### EARL EUGENE BOARDWAY 1880-1968

Mr. Earl E. Boardway was born in Malone, N. Y. and resided for many years in Worcester, where he was employed with the Norton Company. Later he went to Florida where he was a celery grower. Here he met the late Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Peterson of Carver who were wintering in Florida, and he decided to come to Carver, where he was engaged in the poultry business, farming and also had a small cranberry bog. He married Mrs. Annie P. Shurtleff.

Mr. Boardway was interested in all civic activities. He was the president of Carver Historical Society, former treasurer of Carver Old Home Day Association, and also on its Reception Committee, Carver Director for Plymouth County Aid to Agriculture, active member and held several offices in the First Baptist Church where he was Deacon Emeritus, and he designed the official seal for the Town of Carver.

### MISS ETHEL SAVERY 1882-1968

Miss Ethel Savery was born in New Jersey on Feb. 27, 1882. Her parents were William E. and Louise Savery. Her father was in the iron industry in New Jersey and later came to reside in Carver. Her grandfather, William E. Savery presented Savery Avenue to the Town of Carver in 1861. It is the first divided highway in the country.

Miss Savery was an excellent conversationalist, intelligent, loved to entertain and frequently held parties at her home for the children in the area. She was a member of the Union Church Society, the First Baptist Church, the Society of Mayflower Descendants, and the Antiquarian Society. She spent her winters in New York with her sister, Miss Anna Savery and in later years at Winter Park, Fla.

She was also a member of Carver Old Home Day Association.



MRS. MARION L. GRIFFITH 1892-1968

Mrs. Marion (Lyon) Griffith of Tremont Street, South Carver, was born in Fairhaven, Mass. on Sept. 17, 1892, the daughter of the late Frank and Eliza Lyon. She came to Carver about 54 years ago.

She was married to the late Rodney Griffith who died in 1963. For 38 years she was a dedicated teacher, especially of sixth graders. She used to prepare the eighth graders for their graduation exercises and also prepared with them, the musical portions of the program. Mrs. Griffith was a frequent soloist at the South Carver United Methodist Church, and gave book reviews at various meetings of local organizations. During her retirement, Mrs. Griffith continued her teaching by tutoring pupils in her home, without a fee. She was also a member of South Carver Grange, as was Mr. Griffith. Together, they presented duets at Grange meetings.

Mrs. Griffith is survived by her three children: David of Middleboro, Thelma of South Carver, and Anita of Flushing, Mich., five grandchildren and one great grandchild.

### ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

### March 9, 1968

The Annual Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Saturday, March 9, 1968. The meeting was called to order at 2:00 o'clock, P.M., by the Moderator, Thomas C. Barham, there being a quorum present. The Invocation was given by the Rev. Richard Smith, Pastor of the South Carver Methodist Church. The Moderator then introduced Senator William D. Weeks, who was present, and made a few brief remarks regarding the progress of legislation relating to the relocation of Route 44, etc. Reading of the Warrant being dispensed with and Article 1, relating to the election of officers, having been disposed of at a prior meeting, the meeting thereupon proceeded to act upon the remaining Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 2. VOTED, unanimously, to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue for the financial years beginning January 1, 1968 and January 1, 1969, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 3. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15.40 to pay the following unpaid bills, namely: Wareham Police Dept. (1963) \$10.00; Craig's Pharmacy (1967) \$5.40.

Article 4. VOTED, unanimously, to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town, such salaries to be retroactive to January 1, 1968, as provided by General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, namely:

- Article 6. VOTED to authorize the Tree Warden, Cemetery Commissioners and Park Commissioners to employ themselves as laborers in the cemeteries, parks, and tree department.
- Article 7. VOTED to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account to the 1968 Reserve Account the sum of \$10,000.00.
- Article 8. VOTED that the County Dog Fund be applied to the Library Account.
- Article 9. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for County Aid to Agriculture. Thereupon, nomination being duly made, Mr. Roger V. Weston was unanimously elected to serve as Town Director County Aid to Agriculture.
- Article 10. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Assessors' Plans, such sum to be used and expended by the Board of Assessors
- Article 11. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to choose all necessary Town Officers not elected by ballot. Thereupon, nominations

being had, the following officers were unanimously elected:

- 1. Field Drivers and Pound Keepers: Raymond A. Parent, Theodore E. Halunen, Matthew J. Mendes.
- 2. Surveyors of Lumber and Measurers of Wood: John G. Shurtleff, Toivo J. Kallio, Homer F. Weston.
- 3. Herring Committee: Frank R. Mazzilli, Clark A. Griffith, Bradford H. Cole.
- Article 12. VOTED to hear the report of any standing committees and to establish any new committees. Thereupon, the following reports were heard and accepted:
- 1. Mr. Harold T. Braddock presented the report of the Recreation Committee. The Committee, among other recommendations, recommended that the town-owned land adjacent to the North Carver Dump, consisting of about 20 acres, be set aside or appropriated to the Park Commission for future development as a recreational area.
- 2. Mr. Edwin G. Brown presented the report of the Conservation Commission. The Commission recommended that the Cedar Swamp area be kept in its natural condition and preserved for the townspeople to enjoy its natural beauty as a wild area. Also, that a Town Forest be established adjacent to Savery Avenue; the Commission, as a result of soil tests, feels that this area, because of poor drainage and impervious sub-soil, is ideal for a Town Forest and for no other purpose.
- 3. Mr. Erwin K. Washburn presented the report of the School Building Committee. The building is complete with the exception of waterproofing all new brick-work and the possible remodeling of the old kitchen for additional classroom space.

- 4. Mr. Clark A. Griffith presented the report of the Public Health Nurse Committee, and the report was duly accepted.
- 5. Mr. Frank R. Mazzilli (by request) made motion, duly seconded, to establish and have Selectmen appoint a committee of five (5) members to find a swimming area for the townspeople. VOTED, unanimously.
- 6. Mr. Frank R. Mazzilli (by request), offered the following motion: "To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Historical Committee of at least five members." The motion was duly seconded, and it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Historical Committee of at least five (5) members.
- Article 13. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, and to transfer the sum of \$2,000.00 from available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.
- Article 14. VOTED, unanimously, to transfer the sum of \$5,002.68 from the proceeds received, or to be received from the Commonwealth under the provisions of Chapter 616, Section 5, of the Acts of 1967, said sum of money to be used for construction work on Tremont Street.
- Article 15. VOTED, unanimously, to transfer from available funds in the Treasury, the sum of \$3,300.00 for the purpose of installing school zone traffic lights on Tremont Street, the reimbursements from the State, under the provisions of Chapter 616, Section 6, of the Acts of

1967, to be restored upon their receipt to free cash in the treasury.

Article 16. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for Chapter 90 Highway Construction on Center, Plymouth, and Tremont Streets, and to transfer the sum of \$21,000.00 from free cash in the treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.

Article 17. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,700.00 for Chapter 81 Highways, and to transfer the sum of \$18,425.00 from available funds in the treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.

Article 18. VOTED, unanimously, to assign two (2) stalls on the northerly end of the Town Shed for the exclusive use of the Town Mechanic, and that the Town Mechanic shall have the exclusive and sole control of the repair and maintenance of all Town-owned trucks, machinery, etc.

Article 19. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to purchase a parcel of land owned by Harold T. Braddock, for the purpose of widening Hines Avenue, said parcel of land lying on the Northerly side of Plymouth Street and on the Easterly side of Hines Avenue, containing about 4,455 square feet.

Article 20. VOTED, unanimously, to transfer from the Road Machinery Fund the sum of \$1,589.00 to be used for

the purpose of purchasing a new Pick-up Truck for the Highway Department, and to authorize the Selectmen to trade the present 1962 Chevrolet Pickup Truck for the new truck, and apply the trade-in value thereof toward the purchase price of said new truck.

Article 21. VOTED, unanimously, to appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 from available funds in the treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the Cemetery Funds in the town treasury.

Article 22. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 to be used to pay for all private work and material in Town Cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 23. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of enlarging the South Carver Fire Station.

Article 24. Shall the Town accept the provisions of Section Sixteen to Sixteen I, inclusive, of Chapter Seventyone of the General Laws, providing for the establishment of a Vocational Regional School District together with the towns of Plymouth, Duxbury and Marshfield, and the construction, maintenance and operation of a Vocational Regional School by the said District in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen?

Motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly seconded, that Article 24 be "laid on the table." VOTED, unanimously.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of paying the Town's share of the initial operating and maintenance

cost of the proposed Vocational Regional High School District consisting of the town of Carver, Duxbury, Marshfield and Plymouth or take any other action relative thereto.

Mr. Erwin K. Washburn moved that Article 25 be "laid on the table"; the motion was duly seconded and was unanimously VOTED.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept an amendment to the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District Agreement proposed by the Regional District School Committee and entitled "Amendment No. 1, to the Agreement for the Establishment of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District." which Amendment provides in substance (a) that the regional district schools shall comprise grades six through twelve. (b) that the regional district school committee may establish state-aided vocational education. (c) that the regional district schools shall be located within a radius of seven miles from the junction of Route 3 and the present Route 44. (d) that capital costs shall be apportioned 89% to Plymouth and 11% to Carver except that all capital costs incurred on or after April 1, 1968 which are related wholly to a particular school shall be apportioned on the basis of pupil enrollment in such school and (e) that the annual tentative maintenance and operating budget shall be prepared on or before November 15.

Article 26 was duly moved and seconded, and was discussed at considerable length. A voice vote was taken and the result was in doubt. Thereupon it was voted to proceed to vote on the question by "Australian Ballot." Ballot being had, the check-list showed that 87 persons had cast a ballot; however, a count of the ballots showed

a total of 72 "Yes" votes and 47 "No" votes. Thereupon, the vote was declared invalid.

Thereupon, motion to adjourn to Saturday, May 16, 1968, at 2:00 P.M., was duly made and seconded. Voice vote on this question was doubted. Thereupon, a standing vote was taken, and it was VOTED to adjourn the meeting to March 16, 1968, at 2:00 P.M., 56 voting in the affirmative and 18 in the negative.

Adourned at 5:30 P.M.

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting reconvened at the Governor John Carver School House at 2:00 o'clock, P.M., on Saturday, March 16, 1968. The meeting was called to order at 2:00 o'clock, P.M., by the Moderator, Thomas C. Barham, there being a quorum present. Mrs. Elizabeth F. Ryder, Mr. Matthew J. Mendes and Mr. Richard F. Ward were appointed Tellers to count the votes, and were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties

Thereupon, the meeting proceeded to act on Article 26 as hereinbefore set forth. Mr. George E. Young moved that further information should be forthcoming from the Assessors as to the effect on the Tax Rate and as to the amount of state reimbursements due the Town in accordance with the recently received "Cherry Sheet." Thereupon, Mr. George A. Perkins, Chairman of the Board of Assessors, explained the matter, stating that State Reimbursements for schools had decreased from about 40% in 1958 to about 14% in 1967. Mr. Erwin K. Washburn explained the School Committee position.

Thereupon, ballot being had, the check-list showed a total of 95 votes cast, of which 54 were "Yes" votes and 41 "No" votes, and Article 26 as set forth in the Warrant, was declared VOTED.

Article 27. VOTED, unanimously, to establish a development and industrial commission for the promotion and development of the industrial resources of the town, as set forth in Chapter 40, Section 8A, of the General Laws.

Article 28. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to pay the rent of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post #7421 of Carver.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to designate the South Shore Community Action Council, Inc., a Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 180 non-profit corporation, as the agency to carry out the anti-poverty programs as defined in the Federal Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 (and as later amended) (Public Law 90-222) in the Town of Carver.

Motion duly made and seconded to postpone action indefinitely on Article 29. Mr. Elmer Ingraham and Selectman Clark A. Griffith explained that the vote was unnecessary at this time and that, therefore, the action to postpone was requested. It was unanimously VOTED to postpone action indefinitely on Article 29.

Article 30. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adopt the following resolution: "The citizens of the Town of Carver hereby reaffirm their full support of the goal of equality of opportunity in employment, housing, education and individual rights, freedom, and justice without regard to race, creed, or national origin."

Article 31. Mr. Charles A. Grace, Chairman of the Committee to revise the town by-laws, presented the report of the Committee, and thereupon proceeded to read the Proposed By-Laws section by section.

Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to amend Article I, Section 1, of the By-Laws as appearing in the Warrant, so as to read as follows:

#### Article I.

Section 1. The annual town meeting shall be held for the election of officers on the third Saturday in March at 12:00 o'clock noon. The polls shall be open for at least seven hours, and as soon as the ballots are counted the meeting shall be adjourned to the following Saturday at 1:00 o'clock, P.M., for the transaction of municipal business.

Mr. Jarvinen moved to amend Section 2 of Article I so as to require a quorum of 100 at all town meetings, including meetings at which bonded indebtedness is to be voted. Motion duly seconded. On voice vote, the motion was lost.

Selectman Bradford H. Cole moved that Article 7, Section 1 be amended so as to have the Finance Committee consist of 15 members. Also motion to amend so that Finance Committee members be elected "at large," the names to appear on the ballot. Motions duly seconded. Voice vote being had, both motions for amendments as above set forth were declared lost.

Thereupon, Attorney Paul Record, a member of the By-laws committee, moved that the proposed by-laws, as amended, be adopted. The motion was duly seconded, and it was unanimously VOTED to adopt the proposed by-laws,

as amended, for the Town of Carver (The full text of the by-laws are not being included in this report. However, if and when the by-laws are approved by the Attorney-General and are published as required by law, the Town Clerk's office will prepare pamphlet editions of the by-laws for public distribution).

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

Adjourned at 3:43 P.M.

#### December 2, 1968

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on December 2, 1968. The meeting was called to order at 2:00 o'clock, P.M., and the polls were open until 8:00 o'clock, P.M., for the purpose of voting by ballot on the following Question: "Shall the Town accept the provisions of Section Sixteen to Sixteen I, inclusive, of Chapter seventy-one of the General Laws, providing for the establishment of a Vocational Regional High School District together with the towns of Plymouth, Duxbury, and Marshfield; and the construction, maintenance and operation of a Vocational Regional High School by the said District in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen?" A total of 295 ballots were cast, of which 85 were in the affirmative and 210 in the negative.

Thereupon the meeting adjourned to 8:30 o'clock, P.M. to consider the remaining Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 2. Article 5. VOTED, unanimously, to appropriate from available funds in the treasury the sum of \$1,879.00 for the Police Account.

Article 6. VOTED, unanimously, to accept the sum of \$500.00 as a gift from South Carver Grange No. 345, for the use of the Public Library Building Fund.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:17 o'clock, P.M.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF CARVER CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Carver Conservation Commission held ten meetings during the year 1968.

Mr. Domingo Fernandes resigned from the Commission in February due to other commitments and Mr. Lawrence Pink was appointed to fill this vacancy.

Representatives from the Commission have attended several regional conservation meetings which have been informative and helpful.

Acquisition of desirable land for conservation purposes is a slow process. Presently, the Commission is negotiating with Messrs. J. B. and David Bradshaw, heirs of Miss Eleanor Barrows, for a parcel of land on the westerly side of Savery Avenue at the southern end. The land in this area has been tested, and soil analysis taken by members of the Plymouth County Soil Conservation Service, showing, that because of the poor drainage and impervious subsoil, it is unsuitable for anything but a wild area. When this parcel has been acquired it will be the first step in establishing a Town Forest on the westerly side of the Avenue.

The Carver Conservation Commission has been empowered to accept, for the Town of Carver, any parcels of land that the owners wish to be preserved for conservation purposes. It should be understood that, although the Town must take title, the Conservation Commission will have complete control and management.

Again, we wish to express our thanks to the Board of Selectmen for their help and cooperation.

#### PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

Spring weather conditions in 1968 were comparable to those of 1967, causing a flooding of "muck-lands" which contributed to another heavy mosquito infestation in May and June. We cannot control this condition, as there are over 70,000 acres of registered "muck-lands" in our county. An attempt to larvacide these large swamps would exhaust our entire budget. Most towns are aware of this condition, and are supplementing adult control measures of their own to allow this Project to conduct more extensive permanent control work. This was the original intent of these Projects. Hundreds of calls still come into this office for backyard spraying service. Many of these are referred by Health Departments and other town officers. These calls are a constant drain on our funds and personnel.

Monies will only allow for very limited aerial applications. Consideration of possible harm to our environment will always limit us as to areas treated and types of insecticides applied. We will also continue to work closely with the State Pesticide Board, Health Departments, and Natural Resource interests regarding pesticide recommendations. We will also continue our cooperation with the Lakeville Field Station, in their most important research regarding equine encephalitis.

I cannot over-emphasize the obligation of the homeowner and commercial entities regarding the elimination of breeding sites on their properties. A few minutes spent ridding properties of containers holding stagnant water during the summer months will reduce the mosquito population by millions. Any water container is suspect, as old tires, wading pools, car bodies, clogged gutters, sewage violations, and open disposal receptacles are just a few of the breeding sites of the Culex, or summer mosquito. A frequent changing of water in birdbaths and other beneficial water containers will accomplish the same purpose.

Evening activities under floodlights will attract mosquitoes from a distance. Perfumes and lotions compound this problem, as they are also attractants. We cannot be expected to provide service to these thousands of events, anymore than we can to individual properties for insect-free cookouts.

Our yearly program of ice-dusting to small breeding areas will continue, as will our spring larvaciding program. Fogging and mist-blowing of municipal sewage areas, school and playgrounds, and dumping areas will also be scheduled. We will do what we can with our services. We just do not have the monies, tools, and personnel to provide insect-free leisure hours to every taxpayer in the county.

Our backhoes are still our choice weapons for permanent control measures. Thousands of feet were trenched both on the salt marshes and inland wet-lands. We do not get into every single one of the twenty towns each year, but we eventually give each town their share of this phase of control.

We wish to again thank the town officers, and especially your highway supervisors and health officers for their concern and cooperation.

#### REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY SURVEYOR

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen

#### Gentlemen:

The Chapter 90 Maintenance allotment of \$3,000.00 of which the Town appropriated \$1,000.00, the State \$1,000.00, and the County \$1,000.00, was used on Tremont Street where 2500 feet of Class I bituminous concrete surface was constructed over existing surface.

The Chapter 81 allotment of \$25,125.00, of which the Town appropriated \$6,700.00 and the State \$18,425.00, must be used for maintenance purposes out of which approximately \$11,000.00 was to purchase 32000 gallons of asphalt for sealing the streets.

The remaining \$14,125.00 was used for patching, catch basins, culverts, brushing, mowing, shoulders and other miscellaneous maintenance operations.

The Chapter 90 allotment of \$28,000.00 was used to completely reconstruct and resurface 8745 feet of road on Center and Plymouth Streets with proper drainage.

The \$1,000.00 appropriated in the General Highway funds for asphalt was used to apply 4200 gallons of M C 250 asphalt to Wareham Street.

The \$5,002.68 appropriated for Tremont Street was used to properly install 3000 feet of drainage with necessary catch basins.

### REPORT OF THE CARVER HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

The Carver Historical Committee was instituted after a vote was taken at the Annual Town Meeting in March 1968, "to establish a Historical Committee of seven members." The appointments to the committee were made by the Board of Selectmen.

The first meeting was held on the steps of the Town Hall, with the election of officers. Mrs. Marjorie D. Mosher was elected chairman; Henry M. Shaw, vice chairman; and Mrs. Florence K. Sand, secretary. The other members are Mrs. Arlene Johnson, Andrew F. Griffith, Winsor B. Leach, and Harold Braddock.

Six meetings have been held, one of them was with the Board of Selectmen. A discussion was held as to the purpose and aims of the committee. It was unanimously decided that the History of Carver written by the late Henry S. Griffith should be continued to the present and we should work diligently to reach that goal as so many sources of the valuable history have already passed on.

It was further decided that we should find out more about the part played by Carver in the Civil War, presidential elections, iron industry, cranberry culture, noted persons, buildings and about the first Nationalities to settle in Carver. A distant vision includes the establishment of a Carver Historical Museum. A file has been purchased and placed in the Town Hall, and important letters, papers and documents are being filed.

Possibly at a later date the former Historical Society which was organized in 1939, but has not held any meetings since 1958, may unite with our committee.

On May 27, 1940 the society met in the town hall and the following paper was read by Ellis D. Atwood:

#### My Boyhood Memories of Carver Foundries

In the early part of the Eighteenth Century it dawned upon the minds of the people of the South Precinct of Plympton that it was folly to import their utensils made of iron while there abounded in their vicinity the essential factors for the manufacture of iron, such as iron ore in the swamps, charcoal timber in the woods and numerous water power privileges along the rivers. Also the proximity to the sea for shipping and for the supply of sea shells to furnish lime for the separating of the iron.

Carver had eight blast furnaces during the period from 1735 to 1835, namely:—Pope's Point, 1735; Fresh Meadows, 1800; Slug, 1819; South Meadows, 1824;

Barrows, 1825; and Wenham, 1827. The first three were in use many years but the others were short-lived.

Sampson's Pond contained the richest iron ore bed in Carver. Bartlett Murdock who owned abutting land to the north, east and southeast of the pond, and George Barrows who owned most of the remaining border land, went to work digging ore. In 1760 Bartlett Murdock built a blast furnace near the southeast corner of Sampson's Pond where the road crosses Sampson's Brook, the outlet of the Pond. Between the road and Sampson's Pond was a small annex called the Furnace Pond. The two ponds were separated by an auxiliary dam and an equalizing flume, while the roadway constituted a dam across Sampson's Brook impounding its water into the little pond as a latent power for the blast furnace. The controlling flume and raceway was under the road.

This Furnace was called the "Charlotte Furnace" probably in honor of Queen Charlotte, wife of George II of England, perhaps in hope that the mother country might not frown too harshly upon the new enterprise. Charlotte Furnace had a longer life than any of the other Carver furnaces. When it ceased to be a blast furnace it became the Charlotte Foundry until the last few years of its existence when it became the Ellis Foundry Company, in all, 145 years. But the name furnace clung to the spot to the very last. The village of South Carver that grew up with the furnace was always called "The Furnace" — "The Furnace Store" — "The Furnace Post Office" — "The Furnace Neighborhood" — "The Furnace Folk."

As my subject tonight is: Boyhood Memories of Carver Foundries; and as the foundry at South Carver

was the only one that had existed within the memory of man I will confine my remarks to the Charlotte Furnace which later became known as Benjamin Ellis and Company in 1810 and Matthias Ellis and Company in 1860 and the Ellis Foundry Company in 1872 and until its dissolution in 1904. Last owners were Gerard Tobey, Peleg McFarlin and Edward Avery. Peleg McFarlin was its treasurer and manager.

The plant was destroyed by fire in 1808 and again in 1872. The last plant which was built in 1874 and which closed for the last time in 1902 had the moulders building on the southerly side of Tremont Street and the factory building on the northerly side.

The moulders plant was sixty feet wide and one-hundred sixty feet long and contained eighteen stalls for moulders. There was also a boarding house, a granite house for the storing of clay and moulding sand. Also a large shed for the storing of flasks. All of these buildings were demolished several years ago. On the northerly side of the highway was the factory and two small buildings for the storing of stock and flasks. The factory building is now used as a screenhouse and the storage buildings were moved away and one is now used by H. R. Bailey as a shop.

In the moulders building no power was used except a large pipe running under the road which conducted the air blast from the blower in the factory to the cupola. To the best of my recollection the procedure of the manufacturing of cast iron was as follows: coke, pig iron, moulding sand, fire clay, and lime stone were received at the Tremont Station by freight and brought to South Carver by a mule team consisting of five mules

which made two trips per day taking the finished product and bringing back the raw materials.

In the morning the cupola was cleaned and the lining resurfaced with clay and then charged by putting wood in the bottom, and alternate layers of coke and pig iron until the cupola was filled to the top, which was probably 12 to 15 feet above the bottom of the furnace. This was done by the melter and assistant melter. The assistant melter's job sometime during the day was to break the pig iron in half which made pieces about a foot long. This he did by raising the piece above his head with both hands and letting it fall on a large block of steel.

This is all of the memoirs that can be found at this time.

# REPORT OF THE TOWN BEAUTIFICATION COMMITTEE CARVER GARDEN CLUB

The town Beautification Committee of the Carver Garden Club is trying to improve roadside areas throughout the town, but is hampered somewhat by lack of available manpower. At South Carver, three islands have been planted, two with Pot of Gold and one with Swiss violets. Since these islands are only temporary, not too much effort has gone into the upkeep. At Center Carver, opposite Carver Supply, more permanent planting has been done. With the help of Leonard Roby who worked on the plot with a rototiller, the island has been planted with 250 daffodil bulbs for spring blooming, and cranesbill and petunias for summer. The Robys have seeded, fertilized, watered and mowed, and kept the area in fine condition. If people in each part of town would express a desire to help take care of plots and work along with the Carver Garden Club, the Carver roadsides could be beautiful. There are several areas in East. North and West Carver which could be planted and add considerably to the appearance of the countryside.

These few plantings are but a start, but in the right direction. By far the most extensive undertaking of the Garden Club has been the Savery Avenue project. Since this is well along and should near completion within the next year, perhaps the Carver residents would be interested in a report of the Garden Club's efforts.

Early in March 1966 when Gladys Pignataro, Town Beautification Committee chairman, and Mary Sampson,

president, of the Carver Garden Club met with Carver Selectmen to ask permission to undertake civic improvement in various areas in town, the main object was the planting and restoration of the entrances to Savery Avenue which had been left in a sad state of churned earth after the rerouting of Route 58.

After a general discussion, a few suggestions, but no funds or promise of any, we left the Selectmen's office with their blessing! The first thought was to seek State or Federal assistance from one of their many agencies. Letters were written to Senators Saltonstall and Kennedy, Congressman Keith, Secretary of the Interior Udall and finally, through the suggestion of Representative John Armstrong of Plymouth, to Charles Foster, then Commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources of the Commonwealth, From all but Mr. Foster the same reply. Cong. Keith wrote, "Since Savery Avenue does not fall within the correct classification it is not eligible for highway beautification funds. The National Park Service does not give a very promising response either. However, I am sufficiently impressed by all your efforts that I intend to make an extra effort of my own. And Savery Avenue is such a lovely spot that I would hate to see the project fail. In any case I have written to Mrs. Lyndon Johnson in the hope that she will be able to help you get a landscape architect." From Francis W. Sargent, then Commissioner of Public Works, "This department cannot legally expend highway funds for any type of improvement in areas not within the State Highway layout. Federal funds granted to the State are earmarked for expenditures along Interstate and Federal Aid Primary Systems in the Commonwealth. This highway does not fall within

the above classification . . . This is a worthy project and it is regrettable that the Department cannot participate in it." And so it went from all Federal departments from the White House and Mrs. Johnson's highway beautification program to our own Commonwealth Department of Public Works. But from Commissioner Foster came the good news. "Dear Mrs. Simpson: I was greatly interested in your information concerning the first divided highway in North America and was, frankly, unaware that the Town of Carver had such a distinction! Your letter has been forwarded to Regional Forest and Park Supervisor Charles R. Orsi, and you should hear from him or one of his associates in the very near future."

On April 1, 1966, Mr. Charles Cherry, Forester from the Myles Standish Reservation, came to discuss our project. He was most enthusiastic and offered to help with the layout, work along with Mr. Kallio, Tree Warden, and provide much of the native planting, ilex, swamp honeysuckle, sweet pepperbush. He marked trees in the avenue which should be removed, and indicated various places where new ones should be planted.

Still there was no money. But good publicity of our project brought what we needed — an offer of shrubs and trees and several sizable checks!

On April 25 and 26 the first plantings were done. Mr. Cherry staked out locations for various shrubs. Weston Brothers dug all holes assisted by Mr. Clifford, Highway Superintendent and his crew. All holes were filled with native peat and good loam brought in by the highway trucks. Mr. Kallio and his men did the

planting. All dogwood, mountain laurel, ilex, azalea viscosa, clethra and juniper andorra were donated. Some were given by the State Forest and some by residents, but most were the gift of Mr. Page Wyman, of Halifax in memory of his father, Donald Wyman, who loved the beauty and serenity of the Avenue.

Interested citizens contributed time, equipment and money. Scouts and members of the Carver Garden Club cleared up trash, rocks, litter and dead trees. Raking, mulching, weeding and mowing kept members busy during the summer. Whenever the plantings needed water Mr. Aime Bolduc used the small fire truck with permission from the Fire Warden. What started out to be a Garden Club project resulted in a truly community undertaking. None of it could have been accomplished without the complete and willing cooperation of the Board of Selectmen, the Highway, Park, Tree and Fire Departments, and the proffered assistance of townspeople and their equipment and financial support. No matter what the problem, Mr. Frank Mazzilli came up with the right answer. He was "our port in a storm."

For all this help and genuine interest the Carver Garden Club is deeply grateful and wishes to express here their sincerest appreciation to all for their help and encouragement.

By summer's end pleasant comments were forthcoming. From Cong. Keith, "Congratulations on your success with Savery Avenue!" From Senator Saltonstall, "I was awfully pleased to read that Commissioner Foster has been so helpful in completing your plans for Savery Avenue. I frankly think that local people can do a much better job and a more meaningful one in this type of activity." From Commissioner Foster, "It was thoughtful of you to write me concerning the fine job done by Forester Charles Cherry, and I am naturally delighted your Garden Club project received every assurance of assistance." And one day while working at the Avenue, a car stopped and a gentleman, a former Carverite, said, "Thank you for what you are doing to Savery Avenue." This was only one of many people who have stopped to comment favorably on work being done.

The Savery Avenue project was in abeyance in 1967 except for general upkeep because of a rumor that a development might be started in the avenue proper. Town officials assured the Garden Club that no building would take place there.

In January 1968, the Club voted to try for the Sears, Roebuck Civic Beautification Award, and Mr. Gunther Schulz of Schulz & Goldsmith, Landscape Architects, was called in for consultation. Planting plans for a working period of two to three years were approved. The application for the award with pictures was submitted to the Bay State Civic Beautification Contest and on May 28, 1968, at the annual meeting of the Garden Club Federation of Massachusetts, Inc., the Carver Garden Club was awarded \$200 "seed money" and a citation for "your club's activities in planting the seeds of civic development and improvement for present and future generations to harvest." It was a great day for those who had worked so hard on this project.

The spring of 1968 was a busy one. 1,000 pounds of limestone was spread on the grassy area around the

trees at both ends of the avenue. All plantings were cultivated, fertilized and mulched with pine chips obtained from and delivered by the Highway Department. Since, at that time, funds were low, and we had not yet received our award, no planting could be done during the best months. But, with our "seed money" in hand, and generous contributions from present and former residents of Carver, we carried out Mr. Schulz's recommendations and ordered 15 Mountain Laurel and 20 Phitzer Junipers and two seven-foot European White Birch trees for planting early in 1969.

Our next task was to replace the iron markers which had been stolen. In June 1966, at the home of the late Mr. and Mrs. Earl Boardway. I was shown the original wood pattern from which these were cast. It had been given to Mr. Boardway by Miss Ethel Savery before her final trip to Florida. With it was a letter of explanation, stating that the pattern was made in the foundry of William Savery, donor of the avenue, and that the small hand on the pattern indicating "Keep to the Right" was modeled on the hand of his daughter, Mary Page Savery, when she was a small girl. Before Mr. Boardway's death he had replaced the missing metal letters, preparing it for use by the Carver Garden Club. The pattern was loaned to me by Orrie Dempsey, Mrs. Boardway's daughter, and bronze plagues were cast by Colonial Brass Company of Middleboro. Mr. Ralph Linton of North Carver, gave his time, material and services to set these plaques into the boulders at each end of the avenue, and was also influential in obtaining a discount rate from the stonecutter. Money to defray all expenses connected with casting, setting, etc., was given by Carver residents and friends to Aune

Wood, a member of the Town Beautification Committee of the Carver Garden Club.

There is still much to be done. The plantings in the Spring of 1969 will require help from various Town Departments and from interested citizens with equipment. Marked trees should be taken down before they decay and fall. New ones should be planted in the middle lane and in other empty spaces, dead underbrush, fallen trees and other debris cleaned out. All areas where picnickers park should be blocked off. Several suggestions have been made, i.e., boulders to block areas, cedar posts with natural plantings, or additional young pines. Some provision should be made to keep the area free of trash — not trash cans unless they are emptied weekly!

Once the planting, cleaning up and reforestation has been accomplished the area should be turned over to the Carver Conservation Commission for future care, control and management.

What a beautiful spot this would be if, within a few years, the whole area from one end of the avenue to the other and its adjoining lands could be a combination of park area, pine-studded land and wild forest!

In conclusion a personal note. As chairman of the Town Beautification Committee and past-president of the Carver Garden Club may I express my deepest and sincerest thanks to all who have listened and counseled and helped. It would have been an impossible task without complete understanding and cooperation. I shall always be grateful for having had the opportunity to

work with the members of the Carver Garden Club and town officials and workmen.



# REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION TO FIRST GRADE.

- 1. A child who will reach his sixth birthday on or before December 31st may be admitted to the first grade in September, 1968, without examination.
- 2. A child whose sixth birthday occurs in the two months after December 31st may be admitted the preceding September if readiness for School can be demonstrated by means of appropriate tests. Parents having a child whom they wish to be examined under this rule are required to make application to the Superintendent of Schools on or before August 15 preceding the opening of school in September. A special form will be furnished for this purpose upon written request from the parent. The School Committee reserves the right to withhold the examination privilege whenever the number of children eligible to enter without examination is equal to the capacity of the available classrooms.

#### CLOSING OF SCHOOLS

It is the policy of the School Committee to close school only under the severest conditions or on such occasions when it is dangerous to operate school busses. At other times, parents are expected to use their own judgment in sending children to school. #### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS

Once again we offer a combined report from the central office, the elementary supervisor, and the building principal. We represent a team approach to the educational task and move in a cooperative manner to develop and maintain worthy educational programs for our community.

## **Staffing**

This past year found us losing three of our most valued staff members. Mr. Emmett Finck, Elementary Supervisor, resigned to accept the principalship of St. Colletta's School in Hanover. Mr. Richard Silva left us to assume the position of Assistant-Principal in the Junior High School in Norton. Carver's greatest loss has been felt in the retirement of Henry Miller Shaw. There can be no question of the esteem in which this gentleman has been deservedly held by the townspeople.

We feel ourselves fortunate in the quality of teachers new to our schools this year. We have indeed learned since September how fortunate we have been to gain the services of Mrs. Mercia Pike as Elementary Supervisor. Here is a school person with a rich background of experience and training and an excited interest in the growth and development of our education program.

Recognizing that today's children have a broader awareness than ever before and having become sharply aware of the knowledge explosion that has occurred in particular fields of study, we have developed positions of Coordinators of Instruction in the areas of science and mathematics. Mr. William Levesque has been appointed

Science Coordinator and Mr. Angelo Medici, Department Chairman at Plymouth-Carver, will serve as Mathematics Coordinator. These people will work to create new programs of study within their fields and will supervize the quality of instructional programs in Grades I-XII.

The new technology has made giant steps in developing uses for its materials and equipment. In an effort to take proper advantage of this burgeoning national industry, we have had Mr. James Donovan appointed as Instructional Media Coordinator. He will serve to develop and maintain a staff awareness of the new things that are every day becoming available to the classrooms of our country.

## Program Development

We have continued to develop our Reading Programs. Grouping has been increasingly refined in our primary grades in an effort to facilitate student adjustment to work that is more closely in accord with their separate abilities and levels of interest.

Teacher aides have come to Grades one and two and have proved most worthwhile additions to staff. This is a first experience of which we are most proud.

We are pleased to note the continued support and community interest shown in our Science Fair and Arts Festival. This year Mr. Sherman, a new member of our staff, worked to organize a Drama Club that gave its first presentation at Christmas to a most enthusiastic audience.

During the summer both Head Start and Honest Effort programs were conducted at Governor John Carver

with great success. These have proved of particular advantage to our children and we urge all families to consider participation this next year of their eligible children. Students in Grades 4-8 took part in programs of enrichment or remedial assistance at the Intermediate School in Plymouth where Mr. Richard served as program administrator.

We have this year gained our first experience with released time for teachers involved in in-service training. It is believed imperative that time be properly taken for teachers to work together in different groupings in an effort to improve understandings and to sharpen certain classroom skills. Our science program proved particularly noteworthy and has gained wide recognition throughout New England. Certainly this has not been "time off" for teachers. We feel that this enthusiastic effort here have been cause for an increased pride in them as teachers, the most important members of our academic team.

Our new cafeteria has continued as a most pleasant and most satisfying dining area. All youngsters should be encouraged to take part in a school service that is so much to their advantage. Hearty appetites are well served, and it is a joy to see some of our "growing boys" come back for second servings.

## PLYMOUTH-CARVER REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT

The past year has been one of recognizing our responsibilities in the area of growth and expansion of our Regional School District. Our enrollment projections have had us understand the need for additional classroom and other spaces within our high school.

In June we had a total school population of 1,003 students. At the present writing the enrollment has increased to 1,119, an increase somewhat in excess of eleven per cent. The senior class graduated in June was one of 208 members. When this is compared with the present average class size of 279, and a freshman class of 313, it is evident that we must soon submit requests for your support of a school addition.

In a display of their satisfaction with our development of the four year high school program, the Plymouth and Carver School Committees voted unanimously to request amendment of the Regional Amendment to allow for extension to include our jurisdiction over school policy planning for Grades 6-7-8. We were further gratified when the townspeople gave support to the request and the Agreement was indeed amended.

Since that time we have been deeply involved with a study of the educational needs of these new grade groups. We have been most favorably impressed with the planning of our staff to make provision for a Regional Intermediate School to properly care for the educational needs of these three classes in our communities.

We have engaged the services of David M. Crawley Associates to assist us as architects in the selection of a site and in the development of educational plans and specifications. With the architect and our Superintendent, members of our Committee have traveled to view first-hand examples of modern school construction that have gained recognition as models of flexible school structures that are designed to provide for the exciting new school programs of today and tomorrow.

We are pleased to note the many improvements in curricular offerings to our students. Particular satisfaction is found in the increased emphasis on the Humanities with its attendant efforts at correlating the classical arts with the broader reaches of social science. To prove our versatility, we suggest our equal pleasure with the advances in computer math and in the field of data processing.

Our evening schedule of Adult Education classes has continued to flourish. The continued increase in attendance is the most noteworthy praise of the entire program. Our involvement in the federally funded classes for Adult Basic Education and for Citizenship Training are serving the very critical needs of some of our adult residents. We can only wish that more people would seek the advantages to be found here.

In addition this year we have made first time provision for an Evening High School that will lead to our granting of a Plymouth-Carver High School diploma. For too long this opportunity has been unavailable within our immediate area; we are pleased to acknowledge our responsibility. Outside the school

we have encouraged development of a program that allows continuing educational progress for our expectant teenage mothers. Arrangements have been made to allow these young people to return to school at the appropriate time without suffering the discouragement of loss of class standing. Indeed we have accepted with all sincerity our responsibilities to the individual needs of community members.

Our visits to the school have given us great pride in the high quality of maintenance of the school building and grounds. This is the kind of protective care of your investment upon which we have insisted. We are indeed fortunate to have the services of such conscientious staff members. We are pleased that so many of you have taken time to inform us of your satisfaction based upon your own observations during one or another of your school visits.

We feel ourselves to be involved in a communities-wide effort in the cooperative planning of a truly viable school district in which the needs of people are held to hold first importance. We have kept faith with our promise that the school would be developed and maintained in recognition of its responsibilities to wide community service. We know that our present pride in our discharge of these responsibilities could not have been possible without the continued support of the people of Carver and Plymouth. We recognize the tenuous nature of faith and the magnitude of its importance in community service. We shall strive to continue our service to you in a manner that may allow us to deserve the great measure of confidence you have

displayed throughout the several years of our existence as a regional school district.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE PLYMOUTH-CARVER HIGH SCHOOL

Experimentation continues at Plymouth-Carver High School with the Core Program being introduced as a Pilot Program in the fall of 1968. This program is designed to meet the needs of the student who is a candidate for academic failure and ultimate drop-out from school. It represents a program within a program. Specifically, it is intended to help bring self-confidence to students in the lowest segment of the basic course on the ninth grade level. The techniques of instruction will be flexible and incorporate imaginative planning and implementation which could involve team teaching. All students involved in the program will participate in physical education. Art and music will be available as electives. The program represents an honest attempt to improve and refine our instruction for a particular group of needy students.

To broaden the curriculum the following courses were offered as electives: The Humanities, Fashion and Design, Data Processing, Speech, and Pre-Algebra.

The Work-Study Program continues to grow in popularity with approximately seventy students enrolled in this program. This is an increase of over 100% since the program was introduced in the fall of 1966. It is the intention of this program to provide a practical means to help students through a series of experiences which are intended to introduce them to various vocations.

The increasing pupil enrollment necessitated a staff increase in order to carry out the school program. Additions have been made in English, Social Studies, Mathematics, Business, and Art. Mr. Victor Bissonnette assumed the responsibility of Director of Guidance. and Mr. James Donovan became the new Audio-Aids Director, replacing Mr. Robert Simmons who left the teaching profession for a business career, Mr. John Penny returned from his teaching Fellowship at Syracuse University, Miss Ellen Murphy became our Home Economics teacher and Mr. Blaine Losh our new Choral Director. Our entire staff and student body will miss Mr. Francisco Garcia, a Spanish teacher, who will be returning to his native land of Spain in June. Mr. Garcia spent two years with us as an exchange teacher on the faculty staff.

School activities which offered enriching extracurricula experiences were received with enthusiasm by many of the students such as dances, plays, talent and senior show, exchange concerts, Pop concert, and various field trips. Success of the basketball team winning the Old Colony League Championship for the second straight year and going undefeated in 36 league games was a major highlight of the winter sport season.

The entire faculty and student body at Plymouth-Carver High School was pleased to welcome Pilar Fuentes as our fourth American Field Service student. The selection of the American family to take Pilar into their home as a member of the family during the year was Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Couter, of West Pond Road, Plymouth, Massachusetts. Charles Cappannari, a member

of the graduating class of 1968, was selected to go abroad and is now studying in Lengerich, Germany.

The class of 1968 was a record-breaking class in the amount of scholarship aid they received. Like their predecessors, a high percentage of the graduating class is furthering its education. This benevolence provided more students more opportunities to continue their studies. The information we have received from these students and from the schools they are attending merits strong words of praise and thanks to all who have provided scholarship aid.

We express our overall thanks to the citizens, service organizations, school personnel, students and staff who have contributed to the growth, development, and well-being of the students, the staff, the school, and the communities.

### REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF GUIDANCE

An increased school population and an ever increasing concern for the individual student caused a change in the job description and title of the Director of Guidance for the 1968-69 school year. The duties of the Director now include the responsibility of initiating a coordinated elementary program and incorporating a complete guidance service for the total populations of Plymouth and Carver. The new position is now entitled Director of Guidance of Plymouth-Carver High School and Coordinator of Guidance Services for the towns of Plymouth and Carver.

Since assuming the responsibilities of this position in August, a concentrated effort has been made to incorporate a guidance program which will provide guidance services to all the students in the Plymouth and Carver schools as well as to the entire community. It is felt that we must provide a complete program for all age levels if we are to expect positive results.

In order to provide this extended guidance service, we must turn to the addition of a competent professional staff at the elementary level, the first of whom will be added this Spring. He will work in direct support of the existing guidance programs but will be primarily concerned with the elementary school students. In this way we are able to begin to work toward a program on the continuum through all the grades.

The implementation of these objectives has led to the establishment of a uniform referral procedure throughout the grades. This procedure allows for the maximum utilization of all our school specialists, as

needed, when dealing with a school problem. A coordinated testing program has also been recommended in cooperation with Mrs. Mercia Pike, Elementary Supervisor. Additional recommendations will be made in the future in order to provide an individual approach to students and parents of our communities.

Activities which received priority at the secondary level in addition to our every pupil services were a Parents Night devoted to post-secondary placement, a College Day at which more than 50 schools were represented and attended by more than 500 students representing Plymouth-Carver High School, Silver Lake Regional High School, Duxbury High School, and Sacred Heart High School, and pupil and parent orientations for incoming freshmen. In addition to these programs, a class for expectant teenage mothers was established in November under the direction of Mrs. Edwin T. Anthony. Although the program was initiated through the efforts of the guidance department, its activities include the utilization and cooperation of community agencies, school department, local citizens, clergy, and doctors. All concerned with this program feel very positive results being derived in social and emotional adjustment, physical well being and in academic study. The total efforts of this program are well received and greatly appreciated by the enrolled students.

The educational process is directed toward "preparation for life." The statistics of the class of 1968 illustrate the trend of the time toward the acquisition of a broader educational base prior to seeking employment with 62% of the class entering post-secondary schools. Complete

## TOWN WARRANT AND REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

Plymouth ss. To either of the Constables of the Town of Carver, Plymouth County, GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs to meet at the Governor John Carver School House in said Carver on Saturday, the fifteenth day of March, 1969, at 12:00 o'clock, noon, then and there to act on the following article, namely:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers, to be voted for all on one ballot, viz.: One Moderator, Three Auditors, each for one year; One Selectman, One Assessor, One Highway Surveyor, One member of School Board, One Park Commissioner, One Cemetery Commissioner, Two Library Trustees, One Tree Warden, each for a term of three years; One member of Planning Board for a term of five years; One member of Planning Board for a term of one year (to fill vacancy).

The polls will be open for at least eight hours.

And you are directed to further notify said Inhabitants of said Town that as soon as the ballots have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Saturday, March 22, 1969, at 1:00 o'clock P.M., and at that time will reconvene at said Governor John Carver School House, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to

borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue for the financial years beginning January 1, 1969 and January 1, 1970, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

### Article 2. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town such salaries to be retroactive to January 1, 1969, as provided by General Laws Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, namely:


