Annual Town Meeting

April 14, 1980

The Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School House on Monday, April 14, 1980, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated February 28, 1980. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M., by the Moderator, Arthur P. DeCoursey, there being a quorum present. The meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, beginning with Article 2, Article 1, relating to election of officers, etc., having been disposed of at a prior meeting, as follows:

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1980, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes, therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from free cash in the treasury the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars to meet interest charges on temporary loans in anticipation of the revenue for Fiscal Year 1981.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from free cash in the treasury the sum of Twenty-one Thousand (\$21,000.00) Dollars and to transfer from the Overlay Surplus Reserve Fund the sum of Nineteen Thousand (\$19,000.00) Dollars to the 1981 fiscal year Reserve Account.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars from available funds in the treasury to be expended by the Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service and choose a Director in accordance with the provisions of General Laws of Massachusetts, Chapter 128, Section 41 and 42. Thereupon, Jean O. Gibbs was unanimously elected Director, County Aid to Agriculture.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to fix the salaries of Elected Town Officers in accordance with General Laws Chapter 41, Section 108 as amended, namely:

Town Treasurer & Tax Collector	\$12,240.80 per annum
Town Clerk	2,225.60 per annum
Moderator - \$50.00 for the Annual Town Meeting and \$20.00 for each Special Town Meeting	
Member of School Board	3.00 per hour
Chairman, Board of Selectmen	1,800.00 per annum
Two Members, Board of Selectmen	1,550.00 per annum
All other elected officers	3.00 per hour

At 7:55 P.M., the Annual Town Meeting was recessed as a Special Town Meeting had been called for 8:00 o'clock P.M. At 10:15 P.M., the Special Town Meeting having been completed, the Annual Town Meeting was reconvened. Motion was made to adjourn to Wednesday, April 16, 1980, at 7:30 P.M. After some discussion the motion was withdrawn, and the meeting proceeded to act on Article 7 of the Warrant.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded and after some discussion of the matter, standing Vote being had, with 107 voting in the affirmative and 17 opposed it was VOTED to adopt a by-law establishing an Historic District Commission, under the provisions of Chapter 40C, General Laws, as most recently amended by Chapter 168, Acts of 1975. For full text of the by-law see attached addendum incorporated herein by reference. (Full text of By-Law as adopted is in separate file in Town Clerk's Office).

Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn to Tuesday, April 15, 1980, at 7:30 P.M.

Special Town Meeting April 14, 1980

A Special Town Meeting was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, April 14, 1980, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated March 26, 1980. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M., by the Moderator, Arthur P. DeCoursey, there being a quorum present. The meeting then proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to appropriate from available funds in the treasury the sum of One Thousand two hundred (\$1,200.00) dollars for Elections, Registrations and Street Listing.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to appropriate from available funds in the treasury the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a new Ballot Box for use at all Town and State Elections.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars to the Veterans' Benefits Account.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars to the Town Hall Account for the purpose of making repairs to the Town Hall.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars to the Police/Fire Station Maintenance and Utilities Account.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to be used in the Machinery Account to maintain Department of Public Works vehicles through June 30, 1980 and act anything thereon or thereto.

Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED "to table" Article 6.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of One Thousand five hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars from the Planning Board operating account to the Board of Public Works operating expense account for the purpose of paying engineering and consulting expenses and fees. Said account to be disbursed under the direction of the Department of Public Works with the consent of the Planning Board.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to the Police Sick Leave Account or take any other action thereto. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to take "no action" on Article 8.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars to the Police Overtime Account or take any other action thereto. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to take "no action" on Article 9.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to the Police Vacation Account. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unaminously VOTED to take "no action" on Article 10.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to the Police Personal Days Account. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to take "no action" on Article 11.

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded, standing vote being had, with 69 voting in the affirmative and 60 opposed, it was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Four Thousand One Hundred (\$4,100.00) Dollars to the Police Operating Expense Account.

Article 13. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty-Six Dollars and thirteen cents (\$9,856.13) to the Police Salary Account.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, standing vote being had, with 102 voting in the affirmative and 14 opposed, it was VOTED "To amend the Zoning By-Law of the Town of Carver by rezoning as an Industrial District the area 500 feet from the street line bounded on the south by Old Route 44, Plymouth Street, on the West by the Carver-Middleborough Town Line, and on the North by the Carver-Plympton Town Line, and on the East by Route 58, and to make the appropriate change to the Zoning Map".

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to the Inspector of Buildings Salary Account for the purpose of paying the salary of an Alternate Building Inspector. Upon motion duly made and seconded, voice vote being had, the motion was declared DEFEATED.

Article 18. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars to the Gasoline Account.

Article 19. To see what amount the Town will vote to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account to equip the Town Hall and the Marcus Atwood House with access for the Handicapped under the Acts of 1969, Section 504. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to take "no action" under Article 19.

At 10:03 P.M., the Moderator declared a recess.

The meeting was again called to order after a short recess, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to exceed the "tax cap" by \$42,156.13.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

Annual Town Meeting Adjourned Session—April 15, 1980

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting was called to order at 8:17 P.M., by the Moderator, Arthur P. DeCoursey, there being a quorum present. The meeting then proceeded to act on the remaining Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40 A as revised by Chapter 808, Act of 1975 and amend its Zoning By-Laws to have it conform thereto. Refer to Supplement in Town Warrant containing complete text of the proposed revised Zoning By-Laws.

The Article was duly moved and seconded, and after considerable discussion pro and con, and upon motion, duly made and seconded, standing vote being had with 54 voting in the affirmative and 49 opposed, it was VOTED to "withdraw" the Article as "nonsensical".

At this time the Moderator declared a short recess; the meeting resumed at 8:55 P.M. Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to reconsider Article 8. Motion duly made and seconded to rescind all former Zoning By-Laws. SO VOTED. Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to accept Sec. 2 (Definitions) as set forth in the proposed by-law. (This related to acreage requirements of Mobile Home Parks).

At this time, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to postpone action on Article 8 until end of Warrant.

Article 9. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED that the amount of the County Dog Fund, One thousand one hundred sixty-eight dollars and twelve cents (\$1,168.12) be applied to the Library Account, said amount to be deducted from Library Operating Expense.

Article 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to hear the report of any standing committees and to abolish any special committee not submitting a report unless otherwise voted, and to establish any new committee. Thereupon the following committees presented their oral reports; the committee reports were accepted, and it was VOTED to continue the committees:

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty six thousand eight hundred (\$46,800.00) dollars for the purpose of preparing, oiling and paving roads that are accepted Public Ways within the Town of Carver.

Article 13. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Three thousand five hundred (\$3,500.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury for the sole purpose of meeting the charges against the cemetery funds in the Town Treasury.

Article 14. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two thousand five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars to be used to pay for all private work and materials in Town cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 15. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten thousand four hundred (\$10,400.00) dollars for a Drainage Account to be expended by the Department of Public Works on various streets that are accepted Public Ways or easements within the Town of Carver.

Article 16. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of twenty five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury for the purpose of reconstructing and resurfacing a section of Cranberry Circle and related drainage work.

Article 17. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Five thousand three hundred ninety-five (\$5,395.00) dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new 1980 sand and salt spreader for the Department of Public Works.

Article 18. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping two new 50 watt radios for the Department of Public Works.

Bradshaw, Scale 1" = 100' August 20, 1973 drawn by Russell A. Wheatley, R.L.S. Abington, Massachusetts and to act anything thereon or thereto. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED "to strike Article 21 from the Warrant".

Article 22. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to amend Article 22 so as to transfer the required funds from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. Thereupon, upon motion duly made and seconded, standing vote being had, 55 voting in the affirmative and 28 opposed, it was VOTED to transfer the sum of Eight thousand (\$8,000.00) dollars from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for the purpose of completing the toilet facilities in Shurtleff Park.

At this time, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to adjourn the meeting to Wednesday, April 16, 1980, at 7:30 P.M.

"Any registered voter of the Town shall be eligible for appointment to the Finance Committee or Council on Aging except that no elected or appointed town officer or regular town employee or person holding a position of financial responsibility for the Town shall be eligible for membership in such agency. No member of a special town committee shall be authorized to vote as member of such agency or any matter pertaining to the duties of a special committee of which he is a member. A Finance Committee member may serve as an appointed member of a Wage and Personnel Study Committee or "Capital Program Committee".

Article 55. To see what amount the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of reducing the tax rate for the Fiscal Year 1981. Motion duly made and seconded to use the amount of \$67,581.87 from free cash to reduce the tax rate. Standing vote being had with 37 voting in the affirmative and 50 opposed, the motion was DEFEATED.

Article 56. To see if the Town will vote to ratify all appropriations that exceed the four percent Tax Cap (which requires 2/3rd vote). Article duly moved and seconded. SO VOTED.

Thereupon, Mr. Alan I. Dunham moved that the Town vote to increase the Appropriation Limit established by Chapter 151 of the Acts of 1979 by \$191,444.15 so that the Appropriation Limit as so increased will be \$3,008,963.93. Motion was duly seconded, and Standing vote being had, with 85 voting in the affirmative and 4 opposed, it was SO VOTED.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to increase the Budget Limit of the Schools and Vocational Education Account established by Chapter 151 of the Acts of 1979 by \$94,461.52 so that the Budget Limit as so increased will be \$1,470,862.00.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to increase the Levy Limit established by Chapter 151 of the Acts of 1979, by not more than \$150,088.49 so that the Levy Limit as so increased will not be more than \$3,093,937.48.

At this time it was duly moved and seconded to take up Article 8 which was not completed at a prior session of the Annual Town Meeting. Thereupon, it was duly moved and seconded to rescind all former action on Article 8 and to postpone action thereon until the next Special Town Meeting. Standing vote being had, with 47 voting in the affirmative and 35 opposed it was SO VOTED.

At this time, there being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to adjourn.

Special Town Meeting July 7, 1980

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School House on Monday, July 7, 1980, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated June 11, 1980. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M., by the Moderator, Arthur P. DeCoursey; there not being a quorum present at that time, the Moderator declared a recess until such time as a quorum appeared. At 7:45 P.M. a quorum was present, and the meeting was again called to order. After the Pledge of Allegiance the Moderator called upon the Reverend Robert H. Merritt to give the Invocation. Rev. Merritt asked for a moment of silence in memory of the late Domingo M. Fernandes, a highly regarded and respected citizen of Carver who unselfishly devoted his time and energy to many endeavors for the good of the community, particularly his efforts toward the education of the children of Carver. Following the Invocation the meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40A as revised by Chapter 808 Act of 1975 and amend its Zoning By-Laws to have it conform thereto. Refer to supplement containing complete text of the proposed revised Zoning By-Laws.

The Article was duly moved and seconded, and after some discussion of the matter by Robert Lee Moore, Esquire, and Edward M. Angley, Esquire, Town Counsel, Attorney Moore moved that action on Article 1 be postponed until the next Special Town Meeting or the next Annual Town Meeting. The motion was duly seconded, and voice vote being had, the motion to postpone was DEFEATED. The meeting then proceeded to act on various motions for amendments to the proposed Zoning By-Law as set forth in the printed copy of the By-Law.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was voted to amend Section 41b as appearing in the proposed Zoning By-Law by striking the words "or use for a regional refuse disposal facility by the Regional Refuse Disposal District".

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to amend Section "5.3" by striking the words "Dwelling 20%".

At this time, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to take up Articles 3 and 4 of the Warrant and then return to consider Article 1.

Article 3. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly seconded, it was VOTED to approve the amount of the \$400,000.00 debt authorized on June 10, 1980 by the Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee for the purpose of financing reconstruction and extraordinary repairs to portion of the roofs at the high school and the intermediate school, including any architects' and engineering fees and other costs incidental thereto, there be and hereby is authorized, under and pursuant to Chapter 71 Section 16 (d), of the General Laws and the District Agreement, the incurring of debt on the full faith and credit of the District by issuance and

sale at one time or from time to time of bonds or notes in the aggregate principal amount of \$400,000.00, to be issued as one or more separate issues, each such issue to be in such principal amount, to be payable over such period (not to exceed, five years from its date), to bear such rate of interest and to be in such form, subject to applicable provisions of law and not inconsistent with this vote as shall later be determined by the Treasurer, with the approval of this Committee.

Article 4. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly seconded, it was unanimously VOTED that the Town accept an amendment to the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District Agreement initiated by vote of the Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee adopted on June 10, 1980 and entitled "Amendment No. IV to the Agreement for the Establishment of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District". A copy of the text of the proposed amendment is attached.

At this time, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to adjourn to Tuesday, July 8, 1980, at 7:30 P.M.

Article was duly moved and seconded.

Following considerable discussion, and the adoption of several amendments to the proposed by-laws, as printed, and upon motion duly made and seconded, standing vote being had, with 75 voting in the affirmative and 5 opposed, it was

VOTED to adopt the proposed Zoning By-Laws, as amended.

Copies of the complete Zoning By-Law will be available at the Town Clerk's Office.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to petition the General Court for the passage of a special law validating and confirming the action taken under Article 49 of the Warrant for the 1980 Annual Town Meeting in voting to transfer \$50,000.00 from the School Building Construction Account to a special account for the purpose of repairing, remodeling and otherwise improving the school buildings.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand two hundred thirty (\$2,230.00) dollars to pay the following unpaid bill of 1979:

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars for the purpose of insulating and improving the energy efficiency of the Town Hall.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars for the purpose of conducting further water quality analysis of well water within the Town of Carver.

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Four hundred forty-three dollars and thirty-four cents (\$443.34) for the purpose of paying an Assistant Inspector of Building's salary for the ensuing year.

Article 9. Upon motion by Bernard P. Gill, Chairman of the Finance Committee, duly seconded, it was VOTED to transfer Two thousand five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars from the State Aid to Free Public Libraries Account and Six thousand (\$6,000.00) dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account. This appropriation shall be for the purpose of developing specifications outlining heating and insulation requirements of and making the necessary repairs to the heating system of the Carver Public Library building. Monies shall be expended first from the State Aid to Free Public Libraries Account and then from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account. Expenditure of these funds shall be under the direction of the Library Trustees, Selectmen, and Finance Committee.

Article 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Seven hundred thirty-nine (\$739.00) dollars for the purpose of purchasing and installing Storm Windows improving the energy efficiency of the Carver Public Library, such expenditures to be under the supervision of the Library Trustees, the Selectmen, and the Finance Committee.

Article 11. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Three hundred (\$300.00) dollars for the purpose of providing the Local Arts Council with an Operating Account.

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Four thousand (\$4,000.00) dollars to the Historical Commission Operating Expense Account for the purpose of conducting a Comprehensive Community Inventory. Said amount to be reimbursed to the Town by the Massachusetts Historical Commission, after completion of inventory, under the provisions of the National Historical Preservation Act of 1966.

Article 13. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer the sum of Eight thousand two hundred (\$8,200.00) dollars from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for the purpose of oiling and paving roads that are Public Ways within the Town of Carver.

Article 14. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from the Planning Board Engineering (D.P.W.) Account the sum of One thousand five hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars to the Superintendent of Public Works-Salary Account.

Article 15. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven thousand five hundred (\$7,500.00) dollars for the purpose of adding to the Fiscal 1981 Department of Public Works - Salary (Regular) Account to cover the Union negotiation increase.

Article 16. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred (\$100.00) dollars for the purpose of adding to Fiscal 1981 Department of Public Works - Salary (overtime) Account to cover the Union negotiation increase.

Article 17. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Three hundred fifty (\$350.00) dollars for the purpose of adding to the Fiscal 1981 General Highway - Operating Expense Account to cover the Union negotiation increase (Clothing Allowance).

Article 18. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten thousand six hundred ninety-four (\$10,694.00) dollars for the purpose of adding to the Fiscal 1981 Police Salary Account to cover the Union negotiation increase.

Article 19. Motion duly made and seconded to change the appropriation request to \$27,679.50. Standing vote being had, with 26 voting in the affirmative and 39 opposed the motion was DEFEATED. Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen thousand eight hundred thirty-nine dollars and seventy-five cents (\$13,839.75) to be added to the Fiscal 1981 Police Salary Account for the purpose of paying a salary for a Police Officer to replace a man who is presently out on disability.

Article 20. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two thousand six hundred twenty-four (\$2,624.00) dollars for the purpose of adding to the Fiscal 1981 Police-Fire Dispatcher's Account to cover the Union negotiation increase.

Article 21. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand eight hundred (\$1,800.00) dollars for the purpose of reimbursing the Police Chief for the use of his personal vehicle for police work which would eliminate the purchase of one town-owned cruiser.

Article 22. Upon motion by Mr. Alan I. Dunham, duly seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to further increase the Appropriation Limit established by Chapter 151 of the Acts of 1979 by \$77,820.09 to be added to the Appropriations Limit override of \$191,444.15, as voted at the Annual Town Meeting, adjourned session April 28, 1980, with the Appropriations Limit as so further increased to the total of \$3,086,604.02.

Also, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to further increase the Levy Limit established by Chapter 151 of the Acts of 1979, by \$77,820.09, to be added to the Levy Limit override of \$150,088.49 as voted at the Annual Town Meeting, adjourned session April 28, 1980, with the Levy Limit as

so further increased not be more than \$3,171,757.57.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

Special Town Meeting December 1, 1980

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, December 1, 1980, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated November 12, 1980, and duly posted on November 14, 1980.

The motion was duly seconded, and after some discussion of the matter the resolution was unanimously adopted.

Mr. Washburn then moved the adoption of the following resolution: "Resolved: That the Town instruct its Representative to the General Court to file special legislation for the purpose of permitting a special election to be held on the question of exceeding the 2 1/2 percent limit on local taxes insofar as such limit would otherwise prevent the Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee from proceeding with the construction of the new comprehensive high school." The motion was duly seconded, and voice vote being had, it was VOTED to adopt the foregoing resolution.

Thereupon upon motion by Mr. Washburn, duly recorded, standing vote being had, with 94 voting in the affirmative and 6 opposed, it was VOTED "That the Town hereby approves the amount of the \$26,000,000.00 debt authorized by vote of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School Committee on October 28, 1980, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a new comprehensive high school, provided that in accordance with the vote of the Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee that a construction contract will not be signed or bonds issued for the comprehensive high school project unless the borrowing is approved by the Emergency Finance Board and is determined not to be in violation of the provisions of Proposition 2 1/2."

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

Annual Agency Review

The evaluation and policy review sub-committee of the Professional Advisory Committee met on October 15, 1980 to conduct the annual agency evaluation.

The group reviewed the following policies:

The following items were also reviewed: Tax exemption, statement of purpose, organizational chart, list of registered personnel, agreements with selectman's office and Carver Police Dept., requests for service, visits during extended hours, agreement with medical supplier, composition and responsibilities of Board of Health, job descriptions, salary scale, in-service programs, community relationship agreements, and standards of care.

While discussing clinical record policies, there was a suggestion to contact The Old Colony Vocational School regarding printing record forms.

A policy was written regarding not hiring LPN's as staff nurses. Job description for LPN is not needed at this time.

The group reviewed the contracts and other relevant information regarding therapeutic and home health aide services. An addendum to the Easter Seal was approved, effective November 1, 1980, to eliminate social services. This service had become too costly in view of the fact that the social worker had never made any visits. Attorney Onni Erickson, Town Clerk and Treasurer, reviewed all contracts and approved them.

Budget committee minutes were reviewed as well as the budget, salary scales and fee schedule. The committee met on October 28, 1980 to consider requested rate increases. They suggested consultation with the rate setting commission regarding this. The cost report was reviewed.

Dr. Hughes, Medical advisor, reviewed Standing Orders and Medical Policies, Death in Home, Acceptance, denial and termination, and The Standards of Care. He approved all policies.

Secretarial help has been increased to 20 hours per week. 4. Billing procedures have been improved and reimbursements increased. 5. Improved communication and cooperation with new medical advisor. 6. Increased cooperation with area agencies for policy establishment and inservice programs. 7. Meeting with area groups to consider and discuss merger.

Recommendations: 1. Advertise Blood Pressure clinics more heavily and encourage non-elderly to attend. Plan to advertise in local church bulletin. 2. Consider a blood pressure screening program for entire town.

1981—Shifting Time: Civil Defense

The page of 1980 is now a wrinkled page and now a new page is to be written and a step forward is to be taken. 1980 Civil Defense showed its need--

1. Carver Auxiliary Police was formed.
2. Ten Devoted townspeople were appointed.
3. Officer meetings were held.
4. Carver was one of the first to have its updated Civil Protection and Co-ordinated Emergency Responses for Disasters.
5. Meetings were held for the elderly in regard to man-made and natural disasters.
6. New Radiological equipment for monitoring was received.
7. Radiological schools were set up for training.

The Town of Carver can pride itself in the New Make-Up of the Civil Defense. The importance of the Department in these times of reality is beyond explanation.

With the Nuclear Age upon us - accidents beyond our control can and do happen - we can be prepared and we are.

Almost daily we read in the news or on TV - mishaps and conditions, accidents in our town or near. It takes manpower - not just bodies, but trained, dedicated men with procedures, techniques in all phases. Their training will continue in the following:

- a. First responder course.
- b. EMT School
- c. Chapter 90 laws. (traffic)
- d. Pistol Training (qualification)
- e. Emergency Driving

These courses will be held along with the regular Police and will continue until they are trained in every phase.

Director's Report

The Carver Council on Aging provides many services for people who are 59 years of age or older. A list of these services may be obtained at the Marcus Atwood Multi-Purpose Center in South Carver, which is open daily from 9 A.M. - 4 P.M.

Through the past year the Director for the Council on Aging has coordinated all mini-bus reservations, mall trips, school lunches, mini-bus drivers, newsletters, business calls, information and referral calls, and has attended numerous meetings pertaining to the interests of the elderly.

The Council has two drop-in centers. The Marcus Atwood Center is open daily from 12 Noon to 4 P.M. for recreational purposes, and Fellowship Hall in Center Carver is open on Wednesdays and Fridays from 12:30 P.M. - 4:30 P.M. These centers offer many activities, such as the following: crafts, films, games, refreshments, and holiday parties. Parties usually take place on Valentine's Day, Halloween, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Birthdays are celebrated monthly with donated cakes and ice cream.

Newsletters are mailed bi-monthly, keeping the elderly informed of any new legislation for the elderly, discounts, legal and tax assistance, and a two month calendar of activities and services. The mailing has reached 3,800 and is rising rapidly.

Through the Councils on Aging of the Plymouth Area, Inc., of which the Carver Council is a member, we have three Senior Aides, whose salaries are paid by the Department of Labor. The Aides each work 20 hours per week. Their purpose is to visit the ill and infirmed, both in hospitals and in private homes, calling on new residents with information about the services provided by the Council, and assistance to Director in many areas. For nine months of last year, one Aide was a competent mini-bus driver. We also had a clerk, through CETA, who assisted with the newsletter, business letters, and many other office duties.

Our mini-buses are functioning with dedicated volunteer drivers. However, the need for more is there.

We are still facing the energy crisis. Many of our elderly have received assistance. A lot of outreach work has been done by members of the Council, to seek out people in need. We also attend many meetings which are energy related.

During the past year we have had a free blood pressure clinic monthly, free flu shots, and pneumonia shots at a very small fee through the Carver Public Health Nurses, at the Marcus Atwood House. The Multi-Purpose Center is fully equipped with machinery for composing, compiling, and issuing the newsletter. We also have a copier that is available, free of charge, to any senior citizen in the town.

The meetings attended by the Director are as follows: Housing Authority, Senior Aide, Old Colony Planning Council, Old Colony Elderly Services, Energy Related, CIRCA, Associations, Department of Elderly Affairs, and Staff.

We continue to thank the Selectmen, the Town Boards and the Townspeople for their outstanding support of our program.

Report of the Office of Public Prosecutor

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen
Town of Carver
Gentlemen:

During the year 1980, the Office of Public Prosecutor has continued to represent the Towns of Carver, Marion, Mattapoisett, Rochester and Wareham, in all matters directly related to the jurisdictional powers of the Wareham District Court. The office serves as an example of regional town cooperation in furnishing advice and legal assistance to the local police departments and various other town departments, as well as the general public, at a financial saving in revenue expenditures.

A summary of the office case load for the year is as follows:

Carver: 706 defendants, 1,501 complaints
Marion: 450 defendants, 1,037 complaints
Mattapoisett: 597 defendants, 1,241 complaints
Rochester: 239 defendants, 490 complaints
Wareham: 2,246 defendants, 4,455 complaints

for a total of 4,238 defendants and 8,724 complaints. The above figures reflect a weekly average of 82 defendants being charged with approximately 168 various charges.

As in the past, the office has been called upon to advise and assist in the enforcing of sanitary, health and building regulations, giving legal opinions to various departments in regards thereto, as well as the collection of delinquent personal property and excise taxes by use of the small claims powers of the Court.

Approximately 65 to 70% of all criminal or by-law complaints have been disposed of by the office at the pre-trial stage of the legal proceedings. This results in a substantial savings by greatly reducing the hours off-duty and on-duty Police Officers would have to spend at Court in preparing the case and testifying. Furthermore, cases when assigned for trial on a specific date have been heard by the Court as scheduled, thus eliminating costly delays by reducing continuances.

At present, with double sessions on a weekly basis, there is no criminal backlog in the Court and, hopefully, this situation will continue during the ensuing year.

Criminal fines collected by the Court, which have been returned to the towns for the year 1980, amount to the following:

Carver: \$ 19,595.00
Marion: \$ 14,796.00
Mattapoisett: \$ 17,829.00
Rochester: \$ 3,108.00
Wareham: \$ 66,051.00

In addition thereto, the Court has returned other funds to the towns as restitution for the damage to town property and costs assessed against Defendants for defaults, in order to reimburse the towns for Police Officers' time in coming to Court for trials which cannot proceed due to the Defendant's absence.

Report of the Department of Public Works

Honorable Board of Selectmen

Gentlemen:

The Board of Public Works reports that the following work was accomplished during fiscal year 1980.

Route 44 from Route 58 to the Catholic Church, approximately one (1) mile, was paved with drainage improvements and road side clearing part of the project.

The intersection improvements at Purchase Street and Forest Street are complete. With funds approved at the last Town Meeting, work will begin shortly at improving the intersection of Purchase Street and Fosdick Road.

Work will continue shortly on the Holmes Street reconstruction project. Done to date has been the removal of brush and stones with the unsuitable material removed and replaced with gravel. Drainage, grading and paving to be done in the spring.

Wenham Shores reconstruction project has been completed. Also a section of Nel Bonney Road has been reconstructed. The last section of White Pine Lane was completed with the drainage, gravel and oiling of this roadway.

Scheduled for reconstruction this summer is Rochester Road from Route 58 west 1700 feet. This work is to be done in conjunction with the reconstruction of Popes Point Road across the causeway. Both these projects are to be done by Carver Department of Public Works personnel.

Montello Street reconstruction could be starting any time with all work being done by Nemasket Construction Company in accordance with the Board of Appeals' decision allowing a Gravel Permit in this area.

Route 58 from Wareham town line to Plympton town line is scheduled to be reconstructed during the summer of 1982 with the design plans 50% complete at this time.

South Meadow Road is still scheduled to be reconstructed this summer.

One thousand feet of drainage was installed on Forest Street. This completes this drainage project. Only a new bituminous concrete surface has to be installed to finalize these major improvements on Forest St. A 36 inch culvert was replaced on Meadow Street. Other minor drainage improvements were provided throughout the town.

Sections of Purchase Street, Forest Street, Spring Street, Old Main Street, Lakeview Street, Pine Street, Mayflower Road, Meadow Street, Fuller Street, High Street, Hines Avenue, Green Street, Gates Street, and Pond Street were paved using cold mix emulsion. The sealing with oil and sand is scheduled for this spring.

During the spring cleanup all catch basins in town were cleaned and over 60 miles of roads swept of winter sands.

The George E. Williams Recreation area has been graded and loamed with only the seeding of the area remaining to be done.

The Toilet Facilities in Shurtleff Park and at the baseball field have been completed.

There were 22 burials attended to. All parks and cemeteries were maintained in the usual manner.

The Department of Public Works has put to good use the newly purchased sign machine and work zone protection kit (purchased by the Governor's Highway Safety Bureau for the town). Also the new sander and two new 2-way radios, all of which were approved for purchase at the last Annual Town Meeting.

The entire Town of Carver was picked up of litter by summer kids hired through the bottle and can industries of Massachusetts.

A word of thanks should go to Richard Gomes and his crew of summer school kids who worked so diligently for the DPW this past summer. Projects completed include mowing in the cemeteries, painting guard posts on Rt. 44, Mayflower Road, Pond Street, Meadow Street, Lakeview Street, and the continued cleanup of town beaches.

The Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service's Office is located on High Street, Hanson, and can be reached by calling 293-3541, 447-5946 or 746-0053.

This is repetitious, but for the information of new residents, we are the educational arm of the University of Massachusetts, and the United States Department of Agriculture at the county level. This is where the name, "Cooperative Extension" is derived.

STAFF:

Our staff is comprised of a Director, two Regional Agricultural Specialists, a Community Resource Development Specialist, two Home Economists, four 4-H Agents and four clerical staff.

In addition to our County Staff, we administer a Nutritional Educational Program for limited-income families in Plymouth County, (Expanded Food & Nutrition Educational Program). We have two professional nutritionists and twelve aides. This office is located at 32 Belmont Street, Brockton, and is funded by Federal Nutrition Funds, through the University of Massachusetts, our Land-Grant College. This is for both a 4-H and Adult Program

We have many new and varied educational programs for you. Areas in which our staff has expertise are Agriculture, Community Resource Development, Home Economics, 4-H Youth Program, Nutrition and Energy Conservation.

Our Expanded Food and Nutrition Program (EFNEP) has expanded from Brockton to all of Plymouth County's twenty-six towns.

In the 4-H youth phase of the program, Nutrition Assistants and volunteers work to provide education to youth, which will contribute to personal development and improvement of diets and nutrition of their families.

In 1979-80, there were 4,640 youth involved in our 4-H EFNEP Nutrition Program. You can obtain information about current programs, as well as up-to-date consumer information, by requesting the free monthly newsletter. This newsletter can be sent to you by calling the Brockton Office at 583-2545 or 583-2598.

EFNEP prepared a Spanish Nutrition Newsletter to 240 Spanish speaking families and a monthly nutrition newsletter, *Kitchen Quotes*, to approximately 3,000 families. In addition, monthly columns appear in *Council for Children* news and eight *Council on Aging* newsletters, reaching 7,000 residents of Plymouth County on a monthly basis.

Since August of 1977, we have been performing energy audits for home owners. With oil at \$1.10 per gallon, this has meant an average savings of well over \$300 each for those homes. During the past two years, 1,400 homes had such an audit in Plymouth County.

In our traditional 4-H Program, we have 1,108 members with 28,777 other youth participating in our short-term and school programs. The 1977 population of Plymouth County schools was 96,287. This means 29.8% of Plymouth County youth have been involved in our programs this year.

In the town of Carver, there were 960 youth that participated in these programs. Contact your Town Director, Mrs. Jean Gibbs, for the County Cooperative Extension Service with any suggestions or requests.

Free bulletins are on display at our office on lawn care, gardening, nutrition, home canning and freezing, to name just a few. If you pass our office in your travels, please stop and get to know us. We continue to test soil, free of charge, for Plymouth County Residents.

Carver Historical Commission

1980 was a year of outstanding accomplishment for the Carver Historical Commission.

In March the Commission received an \$8,000.00 matching grant from the Massachusetts Historical Commission for the purpose of preparing a comprehensive historical survey and inventory of the town. Under this grant, the town was to advance \$4,000.00 in cash and \$4,000.00 in-kind services. There was a misunderstanding as to the source of the money, so the matter was brought before the Special Town Meeting of July 7, 1980. At that time, \$4,000.00 was voted to be allocated for the project. This money was returned to the Town Treasury on November 4, 1980 by the Massachusetts Historical Commission, along with an additional \$715.00 which was allocated over and above the initial grant amount.

Two consultants were employed to facilitate the project. Marsha Penti, a folklorist and life long resident of Carver, was the chief consultant for the project. She was assisted by Carol Zelli, a professional historical surveyor from Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Volunteers were a vital part of this intensive undertaking. The Historical Commission is indebted to the following people for their time, energy and effort:

The majority of the work for the survey was done between May and August. The final inventory submitted to the Massachusetts Historical Commission included 128 sites. The inventory was comprised of research from deeds, maps and assessors records, as well as, written histories and oral histories given by some of Carver's elder citizens. Photographs of each site were included, along with area maps and a map of the entire town. Copies of the inventory are on file with the Massachusetts Historical Commission and at the Carver Public Library.

As a by-product of the survey, 20 different sites were recommended for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places:

Another by-product of the survey is a 14 page narrative history of Carver, which was written by Marsha Penti. Copies are available, at cost, through the Historical Commission.

The public was kept informed of the progress of the survey through frequent articles in the *Old Colony Memorial* newspaper during the summer.

Although the survey was the major project and focus during 1980, several other matters were dealt with by the Commission.

The Commission increased its membership to a total of four with the addition of Maureen Fuller in March. There are currently 3 vacancies on the Commission. Any interested persons are encouraged to apply.

Also, in March, the Commission expressed its concern for the proposed development of the Shaw Estate and was granted the right of design review by the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Election of officers took place in May with Charles Bezanson elected chairperson and Maureen Fuller, secretary. The position of curator for the Commission's collection at the Atwood House was established with Florence Sands elected to the position. The possibility of developing a museum with regular hours was discussed, but no decision was made. At this time, the chairman discovered that the "Savery Lane Deed" was missing from the collection at the Atwood House. This matter was reported to the Board of Selectmen and the Commission was advised that the deed had been removed and placed in the Town Hall.

The Commission feels quite proud of their accomplishments during 1980. Although the inventory was completed for the purposes of the grant, there will be a continuing effort to research additional sites which were not included due to the time limitations involved.

Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project

The Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project respectfully submits the following report for 1980.

Extremely dry weather was partially responsible for somewhat lower than normal mosquito populations in 1980. The monitoring program conducted by the Project and the Extension Specialist of the University of Massachusetts showed that most mosquito species that attack humans were indeed relatively low in numbers in most areas. However, that species implicated in the transmission of Eastern Equine Encephalitis within local bird populations was found in appreciable numbers. Encephalitis was not a major concern in 1980, though the virus was isolated from mosquitoes captured in Halifax (not a member of this project).

The project again expanded its early spring pre-hatch treatments to cover 2,506 acres of selected breeding sites, compared to 1,200 acres in 1979. Excellent results were again obtained and provided an additional factor in the lowering of mosquito populations.

Beyond the pre-hatch treatments, 890 acres of larval mosquito habitat was treated along with 969 catch basins. The latter involved the use of a relatively new and extremely safe insect growth regulator.

In those areas where adult mosquitoes reached nuisance levels, various types of chemical applications were performed with a total coverage of 125,242 acres. Increased use of ultra-low volume spray apparatus and decreased use of cumbersome and expensive mist blowers enabled the project to more effectively serve all areas involved. We expect to phase out the use of mist blowers in the next few years.

The project continued its water management program with the excavation or reclamation of nearly 100,000 feet of upland and saltmarsh drainage ditches. 48,905 feet were worked by hand with the remainder by tractor mounted backhoe. In addition, 60 culverts were cleaned of blockages. Water management is the first and most permanent line of defense against mosquitoes. The topography of Plymouth County insures that water management will occupy the Project for many years to come.

The vastly increased complexity of mosquito control in the last decade precipitated the appointment of an entomologist as superintendent of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project late in 1980. This will result in the incorporation of the most modern mosquito control technology into the pest management program already well established by Arthur L. Westgate, who will continue to direct field operations. An educational slide presentation by the superintendent will be available to governmental and civic organizations in the county by late summer, 1981.

We wish to thank each town and their personnel for their cooperation and assistance throughout 1980.

Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD)

During 1980, the Town of Carver continued its membership for the eleventh year in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is a planning and economic development agency formed under state law to serve communities in southeastern Massachusetts by providing a cooperative approach to regional issues.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or designee and a planning board representative from each participating municipality and six low-income and minority representatives. Carver's Commission representatives from the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board, respectively, are David Knight who serves as Chairman of the SRPEDD Commission, a member of the Executive Committee, and as secretary-treasurer of the Massachusetts Association of Regional Planning Agencies, and Timothy McGillicuddy, who serves on the Executive Committee. Karl Eklund served as the At-Large Commissioner from the Taunton Area and as both a member of the Affirmative Action Committee and the Legislative and By-Laws Committee for the SRPEDD Commission.

In addition to regional planning and economic development, SRPEDD assists member cities and towns. Through the free municipal assistance program, each community receives time for local projects and assistance in preparing applications for federal and state funds.

The agency's purpose is to plan for regional land use, economic development, housing, transit, transportation, solid waste, energy resources and conservation, and air and water quality. Local participation in these regional plans enables communities to be eligible for federal and state dollars.

Services to Carver this past year included:

- Re-codifying town zoning by-law
- Assisting in the preparation of Chapter 667 Elderly Assisted Housing and Chapter 705 Family Assisted Housing grant applications. The Carver Housing Authority received \$1.38 million in December, 1980.
- Reviewing and making recommendations for revisions of Planning Board Rules and Regulations.

Regional plans completed this year benefitting all communities include:

***The Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP)** which makes member communities eligible for EDA funding and a 10 percent bonus for public facility projects.

***The Transportation Improvements Program (TIP)** which lists major projects in each community for federal and state funding. A project must be included on the TIP in order to be eligible for these funds.

SRPEDD represents the collective will of its member communities. As the responsibilities and problems of municipalities become increasingly complex, the District can provide technical assistance to local boards, encourage cooperation among communities, and provide a comprehensive approach to issues that cross local boundaries.

Administrator's Report Carver Public Schools 1980

The 1980 school year in the Carver Public Schools indicated continued modest growth, not only in student enrollment but also in program, services and community involvement. 1979 ended with an enrollment of 1,081, while the current enrollment is 1,110. Carver continues to be the rare exception in the Commonwealth by being one of the few communities to experience growth rather than decline in student enrollment. For the last time in 23 years the *Annual Report of the Carver Town Officers* will include the name of Alan I. Dunham as a member of the Carver School Committee. Mr. Dunham resigned to accept the position of Town Accountant. The school will miss Mr. Dunham. He touched the lives of generations of children and his efforts will be missed. Mrs. Terry Katz, previous President of the P.T.O., was appointed to fill the vacancy on the School Committee.

Curriculum planning and development continued throughout 1980. The new multi-basal reading program was implemented in grades 1-6. The children were tested to determine the style in which they learned most effectively. The basal series that each child utilizes matches learning style and basal reader. A pilot social studies program was implemented in grades K-6. The Kindergarten children were introduced to the highly successful and popular Alpha Time Reading Program. The staff worked hard at designing and developing the state mandated minimum competency testing program. An All-Day Kindergarten program was introduced in 1980. The program was designed to meet the developmental needs of Kindergarten children who were not quite ready for first grade, but who needed more than simply repeat a year in a half-day Kindergarten. A Staff Committee to study program development for the Gifted and Talented was formed. A Staff In-Service Planning Committee was formed to develop a comprehensive series of in-service programs. The three programs were generated to meet the needs of the school as indicated through a Needs Assessment.

A wide variety of activities characterized the Gov. John Carver 1980 year. Santa Claus visited the school for the second time in a helicopter during the holidays. The fourth grade children spent one week in Swanzey, New Hampshire, participating in a program entitled Nature's Classroom. The highly successful experience promises to be an annual event for the fourth grade. The fifth grade spent a day off the coast of New England on a "Whale Watch". The sixth grade introduced an elective program for the children. Grade three participated in a program conducted by the Plymouth Plantation on the Early American. Many activities added to the quality of the instructional program.

Community involvement in the school grew during 1980. The P.T.O. under the direction of Gayle Szymczak assumed the theme of providing enrichment activities for the children at the school. 1980 P.T.O. activities included an Action for Children's Television Program, an Open Forum with the Principal, a Make-Up and Skin Care Program, Volunteer Recognition Night, School Fair, Old Home Day participation, P.T.O. Enrichment Chorus, a Child Abuse Program, Arts and Crafts Fair, Fashion Show, Berklee Guitar Performance, Open House, Christmas Program, Magic Show, and the Parent Volunteer Program. The Volunteer Program, under the coordination of Carolyn Brennan, continued to provide support throughout the school. Several orientation programs were offered as well as a "Let's Talk it Over" session for the volunteers. The P.T.O. raised a considerable amount of money throughout the year for the school. The Community Action People (CAPS) played a volleyball match with the faculty to assist the ongoing fund raising effort.

Children continue to receive a wide variety of core and support services. The guidance counselors, learning disability/reading specialists, school psychologist, speech therapist, occupational therapist, art, music, physical education, and the media specialist continue to assist the efforts of the classroom teachers to provide for the wide range of needs of the Carver children. Several special needs staff positions continue to be funded through Federal grants. Title I Services continue to be an integral part of the instructional program.

Mrs. Roberta Perry and Mr. Franklin Wilbur head up the important food and custodial services at the school.

The school facility has been utilized even more by community and civic groups. While rising utility costs are becoming more apparent, the school committee has made the school facility available virtually every day. The Governor John Carver School has truly served as a Community Center for Carver residents ranging from softball registration to Senior Citizen's Luncheons.

1980 was indeed a year of program growth and development. The Governor John Carver School and the entire faculty will continue to work hard at providing the highest quality instructional program. While budget cutbacks will make it virtually impossible to maintain programs, staff, and services at the current level, the commitment to maintain what is best for the young people in Carver will continue.

Annual Report of the Principal of the Plymouth-Carver Intermediate School

1980 was a year of curriculum revision at PCIS. Each of the major disciplines was reviewed and emphasis placed on the basic skills. Reading comprehension, writing, and grammar were particularly emphasized in the Language Arts curriculum. Latin American Countries was introduced in the Social Studies curriculum as well as emphasis on writing. A needs assessment in Science has been completed with the aid of a new Science Coordinator. The most significant change will be in Grade 8 curriculum. A survey course involving the fundamentals of Earth and Physical Science will be readied for September 1981. The Math curriculum has been expanded to include a computer segment. Intermediate School students are provided with a good variety of experiential areas to help foster a well-rounded curriculum addressing the intellectual and social needs of our students.

Enrollment has increased 4% for a total of 1,457 students. With minimal increase, additional staffing was unnecessary. Our staff remained at 101.

Students at PCIS have extended services to community and school through the band, art department, and National Jr. Honor Society. The decorations for the public Thanksgiving dinner were provided by students in art classes. Our band has performed in all major holiday parades and the National Jr. Honor Society visits the sick and infirm.

A pictorial history of Plymouth has been added to our library. This project included pictures of major attractions in Plymouth at the turn of the century. Our thanks to the staff at Pilgrim Hall for making this possible. In 1981 the PCIS library will house the Raytheon collection of working engineers' models of space missiles, including those our Houses are named after.

1981 will bring some changes to PCIS as mandated by Proposition 2-1/2. We will continue to serve the needs of our students with perseverance and commitment.

The Annual Report of the Principal of the Plymouth-Carver High School

The second year of double sessions found continued student population increase in the building that was already suffering from overcrowding in both sessions.

After the Christmas recess the senior class began work on the Senior Show. Long hours were put in by many students under the direction of Christopher Darsch and Joyce Panora who organized the memorable "Slide Show," a great work which exemplified the Class of 1980 as truly a "Cut Above the Rest".

The French-Spanish Club had an increase in their membership and were involved with several activities. The highlight of their program was an international dinner prepared for the foreign exchange students attending Plymouth-Carver High School.

The Music Department had a very busy and exciting year. The Concert Choir was involved with three evening concerts, namely: A Christmas Concert, A Spring, and Choral Pops Concert. Fifteen students made the SEMSBA chorus, a school record; seven made the Southeast District Chorus; and one made the All-State Chorus. The Marching Band participated in several competitions with a high degree of success and their Toronto trip was the highlight of their school year.

The DECA program under the leadership of Mr. Huban was able to achieve their objectives. Valerie Chaplin qualified at the State Conference to attend the National DECA Conference in Miami with her written event General Merchandising. Through the various fund raising activities the DECA program defrayed the entire cost of students attending these conferences. In addition, DECA gave three \$300.00 scholarships to qualified seniors planning to continue their education in a business program.

Successes of the boys' and girls' athletic teams were major highlights of our sports program. The basketball team shared the Old Colony League Championship with Whitman-Hanson. The boys' cross-country and golf teams were crowned champions and the girls' field hockey team qualified for state tournament competition and reached the semi-finals.

In January the AFS Club had foreign exchange students from Norway, Mexico, South Africa, Spain, Japan, Holland, and Chile. For the new school year, beginning in September, students arrived from Columbia, Italy, Finland, Sweden, Japan, Holland, Germany and Brazil.

A short term exchange was held with Wallingford, Connecticut in the spring. Twenty Plymouth-Carver High School students spent five days in Wallingford; a month later twenty students from Wallingford attended Plymouth-Carver High School.

Eight Plymouth-Carver High School students were involved in foreign exchanges. In December Hannah Barnes, '82, was accepted by AFS to spend a year in South Africa and Jayne Rose was accepted by AFS to spend a year in Australia.

The AFS Club, advised by John Allen and Nancy Stevens, has about 150 student members. Various fund raising events were held, such as selling coffee and doughnuts at town meetings and the faculty-student basketball game. Other activities included a pot luck dinner attended by 250 people, a Christmas party, Christmas carolling and a trip to the Whole World Celebration in Boston.

Curriculum development during the school year was a top priority. The English Department, under the leadership of Mr. McQuillan, has initiated the following proposals:

To build developmental reading programs similar to the one implemented in the elementary grades.

A literature series has been identified that would be adopted for students in Curriculum I and II in all grades and to continue to search for materials for students in Curriculum III.

It is recommended the curriculum writing committees for the 11th and 12th grades be instituted with new procedures for teaching and evaluating composition. Efforts to improve students' composition skill continues to be a major concern of the department. Miss Johnson, Coordinator of the Social Studies Department and Mr. McQuillan have provided direction on composition instruction by conducting workshops during In-service time. These workshops will be administered by consultants from Curry and Antioch College and also by members of the English Department. Looking ahead to the near future the accelerated curricula for grades 11 and 12 will be adopted.

Miss Albertini, Foreign Language Department Chairman, and Mrs. Stevens worked during the summer studying the content, structure and lexical components to be mastered of the French I course. The study included the different levels of French I which have been created to accommodate the in-coming students from Plymouth-Carver Intermediate School.

Mathematics courses have been realigned and a new sequence, standard, has been introduced. The mathematics teachers have been developing courses of study which contain expectation levels for both the preparatory and standard sections. The course of study for Algebra Preparatory and Algebra Standard was developed and is now in use at the high school level. The second course of study to be developed was geometry, and during the summer a math committee was organized in which expectation levels for both the preparatory and standard sequences were finalized. A third course of study, which is in its final stage, is Senior mathematics. The next objective for developing the course of study is Algebra II. The explosion of computers on the educational and business world brought about the development of the micro-computer in recent years. Because of this unpredicated growth in the use of the computer the Mathematics Department will be advocating the inclusion of computer programming and computer science in the school curriculum.

The Science Department of Plymouth-Carver High School is evolving to better cope with the needs of its students. Our students will be able to deal with the many decisions that they will face in the technological world in which they live.

In order to do this, the programs and facilities have been assessed and changes are being planned.

All curriculum offerings will be standardized and updated to ensure a proper coverage of topics. The level of Sophistication made available to our students will be increased with an advanced, placement level of instruction in the near future.

The Social Studies Department, under the leadership of Miss Johnson, Coordinator, completed the course of study for the ninth grade (Social Studies I) as outlined by the teachers. This course of study includes the concepts to be taught within each section of the content outline and the skills to be developed during the year.

Mr. Correa, of the Business Department, conducted a Data Processing Workshop during the summer to develop a curriculum for our computers. Conferences were held with people who are involved in educational planning for mini-computers. The result of this two-week workshop was the implementation of a desirable and effective business data processing course.

The Class of 1980 received \$524,859.93 from scholarships and financial aid; of the total received \$49,854.93 is the amount of the local program. This was a record breaking amount and we are grateful to the citizens of Plymouth and Carver for this continued support.

Report of the Plymouth-Carver Regional School Committee

We find ourselves looking back on 1980 with very mixed feelings.

It had been a matter of such great encouragement to observe the outstanding efforts of our School Building Committee. Chaired by Mr. Frank Collins and assisted by Mr. Robert Nelson, our Assistant Superintendent/Director of Vocational Education, this committee had engaged an architectural firm that had developed plans for a building that we truly believed to be within the budgetary limitations which we had placed upon them.

We went to Town Meetings in both Plymouth and Carver and were delighted by the broad margins of support given by both communities. These meetings were held in October and were under the shadow of what might come to pass if Proposition 2-1/2 were to be supported by the electorate. In November the voters chose to impose a tax limit that would deny the will of the people of our two towns as expressed in their separate Town Meetings.

Since that day in November we have been urgently seeking those ways in which we could continue to operate your schools with the least possible hurt to our educational programs.

There exists an obvious disparity in the effects that 2-1/2 imposes upon our separate communities. Plymouth is already below the mandate. While we shall not be able to meet the expanding needs of our growing community, the Town will not be forced to make drastic cuts in any of its programs that are believed to be essential.

Carver has a very different situation in which they have been forced to reduce their appropriation quite drastically. This has meant a fifteen per cent reduction in all departments, including the Elementary School programs for Grades K-VI.

In addition we are faced with increases in costs over which we have no control. State mandated programs such as 766 are ever expanding. A new contract for school bus transportation has to be awarded following these years of unpredicted inflation. Costs for heating and lighting are beyond our control.

Teachers, custodians, cafeteria employees, clerical staff members, bus drivers are all people whose personal budgets are being ravaged by inflation and who are looking to us and to you for wage and salary adjustments.

We enter upon a new year that does indeed seem plagued with problems which we have never before had to face. We give you our positive assurance that we will work to find the best for our young people during these very trying times.

Report of the Carver Public Library — 1980

In 1895, the Carver town library was opened. A room in the old town house was used by townspeople to meet, browse, read and converse. These goals are still here, but have been broadened. We are moving forward to play a larger role as the education and information center for the total community.

We seek to promote stimulating and useful programs and exhibits for children and adults. In doing so, we use the expertise of many Carver residents as well as the state library system. Our library staff offers professional knowledge in guiding patrons to our resources and over 283 yearly resources in the inter library loan system. We keep abreast of new developments by attending state library conferences, Eastern Regional meetings, and specialized management meetings on public relations and energy conservation.

Programs to encourage better learning and reading habits in children are upper most. Semi-monthly children's afterschool films on classic books and characters such as "Born Free", "Stuart Little", and "Paddington Bear" encourage 50-75 youngsters to search out those special books. Annual contests on naming birds, favorite books, painting windows at Halloween and counting cranberries attract up to 100 children to visit the library. Fifty to one hundred children came to see live performances by the Plymouth Playhouse "You're a Good Man Charlie Brown", Maggie Kavanaugh and her music, the Thanksgiving Barn raising with a Plimoth Plantation person and the Christmas Magic show by David Eric. Our summer reading program encouraged over 60 children to read about Science Fiction.

Special interest programs to help the total community were: woodheat clinic, solar energy presentations, needlework classes with the generous time given by Nancy Mott and "Personal Touch Needlework Shop", babysitting clinic, Garden talk and soil sampling, Slide show on Finland, a writing clinic by Michael Couture, and almost 300 Carver residents used museum passes to Plimoth Plantation, Edaville Railroad, and the Museum of Transportation.

A special thanks to the Friends of the Library for sponsoring a trip for over 50 children and parents to the Children's Museum in Boston. Thanks to Friends president Merle McIver and all the Friends for the help in the tupperware party, used book sales and refreshments at important programs.

Changes in the staff and library this year included the addition of page, Kathy Furneau, new typewriters, new circulation cards, and new Monday night hours. With the help of the storyhour mothers who read and storyhour volunteer directors, Lynne DeMeo and Marie Sullivan, we expanded to two storyhour sessions. Through the generosity of the Sassamanesch Jr. Women's Club, we received a large folding table, a new book cart, and a telecaption viewer for the deaf.

Thank you to all who donated materials and time this year to make your library a better place. Our volunteer tea in June thanked over 25 of you, but there are many more.

Report of the Planning Board

Tim McGillicuddy was appointed acting Chairman in the absence of Chairman Michael Barrone who could not attend for personal reasons.

On January 22, 1980 the Planning Board approved a twenty-nine (29) house lot subdivision called John's Pond Estates.

On January 26, 1980 a special meeting was held to discuss proposed zoning by-laws.

On January 29, 1980 a joint meeting with the Plympton Planning Board, Carver Selectmen and DPW was held to discuss Route 44 corridor through Plympton and Carver.

On February 26, 1980 the Carver Jaycees met with the Planning Board to discuss their taking over the house numbering for the town, at their expense. Permission was granted.

On March 18, 1980 the Board voted to endorse the Carver Housing Authority in their application for a grant for forty (40) elderly housing units.

On April 30, 1980 the Board attended the Southeast Area Spring Conference in Brockton.

On February 14, 1980 a public hearing for a zoning change submitted by the I.D.C. was held by the Planning Board. The proposal to eliminate Business-Commercial zoning in the Carver Industrial Park and make the entire area zoned Industrial. It was approved at the annual town meeting in April.

The Planning Board reorganized in April. Timothy McGillicuddy was elected Chairman, Warren Greene was elected Clerk, Michael Barrone was re-elected to serve a five year term at the April elections.

On May 13, 1980 a \$75,000.00 bond was posted for subdivision called Vaughn Estates off South Meadow Road, owned by Williams Bros. of Marshfield.

On June 5, 1980 another informal public hearing was held for the zoning by-laws.

On September 30, 1980 Arthur DeCoursey resigned from the Board to devote his time to Moderator's position.

On October 21, 1980 Mr. John Churchill was appointed to the Planning Board to fill Mr. DeCoursey's position. Mr. Barrone also resigned that evening.

On October 28, 1980 Mr. Robert Brennan was appointed to fill Mr. Barrone's position.

On July 7, 1980 at a special town meeting, the town voted to accept the new revision of the zoning by-laws 75-5 which were approved by the Attorney General on January 7, 1981.

The Planning Board is now in the process of adopting new and updated subdivision control laws.

"Shall the town vote to accept the provisions of section thirteen of chapter two hundred and fifty-eight of the General Laws which provides that the town shall indemnify and save harmless municipal officers, elected or appointed, from personal financial loss and expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, in an amount not to exceed one million dollars, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of any act or omission except an intentional violation of civil rights of any person under any law, if the official at the time of such act or omission was acting within the scope of his official duties or employment?"

QUESTION No. 2

The following is a non-binding advisory question:

Do you approve of the Vote taken at the State Election on November 4, 1980 for the adoption of "Proposition 2 1/2"?

The polls will be open until 8:00 o'clock, P.M.

And you are further directed to notify said Inhabitants of said Town that as soon as the votes have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Monday, April 27, 1981, at 7:30 o'clock, P.M., and at that time will reconvene at said Governor John Carver School House, then and there to act on the following Articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time, in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1981, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 2. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from free cash in the treasury the sum of four thousand (\$4,000.00) dollars to meet interest charges on temporary loans.

SAVERY HISTORIC DISTRICT BY-LAW

This By-Law shall be known and may be cited as the Savery Historic District's By-Law under the authority of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40C, as amended.

The purpose of this By-Law is to promote the educational, cultural, economic and general welfare of the public through the preservation and protection of the distinctive characteristics of buildings and places significant in the history of the Town of Carver or their architecture, and through the maintenance and improvement of settings for such buildings and places and the encouragement of design compatible therewith.

There is hereby established an Historic District to be known as the Savery Historic District under the provisions of the Historic District Act, General Laws, Chapter 40C bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point about 100 m south of the intersection of Main Street, (Main Street is also known as S. Main, Rochester Road, Plymouth Street and Route 58) and Meadow Street, the district heads in a southerly direction along Main Street until it reaches the intersection of Shaw Road and Main Street where the district terminates. The district encompasses the buildings and some portion of the land on both sides of the route just described.

The boundaries are hereby established as shown on the map entitled "Savery Historic District" dated February, 1981 which accompanies and is hereby declared to be a part of the By-Law.

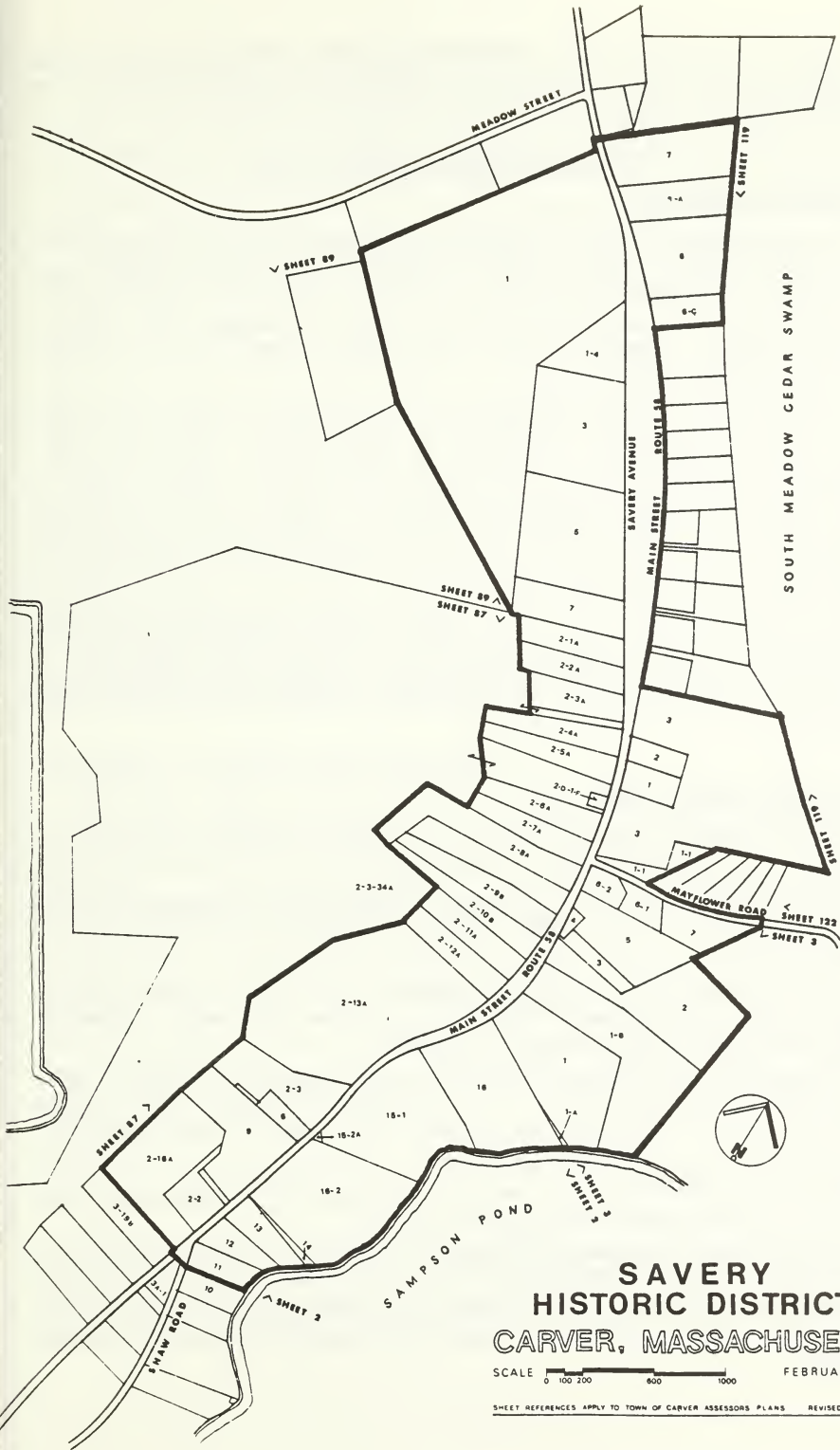
Administration of the Savery Historic District

No building or structure within the Historic District shall be constructed, demolished, moved or altered in any way that affects exterior architectural features and no building shall be moved into an Historic District unless the Carver Historic District Commission shall first have issued a certificate of appropriateness, a certificate of hardship or a certificate of non-applicability with respect to such construction, alteration or movement. The Building Inspector shall not issue a permit within an Historic District unless one of the certificates noted above has first been issued by the District Commission.

The authority of the Commission shall be limited to exterior architectural features which are subject to view from Main Street (Route 58), Savery Avenue and the Union Cemetery.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to amend the General By-Laws of the Town of Carver by adding a new section as follows, or to take any other action with respect thereto.

WETLANDS PROTECTION BY-LAW

SECTION I: PURPOSE

The purpose of this by-law is to protect the wetlands of the Town of Carver by controlling activities deemed to have a significant effect upon wetland values, including but not limited to the following: public or private water supply, ground-water, flood control, erosion control, storm damage prevention, water pollution, fisheries, shellfish, wildlife, recreation and aesthetics (collectively, the "interests protected by the By-law").

No person shall remove, fill, dredge, alter or build upon or within one hundred feet of any bank, fresh water wetland, beach, marsh, meadow, bog, swamp, creek, river, stream, pond or lake, or any land under said waters, or any land subject to flooding or inundation, or within one hundred feet of the 100-year storm line, other than in the course of maintaining, repairing or replacing but not substantially changing or enlarging, an existing and lawfully located structure or facility used in the service of the public and used to provide electric, gas, water, telephone, telegraph and other telecommunication services, without filing written application for a permit so to remove, fill, dredge, alter or build upon, including such plans as may be necessary to describe such proposed activity and its effect on the environment, and receiving and complying with a permit issued pursuant to this By-law.

SECTION II: APPLICATION

Any person desiring to know whether or not a proposed activity or an area is subject to this bylaw may request a determination from the Carver Conservation Commission (the "Commission") in writing. The Conservation Commission shall issue its determination, in writing, within twenty-one (21) days from the receipt of such request.

The same Notice of Intent, plans and specifications required to be filed by the applicant under Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 131, section 40 will be accepted as fulfilling the requirements of this bylaw.

The Conservation Commission shall hear any oral presentation under this bylaw at the same public hearing required to be held under the provisions of said Chapter 131, section 40, of the Massachusetts General Laws. Definitions, time frames, and procedures, insofar as applicable, set forth in said Chapter and section and in the Regulations promulgated by the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering on July 28, 1978 are hereby made part of this bylaw.

The Conservation Commission, its agent, officers and employees, may enter upon the land upon which the proposed work is to be done in response to a request for a prior determination or for the purpose of carrying out its duties under this bylaw and may make or cause to be made such examination or survey as deemed necessary.

SECTION III: PERMIT AND CONDITIONS

If, after the public hearing, the Commission determines that the alteration which is the subject of the application is significant to the interests protected by this Bylaw, the Commission shall, within twenty-one (21) days of such hearing, issue or deny a permit for the work requested. The Conservation Commission is empowered to deny permission for any removal, filling, dredging, altering or building upon subject lands within the Town if, in its judgement, such denial is necessary for the interests protected by the Bylaw. Due consideration shall be given to possible affects of the proposal on all values to be protected under this bylaw.

If it issues a permit after making such determination, the Commission shall impose such conditions as it determines are necessary or desirable for protection of those interests, and all work shall be done in accordance with those conditions. If the Commission determines that the area which is the subject of the application is not significant to the interests protected by this Bylaw, or that the proposed activity does not require the imposition of conditions, it shall issue a permit without conditions within twenty-one (21) days of the public hearing. Permits shall expire one year from the date of issuance, unless renewed prior to expiration, and all work shall be completed prior to expiration.

SECTION IV: EMERGENCY PROJECTS

This Bylaw shall not apply to any emergency project as defined in Chapter 131, section 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws.

SECTION V: AGRICULTURAL PROJECTS

This Bylaw shall not apply to work performed for normal maintenance or improvement of lands in agricultural use as of the effective date of this Bylaw.

SECTION VI: PRE-ACQUISITION VIOLATION

Any person who purchases, inherits or otherwise acquires real estate upon which work has been done in violation of the provisions of this Bylaw or in violation of any permit issued pursuant to this Bylaw shall forthwith comply with any such order or restore such land to its condition prior to any such violation; provided, however, that no action, civil or criminal, shall be brought against such person unless commenced within three (3) years following the date of acquisition of the real estate by such person.

SECTION VII: REGULATIONS

After due notice and public hearing, the Commission may promulgate rules and regulations to effectuate the purposes of this Bylaw. Failure by the Commission to promulgate such rules and regulations or a legal declaration of their invalidity by a court of law shall not act to suspend or invalidate the effect of this Bylaw.

SECTION VIII: BURDEN OF PROOF

The applicant shall have the burden of proving by a preponderance of the credible evidence that the work proposed in the application will not harm the interests protected by this Bylaw. Failure to provide adequate evidence to the Commission supporting a determination that the proposed work will not harm the interests protected by this Bylaw shall be sufficient cause for the Commission to deny a permit or grant a permit with conditions, or, in the Commission's discretion, to continue the hearing to another date to enable the applicant or others to present additional evidence.

SECTION IX: ENFORCEMENT

Any person who violates any provision of this Bylaw or of any condition of a permit issued pursuant to it shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$200. Each day or portion thereof during which a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense; if more than one, each condition violated shall constitute a separate offense. This Bylaw may be enforced by a Town police officer or other officer having police powers. Upon request of the Commission, the Board of Selectmen and Town Counsel shall take such legal action as may be necessary to enforce this Bylaw and permits issued pursuant to it.

SECTION X: DEFINITION

The term "person" shall include any individual, group of individuals, association, partnership, corporation, company, business organization, trust, estate, the Commonwealth or political subdivision thereof to the extent subject to town bylaws, administrative agencies, public or quasi-public corporations or bodies, the Town of Carver, and any other legal entity, its legal representatives, agents or assigns.

SECTION XI: SECURITY

The Commission may require, as a permit condition, that the performance and observance of other conditions be secured by one or both of the following methods:

- (a) By a bond or deposit of money or negotiable securities in an amount determined by the Commission to be sufficient and payable to the Town of Carver upon default;
- (b) By a conservation restriction, easement or other covenant running with the land, executed and properly recorded (or registered, in the case of registered land).

SECTION XII:

The invalidity of any section or provision of this Bylaw shall not invalidate any other section or provision thereof.

Municipal Finance Terminology

The following terms are frequently used in the Annual Town Report and at Town Meetings. In order to provide everyone with a better understanding of the meaning, the following definitions are provided.

SURPLUS REVENUE: (often referred to as “Excess and Deficiency”)

This fund represents the amount by which the Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserve. This is a bookkeeping item.

AVAILABLE FUND: (often referred to as “Free Cash”)

Available Funds is the amount certified annually by the State Bureau of Accounts by deducting from surplus revenue all uncollected taxes for prior years. This fund may be used by a vote of the Town Meeting.

OVERLAY:

The Overlay is the amount raised by the Assessors in excess of appropriations and other charges for the purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements granted and avoiding fractions.

OVERLAY RESERVE:

This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific Overlay account for a given year, and may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes or voted into the Reserve Fund.

RESERVE FUND:

This fund is established by the voters at an annual town meeting only and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) both.

STABILIZATION FUND:

This is a fund created to provide a reserve for capital expenditure. Appropriations from the Stabilization Fund may be made at an Annual Town Meeting by a two-thirds vote for any purpose the town is authorized to borrow money for under Section 7 or 8 of Chapter 44 or for such other purpose as is approved by the Emergency Finance Board.

CHERRY SHEET:

Named for the cherry colored paper on which the Massachusetts Commission of Corporations and Taxation traditionally has printed it, the cherry sheet carries the figures which must be used by the Assessors in determining the amount to be raised by taxation.

It lists the amounts of county tax and state assessments, as well as the estimated tax distributions from the General Fund, reimbursements, agency funds, and the Sales and Use Taxes.

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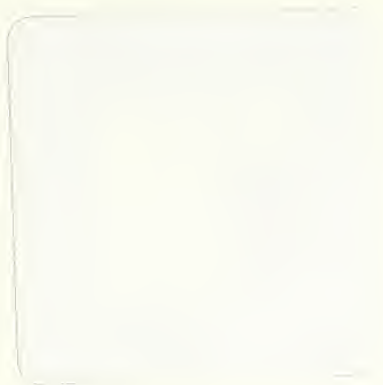

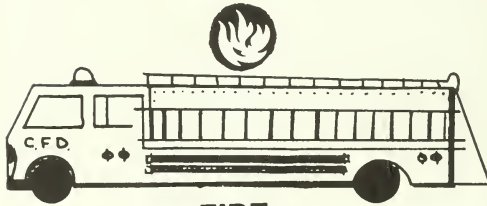
