CARVER'S BICENTENNIAL QUILT

As part of Carver's celebration of the Bicentennial, it was decided to depict part of Carver's rich history and character through the media of a quilt. The last week of January 1976, the Quilt Committee was formed consisting of Judith Ekholm, Nancy Mott, Chatharine Shaw, Nancy Weston and Virginia Weston. Work was begun February 6th to research the town structures, sketch the patches, assemble the patched kits and stitch them by 35 different women.

It was voted at Town Meeting in April to accept the town quilt and it was presented to the town on June 15, 1976, for permanent display. Accompanying the quilt were booklets compiled by the Committee as a helpful descriptive history of the patches on the quilt. Briefly, they are from left to right –

Cranberry bog – first produced in town on or before 1854

South Carver United Methodist Chapel – 1896

Gustavus Atwood Homestead – 1810

Our Lady of Lourdes Church – 1913

Turner Place – now Myles Standish State Forest Headquarters

Lewis Pratt House – “typical” half-cape house built around 1750

First Congregational Church – 1858

Vaughan Barn – old English-style barn of the mid 1700's still standing

Advent Christian Chapel – 1870

Second Church and shoe store – 1823

Sturtevant House) former gambrel cape built 1755

)

Waterman House) later – built a year earlier

Cooper Shops – considerable business in town in the 1800's

Savery's Avenue – America's first divided highway

Union Cemetery Church – 1854

Carver Town Seal – depicts Carver's cranberry, iron industry and forests

First Baptist Church – 1824

Gibbs Farm and Sheep Raising – sheep were important in the early days but almost vanished by the 19th century

Benj. Ward House – 1770 garrison house

McFarlin House – full cape built between 1788 and 1796 by an iron foundry man

Carver General Store – 1821

Wellsweep – full cape built around 1730

Shurtleff House – cape of 1796; now the Carver Sportsmen's Club

Swan House – 1743 cape

Charlotte Furnace – important iron industry began in 1760's

Wenham Schoolhouse – typical of Carver's many small schools in each area of town

Carver High School – 1897-1924

Indian Tribes – Narragansett and Assawamsett tribes were known to camp here very early

Edaville Railroad – founded in 1945 by Ellis D. Atwood

Marcus Atwood House

South Meeting House – 1772 as a second meeting house for the residents of the then “Southern Plympton”

Methodist Episcopal Church – 1843

North Carver Train Depot – train service to town ceased in 19—

Bailey Blacksmith – built of stone possibly from an iron furnace

Sawmills and Lumber Industry – mills were of considerable importance to the area. North Carver's Cole Mill built in 1707.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

APRIL 20, 1976

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Tuesday, April 20, 1976 pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated April 1, 1976. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M., by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott, there being a quorum present. Town Counsel, Edward T. Angley, was present throughout the meeting. Action proceeded as follows:

Article 1. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to accept the provisions of Chapter 90, Section 18A providing for the Board of Selectmen to adopt regulations for use by pedestrians of ways.

Article 2. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the balance of two thousand sixty (\$2,060.00) dollars from the Traffic Control Device Account, at the intersection of Plymouth Street (Route 44) and North Main Street (Route 58) in North Carver, to the Traffic Safety Island Account of Purchase and Main Streets.

Article 3. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of twelve thousand (\$12,000.00) dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account and transfer the sum of four thousand (\$4,000.00) dollars from available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of purchasing and installing a Traffic Control Device at the intersection of Purchase and Main Streets (Route 58).

Article 4. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars to the Snow Account.

Article 5. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of five thousand five hundred (\$5,500.00) dollars to the Fiscal 1976 Municipal Employees' Insurance Account.

Article 6. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of six hundred eighty-six dollars and eighty-four cents (\$686.84) from the State Aid for Free Libraries to the Library Account for the purpose of buying books and library equipment.

Article 7. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of three hundred fifty (\$350.00) dollars for the purpose of purchasing two aluminum life-boats for the Fire Department.

Article 8. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars for the purpose of purchasing one fire radio, suction hose and strainer, two hand fire extinguishers, one ansul extinguisher, and 300 feet of forestry hose to be used on the new fire truck.

Article 9. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to accept as a gift from the Carver Bicentennial Town Quilt Committee a Bicentennial Town Quilt depicting part of Carver's history, to be under the jurisdiction of the Selectmen.

Article 10. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of seven

thousand (\$7,000.00) dollars for the purpose of purchasing gasoline for all town-owned vehicles.

Article 11. On motion duly made and seconded, and voting of amendment, it was VOTED to postpone printing the Valuation Book and Tax List for the Town of Carver if revaluation voted under Article 34 of the Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting.

Article 12. On motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of six thousand (\$6,000.00) dollars to the Police Salary Account.

Article 13. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars for the purpose of purchasing a breathalyzer machine for the Police Department, amount to be reimbursed by a Federal Government Grant.

Article 14. On motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to accept the provisions of Chapter 41 Section 108L of the General Laws pertaining to the Police Career Incentive Pay Program (salary increases) for Higher Education.

Article 15. On motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of five thousand one hundred twenty-three dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$5,123.58) to be applied to the Dispatchers' Salary Account.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to employ one full-time patrolman for the Police Department and to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of nine thousand (\$9,000.00) dollars for the purpose of paying the salary for one patrolman for the Police Department, or take any other action with respect thereto. Frank R. Mazzilli, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen moved that no action be taken. Duly seconded, it was unanimously SO VOTED.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

ADJOURNED at 8:45 P.M.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

APRIL 17, 1976

The Annual Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Saturday, April 17, 1976, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated February 24, 1976. The meeting was called to order at

1:00 P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott, but was recessed until such time as a quorum should be present. The meeting was called to order again at 1:15, a quorum being present. The Boy Scouts and 4-H Club members presented the colors and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Rev. Robert H. Merritt gave the Invocation. Town Counsel, Edward T. Angley, was present throughout the meeting.

Article 1, Election of Officers, having been disposed of, the meeting proceeded as follows:

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1976, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to take up the salary of each town official separately. After discussion the following salaries were voted:

Town Clerk	2,000 per annum
Collector of Taxes	6,000 per annum
Moderator—\$50.00 for the Annual Town Meeting and \$20.00 for each Special Town Meeting	
Member of School Board	\$3.00 per hour
Chairman, Board of Selectmen	1,800 per annum
Two Members, Board of Selectmen	1,300 per annum
All other Elected Officers	2.50 per hour.

Mr. Erwin K. Washburn, Chairman of the School Board, moved reconsideration of the salary voted for the School Board and it was so VOTED. Mr. Washburn then moved that the salary for members of the School Board be \$2.50 per hour. It was seconded and SO VOTED.

After a ten minute recess, Mr. Washburn moved that Items 88, 89 and 90 of Article 4 be taken up out of sequence and it was SO VOTED.

At 4:25 P.M. the quorum was questioned. By actual count, 84 voters were present and the meeting continued.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to raise and appropriate sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges from July 1, 1976 to June 30, 1977 as follows:

ADJOURNED SESSION, APRIL 20, 1976
ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Tuesday, April 20, 1976. There being a quorum present, the Moderator called the meeting to order at 7:30 P.M. Town Counsel was present throughout the meeting.

Article 5. It was VOTED unanimously to transfer the sum of thirty-one thousand (\$31,000.00) dollars from the Overlay Reserve Account and to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of nine thousand (\$9,000.00) dollars to the 1976-1977 fiscal year Reserve Account.

Article 6. The Article "Leash Law" was moved and seconded. After considerable discussion it was VOTED, 96 to 7, to cut off debate. It was VOTED (57 affirmative and 45 opposed) to adopt as Article 14 of the Town By-Laws the following:

Section 1. Every dog owned or kept in this Town shall at all times while within the Town be effectively restrained by some person by means of a leash, except when such dog is on the premises of the owner or keeper or another person with the consent of such person, or is within Conservation Land and accompanied by and under the effective control of some person. The owner or keeper of any such dog that is not so restrained shall be punishable by a fine of not more than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each offense.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Dog Officer to apprehend any dog not restrained as required by Section 1 of this Article, and to confine or cause to be confined said dog as provided herein. Any unlicensed dog so apprehended shall be confined and otherwise dealt with by the Dog Officer as required by law. Any dog so apprehended which is licensed and owned or kept in this Town shall be confined until the earlier of its being reclaimed by said owner or keeper as provided herein, or until the tenth day following the day on which such dog is apprehended. If such a licensed dog is not reclaimed as provided herein, within said ten day period, the Dog Officer shall take one of the alternative courses of action which Section 151A of Chapter 140 of the General Laws, or any act in replacement thereof or amendment thereto, requires to be taken with respect to unlicensed dogs not licensed, collared or harnessed and tagged within the ten-day period provided therein.

Section 3. Promptly following the apprehension and confinement by the Dog Officer of any such licensed dog, said officer shall mail to the licensed owner thereof a notice of such apprehension and confinement, which notice shall include a statement of the last date on which said dog may be reclaimed as provided herein. The Dog Officer shall also promptly

inform the Carver Police Department of such apprehension and confinement and of the description of such dog. Licensed dogs confined by the Dog Officer pursuant to this Article shall be confined in a place suitable for the detention and care of dogs and kept in a sanitary condition; or they may be placed in the care of the holder of a kennel license or of a charitable corporation incorporated exclusively for the purpose of protecting animals from cruelty, neglect or abuse.

Section 4. The Owner or keeper of any licensed dog confined as provided for in this Article may reclaim such dog upon payment of the costs and charges incurred by the Town for such apprehension and confinement and care of such dog, said charges to be \$5.00 for the apprehension of such dog, plus care charges of \$2.00 for each full or partial day of confinement in a pound owned or leased by, or under the control of the Town or the Dog Officer.

If the dog is confined in a place other than a pound owned or leased by or under the control of the Town or the Dog Officer, the care charges to be paid hereunder shall be the actual charges incurred by the Town or the Dog Officer for such confinement. No licensed dog confined as provided in the Article may be reclaimed until the owner or keeper thereof shall have paid all such costs to the Dog Officer. The Dog Officer shall pay over to the Town Treasurer all sums so paid to him, said sums to be applied to the cost of enforcing this Article.

Section 5. If the Dog Officer determines that a dog in its oestrus cycle or "in heat" is attracting other dogs and such attraction is causing damage or disturbance to any neighborhood, the Dog Officer shall order in writing the owner or keeper of such dog to restrain the dog for the duration of its oestrus cycle. If the Dog Officer determines that such owner or keeper is not complying with such order, the Dog Officer shall impound said dog for the duration of its oestrus cycle at the expense of the owner or keeper.

Motion was duly made and seconded that the Dog Officer be elected instead of appointed. Motion was duly made and seconded to postpone action. It was SO VOTED.

Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to adjourn until Special Town Meeting scheduled for 8:00 P.M. Adjourned at 7:59 P.M.

ADJOURNED SESSION – APRIL 20, 1976
Annual Town Meeting

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting reconvened at 9:00 P.M., after completion of the Special Town Meeting. A quorum was present. Discussion of Article 6, Leash Law, was resumed. Chief of Police, Thomas S. Orr, explained some law relating to Dogs. Motion to elect the Dog Officer was withdrawn.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars from available funds in the Treasury to the Stabilization Fund.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$3,900.00 from the Sale of Real Estate Fund and to appropriate the additional sum of \$1,100.00 from Free Cash in the Treasury for the purpose of purchasing a parcel of land from Orrie S. Dempsey shown on Assessors' Sheet 103, Lot 7, containing about 0.22 acres on Main Street.

The Article was moved, seconded and discussed and standing vote was had (31 affirmative and 49 opposed). The motion to purchase was defeated.

Article 9. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to return the Benjamin Ellis School and land to the Town of Carver in compliance with Chapter 40, Section 15A of the General Laws.

Article 10. Article duly made and seconded. Motion, seconded, to amend figure to \$4,000.00 was defeated, standing vote being had (Affirmative 22, Opposed 52). Thereupon it was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of six thousand (\$6,000.00) dollars for the purpose of operating and maintaining the Benjamin Ellis School to be used for town office space.

Article 11. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of nine thousand five hundred (\$9,500.00) dollars which may be used for State Aid Construction or Improvement in conjunction with available State funds of thirty-six thousand three hundred forty-five (\$36,345.00) dollars and in addition to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of thirty-six thousand three hundred forty-five (\$36,345.00) dollars to meet the State's share of cost of work, reimbursement received therefrom to be returned to the Treasury.

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-five thousand (\$35,000) dollars for the purpose of preparing, oiling and paving roads that are accepted Public Ways within the Town of Carver.

Article 13. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900.00) to

purchase portable bleachers for use by the Department of Public Works in the park system.

Article 14. Motion by Clark A. Griffith, Chairman of Board of Public Works, that the sum of four thousand four hundred (\$4,400.00) dollars be transferred from the Machinery Fund and that the sum of one thousand nine hundred forty-three dollars and twelve cents (\$1,943.12) be transferred from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new 1976 $\frac{3}{4}$ Ton truck with snowplow for the Carver Department of Public Works. Motion was duly seconded and it was SO VOTED.

At this time Motion was made to adjourn. By voice vote the Motion was defeated. At 9:50 P.M. quorum was challenged. Tellers counted 79 voters present and the meeting continued.

Article 15. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of four thousand eight hundred twelve (\$4,812.00) dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing a new 1976 Ice Control Sand Spreader for the Carver Department of Public Works.

Article 16. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund account for the purpose of adding to and installing toilet and washing facilities to the Town Barn for the Department of Public Works.

Article 17. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars for a Drainage Account to be expended by the Department of Public Works on various streets that are accepted Public Ways or easements within the Town of Carver.

Article 18. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of three thousand five hundred (\$3,500.00) dollars from available funds in the Treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the cemetery funds in the Town Treasury.

Article 19. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars to be used to pay for all private work and material in town cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 20. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand five hundred (\$7,500.00) dollars for the purpose of repairing private ways under Chapter 40, Section 6H of the General Laws.

Article 21. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Selectmen to purchase one station wagon type vehicle to be used as a Police Cruiser and empower the Selectmen to

transfer or dispose of a 1973 Chevrolet Station Wagon and to transfer from Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of six thousand (\$6,000.00) dollars to be used for this purpose.

Article 22. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Board of Selectmen to have six (6) street lights installed by the New Bedford Gas & Edison Light Company on electric light poles in the Bates Pond subdivision; location of lights to be designated by the Board of Selectmen and said cost of lights to be taken from the Street Lighting Account of 1976/1977 and to be fully paid for by the Town of Carver hereinafter.

Article 23. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand one hundred twenty-seven dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$3,127.38) to pay the following unpaid bills of 1974 and 1975:

Article 24. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of two thousand two hundred (\$2,200.00) dollars for the purpose of constructing a dog kennel to be under the direction of the Dog Officer and Selectmen.

Article 25. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to accept the report of the Planning Board, or to lay out or accept as laid out, the following private ways as public ways:

Peltola Lane, Eastman Street, Dunham Street, Flax Pond Drive, Garden Drive, Rickard Street, Watson Street, Thatcher Street, Sears Street, McFarlin Street Extension,

and to see what sum the town will raise from the tax levy, transfer from available funds or borrow for the purpose, authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase land or interests in land or acquire land or interests in land by eminent domain under Chapter 79 of the General Laws or otherwise for the purpose of this article.

Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to adjourn to Wednesday, April 21, 1976 at 7:30 P.M.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
ADJOURNED SESSION – APRIL 21, 1976

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting at the Governor John Carver School was called to order by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott at 7:30 P.M., on Wednesday, April 21, 1976, there being a quorum present. Town Counsel, Edward T. Angley was present throughout the meeting.

Article 26. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars to be expended by the Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service and choose a Director in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 128, Sections 41 and 42. Thereupon, Mrs. Jean O. Gibbs was unanimously elected Director, County Aid to Agriculture.

Article 27. It was unanimously VOTED to apply the County Dog Fund, in the amount of \$1,105.88 to the Library Account.

Article 28. It was unanimously VOTED to hear any special committee report and to abolish any special committee not submitting a report unless otherwise voted and to establish any new committee.

1. Beach Committee—No Report.
2. Police Building Committee. Chief of Police Orr reported for the Committee, written report on file. Report accepted and committee continued.
3. Private Roads Study Committee. Mr. Doherty reported the committee unable to organize. Committee abolished.
4. Revaluation Study Committee. Joan Sampson presented report (written report on file). Report accepted without action pending action on Article 34.
5. Town Barn Study Committee. Clark Griffith presented written report (on file). Report accepted and committee continued.
6. Water Supply Study Committee. No Report. Committee continued.
7. Protective Zoning By-Law Study Committee, Mr. Erwin reported for committee and spoke of new State Zoning Law. Committee continued.

Upon motion by Town Counsel, seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to establish a By-Law Study Committee to consist of five members, three to be appointed by Selectmen and two by Moderator.

Article 29. After article duly moved and seconded, motion was made and seconded to amend by striking out the \$2,000.00 figure and inserting in place thereof the amount of \$1,000.00. Motion to amend was VOTED. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) for the purpose of an Alcoholic Intervention Program to be used to rehabilitate and counsel citizens of the Town of Carver.

Article 30. After article moved and seconded and considerable discussion, motion to amend by adding the words "such funds to be spent only if a grant of additional money is received by the town to operate said property" was defeated. Thereupon, it was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of twenty thousand (\$20,000.00) dollars for the purpose of operating and maintaining the newly purchased Marcus Atwood property on Tremont and Lakeview Streets, South Carver.

Article 31. It was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of two thousand five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars for the purpose of remodeling the basement of the Town Hall for the Police Department.

Article 32. After article moved and seconded, it was VOTED to change the name Fuller Street as appearing in the Article to Forest Street. Thereupon it was VOTED to rename the section of Old Main Street from Forest Street south to Main Street (Route 58) bordering Lakenham Cemetery to "Linton Drive."

Recess declared at 8:45 P.M., Meeting reconvened at 8:55 P.M.

Article 33. It was unanimously VOTED to abolish the Public Health Nurse Committee and to realign functions as follows:

- a. The overall programs of Public Health and Visiting Nursing to the Board of Health.
- b. The overall program of School Nursing to the School Committee.

Article 34. Article moved and seconded to transfer the sum of forty-two thousand (\$42,000.00) dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account and to transfer the sum of one thousand two hundred fifty (\$1,250.00) dollars from available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of engaging a firm to revalue the Town of Carver, this sum to be under the direction of the Board of Assessors. After considerable discussion, motion was made to cut off debate and passed by standing vote, 101 affirmative and 24 opposed. Thereupon, standing vote being had, 54 affirmative and 71 opposed, the original motion was DEFEATED.

It was unanimously VOTED to continue the Revaluation Study Committee.

Article 35. It was unanimously VOTED to allow the Housing Authority to be authorized to construct, acquire, or enter into dwelling units for the elderly, guaranteed and financed by Federal or State Agencies.

Article 36. Article moved and seconded, it was voted to amend the article as follows: Change period to semicolon after the word "service," change Capital "I" to lower case "i," change "The Elementary School, Main Street" to "Governor John Carver School and addition." Thereupon, it was unanimously VOTED to authorize to grant, insofar as they have the right to do so, to the New Bedford Gas and Edison Light Company, its

successors and assigns, the perpetual and exclusive easement right to enter upon, dig up, lay, install, maintain, construct, reconstruct, repair, replace, operate, inspect and remove underground conduits, wires and cables, transformer supports, transformer enclosures, transformers, equipment and other usual fixtures and appurtenances deemed necessary for the distribution supply of electricity for light, heat and power or any other purpose, together with the right to install a temporary overhead line or lines whenever, in the judgement of the Grantee, it is required for emergency maintenance of service; in cases of emergency work, repairs and improvements shall be completed and the temporary overhead lines will be removed as soon as practical, in, over, under and upon a certain parcel of land in which the Town may have an interest namely; The Governor John Carver School and addition, Main Street.

Article 37. To see what amount the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of reducing the tax rate for the fiscal year 1977. Upon motion by Frank R. Mazzilli, seconded, it was unanimously VOTED that nothing be transferred from available funds to reduce the tax rate.

At this time Mr. Bruce Starr, Chairman of the Board of Assessors, moved to reconsider Article 4, Item 15, relating to Assessors' Operating Expense. The motion was seconded and VOTED. Mr. Starr then moved that the sum of \$5,590.00 be substituted for the original amount of \$2 840.00. The motion was seconded and DEFEATED by voice vote.

Article 38. It was unanimously VOTED to empower the Board of Selectmen to purchase or take by Eminent Domain a portion of land bordering the Union Cemetery in South Carver, Lot #1-2, Sheet 89 of Assessors' Plans for the purpose of enlarging the cemetery.

At this time motion was made and seconded to reconsider Article 8 relating to the purchase of the Dempsey land. By voice vote the motion was DEFEATED.

Article 39. After article duly moved and seconded, it was VOTED to amend by striking out Roman Numeral "XIV" and inserting in place thereof Roman Numeral "XV." It was then unanimously VOTED to adopt the following By-Law as Article XV of the Town of Carver By-Laws.

Article XV—Parking. Section 1. General prohibitions: No person shall park a vehicle in any of the following places or at any of the following times and vehicles found parked in violation of the provisions of this section may be moved by or under the direction of a police officer and at the expense of the owner to a place where parking is permitted:

(a) Upon the travelled ways within the Town of Carver while the Town is engaged in the removal of snow from said ways whether with town or hired equipment.

There being no further business to come before the meeting and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

June 21, 1976

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, June 21, 1976 pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated June 9, 1976 and posted as required by law on June 11, 1976. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott, a quorum being present.

The Moderator then read the "Bi-Centennial Proclamation" as prepared by the Bi-Centennial Committee.

Reading of the Warrant being dispensed with, the meeting proceeded.

Selectman Robert H. Merritt moved that Article 1 be taken up after the Articles relating to Schools. Considerable opposition being expressed, the motion was withdrawn.

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$42,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account and to transfer the sum of \$1,250.00 from available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of engaging a firm to revalue the Town of Carver, this sum to be under the direction of the Board of Assessors.

The article was moved and seconded and Joan M. Sampson, Co-Chairman of the Revaluation Study Committee, read the Report of the Committee and answered many questions. Report on file. After considerable discussion, the Moderator called for a standing vote at 8:43 P.M. The motion was DEFEATED, 106 affirmative and 110 opposed.

Mr. Bruce Starr, Chairman of the Board of Assessors requested a recount and was ruled out of order by the Moderator who suggested the Article could be reconsidered if motion to do so was made by a voter who had voted "No." No motion for reconsideration being made, the meeting proceeded.

Article 2. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of one thousand four hundred fifty (\$1,450.00) dollars from the Highway Construction or Maintenance Account voted under Article 9 of the Annual Town Meeting of May 17, 1975, for the purpose of purchasing a used truck for the Department of Public Works.

Article 3. It was unanimously VOTED that Amendment No. II to the Agreement for the Establishment of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District, as initiated by vote of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District Committee adopted on May 11, 1976 be and hereby is accepted. This Amendment provides in substance that on and after July 1, 1977 the regional district schools shall comprise grades seven through twelve inclusive and that the Regional School District shall retain jurisdiction over the pupils in grades six until July 1, 1977.

Article 4. Some discussion followed the moving and seconding of the Article. It was VOTED to permit Mr. John Sherman Breen of Plymouth to address the meeting. He stated that the proposed site of the new School was assessed for \$25.00 per acre whereas the purchase price is \$2800.00 per acre, a possible violation of Section 14 Chapter 40 of General Laws. After discussion, it was VOTED (standing vote being had 98 affirmative and 41 opposed) to approve the amount of the \$1,200,000.00 debt authorized on May 18, 1976 by the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District Committee for the purpose of acquiring land and financing in part the construction and equipping thereon of a High School and a Vocational School including architects and engineering fees and other costs incidental thereto.

Article 5. It was unanimously VOTED to accept an Amendment to the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District agreement initiated by vote of the Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee adopted on May 11, 1976 and entitled "Amendment III to the Agreement for the Establishment of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District" which provides in substance (a) that debt service on bonds or notes issued to finance capital cost relating wholly to a new school shall be apportioned in each year on the basis of pupil enrolment in that school on the previous October 1 or, if there is no enrolment in such school on the previous October 1, on the basis of the number of pupils in each member town to accommodate which the school is being or has been planned, as determined by the Regional District School Committee, (b) that for the purpose of apportioning assessments levied by the District against the member towns, costs shall be divided into three categories: capital costs, operating costs and special operating costs, (c) operating costs shall include costs not included in capital costs or in special operating costs as defined in subsections IV (B) and IV (G), but including interest on temporary notes issued by the District in anticipation of revenue and (d) that the Regional School District Committee shall determine the operating costs for each fiscal year of any evening trade extension course or any other types of courses which are offered by the District to persons other than the pupils attending the regular day vocational school. Each member town's share of such operating costs shall be determined by computing the ratio which that town's enrolment of pupil hours in such courses on November 1 of the fiscal year next preceding the fiscal year for which the

apportionment is determined bears to the total enrolment of pupil hours in such courses from all the member towns on the same date. In the event that enrolment of pupil hours in such courses has not been accomplished by November 1 of any year, such operating costs for the ensuing fiscal year shall be apportioned on the basis of the enrolment of pupils residing in each member town and receiving education at such Town's expense on that date.

There being no other business to come before the meeting and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING
OCTOBER 18, 1976

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, October 18, 1976, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated September 30, 1976.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by the Moderator Robert O. Mott. As 75 voters were not present at that time, the Moderator declared a recess until such time as a quorum should appear. At 7:50 P.M., a quorum being present, the meeting was called to order again and proceeded to act on the Articles.

Article 1. It was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Selectmen to submit an application for the construction, repair or other improvements of local public works projects under the Public Works Employment Act of 1976 (PL 94-369) and to expend any monies received in accordance with said application.

Article 2. Motion was made and seconded to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of two thousand one hundred dollars for the purpose of paying the difference between a Patrolman's salary and Police Sergeant's salary for the remainder of the current fiscal year, said sum to be added to the Police Salary Account. After considerable discussion, motion was made to cut off debate. This motion was seconded and passed by standing vote of 53 affirmative and 8 opposed. Thereupon Article 2 was DEFEATED by voice vote.

Article 3. After considerable discussion it was VOTED by voice vote to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of two thousand six hundred dollars for the purpose of paying the salary of the Police Department clerical help which is presently being paid for by the Federal Government (CETA program) that ends on January 22, 1977, said sum to be added to the Police Salary Account.

Article 4. Motion was made and seconded to accept two parcels of land as a gift from Williams Bros., Inc., of Marshfield, to be used by the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver for recreational purposes, and to be named the "George E. Williams, Sr. Park," said parcels described as follows:

FIRST PARCEL: A certain parcel of land situated in said Carver being shown as Lots 55, 56 and 57 on a plan entitled "Land of Williams Bros. Inc. of Marshfield, Purchase & Forest Sts. Carver, Mass." dated October 1, 1970 by Robert C. Bailey, Reg. Land Surveyor and recorded with Plymouth Registry of Deeds as Plan No. 273 of 1971 in Book 3661, Page 635.

SECOND PARCEL: A parcel of land situated in said Carver and being Lots 160, 161 and 162 on a plan entitled "Section III Cranberry Estates" dated July 26, 1972 by Robert C. Bailey, Reg. Land Surveyor and recorded with Plymouth Registry of Deeds No. 29 in Plan Book 16, Page 1144.

Mr. Frank Mazzilli, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, explained in answer to questions that this land comprised approximately 3½ to 4 acres and would be under the control of the Recreation Committee and monies expended thereon would be subject to Town Meeting vote. The Article was then VOTED by voice vote.

Prior to action on Article 5, the presence of a quorum was questioned by Mr. Robert Telles. The Tellers reported 60 voters present.

In the absence of a quorum, motion was made by Mr. Frank Mazzilli, duly seconded and VOTED to adjourn until November 29 at 7:30 P.M.

It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Five thousand nine hundred and ninety-eight dollars from available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of paying the Town's Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the remainder of the current fiscal year, said sum to be added to the Workmen's Compensation Account.

REPORT OF THE PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

Since the Project's inception in 1957 (July 15, 1957, chapter 252, section 5A of the General Laws) the Plymouth County Mosquito Control has successfully served an area of 531.23 square miles and a rapidly expanding population of 261,832 people (current population based on 1975 population area density). Over the past 19 years, the Project has gained in technical knowledge, experience and service to the people it serves in combating such dreaded diseases as Eastern Equine Encephalitis, Swamp Fever and dog heart worm.

In reporting the Project's activities and accomplishments for 1976, there was more emphasis placed on problem areas concerning Vector species and those creating economic distress. Source reduction as a deterrent to pesticide use in these areas is a possible solution for alleviating these problems. Source reduction remains one of the ecological, compatible and less expensive means of control (where feasible) in a program of long-term mosquito control. During 1976 the Project reclaimed 50,540 feet by machine and 100,070 feet by handwork.

The Project's main objective is to seek out breeding areas and destroy the larvae before emergence or to eliminate these areas of breeding where possible and feasible while maintaining concern for the environment. Time and money spent in backyard and area spraying of adult mosquitoes accomplished little toward a permanent abatement program. Towns are growing tremendously, and each home is a probable contributor to the mosquito problem in many ways. Catch basins, toys, open rubbish and garbage containers, birdbaths and open overflowing sewage facilities are just a few of the breeding sites created. Other sites include old tires, abandoned car bodies, drainage ditches plugged with leaves, and debris dumped by those who are unconcerned with our problem (while actually creating one for themselves). The filling of trenches and waterways reclaimed by this Project is a violation of state statutes chapter 252, section 14C of the General Laws and subject to prosecution.

Although the Project continues some area treatment for adult mosquitoes (53,783 acres treated in 1976) it is time consuming and of only temporary relief. Each year the Project puts more effort on water management programs and also spends considerable time on larvicide treatment (1,159 acres treated in 1976) to control the spring brood of mosquitoes. In more heavily populated areas, 9,140 catch basins were treated for culex mosquitoes.

The Project conducted an aerial spray program which covered 3,613 acres. This aerial application was necessary to suppress a large hatch of sollicitan mosquitoes in several communities.

Public relations and education are very important parts of mosquito control, along with the cooperation and support of many town, state, and federal agencies, which the Project has received. A cooperative effort from all can ensure adequate mosquito control and a healthy environment.

The Project and its Commission wishes to thank all the town and city departments for their cooperation and support during the past year.

We continue to test soil free of charge for Plymouth County residents. Our 4-H Earth and Solar Science Program are available to all Plymouth County schools. This year, there were Chicken Embryology, Plant Science, Bike Safety, and Child Care Programs.

Through our Nutrition Program in Brockton, we have "Mulligan Stew." These are a series of six films. Good nutrition practices are emphasized for young people through a comic series of events.

With more food production and preservation by home gardeners, our Home Economists are available for advice. Consumer Economics, Clothing Construction and Nutrition are other areas that may be of help.

Agriculture is only one area in which our staff has expertise.

In addition to our regular staff, we have five Regional Community Development Specialists who work closely with all the towns on varied projects and are available for assistance to all towns.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Board of Public Works reports for the calendar year 1976 as follows:

During the snowless month of February, brush was cut on Meadow, High, Pleasant, Brook Streets as well as Cranberry Road. As Spring arrived, the Winter sand was swept from all streets and catch basins were cleaned. The ordinary work preparing cemeteries and parks used a great deal of time in April and May.

Ten miles of road were oiled in addition to 1.8 miles of hone work done on Fosdick Road, Plymouth and High Streets. In this context, we remind everyone that the signs posted on roads under construction legally close those roads and motorists use them at their own risk.

2100 feet of pipe was laid on Church, Meadow and Lakeview Streets; Fosdick and Wenham Roads to improve drainage.

A new intersection was built at Purchase and Main Streets with islands and traffic lights to handle vastly increased traffic.

New bleachers were purchased and placed in service at Center Baseball Field and the Football Field at Meadow Street. These were well received by the fans.

Section 6H money was used on private roads open to the public in Crystal Lake. The early cold weather stopped this work which will be done in the Spring of 1977.

A bicycle rack was built by Town forces and placed in service at John's Pond Beach.

There were 24 burials handled during the year.

Layouts for Plymouth Street and Popes Point Road were completed by the County Engineer. Design of highway changes has started. Plymouth Street will be re-constructed in 1977.

In order to help homeowners cope with noisy or dusty roadwork, the streets where this type of work will be done will be posted in the press about a week before work starts whenever humanly possible.

The cooperation of other Town agencies and our employees is the cornerstone of the Department's smooth functioning. The Board appreciates their loyalty.

REPORT OF THE OFFICE OF PUBLIC PROSECUTOR

Gentlemen:

The Office of Public Prosecutor continued to render advice and assistance to the members of your police department in regards to legal and evidentiary problems involved in the prosecution of criminal complaints. The office assisted in the preparation and prosecution of cases in the Fourth District Court of Plymouth County, which not only were originated by your local police but also assisted in those that were brought by individual members of the community. The cases which were submitted directly to the Plymouth County Grand Jury were also analyzed and reviewed by myself and approved prior to presentation for Indictment.

The case load from the five towns of Carver, Marion, Mattapoisett, Rochester and Wareham, continued to show an increase in the number of persons being charged with criminal violations, both adult and juvenile offenders. This increase has caused the Court to resort to double sessions twice weekly to stay current with the present case load. Our records indicate that for the year 1976, we processed and/or oversaw a total of 8,388 cases.

Although no decrease in the crime rate is anticipated in the near future, it is certain that the completion of the new Fourth District Court House on Route 28 in Wareham, Mass., this summer, will be of great value in scheduling and expediting the work of the Court, both criminal and civil.

As in the past, the Office continued to render advice and assistance to all other Town Boards and departments, upon request, and collected substantial sums of money in delinquent taxes for certain Tax Collectors, through use of the powers of the Court.

SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

During 1976, Carver continued to participate, along with twenty-nine other southeastern Massachusetts cities and towns as a member of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is one of thirteen regional planning agencies in Massachusetts and was organized in 1956.

The District is governed by a commission consisting of an appointee of the Board of Selectmen and a member of the Planning Board for each member community, and six minority and low-income representatives.

Carver's commission member is David G. Knight representing the Board of Selectmen; the Planning Board has not appointed a member.

SRPEDD staff, under the guidance of the commission and committees, prepares advisory regional plans on such subjects as land use, transportation, solid waste, water supply, wastewater treatment, etc., as required and funded by State and Federal Government. Each community can also receive municipal assistance at no cost beyond its per capita assessment. This can include such areas as zoning, planning, flood insurance, Community Development Grant applications, etc.

During 1976, SRPEDD assisted the Planning Board in developing the Carver Master Plan, assisted in the preparation of a Community Development Block Grant application and Housing Assistance Plan (town received \$72,000) and assisted with an Economic Development Administration grant application under Title I of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976. STEPDD also formulated a Transit Development Program which included the Town of Carver.

As the responsibilities and problems of communities become increasingly complex, it is essential to have a mechanism like SRPEDD to provide assistance in meeting new regional demands and to help in locating new opportunities for cooperation among area communities.

REPORT OF THE CARVER CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Gentlemen:

The Conservation Commission is now meeting on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 p.m. in the Planning Board room of the Town Hall. All posted meetings are open meetings and we invite citizen participation.

If there are any persons interested in becoming Associate Members of the Commission, we would be happy to welcome them.

While maintaining a Commission of seven members for the greater portion of the year, the Conservation Commission has been very active (holding over 17 regular meetings). In early 1976, at a joint meeting of all boards, commissions and committees of the Town of Carver, it was decided that the Conservation Commission would formulate and complete the Natural Resources Planning Program for the Town of Carver. We are extremely grateful for the co-operation and assistance of the Soil Conservation Service, SRPEDD and the Town Planner. The Natural Resources Planning Program is in its final stages of completion.

There have been six public hearings held and Orders of Conditions have been successfully implemented in all cases.

Land acquisition is of primary importance to the Commission and we are presently filing an Open Space and Recreation Program which is necessary for State and Federal reimbursement.

The Conservation Commission can only be effective if we have the co-operation of concerned citizens in notifying the Commission of possible violations.

Any disturbance of wetlands, excepting for agricultural purposes, once voted as such by our commission, is a violation of the law (the Wetlands Act) and the persecutors may be prosecuted.

The Conservation Commission wishes to extend its thanks to the various boards and offices of the town for their co-operation throughout the past year.

The Carver Historical Commission has moved its collection of Historical Memorabilia to the Benjamin Ellis School in South Carver where the Board of Selectmen granted the exclusive use of one room to the Commission. All of the items which are on loan by the Selectmen and the School Committee have been transferred to that location. Gentlemen:

The Housing Authority was certified by the Secretary of State in April 1976 and a pre-application for funds for new construction of elderly low-income housing was sent to the Dept. of Community Affairs for their approval. At this time all State money has been allocated, but new legislation is being introduced for an additional \$50 million bonding authorization.

On the Federal level, the only rental subsidy available through HUD is the Section 8 program, however, there are no funds for new construction such as the State's #667 program administered by DCA.

We meet regularly each fourth Thursday of the month, sometimes with representatives of SERPEDD, South Shore Housing Development Corp., or others to further our knowledge in the housing area.

During the year, Louis Farrah resigned from the Board due to other town commitments, and was replaced by John Foley, a Boston Housing Authority employee, who was appointed to serve until the annual election.

We are hopeful of getting a grant in the not too distant future and are working steadily toward that end.

The Drop In Center is open on Wednesday & Friday afternoons. The Center offers many activities which include the following: Crafts, Games, Films, Refreshments. There are also special Holiday parties—Valentine's Day, Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas. Birthdays are also observed and celebrated with donations of cake and ice cream.

Newsletters were sent out bi-monthly to a mailing list of three hundred and sixty-eight, reaching our total of five hundred and thirty elderly people. Our newsletters keep them informed of legislation for the elderly, discounts for the elderly, legal information and a two-month calendar of activities and services.

The services provided by the Council on Aging are increasing so rapidly and the needs that are surfacing are so varied that to include them all in this report would be difficult.

To name a few, some meals are delivered to shut-ins, food shopping and medicine service are provided for those who are ill, baby sitting jobs by the

elderly are provided, homemakers on a once or twice a month need are taken care of by referral as well as fuel emergency and food emergencies.

The Carver Council on Aging has incorporated with seven area towns. There is a constant flow of information between them which benefits all the member towns. The council is also a member of C.I.R.C.A., an eighty town membership of Councils on Aging which meets quarterly. Our Dispatcher-Coordinator attended thirty-eight meetings this year covering Boston and twelve towns down through Swansea on Council business.

To sum up, there is an ever increasing need. With two mobile parks being established in the town of Carver a modest projected growth of elderly residents will increase from our present number of 530 to 1,000 within the next two years.

REPORT OF THE CARVER INDUSTRIAL AND DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

During the past fiscal year a great deal of our effort was spent on economic development to promote a much healthier climate that would be an advantage to our goal of attracting new industry to Carver.

With the tight money market and very little industrial development statewide we felt that our time would be more wisely spent on projects that would benefit the town in a general economic way.

Our search for a medical doctor is reaching the final stages and we are confident that we will have some action on this project in the very near future.

Efforts to form a business organization is also moving along and hopefully we will be able to have such an organization in the near future to better support our present businesses and to help attract new services that would be an advantage to our community.

Efforts such as these seem far removed from our primary function of attracting new industry but this is far from the truth. The basic services of any community are of great concern to any potential industrial client and the better we are able to serve a new employer the more attractive the town becomes.

We are at a distinct disadvantage in our competition with larger towns to attract industry because we cannot provide the basic municipal services that are really a prerequisite for industrial development. Therefore, any incentive that we might offer, would help us present a more attractive picture of the town.

Several sources are being explored to obtain federal funding that would help us provide an industrial park with the basic service requirements of potential industrial clients.

The coming year appears to be much more favorable to industrial development with monies becoming available that in the past have been very scarce.

A limited advertising campaign along with a very aggressive direct contact approach to major developers and private corporations will be our primary direction for the coming year.

A brochure that was developed with the cooperation of the Plymouth County Development Council will be ready to support this campaign and can be used by other town agencies to promote Carver.

It is our intention to continue to work closely with the regional planning agency (SRPEDD) and to continue the good working relationship we enjoy with Plymouth County Development Council.

We are hopeful that with a great deal of honest effort we will see the town well on its way to a more stable tax base relieving some of the pressure from the already hard pressed property owner.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT
CARVER PUBLIC SCHOOLS
1976

The new addition to the Governor John Carver School has provided the extra space to house the continuing increase of pupils being added to the school's rolls. The primary grades continue to show growth at a consistent rate. The two buildings have proved adequate to provide the classrooms needed to house the pupils in Grades Kindergarten through Grade 6.

October 1, 1976 figures showed an enrollment of 860 students, an increase of 94 over the October 1, 1975 figure of 766.

The new addition has proved to be most functional, lending itself to many different approaches to teaching. I find many good things happening in the older building with both the new and the more experienced teachers using many different methods and techniques.

The curriculum is being studied on an on-going basis to see how it can be made to serve better the children and to provide the best possible education.

The Merrill Reading Program was brought in as a pilot program last year. This year the program is being used at the three slower moving levels in Language Arts. Plans are being studied to update the present handwriting program with new materials.

The school was fortunate in having three student teachers assigned to us this past year. This always proves to be a sharing of ideas and experiences by teachers and student teachers. The children benefit by this extra person working with them.

The new school year brought with it eighteen new staff people, both full and part time. These people were selected to fill new positions and to fill positions due to resignations and leaves of absence.

The results of the standardized testing programs conducted at grade levels K - 1 - 3 - 5 were very gratifying as they indicated a substantial growth in achievement and gave us direction where added emphasis should be placed in the curriculum.

For the first time in many years there was no Title I Summer Program. The money from the Title I funds are now being used in their entirety to hire four full-time, certified teachers to implement the Title I program during the school year.

The administration appreciated the continued support and directions in the Title I program by the Title I Parent Advisory Counsel.

A new report card has been adopted in the system for grades one through six. This reporting instrument is the result of many months of work by the Report Card Committee with members from Plymouth and Carver serving on this important study.

A questionnaire sent home to parents indicated an interest in the formation of a Parent-Teacher Organization. A steering committee was formed. Their efforts resulted in an acceptance of By-Laws and the election of officers. This new organization should help to open wider the doors of communication between home and school.

In-Service has been used for workshops, in-house programs and to work on the Elementary School Evaluation which is being done this school year.

Everyone involved with the education of our youngsters is to be highly commended for bringing quality education to the Carver Schools.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT-DIRECTOR

To the Members of the Regional School District Committee and the Residents of the Towns of Acushnet, Carver, Mattapoisett and Rochester.

I herewith submit the annual report of the Superintendent-Director for this school district. The summary report of the District Treasurer is attached as related to the year 1976. An enrollment table and a personnel directory complete the record.

The committee membership and organization for the year is as listed on the opening pages of this report.

All vocational schools today are searching for capable and qualified personnel. There is considerable change going on in all systems and this District is no exception. Opportunities in vocational technical education are growing almost more rapidly than can be readily realized. Federally funded programs and new technical school construction projects are making demands on the available supply of vocational teachers. Expansion plans of the State Department of Education relating to vocational education in Massachusetts are making and will continue to make more demands in terms of need for personnel, both teaching and non-teaching.

In determining the effectiveness of any vocational technical high school, we must consider several factors, not the least of which are the teachers and the subjects taught. This has been a year where the staff additions at Old Colony have been of significant number. There are 15 new teachers on the Old Colony faculty and this group constitutes some 38 per cent of the entire teaching staff of 39. The evidence at this writing suggests that we were fortunate in obtaining a competent staff for the system. The percentage of new teachers is large, but it is incurred by the fact that the group just described includes teachers to fill newly created positions that were necessitated by increased enrollment. The introduction of such a sizeable percent of new teachers into the system at any one

period of time does constitute a problem to the stability and effectiveness of the organization. Such changes not only increase the responsibilities of those remaining teachers in the system, but more importantly, it creates problems of adjustment for the students in the school. While we cannot avoid the addition of new staff members because of the continued growth of Old Colony, it is to be hoped that we may retain our successful and experienced teachers in the years ahead. We believe this is particularly important at this time as we go about implementing the daily operation of Old Colony under conditions of full enrollment.

As we consider staff, we must realize that this human element is probably the most important single factor in the development and evolution of a successful vocational technical high school instructional program. An exemplary teacher can inspire a student to previously unimagined levels of achievement. That desire to make something of one's life may have had its inception in a student because of his personal admiration for a particular teacher with whom he has had close daily association. The superior vocational technical high school teacher not only demonstrates technical competence in the shop and classroom, he further possesses a personal warmth that radiates confidence and friendliness to his students. At Old Colony we are fortunate to have an increasing number of such teachers amongst our teaching staff.

For the first time in Old Colony's short history, teacher aides were added to the staff. Mrs. Mae E. Johnson, Miss Linda S. Vaughn, Mrs. Kathleen A. Anjos and Mrs. Carol J. Cabral assist various teachers with large classes and do necessary clerical work for staff members. We are most appreciative for the help of these four fine people. There is no doubt that more has been accomplished because of their assistance.

We are pleased to have Mrs. Laurelie W. Strange join the counseling staff at Old Colony. She has much experience dealing with young people and we are sure will make a fine contribution to the Old Colony Guidance Department. As always, we are grateful to Mr. James Berry for assuming the administrative responsibilities of conducting a fine guidance program.

All the schools in the member towns were contacted by members of the Guidance Department in order to give information to boys and girls in the eighth grade about courses offered at Old Colony. Visitations were arranged to Old Colony with student selections later processed by the Guidance Department in cooperation with the District's Admissions Sub-Committee.

New Programs

Two courses were added in 1976-77; Child Care and Driver Education.

We are pleased to report that the Child Care Center is effectively operating with thirty-one children in attendance, ranging in ages from three to four years. This three-year course of study affords Old Colony students an opportunity to gain a better understanding of themselves through the study of children, help students understand the behavior of children, develop the ability of dealing with children effectively and give our students a realistic job experience under the supervision of a trained child care teacher.

Driver Education offers instruction in driving fundamentals and safe driving practices to eligible students. As expected, this program became a welcome addition to Old Colony's expanding list of student options.

Activities

On Friday, February 13, 1976, Old Colony was honored with a visit by Congressman Gerry E. Studds, members of his staff, Associate Commissioner of Vocational Education, Patrick Weagraff and his staff, representatives of the Department of Education. Congressman Studds and Commissioner Weagraff inspected the facility and offered their congratulations to the residents of our District for the successful completion and opening of Old Colony.

In February, the District Committee held a public hearing on the 1976-77 operating budget. We were gratified at the public interest in reviewing budgetary items.

Budget preparation for the year to follow is always a major effort for the committee and administration during the last three months of the calendar year. The increase in terms of dollars will be substantial, comparing 1977 with 1976. The costs for services and materials, the backbone of the school program, rise just as do costs in relation to the individual family. They will continue to rise over the years ahead. This state is faced with a large scale problem in finance and the point is well

illustrated in the experience many districts have had this year with the Chapter 74 vocational school aid. Although we can in no way refute the fact that costs are rising rapidly, the aid which was intended in the law is not reaching the district schools.

The dilemma of rising costs and inadequate state aid coupled with legislative support of collective bargaining is a very real problem to every city and town in the Commonwealth. We are caught between the need to maintain a good vocational technical high school and meet the competition on one hand and the rising tax burden of the citizen on the other.

As many readers may have already noticed, there are instances in the country where the local real estate tax is being questioned as the basis for the support of schools, essentially a state function. It is safe to predict this question will come to the fore in all states and within a few years time, it is quite likely some basis other than local real estate taxes will be determined as a broader and better source.

In March, the Regional School District Committee sent notice to the School Committee, Board of Selectmen, and Moderator of each member town regarding the appointment of school committee members by the member towns of the District, which, pursuant to the District Agreement, must be made on or before May 1, 1976.

The May 5, 1976, meeting was used as the annual meeting for the purpose of committee organization for the ensuing year. Membership on the District Committee changed as the result of new appointments by member towns. The membership from each town follows:

Productivity services from Old Colony's instructional programs increased considerably during 1976, as a great deal of services and work were provided for the municipalities and/or citizens of the member towns, at a considerable cost savings. Printing services extended by Old Colony's Graphic Arts program were high on the list of productivity output. Work such as the printing of letterhead stationery and envelopes, tickets, invitations, announcements, booklets and countless forms were printed daily for civic organizations, citizens, municipalities and state agencies. In-house printing services should also be credited to the many diversified projects of this department. Ninety-five percent of all administrative office forms used in the school are printed in the Graphic Arts shop along with all letterheads and envelopes.

Automotive services continued to be provided on a daily basis for many citizens and municipalities of the district along with the services of other departments to include: Machine Shop, Welding, Carpentry, Electronics, Electricity, Cosmetology, Culinary Arts and others.

Old Colony Regional School District encourages residents and town agencies to consider practical projects for their communities, organizations and personal needs as such projects can be approved and undertaken at a great savings while providing considerable educational value to the students involved.

A constant program of maintenance goes on throughout the school year. The majority of this work is done by our own employees. It may be conservatively estimated that thousands of dollars are saved to the district annually due to the capability of the employees. For such work, Mr. William Hubbard, Plant Supervisor, and his team merit high praise for the condition of our building.

Our school lunch program continues to be a bright spot in Old Colony's program. Under the leadership of Mrs. Althea Fearing, cafeteria personnel have provided nourishing meals for the students.

The athletic program is beginning to help a fine school spirit. This is evidenced by good turnouts in both boys' and girls' sports and the enthusiastic support given intramural teams by the student body. Guided by Mr. Frank Warrington, Athletic Director, Old Colony teams promise to give a good account of themselves in the years to come. We have been very impressed with the intramural coaching staff. They are a young, dynamic, hardworking group who have established excellent rapport with students.

Finally, the operation of a modern vocational technical high school requires the talents and efforts of many people; educators, nurse, cafeteria workers, custodians, secretaries, clerks and teacher aides. Without everyone making his contribution, the educational enterprise at Old Colony would not be as successful as it is. Ours is a talented group of people who are making a devoted effort to the education of the young people of this regional vocational school district. I wish to take this opportunity to publicly thank them for their help and support.

As we conclude the year, we offer the District Committee and the citizens of the four towns, our appreciation for their support in helping to develop a good program of vocational education. We in the school are most conscious of the time and thought which members give to their work on the committee. The sincerity and effort of the community representatives are the foundation stones of a good vocational technical high school program.

To authorize the issuance of bonds or notes in anticipation of reimbursement. To authorize application for Federal or State grants-in-aid available now or in the future for the purposes of this article, or take any other actions, pursuant thereto.

Article 31. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as Article 15 of the Town of Carver By-Laws the following:

The following guidelines with respect to hours and other

conditions of employment apply to all fulltime clerical and secretarial employees within the Town of Carver. Excluded from these guidelines are all school personnel and all elected positions.

WORK HOURS AND WORK YEAR

Work hours will be prescribed by individual department heads. The work week shall not be less than 35 hours. Work year consists of a regular 5-day work week through the year except for vacations and holidays.

SICK LEAVE

Employees will be entitled to 1¼ sick leave days each work month of the year. In cases of merit, the Selectmen, with the Department Head, may allow sick leave beyond the above limit. Sick leave may be accumulated from year to year to a maximum of 60 days.

VACATION

Employees will be entitled to vacation based on the following table of years of service to the Town.

<i>Service</i>	<i>Weeks of Vacation</i>
1 year	2 weeks
8 years	3 weeks
15 years	4 weeks

All fulltime personnel are considered permanent employees after completing one year probationary period. Permanent employees shall have rights of promotion and retention. Promotion and retention rights shall be based upon the following:

- A. Length of service
- B. Hourly or weekly rate and level of responsibility.
- C. Level of skills within classification.

No permanent employee will be discharged without a hearing before the Board of Selectmen.

All permanent employees shall be given a reasonable job offer, if and when available, should their position be abolished.

(by Board of Selectmen)

Article 37. To see what action the Town will take in the following proposed amendment to the Protective By-Law:

To amend the Zoning map referred to Section III B as follows:

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of one (1) new School Bus for the School Department. Said appropriation to be expended under the direction of the School Committee.
