COVER STORY

On August 9, 1977 the Board of Selectmen accepted a \$458,000 Federal Grant to be used to build an addition on the Central Fire station consisting of a new Police Station and added facilities to the Fire Station. The award came as the result of the hard work and untiring efforts of Selectmen Frank R. Mazilli and Charles E. Erwin, Police Chief Thomas S. Orr, and I.D.C. Chairman David G. Knight.

Construction by Sullivan & Foster commenced on October 27, 1977. Dedication ceremonies on the completed building as shown on the Town Report covers were conducted on Sunday, October 8, 1978.

APRIL 15, 1978

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Saturday, April 15, 1978, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated February 27, 1978. The meeting was called to order at 3:00 P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott. There being no quorum present, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously Voted to adjourn to Tuesday, April 18, 1978, at 9:00 P.M.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING
ADJOURNED SESSION, APRIL 18, 1978

The Special Town Meeting reconvened at the Governor John Carver School on Tuesday, April 18, 1978. The meeting was called to order at 9:00 P.M. there being a quorum present.

Article 1. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Twenty-four Thousand Six Hundred Twelve Dollars and Sixty-six Cents, (\$24,612.66) from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account, and to transfer the balance of the Garage Construction Account (Article 4 of February 28, 1977 Special Town Meeting) Fourteen Thousand Sixty-eight Dollars and Thirty-four Cents (\$14,068.34) to the Police and Fire Station Construction Account.

Article 2. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Four Thousand Sixty-five (\$4,065.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing Fire Alarm Systems in the Marcus Atwood House, Benjamin Ellis School, and the Town Hall.

Article 3. It was VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars to the Dispatcher's Account.

Article 4. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of \$576.31 from the School Insurance Recovery Account (Windstorm Damage) for the purpose of paying engineering and architectural services in connection with said damage, as provided in G.L., Chapter 44, Section 53.

Article 5. It was unanimously VOTED to "take no action" on Article 5.

There being no further business to come before the meeting it was VOTED to adjourn.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

ADJOURNED SESSION APRIL 18, 1978

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting was called to order on Tuesday, April 18, 1978, at 7:00 P.M., by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott. As a quorum was not present at that time, the meeting recessed to await the appearance of the quorum. A quorum of voters were present at 7:23 P.M. and the Moderator called the meeting to order. Members of the 4-H Club presented the colors and led the Pledge of Allegiance. The Rev. James Gibbons, Pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, gave the Invocation. Article 1 relating to the election of officers having been disposed of at a prior meeting and reading of the Warrant being dispensed with, the meeting proceeded as follows:

Article 2. It was unanimously VOTED to authorized the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1978, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 3. It was unanimously VOTED to fix the salaries of Elected Town Officers in accordance with General Laws Chapter 41, Section 108 as amended, namely:

Meeting adjourned at 9:00 P.M. to act on Articles in the Special Town Meeting Warrant. Meeting reconvened at 9:25 P.M. to continue with Annual Town Meeting Warrant as follows:

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars to the 1979 fiscal year Reserve Account.

Article 6. It was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty (\$14,730.00) Dollars to be used for State Aid Construction and Improvement in conjunction with available State Funds of Thirty-six Thousand Three Hundred Forty-five Dollars, and further to transfer the sum of Thirty-six Thousand Three Hundred Forty-five (\$36,345.00) Dollars from available funds in the treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, reimbursement returned to the Treasury.

Article 7. It was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-five Thousand (\$45,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of preparing, oiling and paving roads that are accepted Public Ways within the Town of Carver.

Article 8. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) from available funds in the Treasury for the sole purpose of meeting charges against the cemetery funds in the Town Treasurer.

Article 9. It was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be used to pay for all private work and material in town cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 10. It was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for a Drainage Account to be expended by the Department of Public Works on various streets that are accepted Public Ways or easements within the Town of Carver.

Article 11. After discussion of this article by Daniel Daly, Chairman of the Board of Assessors, stating that any vote taken would not be binding, it was VOTED to postpone action on ARTICLE 11.

At this time the quorum was questioned, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to adjourn until Wednesday, April 19, 1978, at 7:00 P.M.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

ADJOURNED SESSION APRIL 24, 1978

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M., on Monday, April 24, 1978. There not being a quorum present, the Moderator declared a "brief recess." A quorum present at 7:20 P.M., and the Moderator again called the meeting to order, and the meeting proceeded to act on the remaining Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 12. It was unanimously VOTED to defer action on ARTICLE 12 until 9:30 P.M.

Article 4. It was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$2,300.00) for the Planning Board. (This item not having been VOTED previously when ARTICLE 4 was considered.)

Article 13. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) from the Sale of Real Estate Fund for the purpose of purchasing a parcel of land abutting Town-owned land on Sampson's Pond from the Cranebrook Cranberry Company, Inc., described as follows:

A certain tract or parcel of upland lying in Carver, southerly part and on the westerly side of the outlet of Sampson's Pond; said tract of land forms the northeasterly part of my homestead and is further bounded and described as follows. Beginning at a boulder on the southeasterly shore of said pond and six rods and two links westerly from the centre of a flume, thence running easterly by the shore of said pond to its outlet, then southerly by said outlet to the Mill Pond, then westerly by the shore of the Mill Pond to a bound on the northerly side, thence running North 20° West across the upland to the point of beginning, intending to convey all the land that I own easterly of the above given course and lying between the two described ponds as far as the outlet of Sampson's Pond; said tract of land contains by estimation about fifteen square rods. I also grant

with the premises here-in conveyed a right of way to and from Tremont Street by the present route along the westerly side of the Mill Pond across my remaining land.

Article 14. It was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to be expended by the Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service and choose a Director in accordance with the provision of General Laws of Massachusetts, Chapter 128, Section 41 and 42.

It was unanimously VOTED that Jean O. Gibbs be chosen Director.

Article 15. It was unanimously VOTED that the County Dog Fund, in the amount of (\$968.14), be applied to the Library Account, this amount to be deducted from the Library Operating Expense.

Article 16. It was unanimously VOTED to hear the reports of any standing committees and to abolish any special committee not submitting a report unless otherwise voted, and to establish any new committee. Thereupon, the following reports were made:

1. William R. Holmes reported for the Town Barn Study Committee. The report was accepted and it was VOTED, unanimously, to continue the Committee.

2. Selectman Charles E. Erwin reported the progress of the Zoning-By-Law Study Committee. It was unanimously VOTED to accept the report and to continue the Committee.

3. Selectman Frank R. Mazzilli reported for the Police and Fire Station Building Committee. The report was accepted and it was unanimously VOTED to continue the Committee.

4. It was unanimously VOTED to abolish the School Budget Study Committee.

5. It was unanimously VOTED to abolish the "Marcus Atwood House" Committee.

No new committees were established.

Article 17. It was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Thirteen Thousand Six Hundred Twenty-seven Dollars and Fifty-three cents (\$13,627.53) for the purpose of purchasing one (1) new School Bus for the School Department. This appropriation to be expended under the direction of the School Committee.

Article 18. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Four Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$480.00) for the purpose of repairing the roof of the Carver Public Library.

Article 19. It was VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Four Hundred Ninety-nine Dollars (\$499.00) for the purpose of repairing the heating system of the Carver Public Library.

Article 20. Upon motion duly made and seconded, standing vote being had, with 175 voting in the affirmative and 15 opposed, it was

VOTED to transfer from the Union Cemetery Sale of Lots Fund the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) and raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to purchase five (5) acres of land from John B. and David N. Bradshaw. This land adjoins the Union Cemetery and consists of two parcels, one north of the cemetery, the other south, and described as follows:

The northerly parcel, containing about 3.3 acres, comprises all the land bounded; southerly by the land of Union Cemetery and Union Society, easterly by Main Street, northerly by the center line of the brook which is about 200' north of Union Cemetery, westerly by the projection of the rear wall of the cemetery.

The southerly parcel, containing about 1.7 acres consists of all the land bounded: northerly by Union Cemetery, easterly by Main Street, southerly by the northerly line of the drainage easement 230' south of the cemetery's southerly iron fence and westerly by a line 267' westerly from and parallel to sideline of Main Street.

Article 21. It was unanimously VOTED to take NO ACTION on Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the \$25.00 filing fee for the purpose of providing 50% funding to send two Carver youths, ages 14 to 17, to the Massachusetts Youth Conservation Camp. A maximum of two youths per year to be sent to the camp. Any monies in excess of 50% tuition of two youths will be returned to the Town Treasury. The estimated cost is One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred (\$1,200.00) Dollars for Life Guards and to act anything thereon or thereto. Standing vote being had, 93 in the affirmative and 104 opposed, the motion under Article 22 was declared LOST.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new 1978 New Cab Truck with a 2-3 yard dump body for the Department of Public Works and to act anything thereon or thereto.

Motion by William R. Holmes, to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Fifty-one (\$8,051.00) Dollars. Voice vote being had the motion under Article 23 was declared LOST.

Article 24. It was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred (\$3,600.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing two (2) new snowplows for the Department of Public Works.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nineteen Thousand (\$19,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new 1978 Dump Truck with 6-8 yard dump body for the Department of Public Works and to act anything thereon or thereto.

Motion to transfer Eighteen Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty-six (\$18,736.00) Dollars from Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account, was seconded. Voice vote being had the motion under Article 25 was declared LOST.

Article 26. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Five Thousand Eight Hundred (\$5,800.00) Dollars for the purpose of making repairs to the Town Barn.

Article 27. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Three Thousand Three Hundred Sixty (\$3,360.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing twenty-one (21) Plectron Tone receivers for the Fire Department.

Article 28. It was VOTED to accept Chapter 53, Section 9A of the General Laws of Massachusetts, which provides, in substance, as follows:

Nomination papers: In any city or town which accepts this section, in a city by vote of the city council subject to the provisions of its charter, and in a town by vote of the town meeting, the following provisions shall apply with respect to nomination papers:

The final date for obtaining blank nomination papers for nomination to city or town office shall be forty-eight week day hours prior to the hour on which nomination papers are required to be submitted to the registrars of voters for certification.

Each candidate shall file with the city or town clerk, prior to obtaining blank nomination papers, a statement containing his name and address, and the city or town office for which he intends to be a candidate.

No candidate for city or town office shall receive more blank nomination papers than will contain the number of signatures required to place his name in nomination, multiplied by five.

Article 29. It was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Dollars and Twenty cents (\$7.20) to pay the following unpaid bill of 1977:

Craigs' Pharmacy, Inc. (Veterans Benefits Account) \$7.20.

Article 30. It was unanimously VOTED, to establish an industrial development financing authority for industrial development purposes, pursuant to Chapter 40D of the Massachusetts General Laws.

Article 31. Upon motion by Frank R. Mazzilli, it was unanimously VOTED to grant to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, through its Division of Fisheries and Wildlife, a forty-foot easement to be used as a public right-of-way into Muddy Pond in said Carver, the center line of said easement being described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the center line of Main Street, said point being 545 feet, more or less, southerly of the intersection of said

center line and a line drawn perpendicular to said center line from a cement bound located at the northwesterly corner of town-owned property; thence south 51 degrees east 427 feet, more or less, to a point; thence south 67 degrees east 628 feet, more or less, to the swamp line.

Also granting the right to use and improve an area beginning at a point in the northerly boundary line of the above-described easement, said point being located on a line perpendicular to a point on the above-described easement center line 370 feet, more or less, southeasterly of the angle point in said easement center line; thence north 23 degrees east 50 feet, more or less, to a point; thence south 67 degrees east 100 feet, more or less, to a point; thence south 23 degrees west 50 feet to a point in the northerly boundary line of the above-described easement; thence north 67 degrees west 100 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning.

Reserving unto the Town of Carver the right and privilege to relocate the above described easement for the convenience and use of the town by an instrument in writing signed by the Selectmen of the Town of Carver and recorded in the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds. The expense of said relocation shall be assumed by the Town of Carver. Further, any improvements installed by the Commonwealth shall be replaced at the expense of the Town of Carver.

Article 32. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the town-owned land described as follows to the Recreation Committee and the Conservation Commission:

The land in Carver bounded and described as follows:

Located between North Carver and Center Carver, at "Cross Paths" as called where Purchase Street crosses Main Street. The bounds and courses as hereinafter shown are taken from a deed of said premises dated June 26, 1880. Andrew F. Barrows to Thomas Vaughan and recorded Book 466, Page 294. Beginning at a stake which is the southeasterly corner of L.W. Rickards lot; then south 36° east 52 rods to a pine tree marked and in the range of the Plymouth lot so-called being a corner bound of Chandler Robbins lot; standing on the easterly side of the road leading from Popes Point to Plymouth; thence easterly by said road 78 rods to a stake standing on the westerly side of said road; being another corner of said Rickard's land; thence westerly by said Rickards land 62 rods to the bounds first mentioned. Containing 11 acres more or less.

Article 33. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred (\$6,500.00) Dollars for for the purpose of the maintenance and the utilities for the new Fire and Police Station.

Article 34. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Nine Hundred (\$900.00) Dollars for the purpose of repairing the South and Center Carver Fire Station roof.

Article 35. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing Office Equipment for the Town Hall.

Article 36. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Fifteen Thousand Six Hundred Fifty (\$15,650.00) Dollars for the purpose of paying the salaries of the Fire Chief, Deputies, Secretary and Firemen.

Article 37. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars for maintenance and the utilities for the Marcus Atwood House.

Article 38. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars to the Law Account.

At this time, it being 9:30 P.M. the meeting proceeded to act on ARTICLE 12, action on said Article having been previously deferred until 9:30 P.M.

Article 12. It was VOTED to transfer from Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars for the purpose of maintaining and updating the revaluation of the Town of Carver. This sum to be under the direction of the Board of Assessors.

Article 39. Motion made and seconded, standing vote being, 180 in the affirmative with 36 opposed, it was VOTED to "table" ARTICLE 39 until completion of ARTICLE 40.

Article 40. Motion made by Clark Griffith, to amend Article so as to include "reconstruction" and "resurfacing" and to add "Cranberry Circle." It was so VOTED.

It was VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of resurfacing and reconstructing a section of Edgewood Road, Wenham Shore Drive and Cranberry Circle.

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift from the Maguire Development Corporation a parcel of land within the Wenham Shores Development, shown on Assessors' Sheet 42A, lot 73, known as the "Recreation Lot."

This Article was duly moved and seconded. Standing vote being had with 86 voting in the affirmative and 60 opposed, the motion was DEFEATED, the Moderator ruling that a 2/3 vote was required for the motion to carry.

Article 41. It was unanimously VOTED to adopt as Article XVI of the Town of Carver By-Laws the following article:

“The Town may make such temporary repairs on such private roads within the Town as the Board of Selectmen and Department of Public Works shall jointly deem necessary, provided, however, that:

(a) Such repairs shall be only to the extent required as determined by the D.P.W.;

(b) Drainage may be included when deemed necessary by the D.P.W.;

(c) Such repairs shall be made only when required by public necessity as determined by the Selectmen and D.P.W. jointly;

(d) No repairs shall be made unless at least 60% of the abutters to the way shall petition in writing the Selectmen or the D.P.W.;

(e) No betterment charges shall be assessed unless authorized by vote of an annual town meeting;

(f) The town shall not be liable on account of damages caused by such repairs;

(g) No repairs shall be made to any private way unless the way shall have been opened to public use for 6 years prior to the date of the petition for repair, unless the Selectmen and D.P.W. determine that the public safety requires such repairs; and

(h) No cash deposit shall be required for said repairs.

Article 42. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of doing ordinary repairs on roads in private ways under Chapter 40, Section 6N of the General Laws.

Article 43. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of hiring independent auditors to audit the Town.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

MAY 22, 1978

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, May 22, 1978, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated May 4, 1978. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M., by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott; there not being a quorum present at that time, the Moderator declared a recess for a "few minutes." At 7:45 P.M., a quorum (175 voters at least) appeared, and a reading of the Warrant being dispensed with, the meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 1. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Overlay Surplus Reserve Fund the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred (\$10,500.00) Dollars to the Municipal Employees' Insurance Account.

Article 2. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Overlay Surplus Reserve Fund the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to the Tax Collector-Operating Expense Account.

Article 3. It was VOTED to transfer from the Overlay Surplus Reserve Fund the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to the Elections, Registrations and Street Listing Account.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article I, Section 2 of the Town By-Laws as follows:

Section 2. Zero (0) qualified voters shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any town meeting, including special town meetings; provided, however, that Three Hundred Fifty (350) qualified voters shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any town meeting where any bonded indebtedness is to be voted upon, and provided, also, that a number less than a quorum may from time to time adjourn the same.

Selectman Frank R. Mazzilli moved that "No quorum shall be necessary (etc.). Motion duly seconded. Thereupon, Mr. Daniel Daly moved to add the following: "Town meetings, at which the Zero quorum applies, shall have sessions that shall meet for no longer than a pre-posted maximum length of time." After considerable discussion, voice vote being had, the motion to amend was declared Lost. Thereupon, voice vote being had on the original motion, the motion was DEFEATED.

Article 5. Upon motion by William R. Holmes, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Two (\$2.00) Dollars from available funds in the Treasury to purchase certain parcels of land for drainage purposes to eliminate the drainage problems on Forest Street. Said parcels of land being as shown on Assessors' Sheet 52, Lots 2-44 and 2-45.

Article 6. It was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Six Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy-five (\$6,975.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a

1978 Suburban-Type vehicle for the School Department. This appropriation to be expended under the direction of the School Committee.

Article 7. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty-five (\$6,825.00) Dollars from the funds received from the Federal Government for snow removal reimbursement to the Snow Removal Account to partially cover the overdrafts resulting from the storm of February, 1978.

Article 8. It was unanimously VOTED to return to the School Department the building known as the Benjamin Ellis School and the land thereon.

Article 9. It was unanimously VOTED to amend ARTICLE 11 of the Special Town Meeting adjourned session May 19, 1975, by inserting the words "or notes" after the word "bonds."

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept an amendment to the Plymouth-Carver Regional District Agreement initiated by vote of the Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee adopted on April 28, 1978 and entitled "Amendment No. IV to the Agreement for the Establishment of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District," which Amendment provides in substance that on and after July 1, 1978 the regional district schools shall comprise grades kindergarten through twelve, inclusive, and that the Towns shall retain jurisdiction over the pupils in kindergarten through grade six until July 1, 1978.

The foregoing Article was duly moved and seconded. Thereupon, it was unanimously VOTED to allow Mrs. Doris Krensky, Chairman of Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee (she not being a registered voter in Carver) to speak. Mrs. Krensky explained the Regional District Committees' position in the matter, and the advantages to be derived by both Towns with full regionalization. Mr. Erwin K. Washburn set forth his reasons why the Article should not be adopted. There was some further discussion of the matter, and voice Vote being had, the motion to amend the Agreement as set forth in the Article was unanimously DEFEATED.

Article 11. It was unanimously VOTED to establish a School Needs Study Committee to consist of the School Committee and three (3) members to be appointed by the Moderator and one (1) member to be appointed by the Selectmen.

Article 12. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars from the Local School Building Committee Account to the School Needs Study Committee.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

Adjourned, at 9:05 P.M.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING SEPTEMBER 25, 1978

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School (New Addition) on Monday, September 25, 1978, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated September 6, 1978. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott; there not being a quorum present at that time, the Moderator called a recess until a quorum should appear. At 7:37 P.M., a quorum appeared, the meeting was called to order and proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. It was VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) Funds the sum of Sixteen Thousand (\$16,000.00) Dollars for the town's contribution to the Municipal Employees' Unemployment Compensation Fund.

Article 2. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) Funds the sum of Two Thousand, Nine Hundred and Forty (\$2,940.00) Dollars for the purpose of paying the salary of the custodian at the Benjamin Ellis School.

Article 3. It was VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) Funds the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars to be used for janitorial services for the Marcus Atwood House and the new police and fire station.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 93-369) Funds the sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars to the Police Salaries Account. The Article was duly moved and seconded, and vote being had by show of hands, the motion was DEFEATED.

Article 5. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) Funds the sum of Two Thousand Two Hundred (\$2,200.00) Dollars to the Police and Fire Dispatchers Account.

At this time, it was VOTED to reconsider the action taken on Article 4. Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED as follows:

Article 4. It was VOTED unanimously, to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) the sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) to the Police Salaries Account.

Article 6. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) Funds the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-seven Dollars and Eighty Cents (\$2,457.80) to the Department of Public Works Salaries Account.

Article 7. After considerable discussion and a vote to "cut off" debate (Vote 163 to 29) it was VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) Funds the sum of Eight Thousand Six Hundred Fifteen (\$8,615.00) Dollars to be used in conjunction with the Insurance Recovery check of Four Thousand Seventeen (\$4,017.00) Dollars for the purpose of repairing and remodeling the outside of the Carver Public Library.

Article 8. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-Recession (Title II, Public Law 94-369) Funds the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to the Recreation Site Construction (King Land) Account for the purpose of completing dugouts.

Article 9. It was VOTED to transfer the sum of Twenty-two Thousand, Seven Hundred and Eleven Dollars and Sixty-nine Cents (\$22,711.69) from the School Insurance Recovery Account (Windstorm Damage) to the Schools-Vocational Education Account for the purpose of making repairs and alterations to the school buildings.

Article 10. It was unanimously VOTED (Voice Vote) to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Thirty-four Dollars and Ninety-three Cents (\$34.93) to pay the following unpaid bills of 1978,

The Standard Times (Recreation Committee) \$10.12

Wareham Auto Parts, Inc. (Council on Aging) 24.81

Article 11. It was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars to meet interest charges on temporary loans in anticipation of the revenue for Fiscal Year 1979.

Article 12. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Machinery Fund Account to the Machinery Account the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars for the purpose of preparing the town vehicles for the coming winter and pay unexpected bills.

Article 13. It was VOTED to transfer the sum of Twenty-five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars in the Treasury to the Department of Public Works Salaries Account to be used to pay employees through June 30, 1979.

Article 14. It was unanimously VOTED to accept Section 22D of Chapter 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws which prohibits the parking of any vehicle parked or standing on any part of any way under the control of the municipality in such a manner to impede in any way the removal or plowing of snow or ice and/or violation of any parking rule or regulation of the Town.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as Article XVII of the Town of Carver By-Laws the following article:

"Any person appointed fulltime or hired fulltime after October 1, 1978, excluding professional personnel of the School Department, shall be required to reside in the Town of Carver within six (6) months from the date of their appointment, with an allowance of an additional six (6) months due to extenuating circumstances with the permission of the appointing authority of the department. After considerable discussion, voice vote being had, the motion was unanimously DEFEATED.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as Article XVIII of the Town of Carver By-Laws the following article:

"Section 1. No person shall drink any alcoholic beverages as defined in Chapter 138, Section 1 of the Massachusetts General Laws while on, in or upon any public way or upon any way, in which the public has a right of access as invitees or licensees, or private land or place without consent of the owner or person or persons in control thereof.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to drink any alcoholic beverage or to have in his possession an open container thereof in any public park, except at functions duly authorized by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Carver.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to drink any alcoholic beverage or to have in his possession any open container thereof on any public beach, except on functions duly authorized by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Carver.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to drink any alcoholic beverage or to have in his possession any open container thereof on any public recreational area or playground, except on functions duly authorized by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Carver.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person to drink any alcoholic beverage or to have in his possession any open container thereof in any public building or upon the grounds on which they stand, except on functions duly authorized by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Carver.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, dump, deposit or strew or cause to be thrown, dumped, deposited or strewn, any bottle, glass crockery, plastic can or part thereof upon the ground or within or about any building in any public park or beach or recreational area or in any public way or right of way to which the public has access at any time.

Section 7. All alcoholic beverages being used in violation of this ordinance shall be seized and safely held until final adjudication of the charge against the person or persons arrested or summoned before court.

Section 8. Any person who shall violate any provision of by-law shall be fined not less than Fifty Dollars, nor more than Two Hundred Dollars or imprisoned for a term not exceeding thirty days."

After considerable discussion, voice vote being had, the motion to adopt was DEFEATED.

Article 17. It was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Twenty-one Thousand (\$21,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing three (3) vehicles to be used as police cruisers.

Article 18. It was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing materials to build an addition to the existing garage at the Governor John Carver School to serve as additional storage area.

Article 19. It was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars to the Police Operating Account.

Article 20. A motion was seconded, by Erwin K. Washburn, "to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of One Thousand One Hundred and Ninety (\$1,190.00) Dollars to be used for the purpose of purchasing seven (7) CB radios, with antennas, installed for each of the five town-owned school buses and two mini-buses, for emergency communications. It was SO VOTED.

Article 21. It was unanimously VOTED to establish an industrial development financing authority for industrial development purposes, pursuant to Chapter 40D of the Massachusetts General Laws, and make the appropriate findings and declarations.

It was unanimously VOTED as follows:

"It is hereby declared that an Industrial Development Financing Authority is needed in the Town of Carver and that (1) unemployment or the threat thereof exists in the Town of Carver, or (2) security against future unemployment and lack of business opportunity is required in the town, and that unemployment or the threat thereof can be alleviated or the security against future unemployment and lack of business opportunity can be provided, by attracting new industry to the town through an industrial development project or projects financed under Chapter 40D, as amended, of the Massachusetts General Laws. It is hereby determined that there is a need for such an authority and in making this determination, this town meeting has taken into consideration the town's ability to adjust to any expected increase in employment and business activity from such industrial development."

Article 22. It was VOTED as provided in General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 1, to authorize the Town Treasurer to act as Collector of Taxes for a term corresponding with that of the Town Treasurer at such annual salary as may be fixed by vote of the town.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

STATE PRIMARY ELECTION

September 19, 1978

Pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated August 15, 1978, a meeting of the qualified voters of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Tuesday, September 19, 1978. The meeting was called to order at 10:00 A.M., by the Warden, Eugene P. Souza, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the forthcoming State Election. A total of 1100 Republican Ballots, 2420 Democratic Ballots, and 50 American Party Ballots were delivered to the Ballot Clerks by the Town Clerk. The ballot box registered zero (0) at the opening of the polls, and the Warden declared the polls open at 10:00 A.M. and announced that the polls would close at 8:00 P.M. The Election continued without interruption until 8:00 P.M., at which time the Warden declared the polls closed. At that time the Ballot Box registered a total of 609 ballots cast, which tallied with the records of the Ballot Clerks, showing a total of 207 Republican Ballots and 402 Democratic Ballots. Of the Democratic Ballots 397 were cast by voters in person and 5 were Absentee Ballots. Of the Republican Ballots 206 were cast by voters in person and one (1) was an Absentee Ballot. There were no American Party Ballots cast.

**PLYMOUTH COUNTY
MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT**

The Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project respectfully submits the following report for 1978.

The activities of the Project for 1978 were centered around more permanent forms of mosquito control such as water management, source reduction and the treatment of larvae. However, as the summer began, a tremendous hatch of spring species (*Aedes*) came off earlier and larger than expected. This forced the Project into the most extensive adult program in its history — spraying 265,965 acres with six vehicle mounted sprayers. Even though the calls for spraying and the population of mosquitoes were so intense the Project proceeded with an efficient program to counter act the onslaught of mosquitoes. It must also be noted that the program did not include aerial adult spraying to accomplish their goal.

Despite major storms upsetting the balance of the Projects efforts the following programs were completed: pre-hatch treatment of 1,569 acres, larviciding of 323 acres and water management cleaning of 114,462 feet of trenches by hand work and 22,500 feet by machine.

Constant monitoring of adult populations by the Lakeville Encephalitis Field Station indicated unusually high populations in most areas checked. Concern was centered around the presence of virus in *Culiseta Melanura* as the summer progressed. Virus isolations exceeded last years figures for this area in several locations but despite this rise in virus iolations no human cases were contracted and only two in horses were confirmed during 1978.

In 1978 all ten Projects in Massachusetts combined their efforts with the University of Massachusetts for the addition of an extension specialist for mosquitoes and biting flies. Mr. Jere Downing was appointed to this position beginning July 1, 1978. His duties are to assist each Project, the public and town and city governmental agencies in any way he can and to assure a more comprehensive understanding of work techniques related to mosquito control.

Our Salt Marsh Maintenance Program was reviewed by the Army Corp of Engineers and the Department of Fish and Game this past summer. The Corp of Engineers are responsible for the issuing of permits for the placement of spoils and debris taken from ditches on the marsh. At this time the Project has received a favorable report from the Corp. of Engineers. At a later date they will review the inland water management practices of the Project in order to formulate a specific permit with restrictions to cover both salt marsh and inland water management work.

The Project wishes to thank all city and town departments for their invaluable assistance and also the fine work of many CETA groups. Their cooperative efforts in the cleaning of many brooks, streams and drainage trenches are appreciated.

**SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND
ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT
(SRPEDD)**

During 1978, the Town of Carver continued its membership in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District, a planning agency set up by state legislation to serve the communities in southeastern Massachusetts.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or a designee, and a planning board member from each member municipality, and six minority and low-income representatives.

Carver's Commission members are David G. Knight, representing the Board of Selectmen, and Timothy J. McGillicuddy, representing the Planning Board. Mr. Knight serves as the Vice-Chairman of the District Commission. Carver has also been represented on several advisory committees to the District Commission.

District staff under the guidance of the Commission and various committees prepares plans for southeastern Massachusetts on such subjects as land use, housing, transit, transportation, economic development, water quality and solid waste as required and funded by the state and federal governments. Preparation of certain regional reports enables communities to be eligible for state and federal funding.

Most of the District's time, however, is devoted to assisting cities and towns. Through the municipal assistance program each municipality receives a certain amount of time at no cost beyond the per capita assessment. Municipal assistance projects can include the following: Master Plans; Open Space and Recreation Plans; Subdivision Regulations; Landfill Inspections; Site Analyses for Proposed Development; Solid Waste Plans; Drainage Studies; Urban Renewal Plans; Home Rule Charters; Zoning Ordinances; Transportation Corridor Studies; Traffic Circulation Plans; and Industrial Survey Plans.

The District also serves as a conduit for information and assistance on federal programs such as Community Development Block Grants or Public Works Projects and enables local officials to participate in state and federal policy making.

During 1978, the District assisted Carver specifically by revising zoning provisions for wetlands and floodplains. The SRPEDD staff assisted Carver with industrial development efforts, historic preservation, and preparation of an application for assistance from the US Farmers Home Administration. The staff also provided the Town with information on community development programs.

The District, in essence, represents the collective will of the cities and towns in southeastern Massachusetts. As the responsibilities and problems of the municipalities become increasingly complex, the agency can provide the necessary technical assistance, insure cooperation among municipalities, and provide for a comprehensive approach.

REPORT OF THE OFFICE OF PUBLIC PROSECUTOR

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen
Town of Carver

Gentlemen:

The following is a report of the office of Public Prosecutor, particularly as it pertains to the services rendered by the office to the five towns comprising the program, during the first year the new court house in West Wareham has been in operation. An approximate list of the number of complaints that have been processed by your department during the past year is as follows: 1,112 Complaints, 511 Defendants. These complaints involve not only major felonies and misdemeanors but also minor motor vehicle and by-law violations.

The new trial system being utilized at the Fourth District Court now requires that every case, except for some minor motor vehicle violations, are not pre-tried either on the arraignment date or a date subsequent thereto. This has eliminated the necessity of police officers and witnesses being present before the Court, unless absolutely necessary for the trial of the case. Furthermore, it has eliminated the number of costly continuances which were being granted by the Court over the last several years, thus further reducing the hours that witnesses have had to spend in Court merely waiting for their case to be heard. The result has been an orderly trial list each day the Court is in session.

A direct consequence of the new procedures is the substantial savings of dollars for all the towns in police overtime for Court appearances. Witnesses now are not brought into Court unless absolutely necessary.

Furthermore, at my suggestion, Judge Anderson has agreed to schedule pre-trial conferences on each day of the week as well as trials, so as to more evenly distribute the work load of the Court. Two judges are sitting three days a week, if not more, in order to facilitate the orderly business of the Court.

The office has continued to be of service to all the Towns in areas wherein redress for violations and assistance can be obtained through the District Court system. The following being some of the examples:

1. Town of Rochester Board of Health — violations under State Sanitary Code;
2. Wareham Board of Health — violations of the State Sanitary Code;
3. Building Inspector, Town of Carver — zoning violation notice and consultations;
4. Building Inspector, Town of Wareham — building use restrictions (Rose Point building violations);
5. Plumbing Inspector, Town of Wareham — State Sanitary Code violations and plumbing code violations, numerous complaints;

6. Tax Collector, Town of Marion — delinquent excise taxes, personal property taxes, and insufficient funds checks, resulting in small claims action, notification, etc.;
 7. Tax Collector, Town of Wareham — delinquent excise taxes, personal property taxes, and insufficient funds checks, resulting in small claims action, notification, etc.;
 8. Carver Board of Health — State Sanitary Code Violations;
 9. Town of Wareham, Sewerage By-law Violations — failure to connect to the sanitary sewerage system;
 10. Town of Mattapoisett — prosecutions involving licensing law violations under the dog laws, and restitution for damages done to fire alarm system due to accidents;
 11. Tri-Town Regional Refuse Disposal District — collection of funds for delinquent creditors;
 12. The preparation and review of search warrants for all Towns, including legal advice and assistance prior to the execution of the warrant, including assistance in police investigations;
 13. In the matters involving child molesting cases, the office has investigated and assisted in the preparation of three serious and delicate cases in regards to sexual deviation, two cases from the Town of Wareham and one case from the Town of Marion, which is still pending before the Court;
 14. The review and defense of all types and kinds of pre-trial motions before the Court, as well as the preparation and filing of answers for Motions of Discovery in connection with criminal prosecutions of all kinds and types;
 15. Furthermore, we are involved in prosecutions of private complaints from all Towns, primarily dealing with domestic violence and neighborhood disputes, larceny by check complaints from private business concerns and the like, even though there has been no official police action from the towns, culminating from these complaints.
- Towns by myself, not only as a Friend of the Court, but primarily to help keep the peace and tranquility of the communities in an area where there is no one else to assist these residents in their peculiar need.
16. Liaison and coordinator between the District Attorney's office and our local departments in regards to matters pertaining to the Fourth District Court of Plymouth County, which will include a meeting next month between the District Attorney and your Police Chief; and
 17. Also prosecutions and advice and counsel to members of the school departments of Old Rochester Regional and Wareham in regards to student conduct of a criminal or quasi-criminal nature;
 18. Assistance to the Department of Public Welfare in matters relating

to support and illegitimacy, when originating from the Towns participating in the program.

It is my understanding that, with the implementation of the new Court Reform enactment, that zoning law violations may now be handled in the District Court. This will eliminate the past procedure which was costly, requiring the Zoning Enforcement Officer to petition the Superior Court for redress and compliance.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Honorable Board of Selectmen
Town of Carver

This past year was a period of transition for the Department of Public Works. Planning was a prerequisite that has or will affect all phases of the Public Works function.

Work accomplished includes:

The Town Barn had a new asphalt shingle roof installed. A new heating system was installed to heat the Superintendent's Office and three previously unheated truck bays. Those previously uninsulated areas of the Town Barn have also been insulated to reduce fuel cost. In general, the Town Barn was given a face up-lifting with new paint, concrete aprons and paved entrance.

The Plymouth Street reconstruction project was completed with the placement of the 1½" bituminous concrete wearing surface, guardrail and loam and seeding of the slopes.

2500' of roadway in Wenham Shores was reconstructed by reclamation of the existing pavement to provide a stable base for the 1½" bituminous concrete wearing surface.

Portions of High Street, Fuller Street, Oak Drive, Maple Drive and Birch Terrace were penetrated and sealed with portions of Wareham Street, Holmes Street and Beaver Dam Road being sealed. Center Street was stone sealed.

Sections of Route 44 and Tremont Street were paved with bituminous concrete pavement.

600' of drainage was installed on South Meadow Road. 700' of drainage was installed on West Street. Other smaller drainage problems were eliminated.

Work on the intersection improvements began, but due to circumstances beyond our control, the work wasn't completed before winter. Work is scheduled to begin again in the spring with completion before summer expected.

There were 23 burials attended to.

All Parks and Cemeteries were maintained in the usual manner.

Eleven diseased Dutch Elm trees were removed and disposed of with trees on a three to one basis replacing those removed.

The complete fleet of Department of Public Works vehicles are now radio-controlled to provide a more efficient operation. The radios were supplied from surplus from the Police and Fire Departments with a minimal cost for installation.

Two new dugouts have been erected at the Center Carver ballfield, along with two new portable grandstands which can be used throughout the Town for sporting events.

The winter of 1978 produced approximately seven feet of snow with varying amounts from 4" to 28" during the "Blizzard of 1978."

Litter and vandalism of Town property appears to be the biggest problem for the D.P.W. Close coordination with the Police Department is being instituted to try and control the problem

Five acres of land was purchased around the Union Cemetery with the preparation of new gravesites now in progress.

Over the past year this Department has worked very closely with the Massachusetts D.P.W. State Aid Engineers in obtaining Federal funds for reconstruction of Town roads. To date we have procured two million dollars for the resurfacing and rehabilitation of Route 58 from the Wareham line to the Plympton line. Recently we have been informed that the reconstruction of South Meadow Road has been approved with the estimated construction cost being one million dollars.

Several other projects are being looked at to obtain Federal funds.

The goals of this Department in the next few years are to provide maximum service for the most economical cost.

This Department would like to express its gratitude to other Town Departments and especially the D.P.W. employees for a job well done over the past year.

We have developed a form for obtaining more pertinent data such as medical history, medications, etc. Monthly evening clinics were offered on a trial basis and discontinued because of poor attendance and cost-ineffectiveness. Future plans include trial daytime clinics at the Atwood House in So. Carver to see if the need in this area of several mobile home parks can be demonstrated.

In cooperation with the School Department a pre-school immunization was held in late spring. We plan to continue to work with the School Nurse in depth to determine the specific needs for updating immunizations.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1978, 820 nursing visits were made. These consisted of 640 morbidity and 180 health promotion visits. Through contracts with the Easter Seal Society and Greater Brockton Homemaker-Home Health Aide Services, Inc., the following visits were made: 233 home health aide; 70 physical therapy and 21 speech therapy visits.

At the Blood Pressure Screening Clinics, 383 patients were counseled, including 62 new admissions.

Nancy Jones was hired as Consulting Supervisor in January, 1978. With this position filled, the Supervisor was able to increase communication with area agencies and take advantage of important meetings relevant to our agency.

Mrs. Loretta Look resigned in October to become School Nurse in Carver. While we regret her absence, we look forward to working with her in her new role and hope she will continue to serve on our Professional Advisory Committee as her input would be valuable. We are in the process of reviewing resumes and interviewing applicants for her position.

Our Professional Advisory Committee has shown an interest in taking a more active role. On a rotating basis, members will be attending area MACHA meetings with our staff and will also be included in record review. We feel that the more education the Committee receives regarding our agency and its concerns, the more input they will be able to contribute.

Our records reviews continue to be of great value in assessing the utilization of the services we provide as well as the appropriateness of such services. We continue to involve Public Health Nurses from other agencies for these audits and plans have been made to include a Physical Therapist at our next review.

We find our record audits serve as an effective utilization review. During the last year we have attended workshops to increase our knowledge in working with the problem solving approach. We have implemented changes in our records to reflect this and plan to re-evaluate periodically to determine if our records demonstrate the quality of our nursing care.

We have worked with our Board of Health, Professional Advisory Committee and Budget Committee to determine a valid basis for each service provided, to explore possibilities for additional services, to establish sound administrative practices and last but not least, to provide quality care to our patients.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT CARVER PUBLIC SCHOOLS 1978

The last day of attendance in 1977 gave us a student enrollment of exactly 1,000. 1978 ended with an enrollment of 1,040. Growth appears to be continuing, but at a diminished rate.

The new school year brought numerous changes. The Benjamin Ellis School, in South Carver, was refurbished and re-opened. It is the home of our six sections of Kindergarten.

Three new teaching stations were established due to enrollment growth. Federal grants brought us a full-time speech therapist, an additional Title I instructor, a part-time counselor, and two CETA aides.

We concluded the calendar year with a staff of 68 professionals and 31 supportive persons.

Our most significant changes have been in personnel. 1978 witnessed the retirement or resignation of several individuals that had served the children of Carver for many decades. In August Mrs. Florence Sand, teacher, retired. During her numerous years of service she became a leading exponent of academic excellence, discipline, and common sense.

Mrs. Irene Williams, supervisor of cafeterias, retired at the end of the school year. She was not only a cook par excellence, but a warm and gracious lady.

In mid-August, Mr. Marcel Richard, principal, resigned to take an administrative position with the Plymouth Public Schools. Mr. Richard had done yeoman's service during a difficult education era.

Mrs. Gertrude Wilson, school nurse, re-entered private practice in October.

The preceding vacancies were filled as follows:

Mrs. Mary Chase, teacher for Mrs. Sand

Mrs. Roberta Perry, assistant supervisor of cafeterias, for Mrs. Williams

Mrs. Loretta Look, public health nurse, for Mrs. Wilson

Mr. Arne Erickson, Administrative Assistant, for Mr. Richard.

Recognition and gratitude must be extended to our P.T.O. and our Title I Advisory Council for their tireless efforts and unwavering support. The P.T.O.'s school sponsored presentations, gifts, and newsletter have helped to make us a more viable education community.

School facilities are used heavily by community groups. Almost every evening civic, public service, and recreational groups are using the system's facilities

Numbers - enrollment, personnel, transportation, and budgetary - are clear indicators that we are no longer a small school system. Numbers, however, have not effected the quality of education in

Carver. I am pleased to report that a fine team continues to deliver quality educational experiences.

The Carver Public Schools sincerely appreciate the support of our community and will continue to merit the backing of the people of Carver.
