

REPORT OF SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND
MEASURES

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen—In compliance with the General Laws of Massachusetts, I herewith submit my report of 1934 as Sealer of Weights and Measures.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS

To the Selectmen:

I am submitting to you a report of the work done on the highways during the past year.

Under Chapter 81 of the General Laws the Town appropriated \$6800 and received \$10,200 from the State. Owing to weather conditions last winter much more repair work was necessary on surfaced roads. There was tar penetration built on the following roads: 4000 feet on Meadow Street, 1000 feet on Church Street, and 1000 feet on France Street. This completed France Street to the Middleboro line. 8000 feet of the side roads received a crushed gravel top. A portion of Holmes Street was widened, straightened, and gravelled in readiness for a tar application which is expected to be made next summer. It is also planned to build another part of Meadow Street with a penetration top.

Under Chapter 90 of the General Laws the Town appropriated \$1500, received \$1500 from the County and \$3000 from the State. This money was portioned over Tremont Street and Cranberry Road. There was 1500 feet of Mixed in Place Tar Penetration built on Tremont Street; which finished this street to the Plymouth line. 4000 feet of Cranberry Road was gravelled and given a Mixed in Place Tar top. This portion of Cranberry Road was widened and straightened under the C.W.A. last winter.

REPORT OF E.R.A. ADMINISTRATOR

To the Board of Selectmen,
and Voters of the Town of Carver:

I think a report should be made by me to show what the conditions are in our Town that comes under the E.R.A. Program.

E.R.A. is the successor to the C.W.A. Selectman Earl B. Ware was the first Administrator, serving without pay for his services. Many projects were put through by him, giving employment to many men,

Among those projects were the Cranberry Road; cutting brush; improving Town Hall Lot; trimming trees in Savery Lane, and painting Gypsy Moth Nests.

Since I became Administrator, E.R.A. regulations have changed. Relief is the password, and Welfare the subject.

Each worker, to be eligible for an E.R.A. job, must be either a Welfare recipient or eligible for such relief.

Applications for work are received by me at the Town Hall daily, and are examined and investigated by a Social Service Worker from E.R.A. Headquarters.

At the present time, according to their ratings, I have filed the following applications for work:

Each worker averages 24 hours a week, the money paying for those services being furnished by the E.R.A.

All material and truck hire has to be borne by the Town as their part.

One project I wish to call the attention to is a sewing project, employing 6 women, who sew garments for the needy in this Town. They make mostly women's and children's clothes which are distributed by the Welfare Board.

Projects in operation since my administration have cost the Town less than \$500.00, while the Government has expended nearly \$7000.00. There is no charge in these figures for services rendered by myself.

Without adopting an E.R.A. program, I feel safe in saying that the bills for relief in this Town would be a great deal larger than what they really are.

REPORT OF COUNTY AID TO AGRICULTURE
(Plymouth County Extension Service)
CARVER — 1934

In every branch of agriculture the Extension Service endeavors to keep the farmers of the county acquainted with developments in production and marketing, to give specific advice on individual problems and lend aid in cooperative enterprise. In addition to the usual lines of work it has been important this year to keep the farmers of the county informed of their position under the agricultural programs of the federal government.

Marketing programs and new farm credit facilities have been most helpful here. Farmers of the county took advantage of the latter to an amount of nearly \$400,000 during 1934. During the year over 3200 farmers in the county were supplied with information in some form on problems directly affecting their production problems.

It is a responsibility of the Extension Service to make available to women in the home a knowledge of the best current practices relative to keeping the family satisfactorily fed, clothed, and housed, and to aid in adjusting these practices to the family standards and pocket book.

Our home program has reached at least 3000 people either indirectly in solving problems, or through groups organized to study specific points of homemaking. In our major projects alone — Children's Coats, Home Furnishing, Chair Seating, and Parent Education, — fifty-three study groups were formed with over five hundred women enrolled.

In 4-H Club Work, the Extension Service provides for the boys and girls of the county an opportunity for educational development through study and practice in home economics and agriculture, as well as an opportunity for

self improvement. It emphasizes the home and brings club members and parents together in a common interest. It develops cooperation, leadership, self-confidence, ambition, sportsmanship, ability to think, responsibility, and community spirit.

Carver citizens, in addition to participating in the many county-wide activities of the Extension Service, have benefited by the following specific activities which were carried on in the town itself.

Carver benefits more than any other town from the services of the cranberry agent supplied by the Extension Service. Personal visits were paid to nearly fifty bog owners in town to give advice on cranberry problems. In addition, all growers were supplied with copies of the Pest Control chart for cranberries and were sent mimeographed circulars giving timely suggestions on pest control. The agricultural agent met with the Garden Club on one occasion. Citizens of the town interested in other agricultural subjects were supplied regularly with material giving suggestions and information.

Homemakers have organized groups to study problems of child training. They have learned to upholster chairs and also to reseat with cane, fiber, or rush, at one of the largest local groups in the county.

Many have attended meetings in home ground improvement.

Four-H Club members enrolled in the following 4-H Clubs during 1934 — garden, lunch box, and canning.

The Garden Club under the leadership of Mrs. Wm. Holmes had an exhibit at the Old Home Day celebration and it is hoped that this exhibit will become a permanent affair.

The Lunch Box Club was led by Mrs. Anne McFarlin, who gave the boys and girls some training in packing attractive nutritious lunches.

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REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Committee of Carver:

I herewith submit my twelfth annual report as Superintendent. The teaching force remains the same with the exception of the Special School. Mrs. Walton resigned in June and Miss Eleanor Birch of Lynn was elected to fill that position, and is proving a valuable member of the corps. As usual, several availed themselves of the short course at Brockton this summer, and served on the committee working with Miss Porter of the State Department, in revising the course of study in Physical Education. With the enrichment of this work, it would seem most wise to employ a male instructor on part time to take the boys of the Center School for three periods each week, thus giving the girls the full attention of their teachers. Many of the upper grade boys are mature and need more strenuous work than the regular teacher should be asked to give.

In cooperation with Mr. Burkland of the Bates School, Middleboro, we have organized our opening exercises upon the basis of a course in character building and safety education. This is based upon biographical studies, open discussion of situations arising in the pupils' lives, and current events; thus all freshmen entering the High School should possess a common ground work for their first year's program in this field.

ENGLISH

In 1931 we joined with some forty thousand other teachers throughout the nation in a program of testing and studying the individual problems as revealed by the

remedial and diagnostic forms published through the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

As a result of this study, the present status of mastery of English usage in each grade has been determined objectively. As a further result, the Psychological Institute has issued an effective sequence of introducing principles of usage for grades three to six. The adoption of such a sequence should free our teachers and pupils from the wasteful practice of spending time upon principles of little importance, and insure the introduction of phases of usage in an order consistent with the needs and abilities of the pupils in these grades. The sequence is designed not only to insure emphasis on essentials, but also to insure the greatest possible progress in the mastery of the phases of usage taught. Knowledge of the relative difficulty which each phase presents to pupils of each grade made it possible to plan the introduction of each principle of usage in such a way that the child is not confused nor burdened with problems beyond his capacity.

We have introduced the first book of the series in Grade Three. The lessons are planned to give the pupil adequate training in organizing his thoughts and in expressing them clearly. The child's own experiences at home and at school, his games, his tasks, and his travels are made a basis for oral and written expression.

A procedure has been developed by which pupils assist one another in guarding against speech errors not only during the English class period, but in other classes and on the playground. Trials which have been made indicate that the method has proved its effectiveness. Supplementary exercises are provided to give additional drill, and tests have been worked out as an integral part of the teaching method.

OBJECTIVES

To bring to the parents and others interested a concise idea of our work, it would seem worth while to state the general aims of the English work by grades.

In the First Grade we seek:

1. To correct wrong speech habits of pre-school life.
2. To enunciate clearly and pronounce words correctly.
3. To encourage the beginner to tell about familiar experiences.
4. To establish sentence sense.
5. To accustom the child to speak freely before others.
6. To lay a foundation for written work.

In Grade Two:

1. To develop the ability to express in a few sentences something the pupil really wishes to express.
2. To think complete sentences before speaking or writing.
3. To establish the use of a natural tone and clear enunciation.
4. To secure correct use of capitals, periods and question marks.

In Grade Three:

1. To secure complete thoughts in sentences.
2. To use new words.
3. To make good beginning and ending sentences.
4. To keep to the point.
5. To use meaningful sentences.

In Grades Four, Five and Six we strive for still further growth in the mastery of the essentials and to secure intelligent criticism of the pupil's own work and that of his classmates.

In Grades Seven and Eight the aim is:

1. To teach through use, and in the order and to the extent that the pupil needs them, the forms and principles of grammar that will enable him to make correct and effective sentences.

2. To train the pupil in sentence analysis to such an extent that he can recognize with ease and certainty the parts of a sentence, and can apply the principles of grammar and the rules of punctuation in constructing and in revising his own sentences.

3. To arouse an ever growing interest in words.

4. To stimulate the pupil to note both the content and the words used by the writer in conveying his meaning.

5. To train the pupil in the regular use of the dictionary.

CLUBS

4-H Club Work is carried on in the upper grades of the Center School. During the past year a 4-H Lunch Box Club improved the appearance of their lunch boxes and contents, new kinds of sandwiches were tried, simple desserts made, and a more balanced and nutritious lunch resulted.

At the Old Home Day celebration the 4-H Garden Club put on a fine exhibition of flowers and vegetables which was of interest to many of those present.

In the Fall, a club known as the Faithful Workers was organized. This club is working on the first program of the Clothing Project. Simple stitches have been taught, demonstrations by members have been given and gifts made for Christmas. An exhibition of work accomplished during the year is planned for the Spring.

A 4-H Handicraft Club for the boys of the eighth grade has been considered, and this will be in effect before the

close of the school year, so that both boys and girls will be carrying out the 4-H pledge of clearer thinking, greater loyalty, larger service and better living for their clubs, community and country.

Junior Red Cross Clubs have been formed for the year in all the rooms. The meetings are conducted in a parliamentary way with officers duly elected by the different clubs. Each club has made its own decision as to dues. Some have none, some have a few cents a month, while the rest give — but no stated amount. Committees are appointed for planning work as well as for entertainment.

The club members bring in many ideas of service for others as they try to follow the motto, "I Serve.."

Mrs. McFarlin has generously given her time to the direction of the 4-H Clubs, and attended the Conference at Amherst for a week during the summer.

The Finance Committee herewith submits its report and recommendations to the Town on the articles in the Warrant for the annual meeting to be held March 4, 1935.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT
