Born in Carser, Nov. 18, 1843, and spent his life on the old homestead where he conducted a general business in farming and lumbering. He was the handy man of his village, a Justice of the Peace, member of the School Conmittee most of the time from 1878 to 1904 ; member of the Boards of Seiectmen and Overseers of Poor in 1879 and 1880; member of the General Court in 1896; and one of the town auditors for the ten years preceding his death. He was generous and public spirited. His name was always subscribed to any good cause, and no one renembers when he missed a town meeting from the time he became a voter. Faithful in the discharge of the various duties entrusted to him, he deserves the grateful remembrance of his townspeople.

## report of stperintenident of sichools．

## To the School Committee of Carver：

I herewith submit my first amual report for the year ending December 31，1920．Of necessity the greater part of my work for the past year has been deroted to a study of conditions as they were and did not warrant the introduction of many ideas of my own．Thanks to the successful work of my predecessor， Mr．Humphrey，the schools were in good shape．He left affairs in such a way that it was very easy for me to begin where he left the work．

We have been very fortunate this year in the fact that we have been able to retain nearly all our teachers．In the middle of the year Miss Dunn，the teacher at Pope＇s Point，died．Her place was taken by Mrs．Blanche Holmes of Carver．Mrs．Har－ ris，our teacher at Bate｀s Pond，did not wish to return and Miss Susan S．Perkins was secured to take her place．Mr．Hall， who had been the principal of the High School for several years，felt that it would be better for him，in a professional way， to go to another and larger school．Although I should have liked to retain him I felt he was taking the right course．Miss Knowles，who had been assistant to Mr．Hall，was promoted to the position of principal．The teachers at the present time and their schools are as follows：

High School－Miss Marian Ḱnowles，principal，Campello， Mass．；Miss Mildred Platts，assistant，Holbrook，Mass．

Centre Grammar—Mrs．Helen Griffith，Carrer，Mass．

The work of all these teachers has been marked by faithfulness and loyalty. Each teacher has done all in her power to assist me in getting started in my work. I feel that any success that may hare been gained during the year should be attributed to these hard working teachers. It has, indeed, been a pleasure for me to work with them.

Throughout the country there is a great shortage of trained teachers. It has become not merely a question of securing trained teachers but in many cases of securing teachers of any kind, trained or untrained. A few years ago when a racancy occurred in our schools there were dozens of likely candidates for the position. Now it is often a question of being able to find a single candidate for the place. During the past year a commission appointed by Governor ICoolidge has been studying the matter of teachers' salaries throughout the state. According to the report of this commission the cost of living increased about 100 per cent. from 1910 to 1920 , whereas the average salary of elementary school teachers increased 85.1 per cent. and that of High School teachers $50 . \%$ per cent. It is evident that increases in salary, although very decided have not been equivalent to the increase in cost of living.
"Although the large cities and towns have been able to maintain their standard the small towns have been less successful. One third of the new teachers employed during the past year in 125 small towns without high schools were graduates of secondary schools only, and nearly two-thirds of those in the 50 smallest towns were no better qualified. It is also to be observed that less than 150 out of more than 4,500 students graduated from the Massachusetts Normal Schools during the past five years are teaching in the $\% 85$ one-teacher rural schools of Massachusetts. Although town and city life present strong attractions to many teachers the most potent canse of failure of the smaller towns to secure and retain their quota of qualified teachers is to be found in the low salaries there paid. During the last financial rear the increases in teachers salaries
granted by the cities were about double those granted in the rural towns.

The salaries paid have not afforded adequate recognition of inrestments in time and money which teachers make to secure the necessary preparation for teaching. After completing the secondary school, the typical elementary school teacher deroted two years to further study and the typical high school teacher four rears. The expense incidental to this special preparation, plus the income that might have been derived from emplorment during this period, constitute a substantial sum. In addition to these initial expenses for preparation the ambitious teacher continues during her teaching career to make substantial outlays for professional reading and professional improvement courses."

From the accompanying table we may see how Carrer compares with other towns in regard to salaries. I hare taken towns nearby or those well known. for comparison. I hare not taken special towns in order to make a strong case for more salary increases but have taken the towns on or near the Cape. From the list we see that we are exceeded by the town of Duxbury only in raluation per pupil, yet we are the lowest of all the group in expenditure for teachers' salaries per thousand dollars. It will also be seen that our school tax per thousand is the lowest of all the group. We further find that although We were among the towns that paid the lowest salaries in 191011 our percentage of increase has not been as great as ten of the serenteen towns listed of those that have a smaller percentage of increase all except one paid a larger arerage salary in 1910-11. These figures show very plainly that Carver has not been doing as well by its teachers as the other towns of the state. If we are to maintain a high standard in our schools it will be necessary for us to make most decided increases in salaries the coming year. The past year we madle some increase but not as much as other towns. The special committee which I hare quoted has recommended that the minimum
salary for the state be made $\$ 800$ and that teachers of one year and two years experience be paid $\$ 900$ and $\$ 1,000$ respectively. This, however, is recognized as a minimum for the whole state. I believe the people of Carver want the best teachers obtainable and should provide enough money for salaries to enable us to offer inducements to the most likely candidates who are graduating from the normal schools. Unless we do so we shall be forced to engage high school graduates who can "keep school" but who cannot "teach school." I would suggest that we adopt the following salary schedule for the elementary schools. This is, of course, for normal graduates or those of equivalent experience.

First year, $\$ 900$; second year, $\$ 1,000$; third year, $\$ 1,100$.
I would suggest that in order to bring this about and to get our salaries on a level with other towns and to enable us to obtain the best teachers as well as to retain those whom we now have that we increase the salaries of all elementary school teachers $\$ 100$, the increase to date from the first of January, 1921, and that another increase of $\$ 100$ be made to take effect next fall, applicable to those teachers who remain with us. The new teachers would work on the salary schedule suggested above. This would mean that the town must raise $\$ 460$ additional to take care of the increase from January to June and $\$ 520$ for the increase from September, 1921, to January, 1922, or a total of about $\$ 1,000$ additional for elementary schools. Even with this increase we cannot be assured of getting the best teachers because most teachers prefer to teach in the cities or in the large towns where there are fewer grades for each teacher to handle. Below is given the table of which I have spoken previously:

There seems to be a feeling on the part of oome parents that it is not necessary for a child to attend school regularly. Of course this is a great mistake on the part of the parents because no child can really make up a day that has been lost at school. An attempt may be made by the pupil and teacher after school but the benefit is not as great as that obtained when the whole class is working together. No temporary financial gain can pay for the loss of education which is to become a part of the child's permanent equipment for his life work. Of course there are times of sickness when the child must remain at home, but it should not be necessary to keep a child out for some of the minor reasons we have had this year. I beliere we should make a great effort to improre these conditions. Our state laws require us to see that all children under a certain age are in school. Chapter 44 , Rerised laws, section 2, reads as follows: "Every person having under his control a child as described in section 1 (a child under fourteen). shall canse him to attend school as therein required, and. if he fails for seven day sessions or fourteen half sessions within any period of six months while such control obtains, to cause such child so to attend school, he shall, upon complaint of an attendance officer and conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than twenty dollare, and no phrsical or mental condition which is capable of correction, or which render- the child a fit subject for special instruction at public charge in institutions other than public day schools, shall arail as defence under the prorisions of this or the preceding section. unle.- it shall be made to appear that the defendant has employed all rensonable measures for the correction of the condition and the suitable instruction of the child.

Whoever induces or attempts to induce a child to absent himself unlawfully from school, or employs or harbors a child while school is in ses-son shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars." I believe it is our duty to
sce that this law is strictly enforced. Nthough we post.pone the opening of our schools until the last of september, many pupils stay out until the middle of October. If we open our schools in September we should insist that every one be there at that time. Unless we do so we work a great injustice to those who do enter on time, because their work is retarded by those pupils who enter late. I hope next fall that erery pupil will be required to attend school on the opening day and to continue to attend unless prevented by sickness or some other excellent reason.

I hare instructed the teachers to be more careful in the matter of promotions to the next grade. It is folly to allow a pupil who has not been faithful in attendance and who has not done the proper amount of work to adrance to the next grade. He not only does an injury to himself but helps hold back the others who are trying to do their best. A pupil should be in the grade in which he is able to do his work in a manner satisfactory to himself and his teachers. If he is below grade he has a great amount of spare time on his hands and loses interest in his work. If he is above grade he finds he cannot do the work and soon becomes discouraged. This year we shall try to make sure that the child is prepared for the next higher grade before we promote. If we promote him without proper preparation we are doing him an injustice.

It would be of adrantage to the schools if the parents would visit them more often. No great success can be expected in our schools unless we have parents and teachers working together. A great deal of unjust criticism is directed at the schools by people who never bother to enter them and who do not know the teachers. While all public servants expect to receire criticism, both just and unjust, it seems to me that in consideration of the ralue of education and the importance of our children, we should be more accurate in our criticism and should fully understand both sides of the question before passing judgment. The school committee, teachers and super-
intendent are rery anxious to hare the best schools possible. It is therefore plain that they will be only too glad to assist in bettering any condition that is not for the best interest of the schools. I would suggest that parents and friends risit the schools as often as possible and observe the work of pupils and teachers. If there is anything unsatisfactory or anything that a parent would like to have explained, the superintendent or committee will be rery glad to give attention to it. We can then work together on the matter and can accomplish a great deal more than we could by working in opposite directions. I wish to say that I shall be only too glad to explain any policy or discuss school matters at any time with any one who is interested. If we could do this I feel sure that we could work together much more effectively.

We should make a sufficient provision for the High School, to maintain a high standard. I am afraid that many of our citizens do not realize the difficulty involved in obtaining good high school teachers. Personally I would prefer to hare a man act as principal of our high school, but it is ridiculous to suppose that good men can be secured unless we are willing to pay the price. A man who can fill the place as we would like to hare it would demand at least from $\$ 1,800$ to $\$ 2.000$. It is possible we might find some one for less, but he would not be what we want. If we cannot afford to pay the salary demanded by a man we must engage women as principals. It is far better to hare a capable woman than an incapable man. The town was very fortunate in being able to retain Mr. Hall so long a time. I am sure that we cannot get a man as capable as he was for less than $\$ 2,000$.

It may seem to some of the citizens that the demands for increase of salaries is rery great. It is generally conceded that our safety and well being as a community and as a nation depends on an intelligent and patriotic citizenship. The citizens of the immediate future are in the schools today. The quality of their citizenship will depend rery largely on the qualifica-
tions of the teachers to whom we entrust them, for to a very large degree "the teacher makes the school."

It camnot be said too often or with too much emphasis that, if we would have good schools we must have the best teachers that can be secured, and that in order to secure and retain them we must not only .pay salaries that will afford something more than a bare living, but as individuals and as a community we should make our teachers feel that we appreciate their work and care for their comfort.

I wish to thank the members of the board for their kind treatment, and co-operation during the past year. I sincerely hope and expect that the coming year will find us still working in this harmonious spirit.

## REPORT OF TOWN CLERK

## EACERPTS FROM TOUN MEETING RECORDS.

(March 1.)
Toted: that taxes become due Oct. 15th.
Voted: that a rising rote of thanks be extended to Levi F. Morse for his eighteen years of faithful and efficient services on the Board of Road Commissioners.

The following resolutions were adopted by a rising rote:
The inhabitants of Carver, in town meeting assembled, having heard with deep regret of the death of our townsman, Gustarus Atwood, and in riew of his lifelong interest in public affairs, and his long years in the service of the town, hereby adopt the following resolutions:

Resolved: that we recommend his constant interest in our town councils and his punctual and never failing attendance in town meetings to the emulation of the living.

Resolved: that these resolutions be spread upon the town records and a copy thereof be sent to the members of his remaining family.

Toted: that the Selectmen be instructed to put the town hall in condition for playing basket ball, or any other game which in the judgment of said Board, may seem adrisable.

Toted: that the Assessors be instructed to publish the raluation list in the next annual town report.

Toted: that the Selectmen be authorized to rent or sell the old town house and lot.

## (Norember 2.)

Voted: that the highway leading from a point on Tremont street, north of the farm of Alex. Johnson, to a point on Seipet street, near the house of William Wrightington, et al. be, and hereby is, discontinued.

Voted: to raise and appropriate the stm of six hundred dollars for the use of the Machinery account.

Voted : to raise and appropriate the following sums of money to be added to the tax lery of $19 \because 1$ :

For support of schools, six hundred dollars.
For Quitticas Road account, fifty dollars.
For Health and Sanitation account, five hundred dollars.
Motion: to raise and appropriate ten dollars for South Meadow road account defeated by a vote of one to none.

Voted : to grant the Catholic Society at North Carver the right to use for a cemetery that certain lot outlined and approved by the Board of Health of Carver, after proper hearing.

Voted by a rising vote, yes 36 , No. 0, that the Moderator be authorized and empowered to appoint a Finance Committee of fifteen members who shall hold no other town office, of whom five members shall be appointed for a term of three years: five members for a term of two years : and five members for a term of one year. In 1921, and annually thereafter, the Moderator of the annual town meeting shall appoint five members of said Committee for a term of three years. Said Committee shall choose its own officers and have power to fill vacancies in its membership.

It shall be the duty of this Committee to consider all matters of business included within the articles of any warrant for a town mecting, and it shall be the dute of the Sclentmen. immerliately upon drawing up of a town warrant, to transmit a copy of such warrant to the Finance Committee. The Committee, after due consideration, shall report such recommendations $a=$ it shall deem best concerning all matters contrined
in any town warrant relating to the appropriation of money or which would entail any expense upon the town. The Finaree Committee shall have authority at any time to investigate the books, accounts and management of any department of the town. and the books and accounts of the town shall be open to the inspection of the Committee, or of any person authorized to act for said Committee.

On or before January 20th of each year, the various officers, Boards of lCommittees, in charge of the expenditure of the town's money, shall transmit to the Finance Committee the total amount of their expenditures for the year previous, together with their estimates for the conduct of their department: for the present municipal year, and the Finance Committee shall report to the town before the annual town meeting, the estimates of the several departments, together with their comments and suggestions thereon. The members of the Finance Committee shall serve without pay for services rendered, but may be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties.

## TOWN MEETING WARRANT

Contents of the warrant for Town Meeting to be held at the 'Town Hall on Mondar, March i. 1921. at 8 o'clock a. m. The polls will be open at 12 oclock m ., for the election of officers by ballot and will be kept open four hours at least.

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
Art. 2. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approral of the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year, beginning January 1, 1921.

Art. 3. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to prosecute, compromise or defend any suits for or against the town.

Art. 4. To decide when taxes shall become due.
Art. 5. To see if the Town will make the yards of field drivers town pounds, provided they are also chosen pound keepers.

Art. 6. To see if the town will make an appropriation for a police force, or act anything thereon or thereto.

Art. \%. To choose all necessary town officers not elected by ballot.

Art. S. To see what disposition the town will make of the dog fund.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will accept the report of the Selectmen, and other town officers.

Art. 10. To raise and appropriate such sums of moner as may be necessary to defray town charges the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To choose all necessary town officers. The following officers to be rated for, all on one ballot riz: Town Clerk,
three Selectmen, Treasurer, Collector of Thases, three Orerseces of the Poor, threc Auditors, three Constables, one 'Tree Warden, three Horring Committcemen, each for one year, one Trustee of the Public Library, for two years, one Assessor, one S'chool Committee, one Road Commissioner, one Park Commissioner, each for three years; and to rote by ballot "Yes" or "Y̌o," in answer to the following question: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating bererages in this town :",
. Irt. 12. To see what pay the town will rote the Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, and other town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To see what compensation the town will vote for labor and teams on the highways, and act thereon.

Irt. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding $\$ 4,500$ for the purpose of resurfacing with a bituminous top or otherwise improving Wenham Road and Main Street from the southerly end of the Bituminous Road and from Plymouth line to the northerly end of Savery Avenue, provided an allotment is receired from the State.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding one hundred fifty dollars for the use of the Plymouth County Farm Bureau, and choose a Town Director, as provided in Chap. 2\%3 of the Acts of 1918; and act thereon.

Art. 16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day, and act thereon.
