

#### (March 8)

Voted to accept the following cemetery funds;

Voted that the dog fund be appropriated for the free public library account.

Article 13 amended to read as follows, that the town authorize the special committee on school housing conditions to petition the Legislature to grant this town permission to borrow a sum of money not exceeding Ten Thousand Dollars, to be used for the purpose of meeting the expense of remodeling the Center School House and the North School House. Further amended by striking out the words "Special Committee on School housing conditions" and inserting the word "Selectmen".

Voted by check list—Yes 44 No 40.

Voted that the Special Committee on School Housing conditions appointed at the annual meeting in 1937 be continued with authority to complete its study of Housing conditions at Center and North Carver and report to a future meeting of the Town.

Voted that the traffic light situation in the Town be studied by the same or a newly appointed committee for the purpose of bringing to the next town meeting definite recommendations with estimates of total cost of installing a different form of traffic signal at the more dangerous intersections of the Town and doing away with the present dummies or blinkers.

The same committee to continue.

Voted that the By-Laws Committee be held over for another year with one additional member appointed to take the place of Allen A. MacDonald.

#### (June 13)

Art. 3 amended as follows: To see if the Town will vote that a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to investigate the advisability of purchasing a new fire apparatus and to report at the next annual town meeting and to make recommendations. Amendment voted.

Art. 4. Report of Special Committee on School Housing. This committee has now completed study of conditions at the Center and North Schools. We feel that better and more sanitary accommodations should be provided at both schools. Several possible methods of attaining the desired ends have been considered.

As a result of our inspection of the buildings, consultation with architects, and study of plans, we recommend as follows;

- 1. If the town feels that it is practical and desirable to remodel both schools, that the work be done as a W. P. A. project under plans presented by Harry L. Meacham associates of Worcester, to wit: remodel the Center School building and increase the floor space of said building, so as to provide a five class room building with a Teacher's room, Recreation room and Flush toilets, and to make such incidental changes as may be necessary: all at an approximate cost to the town of \$6,775.00. Further, to remodel the North School building, so as to provide a two class room building with Flush Toilets and Steam Heating, and to make such incidental changes as may be necessary all at an approximate cost to the town of \$3,675.00.
- 2. If the town feels that it is more practical to and desirable to continue a policy of modern school buildings which was inaugurated with the construction of the Benjamin Ellis School at South Carver, we recommend that the above mentioned remodeling at the Center School be undertaken at once under a W. P. A. Project, and that a new building be erected at North Carver as soon as practicable.

We believe that the latter course is the one that should be adopted by the town.

# THE PLYMOUTH COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE (Trustees County Aid to Agriculture)

This service is available to every community and family in each of the towns of the county. It brings to each of our towns the resources not only of the local organiza-

tion, but of Massachusetts State College, especially of its state extension service with its corps of specialists in phases of agriculture and home making.

The Extension Service looks to the towns for assistance in planning and carrying out the local program. In 1938, there were 560 men and women in the county giving this type of help. With their assistance, 5,000 Plymouth County homes participated directly in the program, and many others indirectly. Sixteen hundred boys and girls from 10 to 21 years old enrolled in 4-H clubs, 1,300 farms were definitely influenced by the agricultural extension work, 1,094 were enrolled in home demonstration groups, and many others received help through home and farm visits, letters, telephone and office calls, and other means.

Farmers and others interested in farm projects have participated chiefly in the following programs: dairy, poultry, fruit, market garden, farm management, cranberry culture.

Homemakers have participated in various programs in nutrition, clothing, food preservation, home grounds improvement, furniture renovation, kitchen improvement, child development, and recreation.

4-H clubs include poultry, dairy, garden, conservation, handicraft, food, canning, clothing, home furnishing, and other agricultural or homemaking subjects.

Nearly eighty citizens of Carver have received assistance in problems relating to cranberry growing. There has also been scattered interest in dairy, poultry, fruit, and vegetable programs.

Homemakers have been particularly interested in clothing, nutrition, and kitchen improvement projects.

Girls and boys have been enrolled in the 4-H food, clothing, canning.

#### SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT 1938

After climaxing a long and useful career as an educator in several cities and towns in Massachusetts with fifteen years as Superintendent of Schools in the Union of Carver, Lakeville, and Rochester, Arthur B. Webber retired from active service on July 31, 1938. One of Mr. Webber's outstanding qualities was his encouragement of individuality of teachers under him. This lead to independent thinking and strong personal convictions among our teachers, who are a credit and an asset to the town.

On August 1st, Donald P. Mattoon, formerly Principal of Mansfield High School, succeeded Mr. Webber as Superintendent of School. Mr. Mattoon has demonstrated a broad knowledge and deep understanding of school problems. These characteristics, together with his youthful and ambitious spirit, should make his service to the Town of Carver very commendable.

Mrs. Blanche Holmes, who served the town with distinction for twenty-three years as a teacher, resigned from her position at the close of the school year in June. While we regret this loss in our schools, we must realize that Mrs. Holmes has earned a period of rest and recuperation for herself. There is no doubt but she will find opportunities for service where she will be an influence for good in the community.

The unfavorable sanitary condition at the Center and North Schools has not yet been settled. However, we hope the Town will see its way clear to take some favorable action during 1939. We do not fulfill our educational obligations as a community unless we take every precaution to safeguard the health of our children. Healthy bodies are of as much importance as healthy minds.

We direct your attention to our financial report and the report of the superintendent which follow.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Committee of Carver, Massachusetts:

It is a pleasure to submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools. The report will be brief because, at the time of writing, my service has covered only a five months' period.

#### **TEACHERS**

The School Department is fortunate to have the services of several experienced teachers whose fine qualities are reflected in the good management and teaching in all elementary grades.

There have been a few changes in personnel. Mrs. Florence L. Gordon is principal at the Benjamin Ellis School. With her, Miss Nellie Squire of Roslindale, graduate of Wheelock School and Boston University, is the teacher of Grades I-II. Miss Jeanne H. Lockhart of Milton, graduate of the Perry Kindergarten Normal Training School, is the teacher of a large room full of first and second grade pupils at North Carver. The Domestic Science at the Center School is taught by Miss Marjorie H. Burr of Needham, who was graduated from the four-year course of Framingham State Teachers' College. Mrs.

Marguary MacCleave has recovered from her illness and has resumed her work as music supervisor. The Roster of the School Department shows the complete list of teachers and the schools in which they work.

There have been three appointments to the teaching staff this year. These new teachers are doing very well and admirably justify their election. The number of trained teachers from which selections may be made permits the choice of those with considerable training for positions in Carver. A four-year course, with a degree, is a desirable minimum standard, and the Carver salary schedule will allow our hiring such candidates.

#### TEACHERS' MEETINGS

The teachers of Union No. 47, Carver-Lakeville-Rochester, have held one meeting this fall, at which Mr. Arnold M. Davis, Extension Horticulturist of the Massachusetts State College, gave concrete directions for the beautification of school grounds and suggestions on the correlation of such projects with arithmetic, drawing, and nature study. This is part of a general program to inculcate pride in school property, clean rooms and grounds, through teacher-pupil planning and development.

Social and professional meetings have been held on occasion during the fall. The general policies of the School Committee and the specific plans of the Superintendent have been explained at these times, and teachers have had an opportunity to discuss these.

Carver teachers are professionally-minded, and many have a wide range of interests. They use their time and means to take study and lecture courses, and continually seek to improve their background and techniques. Pupils are direct beneficiaries of the teachers' broadened horizons.

#### HIGH SCHOOL TRAINING

The School Census, as of October 1, 1938, shows that Carver is paying tuition in high school for 63 boys and girls, at the rate of \$3.00 per week. During 1938, the high school tuition bill has amounted to \$6,531.00. The Com-

mittee is endeavoring to discover if greater returns can be obtained for each school dollar spent for high school tuition. The returns are measured in broader training opportunities. To that end the Committee has encouraged a comparison of the educational offerings in the Middleboro and Plymouth High Schools, the sole purpose of which is to receive for our high school pupils the best training we can obtain readily for the amount Carver can pay.

#### VISUAL EDUCATION

The moving picture machine has been used every other week to show historical pictures at the Center School. Supplementary films on science subjects have been used occasionally.

#### PUBLIC PROGRAMS

Excellent programs, to which parents have been invited, have been given in all of the schools this fall. Parents have attended in large numbers, which is very encouraging to the pupils who take part and the teachers who direct the rehearsals and productions. "Christmas in Old England," prepared by Center School pupils, was very impressive. At the North Carver and Benjamin Ellis schools, the Christmas programs were well done, and the many parents who attended these were genuine in their praise.

#### RURAL SCHOOL SURVEY

The Massachusetts Department of Education conducted a Rural School Survey in November in which the teachers and Superintendent gathered information. Valuable results are anticipated.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE HOURS

Parents are given an opportunity to discuss school matters with the Superintendent in the School Department office in the Town Hall. Office hours for 1939 are from 3:00-5:15 p. m. on the dates indicated. Additional ones will appear on notices on the office door.

#### WORK RELIEF

The Work Relief Program started January 3, 1938, with an appropriation of \$2,000.00. \$1,849.19 was expended, leaving a balance January 1st of \$150.81.

There were 72 who applied for work, 6 of these being single. 48 men worked a total of 3,545 hours. 42 of these represented 199 persons in families—ranging from 2 to 13 in a family. There were 16 cases put to work who had received aid within a year without working for any part of it. There were 98 cords of hard wood and 13 of pine cut. Where wood was cut, all underbrush was cut and burnt, reducing the Gypsy moth menace to Bog owners.

In addition to this work there has been about a mile of brushing done on Fosdick Road and three quarters mile on Plymouth St. There were 18 willows removed on Popes Point St. and some brushing. Also \$114.25 was alloted to School Committee to grade around Centre School.

From the original 72 applicants there were 7 assigned to W. P. A. work.

#### WELFARE REPORT

To the Citizens of the Town of Carver:

We regret exceedingly that we cannot show an improvement in the Welfare situation for the past year. Our Town is built around the cranberry industry and if the bog owners do not receive a net profit sufficient to employ laborers, the Town is compelled by law to take care of the needy.

Due to the good financial condition of the Town, a comparatively light welfare load—except in late fall, winter, and early spring,—and our low tax rate, our W. P. A. quota is small, and is figured on the three items mentioned.

In January we started our Work Relief program on a different angle than previously. All who apply for aid are put to work, and are receiving for their services no money, but orders for necessities, etc. The law is that we cannot put aliens on W. P. A., Chapter 90, or Chapter 81. In other words, citizens have the preference in all work. Our welfare load is over 50% aliens. It is impossible to anticipate the amount needed in advance. For instance, we buried 7 unfortunates in 1938. A new law, approved June 28, 1838, reads all funerals \$100.00.

I want to thank the Police Dept. for their 100% cooperation.

Suggestions and criticisms will be welcome as they will help improve the Department.

40% of the total cost was paid to other Cities and Towns, having Carver settlements.

# TOWN WARRANT AND REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

Plymouth, ss. To either of the Constables of the Town of Carver, Plymouth County, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Carver on Monday, the sixth day of March 1939, at two o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on the following article, namely:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers, the following officers to be voted for all on one ballot, viz:—Moderator, Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Three Auditors, Three Constables, Three Herring Committeemen, one Tree Warden, and one Highway Surveyor, each for one year. One Assessor, One Selectman, One School Committeeman, One Cemetery Commissioner, One Park Commissioner, One Member of Public Welfare and Two Library Trustees, each for Three years, and to vote by ballot "Yes" or "No" in answer to the following questions: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of all alcoholic beverages?" and "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of wines and malt beverages?"

The polls will be open for at least four hours.

And you are directed to further notify said Inhabitants of said town that as soon as the ballots have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Tuesday, March 7th, 1939, at nine o'clock A. M. and at that time will reconvene at said Town Hall in said Carver, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

- Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1939, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.
  - Article 2. Recommended by Finance Committee.
- Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
  - Article 3. Recommended by Finance Committee.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) from the free cash in the town treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the cemetery funds in the town treasury, all monies expended under this vote to be refunded before the end of the current year.
  - Article 4. Recommended by Finance Committee.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to accept the cemetery fund or funds paid into the town treasury under the perpetual care statutes, or act anything thereon.
  - Article 5. Recommended by Finance Committee.
- Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to prosecute, compromise or defend suits for or against the town.
  - Article 6. Recommended by Finance Committee.
- Article 7. To see what disposition the town will make of the dog fund.
- Article 7. Recommended by Finance Committee to be added to Library Account.

- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day and act thereto.
- Article 8. Recommended by Finance Committee, \$150.00 be appropriated.
- Article 9. To see what amount the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture (Plymouth County Extension Service) and to choose a town director as provided in Sections 41 and 42 Revised Chapter 128 of the General Laws and act thereon.
- Article 9. Recommended by Finance Committee, \$100.00 be appropriated.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed One hundred dollars (\$100.00) for rental for the American Legion. Money to be paid to the Treasurer of the Sons of Veterans and act thereon or thereto.
  - Article 10. Recommended by Finance Committee.
- Article 11. To see what pay the town will vote the Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes and other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Article 11. Recommended by Finance Committee that the pay be the same as last year.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed twenty five hundred dollars (\$2500.00) provided allotments are received from the State and County, under Chapter 90, General Laws, for excavating and surfacing Purchase Street. Said appropriation to be expended in the proportion of two by the town, four by the state, and two by the county, based on the sums allotted by State and County, and act thereon or thereto.

- Article 12. Recommended by Finance Committee, \$2000.00 be appropriated.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed fifty five hundred dollars (\$5500.00) to purchase a new fire truck completely equipped, and act anything thereon or thereto. Recommended by Fire Apparatus Committee.
- Article 13. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the purpose of taking out Workmen's Compensation insurance covering all manual labor, and act anything thereon or thereto. Recommended by the Selectmen.
- Article 14. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to be used for School Dental Clinic, and act anything thereon or thereto.
- Article 15. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.
- Article 16. To choose all necessary Town officers not elected by ballot.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate twenty two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2250.00) from the Highway Fund, provided by Chapter 2 of the Acts of 1939 for work to be done on Meadow Street, and act anything thereon or thereto.
- Article 17. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 17A. In view of the increase of the State Tax to the Town of Carver of nearly \$10,000.00 which in itself will increase the town tax rate about \$3.00, a majority of the Finance Committee are of the opinion that this \$2250.00 the Town has received as its portion of the Gasoline tax should be used to reduce its regular road appropriation rather than use it for extension of more road work. This is the fundamental reason for the Finance Committee's recommendation to apply this money to Chapter 81. And the Committee further recommends that the extension of work on Meadow Street be accomplished gradually each year under Chapter 81.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make alterations on the old town hall to house fire trucks and to act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 18. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the alterations on the old town hall for housing of fire trucks, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 19. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries for 1939 seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750.00) and that the sum of ninety dollars (\$90.00) now held by the Town Treasurer as a special cemetery fence appropriation be transferred from said special fund to cemeteries, making the cemetery total of eight hundred and forty dollars (\$840.00) for 1939, as recommended by cemetery commissioners and selectmen, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 20. Recommended by the Finance Committee. Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the overlay reserve account to 1939 Reserve Account, the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or such

other sum of money as may be voted the 1939 reserve account by the Town.

Article 21. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty dollars (\$40.00) for vocational training and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 22. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the purchase of a flag for North Carver Green to be added to the appropriation for Parks, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 23. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate One hundred dollars (\$100.00) for land damage on Meadow Street, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 24. Recommended by the Finance Committee. And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, at the several places designated by vote of the town seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.


