JAMES W. LEWIS

Although a native of Plymouth Mr. Lewis settled in Carver with his parents at an early age. In his youth his thoughts were turned to the sea where he joined the Grand Banks fishing fleet, but as that industry had begun to decline he retired from the water for a career on the land. After trying various occupations he became a cranberry bog builder, later a manager, and the last years of his life were spent in the service of cranberry growers. He was more widely known, however, as a constable, having a record of nearly thirty years as the chief police officer of his town. Mr. Lewis was well equipped by nature for that rough work with its shafts of abuse and its dangers, and he never hesitated to go alone to the haunts of the element that most men would shun. In spite of its abuse and its dangers Mr. Lewis loved the work, and it was generally conceded that the lawless element had a fear of him that was a deterrent factor in itself.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

One change in the membership of this body has occurred since the last report. After several years of faithful and efficient service Mr. Ruel S. Gibbs has resigned because of his removal to another town. Following the course required by law the Selectmen and the remaining members of the School Committee designated Mr. Ellis D. Atwood to fill the vacancy.

The outstanding item in school affairs during the past year has been the erection of a fine and well equipped school house at South Carver. The School Department is grateful to the Town for providing so excellent a housing for one of our schools and indulges the hope that, in due time, other school houses as good as this one may be erected in other parts of the Town.

Teachers and superintendent have continued to serve without change. For this congratulations are in order. The element of reasonable permanence in organization makes for unbroken purpose and steady movement and encourages the spirit of cooperation which is realized to a good degree in our school system.

The number of our high school pupils still increases. Fifty-nine Carver boys and girls are now in the Memorial High School in Middleboro, 37 per cent more than a year ago. It is significant that our pupils are staying in school for a longer period and seeking fuller education.

The financial report shows a total expenditure of \$33,633.58 during the year 1932. The reimbursements from the State amount to \$9,499.30 so that the cost to the Town was \$24,134.28.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Committee of Carver:

My tenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools is herewith presented.

SCHOOL COSTS

Since we are passing thru what is an unusual period of depression, we have made every effort to see that care is exercised in the use of books and supplies, lights, fuel, etc. In this way we have made a substantial saving in the costs of our schools altho with an increased enrollment. The total cost per pupil from local taxation in our average membership for the year ending June, 1932 was \$91.56 or 53 cents per day.

Thruout the state there has been a persistent drive to cut the costs of schools. The largest item in this budget being that for salaries, the cry has been to cut the teacher's salary. As pointed out in my report of last year, our salary schedule is below that of towns of like standing in our group. Our per pupil cost per day for instruction is 31 cents per day. Our average salary is \$1177. or \$3.22 per day. Some will say that many citizens are not receiving that amount. True; but have they spent from four to eight years in preparation for their jobs before earning anything? Have they been subject to the demands made upon our teachers to support every worthy object, and the same requirements as to dress and continued preparation for their work, the standards of which are increasing constantly?

Another argument has been that teachers should take a cut along with others. Teachers have taken their losses. General wages rose some five years before the teachers received any adequate raise, and with less pay they were faced with high costs of living for these years.

We must in considering the salary question consider the fact that our children in increasing numbers are being prepared to enter High School. Middleboro even after the drastic cut just made is paying their teachers for doing the same job an average salary of more than \$1200.

THE TEACHING STAFF

We have had no change in our teachers for several years, and as a result the spirit of the force is very high. Every teacher attended the course in Middleboro offered by the State Department of Education, and nearly every one is continuing this professional improvement by attending a course given at Plymouth for the next ten weeks. Few towns situated as we are can show an equal record. It surely deserves to be recognized by all interested in seeing that our children get adequate preparation for their future life.

THE BENJAMIN ELLIS SCHOOL

The town is to be most heartily commended for its generosity in furnishing such a building as that at South Carver. The morals of the pupils is greatly improved by their healthful surroundings, and the work has shown great gain.

THE TESTING PROGRAM

This fall we have given the Nelson Reading Tests instead of using the Columbian Test service. The following table shows our standing in the subject.

These tests show the work to be of average success in the schools as a whole. The seventh grade is well above average, but the fifth below. This is attributable probably to the fact that we have there several pupils who are three or more years retarded and this brings the class median below the norm. The great value of these tests is in the opportunity they give the teacher of reclassifying her pupils, offering to each remedial work in that type of reading wherein he is weak. We have I feel, made a gain this year over the past in this most important subject. Much of our trouble lies in the fact that so many of our children have little or no chance to read outside of school, having few books or magazines at home, and in many cases hearing little English conversation which will develop their reading vocabulary. This coming term we are introducing a series of work books in dictionary practice which we feel sure will raise our standard materially.

CLUB WORK

The Junior Red Cross and the 4-H Club work have been carried on this year with excellent results. The reports of the secretaries are included to give an idea of what has been accomplished along these lines.

JUNIOR RED CROSS ACTIVITIES

A Junior Red Cross has been organized in each of the five rooms of the Center School. Its purpose is to do some good wherever possible. The dues, which are about one

cent a week have been used to buy flowers for those who are ill. At Christmas we filled Red Cross boxes for the poor children in hospitals and Mrs. Lillian Atwood took food to the local Red Cross to be distributed. The seventh and eighth grades are making a scrap book of Carver's Industry to exchange with the Junior Red Cross of foreign organizations. A formal business meeting is held each week followed by some sort of entertainment or games.

4-H CLUB REPORT

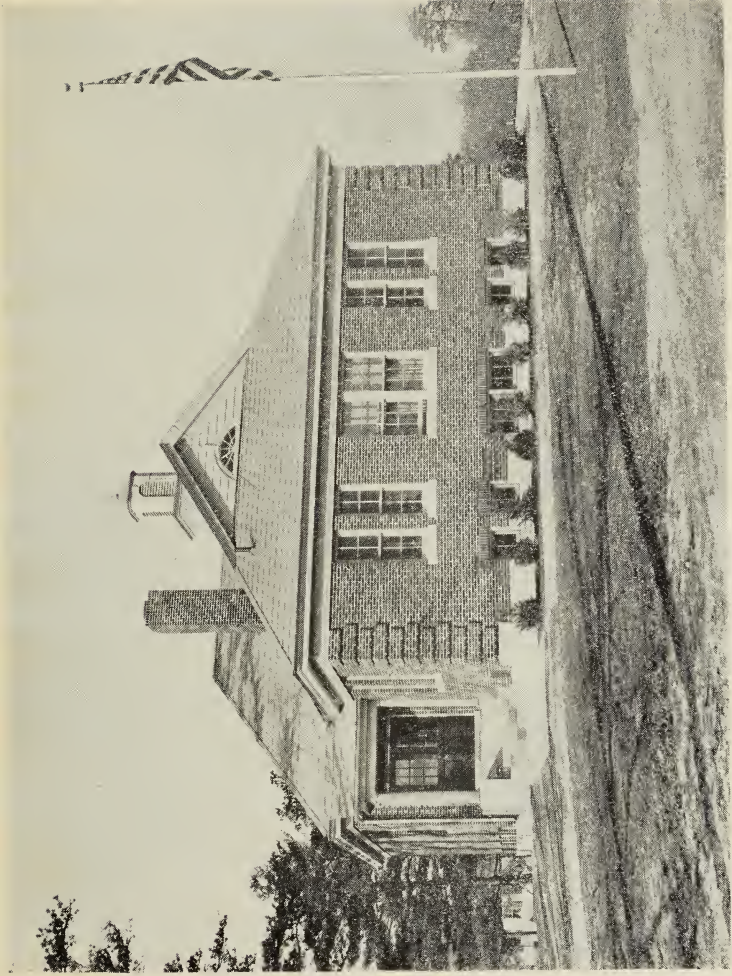
The girls of the seventh and eighth grades have this year formed a clothing club under the leadership of Mrs. McFarlin and have taken the name "The 4-H Handiworkers Club." Margaret Shurtleff is the president and Marie Bolduc the secretary. Meetings are held on Mondays from 11.25 to 12.15. A program is followed which develops "the head to clearer thinking, the heart to greater loyalty, the hands to larger service and the health to better living." The eighth grade members are working on the third year clothing program which includes the making of a school outfit.

Several of the seventh grade are taking the second year program which includes the making of two articles of wear, while the rest are on the home service program. Between work and service it is hoped that club members will gain the knowledge of the care and cost of clothing.

SPECIAL SCHOOL REPORT

The purpose of the Special School is to fit boys and girls to use their hands for the everyday needs in life.

This year we have had an enrolment of twenty-two pupils. Our morning session is devoted to regular academic

work. The allotted time for handwork is two hours a day, so the afternoon session is spent in that way.

A beginner is taught the first steps in woodwork, such as, squaring up stock, the names and care of different tools, sandpapering, and finishing of a project. The more advanced boys are put on different projects and care is given to each step of their work.

Steps in a Project

- 1—Laying out pattern.
- 2—Sawing out.
- 3—Sandpapering.

If an article is to be stained the fourth step is omitted. Many things are made such as end tables, taborets, hanging book sheves, necktie racks, bird houses and various kinds of door stops. Last year we framed eleven George Washington's pictures for the schools in town. At present the boys are making benches for the South Carver school.

The girls are taught sewing, weaving, embroidery and crocheting. They start with small things such as holders and work up to more difficult ones. Swedish embroidery proved very successful as well as braided rugs, embroidery on pillow tops, samplers and towels. This year we made several cellophane belts which were very popular.

The Spring Term is spent in bookbinding. We make several notebooks of different styles also handy telephone pads.

We wish to express our sincere thanks to all who attended our exhibition and sale. We are very pleased to report that we received \$19.25 which will help us to buy more material for another year.

REPORT OF THE BENJAMIN ELLIS SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE

Carver, Mass., Jan. 14, 1933

The erection of the new grade school building at South Carver has been the most important matter before the town for several years.

At the annual 1931 town meeting a committee composed of Ruel S. Gibbs, Mrs. Annie S. Boardway, and Rev. M. Walker Coe was appointed to look into the school house conditions at South Carver. They were to make a report with plans and recommendations at the annual meeting of 1932. An appropriation of \$100.00 was voted for the use of this committee of which \$11.00 was paid to H. C. McFarlin for a plan of the school lot, leaving a balance in this account of \$89.00. Many meetings were held, new buildings were inspected in various towns and, architects Edwin Luce of Marion and Harry L. Meacham Associates of Worcester were consulted for plans and estimates.

The committee were unanimous in condemning the old building and recommending a new two room building with all up to date features.

Both sets of plans and estimates, one in brick the other in wood, with the committee recommendations were presented at the 1932 town meeting. The matter was thoroughly discussed but due to the interest and lack of time an adjourned session of the town meeting was held to complete action on the matter.

At this adjourned meeting it was voted to appropriate \$18,000.00 for a new building at South Carver. An appropriation of \$500.00 was also made to furnish the same. A committee consisting of Ruel S. Gibbs, Mrs. Eleanor L. Shaw, Rev. W. I. Ward, Mrs. Winifred F. Shaw and Ellis D. Atwood were appointed as a building committee.

The first meeting of this committee was held March

28, 1932 and organized with Ruel S. Gibbs, Chairman and Mrs. Eleanor L. Shaw as Secretary. It was unanimously voted to name the new school, The Benjamin Ellis School', in remembrance of one of the old Iron Masters of the town who left a trust fund, the income of which was to be used for the teaching of the school at South Carver. It was unanimously voted to adopt the plans of Harry L. Meacham Associates of Worcester. After various meetings and consultations with Mr. Meacham, the final plans and specifications were accepted by the committee. The bids were opened at a public meeting, June 3, 1932. On June 8th it was voted to award the contracts which after final adjustments were as follows:—Serafino Montanaro of Providence, general contract \$12,546.60, Alfred L. Pappi of Wareham, electrical work \$438.00, John E. Corbridge of South Swansea, plumbing, \$1,766.00 and Taylor Heating Co. of Providence, heating and ventilating \$2,106.00.

The destruction of the old building was turned over to Mr. Eldred S. Mosher at no expense to the Town. Mr. Mosher, in payment for the same, trucked and stored away the furnishings and replaced them in the new building. The small out building and automatic pump were sold to the general contractor for \$50.00 which amount was deducted from his payments. The old heating plant was sold to the Methodist Church at South Carver for \$1.00. This sum has been turned over to the Town Treasurer. The old school house bell has been placed in the library.

Work was started June 13th and the building was accepted for use by the School Committee and dedicated Sept. 9th. At these exercises a handsome flag was presented to the school by the architect, Mr. Meacham. It was raised to the mast head by Mrs. Meacham. Since then the building has been entirely completed.

A description of the building by Harry L. Meacham Associates is as follows:—

The new school building is 49 feet by 59 feet in size, one story and basement in height, and has a pitch roof.

The building is of a modified Colonial design, well suited to the site which it occupies, with exterior walls of Tapestry brick of a full range of red shades, laid up with a white mortar joint, and trimmed with cast stone.

All exterior brick walls are backed up with hollow load bearing tile, insuring dry walls at all times. The roof is covered with Abestos slate of a Sea Green Shade. All interior finish and trim are of North Carolina Pine, stained and varnished.

On the main floor of the building are located two Class Rooms each of 42 pupil capacity, making the total capacity of the new building 84 pupils.

Each Class Room has ample natural light from the left side of the pupils, and is equipped with a Chicago type of wardrobe located at the rear of the room, as well as a book-case and teacher's closet. All class room windows are of the Austral ventilating type, assuring maximum ventilation without drafts, and the window sills are of Buff color brick.

The black-boards are of the best quality natural slate, with bulletin boards and tack boards of Celotex. All class room ceilings are of Celotex tile, providing perfect accoustics in these rooms.

Also on this floor are located the Supply Room as well as the Teacher's Rest Room, the latter having private toilet facilities, as well as a coat closet for each teacher. Toilet Rooms for both boys and the girls are located on the first floor, are well lighted and have floors of Asphalt Tile. All toilet compartments are of sheet steel finished in Gray enamel. All plumbing fixtures are of Vitreous China, and the toilet rooms are well ventilated by means of an exhaust fan.

A corridor 8 feet in width is provided, having exits at each end of the building, and so divided by means of Smoke Screens, that maximum safety is assured the pupils in case of fire. Corridor Floors are of Battleship Linoleum.

In the basement of the building, which is extremely well lighted, are located a Play Room, also the Boiler Room and Fuel Room.

The Play Room is 28 feet by 57 feet in size and is for use in cold or stormy weather. It is well lighted by means of 15 windows located on three sides of the room, and ample exit to the outside is provided by means of a ramp.

Adjoining the Play Room is located the Kitchenette, which can be equipped for the preparation of hot school lunches.

All lighting fixtures throughout the building are of the most modern type for school house use, and the building is also equipped with electric fire alarm system, as well as electric clocks. Each class room is wired for a radio receiving set.

Heating of the building is by means of a vapor system of steam. Ventilation is provided for by means of electrically driven ventilating units installed in each class room, and two foot warmers have been installed in the Corridor, one near each entrance to the building.

A steel septic tank of 1000 gallons capacity and a tile field have been installed for the disposal of sewerage from the building, and a motor driven pump and pressure storage tank provide for an ample supply of pure water from driven wells.

The grounds at the front of the building have been graded, seeded and planted, a circular drive-way of ample width constructed, and a steel flag-pole 25 feet in height has been purchased and erected.

Also granolithic walks and drip strips have been constructed around the building.

Since the completion of the building the School Committee have installed oil heat which the Building Committee were unanimous in advocating.

The work of your Committee has been completed:— the building is in use and speaks for itself. We were very

fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Meacham as architect. He relieved the Committee of practically all details and it is due to his efforts that the school was completed on schedule and within the appropriation. In closing we wish to submit the reports of the funds appropriated for our use.

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in Town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Carver on Monday the 6th day of March 1933 at 8:45 o'clock in the forenoon then and there to act on the following articles.

Art. 1. To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer with the Approval of the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1st, 1933.

Art. 2. To see if the Town will Authorize the Selectmen to prosecute, compromise or defend suits for or against the Town.

Art. 3. To decide when taxes shall become due.

Art. 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers not elected by ballot.

Art. 5. To see what disposition the Town will make of the dog fund.

Art. 6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see what pay the town will vote the Treasurer, Collector of Taxes and other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day and act thereto.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept cemetery funds and act anything thereon or thereto.

Art. 10. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture and Choose a Town Director as provided in Section 41 and 45 of Revised Chapter 128 of the General Laws and act thereto.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Seventy-Five Dollars (75) for rental for the American Legion. Money to be paid to the Commander of the Sons of Veterans and act thereon or thereto. (By request).

Art. 12. To see if the Town of Carver will instruct the members of the School Board of Carver to award all contracts for transportation of school pupils in said town only after duly advertising the routes for competitive bids and duly considering the same.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of five (5) to consider amending the By-laws of the Finance Committee, and report back at a special Town Meeting to be called for that purpose if necessary and act thereon or thereto.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to have the Board

of Public Welfare appoint an investigator of all applicants for aid; that said investigator shall be a local resident in no way connected with said Board, compensation for said investigator to be arranged by Board of Public Welfare or act thereon.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to order the Town of Carver School Committee to close the School at Carver Center, known as the Special School, at the end of the present school year and transfer the pupils therein back to their proper grades or act thereon.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to order its Town Officers to advertise for bids on all supplies purchased locally, said advertisements to be posted on the bulletin boards at the Town Hall and the Post Offices in Carver, or act thereon.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the fund known as The Gasoline Tax received from the State under Acts and Resolves, General Court 1932, Chapter 243, Section 1 from the Assessors' account to a special fund to be known as the Unemployment Relief Fund, said fund to be expended under the joint supervision of the Selectmen and Department heads and act thereon or thereto.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old Federal Road, so called from Tremont St., South to the road leading from the Shoestring Village to the Old Benjamin Wrightington Homestead and act anything thereon or thereto.

Art. 19. To choose all necessary town officers, the following officers to be voted for all on one ballot viz:

Moderator, Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Three Auditors, Three Constables, Three Herring Committeemen, One School Committeeman and one Tree Warden each for one year. One Assessor, One Selectman, One School Committeeman, One Cemetery Commissioner, One

Park Commissioner, One Member of Public Welfare and Two Library Trustees each for Three Years.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, at the several places designated by vote of the town seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting.

The polls will be open at 12 o'clock noon and will be open for at least four hours.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
