## WELFARE REPORT

## To the Citizens of the Town of Carver :

We again are obliged to state that there is no decrease in Welfare, which is with us to stay for an indefinite period. While we lost six cases during the year we have taken on seven. From May to October nearly every one is able to obtain fairly steady employment, but for the balance of the year a large portion of our people find it hard to get work of any continuous nature. Almost without exception anyone who has to extend credit to persons not working require a guarantee that the Town will assume the obligation. This presents a problem difficult of solution. Children must be fed and kept warm, they must have medical attention when required, and if the parents can not receive credit, until such time as they obtain employment the Town must take care of them. This is a situation we are confronted with every Fall and Winter. In a period of two weeks eight applications for aid were received under these conditions. The cranberry industry, the backbone of our Town, only operates part time, and practically all of our cases are dependent on this work. The result,-soon after the close of the Season requests for relief come in. Each case is thoroughly investigated, a new history taken, and aid granted according to need. In no case is the Budget set up by the State exceeded. In every case it is less than recommended.

As of January 1, 1940, the State Relief Program reorganized, making some changes beneficial to the towns.

The opinion seems to be prevalent that assistance under Old Age is a pension for all those reaching sixty-five years. This is not the intent of the Law. It is to provide adequate assistance to citizens over sixty-five years old who have no other source of income, and does not relieve other members of the family of their obligations. Prior
to January 1st the Federal Gov't. reimbursed one half of a $\$ 30.00$ minimum on all Old Age Assistance cases, the State two-thirds of the balance, and the Town the remainder. As of Jan. 1, 1940, the amount on which the Federal Government will participate, at such $50 \%$, was increased to $\$ 40.00$, and the State reimburses two-thirds of the balance, and the Town the remainder.

Prior to January 1st on Aid to Dependent Children cases the Federal Government reimbursed one-third, the the State one-third, and the Town one-third. As of January 1st the percentage of Federal participation was increased to $50 \%$-up to a "top" amount of $\$ 54.00$ a month.

## Report of State Auditor

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Carver for the period from September 27, 1936 to November 8, 1939, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir:
In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Carver for the period from September 27, 1936, the date of the previous examination, to November 8, 1939, the following report being submitted thereon:

General ledger accounts were compiled and the appropriation accounts were analyzed and checked to the amounts voted by the town as listed from the town clerk's record of town meetings, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on November 8, 1939. This
balance sheet indicates that the financial condition of the town is excellent.

In listing the charges against appropriations it was noted that the salaries and expenses of several departments are charged to an appropriation designated "General Government." It is recommended that specific appropriations be voted by the town for the salaries and expenses of each department.

The books and accounts of the late treasurer and of the present treasurer of the town were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the records of the departments making payments to the treasurer, while the payments by the treasurer were checked with the selectmen's orders authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The cash balance on November 8, 1939, was proved by actual count of the cash in the office and by a reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank in which town funds are deposited.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the trust funds in the custody of the trustees and of the town treasurer were examined and listed. The income was proved and the transfers to the town were verified. It is recommended that income from the cemetery perpetual care funds be withdrawn and entered on the treasurer's cash book before any expenditures are made for the care of endowed lots and graves.

The tax titles taken by the town for unpaid taxes were examined and the amounts added to the tax title account were compared with the collector's records. It was noted that, in a number of cases, subsequent taxes have not been added to the tax title account, due to the property not having been assessed. The board of assessors should continue to assess property on which the town has acquired a tax title until foreclosure of the right of redemption. The reported redemptions were checked with the
receipts as recorded on the treasurer's cash book, and the tax titles on hand were listed, proved, and checked with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the late and present collectors of taxes were examined and checked. The taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination were audited, and all subsequent commitments were proved to the warrants issued for their collection. The recorded receipts were checked with the payments to the treasurer, the abatements as recorded were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The charges for departmental accounts receivable were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were checked with the payments to the treasurer and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The outstanding tax and departmental accounts on the books of the town as of November 8, 1939, were verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The financial transactions of the town clerk were examined and checked. The recorded receipts for dog and sporting licenses were checked with the records of licenses issued, and the payments to the town treasurer were verified.

The surety bonds of the town officials required by law to furnish them for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

The computation of the tax rates by the assessors for 1938 and 1939 were checked, and it was noted that appropriations from available funds voted at the annual town meetings for the years mentioned were not used in the determination of the tax rates for those years. Attention is called to the provisions of Section 15A, Chapter 41, and Section 23, Chapter 59, General Laws, which must be carefully followed in order that the tax rates may be correctly computed.

It is recommended that the board of selectmen keep a complete record of licenses and permits issued and that the cemetery commissioners keep a complete record of sales of lots and graves in order that receipts from these sources may be properly audited.

It is recommended that steps be taken toward the establishment of a proper system of accounting, so that complete records may be available in a single town office and so that the true financial condition of the town may be determined at any time.

Attention is called to the fact that a report of the audit, or a summary of its essential features, should be published by the town clerk, thereby complying with Section 40, Chapter 44, General Laws.

In addition to the accounts mentioned, the records of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined and checked in detail.

There are appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, tax title, and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the condition and transactions of the various trust funds.

While engaged in making the audit, cooperation was received from all town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

These books are allchildrens' books and are on the State Certificate Readinglist. Pupils wishing to read these, get a certificate afterreading five books; after receiving four of the small cer-tificates, the pupils are presented with a large certificatewhich may be framed. The "Certificate Reading" booksmay be found on shelves which have been labeled, pur-posely for the benefit of the child.
Other shelves have been labeled for the benefit of the High School students, making it easy for them to find reporting books according to their grades.
A field worker spent several weeks helping to re-arrange books after the new stacks had been installed, taking inventory, discarding books in dirty and ragged condition. The catalogue has been worked on too-and the non-fiction is up to date. While discarding worthless books-books which could be mended and were not in too bad condition were sent to the State House to be cleaned and mended by a W. P. A. project there. The
books came back in excellent condition. Several hundred books were mended and will do the service of new ones.

A new set of encyclopedias and a set of Junior Classics were purchased in 1939. New stacks were installed filling in the whole of the space left beside the original stacks. We now have room to expand for some time to come. A set of shelves were built in the south west corner of the Library which is being used for recent non-fiction and for the "Church Reading List."

I feel that the Library is in good shape now, with everything made easy for the borrowers; the Catalogue will be more accurate, (it still is in the State House, at the present writing, being filed.)

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

The number of venereal disease cases for the past year has been fewer and less expensive than in 1938, due I think to a better understanding between the Town and State and I must say the State authorities have been very co-operative.

The Town Dumps are a problem and your Board is not at all satisfied with the conduct of some of our citizens who persist in leaving refuse in a place most convenient to them whether it be in the road, at the entrance, or in the grove. More drastic regulations are being considered by the board and it may be necessary again to have certain days in the week for disposal purposes, but a better road and a firmer dump off place would be of considerable benefit. The present location of the North Carver dump it seems to your Board is too close to the school and the houses in that vicinity, and for this reason and the fact (according to the Department of Public Health Engineers) that the Dump is a fire hazard, steps should be taken in the near future to remedy this evil. The Board has permission from the State to re-locate on the edge of Muddy Pond where water can be had in case a fire starts in the dump.

The Town has been quite fortunate in not having any serious epidemics of so-called children's diseases. Diphtheria has been controlled one hundred percent by inoculation methods.

The Department of Public Health Engineers have been on many occasions called on to test water in wells and have always been prompt and thorough.

It has been necessary for the Town to assume the responsibility of two more adult cases of Tuberculosis during 1939 and 1940, making a total of four under treatment
in the Plymouth County Hospital. One case is self supporting having paid eleven hundred dollars to the Town Treasurer during a period of a little more than two years. How much longer this will continue is a question.

The two cases mentioned will of course necessitate an increase in the 1940 appropriation for hospitalization of Tuberculosis patients.

Having inspected the Hospital I am pleased to report and feel that our towns people should look with pride upon this institution. Supplies are purchased at the proper time of the year and in such quantities that assure a very low price, thus lowering operative and maintenance costs. I feel sure in saying that the cost per patient compares favorable with any Tuberculosis institution and in most cases the cost is tremendously lower.

A Tuberculin test will be given our school children this year and the expense is figured in the County assessment which will be about $\$ 3,000.00$ higher than in 1939. The Town's part will be negligible. It is generally believed that an increase in this assessment is due to higher operative and maintenance costs which is untrue. In this particular case it is the lack of a proper balance of patients during the year. For example, it takes the same number in personnel to take care of 15 patients in a ward as it would to care for 20 . In other words if all the beds were occupied continuously the effect would be to lower the County assessment.

## REPORT OF COUNTY AID TO AGRICULTURE

The Plymouth County Extension Service

Twenty-five years of Agricultural leadership has been provided the towns of Plymouth County through the Extension Service, officially recognized as County Aid to Agriculture. During this period of time, great agricultural achievements have been made through the initiative and leadership of agricultural associations, farmers' co-operatives, homemakers' groups, 4 - H clubs and their many allied contributing sources.

This service available to all coordinates the efforts of the U. S. D. A., the Massachusetts State College, and local groups in the interest of rural people.

Educational programs are largely determined by county committees, assuring the practicability of meetings, speakers, and subjects of interest to commodity, homemakers' and 4-H club groups.

During 1939 the Extension Service agents directed personally in Plymouth County 813 meetings with an attendance of 21,485 people; made personal contact with 12,237 people on individual problems ; and reached 87,000 people through circular letters.

Information and assistance has been available to everyone in the subjects pertaining to Agriculture, Home Economics and the $4-\mathrm{H}$ Club. These include for farmers the subjects of : dairy, poultry, fruits, vegetables, cranberries, forestry, general livestock, farm accounts, and many others. For Homemakers in 1939 emphasis has been placed on Money Management, Nutrition, Child Development, Home Furnishing and Recreation. Additional work has been done in Clothing, Food Preservation, Home

Grounds Improvement. For 4-H activities, clubs in Poultry, Dairy, Garden, Conservation, Handicraft, Food, Canning, Clothing, Home Furnishing and others have been used by 1959 enrolled members in the county.

The people of Carver have been afforded this service in the best manner possible to meet the demands and interest of groups and individuals. The support of each town financially and morally is greatly appreciated by the Extension Service, and by the people who know its value as an influence in adult education.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

## To the Citizens of the Town of Carver :

We have welcomed a new member on the School Committee this year in the person of Winston B. Leach. This is the first change in the membership of the committee in five years.

The committee has effected two changes during the year which should be noted here:

1. The decision to send secondary school pupils to Plymouth High School rather than to Middleboro High School. This change has been made as gradual as possible by requiring freshmen to enter at Plymouth and offering parents a choice between the two schools for all pupils previously enrolled. The choice by parents was intended to minimize the number of program changes, and the breaking of social contacts, both of which might adversely effect the children if they were not in favor of a change. Plymouth offered a much lower rate of tuition than Middleboro had been charging. The decision to change resulted in a reduction of the rate on pupils remaining in Middleboro.
2. The awarding of contracts for transportation on a mileage basis, with a fixed rate per mile for equipment of a given size, traveling with-in a given mileage range per day.

Both of these changes were prompted by a desire to obtain the best possible service at the lowest possible cost to the town. We hope that the future will prove our judgment to have been sound.

A new water pump has been installed in the Center School together with a new system for pumping drinking water. This gives the children a supply of fresh drinking water at all times.

Repairs were made on the furnace at the North School which have resulted in more satisfactory heating in that building.

Plans are now being considered for further improvement at the North School. These plans will not provide for a new building with modern facilities such as may be desired by some people. They will provide for much needed improvements for the present, at a cost low enough so that a new building may still be a possibility with-in a few years.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Committee of Carver, Massachusetts:
This, my second annual report, contains a brief account of our work during the last twelve months and indicates some results of a study of local school problems.

## TEACHERS

The School Department takes pride in the efficiency of its several experienced teachers. The pupils of Carver reflect the fine instruction and training in habits and studies given them by the teachers who have guided the classroom and playground activities for several years.

The changes in personnel have been limited, fortunately, to our younger and less experienced teachers. Miss Jeanne H. Lockhart secured a position in Middleboro and Miss Marjorie H. Burr accepted a contract in Arlington. Another teacher was offered a contract for a position in a larger center at a much larger salary a few weeks after school opened in September, but she honored her contract with the School Department and did not seek a release. Miss Gertrude R. Currier of North Andover, graduate of the four-year course, with degree, at the Bridgewater State Teachers College, was hired for Miss Lockhart's place at North Carver. Miss Currier did her practice teaching in Middleboro and has had some experience teaching Grades I-IV at the North Reading State Sanatorium. For Miss Burr's position, Miss Dorothy W. Wilbur was selected. She is a graduate of the Rhode Island State College, degree in home economics, and lives in Cranston. The beginning teachers accepted salaries of $\$ 850$ each.

## TEACHERS' MEETINGS

Several teachers' meetings have been held during the year. Some of the topics discussed were:

Report Cards<br>Reading System<br>Health Matters<br>Building Management<br>Rural School Conference Reports

The School Department sent one teacher as its representative to the Rural School Conference at Amherst last spring. As a part of the plan to benefit all teachers in the Superintendency Union, the representatives from Carver, Lakeville, and Rochester gave reports before groups of teachers in the three towns. In this way, the influence of the Conference was extended to all tachers in Union No. 47.

## REPORT CARDS

The teachers of the Superintendency Union have studied different types of Report Cards and have devised one which satisfies our needs. It provides for ratings in "habits" as well as "achievement" in school studies. Ratings are given three times a year in the first three grades, and five times a year in grades four, five, and six. Habits which are considered worthy of development are:

Speech—Speaks distinctly
Posture-Has good posture
Cleanliness-Has habits of cleanliness
Obedience-Responds promptly Follows simple directions
Perseverance-Is persistent in overcoming difficulties Satisfactorily completes work begun
Neatness-Has habits of neatness
Cooperation-Works and plays fairly with others
Takes active part in plays and games
Thrift-Takes care of school property and materials
Industry-Keeps well occupied at all times
Dependability-Depends upon himself whenever possible

The ratings on the achievement in school studies differ with the grade. For example, the record of achievement for the primary grades shows:

## READING SYSTEM

The teachers in the Carver-Lakeville-Rochester Union made a careful study of the problem of reading during the last school year. The procedure followed, which resulted in the selection of a Reading Series, may be briefly stated as follows:

1. Informal discussions during the fall of 1938 of the reading problem.
2. Tentative selection of good reading series from a study of reports in professional literature.
3. Expositions by Reading Demonstrators at several teachers' meetings, and purchase of sets for the teachers of each grade.
4. Study of basic vocabulary facts and phonograms for primers and first readers.
5. Comparison of basal reading books- 45 questions answered by each teacher on each of five sets of books. These questions covered binding, paper, printing, content, pictures, vocabulary, method, supplementary materials and aids (workbook, manual, charts, cards, readers, supervisors), authorship, cost.
6. Meetings of Primary and Intermediate Grade teachers to discuss the various readers and to make a tentative selection.
7. A two-day demonstration in August at the Benjamin Ellis School in South Carver, of the series selected. At these sessions, the teachers were the pupils and the Reading Demonstrator was teacher. All but two of the teachers in the Union attended these meetings, and most of the substitute teachers took the time for these, too.

It was the opinion of the majority of the teachers participating in the selection of basal readers for the schools of Carver-Lakeville-Rochester that the CHILD-DEVELOPMENT READERS represented the best series to purchase, considering all factors. Aside from the great educational values in the books, there is the additional factor of the services of an excellent Reading Demonstrator to help the teachers. Altogether, in use, this series is proving to be a very efficient and economical one to purchase.

## HEALTH:

## Pre-School Visits by the School Nurse

The work of the School Nurse during the school year was extended to include the visits to homes from which pupils may enter the first grade the following September. In December, after the Census Taker has completed the enumeration, the School Nurse locates the homes of preschool children. Then, as she has calls to make in a particular locality, she visits these prospective first-grade
pupils during the Winter and Spring, all before school closes in June. She encourages each parent to have:

1. A Birth Certificate ready for presentation to the first-grade teacher at the opening of school.
2. A Vaccination Certificate to be presented with the Birth Certificate.
3. A Health Record-report on the dates of contagious diseases.
4. A Health Certificate from the School Doctor, if the child's condition seems to warrant this.
5. A Permit for Under-Age Entrance from the Superintendent of Schools, if this is necessary for entrance on trial for a six-week's period.
6. Dental work done.
7. Clothes, shoes, and lunch box for the opening day.

In August, the School Nurse makes a follow-up visit to those homes where the need is evident.

## COLDS

When a child is developing a cold, the School Department encourages a parent to keep the pupil at home for a day or two until the child's strength is restored and the danger of further infection is reduced. In the months of February, March, April, May and June 1939, the statements which parents wrote to the teachers for the three towns in the Union as excuses for absence were listed. Of a total of 498, the following were the larger items:

408 of a total of 498 illnesses reported during five months were, or started with a cold. Beware of colds!!

## DENTAL CLINIC

The School Department feels that there are distinct advantages in having the dental work performed in each school building. Children need not be transported in cars uninsured for the purpose to some central office at a distance, thereby avoiding highway accidents. There is less time lost from school lessons. Furthermore, it wished to extend the dental program, making it available to all pupils, and to finance the cost by having a reasonable charge for each dental operation. To this end, the Board of Health and the School Committee agreed to cooperate in promoting the Dental Clinic.

1. The Dental Service shall be made available to all pupils in Grades 1-8.
2. Part of the cost for each pupil's dental work shall be paid from the funds raised at the Town Meeting, thus giving a chance for more to be treated with limited funds, and keeping the appropriation small.
3. The larger portion of the cost of each dental operation shall be paid by those parents who desire the work done.
4. A School Dentist, graduate of the Tufts Dental College, with a Certificate from the Forsyth Dental Infirmary for Children, shall be hired and paid 60c per dental operation.
5. The work shall be done in each school building.
6. The Board of Health shall approve the payment of 10c from the appropriation for dental service for each operation performed by the School Dentist and the full cost for certain certified cases.
7. The School Committee shall furnish the services of the School Nurse on those days when she is regularly employed for the school health program, provide a satis-
factory place for the dental work to be done, allow pupils to be dismissed from class and study periods to receive dental treatment, and give such minor materials, supplies, and services as may be necessary.
8. The School Dentist shall furnish equipment which is to include three sets of dental instruments, and electric sterilizer, a dental chair, professional services, preliminary examinations, dental materials and supplies, and shall accept 60c per operation.
9. The parents are to decide whether the Family Dentist or the School Dentist is to perform needed dental treatment, give the School Department a written statement of treatments which will be paid for at 50 c an operation, and send the money needed to the teacher at the time the School Dentist does the work.

There has been excellent cooperation in the dental program and the results confirm the wisdom of the change.

## VISUAL EDUCATION

The instruction at the Center School has been enriched by the addition of two pieces of apparatus for visual education. One device is an opaque projector, showing on a screen pictures, postcards, charts, drawing, and any objects through which light cannot be transmitted successfully. The other machine is a slide film projector, using 33 mm . films and displaying one frame on a reel at a time. These are proving to be very serviceable.

## PUBLIC PROGRAMS

"The Spirit of Christmas" and "Why The Chimes Rang" were two of the programs given by pupils near the close of the year. Many parents attended these and witnessed their children taking part.

## SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENCY UNION NO. 47

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

At the Annual Meeting of the School Superintendency Union No. 47, including the towns of Carver, Lakeville, and Rochester, it was voted that a report by the Secretary of the Union be published annually in each Town Report, to enable the voters to have a better understanding of the Union, its aims and problems. This Union has been in existence since 1902, but this is one of the first published reports of its work. The members of the school committees of the three towns comprise the Union Committee of nine members, of which Mr. Samuel H. Corse of Rochester
is the present Chairman. The Union Committee meets at least once a year, considers business which may come before it, elects officers, hears reports, selects Union agents, and elects a Superintendent of Schools for a term of three years. The services and salary of the Superintendent are shared on equitable basis.

At the April 1939 meeting, a written report was submitted by the Superintendent, Mr. Mattoon. This report incorporated a review of the policies of the three committees, their methods of administering school affairs, suggestions for closer cooperation on educational projects, and the purchase of school materials to the mutual benefit of each town. This comparison of the various problems confronting the school committees and their methods of solving them has already proved helpful and has enabled each committee to benefit through this closer cooperation.

Under Mr. Mattoon's superintendence, the teaching methods of the three towns have been more closely related, and materials standardized. To promote this, the teachers in the Union have met at regular intervals through the year for lectures and general discussions of their mutual professional problems. The results of these changes are beneficial.

At the November 1939 meeting in Lakeville, a written report of the Superintendent's activities was presented, and three Lakeville teachers gave demonstrations of the new reading series.

In the School Report for each Town, the matters of State Reimbursement for the Superintendent and financial matters of his salary, travel, and clerical assistance are entered.

## TOWN WARRANT AND REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

Plymouth, ss. To either of the Constables of the Town of Carver, Plymouth County, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Carver on Monday, the fourth day of March 1940, at two o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on the following article, namely :

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers, the following officers to be voted for all on one ballot, viz; Moderator, Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Three Auditors, Three Constables, Three Herring Committeemen, one Tree Warden, and one Highway Surveyor, each for one year. One Assessor, One Selectman, One School Committeeman, One Cemetery Commissioner, One Park Commissioner, One Member of Public Welfare and Two Library Trustees, each for Three years, and to vote by ballot "Yes" or "No" in answer to the following questions: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of all alcoholic beverage?" and "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of wines and malt beverages?"

The polls will be open for at least four hours.
And you are directed to further notify said Inhabitants of said town that as soon as the ballots have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Tuesday, March 5th, 1940, at nine o'clock A. M. and at that time will reconvene at said Town Hall in said Carver, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1940, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 2. Recommended by Finance Committee.
Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. Recommended by Finance Committee.
Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed eight hundred dollars ( $\$ 800.00$ ) from the free cash in the town treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the cemetery funds in the town treasury, all monies expended under this vote to be refunded before the end of the current year.

Article 4. Recommended by Finance Committee.
Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the cemetery fund or funds paid into the town treasury under the perpetual care statutes, or act anything thereon.

Article 5. Recommended by Finance Committee.
Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to prosecute, compromise or defend suits for or against the Town.

Article 6. Recommended by Finance Committee.
Article 7. To see what disposition the town will make of the dog fund.

Article 7. Recommended by Finance Committee to be added to Library Account.

Article 8. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture (Plymouth County Extension Service) and to choose a town director as provided in Sections 41 and 42 Revised Chapter 128 of the General Laws and act thereon.

Article 8. Recommended by Finance Committee.
Article 9. To see what pay the Town will vote the Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes and other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 9. Recommended by Finance Committee that the pay be the same as last year.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars ( $\$ 1000.00$ ) provided allotments are received from the State and County, under Chapter 90 Maintenance, General Laws, for Plymouth Street. Said appropriation to be expended in the proportion of one-third by the Town, one-third by the State, and one-third by the County, based on the sums allotted by State and County, and act thereon or thereto.

Article 10. Recommended by Finance Committee.
Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the overlay reserve account to 1940 Reserve Account, the sum of five hundred dollars ( $\$ 500.00$ ) or such other sum of money as may be voted the 1940 Reserve Account by the Town.

Article 11. Recommended by Finance Committee.
Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of remodel-
ing and reconstructing the North schoolhouse and authorize the borrowing of any or all of the sum appropriated under authority of Chapter 233 of the Acts of 1938, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 12. Recommended by Finance Committee.
The Finance Committee further recommends that, in the event of favorable action on Article 12, a Building Committee be appointed consisting of three persons, one to be chosen by the School Committee from the membership of that body, one to be designated by the Moderator and one by the Chairman of the Finance Committee; and that said Building Committee be directed to seek plans and estimates of cost beside those already in the possession of the School Committee, to have proper specifications prepared, to invite bids for the work to be done and material furnished and to proceed at their discretion to carry the proposed improvements into effect.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Public Welfare to use the Federal Government Reimbursement for administration, and to act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 13. Recommended by Finance Committee.

Article 14. To choose all necessary Town officers not elected by ballot.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand one hundred eighty two dollars and seventy cents $(\$ 2,182.70)$ to pay outstanding Public Welfare bills of 1939, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 15. Recommended by Finance Committee.
Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Clerk to sell the remaining Town Histories for
one dollar per copy, and act anything thereon or thereto.
Article 16. Recommended by the Finance Committee that the Histories be sold at $\$ 2.00$ per copy, and that the Town Clerk be requested to arrange that these books be offered for sale on Old Home Day.

Article 17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to putting in proper condition the Tillson Prátt lot and gravestones, and at anything thereon.

Article 17. Recommended by the Finance Committee that the Cemetery Commissioners be authorized to make plans for putting the Tillson Pratt lot in the Center Cemetery in proper condition, providing suitable gravestone or gravestones, to ascertain the cost thereof, to solicit, by private contributions, the money needed to meet the expense incurred, and, when sufficient funds have been secured, to carry the project to completion.

Article 18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the revision of the Town By-Laws, and act anything thereon.

Article 18. Recommended by Finance Committee that the report of the By-Laws Committee be adopted.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighty two dollars and sixty cents ( $\$ 82.60$ ) to pay outstanding Health bills of 1939, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 19. Recommended by Finance Committee.
And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, at the several places designated by vote of the town seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
