ANNUAL TOWN MEETING March 13, 1965

The Annual Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Saturday, March 13, 1965. The meeting was called to order at 2:00 o'clock, P.M., by the Moderator, Thomas C. Barham, there being a quorum present. Article 1, relating to the election of officers, having been disposed of at a prior meeting, the meeting proceeded to act upon the remaining Articles in the warrant, as follows:

Article 2. VOTED to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1965, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 3. VOTED to appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 from available funds in the treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the Cemetery Funds in the Town Treasury.

Article 4. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 to be used to pay for all private work and material in Town Cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc., as according to General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 53.

Article 5. VOTED that the County Dog Fund in the amount of \$482.34 be transferred to the Library Account.

Article 6. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, and to choose a Town Director as provided in Section 41 and 45 of Chapter 128 of General Laws. Thereupon, Mr. Earl E. Boardway was

duly nominated and unanimously elected Town Director County Aid to Agriculture.

Article 7. VOTED to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account to the 1965 Reserve Account the sum of \$10,000.00.

Article 8. VOTED to fix the salary and compensation of all election officers of the Town, such salaries to be retroactive to January 1, 1965, as provided by General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, namely:

Highway Surveyor \$110.00 per week
Town Treasurer 2200.00 per annum
Town Clerk 1000.00 per annum
Tax Collector 2200.00 per annum

Moderator, \$20.00 for the Annual Town Meeting, and \$5.00 for each Special Town Meeting. Members of the School Board, \$1.75 per hour. All other elected Town officers, \$1.75 per hour.

Article 9. VOTED to authorize the Tree Warden, Cemetery Commissioners and Park Commissioners to employ themselves as laborers in the cemeteries, parks, and tree department.

Article 10. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000.00 for Assessors' Plans, such sum to be used and expended by the Board of Assessors.

Article 11. VOTED to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, as follows:

Article 12. VOTED to choose all necessary Town officers not elected by ballot. Thereupon, nominations being duly made and seconded, the following officers were unanimously elected:

- 1. Surveyors of Lumber and Measurers of Wood: Toivo J. Kallio, Homer F. Weston, Bradford H. Cole.
- 2. Field Drivers and Pound Keepers: Raymond A. Parent, Theodore E. Halunen, Arnold T. Sherwood.

Fence Viewers: Raymond A. Parent, Theodore E. Halunen, Arnold T. Sherwood.

4. Herring Committee: Alan I. Dunham, Erwin K. Washburn, Virginia K. Shaw.

Article 13. VOTED to hear the report of any standing committee and to establish any new committees. Thereupon, Mr. Erwin K. Washburn gave a report of progress of the School Building Committee, stating that the committee were working and would report at a later date.

Article 14. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-eight dollars and eighty cents (\$68.80) to pay the following 1964 unpaid bills, namely:

Veterans' Benefits \$63.80 Moderator 5.00

Article 15. VOTED to return to the Road Machinery Fund the unexpended appropriation balance of two hundred twenty-four dollars and eighty-five cents (\$224.85) remaining in the Highway Department Truck Purchase Account.

Article 16. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$96,027.75 as the Town's share of the annual maintenance and operating budget for the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District consisting of the capital costs assessment of \$16,578.10 and the operating costs assessment of \$79,449.65 which is in accordance with the provisions of Section 168 of Chapter 71 of the General

Laws. Said appropriation is to be used in conjunction with an appropriation made available for the same purpose by the Town of Plymouth.

Article 17. VOTED to create a special unpaid committee to be known as the Regional Vocational School District Planning Committee to consist of three members, including one member of the School Committee, all to be appointed by the Moderator, which committee may join with a comparable committee or committees from one or more neighboring towns for the purpose of studying the advisability of establishing a Regional Vocational School District and making recommendations relative thereto, said committee to report not later than the next annual Town Meeting.

Article 18. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,600.00 for Chapter 81, Highways, and to transfer the sum of \$18,150.00 from available funds in the Treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.

Article 19. VOTED to transfer the sum of \$7000.00 from the Tremont and Wareham Streets Construction account, consisting of funds received from the Commonwealth under Chapter 822, of the Acts of 1963, to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Construction on Tremont and Wareham Streets, and to transfer the sum of \$21,000.00 from available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.

Article 20. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, and to transfer the sum of \$2,000.00 from available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's shares

of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.

Article 21. VOTED to transfer the sum of \$2471.00 from the Road Machinery Fund to the 1965 Highway Machinery Account.

Article 22. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 and to transfer the additional sum of \$1,000.00 from the Carlton Shurtleff Central Cemetery Fence Fund for the purpose of installing a new fence at the Central Cemetery.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to change to "Jordan Road" the name of that section of old Route No. 58, now known as "Main Street," beginning at the southerly terminus of South Meadow Street and extending southerly therefrom a distance of 782 feet, more or less, past the residence of Uuno P. Penti, to the new Auto Route No. 58. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to refer the article to a committee, to be formed, consisting of the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, the Highway Surveyor, and one member from each of the five families who live on the street and who are immediately involved, this committee to report at the next Town Meeting.

Article 24. VOTED to appropriate the sum of \$10.000.00 from available funds in the treasury for the purpose of increasing the Stabilization Fund.

No other business. Meeting adjourned at 3:20 P.M.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

May 24, 1965

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on May 24, 1965. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 o'clock, P.M., by the Moderator, Mr. Thomas C. Barham, and the meeting proceeded to act upon the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. VOTED, by standing vote, 44 in the affirmative and 32 opposed, to authorize the Selectmen to hire a competent and qualified mechanic who shall have charge of the care and maintenance of all townowned machinery, equipment, motor vehicles, etc., and to appropriate from available funds in the treasury the sum of \$3200.00 to pay the salary of said mechanic, the salary to be determined by the Selectmen.

Article 2. VOTED to transfer the sum of \$384.25 from the School Insurance Recovery Account to Schools and Vocational Education Account. Said sum to be used with other available funds for the purchase of a motor vehicle for transportation by the school department.

Article 3. VOTED, unanimously, that the town appropriate the sum of \$260,000.00 for the purpose of constructing, originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Governor John Carver School, that to meet said appropriation the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow the sum of \$260,000.00, at one time or from time to time, under authority of Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948, as amended, and to issue bonds or notes of the town therefor, payable in accordance with the applicable provisions of said Chapter 645 and of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, so that each issue of bonds or notes herein authorized shall be paid in not more than twenty (20) years from its date, and that the present Carver Building Committee be authorized in the name and on behalf of

the Town to enter into all contracts and agreements and to take such other action as shall be necessary to carry out the construction, original equipping and furnishing of such addition.

Article 4. VOTED to appropriate from available funds in the Treasury the sum of \$500.00. said sum of money to be used for the purpose of constructing a basketball court at the Center Carver Athletic Field.

Article 5. VOTED to change to "Crescent Road" the name of that section of old Route No. 58, now known as "Main Street." beginning at the southerly terminus of South Meadow Street and extending southerly therefrom a distance of 782 feet. more or less, past the residence of Uuno P. Penti, to the Auto Route No. 58.

Article 6. This article called for amending the Protective By-laws so as to reduce the minimum lot size requirements of water-front property and sought to create an area zoned as "Resort Residential." The matter was discussed at considerable length. Thereupon, vote being had by standing vote, none were recorded in the affirmative and 101 opposed. The motion was declared lost.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, the meeting adjourned at 9:43 P.M.

# PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

#### CARVER ANNUAL REPORT — 1965

I will briefly outline your Project's activities during the past year.

The extremely dry weather enabled us to put more time to our permanent control measures with our power equipment. We are in hopes of acquiring another trencher this year which should allow us to double our efforts in this most important phase of our program. A control measure such as trenching eliminates contaminated breeding areas. Work of this type of control will also aid in decreasing the mosquito population in surrounding townships that may be subjected to wind-borne mosquitoes.

Our limited aerial applications are to supplement permanent phases of control. Consideration of damage to our environment, farmlands, and to the public, limits us to areas treated and to insecticides which we use. We will continue to work closely with recommendations and suggestions of the State Pesticide Board, Department of Public Health, and the Department of Natural Resources.

Requests for backyard spraying for nuisance mosquitoes is both expensive and time consuming. A program of this type prevents us from allotting our time to permanent control measures in the breeding sites. We maintain a weekly inspection of filter systems, dumps, playgrounds, parks and camping sites. These are treated, if necessary. Catch basins require constant inspection and treatment. Calls from property owners for individual spray applications are increasing yearly, and seriously hampering our permanent control measures for which our Project was organized. Many towns cooperate with us in this adult control phase, thus allowing this Project to conduct the permanent phases of mosquito control.

Homeowners could aid themselves tremendously by frequent changing of water in birdbaths, wading pools etc., plus eliminating old tires, car bodies and clogged gutters.

My gratitude to your tree warden, highway superintendent, and your town officials who have been most cooperative.

#### PLYMOUTH COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

The primary responsibility of the Extension Service is as
the law states "to aid in diffusing among the people of the
United States useful and practical information on the subjects
relating to Agriculture and Home Economics and to encourage

the application of same."

Resources of the University of Massachusetts and the United States Department of Agriculture are available to the Staff of the Plymouth County Extension Service because of a mutual assistance agreement. Members of the staff provide educational information pertaining to Agriculture, Home Economics and 4-H Club Work, through correspondence—newspapers and radio—meetings—office and telephone calls—and farm and home visits.

To make this service available to you, funds are provided by the Federal, State and County Governments. Thus the name — Cooperative Extension Service.

In March 1965, the Southeast Extension Region was organized for the purpose of primarily servicing the commercial farmers in the Counties of Barnstable, Bristol, Norfolk and Plymouth.

Briefly this means that the Agricultural Agent formerly servicing Agriculture in one county now services the Southeast Extension Region. He is responsible for one or two commodity programs only, i.e. Dairy and Livestock; Poultry and Turkeys; Fruit and Vegetables; Floriculture; Nurseries; Misc. Horticulture.

By concentrating on his particular program(s) the agent can keep up-to-date on the latest research; receive advanced training at the University of Massachusetts and offer the farmer a more effective service. Make full use of the Extension Service, but remember that although the Extension Service furnishes the information, it is you who makes the decision as to how the information may be used to best advantage.

# OLD HOME DAY BAKE



# REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY SURVEYOR

Honorable Board of Selectmen Carver, Massachusetts Gentlemen:

The Chapter 90 Maintenance Allotment of \$3,000.00 of which the town appropriated \$1,000.00, the state \$1,000.00 and the county \$1,000.00 was used on Wenham Rd. where 3,000 feet of Class I Bituminous Concrete surface was constructed over existing surface.

The Chapter 81 allotment of \$24,750 of which the town appropriated \$6,600.00 and the state \$18,750.00 must be used for the maintenance purposes only. Out of this amount approximately \$13,280.00 was used to purchase and apply 40,960 gallons of asphalt for sealing the streets.

The remaining \$11,470.00 was used for patching, catch basins, culverts, brushing, shoulders and other miscellaneous maintenance operations.

The Chapter 90 Allotment of \$28,000.00 of which \$19,656.00 was used on Tremont St. where 3,000 feet of road was completely constructed to a width of 26 feet with proper drainage and a surface of 3 inches of type C I mix was applied. The remaining \$8,344.00 was used to construct "pipe arch culvert" on Wareham St. 101 feet in length at base of pipe, 60 feet in length at surface of road, 8 feet 9 inches in depth, 14 feet 1 inch in width. This work is in preparation for the beginning of road construction on Wareham St. in 1966.

The \$1,000.00 appropriated in General Highway funds for asphalt was used to apply 4,996 gallons of MC 250 Asphalt to Pine St.

#### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen Carver, Massachusetts Gentlemen:

The Carver Planning Board presents this report of its activities during the year 1965.

April 27, 1965—After due legal notice, a Public Hearing was held at 8:00 p.m. this date at the Town Hall for discussion and explanation of the proposed amendments to the Rules and Regulations Governing Subdivision Control. After the hearing closed, the proposed amendments to Subdivision Rules and Regulations were adopted by the Planning Board as presented. On May 5, 1965, these amendments were recorded with the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds and with the Recorder of Land Court.

May 21, 1965 — After due legal notice, a Public Hearing was held at the Town Hall at 8:00 p.m. this date for discussion on proposed amendments to the Protective By-Law on petition of Edgewood Trust.

May 24, 1965 — At a special Town Meeting held at Governor John Carver School the proposed amendments to the Protective By-law were voted down.

During the year, twenty-one Plans were submitted to the Board for endorsement as not requiring approval under the Subdivision Control Law, and were so endorsed.

#### REPORT OF VETERANS' AGENT

Board of Selectmen Carver, Massachusetts

#### Gentlemen:

In my first year as Carver's Director of Veterans' Services and Veterans' Agent, I have received not only complete support from all the Town officials but also from the Town's veteran population. I am indeed grateful for this cooperation for it causes us ever to want to do better in providing the services of the Department.

I continually gather the impression that not all the people understand the dual functions of this office. We are charged with disbursement of your monies to the Veteran and his dependents in need. We are further charged with disbursement of your monies in accordance with Chapter 115 of the General Laws of Massachusetts which Laws protect both you the veteran and you the Taxpayer.

The prime function of the office, however, is helping the Veteran in obtaining pensions, compensation, hospitalization and other benefits under Federal jurisdiction. This work has a direct effect on your local and state tax rate as these benefits are applied in determining need. As an example, for every VA hospital day which we may receive for a Veteran in medical need, the local taxpayer is saved the amount of \$34.27. In 1965, the Carver Veterans used 88 VA hospital days (of which we are aware) saving the Town \$3,015.76. In the matter of pensions for 1965, we were able to obtain \$1,862.00 in direct VA payments further providing a po-

tential saving to the Town. As the Veteran population continues to age, these benefits will naturally be greatly increased.

The ever changing Federal and State laws pertaining to Veterans necessitates continuing study and we shall always strive to be able to appraise all concerned of the effect of these changes.

Mrs. Cornelius Harrington and Mrs. Charles Johnson, R. N., assisted with the three clinics.

Mrs. Charles Johnson, R. N., assumed the duties of Public Health Nurse from February 23 until February 26 and from April 19 until April 23 to relieve the nurse for two week's vacation.

On May 25 the nurse presented the film, "The Story of Menstruation" to mothers of Grade 5 girls. On May 26 the film was presented to Grade 5 girls. On both occasions the film seemed to be well received.

On June 1 the nurse presented the film "Human Growth" to parents of Grade 7 students. On June 2 the nurse presented the film to Grade 7 girls and on June 9 Mr. Richard Ward, Junior High School teacher, presented the film to Grade 7 boys. The film seemed to be well received on all occasions.

On June 4, pre-school registration was held at the Benjamin Ellis School. Thirty-six mothers and their children attended.

In September, Dr. W. Vernon Mayo completed physical examinations for the 1965-1966 school year. Athletes transfers and students in Grades 1, 4 and 7 were examined. A total of 166 students were examined.

On October 4, Heaf tuberculin tests were administered to 146 students by Mr. Cesar Aleman of the Plymouth County Health Association. Students in Grades 1, 4 and 7 and contacts of tuberculosis or positive reactors were tested. On October 11, the Heaf tests were read by Mr. Aleman and 4 positive reactors were discovered. On October 26, the nurse transported these four students to the Plymouth County Hospital for chest X-rays.

Two flu vaccine clinics, open to the general public, were conducted in the auditorium of The Gov. John Carver School on October 20, 1965 and on October 15, 1965. Dr. W. Vernon Mayo administered the flu vaccine. Mrs.

Cornelius Harrington, Mrs. Robert Bishop, R. N., and Mrs. Charles Johnson, R. N., assisted the nurse with the clinics. On October 20, 105 persons were immunized and on December 15, 75 persons were immunized.

Vision examinations have been completed for the 1965-66 school year. Failure notices have been sent to parents and follow-up care has been instituted. I wish to thank the Public Health Nurse Committee, Mr. Richard Eldridge, principal, teachers and parents for their help and cooperation.

## REPORT ON PUBLIC WELFARE

To the Honorable Board of Public Welfare

I hereby submit my report on Old Age Assistance, Medical Assistance for the Aged, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Disability Assistance and General Relief for the year ending December 31, 1965.

During the year seventy applications were processed and disposed of as follows:

At the beginning of the year there were twenty-five Old Age Assistance cases. Nine cases were approved and seven cases closed, leaving twenty-seven active cases on 12-31-65. Expenditures decreased from \$31,299.52 to \$25,887.49.

Disability Assistance expenditures decreased from \$5,387.98 to \$3,299.62. One new case was added leaving two active cases at the end of the year.

Under Medical Assistance for the Aged there were sixteen cases at the beginning of the year. Eighteen new cases were opened and fifteen cases closed leaving nineteen active cases as of 12-31-65. The cost of medical services continues to rise and expenses increased from \$21,624.71 to \$35,662.46, however, more cases received medical service this year.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children cases totaled three on January 1, 1965 and steadily increased to eight cases as of 12-31-65. Several of these cases were transferred from other cities and towns. Ten applications were approved and five cases closed. Expenditures decreased from \$7,535.65 to \$6,798.66 due to support payments received from absent fathers.

General Relief expenditures decreased from \$3,780.18 to \$1,055.21. Assistance granted in this category is usually for a temporary period only.

The agency is working directly and closely with the Social Security Administration District Office in regard to enrolling recipients who are not beneficiaries of Old Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance or Railroad Retirement in the Social Security Medical Insurance Program.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Board members for their cooperation during the year. The Police Department has been most helpful in providing transportation to hospitals and nursing homes when circumstances warranted this service.

# REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION TO FIRST GRADE

- 1. A child who will reach his first birthday on or before December 31st may be admitted to the first grade in September, 1966, without examination.
- 2. A child whose sixth birthday occurs in the two months after December 31st may be admitted the preceding September if readiness for school can be demonstrated by means of appropriate tests. Parents having a child whom they wish to be examined under this rule are required to make application to the Superintendent of Schools on or before August 15 preceding the opening of school in September. A special form will be furnished for this purpose upon written request from the parent.

The School Committee reserves the right to withhold the examination privilege whenever the number of children eligible to enter without examination is equal to the capacity of the available classrooms.

## CLOSING OF SCHOOLS

It is the policy of the School Committee to close school only under the severest weather conditions or on such occasions when it is dangerous to operate school busses. At other times, parents are expected to use their own judgment in sending children to school. When a decision to close schools has been made, this information will be broadcast through the courtesy of radio stations WBZ and WPLM.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

It is with feelings of great satisfaction that I hereby submit my third annual report for your consideration. The report of the Elementary Supervisor and the Principal will go into some detail concerning this year's progress; I shall touch quite briefly upon some of the more significant occurrences.

## **Building Committee**

Much work has been accomplished toward the construction of the much needed addition to the Governor John Carver School. The unanimous support of the townspeople was greatly appreciated at the Town Meeting last March. A major disappointment was suffered when it was learned that even the lowest among the several bids exceeded the amount requested in the appropriation. Careful re-studies were made to determine which course should be followed. The Building Committee met with the Finance Committee, and it was agreed to request a Special Town Meeting to seek sufficient additional funds to construct and equip the addition.

(On Monday evening, January 25, 1966, the Special Town Meeting approved the increased appropriation.)

#### Curricula

The study committee appointed last year has been active in meeting with other interested groups to discuss the possibilities for the creation of a Regional Vocational School.

Our own staff members have engaged in many worthwhile projects in an effort to keep abreast of the latest in curriculum development. Much of this work has been done in cooperation with the Plymouth teachers and with staff members from Plymouth-Carver High.

This year we have been greatly pleased by the improvement of our shop program for Grade 8 boys. We are still working to expand this program and to make it possible for the boys in Grade 7 to gain this valuable experience.

One of the greatest advantages to our educational program this year is to be found in the appointment of an additional teacher to assist in the work with the two large first grade classes at the Benjamin Ellis School. There can be no question concerning the critical value of a good beginning. We do feel that all of these first grade youngsters have been helped by this decision.

We are still working to develop a program in Modern

Foreign Language. Our difficulty here has come in the great shortage of properly qualified teachers.

Again this year we share with parents and teachers the pride that is to be taken as a result of the achievements of many of our young people in the Grade 9 National Educational Development Test taken at Plymouth-Carver High.

## REPORT OF THE ELEMENTARY SUPERVISOR AND

## AND PRINCIPAL OF THE CARVER PUBLIC SCHOOLS

We hereby submit our second joint report as Elementary Supervisor and Principal of the Carver Schools.

The enrollment projections given in last year's report for the school year were somewhat premature. The opening enrollment for the school year 1965-1966 was 387. However, the projected first grade enrollments for the next few years indicate an increasing growth pattern.

The growth patterns in our community, although not so great as in those communities just north of us, is, however, being felt in our schools. The distribution of new pupils cannot always be made evenly throughout all grades. Therefore, the need for additional classroom space has increased. This year the Homemaking Room is being used as a regular classroom, as well as for Homemaking. Also, at The Benjamin Ellis School, the increase in the number of first graders necessitated hiring a new first grade teacher in November.

We look forward to the new addition scheduled for completion in September. This addition will provide sufficient area at The Governor John Carver School for Grades 2-8 and for our Special Class. Projected figures also reveal that we shall have three first grade classrooms next year. These classes will be conducted at The Benjamin Ellis School. This will allow us to use one classroom at The Benjamin Ellis School as a cafeteria and playroom.

The rapid progress and broad changes in education require constant evaluation of our program so that our children may receive the finest education possible. Our schools are keeping abreast of developments in education, and we are adapting our program to fit the needs of the children. However, a constant re-examination of practices, procedures, and content is requisite to a curriculum that is to keep pace with the ever-changing demands made upon it.

In the area of curriculum study, the Social Studies Committee is continuing its eorts this year. Textbooks of vaious publishers the being eqamined and evaluated. It is also hoped that a curriculum guide will be developed for use of all teachers in theUnion. Recently a new committee was formed to begin a study of the Science Curriculum in Union No. 62. It will be the responsibility of this group to coordinate the Science Curriculum in Grades 1-12. In addition to the previously mentioned committees, other groups have met this year to discuss and evaluate other areas such as Guidance, Mathematics, and Time Allotments.

Paernt-teacher conferences are an important part of the program for the development of the child. Although we have specific nights set aside for this purpose, we encourage these conferences at any time the need arises. The value of these conferences lies in the fact that they provide a two-way exchange of information concerning the child. The parent can learn of the child's academic achievement, of his relationship to his peers, and of his physical and emotional maturation. The teacher, on the other hand, learns of the child's development in the home and neighborhood environments.

The professional staff in our schools is gradually increasing, thus allowing us to provide for more of the needs of our children. We are fortunate to have added to our faculties this year:

Mr. Henry M. Shaw, a member of the Carver faculty who has contributed much to our youth, was honored at the 130th Annual Convention of the Plymouth County Teachers' Association held in Plymouth in October. Mr. Shaw was the recipient of a citation for Outstanding Service to Education. We congratulate Mr. Shaw for this achievement and for his devotion to education.

All exhibitors in our Annual Science Fair deserve commendation for the effort they expended on their exhibits. The pupils receiving special recognition for their fine achievements this year were: Lorna Washburn, who received First Prize for her exhibit on "Bacteria"; William Bouchard, who was awarded Second Prize for an exhibit on "Propagation of Plants"; and Janelle Bartels, who was Third Prize winner for her "Pigeon Smarts."

The first issue of a School Newsletter for Supervisory Union No. 62 was published and distributed to local citizens this fall. This newsletter is a step forward in bringing our citizenry up-to-date information about what is happening in our schools.

The Magazine Drive this year netted our School Fund \$536.96, and the sale of pictures added another \$154.97.

Our school lunch program, managed by Mrs. Irene Williams, has continued to be self-supporting and to provide excellent, well-balanced hot lunches. The financial statement of our lunch program is as follows: RECEIPTS

This year we share the pride in our High School that has been evident in the many expressions of satisfaction that we have received from parents and from students. We have been particularly pleased by the many reports of success that have been achieved by last year's graduates in their college programs. Indeed, their achievements offer evidence of the worth of our school program.

We make no pretense that our school is without problems. These will always be with us, and it might be said that their solutions represent the greatest challenges to all who are interested in the educational and

social welfare of our young people.

Several staff members were added this September. We have again been fortunate to have a blending of experienced teachers and enthusiastic young people beginning their professional careers. It is our continued ability to attract teachers of high quality upon which the eventual measurement of our educational product must finally depend. We congratulate our teachers on the quality of their preparation and the great degree of dedication that they display in their daily performances.

We note with regret the departure from our school of Vice Principal C. Richard Vaughan, who accepted the principalship of a Government-sponsored private school facility in Holland. His work with us was of the highest quality and assisted greatly in the early development of

our school program.

Mr. Wilbert P. Cingolani was appointed to fill this important vacancy. We are certain that the experience and enthusiasm which he has brought to his tasks will serve to insure both his success and our assurance of

continued advantage for our students.

We would indeed be remiss if we failed to note the departure from our Committee of Mrs. Adeline Keller, a member of the first duly constituted Regional School Committee, whose tireless efforts in behalf of our youth were recognized by those who served with her.

Dr. George S. Wild was this year welcomed to membership on the Committee as an elected member from the Town of Plymouth, and Mr. Harry Doyle was

warmly greeted as our newly appointed member from the Plymouth School Committee.

Continued efforts have been made to lend improvement to the school grounds and playing fields. The magnitude of the problems here have been recognized, and we shall move carefully towards their correction.

The administrative officers have been directed to prepare a careful study of the developing needs for additional classroom and special area space. This action has been instituted in an effort to maintain our ability to provide a strong curriculum and to make proper allowance for reasonable flexibility in scheduling the school program.

Your participation in school affairs is again encouraged. These are your programs and will flourish only with your support. If there are problems that arise or questions that develop, please contact the school counselors or administrators. Their function is to serve our communities. We are certain that you will find them most willing to assist you in any reasonable manner.

We of the School Committee consider ourselves fortunate to have had the continued support of the citizens of our communities. We offer to you our firm resolve to extend every effort to make more valuable each year the quality of educational experience which our students are to receive. We shall be mindful of our responsibilities to the individual needs of each child; we ask only for your continued support and understanding.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL PLYMOUTH-CARVER HIGH SCHOOL

The year 1965 proved to be a year of continuing growth and development at Plymouth-Carver High School. The experiences of the preceding year, some of

the preliminary findings of the School Self-Evaluation Program, and the cumulative evidence of the many evaluations which the students undergo brought about changes in the school organization, staff, curriculum, and activities program. We believe these changes are in harmony with the national effort to make school "a place where every child can find knowledge to enrich his mind and to enlarge his talents."

The "Dropout" and the causes of his dropping-out, continue to be a gnawing concern. Here is why. Fifty-five students dropped out of school: 16 left because of poor self-motivation; 6 preferred to work; 2 left for financial reasons; 7 left because of ill health; 6 married; 2 parents requested withdrawal; 4 entered the service, and 12 withdrew because of disciplinary action. Through parent-student conferences, letters to parents and personal contact, 13 of these students were encouraged to return to school during the year; and 9 more re-entered in September. Thus the net drop-out figure remained at 3%. In an effort to reduce the drop-out rate, a Work Study Program, a Health Program, a Remedial Reading Program and more conferences involving parents, students, teachers, and community specialists have been initiated.

Among the professional staff there was approximately a 20% turnover: Everyone who knew Mr. Wiseman laments his tragic death. Four other teachers improved their positions; 2 continued their education; 1 resigned; 1 moved out of state; 1 left teaching; and 3 did not return. Mr. Wilbert P. Cingolani replaced Mr. C. Richard Vaughan as Vice-Principal, and Mr. Roland W. Holmes returned from his Teaching Fellowship at the University of Illinois.

The staff also grew in number as a direct result of curriculum development and improved teaching conditions: A second Special Education teacher, a Remedial Reading teacher, a Health teacher, a part-time Orchestra teacher, a Technical Teacher-Aid augmented the competency of the staff.

Honors Courses were introduced in English and history at the eleventh grade level, as well as an Advanced Placement course in mathematics for the students who, as juniors, took part in the Independent Study Program in mathematics. Chem Study and a full year Earth Sci-

ence course were also introduced into the science program. as was Data Processing into the business curriculum. Second and third level courses in German and Spanish were additions to the Modern Foreign Language Program. The students engaged in the accelerated programs in mathematics and science continued to perform better than their counterparts studying the same courses a grade level higher. These are explicit manifestations of the developing educational programs created to meet the specific needs of the students attending Plymouth-

Carver High School.

Based upon the experiences that were obtained by having an early dismissal for seniors the preceding year, which released classroom spaces and teachers for more specialized educational endeavor, the organization of the school day was modified to six academic periods, after which time students who are not participating in extracurricular activities or seeking special help to improve academic standing may leave. The effects of this change are discernable; an average of one hundred additional students each day stay for a seventh period. This number does not include those who ordinarly remain for athletic or other planned school activities. The only problem created by this change has been a negative one affecting the music program. This difficulty has arisen because of competing activities and teacher demands. Generally, students are being forced into maintaining their academic progress in order to participate in activities as well as being forced into making choices among a variety of activities. It is hoped that more students will have an opportunity to obtain additional help in subjects proving difficult and that students will select extra-curricular activities more wisely.

Along with these developments the staff formerly began its self-evaluation study for Plymouth-Carver High School accreditation. Between January and June 1965, school was dismissed early one day each month, and since October, two days each month (in oder to prepare for the evaluation which is scheduled to occur in April.) It has been a long, arduous study of every part of the school and the communities it serves. Throughout the study, the cooperation of the School Committee, the Superintendent of Schools, and the citizens who have served on the various evaluating committees has

been most gratifying.

At the risk of omitting anyone, we will forego individual mention and instead express our overall thanks to the citizens, service organizations, school personnel, students, and staff who in obvious as well as less noticeable ways have contributed to the growth, development, and well-being of the students, the staff, the school, and the communities.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF GUIDANCE

For the academic year 1965-1966, the Guidance Department welcomed a new member to the staff at Plymouth-Carver High School: Mr. Horace Turner, of Wareham, who has a background of experience in teaching, Y. M. C. A. work and advertising, replaces Mr. Daniel Alvino, who left to accept a position in guidance

on Long Island, New York.

In addition to individual and group conferences with students, the counselors confer daily with other members of the teaching staff and administrators of the high school and other schools in the district. We maintain a close liaison with such agencies as the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission, the Welfare Departments, the Judge Stone Guidance Clinic, the Division of Child Guardianship, the Division of Employment Security, the M. S. P. C. C., and many others whose assistance we find invaluable.

Once again we are indebted to the Kiwanis Club of Plymouth for the funds which enable the members of the guidance staff to plan education-vocational tours for the benefit of our seniors not headed for college. In 1965 tours arranged took groups of these students to Massachusetts Trades Shop School, Coyne Electric, Franklin Institute, Children's Hospital, Deaconess Hospital, Fisher Junior College, Burdett College, General Dynamics Corp., South Shore Vocational Technical High School, and to M. I. T. for a science tour.

In addition to the regular, standardized battery of tests in our overall testing program, we have made provisions here for administering a mechanical aptitude test to candidates for an electrical and technical school, and an accounting aptitude test for a busines college. For the second consecutive year our school participated in an Evaluation and Adjustment Series Research Program, wherein some of our students were given a mental ability test and a test in psychology for the purpose of aiding in the standardization of the latter mentioned test.

For the first time in Plymouth, the College Entrance Examination Board tests are being administered at Plymouth-Carver High School on December 4, 1965, and on March 5, 1966. Another "first" here was the administration of Foreign Language Listening Comprehension test (French) using tapes.

Hardly a day goes by without a visit from a college or school representative; good attendance at these sessions is proof that the students find them interesting, informative, and worthwhile. Admissions personnel representing four-year liberal arts colleges, engineering colleges, junior colleges, technical institutes, business schools, and service academies have come from cities as close as Brockton and Quincy, and from places as far away as Florida, Pennsylvania, and Illinois.

We are now making our own tape recordings of what these college and school representatives have to say concerning admission policies, course offerings, fees, etc.

# TOWN WARRANT AND REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS
Plymouth, ss. To either of the Constables of the Town of

Carver, Plymouth County, GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs to meet at the Governor John Carver School House in said Carver on Saturday, the fifth day of March, 1966, at 12:00 o'clock, noon, then and there to act on the following article, namely:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers, to be voted for all on one ballot, viz.: One Moderator, Three Auditors, each for one year. One Selectman, One Assessor, One Highway Surveyor, One member of School Board, One Park Commissioner, One Cemetery Commissioner, Two Library Trustees, One Tree Warden, each for a term of three years, and One member of Planning Board for a term of five years; and to vote by ballot "Yes" or "No" on the following Question:

Question No. 1

"Shall certain provisions of Chapter thirty-two B of the General Laws, authorizing any county, city, town or district to provide a plan of contributory group life insurance, group accidental death and dismemberment insurance, and group general or blanket hospital surgical and medical insurance for certain persons in the service of such county, city, town or district and their dependents, be accepted by this town?"

The polls will be open for at least eight hours.

And you are directed to further notify said Inhabitants of said Town that as soon as the ballots have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Saturday, March 12, 1966, at 2:00 o'clock P.M., and at that time will reconvene at said Governor John Carver School House, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1966, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4 and Section 17.

Article 2. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury for the purpose of increasing the Stabilization Fund.

Article 4. Recommended by the Finance Committee that the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars be transferred within sixty days from the date of this meeting from available funds in the Treasury to increase the Stabilization Fund.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town, such salaries to be retroactive to January 1, 1966, as provided by General Laws Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, namely:

Highway Surveyor \$110.00 per week
Town Treasurer 2,200.00 per annum
Town Clerk 1,200.00 per annum
Tax Collector 2,400.00 per annum

Moderator \$20.00 for the Annual Town Meeting, and \$5.00 for each Special Town Meeting.

Members of the School Board, \$2.00 per hour. All other elected town officers, \$2.00 per hour.

Article 5. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tree Warden, Cemetery Commissioners and Park Commissioners to employ themselves as laborers in the cemeteries, parks, and tree department, and to act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 6. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account to the 1966 Reserve Account the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars.

Article 7. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 8. To see what disposition the Town will make of the County Dog Fund.

Article 8. Recommended that the dog fund be applied to the Library Account.

Article 9. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, and to choose a Town Director as provided in Section 41 and 45 of Chapter 128 of the General Laws, and act thereon.

Article 9. Recommended by the Finance Committee that the sum of \$100.00 be raised and appropriated for County Aid to Agriclture, and choose a Town Director as provided in Section 41 and 45 of Chapter 128 of the Gen-

eral Laws.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand (\$4,000.00) dollars for Assessors' Plans, such sum to be used and expended by the Board of Assessors.

Article. 10. Not recommended by the Finance

Committee.

Article 11. To choose all necessary Town Officers not elected by ballot.

Article 11. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 12. To hear the report of any standing committees and act anything thereon or thereto and to establish any new committees.

Article 12. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, and to transfer the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's

shares of the cost of the work the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.

Article 13. Recommended by the Finance

Committee.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of seven thousand (\$7,000.00) dollars from the proceeds received, or to be received, from the Commonwealth under the provisions of Chapter 679 of the Acts of 1965, to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 work on Tremont and Wareham Streets, and to transfer the further sum of fourteen thousand (\$14,000.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury, and act thereon.

Article 14. Recommended by the Finance

Committee.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand seven hundred (\$6,700.00) for Chapter 81, Highways, and to transfer the sum of eighteen thousand four hundred twenty-five (\$18,425.00) dollars from available funds in the Treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.

Article 15. Recommended by the Finance

Committee.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to change to "Shaw Road" the name of that section of old Route No. 58, now known as Rochester Road, beginning at Lucas Springs Bog extending northerly to Earlwyn Murray's property back to the present Auto Route No. 58.

Article 16. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-five hundred (\$3,500) dollars for the purpose of purchasing a new limb chipping machine to be used by the Highway and Tree Departments. Purchase to be made by the Highway Surveyor, Tree Warden, and Board of Selectmen.

Article 17. Recommended by the Finance

Committee.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand three hundred forty-five (\$2,345.00) dollars to meet additional Land Damage awards on Route No. 58, as ordered by the Plymouth County Commissioners under Partial Decree No. 1124, Section 3.

Article 18. Recommended by the Finance

Committee.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the Cemetery Funds in the Town Treasury.

Article 19. Recommended by the Finance

Committee.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred fifty (\$650.00) dollars to be used to pay for all private work and material in Town Cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 20. Recommended by the Finance

Committee.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred (700.00) dollars for the purpose of planning and mapping Lakenham Cemetery lots and boundaries complete to date.

Article 21. Recommended by the Finance Committee with the stipulation that a progress report be sub-

mitted to the Selectmen every three months.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110,141.84 as the Town's share of the annual maintenance and operating budget for the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District consisting of the capital costs assessment of \$16,067.53 and the operating costs assessment of \$94,074.31 which is in accordance with the provisions of Section 16B of Chapter 71 of the General Laws. Said appropriation is to be used in conjunction with an appropriation made available for the same purpose by the Town of Plymouth.

Article 22. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars for Regional Vocational School District Planning Committee expenses.

Article 23. Recommended by the Finance

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,728.00 for the purpose of paying part of the premiums for group life insurance, accident, hospitalization, medical and surgical insurance for certain employees and their dependents under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 32B.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventeen thousand (\$17,000) dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new four-wheel drive brushbreaker type fire truck. Purchase to be made by the Fire Chief, the two Deputy Fire Chiefs, and the Board of Selectmen.

Article 25. Recommended by the Finance

Committee.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting attested copies thereof at the several places designated by vote of the Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting.

### SOLDIERS MONUMENT

The Carver Ladies' Soldiers Memorial Association was organized in 1905 with one hundred members. Officers were: President, Mrs. P.
