SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

March 23, 1974

A Special Town Meeting was held on Saturday, March 23, 1974, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated March 6, 1974. The meeting was called to order at 3:00 o'clock, P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott, there being a quorum present. Thereupon, the meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in said Warrant, as follows:

Article 1. Voted, unanimously, to appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the Local School Building Committee and that such sum be provided by transfer from the School Appropriation.

Article 2. Voted to accept the report of the Carver Council on Aging as establishing facts indicating the need among families and elderly persons of low-income within the Town of Carver for a local housing authority within the Town to provide housing for such families and persons. (The written report of the Committee is on file with the Town Clerk).

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote, after having established the need for a local housing authority, to establish a local housing authority for the purpose of providing housing for families and elderly persons of low-income. Article duly moved and seconded.

The matter was discussed by several speakers and some of the legal aspects of the matter were explained by Town Counsel, Donald L. Connors, Esq. Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Lawrence Carter, duly seconded, it was Voted to refer the entire subject matter to a Study Committee consisting of five (5) members to be appointed by the Moderator and the Board of Selectmen, said Committee to report its findings at a Special Town Meeting or at the next Annual Town Meeting.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously Voted to adjourn.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 23, 1974

The Annual Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School House on Saturday, March 23, 1974, pursuant to the Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated February 18, 1974. The meeting was called to order at 1:00 o'clock, P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott, there being a quorum present. Town Counsel, Donald L. Connors, Esq., was present throughout the meeting. The Carver Boy Scout Troop presented the colors and led the Pledge of Allegiance. The Rev. James M. Gibbons, Pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes R.C. Church, gave the invocation. The following persons were appointed Tellers to count the votes and were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties: Elizabeth F. Ryder, Anita Fernandes, Grace Testa, Raymond Jarvio, Jean Gibbs, Susan Callahan, Domingo Fernandes and Robert Telless.

Article 1 of the Warrant, relating to the election of Town Officers, having been disposed of at a prior meeting, the meeting proceeded to act on the remaining Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 2. Voted, unanimously, to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1974, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 3. Voted, unanimously, to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided by General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, namely:

Town Treasurer	\$2,500 per Annum
Town Clerk	\$2,000 per Annum
Tax Collector	\$4,500 per Annum
Moderator	\$25 for the Annual Town Meeting and \$10 for each Special Town Meeting
Member of School Board	\$2.50 per hour
Chairman, Board of Selectmen	\$1,300 per Annum
Two Members, Board of Selectmen	\$1,100 per Annum
All other Elected Officers	\$2.50 per hour

Article 4. To raise and appropriate sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges from July 1, 1974 to June 30, 1975.

The meeting proceeded to consider the various items in the

Summary (so-called). After Item 33 (Snow Removal) was considered, Selectman Walter W. Correia moved to recess until 3:00 o'clock, P.M., and then reconvene for the Special Town Meeting. Recessed at 2:50 P.M. Reconvened in Special Town Meeting at 3:00 P.M. Special Town Meeting, adjourned at 4:50 P.M. and Annual Town Meeting was reconvened.

Motion, duly seconded, to adjourn Annual Town Meeting and to reconvene on Monday, March 25, 1974, at 7:00 o'clock P.M. So voted.

Article 5. Voted, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the Reserve Account.

Article 6. Voted, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be expended by the Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service, and choose a Director in accordance with the provisions of General Laws of Massachusetts, Chapter 128, Sections 41 and 42. Thereupon, Mrs. Jean O. Gibbs was unanimously elected Director, County Aid to Agriculture.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,910.78 to pay the following unpaid bills of 1970 and 1971:

Article 8. Voted, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 and to transfer the sum of \$4,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing, equipping and installing a 10,000 gallon gasoline tank.

Article 9. Voted, unanimously, to transfer the sum of \$2,000.00 from the State Aid for Free Libraries Account to the Library Account for the sole purpose of buying additional books.

Article 10. Voted, unanimously that the County Dog Fund (\$1,263.60) be applied to the Library Account.

Article 11. Voted, unanimously, to hear the report of any standing committee and to establish any new Committees.

Thereupon, Mr. Doherty reported for the "Private Roads Study Committee." (No written report submitted.)

Mr. Samuel Ridder reported for the Personnel Board. (No written report).

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Voted to accept the foregoing reports.

Upon motion of Mr. William R. Holmes, duly seconded, it was Voted "to establish a committee of five, consisting of one member of the Department of Public Works, one member Board of Selectmen, one member of Finance Committee, and two persons appointed by the Moderator for the purpose of studying the needs for a new Town Barn."

Upon motion of Mr. Frank R. Mazzilli, duly seconded, it was Voted "to establish a committee of five (5) to revise and update the Town By-Laws. One member to be the Town Clerk, and four members to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen. Said committee to report back to the next Annual Town Meeting."

Article 12. Voted, unanimously, to designate as Scenic Roads the following: Savery's Avenue, Lakeview Street, and Indian Street, in accordance with Chapter 40, Section 15C of the General Laws.

Article 13. Voted, unanimously, to sell to the Historical Society, for the sum of \$1.00, the No. 22 — 1942 Maxim Built Ford Fire Truck to be restored and used in Parades and at Public Gatherings, provided said Truck remains in the possession of the Historical Society.

Article 14. Voted, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,304.69 to purchase one 1974 Chevrolet 65 passenger School Bus for the School Department. Said appropriation to be expended under direction of the School Committee.

Article 15. Voted, unanimously to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to be expended under the direction of the Board of Health for providing cooperative or complementary facilities to out-patient clinics established or to be established in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 19 of the Massachusetts General Laws, in cooperation with the Department of Mental Health and other agencies collaborating with said Department and for providing payments for services rendered or to be rendered by such public or private agencies.

Article 16. Voted, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be used for State Aid Improvement (Highways) in conjunction with any available State and County Funds, and to transfer the additional sum of \$2,000.00 from free cash in the Treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to free cash in the Treasury.

Article 17. Voted, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500.00 which may be used for State Aid Construction in conjunction with any available State and County Funds, and in addition, to borrow the sum of \$43,845.00 to meet the State's and

County's share of the cost of this work, reimbursements received therefrom to be returned to available funds.

Article 18. Voted, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of constructing a new tomb at the Central Cemetery.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,500.00 for a drainage account to be expended by the Department of Public Works on various town streets where drainage problems exist, and act anything thereon or thereto. Considerable discussion followed after article was duly moved and seconded. Voice vote was in doubt. Thereupon, standing vote being had and none voting in the affirmative, the motion was declared Lost.

Article 20. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for a new two or three yard dump body for the Department of Public Works.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for the purpose of graveling, otherwise preparing, penetrating, and oiling graveled roads that are accepted Public Ways within the Town of Carver and act anything thereon or thereto. Article was duly moved and seconded. Standing vote being had, the Moderator declared the motion lost.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing a new Street Sweeper for the Carver Public Works Department and to act anything thereon or thereto.

Mr. William R. Holmes then moved that the Town vote to transfer from Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of \$20,000.00 for the purpose set forth in the foregoing Article. Motion was duly seconded. After considerable discussion, voice vote being had, the Moderator declared the motion Lost.

At this time, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Voted to adjourn until Saturday, March 30, 1974, at 1:00 o'clock, P.M., at the Governor John Carver School.

Adjourned at 9:55 P.M.

**ADJOURNED SESSION OF
ANNUAL TOWN MEETING**

March 30, 1974

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting was called to order at 1:00 o'clock, P.M., Saturday, March 30, 1974, by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott. As a quorum was not present at that time, the Moderator declared a recess until a quorum appeared.

Town Counsel, Donald L. Connors, Esq., was present throughout the meeting. A quorum appeared at 1:12 P.M., and the meeting proceeded to act on the remaining Article in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 23. Voted, to transfer the sum of \$29,014.00 from the proceeds received or to be received from the State under the provisions of Section 20, Chapter 1140, Acts of 1973, for the construction of Wareham Street and South Meadow Road and any other work permitted under the provisions of said Act on such roads within the Town as may be approved by the Board of Selectmen and the Massachusetts Department of Public Works.

Article 24. Voted, unanimously, to transfer the sum of \$5,129.91 which was left from Safety Island, Tremont and Lakeview Streets, Article 30 of the 1973 Annual Town Meeting. Also, to transfer the sum of \$1,999.45 which was left from School Zone Lights on Route 58 at Governor John Carver School, Article 29 of the 1973 Annual Town Meeting, and appropriate said sums to be used for the installation of Traffic Safety Islands in order to channelize the traffic at the intersection of Purchase and Main Street (Route 58) in North Carver, said sum to be 100 per cent reimbursed by the State under Chapter 90, Section 338 of the General Laws in accordance with Chapter 44, Section 6A of the General Laws.

Article 25. Voted, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 to be used to pay for all private work and material in town cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 26. Voted, unanimously, to appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 from available funds in the treasury for the sole purpose of meeting the charges against the cemetery funds in the town treasury.

Article 27. Voted, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,670.00 for Chapter 81 Highways to meet the Town's share and to authorize and empower the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow the sum of \$18,345.00 in anticipation of reimbursement to meet the State's share of the cost of the work in accordance with Chapter 44, Section 6A of the General Laws.

Article 28. Voted, unanimously, to appropriate from Free Cash the sum of \$13,000 to be used for the purpose of purchasing and installing a new Traffic Control Device at the intersection of Plymouth Street (Route 44) and North Main Street (Route 58) in North Carver, said sum to be 100 per cent reimbursed by the State under Chapter 90, Section 33B of the General Laws.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing one new station wagon type cruiser and to trade in one 1973 station wagon type cruiser for the Police Department.

Police Chief Thomas S. Orr moved the Article as written, but deleting the words "station wagon type" and substituting the figure \$3,500.00 in place of \$4,000.00. Motion was duly seconded. Considerable discussion followed and various amendments to the original motion were offered. All motions for amendments were defeated. Standing vote being had on the original motion and 30 voting in the affirmative with 54 opposed, the motion was defeated.

Motion duly made and seconded to reconsider Article 29. On voice vote the motion to reconsider was declared Lost.

Article 30. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one additional Patrolman under the provisions of existing Civil Service Rules and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,800.00.

Article 31. Upon motion by Selectman Walter W. Correia, duly seconded, it was unanimously Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,250.00 and to transfer the sum of \$10,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of providing dispatching services for the Fire and Police Departments.

Article 32. Upon motion by Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Richard F. Ward, duly seconded, it was unanimously Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 and to transfer the sum of \$2,500.00 from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account to purchase and install a tone alerting and control system to the existing Fire Radio System.

Article 33. Re: Vacation Schedule for Town Employees. Article as appearing in the Warrant was duly moved and seconded. Mr. Thomas F. Harty, Clerk of the Personnel Board, offered motions for certain amendments to the Article as appearing in the Warrant, duly seconded. After considerable discussion of the matter, motion was made to "lay on the table," duly seconded. A two-thirds vote on the motion being required, standing vote was had, with 68 voting in the affirmative and 22 opposed, it was Voted that the motion be "Tabled."

Article 34. Re: Sick Leave Schedule for Town Employees. Mr. Thomas F. Harty made motion, duly seconded, said motion being an amended version of the Article as appearing in the Warrant, a written copy of which is on file with the Town Clerk. Selectman Walter W. Correia stated that the matter of sick leave would be negotiated when the Police Department members join a Union. Town Counsel explained certain phases of the "Collective Bargaining Law" as it relates to this matter. After considerable discussion, voice vote being had on the main question, the motion was declared Lost.

At this time (3:15 P.M.) a 15-minute recess was declared. Meeting resumed at 3:30 P.M.

Article 35. Re: Acceptance of General Law Chapter 262, Section 53C, relating to extra compensation, etc., for Police Officers attending Court, etc. Article as appearing in the Warrant was duly moved and seconded. After some discussion of the matter, Mr. Richard F. Ward, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, moved that the matter be indefinitely postponed. Motion was duly seconded, and it was So Voted.

Article 36. Re: Overtime pay, etc. for Police Officers. Article as appearing in the Warrant was duly moved and seconded. Thereupon, motion was made and seconded to "postpone indefinitely," and it was So Voted.

Article 37. Re: Change of By-Laws. Article duly moved and seconded. Thereupon, Selectman Walter W. Correia moved that the motion be amended by changing Section 1 so as to keep Polls open until 8:00 P.M. Motion duly seconded and it was unanimously So Voted.

Thereupon, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously Voted to adopt the following amendments to the By-Laws:

ARTICLE 1. — Section 1. The Annual Town Meeting shall be held for the election of officers on the second Saturday in May at 10:00 o'clock A.M. The polls shall be open until 8:00 o'clock, P.M., and as soon as the ballots are counted the meeting shall be adjourned to the following Saturday at 1:00 o'clock, P.M. for the transaction of municipal business.

ARTICLE I — Section 6. The Articles to be acted upon at the Annual Town Meeting in May shall be in the hands of the Board of Selectmen on or before March 15th preceding said meeting.

ARTICLE VII — Section 3. On or before the fifteenth day of June it shall be the duty of the Moderator to call the organization meeting of the Finance Committee.

ARTICLE VIII — Section 11. On or before February 21 of each year the Officers, Boards, or Committees having charge of expenditures of the Town's money shall transmit in writing, to the Finance Committee, their estimate of expenditures for the conduct of their departments for the next fiscal year. On or before March 15 the same officers shall present to the Finance Committee, in writing, a detailed list of the expenditures for the fiscal year previous.

Article 38. Motion by Mr. Walter W. Correia "to authorize the Board of Selectmen to designate five (5) acres of land, purchased from Emily Adams King under Article No. 10 of the 1973 Annual Town Meeting Warrant, to be used as a recreation site for the Town, and to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of \$13,000.00 to be expended by the Recreation Committee and

the Selectmen in preparing and equipping the site. Said site to be under the control of the Recreation Committee and maintained by the Department of Public Works." Motion was duly seconded and it was So Voted.

Article 39. Mr. William R. Holmes, Chairman of the Board of Public Works, moved to apply the \$500.00 gift from Peter Mazzilli to the construction and installation of a chain link fence at the Center Carver Ballfield. The motion was ruled out of order upon advice of Town Counsel who stated that he believed that the motion was "not within the scope of the Article."

Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, it was Voted to accept as a gift from Peter F. Mazzilli the sum of \$500.00 to help defray the charges of constructing and equipping ballfields located on the newly purchased King property.

Article 40. Voted, to accept as a gift, a parcel of land from Frank R. and Peter F. Mazzilli of Carver, Massachusetts, between Old Main Street and Route 58, bounded and described as follows:

A small triangle of land situated Easterly by said Route 58 and there measuring about 100 feet; Northwesterly by Old Main Street and there measuring about 83 feet; Southerly by what was supposed to be formerly the Meeting House Road, and there measuring about 30 feet.

Being the same premises conveyed to Mazzilli Builders, Inc. by deed of Clarence Theo Thomas et al dated July 25, 1963, and recorded in Plymouth County Registry of Deeds in Book 3037, Page 340. This parcel of land is to be used for re-channelizing traffic to Route 58 by the Department of Public Works of Carver.

Article 41. Voted, to accept the name "Cranberryland, U.S.A." as the trademark for the Town of Carver.

At this time, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Voted to adjourn to Monday, April 1, 1974, at 7:00 o'clock, P.M.

Adjourned at 4:45 P.M.

ADJOURNED SESSION ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

April 1, 1974

Meeting called to order at 7:00 o'clock P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott. A quorum was not present at that time and the Moderator declared a recess until such time as a quorum appeared. Quorum present at 7:12 P.M. and the meeting proceeded to act on the remaining Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 42. To see if the Town will vote to accept Section 6H of Chapter 40 of the General Laws relating to private ways, or take any other action with respect thereto. Article duly moved and seconded,

and there was considerable discussion of the matter. Town Counsel, Ted Cohn, Esq., stated that the only action the Town could take was either to accept or reject. A motion to lay on the table, duly seconded, was defeated, a two-thirds vote being required and 54 voting in the affirmative with 57 opposed. A motion by Mr. Robert Hitchcock to specify certain roads upon which work could be done was ruled "out of order."

Thereupon, standing vote being had on the main question, 38 voting in the affirmative and 63 opposed, the motion to accept Chapter 40, Section 6H was defeated.

Article 43. Article duly moved and seconded. Clark Griffith moved to amend the motion by inserting at the end of the Article as appearing in the Warrant, the following words: "and to direct the Board of Selectmen to search the title of this parcel and examine the General Laws to determine that this transfer is legal." Motion for amendment was duly seconded, and it was So Voted. Town Counsel, Ted Cohn, Esq., said that in his opinion the land in question was a portion of the Park System of the Town of Carver, and that, therefore, the land could not be transferred without authority from the General Court.

Thereupon, Standing Vote being had on the original Article as amended, 98 voting in the affirmative and 8 opposed, it was Voted "to exchange lands with Clark A. & Marjorie Griffith, receiving the lot shown on Assessors' Sheet No. 1 Lot 1A containing about 0.05 acres on Lakeview Street described as follows:

Beginning at the most westerly corner of the described lot at a point in the northeasterly sideline of Lakeview Street at the southeasterly corner of land belonging to the Town of Carver, thence in line of said Town of Carver land N78°02'10"E a distance of 60 feet to the shore of Sampson's Pond; thence southwesterly by the shoreline of Sampson's Pond a distance of approximately 60 feet to the Lakeview Street sideline; thence northwesterly along said sideline of Lakeview Street a distance of 105 feet to the point of beginning.

Giving in exchange a piece of land containing about 0.07 acres shown on Assessors' Sheet No. 1, Lot 1 on Lakeview Street described as follows:

Beginning at the most westerly corner of the described parcel at a point, marked by a spike, in the northeasterly sideline of Lakeview Street at the southeasterly corner of land belonging to Emma F. Dunham; thence N10°49'20"W in line of land of said Emma F. Dunham a distance of 83.63 feet to a drill hole in a stone on the shore of Sampson's Pond; thence by the shore of Sampson's Pond by a line running southerly, easterly and then northeasterly a distance of 245 feet to a concrete bound; thence S35°00'W a distance of 75 feet to a concrete bound in the northeasterly sideline of Lakeview Street;

thence northwesterly along said northeasterly sideline of said Lakeview Street 73.13 feet to a turning point thence still along said northeasterly sideline of said Lakeview Street a distance of 12.98 feet to the point of beginning. Being the northwesterly portion of Lot 1 as shown on Sheet 1 of the Town of Carver Assessors' Plans.

And to direct the Board of Selectmen to search the title of this parcel and examine the General Laws to determine that this transfer is legal.

Article 44. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following By-Law as recommended by the Leash Law Study Committee. (The full text of the proposed By-Law is printed in the Warrant and is incorporated herein by reference.)

After considerable discussion and several motions for amendment, etc., Mr. Carl Sampson moved to table the Article "until the next Annual Town Meeting at which time the Leash Law Study Committee present the actual cost of enforcing such a law in the Town of Carver in terms of

1. Full time Dog Officer which will be necessary.
2. Kennels which will be required by the State and satisfactory to the enforcement officer.
3. Vehicle for the enforcement officer to apprehend and transport such animals as may be required."

Motion to table was duly seconded. Voice vote not being unanimous and a two-thirds being required, a standing vote was had with 76 voting in the affirmative and 38 opposed, and it was Voted to table the motion. Motion was made to recount the votes, and the motion was ruled "out of order."

Article 45. Voted, unanimously, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be used by the Board of Selectmen for services rendered to Carver residents at the Half-Way House in Plymouth, a cooperative facility for alcoholics.

Article 46. Upon motion by Selectman Walter W. Correia, duly seconded, it was Voted to transfer the sum of \$48,356.00 from the proceeds received or to be received from the State under the provisions of Section 22, Chapter 1140, Acts of 1973, for the purpose of reconstruction, maintenance, and repair of public highways and bridges, the amount to be used for Rochester Road and Pope's Point Road or any other approved by the Board of Selectmen.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously Voted to adjourn.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

July 1, 1974

A Special Town Meeting was held on July 1, 1974, at the Governor John Carver School, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated June 19, 1974. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M., by the Town Clerk, the Moderator, Mr. Robert O. Mott, not being present. As a quorum was not present at that time, a recess was declared until such time as a quorum appeared. The meeting was then called to order again at about 7:45 P.M., at which time Town Counsel, Ted Cohn, Esq., explained that if the meeting were adjourned to a date beyond Friday, July 5, 1974, that Article 6, relating to the approval of the Bond Issue for the Regional Refuse Disposal Facility would be automatically accepted inasmuch as the law provides that disapproval must be voted within 30 days of the date of authorization of the Bond Issue. Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, it was Voted to recess until 8:30 P.M. to await the appearance of a quorum.

At 8:35 P.M., it appeared, by actual count of the voters present, that a quorum (75 voters) had appeared. Thereupon, nomination being had, duly seconded, Mr. Frank R. Mazzilli was unanimously elected Temporary Moderator, and the meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. Voted, unanimously, to transfer the sum of \$10,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of repairing and renovation the Town House.

Article 2. Voted, unanimously to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing, equipping, and installing a 10,000 gallon gasoline tank, said amount being in addition to the amount voted under Article 8 of the Annual Town Meeting 1974.

Article 3. Re: Purchase of land from Orrie S. Dempsey. Voice vote being had on the motion to purchase the land the motion to purchase, as set forth in Article 3, was defeated.

Article 4. Upon motion by Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, duly seconded, it was Voted "to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of \$3,200.00, and to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new police cruiser station wagon to be used by the Police Department, and to trade in a 1973 Chevrolet police cruiser station wagon known as Cruiser No. 26.

Article 5. Voted, to transfer the sum of \$2,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account to the Public Library for the purpose of purchasing audio-visual and office equipment.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Voted to approve the additional \$125,000.00 indebtedness authorized on June 5, 1974, by the Regional Refuse Disposal District Committee of the

Carver, Marion and Wareham Regional Refuse District for the purpose of constructing and originally equipping a district refuse disposal facility.

There being no further business, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously Voted to adjourn.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

September 30, 1974

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, September 30, 1974, pursuant to a warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated September 19, 1974. The meeting was

called to order at 7:35 P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott. As 150 voters are required to constitute a quorum where a Bond Issue is to be voted upon, the Moderator declared a recess until such time as the required number of voters appeared. Town Counsel, Donald L. Connors, Esq., was present throughout the meeting. At 7:45 P.M. a quorum appeared and the meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 1. Upon motion by Mr. Erwin K. Washburn, duly seconded, it was unanimously Voted "that the Town authorize the School Committee to evaluate and recommend a site or sites for future school use. The School Committee shall submit progress reports and recommendations at either a special or annual Town Meeting."

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, standing vote being had, with 155 voting in the affirmative and 23 opposed, it was Voted "That the sum of \$2,615,000.00 be and hereby is appropriated for the enlargement of the Governor John Carver Elementary School by constructing, originally equipping and furnishing an addition thereto; that to meet said appropriation, the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen is hereby authorized to borrow the sum of \$2,615,000.00 at one time or from time to time under and pursuant to Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948, as amended, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor."

Article 3. Voted, unanimously, to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the \$13,000.00 which was voted under Article 28 at the last Annual Town Meeting for the purpose of installing new traffic signals at the junction of Plymouth and North Main Streets in North Carver (Routes 58 and 44).

Article 4. Voted, unanimously, to transfer the sum of \$400.00 from the State Aid for Public Libraries Account to the Public Library for the purpose of cataloging books.

Article 5. Article duly moved and seconded. Thereupon, Mr. Perry Cox presented the Report of the Police Building Study Committee, a copy of which is on file with the Town Clerk. Thereupon, it was Voted to accept the report of the Police Building Study Committee.

Article 6. Voted to retain the members of the Police Building Study Committee to serve as the Police Building Committee, until dissolved by vote of an annual or special town meeting.

Article 7. Voted, unanimously, to establish a study committee to study the need for a site for a town water supply. Such committee to be made up of a member of the Board of Health, a Selectmen, a Planning Board member, and two registered voters of the Town, one of whom shall be a member of the Conservation Commission, to

be appointed by the Town Moderator. Said committee to report at the next Annual Town Meeting.

Article 8. To hear the report of the Housing Authority Study Committee. Article duly moved and seconded. Thereupon, Mr. Frederick E. Simmons presented the Report of the Housing Authority Study Committee, a copy of which is filed with the Town Clerk. Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously Voted to accept the report of the Housing Authority Study Committee.

Article 9. Re: Establishment of Local Housing Authority. Voted, after having established the need for a local housing authority, to establish a local housing authority for the Town of Carver pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 121B of the General Laws for the purpose of providing housing for families and elderly persons of low-income.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously Voted to adjourn.

Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project

In reporting the Project's activities for 1974, we have been able to continue our primary objectives in each town or city. Namely, the reduction of the mosquito population at source of breeding. This was accomplished by water management projects and periodic treatment of known breeding areas.

Light snows coupled with normal rain fall produced a moderate influx of mosquitoes in the earlier part of the season. Dry weather became more prevalent in July, and with a complete and comprehensive program carried out by the Project using thermal and aerosol foggers, mist blowers and periodic treatment of breeding areas, the mosquito population decreased considerably.

Although the possible vector counts of mosquitoes was very low, two cases of Eastern Equine Encephalitis were reported in Plymouth County. These cases were confirmed by the State Department of Communicable Diseases; one of which was a human case, the other a horse. Mist blowers and ultra-low volume aerosol foggers were used by the Project in immediate response to the troubled areas. The State Department of Public Health with information supplied by the Lakeville Encephalitis Field Station and the cooperation of Plymouth County Mosquito Control, undertook an aerial spray program in mid-September. This included parts of Plymouth, Bristol and Norfolk Counties and covered 82,505 acres. The cycle was broken and no further cases were reported.

The following is a summary of the total work accomplished in Project towns in the past year in Plymouth County. Aerial spray 8,260 acres, ground spray 34,730 acres, hand spray 915 acres, catch basins treated 11,700, hand clearing of streams 62,975 feet, inland and salt marsh maintenance of streams and ditches with power equipment 26,760 feet.

The fine cooperation of your town officers and department heads has been most gratifying.

The Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service's office is located on High Street, Hanson and can be reached by calling 293-3541 or 447-5946.

This is repetitious but for the information of new residents, we are the educational arm of the University of Massachusetts and the U.S.D.A. at the county level. This is where the name "Cooperative Extension" is derived.

We have many and varied educational programs.

Free bulletins are on display at our office on lawn care, gardening, nutrition, home canning and freezing, to name just a few. If you pass our office on your travels, stop and visit us.

The number of soil samples tested continues to increase each year which is a free service to the Plymouth County residents. This year, with more gardeners, we were swamped with soil samples.

Posters and leaflets describing our staff services have been placed in every town hall and library in the county along with timely leaflets for distribution. With more food production and preservation by home gardeners, our Home Economists are available for advice. Citizens are encouraged to bring to the attention of their Town Director any suggestions to improve our services.

Plymouth County continues to have the most active 4-H Program in Massachusetts. Increased enrollment continues in our new Urban 4-H program and we have had added to our staff a new Associate 4-H Agent's position. 4-H has become more than just "cows and cookies" and varied programs are available for all young people.

Librarian's Report for the Year 1974

Selectmen

Town of Carver

Gentlemen:

The year 1974 was a year of growth and much change in personnel. Mrs. DeLucia resigned as Head Librarian and I, Mrs. Harvey Carleton, replaced her July 1st. Mrs. Turpin and Mr. Christianson both resigned in the summer and were replaced by Lynn Vaughan. Mrs. Jarvio, a volunteer, was hired to fill Lynn's position as Aide. Part-time help funded by the Youth Program saw service by four high school students, with Jan Orzechowski beginning her duties in October. There were also several volunteers who contributed much to providing service to patrons.

The Story Hour for preschoolers, the summer reading program for elementary children, and the visitation of the elementary children to the library in the spring were rewarding experiences for the children and the library as well. In the spring, Mrs. DeLucia conducted a 10-week session for three to five year olds with six volunteer story-tellers. Sessions were once a week. In the fall, I welcomed twelve volunteers coordinated by Mrs. Kathy Glynn. An added convenience for parents bringing the children in the fall was the opportunity to stay at the library to browse and or to have coffee and visit in the Atwood Room.

The elementary children came to the library in the spring by classes, were given a tour, and each child received an application card for a borrower's card. They also had the opportunity to participate in a summer reading program and receive a certificate. Formal programs held for them included a craft workshop under the direction of Mrs. June Beaton and a film.

A service provided to the schools has been the obtaining of films and books as well as providing a monthly list of new books added to the library through purchases.

The film program presented at Thanksgiving was attended by 75 adults and children.

Exhibits of varied and interesting subjects have been in the display case each month. In addition, paintings of local artists have been viewed by patrons.

Many people were in the library during Old Home Day to see a number of craft demonstrations.

A service of which many townspeople are taking advantage is the coin-metered photocopier that was installed in May.

To make the library more efficient and easier to use, my able staff, volunteers, and I have revamped the card catalog, indexed all magazines, and are taking an inventory of books. The catalog now has juvenile, young adult, and adult books interfiled, but is divided by author, title and subject. Also, a shelf list is being completed so that there is a record of the collection. An evaluation of the collection is being made as fast as time will permit and weak areas filled in through purchases and loans from the Eastern Massachusetts Regional Library System. An information file has been implemented, and here again, progress will be made as fast as time and manpower will permit.

Donations of books (both hard-cover and paperback) and magazines by townspeople are much appreciated. The paperbacks are not catalogued, but patrons can browse and select from approximately 700 books.

On July 1st, library hours were increased from 21 to 25. Hours are:

Monday and Thursday	2-8
Tuesday	2-9
Saturday	10-4

Hardcover books added through purchases and donations during the year totaled 465. In addition, were the approximately 700 paperbacks donated. Three newspapers were added, and fourteen magazines.

Many more people are now using the library. 405 new borrower's cards were issued including 11 non-resident. This is 50 more than last year. Circulation increased, but is not reflected in the count because the State mandated a change in the method of counting. The present method is, however, more realistic since the old way counted a number of books two and three times for one circulation. The circulation figures for the year are 13,118.

Plans for 1975 and the future are to make the library the focal point of the community with the provision of services to meet the needs of everyone. Access to a variety of information, as well as recreational reading, viewing, and listening are objectives..

I wish to thank all who have made this last half of 1974 a gratifying experience for me. I can not name each one by one, but I refer to my able staff, volunteers, townspeople, town officials, and the Library Trustees.

Report of the Board of Health

This has been a year of great improvement in the Board of Health. In March Mr. Charles Erwin was elected to a three year term, after serving one year filling an appointed position.

After much investigation, study, meetings, etc., a complete set of well and sewerage regulations and regulations governing horses, cows, goats, swine and poultry, etc., were issued on September 17, 1974. All sewerage systems in Carver must now be approved and inspected by a Registered Professional Engineer experienced in sewerage disposal.

Samples of water from all bathing ponds were tested from May through September to insure safe bathing water.

The South Carver Dump has been closed permanently and the Carver Board of Health has cooperated with the towns of Marion and Wareham to open the Regional Refuse Disposal Facility. The Board of Health was instrumental in closing the North Carver Dump and will aid the State Department of Public Health in having the area completed properly.

Numerous health complaints have been received and investigated and cases satisfactorily closed.

All members completed the course on Responsibilities and Functions of the Board of Health conducted by the State Department of Public Health.

\$3,212.11 has been turned over to the town treasury as receipts from licenses, percolation tests, etc.

The Board of Health appreciates the cooperation and assistance received from the Builders, Installers, State Department of Public Health, Selectmen, Planning Board and citizens of the town. Without this cooperation the duties of the Board would have been far more difficult to perform.

During 1974 the workload increased dramatically, an increase of 111 home visits over 1973, and the school population of 606 has increased significantly making the nurses work much more difficult. This has caused an increase in hours for the assistant nurse and finally in November, Mrs. Loretta Look, R.N., was hired to be part-time nurse.

Again we were recertified by Medicare and rehabilitation services were available to Carver residents through our Easter Seals contract, consisting of occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy and social services. We also have con-

tinued to utilize our contract with the Greater Brockton Homemaker Services Inc. for home health aides when it has been necessary.

The immunization clinics were held for preschool and school children as well as a flu clinic for senior citizens. T.B. testing of all school personnel from the Governor John Carver School and the Benjamin Ellis School were performed in compliance with the State Board of Health.

Many conferences with professional personnel and official agencies were held throughout the year to improve and assist the children and residents of Carver.

We wish to thank the members of our Advisory Committee for all their assistance this past year and look forward to an even more rewarding year meeting the health needs of Carver.

Gentlemen:

The Carver Board of Public Works wishes to report on its activities for the past year.

A new tomb was constructed at the Center Cemetery of cement block construction with a brick face and an asphalt shingle roof. This tomb gives us good storage and also opens up the road to the newest area in the rear of the cemetery.

A new chainlink fence was erected at the Center Ball Field eliminating the old, rotted wood fence which was dangerous to players.

The new state program of Chapter 1140, Section 22 state aid funds has been a great asset to the town. This has helped to carry on projects such as drainage and roadside improvements for which no other money was available. The Board was able, through this fund, to purchase a used road grader of the same type as our old one but in very good condition. This will enable us to grade for several years at a very small expense.

Pleasant Street was penetrated and sealed eliminating another gravel road.

Chapter 90 reconstruction was completed on Tremont Street between South Main Street and Lakeview Street. A continuation of this project at Little Pond (Foundry Pond) was started. A large pipe was placed under the road and drainage pipe is ready to be installed as the next phase.

The Board is in the process of inspecting and rating bridges in town for posting of weight limits as mandated by State Law.

Many hours were devoted to study and planning for Federal Road leading to the new regional dump. The regional committee has agreed to maintain the road until it is reconstructed. They also have agreed to a plan for reconstructing the road for the entire length. This will be at the expense of the region.

Labor costs are up 10 percent over last year as a result of the new negotiated contract. Overtime, sick leave, Holiday and vacation pay are also a part of the contract. These are expenses new to the Public Works budgets.

Insurance rules and inspection has condemned our air compressor causing us to expend funds for a new compressor. This is an

unforeseen expenditure which drains our funds. Our expenses in all areas are up sharply reflecting the inflationary economy we live in. It is very difficult for us to remain within budgeted figures which are drawn up many months before they are to be spent. Our state funds help out in this area but less road work is done each time expenses eat into the budgeted funds.

The cooperation of elected and appointed officials, Supt. Ralph Stevens, and our loyal employees is greatly appreciated. Without them we could not function.

Report of the Veterans' Services

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen
Town of Carver, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

Many Legislative Acts in 1974 affected the Veterans' Services Benefits. The enactment of the Supplementary Security Insurance (S.S.I.) as of January 1, 1974, provided a monthly income plus medical insurance for the aged, blind and disabled from the Federal Government. Your Agent-Director assisted many recipients of veterans' benefits who qualified to apply for S.S.I. which resulted in savings of more than \$10,000.00 for the taxpayers of the Town of Carver.

The Comprehensive Employment Training Act (C.E.T.A.) Program signed by former President Richard M. Nixon, December 28, 1973, released federal funds to assist the unemployed, job-seekers, people who needed training or other help to secure and hold jobs. These programs are coordinated by the Director of Manpower Affairs making funds available to prime sponsors, generally a State, City, County or a combination of such local government units. Plymouth County is a sponsor with ten (10) towns in the Consortium one of which is, Carver. Your Agent is a member of the Ancillary Manpower Board (A.M.P.B.) of Plymouth County Consortium. Through the affiliations of your Veterans' Agent who is a member of the A.M.P.B. and sub-committee member of the Public Service Employment (P.S.E.) of Plymouth County, the Agent has enabled veterans and their dependents and non-veterans to work under Title II and VI of P.S.E.

Referrals to business and industries are services offered to the veteran who is work oriented or wishes to continue in higher education programs. There have been several increases in veterans compensation, pensions and benefits during the year 1974. Social Security Benefits have also reflected increases due to the cost of living expenses and the state of economy. President Gerald R. Ford has extended unemployment compensations to a total of (52) weeks including those who were formally ineligible because of state, federal and municipal employment. The Veterans' Service Office continues to help all veterans and their dependents during their needs for benefits, waiting period for their unemployment checks and procuring job positions.

From August 1973 to June 30, 1974, the clerical assistance of the Veterans' Services Office, worked nine (9) hours per week. As of July 1, 1974, twenty (20) hours was allocated and a new clerical assistant was employed in August 1974 and is completing her on the job training period by the Veterans' Agent.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT-DIRECTOR

To the members of the Regional Vocational Technical High School District Committee and the residents of Acushnet, Carver, Mattapoisett and Rochester.

This annual report is offered with the express purpose of reporting and summarizing the activities and plans of the Old Colony Regional Vocational Technical High School District. A summary report of the District Treasurer is attached, as it relates to the eighteen (18) month budget period of January 1, 1973 through June 30, 1974.

The year on which we are currently reporting is one in which we have undertaken the construction of the Old Colony Regional School, by any measure, the most significant step yet taken by the District Committee. The pivotal problem confronting the District Committee in 1974 was: to create a plant that would facilitate up-to-the-minute instruction in some fifteen (15) separate and distinct occupational areas—with a built-in allowance for future expansion of this curriculum pattern in concert with enrollment growth.

Arriving at a solution wasn't an easy task. Pursuing their goal led them through a year of intensive planning. The resulting school plans reflect a combined effort utilizing the knowledge of not only the regional school committee and the architect, but experts from existing vocational schools and industry as well.

The Old Colony school will actually become a community skill center for all ages. Its services to the public will be on all levels—ready for the young student when he is, and waiting for the adult when he realizes what a wealth of new or renewed skills is available to him.

The following represents a digest of events to date:

In January 1974, the Committee concentrated with the development of the North Avenue, Rochester site by awarding a well contract to R. E. Chapman Company, Oakdale, Massachusetts. Within a month, water was located at a depth of two hundred and fifty feet (250') with an output of approximately one hundred to two hundred (100-200) gallons per minute.

A major breakthrough in the construction of the school came about in February when the Massachusetts School Building Assistance Bureau approved Old Colony's revised preliminary plans and educational specifications.

On January 30, the resignation of one of the original members of the Carver delegation to the District Committee, Mrs. Joan Peltola, was accepted with regret. Mr. Randall Look was appointed to fill the vacancy.

In October, we learned of the intended resignation of a veteran member of the District Committee, Mr. Norman L. LaBelle. Mr. LaBelle completed four (4) years service as a committeeman and vice-chairman, and was one of the original planners of the regional school district. His service brought a valuable basis of experience to the many problems of policy which are encountered in perplexing questions about vocational education. Both the community and his associates appreciate his many hours of service to the youth of Acushnet. Mr. Paul E. Bonville, Acushnet, was appointed to fill the resulting vacancy and on November 20, Mr. Bernard F. Talty, Mattapoisett, was elected to the vice-chairman's office.

The District Committee, the Treasurer, Mr. Frederick W. Underhill, Jr., and the business manager, Mr. Francis X. Flynn, have attended to the funding requirements and with the assistance of Mr. T. Richard Guinan, Vice-President of State Street Bank and Trust Company, Boston, have successfully sold two (2) bond issues. The first issue was sold to the National Shawmut Bank on March 13, 1974 in the amount of \$500,000.00 for a 5.1 per cent interest coupon. The Committee voted to sell the issue on the basis of a 19-year plan for retirement. An additional \$4,700,000.00 issue was sold July 3, 1974 to Hibbard, O'Connor & Weeks, Inc., Houston, Texas for a 7.1 per cent coupon. It was voted to sell this issue on the basis of a 20-year plan for retirement. The state construction grant will also be spread over the 20-year period. Additional financial assistance includes the cost of the interest on the bond issue as a part of the reimbursement for projects approved after January 1, 1971. Sixty-five per cent (65 per cent) of the total capital costs to be repaid over the 20-year period of the issue, will be added financial assistance toward meeting capital costs. In September 1974, the Division of Occupational Education approved the Districts' request for a federal construction grant of \$525,000.00.

In March, Westgate Associates, Carver, began surveying Old Colony's access road and school site. Logging of the site commenced shortly thereafter. The Committee proceeded to solicit applications for the position of Clerk of the Works and on May 1 appointed Mr. William Danforth, Medway, Massachusetts, who began his duties at the site on June 12.

The activities of the Regional School Committee were significantly increased in the following months with the award of the General Contract on May 29 to New England Constructors, Inc., Avon, Connecticut. Ground-breaking ceremonies were held a month later.

Subcommittee activities throughout the year were accelerated to an extremely demanding pace. A tremendous amount of work is necessary on the part of the subcommittees, especially as the opening of Old Colony draws near.

Budget preparation for the year to follow is always a major effort for the committee and administration during the last three (3) months of the calendar year. This was especially difficult due to the lack of any historical data on which to base projections. The increase in terms of dollars will be substantial, comparing 1975 with 1974. The costs for services and materials, the backbone of the school program, rise just as do costs in relation to the individual family.

We welcome the appointment to the staff of Miss Mary M. Riordan as Director of Pupil Personnel and Mr. Francis X. Flynn, Business Manager. Both have much experience in their respective fields and we are sure they will make a fine contribution to the Old Colony Regional School.

In addition, the Regional Committee appointed Miss Nancy J. Fuller, Rochester, as Clerk-Typist and Mr. William F. Hubbard to the position of Surplus Equipment Coordinator.

In preparation for Old Colony's opening, an orientation program was developed to acquaint parents and students with the offerings of vocational technical education and most especially, the opportunities available at Old Colony. This slide-tape program was presented to all eighth and ninth graders in the district and will be shown to residents in each of the member communities.

We express our appreciation to the members of the School Committee, the office staff, and those citizens elsewhere within the District who, by their interest and active participation in the school building program, have helped to make it a year marked with progress. We have many problems and questions to meet in the future; no year is without them. But when the questions are met by people with genuine interest and steadfast purpose, we can be confident we will find the right solution. Much of the work this year has had to be in relation to the future as well as the present. We appreciate the many hours the membership gives to the work and hope they shall find their reward through being a part, in fact the foundation, of a strong and soon-to-grow vocational technical school program.

It continues to be an honor to serve this School District.

School Department

The School Committee and the many staff members of the Carver School Department have been busily engaged throughout the year in developing proper plans to provide for the expanded educational needs required as a result of our still growing population.

Much thanks must go to Mr. Randall Look and the members of the Building Committee that have worked most industriously in their planning of an eighteen room addition. It is our hope that this will provide for a reasonable time adequate space for our Grades K-6.

We have worked closely with the Plymouth-Carver Regional School Committee in their study of classroom needs for Grades 7-12. There can be no question of the need for additional space. The manner of its accomplishment is presently a matter of critical concern.

We look forward to the opening next fall of our Old Colony Regional Vocational School. This will serve to fulfill a long felt need for Carver's high school students.

The continued availability of Title I has proved most helpful. These federal dollars covered most of the costs of last years summer program and were used to employ three part-time remedial instructors during this school year. We congratulate the parents who have helped so much to make of this a most successful effort.

As our town continues to grow, so must the problem of the proper provision of all municipal services. We promise you to do all that is possible to continue to offer to your children that quality of education that they so much deserve consistent with our town's ability to pay. In this time of economic recession, we are all suffering a cost squeeze. We shall strive to assure you every advantage for your tax dollar.

The Annual Town Report this year will contain the financial reports required by Statute for the Town's School Department and that of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District Committee. In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District for the period from January 1, 1973 to August 31, 1974, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions of the district, as recorded on the books of the treasurer, were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were analyzed and checked with the sources from which money was paid into the district treasury, while the disbursements were checked with the warrants approved by the district school committee.

The treasurer's cash balance on August 31, 1974 was proved by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit and by verification of a certificate of deposit.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and were checked with the cancelled securities on file. The outstanding coupons on August 31, 1974 were listed and reconciled with the balance in the bond and coupon account, as shown by a statement received from the bank of deposit.

The records of payroll deductions for Federal and State taxes, the retirement systems, group insurance, school employees' annuities, professional and union dues, credit union, and the purchase

of savings bonds were examined. The payments to the proper agencies were verified and the balances in the general treasury were reconciled with the ledger controls.

The surety bond of the district treasurer for the faithful performance of his duties was examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of assessments made on member towns for capital and operating expenses were checked, and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

The ledger accounts were analyzed, the recorded receipts being checked with the treasurer's books, while the payments, as entered, were compared with the warrants approved by the district school committee. The appropriation accounts were checked with the available district clerk's records of financial votes passed by the district school committee, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the district on August 31, 1974.

Considerable detailed checking was necessary in order to properly reconcile all of the treasurer's financial transactions with the ledger accounts, which added materially to the time consumed in making the audit.

It is recommended that the district school committee adopt an annual budget in such form as specified in the articles of agreement between the member towns.

Furthermore, attention is called to the fact that the district school committee should apply the Public Law 864 and 874 funds to the annual budget prior to its adoption.

The recorded receipts from the school lunch and athletic programs and other school activities were examined and checked, the payments to the treasurer being verified.

The petty cash advances to the various offices were verified by actual count of the cash on hand and a listing of the cash memoranda.

There are appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash and summaries of the payroll deductions, assessments, miscellaneous receipts, and lunch and athletic accounts.

During the progress of the audit cooperation was extended by the district officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

Report of the South Shore Community Action Council, Inc.

To the Board of Selectmen:

The South Shore Community Action Council, Inc. is a non-profit, Federal, State, local and privately funded anti-poverty agency, operating through Federal mandate in the towns of Cohasset, Hull, Scituate, Norwell, Hanover, Marshfield, Duxbury, Kingston, Plympton, Pembroke, Plymouth and Carver. The SSCAC provides direct social services, acts as liaison to State Social Service offices, functions as a clearing house of referral information, attempts to organize residents around relevant issues, and generally functions as an advocate for low-income residents of the twelve (12) town council area.

The main offices of the SSCAC are located at 17 Court St. (rear), Plymouth, Mass. In July of 1974, the SSCAC opened a satellite office in the "Old Fire Station" at 27 Brook St., Scituate. The satellite office, plus increased personnel, brought in through the CETA Program, will enable the SSCAC to expand the level of service currently being provided.

The overall economic climate of the area indicates that 1975 will be a demanding year for the SSCAC. The unemployment statistics from the Division of Employment Security for the South Shore are among the highest in the State, and everyone is feeling the effects of the inflationary spiral.

With the generous support of the Council Area Towns, the SSCAC will combine to provide assistance to eligible South Shore residents, and attempt to develop new and innovative solutions to meet the area's social problems.

Report of the Office of Public Prosecutor

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen
Carver, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

During the year 1974, the office of Public Prosecutor experienced a general increase in the number of criminal complaints emanating from the region, which is comprised of the neighboring towns of Marion, Mattapoisett, Rochester and Wareham. The increase in the number of complaints we experienced is consistent with the statistics recently released by the Chief Justice of the District Courts, Franklin Flaschner. The Chief Justice indicated that, for Massachusetts as a whole, an increase of thirteen (13) percent was noted for the year 1974 and, since 1969, the criminal business of the District Courts has increased a total of eighty nine (89) percent.

The past year produced a significant experiment in the disposition of complaints involving the charge of operating under the influence of liquor. The Probation Department fully implemented an Alcoholic Intervention Program to rehabilitate individuals who were charged with the aforementioned crime and who had been tried and convicted or admitted to the evidence being sufficient to obtain a conviction.

The office also continued to advise and render opinions to the Boards of Selectmen on certain zoning violations, Board of Health problems, and criminal violations. Several occasions arose that called for action under the State Sanitary Code and the office of Public Prosecutor was pleased to have been able to assist the Board of Health in these matters.

The Tax Collector continued to call upon us to enforce and collect certain specific delinquent taxes by means of the Small Claims procedure of the Fourth District Court of the County of Plymouth. As in the past, this office has continued to give legal assistance to your police department and school officials, especially in regards to matters that call for or could have, as a possibility, the violation of a Town By-Law or State Statute.

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Carver for the period from January 1, 1973 to February 5, 1974, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Carver for the period from January 1, 1973 to January 5, 1974, the following report being submitted thereon:

An examination and verification was made of the financial transactions as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection.

An analysis was made of the accounting officer's ledger for the period covered by the audit. The receipts were compared with the treasurer's books, and the payments were checked with the warrants authorizing them and with the treasurer's records of payments. The appropriations and transfers were checked with the town clerk's records of financial votes passed by the town meetings and with the finance committee's authorizations of transfers from the reserve fund. The necessary adjusting entries resulting from the audit were made, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on February 5, 1974.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts were analyzed and checked with the

records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds.

The cash book footings were verified, and the cash balance on February 5, 1974 was proved by actual count of the cash in the office and by reconciliation of the balance in the checking account with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The Feral Revenue Sharing Funds were examined and checked. The funds received from the Federal government were listed, the appropriations were checked with the town clerk's records of town meeting votes, and the payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the disbursement of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. The cash balance on February 5, 1974 was proved by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit and by verification of the savings account.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined. The taxes, interest, and costs transferred to the tax title account were compared to the collector's records, the reported redemptions were checked with the treasurer's cash book, and the tax titles and tax possessions on hand were listed, reconciled with the accounting officer's ledger, and compared with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The transactions of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the trustees were verified, and the savings bank books and securities representing the investment of these funds were examined and listed.

The recorded payments on account of maturing debt and interest were verified by comparison with the amounts falling due and checked with the cancelled securities on file. The outstanding coupons on February 5, 1974 were listed and reconciled with the balance in the bond and coupon account as shown by the statement received from the bank of deposit.

The records of payroll deductions on account of Federal and State taxes, the retirement systems, group insurance, teachers' association dues, and for school employees' annuities were examined and checked. The payments to the proper agencies were verified, and the balances on hand to the credit of the employees were proved with the town treasurer's records.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked. The commitments of taxes and excise were proved with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection, the payments to the treasurer by the collector were checked with the treasurer's cash book, the abatements as recorded, were compared with the records of the assessors, the transfers to the tax title account were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The veterans' services account was audited and proved. The payments to the treasurer were checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts and the outstanding accounts due from the State were listed and proved.

The outstanding tax and excise accounts were verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The records of receipts from licenses and permits issued by the selectmen, the town clerk, the police and the health departments, as well as by the building, gas, plumbing, and wire inspectors, were examined and checked, and the payments to the State and to the town treasurer were verified.

The surety bonds of the town officials required to file them for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

The available records of receipts of all other departments collecting money for the town were examined and checked, and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

In connection with the audit of the trailer park fees received by the town, it is recommended that the collection of such fees be made in accordance with the procedure under the provisions of Section 32G, Chapter 140 of the General Laws.

In addition to the balance sheet, there are appended to this report tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, tax title, and departmental accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

While engaged in making the audit cooperation was received from the officials of the town, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

Historical Sketch of Carver

Carver is a small town of about 44 square miles located between its neighbors Middleboro, Plymouth, Plympton, and Wareham. It was originally united with Plympton. But true to the beliefs of its forefathers who crossed the ocean for religious freedom, even so Carver wanted to be separate from Plympton.

On the second attempt, with a vote of 97 to 76, after a long period of dissatisfaction, Carver was ushered into existence. The charter was signed by Gov. John Hancock on June 10, 1790. The town was named for Gov. John Carver, the first governor of the Plymouth colony.

Carver held its first legal town meeting on July 5, 1790 in the North Meeting House, opening with a prayer by Rev. John Howland. Francis Shurtleff, Esq. was chosen moderator; Capt. Nehemiah Cobb, Clerk; Deacon Thomas Savery, Capt. William Atwood, and Samuel Lucas, Selectmen. There were also two constables and other officers, including a tithing master, elected.

In 1716 two schools were built with one teacher dividing his time between them. These later became district schools with others in each section of the town. Today Carver has a Kindergarten building, Gov. John Carver School with elementary grades 1 to 5, a regional high school with Plymouth, and a regional intermediate school of grades 6 to 9 with Plymouth. Under construction is an addition to the Gov. John Carver School with a target date of completion by September of 1975. The addition will house three kindergarten rooms, 15 classrooms for grades 1 to 3, administration office, faculty workroom, health office, Special Needs room, music and art rooms, instructional media center, and a cafetorium to serve 200, and a stage area.

Under construction with plans for opening in September, 1975, is Carver's Regional Vocational Technical High School with Acushnet, Carver, Mattapoisett, and Rochester participating. Courses offered will include auto repair, welding, electricity, electronics, house and mill carpentry, cosmetology, machine shop, child-care, culinary arts, printing, data processing, business education, drafting, clothing and food management.

Carver's men courageously fought in the Revolutionary War, War of 1812, and the Civil War. It is reputed that Carver's iron foundries manufactured cannon balls for the Civil War.

Carver had many flourishing iron foundries and furnaces in all sections of the town as the pig iron ore was gathered from swamps and near ponds. It is also reported that the first iron tea kettle was made in Carver. Later the foundries continued their work with ore brought from Pennsylvania. Also Savery Ave. is the first divided highway in the U.S. and the first to be macadamized.

Now as we are in the period of observing the Bicentennial Birthday of our country, Carver Selectmen appointed the members of the Carver Historical Commission to serve as the members of the new Bicentennial Committee. The Bicentennial years close on November, 1976.

The Historical Commission has been functioning since 1968 and is making historical collections of local memorabilia. We have also secured a large safe and two files. Anyone who has items, photos, or old letters may loan or donate them to the town Commission and have them listed in the museum catalogue.

As time marches on, many changes are being made in the town. Of greatest magnitude is the building of new homes, and with the influx of population, which necessitates more organizations, and the addition of departments, boards, and committees. The increase in the number of school children means an increase in individual tax bills as more schools are built, facilities enlarged, and general operating and maintenance expenses climb. Office spaces at the town hall are being made by subdividing areas and town meetings are held in the school auditorium. Additional street lighting, wider streets, and the acceptance of new streets in developments are under consideration.

A town water supply is also proposed as well as recreational facilities for young and old. The recreational project will become reality next fall and will be built by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers of New Bedford. The only expense to the town is the materials. The area involved is the property of the late Mrs. Emily A. King and is adjacent to the town hall.

Carver was instrumental in locating the land on the Carver-Wareham line to build a regional dump facility with the towns of Carver, Marion, and Wareham participating, and is now in full operation.

Throughout the years, Carver has observed Old Home Day. In 1976 the Association will make plans for the Diamond Jubilee as Carver Old Home Day celebrates its 75th consecutive year.

In conjunction with the growth of Carver, the Baptist, Congregational, and Methodist churches have united into the United Protestant Church of Carver. Our Lady of Lourdes is ministering in North Carver and a new church, Assembly of God, has been added in South Carver.

Carver's economy is not limited solely to cranberry culture, where she ranks in the top position. Recent years have seen the advent of two business centers, employing Carver residents and offering a variety of goods and services. They are Cedar Springs and Cumberland Plazas. Stores offer groceries, radios, televisions, clothing, auto parts, pizza, a dance studio, a beautician shoppe,

Olympic Gym, and a Carver branch of the Y.M.C.A.

Carver has a branch of the National Bank of Wareham now. Also, a dentist has located in town for the first time in the town's history.

The theme of the Bicentennial is Heritage, Festivals, and Horizons. This article explains our heritage and mentions our festivals, while we look forward to the horizons of the future as we all work together for a bigger and better Carver.

Carver received official notification that Carver was one of the first four towns in Plymouth County to be named a Bicentennial Community. In 1974 word came from the U.S. Conference of Mayors in Washington, D.C. that Carver was chosen to be listed in the Bicentennial Administration's publication which is the official master reference for Bicentennial activities. This listing provides suggestions for projects for other towns. The project it referred to was two presentations on June 14, 1974 on the lawn and in the auditorium of the Gov. John Carver School by the three fourth grades. It was the story of our country in story, song, and tableaux.

During the outdoor presentation, the official Bicentennial Flag was presented to the town and flies daily at the school under the American Flag. Carver was credited with being the first town to use school children so effectively in Bicentennial activities.

TOWN OF CARVER, MASS.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I — Section 1. The Annual Town Meeting shall be held for the election of officers on the second Saturday in April at 10:00 A.M. The polls shall be open until 8:00 P.M., and as soon as the ballots are counted the meeting shall be adjourned to the following Saturday at 1:00 P.M., for the transaction of municipal business.

Section 2. Seventy-five (75) qualified voters shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any town meeting, including special town meetings; provided, however, that one hundred fifty (150) qualified voters shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any town meeting where any bonded indebtedness is to be voted upon, and provided also, that a number less than a quorum may from time to time adjourn the same.

Section 3. All articles in the warrant shall be taken up in order of their arrangement unless otherwise ordered by two-thirds vote.

Section 4. No motion to adjourn without day shall be in order until all articles in the warrant have been acted upon.

Section 5. The check list shall be used in admitting voters to a town meeting, except that non-voters may be admitted to a defined and separate portion thereof, and non-voters may address the meeting if the Town so votes.

Section 6. The articles to be acted upon at the annual town meeting in April shall be in the hands of the Board of Selectmen on or before February 15 preceeding said meeting.

Section 7. No authority or Commission shall be created at any meeting of the Town unless each registered voter has been informed in writing at least seven (7) days before the meeting of the full powers of such Authority or Commission and the manner of dissolving same, once formed.

ARTICLE II — The town warrant shall be posted at least seven (7) days preceeding the date of the town meeting in the Town House, at each post office and fire station in the town, and at such other locations as may be designated by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE III — The moderator shall be elected for one year, the name to appear on the official ballot. He shall serve in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 39, Section 14 of the General Laws.

ARTICLE IV — The powers and duties of the presiding officer not especially provided by by-law shall be determined by rules of practice as contained in Robert's Rules of Order as far as they are adapted to the conditions and powers of the Town.

ARTICLE V — **Section 1.** The Board of Selectmen shall consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, one term expiring annually.

Section 2. The Board of Selectmen shall have the power to prosecute, compromise or defend suits for or against the Town and employ counsel at any time if, in its judgment, the interests of the Town so require.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen to transmit a copy of any warrant for any regular or special town meeting to the Finance Committee as soon as said warrant is drawn.

Section 4. The Board of Selectmen shall appoint an Inspector of Wires, as provided in Chapter 166, Section 32 of the General Laws.

Section 5. The Board of Selectmen shall notify all department heads and all committees appointed or elected by the Town of any special town meeting at least seven (7) days prior to the posting of the warrant for said meeting, except in case of emergency as determined by the Selectmen.

Section 6. Any committee, board, officer or department having control of town property other than real property shall notify the Board of Selectmen whenever any of such property becomes obsolete or in excess of the needs of that agency. The Selectmen shall establish a procedure to make any such property available to other town agencies that may be able to use it. Any items of property which in the opinion of the Selectmen have a value of five hundred dollars or less and which are not transferred to other town agencies by such procedure shall be disposed of by the Selectmen by public sale following notice.

ARTICLE VI — **Section 1.** The following officers shall be elected from the floor at the annual town meeting for a term of one year and until their successors are qualified.

- A. Three field drivers-pound keepers.
- b. Three surveyors of lumber-Measurers of Wood and Bark.
- c. Three fence viewers.
- d. Three members to serve as a Herring Committee.

Section 2. In order to coordinate the business of the Town, the Board of Selectmen shall call a meeting in May, in September and in January of all Boards, Committees and Departments of the Town. Each board, committee, and department shall have at least one duly authorized representative present at such meeting, who shall be prepared to submit a progress report and to answer any questions from boards, committees or departments as well as from the Selectmen.

Section 3. Any registered voter of the Town shall be eligible for appointment to the Finance Committee, Personnel Board or Council on Aging except that no elected or appointed town officer or regular town employee or person holding a position of financial responsibility for the Town shall be eligible for membership in such agency. No member of a special town committee shall be authorized to vote as member of such agency on any matter pertaining to the duties of a special committee of which he is a member.

Section 4. Within thirty (30) days of the adjournment of the annual meeting it shall be the duty of the Moderator to call the organization meeting of the Finance Committee and the Personnel Board. At such organizational meeting, a Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary shall be elected from the membership of the agency, to serve until their successors are elected and qualified. Within ten (10) days of such election, the Secretary shall notify the Town Clerk, in writing, of the results of the election.

Section 5. Three consecutive absences of any member of an appointed Board, Committee or Council at duly called meetings shall constitute a vacancy.

Section 6. The Chairman of any appointed agency shall notify the Town Clerk, in writing, within seven (7) days of any vacancy occurring in such agency. The vacancy shall be filled within fourteen (14) days of such notifications by the original appointing authority. Such appointments shall be for the unexpired term of the member being replaced.

Section 7. All special committees shall report in writing to the next annual town meeting unless ordered to report to a previous special town meeting. All special committees shall be automatically dissolved at the adjournment of the next annual town meeting unless the Town votes to extend the life of such committee.

Section 8. Any report of a committee recommending action to be taken by the Town shall be available in writing at Town House to all registered voters after the time of posting of the warrant for town meeting. No action shall be taken on any committee report unless there is an article in the warrant expressly covering the action.

ARTICLE VII—(See Alternate Article VII below which provides for election of the Finance Committee)

Section 1. There shall be a Finance Committee of nine (9) members. A committee consisting of the Moderator, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen and the Chairman of the Finance Committee shall annually appoint three members for a term of three (3) years. If the term of the Finance Committee Chairman shall have expired, the six members of the Finance Committee whose terms are not currently expiring, shall elect from their number a temporary Chairman for this purpose. No member of the Finance Committee shall hold office for more than two consecutive terms. Appointments to the Finance Committee shall be made within twenty (20) days after the adjournment of the annual town meeting.

Section 2. The Finance Committee may appoint from its own membership such sub-committees as it may deem advisable.

Section 3. The Finance Committee shall have authority at any time to investigate the town's accounts and the management of any department. The books, records, and accounts of all departments of the town shall be open to the inspection of the Finance Committee, or any of its authorized sub-committees, or any person authorized to act for said committee.

Section 4. On or before January 10 of each year the officers, boards, committees and departments authorized to expend town money shall transmit in writing to the Board of Selectmen their estimate of the appropriation necessary for the conduct of their business for the next fiscal year. The Board of Selectmen shall assemble these requests in such form as the Finance Committee may reasonably request, and submit them to the Finance Committee on or before January 21. On or before February 15 the officers, boards, departments or committees authorized to expend town money shall present to the Finance Committee, in writing, a detailed list of their expenditures during the previous year.

Section 5. The Finance Committee shall prepare an annual budget for insertion in the warrant for the annual town meeting. The Finance Committee shall submit a report in printed form to the annual town meeting containing the budget request of all departments, the appropriations recommended by the Finance Committee and the reasons therefor, together with such recommendations on other matters in the warrant as, in their judgment, should be brought to the attention of the Town. Reports to all other town meetings shall be in such forms as the Finance Committee shall deem advisable.

Section 6. The members of the Finance Committee, excepting Chairman and Secretary, shall serve without pay, but may be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred in the discharge of their official duties. Salary for Chairman and Secretary of said committee shall be set by a vote of the Town.

ALTERNATE ARTICLE VII — Section 1. At the next annual election following adoption of this By-law, nine (9) members shall be elected to the Finance Committee, three for a term of three years, three for a term of two years and three for a term of one year. At subsequent annual elections three members shall be elected for a term of three years.

Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 are repeated without change.

ARTICLE VIII — Section 1. It is well recognized that proper personnel administration is essential to effective and economical work performance; and that major factors in proper personnel administration are intelligent human relations, valid administrative practices, and a realistic and equitable system of compensation, with fair and swift solution of compensation problems. The purpose of this By-Law is to deal with these problems directly and through the establishment of a Personnel Board under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108A, 108C and amendments thereof; and thus to encourage stability and improvement of the Town's working forces, and the effective and productive performance of their work.

Section 2. JURISDICTION

A. The compensation for every job and position on which the Town employs or intends to employ any person except those filled by election by the registered voters of the Town and except those under the control and direction of the School Committee or governed by existing union contract shall be governed by the provisions of this By-Law.

B. Any job or position which is not specifically classified hereinunder shall continue to be paid for at the rate in effect for it during the sixty (60) days immediately before the date this By-Law is accepted by the Town until it is classified.

C. Any provision in conflict with Chapter 31, General Laws, shall not apply to a job or position governed by Civil Service, but every other provision herein shall apply to such job or position.

D. The advisory benefit of this By-Law may be taken by the School Committee, when it sets the compensation of jobs or positions within its jurisdiction.

E. The advisory benefit of this By-Law may be taken by the Town to set the compensation for posts, filled by election by the registered voters of the Town.

F. It is to be noted that Chapter 41, Section 108A, General Laws states that this By-Law shall not be subject to Section 32 of Chapter 40.

Section 3. ADMINISTRATION — A committee composed of the Town Moderator, the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee, hereinafter called the Committee, shall appoint five (5) persons who shall serve, without compensation, as the Personnel Board, hereinafter called the Board, as follows: The Moderator shall appoint one person, the Board of Selectmen shall appoint two persons and the Finance Committee shall appoint two persons. The Committee shall appoint all successor members of the Board to fill vacancies in the same manner and by the same authority with the advice, but not necessarily the consent of the Board. Appointments shall be for terms of three years, each, except that when to fill a vacancy in an unexpired term, appointment shall be only for the unexpired term. A member may be appointed to succeed himself.

Section 4. DUTIES OF THE PERSONNEL BOARD

A. The Board shall establish such policies, procedures and regulations as it deems necessary for the administration of the classification and compensation plans and may employ assistance and incur expenses as it deems necessary, subject to appropriation of funds therefor.

B. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The votes of a majority of all the members of the Board shall be necessary on any matter upon which it is authorized or required to act.

C. The Board shall maintain written descriptions of the jobs or positions in the plan describing the essential characteristics, requirements and general duties. The description shall not be interpreted as complete or limiting definitions and employees shall continue to perform any duties assigned by their superiors.

D. The Board by its own authority may reclassify an existing position to a different class, and no position may be reclassified until the Personnel Board shall have determined that such reclassification is consistent with the provisions of the classification and compensation plans. Such reclassification of a position, however, shall be subject to the appropriations of the necessary funds to adjust the compensation of the incumbent employee.

E. The Personnel Board from time to time shall review the work of all positions covered by the Plan, such reviews to be scheduled so as to cover all such positions at intervals of not more than three years.

F. The Personnel Board shall from time to time review the Salary Schedules. It shall keep informed as to pay rates and policies outside the service of the Town and shall recommend to the Town any action deemed desirable to maintain a fair and equitable pay level.

G. Upon recommendation of a department head, supported by evidence in writing of special reasons and exceptional circumstances satisfactory to the Board, the Board may authorize an entrance rate higher than the minimum rate for a position and such other variance in the plan as it may deem necessary for the proper functioning of the services of the Town. No variance shall become effective unless, or until, the necessary funds have been appropriated therefor.

H. The Board shall make an annual report in writing to the Board of Selectmen on or before January 31st of each year.

Section 5. AMENDMENT OF THE CLASSIFICATION AND COMPENSATION PLANS

A. The Classification and Compensation plans may be amended at a Town Meeting in the same manner that other By-Laws may be amended; provided, however, that no amendment shall be made unless a request therefor, in writing and signed by the petitioners or petitioner, is addressed to and submitted to the Personnel Board, and a copy thereof filed with the Town Clerk.

B. Upon receipt of such request, the Board shall hold a hearing thereon at which time all persons interested shall be entitled to be present and heard. Written notice of such hearing shall be given, not less than three days preceding the date thereof, to the petitioner or petitioners, and to the heads of department and employees affected.

C. The Board shall, after such hearing submit a report with recommendations at the Town Meeting.

D. The Board may of its own motion, after like notice to all persons interested and after a hearing, submit to the Town Meeting a proposal for amending plans.

ARTICLE IX — Section 1. There shall be a Council on Aging for the purpose of coordinating or carrying out programs designed to meet the problems of the aging in cooperation with programs of the Commission on Aging established under Chapter 6, Section 73 of the General Laws.

Section 2. The Council on Aging shall consist of seven (7) members. The Board of Selectmen shall annually appoint two members for a three year term except that each third year three members shall be appointed for a three year term in order to maintain a Council of seven members. The members of the Council shall serve without pay.

Section 3. The Council on Aging shall hold an annual meeting in April of each year and shall elect from its membership a President, 1st Vice-President, 2nd Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. Each officer shall hold office until the next annual election. In the event a vacancy occurs in any of the offices above, the Council shall

hold a special meeting for the purpose of electing one of its members to fill such vacancy.

Section 4. The Council shall prepare and submit an annual report of its activities to the Town and shall send a copy thereof to the Commission on Aging.

Section 5. The Council may appoint such clerks and other employees as it may require.

ARTICLE X — Section 1. No political or advertising signs shall be displayed on town property.

Section 2. No political or advertising signs shall be displayed within the Town until a permit therefor has been obtained from the Carver Police Department. The person obtaining such a permit shall state the number of signs to be displayed and assume responsibility for their removal in compliance with this By-Law.

A. Political signs which conform with the Zoning By-Laws may be displayed on private property with the owner's consent for a period of thirty (30) days prior to an election. Such signs shall be removed within ten (10) days after the election or they shall be removed by the Department of Public Works and the costs thereof assessed to the person obtaining the permit therefor.

B. Advertising signs for any public event may be displayed on private property with the owner's consent for a period of thirty (30) days prior to the event. Such signs shall conform to the Zoning By-Laws. Such signs shall be removed within ten (10) days after the advertised event or they shall be removed by the Department of Public Works and the costs thereof assessed to the person obtaining the permit therefor.

ARTICLE XI — No person shall permit a junk automobile to stand in the open on premises within the Town which are not licensed under Chapter 140, Section 57 or Chapter 104, Section 54, for a period of more than three months. Any unregistered vehicle which is inoperable or unfit for vehicular use, unless said vehicle is used solely for agriculture or lumbering purposes, shall be subject to this By-Law. The decision of the Board of Selectmen shall be final in each case.

ARTICLE XII — All town meeting proceedings and results of all elections shall be included in the annual Town Report.

ARTICLE XIII — Valuation lists for the Town of Carver shall be published every five (5) years unless otherwise voted by the Town.

ARTICLE XIV — These By-Laws may be modified, amended or repealed at any annual or special town meeting by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of those present and voting pursuant to an Article or Articles for that purpose inserted in the warrant for such meeting.

ARTICLE XV — The By-Laws adopted by the Town on March 16, 1968 and approved by the Attorney General on July 1, 1968, and any amendments and additions thereto, are hereby repealed.

Article 29. The Finance Committee recommends deleting Section 7 of **ARTICLE I**.

The Finance Committee recommends deleting words “and the reasons therefor” from **ARTICLE VII** Section 5.

The Finance Committee recommends adding to **ARTICLE VIII** Section 4. H the words “this list shall include an up-to-date list of job classifications and recommended compensation plans.”

Vote: 3 Yes — 2 No

The Finance Committee makes no recommendation on **ARTICLE X** Section 2 A and B pending further legal clarification.

Vote: 3 Yes — 2 No

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of the Planning Board, or to layout or accept as laid out, the following private ways as public ways;

Cornish Street
Atwood Street
Barrows Street
Mazzilli Drive
White Pine Lane

and to see what sum the town will raise from the tax levy, transfer from available funds or borrow for the purpose and see whether the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase land or interests in land or acquire land or interests in land by eminent domain under Chapter 79 of the General Laws or otherwise for the purpose of this article or take any other action with respect thereto.

Article 30. No action taken by Finance Committee pending further clarification.

Vote: 5 Yes

Article 31. To see if the Town will ratify in every respect the action of the Board of Selectmen in making application for a Community Development Block Grant under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 for the purposes described in the application dated March 31, 1975, or take any other action with respect thereto.

Article 31. Recommended unanimously by the Finance Committee.

Vote: 5 Yes

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to have twelve (12) street lights installed by the New Bedford Gas & Edison Light Company on electric light poles on the following streets in Carver; Jowett Street, Great Meadow Drive, Murdock Street, Shaw Street, Ransom Street, and Popes Street. Location of lights to be designated by the Board of Selectmen, and said cost of lights to be taken from the Street Light Account of 1975-1976 and to be fully paid for by the Town of Carver hereinafter.

(by Board of Selectmen)

Article 32. Recommended unanimously by the Finance Committee.

Vote: 5 Yes

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law as recommended by the Leash Law Study Committee.

Section 1. Every dog owned or kept in this Town shall at all times while within the Town be effectively restrained by some person by means of a leash, except when such dog is on the premises of the owner or keeper or another person with the consent of such person, or is within Conservation Land and accompanied by and under the effective control of some person. The owner or keeper of any such dog that is not so restricted shall be punishable by a fine of not more than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each offence.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Dog Officer to apprehend any dog not restrained as required by Section 1 of this Article, and to confine or cause to be confined said dog as provided herein. Any unlicensed dog so apprehended shall be confined and otherwise dealt with by the Dog Officer as required by law. Any dog so apprehended which is licensed and owned or kept in this Town shall be confined until the earlier of its being reclaimed by said owner or keeper as provided herein, or until the tenth day following the day on which such dog is apprehended. If such a licensed dog is not reclaimed as provided herein, within said ten day period, the Dog Officer shall take one of the alternative courses of action which Section 151A of Chapter 140 of the General Laws, or any act in replacement thereof or amendment thereto, requires to be taken with respect to unlicensed dogs not licensed, collared or harnessed and tagged within the ten-day period provided therein.

Section 3. Promptly following the apprehension and confinement by the Dog Officer of any such licensed dog, said officer shall mail to the licensed owner thereof a notice of such apprehension and confinement, which notice shall include a statement of the last date on which said dog may be reclaimed as provided

herein. The Dog Officer shall also promptly inform the Carver Police Department of such apprehension and confinement and of the description of such dog. Licensed dogs confined by the Dog Officer pursuant to this Article shall be confined in a place suitable for the detention and care of dogs and kept in a sanitary condition; or they may be placed in the care of the holder of a kennel license or of a charitable corporation incorporated exclusively for the purpose of protecting animals from cruelty, neglect or abuse.

Section 4. The Owner or Keeper of any licensed dog confined as provided for in this Article may reclaim such dog upon payment of the costs and charges incurred by the Town for such apprehension and confinement and care of such dog, said charges to be \$5.00 for the apprehension of such dog, plus care charges of \$2.00 for each full or partial day of confinement in a pound owned or leased by, or under the control of the Town or the Dog Officer.

If the dog is confined in a place other than a pound owned or leased by or under the control of the Town or the Dog Officer, the care charges to be paid hereunder shall be the actual charges incurred by the Town or the Dog Officer for such confinement. No licensed dog confined as provided in the Article may be reclaimed until the owner or keeper thereof shall have paid all such costs to the Dog Officer. The Dog Officer shall pay over to the Town Treasurer all sums so paid to him, said sums to be applied to the cost of enforcing the Article.

Section 5. If the Dog Officer determines that a dog in its oestrus cycle or "in heat" is attracting other dogs and such attraction is causing damage or disturbance to any neighborhood, the Dog Officer shall order in writing the owner or keeper of such dog to restrain the dog for the duration of its oestrus cycle. If the Dog Officer determines that such owner or keeper is not complying with such order, the Dog Officer shall impound said dog for the duration of its oestrus cycle at the expense of the owner or keeper.

Article 33. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Vote: 2 Yes — 2 No, 1 Abstention

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution.

WHEREAS, the Town of Carver is annually required to raise funds on the property tax for support of state enacted programs, and;

WHEREAS, the Town of Carver does not receive its full entitlement under most state aid categories, and;

WHEREAS, the burden to raise all these funds fall squarely on the taxpayers of the Town of Carver, and;

WHEREAS, only a small amount of revenue from the state is received in the Town of Carver for municipal services not related to education, and;

WHEREAS, the property taxpayers of the Town of Carver can no longer afford to carry the heaviest burden of taxation on the local taxes.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the voters of the Town of Carver do hereby call upon their legislators and the other members of the General Court along with the governor to vote in favor of a program of municipal aid and additional educational aid during this legislative session and to redistribute the tax burden through use of the less regressive forms of taxes available at the state level, such as sales and-or income tax.

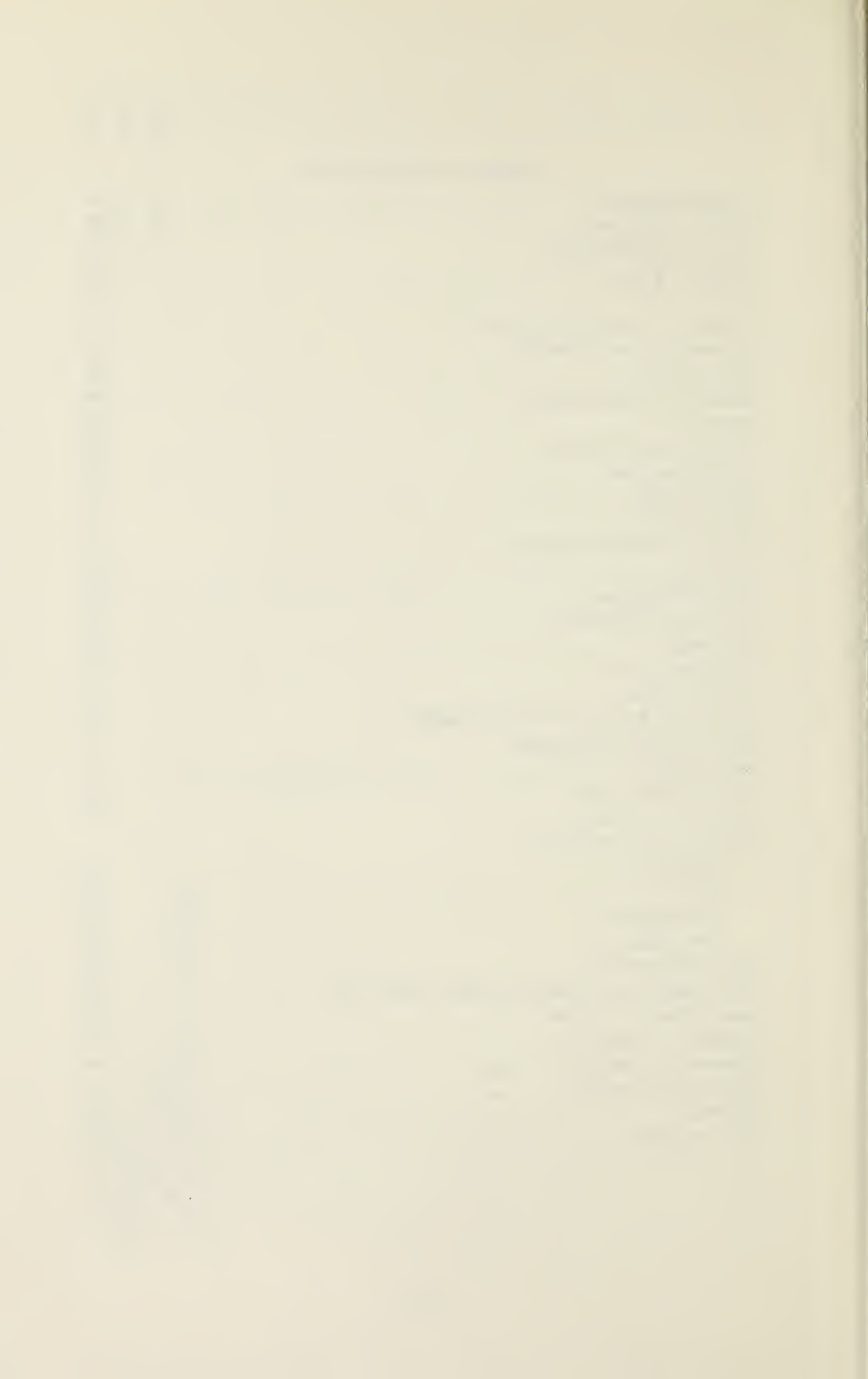

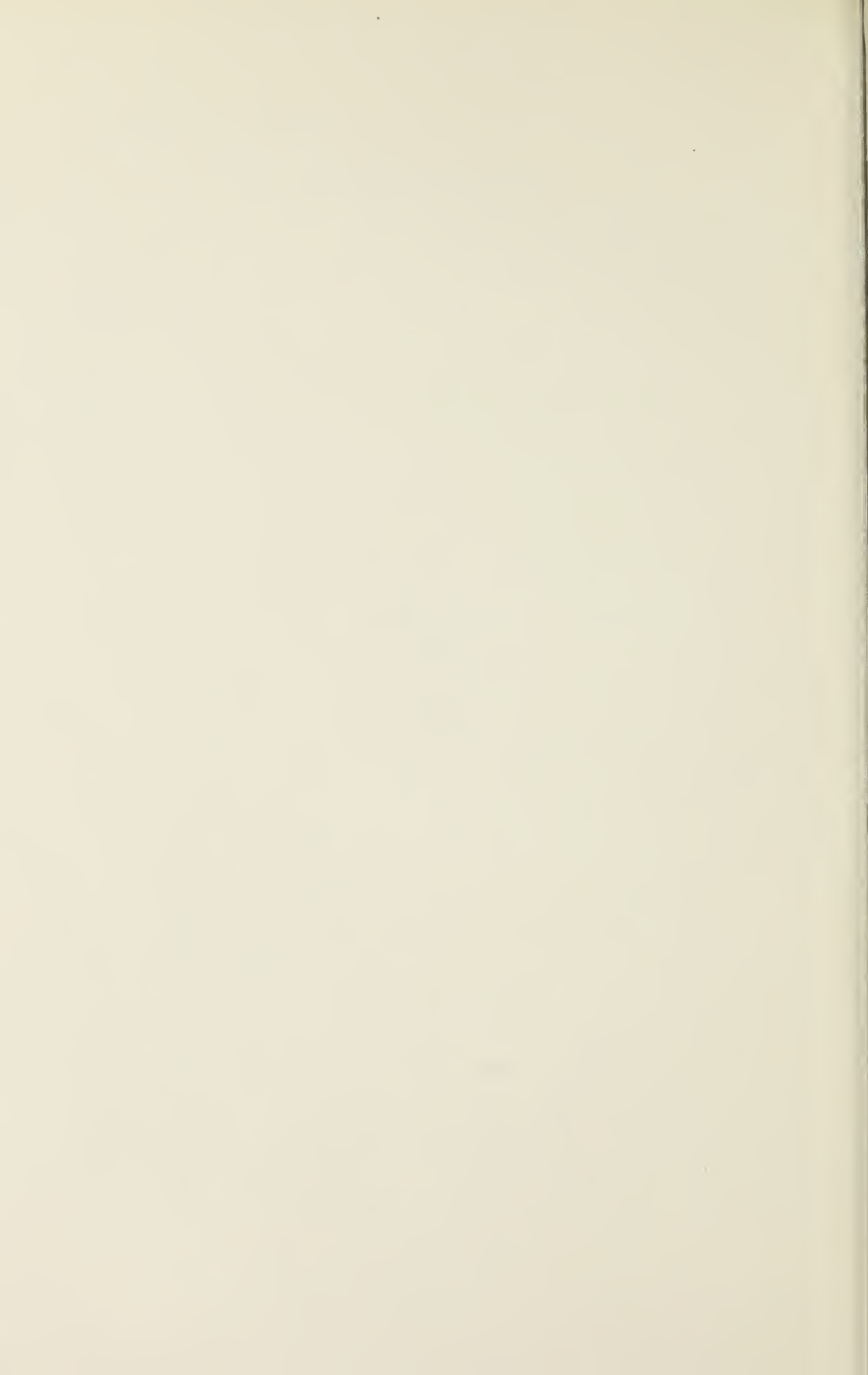

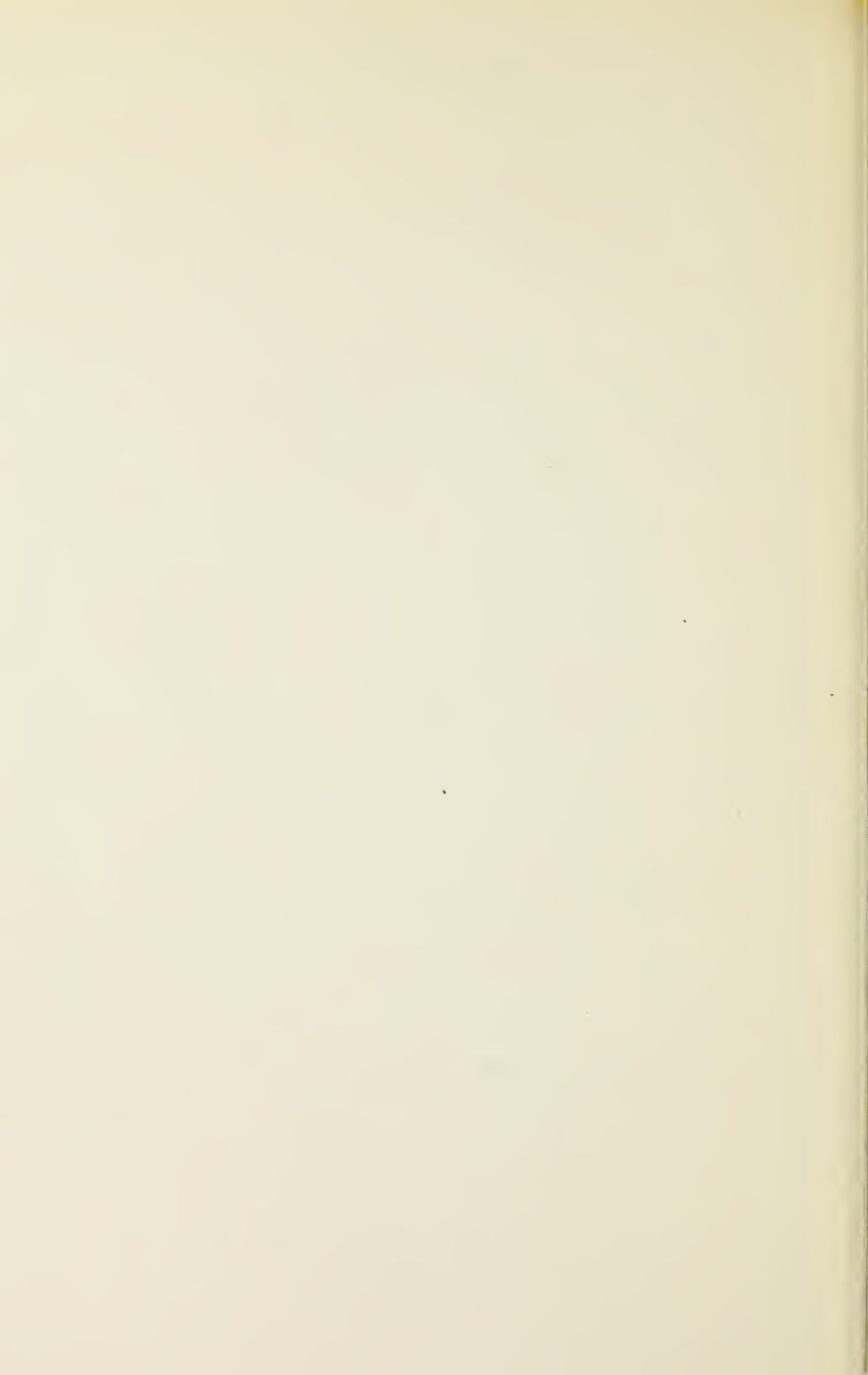
