It will be noticed that there is a net gain of \$88.14 in the income accounts of the Perpetual Care funds. While a reasonable accumulation to meet emergencies is desirable, there is a limit, and in a few cases the limit seems to have been reached. Caretakers of the cemeteries may have a problem in judiciously expending the income of some of the funds, and the best suggestion I can make is that the income be reduced, or at least stopped where it is, by an outlay for flowers and shrubs, and by improving the approaches to the lots concerned. The Stetson, Atwood, C. W. Griffith, T. B. Griffith, Ellis Griffith, and Pratt funds need immediate and careful attention.

In the early part of the year 1917 the Massachusetts Highway Commission made agreement with the Selectmen to pay one half of any amount of money which the town might wish to spend, not exceeding \$20,000, for the purpose of covering a part of the old macadam road with a bituminous top; and their written suggestion was that the amount be \$13,000.

This offer was accepted at the 1917 annual town meeting when \$6,500 was raised and appropriated for the purpose; and, soon after, the State entered into contract with us to spend a like sum.

The section of road called for in the contract was completed, and the orders paid, as shown on pages 16 and 38 of the 1917 town report, amounted to \$9,828.37.

This amount included what was paid for light resurfacing oil and expense for application, but did not include the cost of the heavy oil used in making the bituminous top.

The town expected to receive a bill from the Standard Oil Company for the heavy oil, and also expected \$3,473.09 more from the State as we had received but \$3,026.91 of the \$6,500, which they had promised. We therefore credited the bituminous road account on Dec. 31, 1917, with a balance of \$3,171.73 which is the difference between \$9,828.27, the actual amount expended and the \$13,000 allotted to that work.

On investigation it was found that the Massachusetts Highway Commission, who placed the order for the heavy oil, had paid for the same direct to the Standard Oil Company, so that we had no reason for expecting the \$3,473.09 from the State and no reason for expecting a bill for the oil.

Now, as the total amount actually received to the Bituminous Road Account was \$9,526.91 and the amount actually paid out was \$9,828.27, there was an overdraft of \$301.36.

In 1918 a further expense of \$114.13 was paid from that account as appears on pages 24 and 34 of that year's town report, making in all an overdraft of \$415.49, the amount which was appropriated at the last annual town meeting to balance the account.

As the three items in the above auto truck account, showing the amounts paid for a truck chassis, gasoline and supplies, are not sufficient to make plain the present standing of the same, the following explanation and figures are given:

One year ago through the efforts of Herbert F. Atwood, local Moth Superintendent, the State Forestry Department agreed to give to the Town of Carver, a properly equipped Ford truck for the use of the local Moth Department, provided the town would first pay for it, and later receive reimbursement for the same by means of charges to the State, for the use of the truck, at the same rate per day as if hired from some individual.

The proposition was brought before the town at the annual March meeting, where it was voted to accept the gift from the State, and the sum of \$550 was appropriated for the purpose of affecting the same.

On further consideration of the matter with the Maxim Motor Company of Middleboro, it was found that the amount appropriated would be insufficient to carry out the wishes of the town, and agreement was made with them to furnish a thoroughly equipped truck for \$800, and on payment of \$500 from the appropriation to cover the first cost of the machine, they delivered the same complete to the Town, the balance of \$300 for equipment to be paid in the same way, the State had agreed to reimbuse the town.

The earnings of the truck charged to the Moth, Highway and Fire accounts, and paid to the Maxim Motor Company, from said accounts have finished paying the equipment bill in full, and the truck is ours.

Before and since paying the Maxim Motor Company in full, the trucks earnings on the Moth Account have been charged to the State to the amount of about \$400, and this will be continued until the full sum of \$800, which the town has paid out, has been paid back to us.

The fireproof safe conveniences for the several departments are not in a satisfactory condition. The records stored in the safe in the basement of the Town Hall show signs of mildew, and some records are not kept in town safes. I think the vault is dry enough to be fitted for use, and recommend that the proper fittings be installed so that all departments charged with the custody of public records may be accommodated.

The first volume of Plympton town records dating from the incorporation of the town of Plympton to the incorporation of the South Precinct, contains the only record of this vicinity for the period covered, and I recommend that steps be taken to secure a copy of that record-book.

TOWN MEETING WARRANT

Contents of the warrant for Town Meeting to be held at the Town Hall on Monday, March 1, 1920 at 8 o'clock a.m. The polls will be open at 12 o'clock m., for the election of officers by ballot and will be kept open four hours at least.

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
- Art. 2. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year, beginning January 1, 1920.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to prosecute, compromise or defend any suits for or against the town.
 - Art. 4. To decide when taxes shall become due.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will make the yards of field drivers town pounds, provided they are also chosen pound keepers.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will make an appropriation for a police force, or act anything thereon or thereto.
- Art. 7. To choose all necessary town officers not elected by ballot.
- Art. 8. To see what disposition the town will make of the dog fund.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will accept the report of the Selectmen, and other town officers.
- Art. 10. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges the ensuing year.
 - Art. 11. To choose all necessary town officers. The follow-

ing officers to be voted for, all on one ballot viz: Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, three Overseers of the Poor, two Auditors, three Constables, one Tree Warden, three Herring Committeemen, each for one year; one Assessor, one School Committee, one Road Commissioner, one Trustee of the Public Library, one Park Commissioner, each for three years; and to vote by ballot "Yes" or "No," in answer to the following question: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?"

- Art. 12. To see what pay the town will vote the Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, and other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what compensation the town will vote for labor and teams on the highway, and act thereon.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to sell the old town hall and the lot on which it stands, and act thereon. (Request of E. S. Griffith.)
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to rent or sell the Centre Carver Primary School building and lot, and act thereon. (Request of P. E. Morris.)
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding four thousand dollars for the purpose of resurfacing with a bituminous top or otherwise improving Wenham Road and Main Street from the southerly end of the Bituminous Road and from Plymouth line to the northerly end of Savery Avenue, provided an allotment is received from the State.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding one hundred fifty dollars for the use of the Plymouth County Farm Bureau, and choose a Town Director, as provided in Chap. 273 of the Acts of 1918; and act thereon.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for the purpose of making specific repairs on South Meadow Street from the Albert T. Shurtleff

corner to the line at South Meadow bog, and act thereon. (By request of Philip E. Morris and others.)

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate an additional sum of money for the purpose of resurfacing with a bituminous top or otherwise improving the highway leading from the westerly end of the Bituminous Road on West street to the junction of West and Holmes street, and act thereon.

Art. 20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for observance of Memorial Day, and act thereon.
