SPECIAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Voters of the Town of Carver :

Your Board of Selectmen wish to present to you a brief resumé of the heating facilities now installed in your Town Hall.

At our last Annual Town Meeting a plan as submitted to a special committee was read to you, for a vote, as to whether you would install a new modern heating system or repair the old one.

By your vote, as recorded, you did not approve of any special system or model of heating, so we, as your representatives, made a most thorough investigation of various systems.

We even employed a Heating Engineer, an expert, who was most highly recommended, Mr. James P. Dwyer Jr., of Boston and Braintree.

He advised the following, which is an accurate copy of his letter to us :

“Honorable Board of Selectmen,
Town of Carver, Mass.

Dear Sirs :

To properly draw a comparison between the installation of General Electric Oil Burning Boiler with 750 square feet of direct cast iron radiation, using a one-pipe system of steam piping, with one present furnace used to supply the fresh heated air to the Assembly Hall as required under the Mass. Law and the Heating and Ventilating System proposed by my plans and specifications and installed in the Town Hall, the following data is known :

3. The type of heating system installed is commonly called a modulation system of steam heating, using thermostatic traps on the return end of all radiators, units and drip points in the piping system, with modulation type of supply valve on the supply end of all radiators. This type of apparatus is a very modern and up to date type of installation which permits a very marked degree of temperature regulation by the supply valve on each radiator, which is impossible with a one pipe heating system.

The method of Ventilation is generally referred to as a Unit System, using ventilating units which are self-contained, heating the fresh air and discharging same into the Assembly Hall.

In the G. E. scheme, one of the present furnaces was to be used to supply fresh air to the Hall. This would require the retention of the fresh air duct from the furnace to the Hall. The State Supervisor of plans does not approve of this type of System, especially when the Hall is located on the Second Floor. The fire hazard is too great.

4. The cost of operating the G. E. system, according to the Contractor will be \$240.00 but to this must be added \$250.00 for the furnace used with this scheme, or a total of \$490.00.

The cost of the heating, with the present installation, using soft coal should be not more than \$245.00 but if hard coal is used, the cost of operation would be \$420.00.

In conclusion, I wish to state that the entire Heating and Ventilation system as installed is ultra-modern in

every respect. It is flexible and will prove inexpensive to operate. It can at any time be converted to an oil-burning job which I would advise doing as soon as possible.

To retain one on the present furnace would have continued the fire hazard in the Hall and possible loss of life due to this scheme.

On June 4, 1935, the contract for installation of a heating and ventilating system in our Town Hall, was awarded to Mr. Perez Shurtleff, a native of Carver, who was the second lowest bidder.

Mr. Shurtleff's bid was \$3,098., or Sixty-One dollars higher than the lowest bidder. There were 14 bidders with bids ranging from \$3740 to \$3037.

The heating was installed by Mr. Shurtleff under the direct supervision of Mr. Dwyer, the engineer.

The fire room has also been made fire proof, and passed inspection.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen:

I am submitting to you a report of the work done during the year of 1935.

Under Chapter 81 of the General Laws the Town appropriated \$6,700 and received \$10,050 from the State. There was considerable oiling and honing done in 1935. \$1,000 was spent replacing wood guard rails with wire cable guards. Holmes Street, from West Street to Fosdick Street, and 1,000 ft. of Fosdick Street was widened graveled and tarred. Meadow Street was widened and graveled with W.P.A. furnishing the Common Labor. 2,000 ft. of this street was surfaced with tar. The remainder of Chapter 81 money was spent gravelling muddy places on others streets.

Under Chapter 90 of the General Laws the Town appropriated \$1,700, received \$1,700 from the County and \$3,400 from the State. Of this money \$6,708.72 was spent to complete Cranberry Road.

The \$3,350 received from the State under the Bond Issue was used to widen, raise and gravel Popes Point; Street. This gravelling was done with crushed gravel; and the Street is ready for a Tar top.

REPORT OF COUNTY AID TO AGRICULTURE

Plymouth County Extension Service, Town of Carver,
By Mrs. A. C. Holmes, Town Director

In presenting the report of Extension Service activities for the town of Carver, I would like to first call your attention to the fact that the Plymouth County Extension Service has been functioning for the betterment of Agriculture, Home Life, and the boys and girls of the County for twenty-one years. It is your organization and serves you only insofar as you ask for service.

Report of Agriculture

The County Extension Service endeavors to present useful and practical information to farmers of the County and encourage the application of the same. We aid in securing and presenting information on production, marketing, and assist in cooperative enterprises. During 1935, farmers of the County have been kept informed of their position under the various Agricultural Control Program. The poultry and egg market program set-up in 1934 gave poultrymen an opportunity to sell \$430,000 worth of produce during 1935. Farm credit programs were especially important during the past year. 3187 farmers in the County were supplied with timely information regarding agricultural problems, while 559 farm visits were made.

Home Demonstration Work

In Home Demonstration Work, the Extension Service assists home-makers with problems relating to the practical management of the home, bringing up of children,

and providing a good home environment.

In home-making, the Extension Service brought help to women during 1935 in food buying and preservation, clothing construction and renovation, child training, improvement of home grounds, planning recreational programs, and the keeping of home accounts. Well over 3,000 women participated in this program.

Club Work

In 4-H Club work, the Extension Service provides for the boys and girls of the County an opportunity for educational development through study and practice in home economics and agriculture, as well as an opportunity for self-improvement. It emphasizes the home, and brings club members and parents together in a common interest. It develops cooperation, leadership, self-confidence, ambition, sportsmanship, ability to think, responsibility, and community spirit.

There were 100 4-H Clubs organized in 1935, with an enrollment of 1600 boys and girls. These clubs were under the supervision of 100 volunteer local leaders. Twenty-six of the twenty-seven towns and cities had club work this year.

Home Demonstration Work

Many homemakers attended the garden maintenance meetings which were held in the county. Carver also participated in the home accounts program.

Agriculture

The Cranberry Agent made 46 farm visits upon request of cranberry growers to assist in problems relative to cranberry growing. County Agent made several calls upon request of farmers relative to agricultural problems. One poultry meeting was held in the town.

Carver men attended many meetings of County-wide nature. On the mailing list to receive timely information on various agricultural projects are: 7 dairymen, 7 poultrymen, 9 interested in fruits and market garden, and 82 cranberry growers.

4-H Club Work

There were 50 boys and girls enrolled as 4-H Club members in the handicraft, garden, and clothing clubs during the past year.

The garden club members were under the supervision of Mrs. Wm. Holmes who visited and scored the gardens. An exhibit of garden products was held in conjunction with the annual Old Home Day in August. Oliver and Oiva Harju of South Carver were visited by a committee from the Sippican Pamona Grange, who were selecting the best 4-H gardens in the district.

Miss Eleanor J. Birch led the boys' handicraft club and gave them training in use of the common tools.

Mrs. Anne McFarlin continued her excellent leadership of the girls in their 4-H Clothing Club. The clubs combined and gave a fine program for parents at their annual exhibit in the spring.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Committee:

I herewith submit my thirteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHERS

Our teaching force has changed more this year than at any time in my experience. In June Mrs. Hudson resigned after 29 years of faithful and efficient service. Mrs. Blanche Holmes has been assigned to the principalship at the Benjamin Ellis School, and Miss Florence Kaski was elected to fill the vacancy in that school, Miss Marjorie Griffith having been assigned to the first grade at the North School.

Miss Birch resigned from the Special School in August, and Miss Webb, who was selected for that position, left after one week, and Miss Evelyn Cooper of Marblehead, a graduate of Salem Teachers' College, was elected to finish the year.

All of our teachers attended the course in Mental Hygiene given by Dr. Elkind and Miss Henderson, of the Mass. Society for Mental Hygiene, at Middleboro. The teachers deserve great credit for their faithful attendance and fine response. Several also attended the Graduate Day at Bridgewater, receiving much help and inspiration. The principals have worked with the group of principals of this section studying activity programs.

Union teachers' meetings have been held as usual in each town with increased morale and added efficiency in the work. We should be proud of the teaching force and their desire and willingness to keep to the forefront in all worthwhile developments.

ULTIMATE AIMS

The question has been asked, "Why the course in Mental Hygiene?" Studies have clearly emphasized that serious emotional distress is very common in childhood and adolescence, and that such difficulties may have exceedingly unfortunat consequences, even affecting both intellectual and physical growth. It has also been shown that the origins of these distresses were essentially simple and understandable, and therefore could be dealt with. Therefore we must in our schools work systematically, with the help of other social agencies, to prevent maladjustments and to make childhood and youth the zestful and happy periods of life they should be. Increased physical health and intellectual efficiency as well as the avoidance of adult unhappiness should be the result.

TESTING PROGRAMS

The testing program is being continued by the use of diagnostic tests to emphasize the individual and class weaknesses in reading and mathematics. These tests show the teachers which children need individual attention, which are so advanced that they require special assignments to keep them from utter boredom, and in which subjects special testing is needed.

Practise tests show the pupil as well as the teacher what he has mastered, and what particular topics need special drill. By keeping a graph of class or individual progress, the interest is better held and ambition stimulated.

At the end of the year Achievement Tests are given to aid in the classification of pupils. These tests are filed and furnish a basis for holding pupils to more satisfactory work through comparison with their previous records.

ARITHMETIC

In my last report I dwelt upon the English course. This year I would emphasize mathematics.

Success in Arithmetic as in other fields depends upon the readiness of the individual for the work which is to be undertaken. This has brought about certain changes in the course of study, especially in the lower grades. The present tendency is to make the number work a natural result of the child's experience. Whatever is done in number work in the lower grades especially becomes a part of a general activity. The purpose of such number work is to create a readiness on the part of the child to carry on the more definite arithmetical activities which will naturally occur in the life activities of the children.

ARITHMETIC AS A TOOL SUBJECT

Formerly arithmetic was quite generally an intelligence test. The belief prevailed quite generally that any one who was efficient in solving intricate problems would be equally efficient in almost any type of school work. It is now generally accepted that the aim in arithmetic teaching should be social. In our endeavor to fit the pupil to meet the needs of society, the work in the elementary grades is limited to the processes which are clearly of use in life, and we seek to secure 100% mastery of these fundamental processes.

MEETING INDIVIDUAL DIFFERENCES

Children in our public schools range in mental ability from the feeble-minded to the genius. Provision must be made therefore, to meet this variation. The mastery of the tool facts must proceed only as rapidly as the child is able to show 100% accuracy. The slower children need much more time in order to perfect themselves in the number combinations, while the brighter children will require much less time to attain

mastery. To meet these conditions the classes are divided into small groups for drill, and these groups constantly shift as the needs of each child are brought out through the tests which reinforce all good teaching.

HEALTH

In almost every class room we find children who become fagged out before the school day closes, and present a disciplinary problem because they are too tired to settle down to study.

One of the first facts that parents should realize is that the child's school day actually begins the night before. No boy or girl can be in the best condition to profit by their opportunity for education if they do not come to school refreshed by a sufficient night's sleep. They should go to bed at an hour which will permit them to be rested and ready to get up in time to dress and eat breakfast without rushing. Certainly late hours or social events that upset the bedtime schedule are not the proper preparation for the school day.

Breakfast is in many respects the most important meal for the growing child. It must be ample, simple, and eaten leisurely. If a child has no appetite for this meal, there is probably something wrong with the health program; more sleep and less excitement are needed. Fruit, cereal, milk to drink,—no tea or coffee,—toast and occasionally an egg or bacon make the best breakfast.

If parents would only remember that every day is a growing day for a boy or girl, and that what is important for health today is important tomorrow, they would establish a daily schedule and keep it rigidly. Routine means a great deal in a child's life. A definite and early bed time, a regular hour for arising, and meals at regular hours are indispensable in any child's health program.

TOWN WARRANT AND REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1936, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed eight hundred dollars (\$800.) from the free cash in the town treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the cemetery funds in the town treasury, all monies expended under this vote to be refunded before the end of the current year.

Article 2. Recommended.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the cemetery fund or funds paid into the town treasury under the perpetual care statutes, or act anything thereon.

Article 3. Recommended.

Article 4. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to prosecute, compromise or defend suits for or against the town.

Article 4. Recommended.

Article 5. To see what disposition the town will make of the dog fund.

Article 5. Recommend it be added to the library appropriation.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day and act thereto.

Article 6. Recommended.

Article 7. To see what amount the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture (Plymouth County Extension Service) and to choose a town director as provided in Sections 41 and 42 of Revised Chapter 128 of the General Laws and act thereon.

Article 7. Recommended.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75) for rental for the American Legion. Money to be paid to the Treasurer of the Sons of Veterans and act thereon or thereto.

Article 8. Recommended.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the pruning of dead wood from the elms, and for the removal of any dead or dying elms on the public streets, and act thereon or thereto. (Request of Massachusetts Forest and Park Association).

Article 9. Recommended.

Article 10. To choose all necessary Town Officers not elected by ballot.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to retire George E. Blair, Janitor of the Town Hall, on a pension, appropriate money for the same, and act thereon or thereto.

Article 11. Recommend this article be referred to voters at Town Meeting.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue Mayflower Road from the West fire line on reservation to Plymouth line, and act thereon or thereto.

Article 12. Recommend to discontinue.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to accept the road leading to Myles Standish Reservation from Cranberry Road to the Plymouth line when laid out by the Selectmen, and act thereon or thereto.

Article 13. Recommend to voters at Town Meeting.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) as expenses for the planning board committee, and act thereon or thereto.

Article 14. Recommended.

Article 15. To see what pay the town will vote the Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes and other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 15. Recommend this article be referred to voters at Town Meeting.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) provided allotments are received from the State and County, under Chapter 90, General Laws, for surfacing Purchase Street, and act thereon or thereto.

Article 16. Not recommended.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to take eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) from the Free Cash in the Treasury, said sum to be used for the purpose of reduction in taxes for 1936.

Article 17. Recommended.

Article 18. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 19. To choose all necessary town officers, the following officers to be voted for all on one ballot, viz.: Moderator, Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Three Auditors, Three Constables, Three Herring Committeemen, One School Committeeman and One Tree Warden each for one year. One Assessor, One Selectmen, One School Committeeman, One Cemetery Commissioner, One Park Commissioner, One Member of Public Welfare and Two Library Trustees each for Three Years, and to vote by ballot "Yes" or "No" in answer to the following questions: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of all alcoholic beverages?" and "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of wines and malt beverages?"
