There has been built one half mile of this macadam road, fifteen feet wide, at a cost of 56 1-2 cents per running foot.

This being my first attempt at stone road building, together with the fact that it had to be built in September, when I had to pay higher wages to men and teams, made the cost higher.

I think, from the experience gained in building, that macadam road can be built in this town for 50 cents per running foot. As to the advantage of this kind of road over common roads, one has only to ride over it to see for themselves.

### SUMMARY:

Births, 20; marriages, 13; deaths, 37. Dogs licensed: Male, 103; female, 12.

The laws relating to the returns of births and deaths are so vaguely understood that I again call attention to them.

The statute says: "Physicians and midwives shall on or before the fifth day of each month, return to the Town Clerk all births of the preceding month at which they officiated." The law further requires the parents to notify the Town Clerk within forty days of a birth; or, as a further safeguard, the Town Clerk is required to make an annual canvass. But in nearly all cases a physician is in attendance, and if he would make returns once a month a satisfactory system would be established. \* \* \* \* moving a body the undertaker or other person in charge is required to get a permit from the Town Clerk, and before such permit is granted the Clerk should be provided with a physician's certificate and with necessary facts for registration. Through a misunderstanding of this law on the part of the sextons duplicate returns of all deaths in Carver the last year have been made.

Before moving the body of a person whose death was caused by a contagious disease (including membraneous croup) the undertaker or other person in charge should first secure a certificate from the Board of Health or Selectmen acting as such, showing that the law has been complied with, and file this certificate with the Town Clerk when making application for a permit for burial or removal. If this is complied with disagreeable delays may be averted.

I am prepared to furnish blanks for the return of births and deaths according to Chap. 444, Sec. 17, Acts of 1897.

### SCHOOL REPORT.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Citizens of Carver—

Your School Committee would submit their annual report, giving the usual statistical table, the roll of honor, a statement of finances, and such information relative to the condition of the schools and buildings as seem to them the citizens would naturally call for. By a careful perusal of the statistical table a citizen may learn more of the doings of their committee and the privileges accorded to the children of the town than is usually given in lengthy essays. There are some things we may write that the citizens should know that are not given in the tableted page. We do not purpose to burden the town with a lengthy essay. Perhaps at no time during the eighteen different years that your chairman has served the town in the capacity of School Committee have you had a board so distinct in their views as are the present board, and with due deference to each knowing well the position we are forced to occupy by direct votes of the town, will simply place before you the facts relative to our schools, trusting that the future action of our citizens will right any apparent wrong that may now exist. We do not propose to censure the town, as we feel that its action has been taken in sincerity, a proof of which is given in the munificence of its appropriations for its educational interests. The appropriations for 1901 for the varied school purposes, ranging in the aggregate in advance of any previous yearly appropriation in the history of the town, has encouraged your committee to give to the pupils of the town, with the increased number of schools, the amount of schooling, with faithful instructors, as is required by the statutes, and keeping us in a central position with the advantages given by other towns to their pupils.

There have been but few changes in our corps of teachers during the year. Mr. N. F. Atwood resigned his position at District No. 2 at the close of the winter term to continue his studies at Mount Hermon school, having taught two terms satisfactorily. The position was filled with Miss Etta O. Poland, a graduate of the Girls' Latin school, Boston, and a student of Wellesley college. The committee have regarded her efforts with much favor, and she has worked hard to advance the interests of the district. At the close of the fall term, her health being poor, she resigned, and we have filled the position by employing Miss Minnie L. Richards, a graduate of our High school. Miss Ellis resigned her position at District No 3 Grammar school during the summer term, and Miss Alden, of the No. 1 Primary, resigned her school during the fall term. Miss Ellis resigned to enter married life, and Miss Alden to take a school in the town where she resides. We would remember them as faithful instructors, and extend to them both our best wishes for their future success. To supply those vacancies we transferred Mr. E. G. Cornish from the East Head school to take the position vacated by Miss Ellis, filling the vacancy thus made by employing the services of Mrs. Dora F. Gammons, who is well known as one of our teachers in the past and who has an aptitude for the work, and the committee have been well pleased with her efforts in this position. We can not speak too highly of the efforts of Mr. Cornish in this school, and believe he is now doing good work in his new position. We consider him thorough, resolute and punctual in the duties entrusted to him.

To fill the vacancy caused by Miss Alden's resignation we employed Miss Lillian G. Murdock, who came to us well recommended, being a graduate of Abington High school and of Quincy Training school, having attended the Hyannis

Normal school, and for the short time we have had the opportunity to witness her work, we would say we are pleased with her methods and earnestness, and believe the school is progressing finely.

In accord with the vote of the town, the No. 8 school building has been moved near to Fresh Meadow Village and fitted up with the necessary appurtenances to accommodate the few pupils in that locality, and was made ready for the fall term, holding a school for eleven weeks, with Miss Grace R. Gammons, a graduate of our High school, as teacher. We are encouraged to believe that Miss Gammons will make a good teacher.

We would be speak a kind word for all our teachers, feeling they have the interest of our schools at heart. While we may personally consider their merits varied, we would not criticise their efforts. Advice when sought or given by the committee has been pleasantly received and applied. We feel to congratulate the town that our efforts have been so successful in the employment and retaining of teachers.

### REPAIRS.

Your committee have exceeded the appropriation for this account quite heavily, made necessary by there being no special appropriation for putting the No. 8 building in order after its removal, which when landed at its present site was in a very dilapidated condition. The sills, floor, roof, plastering, seats and desks had to have heavy repairs, also the blackboard required considerable attention. A new shed and privies under one roof were built, and a coat of paint applied to the outside of the school house and to the trimmings and doors of shed, and paint and paper on the walls and ceiling of the inside, and the renewing of the seats and desks with paint and varnish have put it in condition to compare favorably with other school buildings in town. Heavy plank steps in front, passing by each door, have been furnished on the

outside, and a few days' work of grading and taking out stumps immediately in front and at sides of building has been done.

Other buildings on which heavy repairs or improvements have been made are at Districts No. 3, 4 and 5.

At No. 3 High school building the windows have had to be reputtied and painted, and a substantial wire fence placed around three sides of the lot, which, as well as ornamental, is serviceable, and shows no depletion by use. At No. 3 Primary building the roof on one side and back end was reshingled and a coat of paint was given to the outside walls. No. 4 Grammar room has had a new hard pine floor throughout room and entries. No. 5 has had a wire fence erected as at the new building, one side of roof shingled and a coat of paint applied to the outside walls. The repairs in other districts have been light and limited to actual necessities.

The lot at District No. 8 is unsightly and unsuitable for a play ground, from the large quantity of brush and stumps remaining there, which may justly be considered in making an appropriation. Also a fence should be erected. It would doubtless be pleasing to teachers and pupils if there were better facilities for obtaining water at each of our school yards.

District No. 4 should have a fence erected on the back and south side of the lot, which may comply with the law, and discontinue the driving of teams across it. The floor at No. 5 is badly worn and its repair is anticipated in the near future. School buildings and premises require constant care. It is not policy to hive our children up where we would bestow but a miserly pittance. We believe the citizens have been generous in this particular when called upon by their committee.

In the minds of the committee the reopening of several small schools has a tendency to weaken the force of instruction in town and very materially increases the cost of our schools. We would encourage consolidation and grading, giving all our pupils within the walls of our school buildings equal facilities. As it is the last time your chairman of the School Committee expects to have the opportunity in an official capacity to advise the citizens, he desires the pardon of the town and associate members for the above xpressions if they may seem officious in view of the recent votes passed by the town.

The addition voted for the use of the High school at the new school building at our last annual meeting was completed in time for the fall term of school. It gives the requisite of a recitation room, is well lighted and makes one of the pleasantest rooms in town. It is a valuable adjunct to the High school, which now occupies the southerly room of said building, being connected with it by an intervening door. The much needed enlargement of the basement attained thereby supplies the necessitous want overlooked in the construction of the building. The facilities for our High school, thus supplied, place us in as favorable a condition for its continuance as is enjoyed by other small towns supporting them.

By the continuance of our High school many parents are stimulated to give their children a High school education, when otherwise they could not afford the expense. So, by its continuance, the interest of the present and future posterity of the town will be enhanced. A class of six pupils graduated the past year after a four years' course, with enjoyable exercises given at the Center Carver Baptist church, whose managers gratuitously loaned the church for the occasion. At the commencement of the fall term a class of seven was admitted. We feel as though they have fallen into good hands, as our instructors of the High school we regard as amply qualified and sufficiently commanding for the position, and are commended by those who mingle with them socially. The names of the graduating class will be given on another page.

Sickness has broken the attendance record considerably during the year in several schools. We see it noted on the No. I Grammar register. In some cases of absenteeism, it appears as though the parents were negligent of the duty they owe their young. Honest, earnest sacrifice has brought joy to many a home. We would encourage parents doing all they can for their children's intellectual culture.

We trust that in the employment of a superintendent, our schools may derive many benefits. The law says we shall employ one after July 1, and with the right man in this position we believe our schools will be improved.
