ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 22, 1969

The Annual Town Meeting was held on Saturday, March 22, 1969, at the Governor John Carver School House. Meeting was called to order at 1:00 o'clock, P.M., by the Moderator, Thomas C. Barham, there being a quorum present. The Invocation was given by the Rev. Norman B. Cawley, Pastor of the North Carver Congregation Church. The Moderator appointed Elizabeth F. Ryder, Dorothy M. Lindros, Matthew J. Mendes and Robert H. Telless to serve as Tellers to count the votes, and they were duly sworn to faithful performance of their duties.

Reading of the Warrant being dispensed with and Article No. 1, relating to the election of officers, having been disposed of at a prior meeting, the Meeting thereupon proceeded to act upon the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue for the financial years beginning January 1, 1969 and January 1, 1970, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town, such salaries to be retroactive to January 1, 1969, as provided by General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, namely:

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to authorize the Tree Warden, Cemetery Commissioners and Park Commissioners to employ themselves as laborers in the cemeteries, parks, and tree department.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account to the 1969 Reserve Account the sum of \$10,000.00.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to return the following unexpended appropriation balances to the treasury:

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to accept the bequest in the amount of \$200.00 under the terms of the Will of the late Ethel Savary, for the benefit of the Carver Library.

Article 9. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, and to choose a Town Director as provided in Section 41 and 45 of Chapter 128 of the General Laws. Thereupon, Mr. Roger V. Weston was unanimously elected Town Director County Aid to Agriculture.

Article 10. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Assessors' Plans, such sum to be used and expended by the Board of Assessors.

Article 11. VOTED to hear the report of any standing committees and to establish any new committees. Thereupon, Mr. Walter W. Correia, Chairman of the Beach Committee, presented the following report; "The Beach Committee met three times last year. It is the recommendation of this Committee that a program be started and continued whereby the Town shall obtain land and provide rights of way to all large ponds used for swimming and boating. It is further recommended that more beach areas be established for the citizens of the town, and that such beaches be owned and controlled by the Town.

To initiate such a program, this committee is recommending the purchase of a parcel of land on Johns Pond off Purchase Street in East Carver. This land is to be used as a Public Beach."

The foregoing report was unanimously accepted, and it was VOTED that the Beach Committee continue, and report at the next Annual Town Meeting.

Article 12. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, and to transfer the sum of \$2,000.00 from the available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's Shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the reasury.

Article 13. VOTED, unanimously, to transfer the sum of \$5,002.68 from proceeds received, or to be received, from the Commonwealth under the provisions of Chapter 616, Section 5, of the Acts of 1967, said sum to be used for construction work on Tremont and Seipet Streets.

Article 14. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500.00 for Chapter 90 Highway Construction on Center, Plymouth, Seipet and Tremont Street, and to transfer the sum of \$25,500.00 from free cash in the treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt to free cash in the treasury.

Article 15. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,700.00 for Chapter 81 Highhways, and to transfer the sum of \$18,425.00 from available funds in the treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the treasury.

Article 16. VOTED, unanimously, to transfer the sum of \$2,500.00 from the Road Machinery Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new Sander for the use of the Highway Department.

Article 17. VOTED, unanimously, to transfer the sum of \$4,000.00 from the Road Machinery Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new truck (cab and chassis) for the use of the Highway Department.

Article 18. VOTED, unanimously, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to negotiate a lease for a Police Cruiser Car, upon such terms and conditions and from such persons as the Board of Selectmen deem advisable, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,220.00 therefore.

Article 19. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,315.00 for the purpose of purchasing the present leased Police Cruiser from Colonial Car Lease Co., Inc.

Article 20. VOTED, unanimously, to accept Chapter 90, Section 7 L as amended by Chapter 713 of the Acts of 1968, "An Act to Prohibit Standees in Certain School Buses".

Article 21. VOTED, unanimously, to authorize the School Committee in accordance with General Laws Chapter 149, Section 178 I, as amended by Chapter 633 of the Acts of 1968, to designate an attorney as a representative of the school committee for the purpose of bargaining with employee organizations for school employees.

Article 22. VOTED to appropriate the sum of \$2,684.00 from available funds in the treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the Cemetery Funds in the Town Treasury.

Article 23. VOTED, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 to be used to pay for all work and materials in Town Cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 24. VOTED, unanimously, that the County Dog Fund be applied to the Library Account.

Article 25. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed revisions and additions to the Protective Zoning By-laws as submitted by the Carver Planning Board.

Mr. Philip H. Gibbs, Chairman of the Planning Board, read the proposed revisions and changes section by section. Thereupon, upon motion duly made and seconded, the following revisions and additions

to the Protective Zoning By-laws of the Town of Carver were unanimously VOTED:

SECTION II, Page 2. In the definition of TRAILER, after the words "mounted on wheels", insert the following words, "including the type of vehicle commonly known as a mobile home".

SECTION II, Page 2. After the definition of PROJECTIONS add the following definition: "KENNEL: Four or more dogs on a single premise as defined in Chapter 140, Section 136A of the General Laws".

SECTION IV, A. 1. b., Page 3 After the words "Excavations as follows" add the following: ", providing resulting topography and cover are not seriously detrimental to normal use of adjacent property;"

SECTION IV A. 1. h. (1), Page 3. Change to read as follows: "The relocation of materials such as sand, gravel, loam, peat, turf or stone within the town provided no undrained depressions are created."

SECTION IV A. 1. h. (3), Page 3. Change to read as follows: "The removal of up to 100 cu. yds. of loam or up to 2000 cu yds. of materials other than loam to points outside the Town of Carver, in any one year, from points more than 200 feet from an existing street line or within 200 feet of any street line provided no excavation is carried below the established street grade."

SECTION IV A. 2. b. (1), Page 4. After the word "motel" insert the words : ", apartment building".

SECTION IV A. 2. b. (4), Page 4 After the words cottages for rent" insert the following: ", having a minimum floor area of 400 sq. ft.,"

SECTION V A. Page 5. Reference to "Minimum Floor Area" change to read as follows: "Minimum Floor Area of Dwelling, excluding cellar, other than summer cottages for rent or commercial farm accessory dwelling in Sq. Ft. 720"

SECTION V A. d., Page 6. Insert after the words "to be measured on" the following: "street line or".

Article 26. VOTED, unanimously, to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to sell the town-owned 1965 Chevrolet Police Cruiser.

Article 27. VOTED, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000.00 to purchase a certain parcel of land now owned by Willard A. Rhodes and Charles W. Jesson, Trustees of the Edgewood Trust, said land to be used as a public beach for the residents of the Town of Carver under the jurisdiction and control of the Park Commissioners, said parcel of land situated in the Town of Carver and lying on the Northeasterly the sale price be not less than \$100.00.

Article 28. VOTED to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey at private sale, and on such terms and conditions as they may deem in the best interests of the Town, the premises on the Easterly side of Crescent Road, known as the "Town House Lot," containing about 0.42 acres, more or less, and is shown as Lot 4 on Sheet 117 of Carver Assessors' Plans; and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to sign, seal, acknowledge and deliver in the name and behalf of the town such deeds and other instruments in writing as they deem necessary and proper to carry this Article into effect, and that the sale price be not less then \$1000.00 dollars

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

Adjourned at 4:55 P.M.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

May 31, 1969

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School House on Saturday, May 31, 1969, pursuant to a Warrant of the

Board of Selectmen dated May 20, 1969. The meeting was called to order at 2:00 o'clock, P.M., by the Moderator, Thomas C. Barham, there being a quorum present. Thereupon, the meeting proceeded to act on the Article in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. Motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly seconded, "that the Town approve the amount of debt \$356,000.00 authorized on May 6, 1969 by the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District Committee for the purpose of acquiring land and financing in part the construction and equipping of a regional intermediate school, including architects' and engineering fees and other costs incidental thereto".

Mr. Washburn discussed the matter at considerable length stating, among other things, that it would not cost the Town of Carver as much as \$200,000.00 annually to construct and operate the proposed new intermediate school.

Mr. Frank R. Mazzilli, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, explained what the effect would be on the Tax Rate if this proposed new school were voted. The matter was further discussed by several speakers and, at 3:30 P.M., there being no further discussion, it was VOTED to proceed to vote on the question by secret ballot. Thereupon, the Moderator appointed Arlene L. Jarvinen, Dorothy M. Lindros, Domingo M. Fernandes and Elizabeth F. Ryder to serve as Tellers to supervise the voting and count the ballots, they being duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties.

Balloting on the question was completed at 4:16 P.M., with a total of 309 ballots cast, and the results of the voting was announced by the Moderator as follows:

The Moderator thereupon declared the motion lost.

upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

November 8, 1969

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School House on Saturday, November 8, 1969. The meeting was called to order at 2:00 o'clock, P.M., by the Moderator, Thomas C. Barham, and proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. VOTED, unanimously, to appropriate from available funds in the treasury the sum of \$5,000.00 for Veterans' Benefits.

Article 2. Motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly seconded, "that the Town approve the amount of debt, \$363,000.00, authorized on October 14, 1969, by the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District Committee for the purpose of acquiring land and financing in part the construction and equipping of a regional intermediate school, including architects' and engineering fees and other cost incidental thereto."

Mr. Erwin K. Washburn, Chairman of the School Committee, speaking in favor the motion, stated that the proposed new intermediate school would result in a net increase of only \$52,736.00 in the cost of the elementary schools for the year 1971 - 1972, and that the total impact on the tax rate would amount to only \$19.42. Mr. Washburn also stated that the proposed intermediate school would result in a savings of \$76,380.00 in the cost of operation of the local school system.

Discussion of the matter was concluded at 3:20 P.M. and the meeting proceeded to vote on the question by secret ballot. Balloting on the question was completed at 3:50 P.M., with a total of 207 ballots cast, of which 105 were in the affirmative and 102 in the negative. The Moderator thereupon declared the motion carried.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, the meeting adjourned at 4:22 P.M.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY SURVEYOR

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen

Carver, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

The Chapter 90 Maintenance allotment of \$3,000.00 of which the Town appropriated \$1,000.00, the State \$1,000.00 and the County \$1,000.00 was used on Tremont Street where 1500 feet of Class 1 bituminous concrete surface was constructed over existing surface.

The Chapter 81 allotment of \$25,125.00 of which the Town appropriated \$6,700.00 and the State \$18,425.00 must be used be used for maintenance purposes, out of which approximately \$6,730.63 was used to purchase 34,181 gallons of asphalt which sealed 43,484 feet of road. The remaining \$18,394.37 was used for patching, cleaning catch basins and culverts, brushing, sand for sealing and other miscellaneous maintenance operations.

The Chapter 90 allotment of \$34,000.00 has a balance of \$30,407.94. The remainder was used to start construction of Seipet and Tremont Streets.

The \$1,000.00 appropriation in the General Highway fund was used to apply 162 tons of mix on Shurtleff Street.

The \$5,002.68 appropriated for construction work on Tremont and Seipet Streets has not been used as drainage was not started.

REPORT OF THE
CARVER HISTORICAL COMMITTEE
FOR 1969

The Carver Historical Committee has continued its meetings at the Carver Town Hall in the Selectmen's Hearing Rooms at 7:30 P.M. on the third Monday of the month. The same membership continues except for the resignation of Andrew F. Griffith, Jr. who moved with his family to Middleboro where they have purchased a home. Mrs. Elaine Shurtleff of Meadow Street was appointed to fill the vacancy. Mrs. Marjorie D. Mosher is the chairman, Henry M. Shaw, vice chairman, Mrs. Florence K. Sand, secretary, Mrs. Arlene Johnson, Winsor B. Leach and Harold Braddock comprise the committee.

The filing and cataloguing of important historical papers, letters and documents continues. The committee has also started a collection of early and recent Carver homes, old photographs of early Carver, its industries and people, and also of those who played an important part in Carver history.

In July 1969, the Committee tried on a small scale, to have historical items and pictures on display at a booth on Old Home Day in Shurtleff Park. The interest displayed by young and old was most gratifying and it is hoped to have a larger booth in 1970, with committee members to explain to those who do not recall the old photos.

Also through the kindness and interest of Blanche Beaton of Wareham, a handsome, hand-embroidered quilt has been given to the committee with Bernard E. Shaw of South Carver,

assisting in the arrangements. The quilt was given after the settlement of the will of Emma Brown of Plymouth. It contains the embroidered names of many Carver people, including Eliza Shurtleff, the grandmother of Mrs. Orrie S. Dempsey and her sister, Mrs. Geneva Winner. Other names are Alvin Harlow, Mercie A. Griffith, Harrison Dunham, Jane Gile, Martha Murdock, William Murdock, Samuel Murdock, Waitstill Murdock, Caroline Atwood, Olive S. Barrows, Mercie S. Shaw and Arad B. Southworth.

The following is an interesting excerpt taken from The Town of Carver Monograph:

“Carver was incorporated on June 9, 1790. When it was first settled, prior to this date, the abundance of waterpower, game, and other natural resources, led the early Puritans to compare the area to the land of Canaan mentioned in the Old Testament. The lowlands were rich in iron ore, and from this the first blast furnace in the new Colony, called the ‘Federal Furnace’, was erected in 1794. Industry was built around the by-products of this furnace, and such items as stoves, registers finders, etc., were turned out in quantity. According to early Carver residents, the first iron tea-kettle was manufactured here. The presence of abundant timber led to the erection of a box-board mill, a shingle and stove mill, and a shoe-string factory. Herring fishery was an early industry here, and early records, dated in 1791, show an attempt at the conservation of herring and other food fish.”

Honorable Board of Selectmen;

The Public Health Nurse Committee wishes to report that we have had the busiest year since the start of the program. The Nurses made a total of 226 home visits and 60 home-school visits. 25 of these visits were made during off-duty hours. Fees collected amounted to \$470.40 There were also 35 cases of communicable diseases reported.

During this year we have seen several important changes made. Mrs. Doris Lapworth resigned as the nurse on November first, for personal reasons. This resignation was accepted with sincerest regret. Mrs. Lapworth served with distinction and she is truly missed by both the school children and her patients scattered throughout the town.

Mrs. Eleanor Bishop, who was our substitute nurse, took over the full time job on November 1. Also on that day Mrs. Barbara Flanders was appointed by the committee to be our new substitute.

The committee has also been working to keep our Medicare Certification. We are in the process of revising our Policies to accomplish this. We are also trying to set up an advisory committee to aid us in keeping the program up to date and filling the needs of the Town. Anyone interested may contact any Committee member. We have also brought in a part-time sec-

retary to assist the nurse in filling out the many forms connected with Medicare and Blue Cross work.

We feel that we have a good program providing skilled nursing care as well as Therapy Services through the Easter Seal Society. There is now a possible new service being discussed with several other towns in the area to further extend our help to the citizens.

Gentlemen:

The year 1969 again saw an increase in the expenses incurred by the Department of Veterans' Services. This is to be expected and will be recurring in direct proportion to the increasing numbers of veterans and dependents as well as these same veterans increasing age.

In 1969 we aided 53% more families, on an average per month, than we did in 1968. 1969 was a very expensive year primarily in medical expenses which increased 109% over the previous year. The average cost per case aided increased from \$1,222.00 to \$1,765.00 annually, due both to an increased budget and the forementioned medical expenses.

It is to be assumed that eventually the cost of expenses now borne by the Town supporting its veterans in need will be transferred to the Commonwealth, however, at the present the veteran has his rights under Chapter 115 to apply for aid either from Veterans' Services or any other agency he chooses. This right we cannot deny.

The main function of the Department continues to be that of advisor in the matters of hospitalization, educational benefits, pensions and compensations. The cost to the Town for this function is minimal and the veteran and his dependents ever are grateful for this most personal service which is guaranteed under Chapter 115, Section 10.

The gratification of those of us who work in this purely service work rests solely with the many thank yous which we receive. As in the past years, I wish to publicly thank not only the Town Officials, but also, both the Carver American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars for helping us to help those whom we serve — the Veteran and his Dependents.

REPORT OF THE PLYMOUTH COUNTY
MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT
CARVER 1969

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen
Carver, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

In reporting the Project's activities for 1969, we have been able to continue our primary objectives in each town or city. Namely, the reduction of the mosquito population at source of breeding. This was accomplished either by trenching of breeding areas, or periodic treatment of waters where larvae were found.

As areas are located or reported with an abundance of adult mosquitoes, mist spraying or fogging is practical, affording temporary relief in troublesome sections. Fogging is extremely costly, but an effective weapon against the biting mosquito.

Many breeding areas which require continuous alert control and pre-hatch treatment weekly, come under some of the following: municipal sewer areas, dumps and disposal areas used by commercial waste pumping concerns, and in residential developments where inefficient septic tanks are leaching into streams and ponds. Storm basins are also a continuous breeding source all season. As all of these specific places represent breeding of both nuisance and vector type mosquitoes, they are the number one priority for each district crew leader.

The excessive rains this fall, coupled with normal snows and rainfalls during this winter, will in all probability be the cause of an abundance of mosquitoes in the spring.

An excess of two hundred hours were expended in Carver with our fogging unit and mist blower. Actual fogging cost at least forty dollars an hour. This is indeed a costly operation but necessary for relief from the biting mosquito, as it is impossible for us to control mosquitoes emerging from the large swamps in the spring. Our trenching unit was in Carver twice during the year, complemented by hand work on several streams and culverts.

Monies will only allow for very limited aerial applications. Consideration of possible harm to our environment will always limit us as to areas treated and types of insecticides applied. We will also continue to work closely with the State Pesticide Board, Health Departments, and Natural Resource interests regarding pesticide recommendations. We will also continue our cooperation with the Lakeville Field Station, in their most important research regarding equine encephalitis.

We wish again to thank the town officers, your highway supervisors and health officers for their concern and cooperation.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS

This has been a year of continued growth and improvement for our educational programs. There is all about us an atmosphere of change that has developed as a natural outgrowth of the knowledge explosions that have been occurring. There has been the "new" math and the "new" science, of which many of you as parents have become aware as you worked with your youngsters in their home assignments. Guidance services at the elementary school level and blocks of released time for the in-service training of our teachers. It is our intention to evaluate these services with utmost care in an effort to see that our young people are provided every reasonable advantage of which we find ourselves capable.

This year we have worked with one group in Grade One and another in Grade Two in the newly developed Lippincott materials for reading instruction. The results thus far have been most encouraging.

We have done much this year to increase the refinement of our student groupings. Mixed ability on heterogeneous groupings are developed for all instructional purposes except Reading and Mathematics. In these subjects the children are grouped according to their abilities and expressed interests. These groupings retain sufficient flexibility to allow changes as student patterns of learning display change.

Our French program begins in Grade Four and continues throughout our school program, making possible a five year experience for the truly interested child. For those youngsters who are not enrolled in French classes, we have arranged companion groups for increased work in Language Arts and in the improvement of Study Skills.

One of the developments studied by teachers during their In-Service meetings involved the latest approaches in the techniques of team teaching. We have begun to experiment with "teaming" in our Mathematics program wherein the teachers of different groups come together for certain lessons each week in which different patterns of grouping are employed.

A most exciting addition to our program this year has been the introduction to children in Grades Three through Eight of the fundamental uses of the computer. In our High School programs the computer at a more sophisticated level has proved a valuable asset to the Math department. Our youngsters have amazed us in the readiness with which they have come to understand this complicated equipment. We are confident that here the important beginnings of having our children ready for the computerized world into which they will be growing.

Our first experience in the field of school counseling has come to us largely through a Cooperative Training Program with Boston University. This program has been most carefully supervised by Mr. Victor Bissonnette, Pupil Personal Services Director for our School Union and has had a most successful series of beginnings.

We have this year increased in small measure our ability to provide individual and small group remedial assistance in the critically important areas of reading and mathematics. These are our very important efforts to help those tykes who are finding some of our hurdles just a little too high. Nowhere have we truly evidenced greater success than in our work to overcome personal handicaps.

We have continued our maintenance program and have taken great pride in the comments of visitors to our schools.

Our intention here has been to accomplish just enough each year to keep our painting and scheduled repairs up to date.

Our school lunch program continues to be a source of pride to us and of great value to our student population. The continued high percentage of hot lunches served is the best evidence of the success of this program. An outline of cafeteria activity follows:

COMMITTEE REPORT

Perhaps no other single year of our existence has been as busy as the one which we have just completed. It has been a year of challenge, and we have worked with both industry and sincerity in our efforts to properly discharge our responsibilities to our young people and to the citizens of our member communities.

We had spent much of the previous year in the planning of educational specifications for the Intermediate School which was to be proposed. This was the year in which we had hoped to begin implementation of those plans which had been so carefully developed.

Following an initial failure, we were delighted when Town Meetings in both Carver and Plymouth gave approach to our request for funds to acquire land and to have developed plans and specifications sufficient in detail to carry us through bid procedures which would have allowed us to come before the Towns with a request for construction funds that would be wholly realistic.

you share with us an awareness of the result of the referendum that was initiated in Plymouth. There were not a great number of negative votes; it is more a matter that there were even fewer positive votes. Your School Committee has felt that this vote could not be accepted as a clear mandate for future action on their part. For that reason we concluded that we should now move out into the various sections of the District in an effort to encourage public expression of community

thought on how we might best move to a solution of what has been recognized as our critical need for a new school facility for the middle grades.

Our High School has been growing at a pace even more rapid than our predictions of previous years. In our efforts to keep pace with the ever increasing demands of the improved curriculum upon which we have continually insisted, we have pressed into service every available space within the school. We are proud of the progress we have made in staying abreast of the most promising of the innovative school practices that have come before us for consideration. We must advise you at this time, however, that space limitations have already begun to hurt our planning, and we must very soon come before you with plans for an addition to the school.

In our extra-curricular programs we have shared with so very many of you who have enjoyed the successes of our athletic teams. Soccer had its first full year of scheduling, and while our won-lost record did not deserve a high position in league standings, we were delighted by the display of spirit that was shown throughout by the players, the coaches, and the fans who are so much a part of the success of any team. As our year ended, your School Committee unanimous support to the adoption of Hockey as a new varsity sport. This is a most exciting game that has been gaining widely increased support from other schools throughout the area. Certainly, our athletes have been a great credit to our school community. We encourage your continued support of the activities of each of our school teams.

This has been the year when the voice of the student has been heard throughout our land. We have found that our young men and women at Plymouth-Carver have not been unaware of this phenomenon and that they have proved themselves capable

of providing clear articulation of their thoughts. We have listened to their spokesmen and have tried hard to understand. We know that we share with those of you who are parents in our hope that we have been successful. Indeed, we are pleased to offer our congratulation to the student body for the manner in which they have chosen to express themselves.

Never has our nation known a more difficult time for the adolescent who has been beset on every side by the conflicting philosophies which today abound. They have experienced exposures to which our generation was never subjected. We are proud to feel that the vast majority of them are moving through these trying times with heads held high. We do not feel that we are without problems nor that they exist is less than our full share. It is our belief that our cognizance of problems serves to increase our ability to more effectively cope with them.

It was very early in our new year that Mr. Cavicchi informed us that his new duties as Executive Secretary of the Massachusetts Association of School Committees made impossible the continuation of his service as a Committee member. Indeed, his appointment to this important post was cause for great community pride in the high degree of respect shown him by School Committee officials throughout the State. Al had been with us from the earliest days of Regional Planning and there are no words to properly say how much his service will be missed.

In March we regettably were informed that Mrs. Gellar felt it necessary to decline further service to the Regional Committee. Jane had served with us since our inception and was the wonderfully faithful secretary of our group through the first six years of our existence. Her quiet manner has often helped us maintain a calm that has allowed polite debate, and her knowledge and intuitive understandings of the problems

of people have been of great value in our deliberations.

We are pleased to welcome the return of Mrs. Adeline Keller and the first presence of Mr. Kenneth Peck, Chairman of the Plymouth School Committee, as newly appointed members of our Regional Committee. May they share the pleasure we have known in the continued development of a worthy series of School experiences for our young people, and may we find them possessed of the strength and wisdom to assist us in the development of proper solutions for our present and future problems.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE
PLYMOUTH-CARVER HIGH SCHOOL

With the termination of another calendar year, we at Plymouth-Carver High School feel that a cooperative manner among administration, staff, and students was created to help every student to understand the opportunities open to him for preparing himself for a productive life and to take full advantage of these opportunities.

Grades followed an interesting pattern; 13 per cent of the students made the honor roll, 2 per cent received failing grades, and the overall distribution was as follows:

A 9 per cent; B 33 per cent; C 39 per cent; D 17 per cent; and E 2 per cent.

As measured by standardized tests, the students of Plymouth-Carver High School represent a normal population pattern. Nineteen students were inducted into the National Honor Society, four students received letters of commendation for their achievement on the National Merit Qualifying Test.

Among the professional staff there was less than five per cent turnover. In Mr. Francis-Alen Garcia, our exchange teacher from Spain, we were grateful to have had a man of such energy and wisdom. We at Plymouth-Carver High School salute him for the contributions that he personally made to the language department, and extend our best wishes to him and to his family. Mr. William Johnstone, a member of the Industrial Arts Department, is on a sabbatical leave, studying at Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan, and we welcome back Miss Clare Driscoll from her leave of absence.

The staff continues to grow in number as a direct result of curriculum development and improved teaching conditions. A second Home Economics teacher and two permanent substitute teachers augmented the competency of the staff.

Pupil enrollment continued to increase from 1131 students in September, 1968, to 1230 in September, 1969. Average daily attendance remained fairly constant at 93 per cent. This creditable percentage of attendance is attributable mainly to the health services provided to our students within the school and the personal contact maintained with the home by the school nurse, Dean of Girls, Director of Guidance, administration, and the Supervisor of Attendance.

Many additions were made in up-dating the mathematics curriculum at Plymouth-Carver High School. Honors and accelerated courses have been added to the college preparatory math areas. The basic math areas have been revised so as to meet the needs of those students who are contemplating further studies in a two-year or technical school, or preparing for various work areas after graduation. Computer Math courses are being offered to all grades in the basic and college preparatory courses.

American Negro Literature and Economics were added to the curriculum this past year. All facets of the Home Economics program will be covered with the addition of a second teacher, and this course will be offered to any girl in the high school.

Successes of the athletic teams were major highlights of our sports program during the year. The most significant being the basketball team's winning of the first Old Colony League Playoff Champion, and the girl's field hockey team's being co-champion of their league division with Hingham.

We were extremely pleased to participate in a new educational project called The Presidential Classroom for Young Americans. This project plans to teach government operations and a high school senior, for a concentrated seven day period, is selected to represent his school in Washington, D. C. We were proud to have Paul Ruoizzi represent Plymouth-Carver High School in this program.

In May the State Department of Education initiated a program called the Activities of the Youth Advisory Council. We at Plymouth-Carver High School were asked to participate in this activity, and Miss Linda Harris was chosen as our representative to this organization. The purpose of this program is to get more student involvement in hopes that the young people will act more responsibly when given more responsibility. Other student members of this council are Judith May, Eve Gilmore, Dorothy Pond, and Mark Wirtzburger.

An intra-mural program under the leadership of Mr. Richard Ward has been received with great enthusiasm by many of the students. Gymnastics for boys and girls has been introduced in an evening program under the leadership of Mr. Ward and Miss Linda Pentheny.

The members of the graduating Class of 1969 were extremely fortunate in receiving \$119,760 in scholarship aid. This is an increase of \$45,317 over last year. Of this amount \$22,600 comes to seniors from the local scholarship program. This generosity provides more students with opportunities to continue their studies.

The community can well be proud of the accomplishments during the past year which could not have been achieved without the efforts of the entire faculty. I would like to express my sincere thanks for the fine spirit of cooperation which has come

from the superintendent's office and his staff. We would also like to express our overall thanks to the citizens, service organizations, school personnel, and students who have contributed to strive for quality education at Plymouth-Carver High School.

REPORT OF THE
DIRECTOR OF PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES

1968 — 1969

Continued emphasis has been placed on providing an individual approach for each child in the Plymouth and Carver schools. It was toward this end that the efforts of this department (the Pupil Personnel Services) were directed at the outset of this school year. Pupil Personnel Services incorporate the coordinated efforts of school specialists who provide specific individualized services for each student. Specialists who comprise the pupil personnel staff include elementary and secondary counselors, the school psychologist, the school nurses, the attendance officer, and tutors. Their efforts, coordinated with instructional specialists and classroom teachers, provide a more efficient means by which each student may receive personal assistance. A "team" approach to individual problems has proven most effective.

It is felt that the pupil personnel program has had a positive effect throughout the grades. The counseling programs initiated in the elementary schools of both Plymouth and Carver will be continued. We have noted a marked need for this service in our elementary schools and hope that additional staff may be added in the future for maximum effectiveness. The consultation provided by Dr. Richard Elliott, pediatric consultant to the Plymouth-Carver Schools, has been of great value in the attempt to meet respective individual needs. Weekly referral coordination meetings have been implemented to insure proper action and follow-up of cases for staff study.

At the secondary level we have been fortunate to obtain the services of an additional counselor to meet the needs of our increasing school population. Mrs. Ellen Sidor joined the high school counseling staff in October and is working with students in grades nine through eleven. In addition to additional staff, a computer-oriented occupational and educational information service was incorporated. A teletype console in the guidance office provided direct computer response to student questions relative to occupations, occupational training junior college, and college programs. This system provided a quick up-to-date source of information pertaining to post-secondary training and placement.

In our attempt to provide a meaningful educational experience to our students, a five-year follow-up study of the class of 1964 was conducted. This was the first class to graduate from the Plymouth-Carver High School and their responses have been highly significant and most helpful. Through our community associations it has been noted that there is an apparent need on the part of individuals not presently enrolled in our schools to utilize our counseling services. As a result, the high school counseling staff has scheduled office hours during the evening. The counseling center is open to all citizens of Plymouth and Carver on the first and third Thursday of each month commencing in October and terminating in May.

A program which was initiated last spring has proven to be most productive. In cooperation with Boston University a number of counselor interns are assigned to the Plymouth and Carver Schools. These graduate students are under the direct supervision of an experienced counselor and provide a valuable supplement to our elementary and secondary school counseling staffs. Our present experience with the program is most encouraging.

Plymouth ss. To either of the Constables of the Town of Carver,
Plymouth County, GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and town affairs to meet at the Governor John Carver School House in said Carver on Saturday, the twenty-first day of March 1970, at 12:00 o'clock, noon, then and there to act on the following article, namely:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers, to be voted for all on one ballot, viz.: One Moderator, Three Auditors, each for one year; One Selectman, One Assessor, One member of School Board, One member of Regional District School Committee, One Park Commissioner, One Cemetery Commissioner, Two Library Trustees, each for a term of three years; One member of Planning Board for a term of five years.

The polls will be open for at least eight hours.

And you are directed to further notify said Inhabitants of said Town that as soon as the ballots have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Saturday, March 28, 1970, at 1:00 o'clock P.M., and at that time will reconvene at said Governor John Carver School House, then and there to act on the follow-

ing articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue for the financial years beginning January 1, 1970 and January 1, 1971, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 2. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred ninety-nine dollars and fifty-five cents to pay the following bills, namely:

Article 3. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 4 To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town such salaries to be retroactive to January 1, 1970, as provided by General Laws Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, namely:

Highway Surveyor	\$150.00 per week
Town Treasurer	2,500.00 per annum
Town Clerk	1,600.00 per annum
Tax Collector	2,700.00 per annum

Moderator, \$25.00 for the Annual Town Meeting, and \$10.00 for each Special Town Meeting.

Member of School Board, \$2.50 per hour.

All other elected officers, \$2.50 per hour.

Article 4. Recommended by the Finance Committee that the Highway Surveyor receive \$137.50 per week, and that the remainder of Article 4 remain as stated.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tree Warden, Cemetery Commissioners and Park Commissioners to employ themselves as laborers in the cemeteries, parks, and tree department, and to act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account to the 1970 Reserve Account the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00).

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the unexpended appropriation balance of sixty (\$60.00) dollars from the School Building Plans Account to the School Construction Account.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred fifty dollars and eight cents (\$150.08) a gift from the Carver Senior Girl Scouts, to be used by the Trustees of the Carver Public Library as they see fit.

Article 11. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Library Building Study Committee to be composed of two Library Trustees, the Board of Selectmen, and two members appointed by the Town Moderator.

Article 12. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars for the initial expenses of the Library Building Study Committee.

Article 13. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 14. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Plymouth County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, and to choose a Town Director as provided for in Section 41 and 45 of the General Laws, and act thereon.

Article 14. Recommended that the sum of \$100.00 be raised and appropriated for County Aid to Agriculture, and choose a Town Director as provided in Section 41 and 45 of Chapter 128 of the General Laws.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand (\$4,000.00) dollars for Assessors' Plans, such sum to be used and expended by the Board of Assessors.

Article 15. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to postpone publishing of valuation lists of the Town of Carver, as established in Article IX of the Town By-laws, and act anything thereon or thereto.

Article 16. Recommended by the Finance Committee that publishing of valuation lists be postponed one year.

Article 17. To hear the report of any standing committees and act anything thereon or thereto and to establish any new committees.

Article 17. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee to be known as the Public Works Study Committee to consider and study the advisability and feasibility of establishing a Public Works Department within the Town of Carver. The members of said committee to be composed of the Board of Selectmen, the Town Clerk, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, and two registered voters of the Town of Carver who shall be appointed by the Town Moderator. Said Committee to report at the next annual or special town meeting with their recommendations.

Article 18. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, and to transfer the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to Free Cash in the Treasury.

Article 19. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of five thousand two dollars and sixty-eight cents (\$5,002.68) from proceeds received, or to be received from the Commonwealth under the provisions of Chapter 768, Section 4 of the Acts of 1969, said sum of money to be used for construction work on Tremont and Seipet Streets, and any other streets that may be approved by the Department of Public Works and the Board of Selectmen.

Article 20. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand five hundred (\$8,500.00) dollars for Chapter 90 Highway Construction on Tremont, Seipet, and High Streets, and to transfer the sum of twenty-five thousand five hundred (\$25,500.00) dollars from Free Cash in the Treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to Free Cash in the Treasury, and act thereon.

Article 21. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand seven hundred (\$6,700.00) dollars for Chapter 81 Highways, and to transfer the sum of eighteen thousand four hundred twenty-five (\$18,425.00) dollars from available funds in the Treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored, upon their receipt, to Free Cash in the Treasury.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars for the purpose of entering into an agreement with the towns of Wareham, Marion, and Mattapoisett in an agency known as "The Office of Public Prosecutor", said Agency to provide the town of Carver with a qualified Public Prosecutor who shall render advice and assistance to the Police Department and Board of Selectmen, including the prosecution of court cases for the Police Department.

Article 25. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred (\$600.00) dollars for the purpose of joining with the towns of Middleboro and Lakeville in a Teleprocessing System.

Article 26. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate seven thousand sixty-one dollars and seventy-two cents (\$7,061.72) for the purchase of one 1970 Chevrolet 54-passenger School Bus for the School Department, and act anything thereon and thereto.

Article 27. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the School Committee to dispose of one 1959 Chevrolet school bus now in use, and act anything thereon and thereto.

Article 28. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the Cemetery Funds in the town treasury.

Article 29. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred fifty (\$750.00) dollars to be used to pay for all private work and material in Town Cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 30. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 31. To see what disposition the Town will make of the County Dog Fund.

Article 31. Recommended that the County Dog Fund be applied to the Library Account.

IN MEMORIAM

ELLIS SHERIDAN BUMPUS

1888 — 1969

Ellis Sheridan Bumpus was born December 21, 1888, in the "Bump-Town" section of South Carver, the son of A. Lincoln Bumpus and Hannah Carlson. For many years he was employed as a mechanic with the Hayden Separator Company, and later with the H. R. Bailey Co., manufacturers of Cranberry separators and other equipment used in the Cranberry industry.

Mr. Bumpus was first appointed as a special police officer in the Town of Carver in 1922; in 1923 he was elected constable and served in that capacity until 1955. Ellis Bumpus is best remembered by the residents of South Carver for his conscientious and serious devotion to his duties as a police officer, patrolling the streets of South Carver in the late evening hours on his own time and without compensation.

Mr. Bumpus was married to the former E. Elizabeth Tillson, a native and former teacher in the Carver Schools, who predeceased him; Mr. Bumpus died on July 16, 1969, at a Bridgewater Nursing Home, after being in poor health for several years.
