A twelve-foot white spruce "Living Christmas Tree" is a new focal point in the center of town. The tree and subsequent electrical materials were donated to the town by the Carver Jaycees. The first annual lighting ceremony was held on Tuesday, December 13, 1977, when young Wade and Wendy Locke of Wenham Shores threw the switch. The brightly decorated tree was a delight to behold and radiated warmth and cheerfulness throughout the evenings of the holiday season.

The tree is planted on the triangular plot of land that lies between Main Street (Rte. 58) and Center Street. The Board of Selectmen voted to allow the Jaycees to improve the triangle. Future plans include annual plantings of shrubs and gradually turning the entire triangle into a cultivated attraction.

The tree stands as an ever-growing testimony of the Jaycee commitment of service to the community.

RECORDS OF TOWN MEETING AND
ELECTIONS FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR
1977

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

February 28, 1977

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, February 28, 1977, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated February 10, 1977. Mrs. Helen Copello served as Clerk to record the proceedings in the absence of the Town Clerk. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. there being a quorum present.

Article 1. It was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of three thousand two hundred dollars for the purpose of continuing the services of the Town Planner.

Article 2. It was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars to the Snow Removal Account.

Article 3. After discussion it was VOTED, standing vote being had, 131 affirmative and 3 opposed, to cut off debate. Thereupon it was VOTED to transfer the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a Class I Ambulance under the Ambulance Law, Chapter 111C of the General Laws of Massachusetts, and to allow the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with an abutting town to share the operating cost.

Article 4. It was VOTED to transfer the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of constructing a four-car garage to house the ambulance and the mini-buses on Town-owned land at the rear of the Town Hall.

Article 5. It was VOTED to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint three additional Police Officers to aid in implementing Ambulance Law under G.L. Chapter 111-C.

Article 6. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Six Thousand Two Hundred Eleven Dollars and Forty-six cents to the Police Salary Account.

Article 7. It was VOTED to transfer the sum of Nine Thousand Four Hundred Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a 12 passenger mini-bus for the Council of Aging. This includes two two-way radios, one radio to be installed in the presently owned mini-bus.

There being no further business to come before the meeting it was VOTED to adjourn.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

April 16, 1977

The Annual Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Saturday, April 16, 1977, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated February 17, 1977. The meeting was called to order at 1:00 P.M. by Moderator Robert O. Mott. Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts presented the colors and led the Pledge of Allegiance. The Reverend James Gibbons, Pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church gave the Invocation. Town Counsel Edward T. Angley was present throughout the meeting. In the absence of a quorum the meeting was recessed until 1:18 P.M. **Article 1** relating to the election of officers, etc., having been disposed of at a prior meeting and reading of the Warrant being dispensed with, the meeting proceeded as follows:

At this time Frank R. Mazzilli, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, and Gary Weston, Chairman of the Finance Committee, commented on the expected increase in the Tax Rate and explained certain articles in the Warrant which they hoped would be revised for the purpose of reducing the rate.

Article 2. It was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1977, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4 and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 3. It was VOTED to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided by General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended, as follows:

*Memo Re Item 68: Schools: After considerable discussion concerning effect of State mandated items and results if Town failed to vote the amount requested, it was VOTED. standing vote being had, 60 affirmative and 21 opposed, to cut off debate. Thereupon, standing vote being had on the original question, it was VOTED, 49 affirmative and 30 opposed, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,061,874.00 for the support of Schools and Vocational Education.

Article 5. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars to the 1978 Fiscal Year Revenue Account.

Article 6. It was unanimously VOTED to take no action on transfer of funds to the Stabilization Fund.

Article 7. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Nine Thousand Five Hundred Dollars which may be used for State Aid Construction or Improvement in conjunction with available State funds of Thirty-six Thousand Three Hundred Forty-five Dollars and in addition to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Thirty-six Thousand Three Hundred Forty-five Dollars to meet the State's share of cost of work, reimbursement received therefrom to be returned to the Treasury.

Article 8. It was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Thirty-five Thousand dollars for the purpose of preparing, oiling and paving roads that are accepted Public Ways within the Town of Carver.

Article 9. It was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars to improve the intersections at Forest and Main Streets (Route 58), Green and Main Streets (Route 58), Forest and Purchase Streets.

Article 10. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Two Thousand Two Hundred Forty-five Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a new 1977 Tractor-type Lawn Mower for the Department of Public Works.

Article 11. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars from available funds in the Treasury for the sole purpose of meeting the charges against the cemetery funds in the Town Treasury.

Article 12. It was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Four Thousand Four Hundred Thirty-four Dollars for the purpose of purchasing three new Snowplows for the Department of Public Works.

Article 13. It was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars to be used to pay for all private work and material in Town cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 14. It was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Twenty-five Thousand dollars for a Drainage Account to be expended by the Department of Public Works on various streets that are accepted Public Ways or easements within the Town of Carver.

Article 15. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Five Thousand Dollars for the purpose of repairing private ways under Chapter 40, Section 6H of the General Laws.

Article 16. It was unanimously VOTED to accept the report of the Planning Board, or to lay out or accept as laid out, the following private ways as public ways:

Nel Bonney Road	Quaker Road
Deacon Lane	Surrey Drive
Shaw Street	Ransom Street
Pope Street	Murdock Street
Jowett from Purchase to Murdock Street	
Great Meadow from Forest to Murdock Street	

and to see what sum the town will raise from the tax levy, transfer from available funds or borrow for the purpose and see whether the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase land or interests in land or acquire land or interests in land by eminent domain under Chapter 79 of the General Laws or otherwise for the purpose of this article.

Article 17. It was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars to be expended by the Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service and choose a Director in accordance with the provisions of General Laws of Massachusetts, Chapter 128, Section 41 and 42. Thereupon, Jean O. Gibbs was unanimously elected Director, County Aid to Agriculture.

Article 18. It was VOTED to apply the County Dog Fund (\$934.31) to the Library Account, this amount to be deducted from the Library Budget.

Article 19. It was unanimously VOTED to hear the report of any standing committees and to abolish any special committee not submitting a report unless otherwise voted, and to establish any new committee. The following reports were heard:

1. William R. Holmes reported for the Town Barn Study Committee. The report was accepted and it was unanimously VOTED to continue the Committee.
2. Police Chief Thomas S. Orr reported for the Police Building Committee. Report accepted and VOTED to continue the Committee.
3. Mrs. Joan Sampson reported for the Revaluation Study Committee and it was unanimously VOTED to discontinue the Committee.
4. Selectman Charles Erwin reported for the Protective Zoning By-Law Study Committee. The report was accepted and it was unanimously VOTED to continue the Committee.

It was VOTED to adjourn the meeting to Tuesday, April 19, 1977 at 7:30 P.M.

ADJOURNED SESSION
ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
April 19, 1977

The Adjourned Session of the Annual Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Tuesday, April 19, 1977. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by the Moderator, there being a quorum present.

Article 19. (Cont'd) Upon motion by Erwin Washburn, Chairman of the School Committee, it was VOTED to create a Committee of five to be appointed by the Moderator to work together with the School Committee to study the various Federal and State laws and regulations, also School Committee policies, that have a bearing on the formation of the School Budget and to recommend as to the continuation, rejection or modification of such laws or policies to the School Committee no later than September 1977 and to make a report to the Town no later than the next annual Town Meeting.

At this time Frank R. Mazzilli and Gary Weston repeated substantially the same statements made at the first session regarding the expected increase in the Tax Rate.

Article 20. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of One Thousand Dollars from the State Aid to Free Public Libraries Account to the Library Account for the purpose of capital improvements to the Library.

Article 21. Upon motion by Mrs. Phyllis Harriman, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer Six Acres of Town-owned property behind the Library and adjacent to the Town Barn to the Carver Housing Authority, this land to be used for the construction of a Sixty unit Elderly Low-Income Complex, such transfer contingent on the granting of monies or loans from State or Federal agencies or private sources.

Article 22. Upon motion by Mr. Frank Mazzilli, it was VOTED to take NO ACTION on the transfer of available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of reducing the tax rate for the fiscal year 1978.

Article 23. The article having been moved and seconded, it was VOTED to leave the frontage requirement at 150 feet. Acting on the original motion, standing vote being had, 117 affirmative and 19 opposed, it was VOTED to amend Section V, Intensity Regulation of the Protective Zoning By-Law as follows:

After the words "Minimum Lot Dimension-Area in Square Feet (a)" strike out the figure "40,000" and insert the figure "60,000."

Article 24. It was unanimously VOTED to take NO ACTION on the transfer of thirty thousand dollars from available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of purchasing ten automatic voting machines.

Article 25. It was unanimously VOTED to take NO ACTION on the purchase of a Radar Set and the setting-up of a Public Safety Program.

Article 26. The Article having been moved and seconded, It was VOTED, standing vote being had, affirmative 43, opposed 70, not to amend the article to \$11,000 for two sedans. Thereupon, it was VOTED to transfer from Revenue Sharing Funds \$15,000 for the purpose of purchasing three sedans to be used as Police Cruisers.

Article 27. It was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer or dispose of a 1974 Chevrolet Wagon and a 1975 Pontiac Wagon.

Article 28. It was VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Twenty-three Thousand Eight Hundred Sixteen Dollars and Fifty-four Cents to the Police Salary Account.

Article 29. It was unanimously VOTED to take NO ACTION relative to the transfer of \$25,000 from Revenue Sharing Funds for the purpose of a Water supply Study.

Article 30. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Forty-eight Thousand Nine Hundred Forty-four Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a one-thousand gallon per minute combination pumping engine and equipment for the Fire Department.

Article 31. It was unanimously VOTED to take NO ACTION on the purchase of the John A. Shaw property for the sum of \$175,000.

Article 32. The Article having been moved and seconded, it was VOTED to amend the next to the last paragraph by adding the words "and the employee's department head" after the word "Selectmen." Thereupon it was unanimously VOTED to adopt as Article 15 of the Town of Carver By-Laws the following:

The following guidelines with respect to hours and other conditions of employment apply to all full-time clerical and secretarial employees within the Town of Carver. Excluded from these guidelines are all school personnel and all elected positions.

Work Hours and Work Year

Work hours will be prescribed by individual department heads. The work week shall not be less than 35 hours. Work year consists of a regular 5-day work week through the year except for vacations and holidays.

Sick Leave

Employees will be entitled to 1¼ sick leave days each work month of the year. In cases of merit, the Selectmen, with the Department Head, may allow sick leave beyond the above limit. Sick leave may be accumulated from year to year to a maximum of 60 days.

Vacation

Employees will be entitled to vacation based on the following table of years of service to the Town.

Service	Weeks of Vacation
1 Year	2 Weeks
8 Years	3 Weeks
15 Years	4 Weeks

All fulltime personnel are considered permanent employees after completing one year probationary period. Permanent employees shall have rights of promotion and retention. Promotion and retention rights shall be based upon the following:

- A. Length of service.
- B. Hourly or weekly rate and level of responsibility.
- C. Level of skills within classification.

No permanent employee will be discharged without a hearing before the Board of Selectmen and the employee's department head. All permanent employees shall be given a reasonable job offer, if and when available should their position be abolished.

Article 33. It was VOTED, standing vote being had, 59 affirmative and 53 opposed, to amend the Town of Carver By-Laws as follows:

Article I, Section 2. Amend to "175 qualified voters and 350 for Bonded Indebtedness."

Article 34. It was unanimously VOTED to amend the Town of Carver By-Laws as follows:

Article VI. Section 2. Amend to add "Commissions."

At this time a motion was made to reconsider Article 33. A 2/3 majority being required for reconsideration, standing vote was had 67 affirmative and 42 opposed, the motion was LOST.

Article 35. It was unanimously VOTED to take NO ACTION on the transfer of funds from the Parade and Family Day Account, there being no funds remaining in this account.

Article 36. It was VOTED to take NO ACTION relative to monies from the Bi-Centennial Souvenir and Donation Account, there being no monies left in this account.

Article 37. It was VOTED, standing vote being had, 82 affirmative and 16 opposed, to amend the Zoning Map referred to in Section IIIB as follows:

Increase the depth of Business Commercial Districts from 500 feet to 1000 feet.

Article 38. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Sixty-Six Dollars for the purpose of purchasing one new School Bus for the School Department. Said appropriation to be expended under the direction of the School Committee.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

December 5, 1977

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, December 5, 1977, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated November 16, 1977, and posted on November 17, 1977, as required by law.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott. There not being a quorum (175 voters) at the time, the Moderator declared a recess until such time as a quorum would appear. At 8:20 P.M. a quorum was present and the meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 1. It was unanimously VOTED, to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369), the sum of twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars to the Police Salary Account.

Article 2. It was unanimously VOTED, to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars to the Police Operating Account.

Article 3. It was VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars to the Law Account.

Article 4. It was unanimously VOTED, to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of eight thousand two hundred thirty-nine (\$8,239.00) dollars to the Recreation Site Construction (King Land) Account.

Article 5. It was unanimously VOTED, to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of fourteen thousand (\$14,000.00)

dollars to the Recreation Site Construction Account (King Land).

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, to transfer from the Public Works Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of seven thousand (\$7,000.00) dollars to provide for accounting services in the Town Treasurer's Department, and the sum of three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars for operating expenses in said department, after considerable discussion, the motion was DEFEATED.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, to accept Chapter 41, Section 103 of the General Laws of Massachusetts authorizing the Selectmen to appoint a Purchasing Agent for the Town of Carver, and after considerable discussion, the motion was DEFEATED.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of seven thousand (\$7,000.00) dollars to the Purchasing Agent Salary Account, and the sum of three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars to the Purchasing Agent Operating Account.

It was VOTED to "table" **Article 8.**

Article 9. Motion made and seconded, to transfer from the Department of Public Works Salaries Account the sum of two thousand dollars to the Superintendent of Public Works Salary Account. Considerable discussion followed with the Moderator calling for a standing vote on the question. Standing vote being had with 76 voting in the affirmative and 83 opposed, the motion was declared LOST.

Article 10. It was unanimously VOTED to set up an Ambulance Fund Account under the provisions of Section 53, Chapter 44 of the Massachusetts General Laws. The receipts, when collected, would be set up in such account and at a subsequent Town Meeting could be appropriated for the purpose of replacing and maintaining equipment and ambulance.

Article 11. After discussion, it was VOTED to accept the report of the Planning Board, or to lay out or accept as laid out, the following private ways as public ways:

Cranberry Circle
Edgewood Drive
Wenham Shores Drive

and to see what sum the Town will raise from the tax levy, transfer from available funds, or borrow for the purpose, and see whether the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase land or interests in land or acquire land or interest by eminent domain under Chapter 79 of the General Laws or otherwise for the purpose of this Article.

Article 12. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Overlay Surplus Reserve Fund the sum of twenty-four thousand nine hundred seventeen dollars and thirteen cents (\$24,917.13) to reimburse the

Treasury of the County of Plymouth, said amount being payable from the Treasury of said County as awards for damages caused by taking of land for highway purposes, in accordance with the provisions of the following Plymouth County Commissioners' Decrees namely:

Article 13. It was unanimously VOTED to amend the agreement to the Old Colony Regional Technical High School District Agreement to read:

“In accordance with the provisions of Section VII-B of the Old Colony Regional Vocational Technical High School District Agreement dated January 20, 1972, as amended, that Section 1A entitled ‘Regional District School Committee—Composition’ be amended by striking the second sentence starting with the words ‘All appointments to the Committee’ and ending with ‘shall be chairman’ and substituting the following sentence: ‘All appointments to the Committee to be made by any member town and filling of any vacancies shall be made by an appointing committee; consisting of three (3) members of the Board of Selectmen, three (3) members of the local School Committee, and the Town Moderator, who shall be the Chairperson. The Board of Selectmen and the local School Committee shall designate the members of their respective Boards who will serve on the appointing committee.’ ”

Article 14. It was unanimously VOTED to grant to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, through its Division of Fisheries and Wildlife, a forty-foot easement to be used as a public right-of-way into Muddy Pond in said Carver, the center line of said easement being described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the center line of Main Street, said point being 545 feet, more or less, southerly of the intersection of said center line and a line drawn perpendicular to said center line from a cement bound located at the northwesterly corner of town-owned property; thence south 51 degrees east 427 feet, more or less, to a point; thence south 67 degrees east 628 feet, more or less, to the swamp line.

Also granting the right to use and improve an area beginning at a point in the northerly boundary line of the above-described easement, said point being located on a line perpendicular to a point on the above-described easement center line 370 feet, more or less, southeasterly of the angle point in said easement center line; thence north 23 degrees east 50 feet, more or less, to a point, thence south 67 degrees east 100 feet, more or less, to a point; thence south 23 degrees west 50 feet to a point in the northerly boundary line of the above-described easement; thence north 67 degrees west 100 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning.

Reserving unto the Town of Carver the right and privilege to relocate said easements for the convenience and use of the said town by an instrument in writing signed by the Selectmen of the Town of Carver and recorded in the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

The Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project respectfully submits the following report for 1977.

Concerning activities of the Project for 1977 we are pleased to report that there were no confirmed cases of Eastern Equine Encephalitis (neither human nor horse) in Plymouth County. However, frequent periodic monitoring of pools of mosquitoes by the Lakeville Encephalitis Field Station with the cooperation of the Project, indicated virus activity in each location late in the season. The heaviest virus activity was in Halifax. The project experienced one of their busiest seasons since its inception and received more than double the calls of last year for various activities. The Project answered each call efficiently through radio dispatched units covering 531.23 square miles.

At the beginning of the spring season the area was hit by two major spring storms; this coupled with a ban placed on one of our most useful insecticides (Baytex®) hampered our spring larvicide program, which covered 14,933 acres. The areas sprayed at this time were only those where breeding was the heaviest. Periodic monitoring of larval activity and populations throughout the summer kept the Project abreast of fluctuating populations of adults. 405 acres were sprayed for larvae by pump cans and mist blowers and 11,475 catch basins were treated. The adult populations peaked during late July to mid-August and many calls were received for adult spraying which was accomplished by using mist blowers and cold aerosol foggers, spraying a total of 322,093 acres. In more heavily infested areas the Project used a Bell Helicopter spraying 29,969 acres. Although the Project was busy spraying we maintained operation of one backhoe unit all year and another unit which worked seasonally reclaiming 26,785 feet of trench and maintaining 14,725 feet of salt marsh ditches. Many areas in which the machine was unable to work made hand work necessary for maintenance and 96,534 feet were cleaned.

The Project wishes to thank all city and town departments for their invaluable assistance and also the fine work of many CETA groups. Their cooperative efforts in the cleaning of many brooks, streams and drainage trenches are appreciated.

Food, Nutrition and Health,
Management and Family Finances,
Consumerism and Housing,

Our Expanded Foods & Nutrition Program located in Brockton was federally funded through the University of Massachusetts eight years ago

and is aimed at improving the diets of limited income people through education. This is now being expanded to the rest of the country.

In the adult phase of the program, Nutrition Assistants work with families of limited income primarily through home visits to:

- Improve eating habits
- Buy food wisely and economically
- Store and care for food sanitarily
- Know the food needs of children, adults, and elderly
- Understand the relationship between good nutrition and good health

In the 4-H youth phase of the program, Nutrition Assistants and volunteers work to provide education to youth, which will contribute to personal development and improvement of diets and nutrition of their families.

In Carver this past year, in addition to the 71 regular 4-H members, 256 young people participated in our Mini-Garden Program and in our Giant Pumpkin & Sunflower Contests, and also three weeks' Summer Camp.

SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (SRPEDD)

During 1977, the Town of Carver continued its membership in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District, a planning agency set up by State legislation to serve the thirty communities in southeastern Massachusetts.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or a designee and a planning board member for each member municipality, and six minority and low-income representatives. Carver's District Commission members are David G. Knight and Richard Lennox. Carver has also been represented on several advisory committees to the District Commission.

District staff under the guidance of the Commission and various committees prepares long- and short-range plans for southeastern Massachusetts, including Carver, on such subjects as land use, housing, transit, transportation, economic development, water quality and solid waste as required and funded by the State and Federal governments. Preparation of certain regional reports enabled communities to be eligible for Federal and State funding.

However, most of the District's time is devoted to assisting cities and towns. Through the municipal assistance program each municipality receives a certain amount of time at no cost beyond the per capita assessment. Municipal assistance projects have included the following: Master Plans; Open Space and Recreation Plans; Subdivision Regulations; Landfill Inspections; Site Analyses for Proposed Development; Solid Waste Plans; Drainage Studies; Urban Renewal Plans; Home Rule Charters; Zoning Ordinances; Transportation Corridor Studies; Traffic Circulation Plans; and Industrial Survey Plans.

The District has also served as a conduit for information and assistance on federal programs such as Community Development Block Grants or Public Works Projects, and has enabled local officials to participate in state policy making in the Coastal Zone Management Program, the Offshore Oil Development Program, local growth policy and highway development.

During 1977, the District assisted Carver specifically by preparing a Master Plan; investigating the cost of initiating a municipal water system; and monitoring improvements on Route 44 through Carver.

The District, in essence, represents the collective will of the cities and towns in southeastern Massachusetts. As the responsibilities and problems of municipalities become increasingly complex, the agency can provide the necessary technical assistance, insure cooperation among municipalities, and provide for a comprehensive approach.

In mid-November, the Commission met with Mr. Tirrell, of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District, to take the initial steps toward the implementation of a Wetland Zoning Plan. This must be a concentrated and co-ordinated effort of various boards of the town to protect the natural resources and wetlands of the community.

The Commission is presently engaged in a joint effort with the Recreation Committee to obtain funding for the development of 12 acres of town-owned property for recreation and conservation programs.

The Commission accepted, with regrets, the resignation of Ray Seamans. We wish to thank him for the 4½ years that he served as Chairman of the Commission.

The Conservation Commission wishes also to extend its thanks to the various boards and offices of the town for their co-operation throughout the past year.

REPORT OF THE OFFICE OF PUBLIC PROSECUTOR

Gentlemen:

During the summer of 1977, the new Court House serving the residents of Carver was finally completed. The new structure finally eliminating the Court sitting in different locations on various days of the week. At last, the new home for the Fourth District Court has allowed different procedures to be implemented in processing criminal complaints emanating from the Carver Police Department.

The new procedures require all complaints to be scheduled for a pre-trial conference as soon as is practicable after arraignment of the defendant. Only after the pre-trial conference is completed, is the matter set down for trial and a firm trial date established. This has reduced substantially the number of continuances that had become a blight on the criminal justice system, not only here in the Fourth District Court, but elsewhere.

The Office of Public Prosecutor continues to serve all other town departments, when called upon, for legal assistance in dealing with matters within the jurisdiction of the District Court, including but not limited to, delinquent tax collections.

The office continues to assist the Carver Police Department in all legal matters and procedures relating to law enforcement, in addition to the presentation of evidence before the Court.

The Board of Public Works reports that in the calendar year 1977, the following work was accomplished:

Portions of High, Wareham, Meadow Streets and Rochester Road were sealed. Gates, Church and Pleasant Streets as well as McFarlin, Fosdick and Mayflower Roads were sealed.

2200 feet of new construction, including cleaning, grubbing, drainage, excavating to subgrade, graveling and a binder course of Type I asphalt were accomplished on Plymouth Street.

1000 feet of drainage was installed on South Meadow Road. 1200 feet was installed on N. Main Street at Meetinghouse Road.

In the severe winter of 1977 there were 34 times when the Department was called upon to plow and sand the roads.

The intersection of Purchase and Main Streets was improved with traffic lights, islands and sidewalks to improve the safety of the area.

Shoulders on Mayflower and Rochester Roads, Meadow, Pine, High and Wareham Streets were cut back by removing brush and built-up soil to improve the safety and ease of maintenance on these streets.

Under Chapter 40, Section 6H, work was done on the surface of Bunny's Road, Snappit Street, Cedar Drive, Doreen Way and in the Bates Pond area. All are private roads open to the public.

All Parks and Cemeteries were maintained in the usual manner.

There were 19 burials attended to.

All catch basins in the town were cleaned of sand and debris.

Road sides were mowed in areas of heavy growth. Trash was removed as time permitted. A cooperative program was held with the Jaycees and several youth organizations in a concentrated effort to clean the road sides before Memorial Day.

The Superintendent, Mr. Ralph Stevens, resigned his position effective December 16, 1977, to move to a better position in the Town of Wareham. "Red" Stevens performed his work in a manner that made him many friends throughout Carver. We wish him well in his new position.

REPORT OF THE TOWN PLANNER

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen
Town of Carver

During the year 1977 this office assisted in submitting an application to the Economic Development Administration for a grant to construct a police station and an addition to the Center fire station. EDA has allocated to the Town of Carver \$458,000 for the above stated purpose and construction began in early November.

This office also assisted in the completion of an application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for a grant to improve recreational facilities in the Town of Carver. This application was turned down due to HUD's decision to fund only housing and housing rehabilitation programs.

Applications were also completed for CETA grants for projects in the Town. As a result, two work crews have been hired. One crew of nine men is working on recreational sites in the Town. Their efforts to date are most noticeable at the Town Beach on Lakeview Street at Sampson's Pond and at the Center recreation site behind the Town Hall. The other crew of seven men is working under the direction of the DPW to make improvements on and to clean up Town-owned property throughout Carver.

Work on Street Numbering for the Town was also started. The following is a list of those streets which have been numbered. Numbers were assigned to those residents who were home when I called:

The Drop-in Center is open on Wednesday and Friday afternoons. The Center offers many activities which include the following: crafts, games, films, and refreshments. There are also special holiday parties—Valentine's Day, Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. Birthdays are also observed and celebrated with donations of cake and ice cream.

Newsletters Mailed 2,400

Newsletters are mailed out bi-monthly keeping the elderly informed of legislation, discounts, legal information, and a two-month calendar of activities and services. In one month our mailings increased from 542 to over 600. This means an expansion in all of the services provided by the Council.

The Carver Council on Aging provides many services for those people who are 59 years of age and older. Some of these services are: a pre-retirement seminar in the fall of 1978 with four, two-hour classes, aid in fuel and food emergencies, property tax information, SSI (supplementary security income) and Social Security information. To include all the services that are available in this report is not possible. A list of services may be obtained by contacting the Service Director.

Through our membership in the Plymouth Area Councils on Aging Association, the Carver Council on Aging has acquired the services of a Senior Aid, whose salary is paid by the Department of Labor. The Senior Aid works a total of 20 hours a week doing outreach work, and making friendly visits. The Council on Aging has also obtained through this membership, a bulk rate mailing permit which has cut down some of our mailing expenses.

There are now two mobile parks established in Carver and 2/3 of the residents come under the guidelines of the Council on Aging, qualifying for all the services provided by the Town of Carver.

We wish to thank the Selectmen, the Town Boards and the Townspeople for their tremendous support of our program.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE COMMITTEE ANNUAL AGENCY EVALUATION

During the past year the Carver Public Health Nurse Committee has attempted to draw from many resources to help deliver an effective community health program to the people of Carver. Systemic evaluation of this program has been undertaken at recent meetings of the Public Health Nurse Committee, Budget Committee and Professional Advisory Committee.

Initial steps in the evaluation process was completion of the Self-Evaluation Guide for Community Health Agencies provided by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, by a sub-committee of the Professional Advisory Committee. Recommendations were made, presented at the Professional Advisory Committee meeting for further discussion and at the Public Health Nurse Committee meeting for approval by the Board of Health. Budget committee reviewed fee structure and cost effectiveness of each program.

Summary of Evaluation: During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1977, a total of 593 nursing visits were made. These consisted of 538 morbidity and 55 health promotion visits. Contracts with the Easter Seal Society and Greater Brockton Homemaker-Home Health Aide Services, Inc., continued to be utilized: 147 home health aide visits, 17 physical therapy, and 9 speech therapy visits were made.

Attendance at adult health promotion programs have increased, as well as the scope, which has increased from blood pressure-diabetes screening to include more emphasis on health counseling. A monthly evening health promotion clinic has also been initiated. Because attendance at the pre-school immunization and lead screening clinic has been poor, this program will be redesigned to be more cost effective in the coming year.

With regret we accepted the resignation of Mrs. Anne Albino as consulting supervisor on March 1, 1977. Mrs. Albino did much to improve the administrative functioning and provide supervisory support to the agency. We recognize the loss of her abilities and are actively seeking replacement of her services, as a necessary aspect of providing complete community health care.

Mrs. Loretta Look rejoined the staff on February 16, 1977, after a leave of absence. At present the agency staff consists of two part-time public health nurses, an arrangement that allows for case conferences, increased health counseling time and greater professional input into the agency. Nursing time has increased to an average of thirty hours per week to provide necessary services.

We continue to recognize the need for trained clerical assistance and the Board of Health is currently seeking approval from the Selectmen to add secretarial help to our staff.

The Professional Advisory Board has continued to be actively accepting increasing responsibilities and working more effectively in sub-committees. A public relations chairman has been appointed to assist with promoting knowledge about the agency and its programs.

The Budget Committee has offered assistance in developing the budget, considering fee structure and evaluation of the cost effectiveness of the agency's programs. We hope for increased support of this committee on financial matters in the future.

We have continued our quarterly clinical record reviews involving public health nurses from other agencies. An arrangement that seems particularly effective in providing increased insight into patient problems. These external record reviews have also been an effective utilization review. Proficiency with the problem oriented record has increased during the past year.

The Board of Health, Professional Advisory Committee and Budget Committee has attempted to work with increasing co-ordination and co-operation to provide a quality home health agency for the Town of Carver.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT CARVER PUBLIC SCHOOL 1977

October 1, 1976 school enrollment indicated 860 students in attendance. The October 1, 1977 enrollment showed 985 students enrolled in the schools in grades Kindergarten through Six. This shows a gain of 115 students during this period of time. It would appear that this trend will continue in the future.

With the increase in enrollment both buildings are fully utilized. Adjustments will be needed as we look toward another school year in terms of another increase in the number of new students.

The staff continues to grow to serve the needs of the children. There were six new positions. Four Title I teachers were hired to continue the program for students in Grades One through Six. The Title I Advisory Council members are to be commended for their continued involvement in the program. Their support and direction is appreciated and needed for continued Federal funding of this program.

The school continued to provide programs for those children who are identified under Chapter 766. The Referral Team meets monthly to evaluate students who have been referred by the school personnel or by parents. They may need an educational plan that would be different from one available in our regular school program or may require some modification within one of our present programs.

The Elementary School Evaluation has been completed during the in-service meetings during the year. Recommendations should give direction to curriculum and programs as we look to the future. Some recommended changes have been made that have helped in better scheduling of classes this current school year. One factor that has made this possible is the addition of new personnel to the staff.

Working with a committee of teachers, a Student Handbook of Discipline was put together and presented to the Carver School Committee for adoption. Early in the year students brought home copies of this policy handbook. These handbooks attempt to define disciplinary procedures. Their purpose is to present students, parents, and teachers with an understandable referral guide. Mr. Arne Erickson, Administrative Assistant, has worked closely with the committee, the teachers, the students and the parents to see that rules and regulations as stated in the handbook are followed. It is the general feeling that a positive change has been noted. Mr. Erickson feels that the policy handbook has proved to be a valuable benchmark. Cooperation of the parents has helped in making the policy work.

Under Mr. Erickson's direction, an aide in-service program was insituted. This program focussed on task identification and team development. We feel that it has proved most valuable.

The Carver P.T.O. sponsored many programs during the year including the International Fair which was well attended and a great success. The Circus Program with students from all grade levels was well done and appreciated by everyone.

The P.T.O. Newsletter has served as a means of bringing the home and school closer together through better communications.

The School facilities are very much in demand by community groups for meeting and recreation programs and are providing many worthwhile community activities.

The administration appreciates the cooperation received by everyone this year. We appreciate the support of the community and will strive to continue to prove worthy of your faith.
