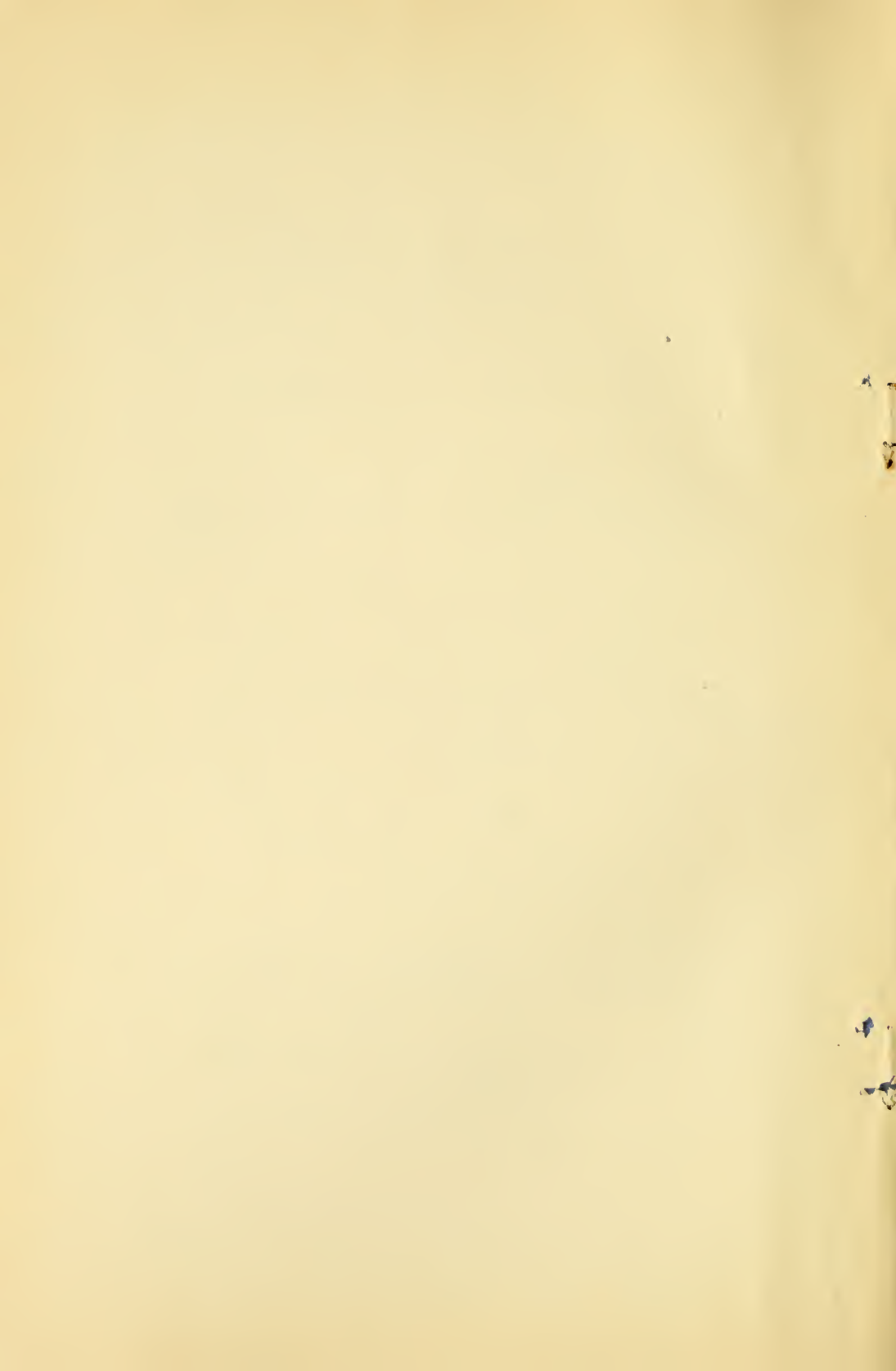

REPORT OF THE FOREST WARDEN

The past year represents one of the severest fire seasons we have ever witnessed. The C. V. F. A. with the aid of nearby towns and State equipment, as well as volunteers, handled the situation so that we did not have too many serious fires.

Our Town equipment responded to seventy-three different fires this past season. Fifty of these were grass or brush, forty one of which were held to one-half acre or less. Fourteen were chimney fires, and there was no damage reported at any of these. Six building fires were responded to, with a complete loss of two buildings. There were also three automobile fires which caused little damage.

The Town Fire Apparatus was greatly appreciated this past year. The Carver V. F. A. members remodeled the old truck, known as Engine 3, so that we now have a good piece of equipment as far as this truck is concerned. All labor on this project was donated by members of the organization.

Meetings of the Carver V. F. A. have been well attended this past year. This has aided us greatly, as it gave us a chance to discuss ways and means of fighting our fires in a more efficient manner.

We are fortunate to have our new State Forest Fire Warden located in our town. His help and suggestions have proved very helpful to us both at our meetings and at our fires.

Due to the hurricane which we had last fall, we have much to think about, as far as protecting our woods from fire. It is true, the State as well as the Town are doing all they can to remove timber from the wood roads. It is impossible for them to clear everything before another fire season is on us. The Carver V. F. A. has had a portable pump demonstrated to them, and they feel this equipment will be the answer to some of our fire problems this coming seasons. These pumps can be used after a fire has been knocked down and will save a vast amount of abuse that our fire trucks ordinarily would have to take. They will also prove very beneficial at house fires.

Last season we placed one truck at North Carver which proved very satisfactory. It was manned by a group from North Carver. This gave us an opportunity to get the jump on fires in that section. This winter the equipment is housed at the screenhouse of Mr. Ellis D. Atwood where there is no danger of its freezing. When a call is received it enables us to get away immediately. The large brush breaker which is generally housed at the State Forest is also here for the winter, along with our own equipment. We are also very fortunate to be able to say that there is no expense attached for this privilege. In the spring we plan to send equipment back to North Carver.

I wish to thank at this time, all who have aided in keeping our fires down. The support and cooperation of everyone has been greatly appreciated, especially those who gave so much of their time for which no pay was received. Our trucks were manned seven days each week during the summer months.

Burn all the slash and grass you can this winter, to help prevent early spring fires.

Notify your forest warden if there are plots you wish burned and do not feel as though you dare to do it yourself. He will gladly cooperate.

The question of spring fire permits is something we should consider. They are going to be hard to get although there are times when they will be available. Violators, this spring will be prosecuted, as we must be careful. Please cooperate.

1944 REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver :

The Carver School Committee, consisting of Eunice Bailey, chairman, Harriet Snow, secretary, and John Carter meet with Superintendent George Austin on the first Monday of each month.

Changes in the teaching personnel have caused the committee much concern. We felt deeply the loss of Mrs. Helen H. Griffith, principal of Centre School for a number of years from our teaching force. We feel that we are very fortunate to have some resident teachers who are carrying on in our schools. At this time the problem of hiring new teachers is very difficult. State regulations of minimum salaries has brought about some changes in the salary scale for Carver, thereby making it more comparable with other towns of the same population.

The school at North Carver was reshingled with asbestos shingles, the work being done by the Tilo Roofing Co. We felt it would be an economy measure over the period of years since it is almost impossible to hire local help for painting or repair work.

At the South School since the re-conversion to coal, the heating problem seems to be improved. To further this step insulation was placed on the ceilings to cut down on the fuel expenditure.

We hesitated in the question of improvement at the Center School.

It is the earnest hope of the committee that the citizens of Carver will see fit to erect a new and adequate school at such time as building is again possible.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the Members of the Carver School Committee:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools for the Town of Carver, a part of the Massachusetts School Superintendency Union, No. 45, which includes the Towns of Carver, Lakeville and Rochester.

Considering the year past in light of experience in other small rural communities, we have reason to feel we are doing as well as can be expected. To secure and keep satisfactory teaching personnel is a problem of paramount importance. In June, 1944, resignations were received from Mrs. Sybil Eshbach, teacher of Domestic Arts and other sixth grade subjects and Mrs. Alice Shurtleff, who had carried the work of English and other allied subjects for grades seven and eight at the Center School. Mrs. Eshbach resigned to devote her time and interests to 4-H work in Barnstable County; Mrs. Shurtleff felt she did not wish to continue as a full-time teacher, having taken the year past only after we were unable to obtain a regular teacher having satisfactory preparation for this important work. Appointments made to these positions were, first Mrs. Carroll (Hattie J.) Griffith to teach Domestic Arts and other sixth grade subjects, and, second, Miss Ann Singleton of Manchester, Mass., to the work of English and other subjects for grades seven and eight. Mrs. Griffith brings experience in Maine and New Hampshire in teaching and has also taught one year at Marion, Mass., and several years in Quincy. Miss Singleton received her training at the Salem Teachers' Collegè, being graduated in June, 1944.

At the close of the year 1944, a resignation is before us from Miss Eva Leonard, of the Benjamin Ellis School, effective Dec. 22, 1944. After considerable thought, Miss Leonard decided to leave the profession for work in Library Science, specializing in children's work; she has taken up this work at Springfield, Mass.

Mrs. Doris E. Brown, R. N., upon her request, was granted a leave of absence to be effective Jan. 1, 1945, until Sept., 1945. This temporary vacancy has been filled with the election of Mrs. Madeline Baker, R. N., of Middleboro, Mass.

Too much cannot be said about the committee's decision to revise the schedule of salaries to be paid for teaching services in Carver. Teachers' salaries everywhere and in all times have lagged behind the general salary scale for other professions and most occupations. The decision ought to make possible the retention of those teachers in the future whose services are satisfactory in every way; it will also encourage those teachers who remain faithful to their tasks in Carver to believe their efforts are appreciated and amount to something. This upward revision will also bring Carver into some semblance of supporting public education to the financial degree which its valuation indicates when compared with other towns of its classification. The changed policy will bear rich dividends in years to come and will be no undue burden upon the Carver residents.

In every respect, the school year past has been kept nearly as normal as possible. Emphasis has been given this year to course of study content in particular and teaching methods in general.

With reference to the course of study work, during the spring of 1944 I visited several selected school systems

in lower New York State to see policies and procedures in operation, especially those which are thought to have been an advance in pedagogical method and course content over our present practices. In this manner it was possible to see the idea in operation and have an opportunity to talk directly with those in charge of carrying it out; such a method is highly preferable to reading the appraisal from a book or interpreting a published report. My time and interest was particularly devoted to the primary grades for some of our course procedures and activities are ready for review and reorientation.

As a result of this visit and coupled with the efforts of the teachers concerned with the primary grades, a new course of study, or guide for the primary grades, is now available, and was adopted by the Union Committee at its November 1944 meeting for use as the source of guidance to the teacher in grade content. It has been developed as a two-grade piece of work as this group is the most common basis for school grouping in this Union. In carrying on the daily work of the school we have felt increasingly that the need for revision and fresh approach could be found in the primary grades. This guide, or course of study, attempts only to indicate the general scope of the work intended; it is sufficiently flexible as to permit a child to do some of his work in one grade and the balance in the next. It seeks to emphasize the importance of individual learning and discounts group progress without individual growth.

In connection with the application of a new philosophy and approach to primary education we shall find it necessary in the future to revise the present policy regarding admission to the first grade of school. Probably there is no single more important step in a child's life than

that of entering and enrolling in the public school. In recognition of this fact, the admission to school on the principle of an arbitrary calendar age does not meet the requirements of individual education. Readiness to go to school is a significant factor in school progress. Because a child is chronologically old enough to meet local requirements, it cannot be automatically accepted that he has attained sufficient mental, social and emotional growth to begin the process of formal education. In Massachusetts we are particularly fortunate in having a liberal law concerning school attendance; the law does not *require* a child to be enrolled in school until he becomes seven years of age. With this in mind, if the school department was to require the child to meet certain standards, as demonstrated by tests of mental ability, readiness for reading and physical fitness, I believe we could do much to improve the work in our primary grades for it would prevent those few pupils who annually enter the first grade who are ready to go to school by reason of calendar age but are not ready because of lack of maturity and sufficient mental growth.

The Annual Dental Clinic was, of necessity, omitted this year; this was due to the lack of a suitably qualified person to conduct the work. Probably in the future, the policy will be somewhat changed regarding this sort of work. It is now known that the Massachusetts State Department of Health looks more favorably upon encouraging the school pupils, through their parents, to seek the services and counsel of their own family dentist. We shall endeavor to accomplish this in the schools and it is expected that dental records for each child will be established eventually.

The annual graduation exercises were observed on June 8, 1944 in the Town Hall. The program was of a

more or less original nature being prepared under the direction of the Principal, Mr. Shaw, with the assistance of Mrs. Alice Shurtleff.

Graduation exercises and, in fact, any occasion when we wish to have pupils partake in the learning situation through auditorium work and the like is made much more difficult and in some senses, inadequate, due to the limited facilities of the present Center School. Mention should be made of the fact that the committee has voted to ask the establishment of a committee to work upon the question of more suitable accommodations for the pupils at Center School. It goes without question that there are many points where improvement is an urgent matter. While the time is not right to build, it is appropriate to form plans and make necessary preparations; this will facilitate the erection of a new school as soon as world conditions warrant the building of one.

Once again through the medium of this report I express my appreciation to the members of the School Committee for their many courtesies and their under-

standing and thoughtful decisions on the problems of public education.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my annual report of work done as school nurse in the Town of Carver.

In March the regular Follow-up Clinic was conducted by Plymouth County Hospital with seven pupils X-rayed, all to be continued for re-examination in one year.

Eyes were examined for defective vision with six pupils found to need attention. Following notices to parents, all have had adequate corrections made.

All pupils were weighed and measured three times during the year.

The annual physical examinations are to be held at a later date.

The annual dental clinic was discontinued this year due to inability to secure a competent dentist.

I have made 104 school visits, 86 home visits and have taken 24 children home for various reasons. During the spring and summer months I made 15 pre-school visits.

The annual meeting of School Superintendency Union, No. 45, was held at the Pierceville School in Rochester on April 14, 1944. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

The Committee unanimously re-elected Mr. George R. Austin as superintendent for another three year term beginning August 1, 1944. It was voted to increase the salary of the superintendent and to pay the same travel allowance as paid last year. The percentage of salary and travel allowance to be paid by each town was voted as follows: Carver 40%, Lakeville 30%, Rochester 30%.

Mrs. Doris Brown, R. N., of Lakeville, was re-employed as school nurse for the Union and her salary divided as follows: Carver 40%, Lakeville 32%, and Rochester 28%.

Mr. Austin presented his annual report which included a brief summary of the annual meeting of the American Association of School Administrators.

The semi-annual meeting of the committee was held at Assawompsett School in Lakeville on November 17, 1944.

The superintendent presented a report on his visit to the schools of several towns in lower New York State in May 1944, giving a brief summary of the differences and

similarities in the teaching practices and administration of these schools as compared to ours.

After reading and discussing a new curriculum for Grades I and II, outlined by Mr. Austin, the committee voted to adopt and use it in the schools of Union No. 45.

In June and December of this year the committee has again asked for the deferment of the superintendent from military service.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Carver for the period from November 10, 1942, the date of the previous examination, to December 6, 1944, and submit the following report thereon:

General ledger accounts were compiled for the period covered by the audit, the appropriations and transfers from the reserve account being checked with the town clerk's records of financial votes passed in town meetings and with the finance committee's records of transfers authorized. A balance sheet, showing the financial condition of the town on December 6, 1944, was prepared and is appended to this report. This balance sheet indicates that the town is in very good financial condition.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The cash book additions were verified and the recorded receipts were analyzed and checked with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds. The cash balance as of December 6, 1944, was verified by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit and by actual count of the cash in the treasurer's office.

The recorded payments on account of debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and by examination of the cancelled securities on file.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined and all additions thereto were compared with the collector's records. The recorded redemptions were checked with the treasurer's cash book and the tax title deeds, as listed, were checked with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and trustees were examined and checked in detail. The income was proved and the withdrawals were verified.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked in detail. The poll, property, and motor vehicle excise taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination and all subsequent commitments were audited and reconciled with the assessors' warrants. The payments to the treasurer were compared with the treasurer's cash book, the recorded abatements were checked with the assessors' record of abatements granted, and the taxes transferred to tax title accounts were checked with the treasurer's record of tax titles held by the town.

The records of departmental accounts receivable were examined and checked. The payments to the town treasurer were compared with the treasurer's cash book and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The outstanding tax and departmental accounts were listed and verified by mailing notices to a number of per-

sons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The records of dog and sporting licenses issued by the town clerk and of the town clerk's miscellaneous receipts were examined and checked. The recorded payments to the treasurer and to the State were verified by comparison with the treasurer's books and with receipts on file.

The surety bonds of the town officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the accounts mentioned, the records of the selectmen, of the sealer of weights and measures, and of all other departments collecting money for the town were examined, checked, and reconciled with the treasurer's books.

It is recommended that all departments collecting money for the town make payments to the treasurer at least monthly.

In the examination of paid bills it was noted that no certificates were attached to the 1943 bills which were provided for by appropriation in 1944, as required by Chapter 179, Acts of 1941.

In addition to the balance sheet referred to, there are appended to this report schedules showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, tax title, and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

For the cooperation extended by the various town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

TOWN WARRANT AND REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

Plymouth, ss. To either of the Constables of the Town of Carver, Plymouth County, Greetings:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Carver on Monday, the fifth day of March 1945 at twelve o'clock noon, then and there to act on the following article, namely:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers, the following officers to be voted for all on one ballot, viz:— Moderator, Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Three Auditors, Three Constables, Three Herring Committeemen, One Tree Warden, and One Highway Surveyor, each for one year. One Assessor, One Selectman, One School Committeeman, One Cemetery Commissioner, One Park Commissioner, One Member of Public Welfare and Two Library Trustees, each for Three Years.

The polls will be open for at least seven hours.

And you are directed to further notify said Inhabitants of said Town that as soon as the ballots have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Tuesday, March 6, 1945, at nine o'clock A. M. and at that time will reconvene at said Town Hall in said Carver, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen,

to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1945, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 2. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) from the free cash in the town treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the cemetery funds in the town treasury.

Article 4. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the cemetery fund or funds paid into the town treasury under the perpetual care statutes, or act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 5. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to prosecute, compromise or defend suits for or against the Town.

Article 6. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 7. To see what disposition the Town will make of the dog fund.

Article 7. Recommended by the Finance Committee that it be added to the Library Account.

Article 8. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, and choose a Town Director as provided in Sections 41 and 45 of Chapter 128 of the General Laws, and act thereon.

Article 8. Recommended by the Finance Committee that \$100.00 be raised and appropriated.

Article 9. To see what pay the Town will vote the Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, and other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 9. Recommended by Finance Committee as follows:

Moderator: \$10.00 for the Annual Town Meeting.
\$5.00 for each Special Meeting.

Town Clerk: \$500.00.

Town Treasurer: \$800.00.

Collector of Taxes: \$800.00.

Highway Surveyor: \$1.00 per hour.

School Committee Members: \$2.50 per day as provided by the law of the Commonwealth, plus \$2.50 additional per day of eight hours.

Constables: 75 cents per hour.

All Other Officers elected by the Town: 75 cents per hour.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the overlay reserve account to 1945 Reserve Account

the sum of Two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) or such other sum of money as may be voted the 1945 Reserve Account by the Town, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 10. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Public Welfare to use the Federal Government Reimbursement for administration, and to act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 11. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 12. To choose all necessary Town Officers not elected by ballot.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 13. Recommended by the Finance Committee that \$1,000.00 be raised and appropriated, and not over \$2,000.00 to be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 81 Highways, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 14. Recommended by the Finance Committee that \$5,417.00 be raised and appropriated, and not over

\$8,125.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Cemetery Commissioners and the Park Commissioners to employ themselves as laborers in the Cemeteries and Parks, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 15. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be used to pay for all private work and materials in Town Cemeteries, such as, opening graves, foundations, etc., as according to General Laws, Chapter 44, Sec. 53.

Article 16. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee consisting of the members of the School Committee, the Principal of the Center School and three additional members to be appointed by the Moderator, for the purpose of studying various proposals to improve the town's educational facilities with respect to a suitable Center School building and to make a report by the annual town meeting of 1946 or earlier if advisable, or take any other action in relation thereto.

By request of the School Committee.

Article 17. The Finance Committee voted to take no action on Article 17.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six hundred seventy nine dollars and sixty nine cents (\$679.69) to pay outstanding Public Welfare bills of 1944, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 18. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of South Meadow Road for a distance of approximately 3,300 feet southwesterly along South Meadow Road from the Plymouth-Carver Town Line to a point in range with the northeasterly side line of a wood road or path leading southeasterly from South Meadow Road to the small cranberry bog owned by the Estate of Theodore T. Vaughan, if and when the Navy Department of the United States Government advises the Town that it has acquired for the enlargement of its airport all the land on either side of that portion of said road to be discontinued.

Article 19. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of war bonds or other bonds that are legal investments for savings banks, for the postwar rehabilitation fund, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Acts of 1943, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 20. Recommended by the Finance Committee that the sum of ten thousand dollars be taken from available funds in the treasury for the purchase of an interest bearing war bond.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to establish a Veteran' Re-

habilitation and Re-employment Committee in the Town of Carver, and act thereon or thereto.

Article 21. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, at the several places designated by vote of the Town seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
