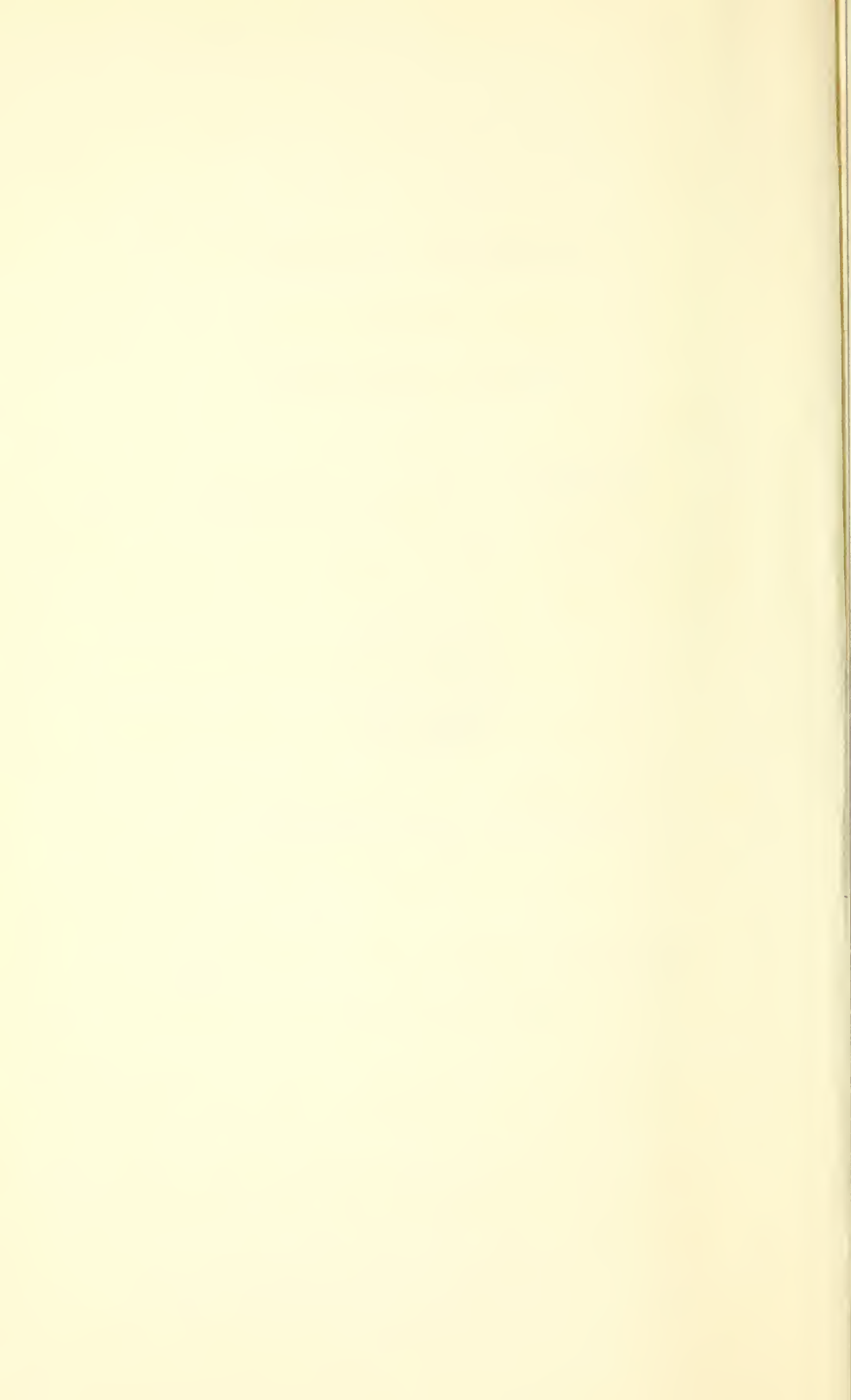

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 14, 1964

The Annual Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Saturday, March 14, 1964. The meeting was called to order at 2:00 P. M. by the Moderator, Thomas Barham, and the Invocation was given by the Rev. James F. Lally, Priest of Our Lady of Lourdes Church at North Carver. Theodore E. Halunen and Joseph G. Morris were appointed Tellers and were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties. Article 1, relating to the election of officers, having been disposed of at a prior meeting, the meeting proceeded to act upon the Articles in the Warrant, beginning with Article 2, as follows:

Article 2. VOTED to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1964, and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 3. VOTED to appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 from Free Cash in the Treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the Cemetery Funds in the Town Treasury.

Article 4. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 to be used to pay for all private work and material in Town Cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc., as according to General Laws Chapter 44, Section 53.

Article 5. VOTED to authorize the Board of Cemetery Commissioners to establish charges, with the approval of the Selectmen, for the care of cemetery lots of non-residents in order to assure uniform rates.

Article 6. VOTED to authorize the Board of Cemetery Commissioners to establish the following cemetery charges:

1. Perpetual Care for sale of new graves at \$50.00
2. Deed to right for burial at grave 15.00
3. Charge for properly grading new graves 15.00

Article 7. VOTED that the sum of \$555.21 of the Dog Fund be transferred toward the Library Account.

Article 8. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for County Aid to Agriculture, and choose a Town Director as provided in Section 41 and 45 of Chapter 128 of the General Laws. Thereupon, Mr. Earl E. Boardway was duly elected Town Director, County Aid to Agriculture.

Article 9. VOTED to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account to the 1964 Reserve Account the sum of \$5,000.00.

Article 10. VOTED to fix the salary and compensation of all elected officers of the Town, such salaries to be retro-active to January 1, 1964, as provided by General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, namely:

Highway Surveyor	\$105.00 per week
Town Treasurer	2200.00
Town Clerk	1000.00
Tax Collector	2200.00

Moderator \$20.00 for the Annual Town Meeting, and \$5.00 for each Special Town Meeting. Members of the School Board, \$1.75 per hour. All other elected Town Officers, \$1.75 per hour.

Article 11. VOTED to authorize the Tree Warden, Cemetery Commissioners and Park Commissioners to employ themselves as labourers in the cemeteries, parks, and tree department.

Article 12. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Assessors' Plans, such sum to be used and expended by the Board of Assessors.

Mr. Paul W. Williams presented the following report from the Carver School Building Needs Study Committee: "The Committee has been holding regular monthly meetings and has discussed with Mr. Nicolas, Superintendent of Plymouth Carver Schools, the problem of addition to the present Governor John Carver School.

The Superintendent of Plymouth-Carver Schools presented us with figures of the present enrollment at the

Carver Schools, and the estimated enrollment from 1963 to 1966. Therefore, the present schools will be inadequate by 1966. Therefore, the present schools will be inadequate by the year 1966. The Benjamin Ellis School is now using the basement for two classrooms on a temporary permit issued for two years. The State will cancel this permit unless progress is made toward the addition of the Carver School System.

The possibilities of including a new library, to be library, was also discussed and met with the approval of the financed partly by the Blenheim Trust Fund left for a new present library committee.

The Carver School Building Needs Study Committee have entered in the warrant for 1964 articles which we are recommending.”

Article 5. VOTED, unanimously, to appropriate from available funds in the treasury the sum of \$550.00 for the 1964 Law Account.

Article 6. VOTED, unanimously, to appropriate from available funds in the treasury the sum of \$609.60 to pay for engineering services in connection with drainage easements, etc., on Route 58 (Main Street).

Article 7. VOTED, unanimously, to appropriate from available funds in the treasury the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of purchasing a used partially equipped, forest fire patrol truck for the Fire Department.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Protective By-Law:

1. By adding the following words to the definition of farm under Section II of the Protective By-Law "but not including the commercial raising of pigs or the operation of piggeries."

2. By amending Section IV (B) (3) by deleting therefrom the following "a. The commercial raising of hogs, pigs or fur bearing animals."

Upon motion duly made and seconded, and after considerable discussion of the matter, it was unanimously VOTED that action on this article be postponed until the next Special Town Meeting and not later than the next Annual Town Meeting.

PLYMOUTH COUNTY AID TO AGRICULTURE
(Plymouth County Extension Service)

by Robert B. Ewing, County Agent-Manager

The primary responsibility of the Extension Service is as the 1914 law states "to aid in diffusing among the *people* of the United States useful and practical information on the subjects relating to Agriculture and Home Economics and to encourage the application of same."

Resources of the University of Massachusetts and the United States Department of Agriculture are available to the Staff of the Plymouth County Extension Service because of a mutual assistance agreement.

To make this service available to you funds are provided by the Federal, State and County governments. Thus the name — Cooperative Extension Service.

Since 1915, when the Plymouth County Extension Service was organized and established, educational information pertaining to Agriculture, Home Economics and 4-H Club Work has been given free to citizens of Plymouth County.

The Extension Service office is located in the Court House, Brockton, Massachusetts, and is staffed by agents who conduct programs in Agriculture, Home Economics and 4-H Club Work by furnishing educational information through farm and home visits, letters, newspaper articles, radio talks, meetings, office visits and telephone calls.

You are invited to make full use of the services provided by the Extension Service but should remember that although the Extension Service furnishes the information, it is you who makes the decision as to how the information may be used to best advantage.

PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

I will briefly outline your Project's activities for 1964.

Although this past year was drier than usual, we were troubled by extreme breeding of the culex mosquito which breeds in sewage areas and water containers. Sewage has been a very serious problem, necessitating spray activities as late as November. Applications of insecticides are becoming more complex. The use of DDT is at a minimum, due to recommendations from the State Pesticide Board. Also, milk and dairy products have a zero tolerance, thereby prohibiting any application of this insecticide in locations that could possibly contaminate forage land or dairy operations. The majority of forage areas are in close proximity to breeding wet-lands which makes our job increasingly difficult. Sewage disposal problems appear to be increasing yearly.

I will continue to stress the importance of reclamation of waterways as permanent control, in contrast to temporary control with insecticides. This is proven mosquito control. The homeowner can benefit us all if he disposes of all water in containers, such as gutters, tires, sewage, toys, abandoned autos, etc. These are the breeding areas of the culex mosquito.

As in past years we will continue to treat dumps, filter-beds, recreation areas, camps, and public outings for adult control. Larvaciding of large swamp areas in early spring, plus treatment to catch basins are yearly functions. Our crews have undertaken at least one major drainage program of contaminated areas in each town. Although costly and time consuming, it is the important phase of the Project.

Again this year, there was not a confirmed case of Eastern Equine Encephalitis in Plymouth County.

As of February 1, 1965, all who apply insecticide for this Project will be licensed.

The cooperation of the Tree and Moth Superintendent, your Highway Surveyor, and town officers was most gratifying.

The Chapter 90 Maintenance Allotment of \$3000.00 of which the town appropriated \$1000.00 the state \$1000.00 and the county \$1000.00 was used on Plympton Street where 5320 feet of road was stone sealed.

The Chapter 81 allotment of \$24,750.00 of which the town appropriated \$6,600.00 and the state \$18,150.00 must be used for maintenance purposes only. Out of this amount approximately \$12,915.00 was used to purchase and apply 40,900 gallons of asphalt for sealing the streets. The remaining \$11,835.00 was for patching, catch basins, culverts, shoulders and other miscellaneous maintenance operations.

The Chapter 90 allotment of \$30,000.00 in conjunction with the remaining \$9,874.84 Chapter 90, 1963 allotment and \$2,505.36 allotted to Tremont and Wareham Streets was used on Tremont Street where 4400 feet of road was completely built to a width of 26 feet with proper drainage and a surface of 3 inches of type C1 mix was applied.

Mrs. Cornelius Harrington and Mrs. Charles Johnson, registered nurse, assisted with the three clinics.

On March 17th the nurse presented the film "The Story of Menstruation" to mothers of Grade 5 girls. On March 19th the film was presented to Grade 5 girls. On both occasions the film seemed well received.

Mrs. Charles Johnson, R.N., assumed the duties of Public Health Nurse from April 19th until April 25th to relieve the nurse for one week's vacation.

On May 12th the nurse presented the film "Human Growth" to parents of seventh graders. On May 13th the film was shown by the nurse to seventh grade girls and on May 14th it was shown by Mr. Darrell Sawyer, junior high school teacher, to seventh grade boys. Discussion following presentation of the film to the students was excellent on both occasions.

On June 5th pre-school registration was held at the Benjamin Ellis School at which time school health policies were explained.

On September 21 and 28, and October 19 and 26, Dr. W. Venron Mayo, school physician, performed physical examinations on athletes, transfers, and all students in Grades 1, 4 and 7.

On October 7th Heaf tuberculin tests were administered to students in grades 1, 4, and 7 and to those students who have been or are contacts of tuberculin individuals or recent positive converters. The tests were administered by Mr. Cesar Aleman of The Plymouth County Health Association.

On October 14th Mr. Aleman read the Heaf tests and found 3 positive reactors. On October 27th the nurse transported these three students to the Plymouth County Hospital for x-rays.

On November 16th a mobile chest unit, sponsored by the Plymouth County Health Association, was held at the Center Carver Fire Station. Two hundred and nineteen people were x-rayed. Members of the South Carver Com-

munity Service Group donated their time and services to help make this program a success. Hearing and visions tests have been completed at The Gov. John Carver School for the 1964-65 school year. Failure notices have been sent home to parents for follow-up care.

The sale of TB pins to the school children netted \$17.20.

I wish to thank the Public Health Nurse Committee, Mr. Richard Eldridge, principal, teachers and parents for their help and cooperation.

REPORT ON PUBLIC WELFARE

To the Honorable Board of Public Welfare

I hereby submit my report on Old Age Assistance, Medical Assistance for the Aged, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Disability Assistance and General Relief for the year ending December 31, 1964.

During the year sixty-six applications were processed and disposed of as follows:

At the beginning of the year there were twenty-six Old Age Assistance cases. Thirteen new cases were approved and fourteen cases closed, leaving twenty-five active cases on 12-31-64. Expenditures increased from \$27,245.71 to \$31,299.52 due to increased medical services.

Disability Assistance expenditures decreased from \$6,765.30 to \$5,387.98 due to a decrease in caseload. One new case was opened and three cases closed leaving one active case at the end of the year.

The Medical Assistance for the Aged program becomes more costly as new applications are received and approved.

At the beginning of the year there were eleven cases. Fourteen new cases were added and nine cases closed leaving sixteen active cases at the end of the year. Expenditures increased from \$19,901.98 to \$21,624.71.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children cases totaled five on January 1, 1964 and three on December 31, 1964. Five new cases were added and seven cases closed. Expenditures increased from \$5,921.05 to \$7,535.65. The Average number of children aided was fifteen .

Chapter 339 of the Acts of 1964 removed from the Board of Public Welfare responsibility for determination of legal settlement as well as the cost of care of persons infected by diseases dangerous to public health.

Chapter 591 of the Acts of 1964 amended Chapter 118A allowing an exemption of \$3,000.00 in combined ownership of personal property between husband and wife when either or both apply for Medical Assistance for the Aged. A person and his or her spouse may have an exemption of \$225.00 of the combined total monthly income which they retain for their maintenance when either or both apply for assistance.

Chapter 594 of the Acts of 1964 amended Chapter 118A by increasing the leisure time activities allowance in Old Age Assistance cases from \$5.00 to \$6.00 per month.

Chapter 595 of the Acts of 1964 amended Chapter 118A by increasing the married child's exemption to \$6,000.00 and increasing the exemption for each of his or her dependents to \$1,200.00. This refers to OAA and MAA.

In order that Boards of Public Welfare may obtain additional Federal financial participation in Old Age Assistance and Disability, effective 1-1-65 local boards must provide certain services as outlined in the Department's directives. A social study must be completed, then an evaluation to study the potential for improved individual and family

functioning for reducing or eliminating dependency. A systematic and appropriate plan for treatment must be developed for each individual.

The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare is requiring that at least one service be made mandatory on a statewide basis. Massachusetts has elected medical to be the mandatory service because it is the one most widely needed and most frequently provided.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Board members for their cooperation during the year.

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Carver for the period from January 1, 1962, the date of the previous examination, to March 21, 1964, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions as recorded on the books of the departments receiving or disbursing money for the town, or sending out bills for collection, were examined, checked and verified.

The ledger accounts, kept by the town treasurer as accounting officer, were analyzed for the period covered by the audit. The recorded receipts were checked with available departmental records and with the treasurer's cash book, while the payments were compared with the warrants authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The appropriations, as recorded on the ledgers, were checked with the amounts voted by the town as shown by the town clerk's record of town meetings, the transfers from the reserve fund were compared with the amounts authorized by the finance committee, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on March 21, 1964.

The books and accounts of the treasurer were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were analyzed and verified by comparison with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the disbursements were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the payments. The cash balance on March 21, 1964 was proved by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The payments of maturing debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and were checked with the cancelled securities on file.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined and checked. The amounts added to the tax title account were compared with the tax collector's records, the tax titles redeemed were checked with the receipts as recorded on the treasurer's cash book, and the tax titles on hand were listed and compared with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the trustees were examined and listed. The income proved, and all other transactions and balances were verified.

The records of payroll deductions on account of Federal and State taxes, retirement systems, Blue Cross and Blue

Shield, and group insurance were examined and checked. The payments to the proper agencies were verified, and balances on hand to the credit of the employees were proved with the town treasurer's records.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked. The tax and excise accounts outstanding according to the previous examination, as well as all subsequent commitments, were audited and compared with the warrants for their collection. The payments to the treasurer were checked with the treasurer's cash book, the recorded abatements were compared with the assessor's records of abatements granted, the transfers to the tax title account were checked with the treasurer's records of tax titles held by the town, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective ledger accounts.

The records of departmental accounts receivable were examined and checked. The recorded collections were proved with the payments to the treasurer, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the ledger accounts.

Verification of the outstanding tax and excise accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed are correct.

The financial accounts of the town clerk were examined. The records of receipts pertaining to dog and sporting licenses issued, as well as receipts of a miscellaneous nature, were checked, and the payments to the town treasurer were checked with the treasurer's cash book.

The surety bonds furnished by the several town officials for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of departmental cash collections of the Selectmen, as well as of all other departments in which money was collected for the town, were examined and checked. The recorded collections were compared with the payments to the town treasurer as shown by the treasurer's books, and the cash on hand in the several departments was proved by actual count.

There are appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, tax title, and departmental accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

During the progress of the audit, cooperation was received from all town officials for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION TO FIRST GRADE

1. A child who will reach his sixth birthday on or before December 31st may be admitted to the first grade in September, 1965 without examination.
2. A child whose sixth birthday occurs in the two months after December 31st may be admitted the preceding September if readiness for school can be demonstrated by means of appropriate tests. Parents having a child whom they wish to be examined under this rule are required to make application to the Superintendent of Schools on or before August 15 preceding the opening of school in September. A special form will be furnished for this purpose upon written request from the parent.

The School Committee reserves the right to withhold

the examination privilege whenever the number of children eligible to enter without examination is equal to the capacity of the available classrooms.

CLOSING OF SCHOOLS

It is the policy of the School Committee to close school only under the severest weather conditions or on such occasions when it is dangerous to operate school buses. At other times, parents are expected to use their own judgment in sending children to school. When a decision to close schools has been made, this information will be broadcast through the courtesy of radio stations WBZ and WNBH and WPLM.

It should also be remembered there are occasions when under the stress of storm conditions the telephone service cannot keep up with the demands and it is impossible to reach radio stations in order to have an announcement made.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith submit my second annual report. This will also include the combined report of the Elementary Supervisor and the Principal of the Governor John Carver and the Benjamin Ellis Schools. A careful analysis of the reports will assist you in becoming better informed on matters relative to the education of your children.

In order to avoid duplication and an exceptionally long report, I will briefly summarize some of the activities for the year.

Building Committee

This year has been a busy one for the Carver School Building Committee, which was created at the annual Town Meeting held in March 1964. This Committee has interviewed architects, met with the School Board Assistance Commission, and in all have held eighteen meetings since their inception. Plans are being developed which will be presented at Town Meeting that will attempt to meet both the educational and space needs of our students.

Curricula

This year, for the first time in many years, all senior high students are attending the same high school—their own. Vocational students will continue attending area schools as space permits.

There is an article in the warrant for the creation of a study committee consisting of three members, one from the School Committee, to meet with the surrounding Towns to explore the possibility of a Regional Vocational School.

Many other curriculum changes have been made which will be covered in the report of the Principal and Elementary Supervisor. The evidence indicates a well developed continuity of educational philosophy and goals which have been indicated by the recent scores of the ninth grade students at the High School.

Again, we were able to institute a limited shop program for the eighth grade boys. Every effort is being made to improve this program so that the seventh grade boys will also have the same opportunity.

Personnel

The value of any school system is determined mainly by the quality of its staff. We are truly fortunate to have such a capable, enthusiastic group. We have a number of additions to our staff this year.

Mr. Franklin Wilbur replaced Mrs. Albert Raymond this spring as Custodian. I wish to take time here to express our appreciation to Mrs. Raymond, who for numerous years, served on the Custodial Staff. Mrs. Raymond served diligently in assisting with the care of our building and displayed great interest in pupils and staff members.

Mrs. Madeine Owens began her duties as School Librarian on a part-time basis this fall and is conducting classes for Grades 3-8. The Library is an integral part of our educational program and each year an increasing number of pupils are availing themselves of its offerings.

Other additions to our faculty include Miss Patricia Henderson, a graduate of Hiram College, to teach Grade 2; Miss Margaret Wood, a graduate of the State College at Bridgewater, to teach Grade 5; Mr. Richard Silva, a graduate of Boston University, to teach Grade 6; Mr. Richard Ward, a graduate of The University of Massachusetts, to teach Physical Education and Science to Grades 7 and 8; and Mr. Malcolm Peterson, a graduate of Boston University, to teach Social Studies in the Junior High School.

Changes in the staff at The Benjamin Ellis School include Mrs. Emma Williams who is now transporting and serving the hot lunches at that school, and Mrs. June Williams who has assumed the duties of custodian.

School Plant Improvements

The following improvements were made in 1964:

Governor John Carver School:

- Replaced two outside doors and moulding (frames)
- Painted eight classrooms
- Replaced several glass blocks in the gym
- Checked oil burner and oil tank treatment
- Entrance lights adjusted
- Clearing Brush

Benjamin Ellis School:

- New light fixture in classroom
- Replaced some floor tile in classroom
- Repaired pump

In conclusion, in behalf of the students and the school, may I express my appreciation to the citizens for their support; the School Committee for their guidance and direction; the principal and teaching staff for their continued endeavors to improve the quality of instruction; and to the custodians and cafeteria workers who serve so effectively.

REPORT OF THE ELEMENTARY SUPERVISOR AND PRINCIPAL OF THE CARVER PUBLIC SCHOOLS

We hereby submit our first report as Elementary Supervisor and Principal of the Carver Schools.

The annual Science Fair continued to be a successful program with many enthusiastic pupils preparing exhibits. Awards were presented to the following pupils for their outstanding work: Lorna Washburn was awarded first prize for her entry on "Bacteria in Everyday Life"; Hilarie Gibbs received second prize for her "Growth of an Atoll"; Donna Ruprecht was awarded third prize for her "Terrarium".

School closed in June with an enrollment of 371. In September this figure had increased to 391 and then tapered back to 386 by December 31, 1964. It is estimated that by September 1965 our enrollment in Grades 1-8 for the first time in history will reach the 400 mark. The amount of growth during the past few years has increased annually and as a result of this growth our facilities are becoming more and more limited. A Building Committee is present giving consideration to this problem.

At present every classroom is being utilized. However, due to the size of our present combined fifth and sixth grades, it will be educationally feasible to discontinue this combination next year. Therefore, in September 1965 an additional classroom will be needed. It is contemplated that the present Homemaking Room will be used for this purpose. We believe that with careful scheduling that we will be able to continue our Homemaking classes.

Thirty-one pupils, including three tuition pupils, were enrolled in our Summer School this year. Mrs. Cole and Mr. Shaw conducted remedial programs in reading and arithmetic. We hope to continue the summer program and broaden its offerings in the near future.

The Intercom System at The Gov. John Carver School finally became a reality this summer and already we have found it to be an extremely valuable instrument. We now

have instant communication with all areas of the building. It saves many needless steps, conserving valuable time. It has flexibility for paging, general announcements, radio programs of national interest, and music programs. It will provide immediate contact with all areas of the building during any emergency. We wish to express our sincere appreciation to the members of the South Carver Community Service Group who worked so diligently to make this system possible.

Now that School Superintendency Union #62 composed of Carver and Plymouth Schools has been formed, and the fact that pupils from both communities will be preparing for the same regional high school, it is imperative that the curriculums of both communities be carefully evaluated and a program developed which will coordinate the curriculum in all schools. Mr. Emmett Finck, Elementary Supervisor, is presently working diligently to achieve this end. Committees have been formed to work on various areas of the curriculum.

In the spring two committees were organized: one of these evaluated the elementary and junior high school testing programs and the other concentrated on the formation of a new pupil permanent record card. Both of these committees have completed their studies. The Committee for Test Evaluation investigated numerous achievement and intelligence tests and then met with representatives of the companies involved to discuss their test materials. The final recommendations of the committee have been approved by the School Committee so that next year our new testing programs will consist of the following:

1. Science Research Associates Achievement Tests to be administered to Grade 1 in the spring.
2. Science Research Associates Achievement Tests to be administered to pupils in Grades 2-8 in the fall.
3. The California Tests of Mental Maturity will be administered to pupils in Grades 1-3-5-7 in October.

The committee, organized to devise a new permanent record card, after reviewing numerous types of cards and considering our own programs and needs, designed a new card for Grades 1-8 which would contain Report Card marks, tests, scores and other pertinent data.

The consistencies which will result from the work of these two committees should prove beneficial to those at the High School who are responsible for interpreting these records and determining an accurate prognosis on each child.

Curriculum committees consisting of representatives from each school in the union have also been active this year. A Mathematics Study Committee completed a study of the various Modern Mathematics Programs offered throughout the nation. The program recommended by the Committee for Grades 1-8 was the one published by the Silver Burdett Publishing Company. This decision was fortunate for us in that we have been using this same program now for three years and have found that it provides for our needs quite well.

A committee to study time allotments is also completing their study. This committee has attempted to determine the amount of time which should be devoted to each subject area per day, so that all schools will be consistent in this area.

A Social Studies Committee is presently evaluating the programs used in the towns. This Committee will, perhaps, report its findings and present its recommendations some time next year.

Mrs. Irene Williams and her staff have continued to provide excellent meals, as well as a pleasant atmosphere, for our children. We have continued the low price of 20¢ per day for the children's lunches. However, rising costs are making it more difficult to continue at this rate. It appears that we will soon have to increase the cost of pupil lunches in order to continue as a self-supporting program.

**REPORT OF PLYMOUTH-CARVER
REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT**

The first year of operation for the High School was indeed successful. This attainment was only possible through the combined efforts of the entire staff of the District as well as the endeavors of the student body. The comprehensive high has become a reality for the two Towns.

Several minor problems still remain with us. The terazzo flooring has had considerable attention and it is believed before too long this will be resolved. A credit is being sought from the General contractor because of the problems encountered.

A draft problem has been under study by the heating engineers and recommendations for corrections are expected shortly.

The grounds around the school are being reviewed. This spring and summer should see the area revitalized. We have installed the bleachers and plan to use our football field in the fall.

The District received its first transportation reimbursement which was applied against the proposed budget for 1965. This reflected a considerable credit, thus reducing the operating appropriation to the two Towns accordingly.

The areas of curricula development and extra curricula activity will be reviewed in more detail in the Report of the School Principal.

This year Mrs. Mary Gomes of Carver was welcomed to the Committee. Mr. Franklin Wilbur, who served on the Interim Regional Committee and the Regional Committee, did not seek re-election. A word of appreciation to Mr. Wilbur is in order for his untiring efforts in serving his community as a Committee member.

Many new staff members were added in September. It is interesting to note that of the fourteen new teachers, eight were experienced. A reasonable turn-over in staff is good for a school. We believe we were most fortunate in being able to attract these fine additions to our staff.

The enrollment has increased over the projected figures. An approximate 2% growth was recorded for September.

An examination of lower grade enrollments indicates that within a year or two an addition will be necessary in order to meet the expected entering classes of three hundred freshmen, beginning in 1968.

Many fine programs are in the process of being developed which will assist our entire student population. Included in the planning is how the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 can be implemented into our school.

Again, you are reminded that this is your school. When problems or questions arise call the school and avail yourself of the opportunity to discuss them with the teachers, guidance counselors, or the administration.

The School Committee wishes to express their appreciation for the support received from the citizens of the Towns: and we shall endeavor to continue to improve our educational offerings to meet the individual needs of all our students.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL PLYMOUTH-CARVER HIGH SCHOOL

The objectives set at the beginning of the 1963-1964 school year were as follows:

1. To meld students from Plymouth and Carver into a unified student body
2. To know the students as individuals

3. To develop a well coordinated, highly effective staff
4. To develop wholesome student-staff relationships
5. To utilize the facilities of the new school efficiently and extensively

Measured by these objectives, the entire staff and the students feel that 1964 was a rewarding year; for all of the goals were realized, and some, with marked success. By January the total school program—educational, social, cultural, and athletic was well under way; and classes and individuals had begun to distinguish themselves in areas of their particular interest or aptitude.

Grades followed an interesting pattern: 8% of the students made the honor roll, 10% received failing grades, and the overall distribution was as follows:

A	B	C	D	F

As measured by standardized tests, the students of Plymouth-Carver High School represent a normal population pattern. Twenty-five students were inducted into the National Honor Society; three students were National Merit finalists, and six students received letters of commendation for their achievement on the National Merit Qualifying Test.

Approximately 500 students participated in the inter-scholastic athletic program, and 400 students participated in the intramural program. Boys' tennis and golf were added as school sports; and for the first time in many years, track and field events took place on home fields.

The social and cultural program involved many students and a multitude of activities: A play, a variety show, an operetta were the highlights; and there were also proms, dances, and concerts as well as visits to the opera and to the museums of art and science and assorted field trips. Students participated in a radio series on youth perspectives, and lectures on modes, manners, and morals were offered the girls as well as health assemblies on cancer and the danger of smoking and drinking.

In addition, through the excellent cooperation of the community service clubs, the students were able to take several vocational trips sponsored by the Kiwanis, a Student Government week was sponsored by the Rotary Club and a cultural program featuring Rubinoff, the violinist, was sponsored by the Lions. Plymouth-Carver High School is indeed grateful to these groups and to all the local organizations that assist students and education in this manner.

School activities were vigorously promoted by the students; hardly a week went by that did not offer enriching extra-curricular experiences. When the final bell rang in June, a great deal had been accomplished. Some of the major highlights were the successes of the athletic teams in football, basketball, and golf; the great victory, of course, being the basketball team's winning the Class C title of the Eastern Massachusetts Schoolboy Tournament. In addition, there were other important achievements: The school newspaper, *The Clarion* and the literary magazine *The Lit* were initiated, and *The Pilgrim*, the school's award-winning yearbook, was again successfully published; new organizations were formed, and the altruism of the students was clearly demonstrated by *Operation Africa*, a project to send Edward Karanja, a foreign student from Kenya, home to see his family whom he had not seen for over two years. Indeed, the first class to graduate from Plymouth-Carver High School left a legacy of outstanding achievement for succeeding classes to equal or to follow.

None of these activities could have been so successful without the inspiring leadership and dedication of the teaching staff, which more than fulfilled its responsibilities to the students, the school, the community, and to one another. The teachers deserve the highest praise for their efforts.

As in all human enterprises, there were problems and failures, as well as successes. New schools present many new problems, and Plymouth-Carver High School was no exception. A freshman class was added, and the curriculum previously oriented to the three-year high school concept required

extensive revision; the teaching staff was expanded, and we faced a new way of life in our modern comprehensive high school. These changes offered many challenges, for new programs do not come into being without adjustments and growing pains, nor does experimentation take place without frustration and anxiety. However, even these experiences offered valuable learning opportunities.

One of our prime educational concerns, the drop-out rate remains fixed at 3%; and while we feel some sense of achievement in having this low statistic, we cannot be complacent. We shall not be satisfied until the figure is lower or there are no drop-outs at all.

During the year there was a 20% turnover in staff: Some teachers left to advance themselves, and others were not re-hired. Even though turnover places a burden on the school, a certain amount is desirable; a school, however, must be continually alert to reasons for the turnover. If highly competent teachers are leaving regularly, school policies, salaries, and administration must be reassessed.

The principal objectives for the students during 1964-1965 included those of the preceding year and added the goal of developing greater school spirit. When the school doors opened in September, pupil enrollment had increased to 1,104 students, and the faculty had added sixteen new teachers. The beginning of school, however, was much smoother than that of the previous year because only one class had to be oriented to the new building. What had taken four months to accomplish in the preceding year was accomplished in the first month of the 1964 school year. The principal objective set for the staff for 1964-1965 is the self-evaluation program, which consists of an investigation of the curriculum to consider its strengths, its weaknesses, and its direction—as well as to investigate the effectiveness of the implementation of the stated philosophy and objectives of Plymouth-Carver High School. This evaluation is no small undertaking, and it will require a minimum of fifteen months to accomplish. It is not an easy task or a pleasant task, and

its success will depend upon the cooperation of the community, the students, and the teachers working toward the common goal of quality education for Plymouth-Carver High School.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF GUIDANCE

After the start of the academic year 1964-1965, the Guidance Department welcomed one new member to Plymouth-Carver High School, Mr. Daniel Alvino filled the vacancy left by Mr. Joseph Jayko who resigned to attend an Institute for Advanced Counseling and Guidance at Boston University.

As has been our practice in the past, the counselors have continued their individual and group conferences with students, parents, teachers and representatives of colleges, referral agencies, etc. Mention should be made of the fact that the counselors confer with graduates as well as the aforementioned; more than fifty alumni sought our help in school and job placement last year.

Thanks to the continued support of the Kiwanis Club of Plymouth, we have been able to continue our visitations with groups of non-college-bound students. Last year's trips took our selected students to two different hairdressing schools, three technical schools (Wentworth Institute, Coyne Electric, and North Bennet Industrial School), the Burbank Hospital School of Nursing, and to Boston; at the New England Mutual Life Insurance Company and at the Jordan Marsh Company this group learned of opportunities in sales, clerical and office work, data processing and automation in particular.

In testing, we have added and revised tests to update the program at all levels, elementary, junior high, and senior high schools. In May, 1964 we participated in an Evalu-

ation and Adjustment Series Research Program wherein we administered a mental ability test and an American History test to 300 juniors for the purpose of helping to standardize the latter test. With the addition of the School and College Ability Test (SCAT) we provided our sophomores with a long-range prediction of performance on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) of the College Entrance Board Examinations.

An innovation last year was the publication of *The Guidance News Letter*, edited first by Mr. Jayko, and currently by Mr. Alvino. Through this medium, students and their parents have brought to their attention timely information about scholarships, post-secondary schools, career information, trends in employment, etc.

In the fall of 1964, the Guidance Department arranged two programs in the evening for students and their parents. Built on the theme, "After High School, what?" Part I encompassed "Post Secondary Schools and Colleges" with a panel of representatives from a liberal arts college (Harvard), a business college (Burdett), a junior college (Cape Cod Community College), a university (Northeastern), a state college (Bridgewater), and a technical school (Wentworth). The panel members gave descriptions of their respective schools' offerings, requirements, and then answered questions from the audience. Part II, "The World of Work", presented the following month, consisted of an introductory talk by a keynote speaker, after which students and parents, directed to various classrooms, heard representatives of the following fields and careers: automation and data processing, office work, beauty culture, engineering, auto mechanics, social work, forestry, building trades, nursing, airline stewardess and commercial art.

The percentage of our graduates planning post-secondary education continues to increase. Below are the statistics for the class of 1964:

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Plymouth, ss. To either of the Constables of the Town of Carver, Plymouth County, GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs to meet at the Governor John Carver School House in said Carver on Saturday the sixth day of March, 1965, at 12:00 o'clock noon, then and there to act on the following article, namely:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers, to be voted for all on one ballot, viz.: One Moderator, Three Auditors, each for one year. One Selectman, One Assessor, One member of School Board, One Town Clerk, One Town Treasurer, One Collector of Taxes, One Cemetery Commissioner, One Park Commissioner, Three Constables, Two Library Trustees, each for a term of three years. One member of Planning Board for a term of five years, and One Park Commissioner for a term of one year (to fill vacancy).

The Polls will be open for at least eight hours.

And you are directed to further notify said Inhabitants of said Town that as soon as the ballots have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Saturday, March 13, 1965, at 2:00 o'clock P. M., and at that time will reconvene at said Governor John Carver School House, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1965, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less

than one year in accordance with Section ~~17~~⁴ Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 2. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred (\$1500.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the Cemetery Funds in the Town Treasury.

Article 3. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred fifty (\$650.00) dollars to be used to pay for all private work and material in Town Cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc., as according to General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 53.

Article 4. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 5. To see what disposition the Town will make of the County Dog Fund.

Article 5. Recommended by the Finance Committee that the Dog Fund be applied towards the Library Account.

Article 6. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, and to choose a Town Director as provided in Section 41 and 45 of Chapter 128 of the General Laws, and act thereon.

Article 6. Recommended by the Finance Committee that the sum of \$100.00 be raised and appropriated for County Aid to Agriculture, and choose a Town Director as provided in Section 41 and 45 of Chapter 128 of the General Laws.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account to the 1965 Reserve Account the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars.

Article 7. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town, such salaries to be retroactive to January 1, 1965, as provided by General Laws Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, namely:

Highway Surveyor	\$110.00 per week
Town Treasurer	\$2,200.00 per annum
Town Clerk	\$1,000.00 per annum
Tax Collector	\$2,200.00 per annum

Moderator \$20.00 for the Annual Town Meeting, and \$5.00 for each Special Town Meeting.

All other elected town officers \$1.75 per hour.

Article 8. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tree Warden, Cemetery Commissioners and Park Commissioners to employ themselves as laborers in the cemeteries, parks, and tree department, and to act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 9. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand (\$4,000.00) dollars for Assessors' Plans, such sum to be used and expended by the Board of Assessors.

Article 10. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 11. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 11. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 12. To choose all necessary Town Officers not elected by ballot.

Article 12. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 13. To hear the report of any standing committees and act anything thereon or thereto and to establish any new committees.

Article 13. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-eight dollars and eighty cents (\$68.80) to pay the following 1964 unpaid bills, namely:

Veterans' Benefits	\$63.80
Moderator	5.00

Article 14. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to return to the Road Machinery Fund the unexpended appropriation balance of two hundred twenty-four dollars and eighty-five cents (\$224.85) remaining in the Highway Department Truck Purchase Account.

Article 15. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$96,027.75 as the Town's share of the annual maintenance and operating budget for the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District consisting of the capital costs assessment of \$16,578.10 and the operating costs assessment of \$79,449.65 which is in accordance with the provisions of Section 168 of Chapter 71 of the General Laws. Said appropriation is to be used in conjunction with an appropriation made available for the same purpose by the Town of Plymouth.

Article 16. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to create a special unpaid committee to be known as the Regional Vocational School District Planning Committee to consist of three members, including one member of the School Committee, all to be appointed by the moderator, which committee may join with a comparable committee or committees from one or more neighboring towns for the purpose of studying the advisability of establishing a Regional Vocational School District and making recommendations relative thereto, said committee to report not later than the next annual Town Meeting.

Article 17. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand six hundred (\$6,600.00) dollars for Chapter 81, Highways, and to transfer the sum of eighteen thousand one hundred fifty (\$18,150.00) dollars from available funds in the Treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State, to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.
