

Thereupon, the Moderator led the assembled voters in the Pledge of Allegiance, and the Invocation was offered by the Rev. Robert H. Merritt.

Frank R. Mazzilli, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen then moved that the Annual Town Meeting be postponed until Monday, June 8, 1981, at 7:30 P.M. The motion was duly seconded, and it was unanimously SO VOTED.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Voted to adjourn until Monday, June 8, 1981, at 7:30 P.M.

## **Special Town Meeting**

April 27, 1981

A Special Town Meeting of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School House on Monday, April 27, 1981, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated April 1, 1981, and posted on April 2, 1981. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 o'clock P.M. by the Moderator, Arthur P. DeCoursey, there being a quorum present. After the introduction of the several Town Officials, the meeting proceeded as follows:

Article 1. After considerable discussion of the matter, the Article having been duly moved and seconded, and standing vote being had, with 116 voting in the affirmative and 36 opposed, it was VOTED "to rescind the action taken on December 1, 1980, under Article 1 of the Special Town Meeting Warrant dated November 12, 1980, whereby the Town voted to approve the amount of the \$26,000,000.00 debt authorized by vote of the Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee on October 28, 1980, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a new comprehensive high school."

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer the remaining twelve (12) acres of town-owned property behind the Library to the Carver Housing Authority. This property is adjacent to six (6) acres of property previously transferred to the Carver Housing Authority. A portion of this land is to be used for the construction of twenty (20) units of elderly low-income housing and eight (8) units of family low-income housing, parcel to be designated by Selectmen.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to amend the action taken on April 28, 1980 at the Annual Town Meeting on Article 53 of the Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated February 28, 1980, by deleting the words "Nemasket Construction Company, Inc." thereupon and substituting the words "Nemasket Sand & Gravel Corporation" therefor.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars from the Road Machinery Fund to be used by the Carver Department of Public Works to purchase surplus equipment.

**Article 5.** Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars from the Police Salary Account to the Police Overtime Account.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred (\$1,600.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a Traffic Light Control Unit for the traffic lights at the intersection of Purchase Street and Main Street.

There being no other business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

## **Annual Town Meeting**

Adjourned Session, Monday, June 8, 1981

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School House on Monday, June 8, 1981. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 o'clock P.M., by the moderator, Arthur P. DeCoursey. There not being a quorum present at that time, the meeting recessed until such time as a quorum should appear. A quorum appeared at 7:40 P.M., and the meeting was then called to order. The Invocation was offered by the Rev. Robert H. Merritt.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Richard Slavin, 6th Grade Student Government Town Moderator. The following Student Government Town Officers were presented with Certificates by Moderator, Arthur P. DeCoursey:

At this time, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Frank R. Mazzilli moved that action be taken only on, "Non Money Articles" at this session of the Annual Town Meeting. The motion was duly seconded, and it was SO VOTED.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1981, in accordance with provisions of General Laws Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to amend the General By-Laws of the Town by adding a new section as follows or to take any other action with respect thereto. This By-law "Savery Historic District By-Law" was presented by the Carver Historic District Commission. As a ½ majority vote was required, after considerable discussion, a standing vote being had, with 91 voting in the affirmative and 73 opposed, the motion for adoption of the By-law was DEFEATED.

**Article 6.** To see if the Town will vote to amend the General By-Laws of the Town of Carver by adding a new section as follows, or to take any other action with respect thereto.

#### Wetlands Protection By-Law

#### SECTION 1: PURPOSE

The purpose of this by-law is to protect the wetlands of the Town of Carver by controlling activities deemed to have a significant effect upon wetlands values, including but not limited to the following: public or private water supply, groundwater, flood control, erosion control, storm damage prevention, water pollution, fisheries, shellfish, wildlife, recreation and aesthetics (collectively, the "interests protected by the By-law").

No person shall remove, fill, dredge, alter or build upon or within one hundred feet of any bank, fresh water wetland, beach, marsh, meadow, bog, swamp, creek, river, stream, pond or lake, or any land under said waters, or any land subject to flooding or innundation, or within one hundred feet of the 100-year storm line, other than in the

course of maintaining, repairing or replacing but not substantially changing or enlarging, an existing and lawfully located structure or facility used in the service of the public and used to provide electric, gas, water, telephone, telegraph and other telecommunication services, without filing written application for a permit so to remove, fill, dredge, alter or build upon, including such plans as may be necessary to describe such proposed activity and its effect on the environment, and receiving and complying with a permit issued pursuant to this By-law.

#### SECTION II: APPLICATION

Any person desiring to know whether or not a proposed activity or an area is subject to this bylaw may request a determination from the Carver Conservation Commission (the "Commission") in writing. The Conservation Commission shall issue its determination, in writing, within twenty-one (21) days from the receipt of such request.

The same Notice of Intent, plans and specifications required to be filed by the applicant under Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 131, section 40 will be accepted as fulfilling the requirements of this by-law.

The Conservation Commission shall hear any oral presentation under this bylaw at the same public hearing required to be held under the provisions of said Chapter 131, section 40, of the Massachusetts General Laws. Definitions, time frames, and procedures insofar as applicable, set forth in said Chapter and section and in the Regulations promulgated by the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering on July 28, 1978, are hereby made part of this by-law.

The Conservation Commission, its agent, officers and employees, may enter upon the land upon which the proposed work is to be done in response to a request for a prior determination or for the purpose of carrying out its duties under this bylaw and may make or cause to be made such examination or survey as deemed necessary.

#### SECTION III. PERMIT AND CONDITIONS

If, after the public hearing, the Commission determines that the alteration which is the subject of the application is significant to the interests protected by this Bylaw, the Commission shall, within twenty-one (21) days of such hearing, issue or deny a permit for the work requested. The Conservation Commission is empowered to deny permission for any removal, filling, dredging, altering or building upon subject lands within the Town if, in its judgement, such denial is necessary for the interests protected by the Bylaw. Due consideration shall be given to possible affects of the proposal on all values to be protected under this bylaw.

If it issues a permit after making such determination, the Commission shall impose such conditions as it determines are necessary or desirable for protection of those interests, and all work shall be done in accordance with those conditions. If the Commission determines that the area which is the subject of the application is not significant to the interests protected by this Bylaw, or that the proposed activity does not require the imposition of conditions, it shall issue a permit without conditions within twenty-one (21) days of the public hearing. Permits shall expire one year from the date of issuance, unless renewed prior to expiration, and all work shall be completed prior to expiration.

#### SECTION IV: EMERGENCY PROJECTS

This Bylaw shall not apply to any emergency project as defined in Chapter 131, section 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws.

#### SECTION V: AGRICULTURAL PROJECTS

This Bylaw shall not apply to work performed for normal maintenance or improvement of lands in agricultural use as of the effective date of this Bylaw.

#### SECTION VI: PRE-ACQUISITION VIOLATION

Any person who purchases, inherits or otherwise acquires real estate upon which work has been done in violation of the provisions of this Bylaw or in violation of any permit issued pursuant to this Bylaw shall forthwith comply with any such order or restore such land to its condition prior to any such violation; provided, however, that no action, civil or criminal, shall be brought against such person unless commenced within three (3) years following the date of acquisition of the real estate by such person.

#### SECTION VII: REGULATIONS

After due notice and public hearing, the Commission may promulgate rules and regulations to effectuate the purposes of this Bylaw. Failure by the Commission to promulgate such rules and regulations or a legal declaration of their invalidity by a court of law shall not act to suspend or invalidate the effect of this Bylaw.

#### SECTION VIII: BURDEN OF PROOF

The applicant shall have the burden of proving by a preponderance of the credible evidence that the work proposed in the application will not harm the interests protected by this Bylaw. Failure to provide adequate evidence to the Commission supporting a determination that the proposed work will not harm the interests protected by the Bylaw shall be sufficient cause for the Commission to deny a permit or grant a permit with conditions, or, in the Commission's discretion, to continue the hearing to another date to enable the applicant or others to present additional evidence.

#### SECTION IX: ENFORCEMENT

Any person who violates any provision of this Bylaw or of any condition of a permit issued pursuant to it shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$200. Each day or portion thereof during which a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense; if more than one, each condition violated shall constitute a separate offense. This Bylaw may be enforced by a Town police officer or other officer having police powers. Upon request of the Commission, the Board of Selectmen and Town Counsel shall take such legal action as may be necessary to enforce this Bylaw and permits issued pursuant to it.

#### SECTION X: DEFINITION

The term "person" shall include any individual, group of individuals, association, partnership, corporation, company, business organization, trust, estate, the Commonwealth or political subdivision thereof to the extent subject to Town bylaws, administrative agencies, public or quasipublic corporations or bodies, the Town of Carver, and any other legal entity, its legal representatives, agents or assigns.

#### SECTION XI: SECURITY

The Commission may require, as a permit condition, that the performance and observance of other conditions be secured by one or both of the following methods:

- (a) By a bond or deposit of money or negotiable securities in an amount determined by the Commission to be sufficient and payable to the Town of Carver upon default:
- (b) By a conservation restriction, easement or other covenant running with the land, executed and properly recorded (or registered, in the case of registered land).

#### SECTION XII:

The invalidity of any section or provision of this Bylaw shall not invalidate any other section or provision thereof.

(by Carver Conservation Commission)

The Article was duly moved and seconded. Thereupon, after considerable discussion, the following Amendments to the By-Law as appearing in the Warrant, were duly VOTED.

After motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to amend Section II, as appearing in the Warrant, by inserting the following words "including all appeal procedures provided" in the third line of the third paragraph of Section II so as to read "Definitions, time frames, and procedures, including all appeal procedures provided," insofar as applicable, set forth in said Chapter and section and in the Regulations promulgated by the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering on July 28, 1978, are hereby made part of this bylaw.

After motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to amend Article 6, as appearing in the Warrant, by adding a new section after Section XII, as Follows:

#### SECTION XIII:

Any person aggrieved by a determination of the Commission or its failure to act shall have the right to appeal as provided by Chapter 131.

Thereupon, upon motion duly made and seconded, standing vote being had, with 127 voting in the affirmative and 35 opposed it was VOTED to adopt the foregoing "Wetlands Protection By-law," as amended.

- Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to advise the Great and General Court not to appropriate for Fiscal Year 1982 more than it did for Fiscal Year 1981 for expenditures by the Commonwealth's departments and agencies. Further, that the savings of approximately \$350,000,000 from the above cuts be redistributed to the cities and towns in the form of increased local aid.
- **Article 9.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish an Energy Resource Commission under the provisions of Chapter 40 of the General Laws, amended by adding after Section 8 H the following section; SECTION 81 Energy Resources Commission.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, and after some discussion, voice vote being had, the motion was DEFEATED.

- **Article 11.** Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED that the County Dog Fund be applied to the Governor Carver School Operating Expense Account.
- **Article 12.** Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to hear the report of any standing committees and to abolish any special committee not submitting a report unless otherwise voted, and to establish any new committee. Thereupon the following committee reports were presented:
- 1. William R. Holmes, Chairman of the Town Barn Study presented a report, in writing, for the Committee. It was VOTED to accept said report and to continue the committee.
- 2. Mr. Raymond presented the report of the Wage and Personnel Study Committee. It was VOTED to accept the report and to continue the committee.
- 3. Mr. Erwin K. Washburn reported for the Local School Building Committee and requested that the Committee be allowed to continue in effect, because of a pending law suit. Report accepted and so VOTED.
- Article 14. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to establish a Youth Program Critical Needs Review Committee, said committee to be made up of five members, two appointed by the Moderator, two appointed by the Selectmen, and one appointed by the Chairman of the Finance Committee. This committee will work with the Recreation Committee over the next year in assessing the need

for programs for 12-16 year olds, over the next four years, and will be prepared to submit their findings to the next Annual Town Meeting.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws of the Town of Carver to include the following:

#### 2.0 Definitions:

Country Club—A club having non-discriminatory membership and consisting of recreational, dining, entertainment and function room facilities located in a rural area on at least five (5) acres of land and operated to the benefit of the community and established in a manner that is compatible with its rural setting.

#### 4.1e Allowed Uses in Agricultural-Residential District

Country Club

After considerable discussion of the matter, both pro and con, Mr. DeBenedictus offered the following amendment to section 4.1e "and provided that such facilities be restricted to one (1) such facility per 5000 population." The motion to amend was duly seconded. Thereupon, voice vote being had, the motion to amend was DEFEATED.

Upon motion duly made and seconded on the Article as appearing in the Warrant, standing vote being had, with 45 voting in the affirmative and 100 opposed, the motion was DEFEATED.

At this time it was duly moved and seconded to adjourn to Wednesday June 10, 1981, at 7:30 P.M. So Voted, unanimously.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED "to authorize and direct the Board of Selectmen to petition the General Court for the passage of legislation to authorize issuance of an all-alcoholic beverage package store license to Country Cupboard for premises located on Route 44, notwithstanding the limitation of the number of licenses provided for in Chapter 138 of the General Laws."

Article 21. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to amend the Article by adding the word "private" before the word "events" in the second line of Article 21 as appearing in the Warrant. Amendment was duly VOTED. Dollars to meet the Town's share, and to borrow on short term notes, in anticipation of reimbursement, the sum of Twenty-seven Thousand One Hundred Eleven (\$27,111.00) Dollars as the State's share of the cost of work under State Aid, Construction or Improvements.

**Article 40.** Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Thousand (\$35,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of preparing, oiling and paving roads that are accepted public ways within the Town of Carver.

Article 41. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars from available funds in the treasury for the purpose of meeting the charges against the cemetery funds in the Town Treasury.

Article 42. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to be used to pay for all private work and materials in Town cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 43. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars for a drainage account to be expended by the Department of Public Works on various streets that are accepted public ways or easements within the Town of Carver.

Article 44. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds the sum of Five Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-five (\$5,225.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new 1981 Sand and Salt Spreader for the Department of Public Works.

Article 45. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping two new 50 Watt Radios for the Department of Public Works.

**Article 46.** Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to accept the report of the Planning Board, and to lay out and accept as laid out, the following private ways as public ways:

All of Lucas Street

All of Kaski Street

Jowett Street from Murdock Street to Great Meadow Drive

Great Meadow Drive from Murdock Street to the high tension line, and to see what sum the Town will raise from the tax levy, transfer from available funds or borrow for the purpose and see whether the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase land or interests in land or acquire land or interests in land by eminent domain under Chapter 79 of the General Laws or otherwise for the purpose of this article.

**Article 47.** Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars to the Historic District Commission for the purpose of paying the projected costs for postage, maps, recording at the Registry of Deeds, paper and typing costs.

**Article 48.** Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to transfer the sum of Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of adding to the Street Lighting Account.

There being no futher business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to adjourn.

**September 21, 1981** 

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School House on Monday, September 21, 1981, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated September 2, 1981.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M., by the Moderator, Arthur P. DeCoursey. There not being a quorum present at that time, the Moderator declared a recess to await the appearance of a quorum.

At 7:37 P.M. the Moderator declared a quorum present and the meeting was again called to order. After the Pledge of Allegiance the Reverend Robert H. Merritt offered the Invocation. Robert E. Bentley, Chairman of the Finance Committee, introduced the members of the Finance Committee. Thereupon, the meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. Motion duly made and seconded to transfer from free cash in the treasury the sum of Five Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-five (\$5,225.00) Dollars to

reimburse the County of Plymouth for awards payable from the Treasury of said County for damages caused by the taking of land on Plymouth Street, Carver, under the provisions of Decree No. 1499, Section I in accordance with Warrant issued August 4, 1981. Voice vote in the affirmative being questioned and standing vote being had, with 62 voting in the affirmative and 38 opposed, the motion was VOTED.

**Article 2.** Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to transfer from free cash in the treasury the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars for interest on temporary loans, said sum to be in addition to the funds voted for the same purpose at the Annual Town Meeting.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED that the Town amend its action taken under Article 36 of the 1981 Annual Town Meeting and it was VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury (instead of borrowing as originally voted) the sum of Twenty-seven Thousand One Hundred Eleven (\$27,111.00) Dollars to meet the State's share of the cost of work under State Aid, Construction, or Improvements, being funded by Chapter 329, Acts of 1980.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to amend the action taken under Article 37 of the Annual Town Meeting and to transfer from available funds in the treasury (instead of borrowing as originally voted) the sum of Fourteen Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety-four (\$14,994.00) Dollars to meet the State's share of the cost of work under State Aid, Construction or Improvements, being funded by Chapter 570, Acts of 1980.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to amend the action taken under Article 38 of the Annual Town Meeting and to transfer from available funds in the treasury (instead of borrowing as originally voted) the sum of Twenty-seven Thousand One Hundred Eleven (\$27,111.00) Dollars to meet the State's share of the cost of work under State Aid, Construction or Improvements.

**Article 6.** Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty-one Dollars and Eight Cents (\$251.08) to pay the following unpaid bills of 1981:

**Article 8.** Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars, said amount to be added to the amount originally voted under Article 33 of the 1981 Annual Town Meeting for Schools and Vocational Education.

**Article 9.** Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty-three Thousand Nine (\$83,009.00) Dollars, said amount to be added to the amount originally voted under Article 33 of the Annual

Town Meeting for the purpose of meeting the Plymouth Carver Regional School assessment in full.

Article 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to establish the salary for the Fire Chief at Eighteen Thousand (\$18,000.00) Dollars per annum, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand One Hundred Fifty-three Dollars and Seventy Cents (\$13,153.70) for the balance of the Fiscal Year to the Fire Chief Salary Account.

Article 11. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars to the Municipal Insurance Account.

Article 12. Article was duly moved and seconded. Thereupon it was duly moved and seconded to act on each "Line Item" separately. Voice vote being had, the motion to act on each item separately was DEFEATED.

Thereupon, upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to amend the original motion by striking out the words "Cost of Living," as appearing in the Article in the Warrant.

Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-three Dollars and Eighty-six Cents (\$35,233.86) to provide "adjustment" in salaries and wages, in addition to the amounts originally voted under Article 33 of the 1981 Annual Town Meeting, said salary and wage adjustments to be retroactive to July 1, 1981, as follows:

#### Director's Report

The Carver Council on Aging Director has co-ordinated through the past year all mini-bus reservations, mall trips, medicals, mini-bus drivers, newsletters, information and referral, business calls, and also attended numerous meetings. These meetings were concerning ways to help the elderly with Medicare and Medicaid problems, Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits, Fuel Assistance and other Energy Related problems.

The Council provides many services for people who are 59 years of age or older. A list of these services, I.D. cards for discounts, and names placed on the mailing list may be obtained at the Marcus Atwood Multi-purpose Center in South Carver, which is open daily from 9:00 A.M.—4:00 P.M. for information and referral.

There are two Drop-in Centers for the Council on Aging. The Center Drop-in, located at Fellowship Hall in Center Carver, is open on Wednesdays and Fridays from 12:30—4:30 P.M., and the Atwood Drop-in is open daily from 12:00 noon—4:00 P.M. These Centers offer many activities which include the following: games, occasional films, refreshments, Holiday parties, and Birthday parties which are celebrated once a month with donations of cake and ice cream.

Newsletters are mailed out bi-monthly keeping the elderly informed of legislation for the elderly, discounts, legal information, any new developments in Social Security, tax information, and a two month calendar of activities and services. Our mailings have increased from 3,800 to 4,113 in the past year.

We have three Senior Aides, whose salaries are paid by the Department of Labor. Each Aide works 20 hours a week. Two of these Aides assist at both Drop-ins, visit the sick in hospitals and nursing homes and the homebound, call on new residents and acquaint them with the activities and services of the Council on Aging, and assist with the newsletter. The third Aide works as a clerk in the office at the Marcus Atwood House and also handles the business affairs when the Director is at a meeting.

The Director for the Council on Aging attends several other meetings such as: Carver Housing Authority, Senior Aide, CIRCA, Area Associations, Old Colony Elderly Services, Energy, Department of Elder Affairs and Staff.

During the past year, the Council has spent a great deal of time seeking and preparing grants for a nutrition center. Their goal is to renovate the existing barn adjacent to the Multi-purpose Center, to be able to have hot lunches daily for the elderly of the town at a modest cost to them.

Our continuing thanks to the Selectmen, the Town Boards, and the Townspeople for their tremendous support of our program.

# Report of the Office of Public Prosecutor

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The Office of Public Prosecutor, during the year 1981, has continued to represent the Towns of Carver, Marion, Mattapoisett, Rochester and Wareham, in all matters related to the prosecution of criminal cases, town ordinances and by-laws in the Fourth Plymouth Division of the Trial Court at Wareham.

At the end of the year, a slight delay in bringing cases to trial had developed due to the lack of double trial sessions. The recommended time between an ordinary arrest or criminal violation and the trial is approximately 60 days, whereas the present court docket averages about four months before the matter can be tried on its merits.

Figures for the past twelve months from this office indicate the following:

Carver: 709 Defendants, 1,268 Complaints
Marion: 468 Defendants, 991 Complaints
Mattapoisett: 611 Defendants, 1,186 Complaints
Rochester: 222 Defendants, 573 Complaints
Wareham: 2,181 Defendants, 4,654 Complaints

for a total of 4,191 Defendants and 8,672 Complaints. The above figures reflect a weekly average of 80 Defendants being charged with approximately 166 various charges.

Reimbursement to the towns by the Court for criminal fines increased during the year and a review of the Court records for the year show the following reimbursement:

## Carver Public Health Nurse Committee

The Carver Public Health Nurse Committee has had another increasingly active year serving the health needs of the people of Carver.

As a comprehensive home health agency, the Carver Public Health Nurse Committee provides home based care as well as health promotion services for the Town's people. Hospitals continue to release patients earlier in their recovery phase and the need for providing a full range of home care services is essential. An increasing number of patients have been seen over the past year by agency nursing staff and contracted providers of therapy services and home health aides.

During FY 1980-1981, 53 patients were admitted for agency services and the following visits were made:

The agency offered a Health Fair in October to provide health information and screening. Staff members, Dr. Stephen Hughes, agency medical advisor, and many R.N. volunteers contributed to this worthwhile and informative project.

With regrets the agency accepted the resignation of Nancy Jones, R.N., Supervisor in June 1981, and in October, 1981 Anne Hyde, R.N. was hired to fill this position.

The agency has continued to be involved with area home health agencies to better meet program goals. Coordination with other agencies for record review, consultation on mutual problems, provision of inservice, and co-ordination with area hospitals enable improved productivity and efficiency.

We are also greatly assisted by our own Board of Health, Professional Advisory Committee and its sub-committees. Many dedicated health professionals and consumers continue to offer their support and direction in reviewing and recommending policies: administrative, personnel and services, evaluating administration and services offered.

With an increasing patient case load and an increasing level of complexity of patients served, the Carver Public Health Nurse Committee continues to strive to offer the people of the Town comprehensive home and community centered health care, providing quality, cost effective care to those in need.

# Report of the Carver Historical Commission

Once again a year has passed through our hands and on into history. This is another year now given over to the Town Historians. We are fast approaching our 200th year of incorporation which will be the Carver Bicentennial of 1790—1990.

As we think of that incredible mass of time, we may pause to think, wonder, muse, reflect on or about the past. Natural curiosity causes us to wonder things like: what

were the indians like who used and dropped those arrow heads and artifacts we find about town? Or perhaps who first lived on my property and built the old house there? or even what did these earlier people do for a way of life, or how did the cranberry industry or the iron foundrys begin and/or die? These are the issues of Carver's past that are memories.

The Carver Historical Commission, for people who may be new in town, was established to promote the educational, cultural, economic and general welfare of the public through the preservation and protection of the distinctive characteristics of buildings and places significant in the history of the Town of Carver or their architecture, and through the maintenance and improvement of settings of such buildings and places.

Two activities currently under way are: a filing to get five places in Carver on the National Historic Register, and the production of a booklet to be made available for public disposal. This booklet will contain a map of Carver, photographs and text of significant structures indigenous to Carver, and surveyed the summer of 1980.

One of the articles submitted for the Town to consider is a request for \$715 to help pay for the cost of the booklets production. The sum is an odd one because this is the amount paid to the Town over and above the cost of the 1980 survey, and was placed in available funds to be voted out again for the use of the Historical Commission at a later time.

A third project of an ancillary nature and spearheaded by the separate Historic District Commission is also of great interest and importance to the goals and objectives of our commission. There is another article in the Town Warrant to establish a Historic District in the Savery Lane, Larches Union Church, Leyden Cottage Area of Route 58 in South Carver. The homes and neighborhood of important people in Carver's past, and beautiful examples of fine architecture. Perhaps even the most historically distinctive area in all of Carver. We would like to see this section set aside for future generations to be able to wonder and muse over the past just as we have had the pleasure and opportunity to do.

Our Board is always looking for more interested people of Carver's past, and working towards preserving it for the future. Those who may be interested should contact the Board of Selectmen.

## **Carver Historic District Commission**

The Carver Historic District Commission had an active year during which time it received and acted upon seven (7) applications for design review. Of these, six (6) were for certificates of design appropriateness and one (1) was for a certificate of non-applicability. The projects ranged in nature from the erection of new signs to the total rehabilitation of a small cluster of existing buildings. Included in the projects was the revitalization of a previously uninhabitable structure into a handsome single family residence. Also, of prime importance was an application for the conversion of a former residential structure into a structure for commercial use.

In March, 1981, the Commission prepared and published an explanation sheet of the Carver Historic District Commission. In common language, the explanation sheet posed and answered many questions regarding filing procedures, issuance of certificates and the benefits of having a local historic district.

In the continuing effort to identify and preserve valuable historic areas within the town, the Commission undertook and completed the Savery Avenue Historic District Study, which recommended the establishment of a second historic district within the town, to be called the Savery Historic District. The recommendation became an article on last years' town meeting warrant. The article did not receive the mandatory two-thirds vote of town meeting and was defeated.

The Commission recently submitted the Lakenham Historic District to the U. S. Department of the Interior for certification. Once certification is achieved, projects within the Historic District which involve the improvement of properties and structures for income-producing purposes will become eligible for a federal income tax incentive program. Property owners improving properties will be allowed to take twenty-five percent (25%) of certified rehabilitation costs as a tax credit. For further information regarding this program, contact the Historic District Commission at Box 92, South Carver, MA 02366.

The Commission began the process of submitting the Lakenham Historic District to the U. S. Department of the Interior for placement in the National Register of Historic Places. If accepted, the District will become eligible for federal grants and low interest loans for the purpose of restoration projects.

Many members of the Commission attended seminars sponsored by the Massachusetts Association of Historic District commissions for the purpose of increasing their knowledge of the operations of other historic district commissions so that the Carver Historic District Commission could be more effectively operated. Commission members will continue to attend such seminars in 1982.

We have made a great stride in preserving those historic areas of value to Carver and look to continued support if we are to continue our progress. We thank all those who have helped for their generous support.

# Carver Public Library Annual Report 1981

Our library goal is the maximum use of the collection by the greatest number of persons. The public library is part of the continuing education process by helping to make available knowledge and ideas required for growth and understanding. Small public libraries can not be everything for everyone in the community, but they can strive to be a place to turn for all ages when all private sources are expended. We hope our interest and help can encourage you as well as if we had thousands more materials and books in our collection.

Because of public interest in curbing rising taxes, our budget was diminished as well as most other departments. In order to stay open the same thirty hours weekly that was attained last year, we changed to summer and winters. The result of a public question-naire established the following hours: Winter Hours: Monday 1-6 p.m., Tuesday 2-8 p.m., Wednesday 10-6 p.m., Friday 1-6 p.m., Saturday 10-4 p.m. Summer Hours: Monday 3-8 p.m., Tuesday 2-8 p.m., Wednesday 10-5 p.m., Thursday 3-8 p.m., Saturday 10-5 p.m.

# Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project

The Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project is pleased to submit the following report for 1981.

Despite a relatively dry season, mosquito populations were considerable in some areas of the county during certain weeks of the spring and summer. Use of efficient Ultra-low volume sprayers allowed our crews to treat 220,500 acres and thus bring some measure of relief to a majority of Plymouth County residents. In addition, over 1500 acres of breeding habitat and 10,750 storm sewer catch basins were treated with safe and non-persistent larvacides.

Before and after the mosquito breeding season, all crews were utilized in the maintenance of nearly 150,000 linear feet of ditchwork and streams to prevent clogging and water back-up, and thus reduce mosquito breeding sites. Most of this was accomplished by hand.

During the first full year under the direction of Superintendent/Entomologist Gary L. Benzon, many significant changes have occurred which include a complete revision and modernization of methods, equipment, facilities, and personnel. When complete, this revision will greatly incease our ability to control mosquitoes safely with no increase in costs per capita which remains below one dollar per year. The superintendent will be visiting each member town during 1982 to fully explain the program and its benefits.

On July 1, 1981, the five towns of Duxbury, Norwell, Scituate, Hingham, and Hull joined the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project. They have been assessed for and have received our services since that time. This will have the effect of decreasing overhead relative to operational costs and therefore make mosquito control even more economical to all towns served. Cohasset had recently voted to join during 1982.

On September 1, 1981, this Project vacated its separate office and operations facilities and occupied one new consolidated facility on Pembroke Street in Kingston. This has also resulted in an increase in economy and efficiency. We invite interested town officials to tour the building.

During the next two years, revision and modernization will continue to occur until the utmost in efficient mosquito control with the least possible environmental impact is achieved. We are proud of our achievements during 1981 and wish to thank each city and town, and their personnel, for their cooperation throughout the year.

# Carver Industrial & Development Commission

This year has been a year for basics for the Towns' Agent designated to promote its future development potential. Realizing that the Town has no land that it owns that is zoned Industrial, it continues to work within the areas of Industrial, Commercial/Business property owned by private parties. Carver is the fastest growing community within the SRPEDD region and continues to be the community with the lowest median income along with the highest unemployment. This is a fact that all should recognize when they look at our ability to support a new high school. Hopefully everyone will get behind two major projects undertaken by the IDC in concert with the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen.

With the expertise of SRPEDD and under the request of the IDC a tourism-recreation feasibility process was undertaken and a reasonable recommendation for community action has been presented to you that basically suggest specific land surrounding Edaville R. R. to be zoned tourism-recreation. The results will be positive for the expansion of that facility as well as protecting the cranberry and residential owners within the designated areas.

Land in Carver abutting the Plymouth Airport is recommended by Selectmen and the IDC to be rezoned business in order for Carver to take advantage of future expansion of the land around the airport for development.

The final area of concern to the IDC and the citizens of Carver is the localizing of a client in the North Carver Industrial Zoned Park. Through the efforts of the IDC a number of clients are in negotiation with the present land owners.

In conclusion, the signs welcoming Industrial, Commercial and Business have been erected with the help of Lee Peck and the DPW whom we thank publicly. It is our hope that the spirit of those signs permeates to our citizens and that we do welcome with a positive attitude anyone who is interested in doing business in Carver which means more jobs and hopefully a stronger tax base.

The IDC felt the loss of one of its members this year in the name of Richard Gabree. He served in the past as chairman and most recently as a member of the commission. We welcomed a new member, Lou Bonito and accepted with regret Deborah Sullivan's resignation, who now serves on the Finance Committee.

# Department of Public Works

Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The Board of Public Works reports that the following work was accomplished during 1981.

The reconstruction of Rochester Road began during the summer and was substantially completed before the heavy holiday traffic into Edaville Railroad began. Scheduled to be completed this summer is the remaining 800 feet out to Route 58. The monies for this project have come from State Aid to Construction and Improvements.

The other major reconstruction project was on Montello Street with the work being performed by Nemasket Sand & Gravel Corp. Funds for this project have been paid by Nemasket as part of the sand and gravel removal permit issued by the Board of Appeals.

The reconstruction of Holmes Street was completed thus eliminating a very serious curve which over the years has been the scene of numerous accidents. Funds for this project were approved at the 1980 Town Meeting.

The Salt Shed was completed prior to the winter thus the continued contamination of the ground water has been minimized.

Minor drainage improvements have been done on Plymouth Street and Meadow Street. Major drainage problems have been witnessed this year. We can attribute these to weather conditions and the fact that the cleaning of the catch basins has not been done for two years because of cuts in the operating budget.

Oiling and paving was done on Purchase St., Plymouth St., Tremont St., McFarlin Rd., White Pine Lane, Cranberry Rd., Doreen Way, Nel Bonny Rd., Snappit St., Forest St., and Holmes St.

Brush clean-up continues of Carver roadways. The snow storm of December 4 and 5 created a massive cleanup problem for the D.P.W. personnel.

With the major cuts in personnel from the CETA program and summer help program, we have embarked on a new program to supplement these cuts. With the cooperation of the Superintendent at MCI, Plymouth, the Town of Carver is supplied daily 10 inmates to work as laborers on the Department of Public Works. This work is being done at no cost to the Carver taxpayer. Work assignments have included work in the cemeteries, parks, beaches and road side litter cleanup.

During the first year of Proposition 2½, the Carver Department of Public Works has experienced a 15% cut in its operating budget with the biggest cuts coming in road maintenance, it will only be a matter of time before we see the effects. With the extremely hard winter that we have experienced the signs are beginning to show up. The roadways must be maintained!!! Higher material costs, high reconstruction cost (seven times more) and the new tort liability law can all mean added costs in the future.

The Carver Department of Public Works since its inception has provided the people of Carver with the most for the money spent and is committed to this goal each and every year. The essential services must be maintained and no matter what the political structure may be of the Department, the need for men and materials to efficiently run the Department are a must.

# **Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service**

The Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service's Office is located on High St., Hanson, and can be reached by calling 293-3541, 447-5946 or 746-0053.

### STAFF:

Our staff is comprised of a Director, two Regional Agricultural Specialists, a Community Resource Development Specialist, two Home Economists, four 4-H Agents and four clerical staff.

In addition to our County Staff, we administer a Nutritional Educational Program for limited-income families in Plymouth County, (Expanded Food & Nutrition Educational Program). We have two professional nutritionists and ten aides. This office is located at 32 Belmont St., Brockton, and is funded by Federal Nutrition Funds, through the University of Massachusetts, our Land-Grant College. This is for both a 4-H and Adult Program.

Our Expanded Food and Nutrition Program (EFNEP) has expanded from Brockton to all of Plymouth County's twenty-six towns.

In 1980-81, there were 4,722 youth involved in our 4-H EFNEP Nutrition Program. You can obtain information about current programs, as well as up-to-date consumer information, by requesting the free monthly newsletter, *Kitchen Quotes*. This newsletter can be sent to you by calling the Brockton Office at 583-2545 or 583-2598. This newsletter is also prepared in Spanish.

In our traditional 4-H Program, we have 1,313 members with 22,041 other youth participating in our short-term and school programs. The 1977 population of Plymouth County schools was 96,287. This means 2,412 of the Plymouth County youth have been involved in our programs this year.

In your town, Carver, there were 594 youth that participated in these programs. Contact your Town Director, Mrs. Jean Gibbs, for the County Cooperative Extension Service with any suggestions or request.

Free bulletins are on display at our office on lawn care, gardening, nutrition, home canning and freezing, to name just a few. If you pass our office in your travels, please stop and get to know us. We continue to test soil, free of charge, for Plymouth County residents. Our Home Economist will also check your pressure cooker guage.

# 1980-1981 Report of Trustees for County Cooperative Extension Service

In accordance with the General Laws of the Commonwealth, Chapter 128, the Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service are empowered to receive, on behalf of the County, money appropriated by any town, or by the Federal

Government for carrying out the provisions of the law, under which they are appointed.

Their agents have made contacts during the past year in every community, either by public meetings, individual visits, group discussions, demonstrations, or otherwise, in attempting to assist the needs of the citizens toward helping to solve management problems, better living, and better community service, and have been ably assisted by many local volunteer leaders.

A total expense of \$100.00 was incurred during the year for the purchase of material needed in carrying on the various Extension Programs. The appropriation made by your town was used for residents of the town and expended as follows:

# Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD)

During 1981 the Town of Carver continued its membership for the twelfth year in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is a planning and economic development agency formed under state law to serve twenty-eight communities in southeastern Massachusetts by providing a cooperative approach to regional issues.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or designee and a planning board representative from each participating municipality and six low-income and minority representatives. Carver's Commission representatives from the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board, respectively are, David G. Knight who serves as Chairman of the SRPEDD Commission, a member of the Executive Committee and the Economic Development Committee, and also served as secretary-treasurer of the Massachusetts Association of Regional Planning Agencies, and Timothy McGillicuddy, Jr., who serves on the executive Committee.

In addition to regional planning and economic development, SRPEDD assists member cities and towns. Through the free municipal assistance program, each community receives time for local projects and assistance in preparing applications for federal and state funds.

The agency's purpose is to plan for regional land use, economic development, housing, transit, transportation, solid waste, energy resources and conservation, and air and water quality. Local participation in these regional plans enables communities to be

eligible for federal and state dollars.

Services to Carver this past year included:

- Preparing a Carver Recreation and Tourism Study;
- Providing advice on request on zoning issues; and
- Evaluating a proposal for a refinery.

Regional plans and other activities conducted this year benefiting all communities include:

- The Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which makes member communities eligible for U.S. Economic Development Administration funding and a 10 percent bonus for public facility projects.
- The *Transportation Improvements Program* (TIP) which lists major projects in each community for federal and state funding. A project must be included on the TIP in order to be eligible for these funds.
- A Housing Conversion and Rehabilitation Program funded with bonus money provided to SRPEDD by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The program will provide grants to establish approximately 25 new housing units in existing structures throughout the region.
- The *Transportation Energy Contingency Plan* which recommends a number of local and regional actions in case of a gasoline emergency.
- Several conferences: SRPEDD co-sponsored a Water Symposium in Bridgewater, Hazardous Waste Workshops in Fall River and New Bedford, and an Economic Development Conference in Brockton; and conducted Energy Conservation and Waste Heat Utilization Workshops.
- SRPEDD also conducts "A-95" and environmental assessment reviews of state and federally funded projects; reviews of industrial revenue bonds; and reviews of all local zoning amendments. The reviews are advisory and are oriented toward making proposals more cost-effective and feasible.

SRPEDD represents the collective will of its member communities. As the responsibilities and problems of municipalities become increasingly complex, the District can provide technical assistance to local boards, encourage cooperation among communities, and provide a comprehensive approach to issues that cross local boundaries.

# Administrator's Report Carver Public Schools 1981

The 1981 school year in the Carver Public Schools continued to experience growth in student enrollment. 1980 ended with an enrollment of 1,125, while the current enrollment is 1,290. While this increase represents the Seventh grader's return to the Governor John, an increase in Kindergarten through grade 6 was also noted. 1981 also brought Proposition 2½ and significant program and personnel cuts. 6 full time teachers were cut, bus routes were consolidated, the All-Day Kindergarten program was eliminated, and other significant programs and part time personnel were reduced or diminished. The following new staff members joined the Governor John Carver faculty in 1981:

After 3 years of distinguished service to the young people in Carver, Walter Correia resigned as a member of the Carver School Committee. His humane and fair approach will be greatly missed during these times of profound economic and political decisions. Mr. Charles Erwin was appointed to fill the vacancy on the School Committee.

Minimum Competency testing highlighted the curriculum efforts at the school. As a result of the minimum competency program, curriculum review of writing skills became immediately mobilized. Teacher in-service training, improved supervision, and review of instructional materials made up the substantial commitment to strengthen the writing program. A pilot Science program was implemented in grades 2 and 6. The multi-basal reading program enjoyed a highly successful second year of implementation. The staff participated in a systems review of the homework policy to be acted on and implemented in the near future. The staff In-Service Planning Committee developed an outstanding program of comprehensive in-service training sessions. The 3-day in-service calendar was generated from a School Needs Assessment that identified curriculum and program issues that the staff felt needed to be addressed. A program involving Plimoth Plantation highlighted the social studies curriculum in the primary grades.

Santa Claus visited the school, but had to leave his helicopter at the North Pole this year due to bad weather. Again, the fourth grade children spent one week in Swanzey, New Hampshire in the Nature's Classroom Program. Later in the year, the fourth grade sponsored a spaghetti dinner and slide tape of the 1981 Nature's Classroom Program. In addition, the sixth grade spent a week on Thompson's Island, also part of the Nature's Classroom Program. The fifth grade spent all day off the coast of New England for their second annual "Whale Watch." All expenses for the various trips were raised by the children through grade level fund raisers. The staff prepared a Nature Trail at the school to be used by the children at the school or any community group who may wish to use the trail.

This year, the Carver Public Schools lost to retirement Mr. Franklin Wilbur, head custodian for many years at the school. Mr. Wilbur's conscientious and dedicated record of extraordinary service to the Town will indeed be missed. Mr. Richard Brown was appointed as Head Custodian to replace Franklin. Mrs. Roberta Perry continues to maintain a quality school lunch program, while at the same time keeping the lunch prices down.

The P.T.O continued to be a vibrant and active support group for the school. Under the leadership of Mary Ross, the P.T.O. took the initiative to run a variety of fund raisers for the school to help offset the impact of Proposition 2½. The P.T.O. sponsored a dance that raised a total of \$1,500 for the school. In addition, the sign that was recently placed on the front lawn of the school was donated by the P.T.O. to help announce upcoming events in the school community. The volunteer program, under the direction of Carolyn Brennan continues to offer instructional and supervisory support for the teachers. Periodic volunteer orientation sessions are run to train new volunteers. Always looking for more volunteers, anyone interested in joining the program should contact Carolyn Brennan. The CAPS raised \$300 playing the school faculty in a second annual volleyball game. The faculty put on a graduation dinner and talent show for the graduating sixth grade.

While the allied arts program were cut back due to the budget acts, the children did receive art, music, physical education classes and media instruction. The state mandated special needs program, Chapter 766, continued to provide instructional support with the following personnel: guidance counselors, learning disability/reading specialists, school psychologist, speech therapist and occupational therapist. A significant portion of the special needs salaries were paid by grant money from the 94-142 and 89-313 grants. Title I services continued as a Title I Parent advisory council was formed under the direction of Beverly Gourley.

The Governor John Carver School is utilized by community groups virtually every day. Due to the insignificant impact that the after-hour use of the school provides, the Carver School Committee has made every effort to extend the usefulness of the school facilities so that the entire community benefits.

While 1981 was a difficult year in terms of maintaining programs and services, the Carver faculty remains committed to maintaining the highest quality instructional program. Despite the budget cutbacks, the Carver Schools will continue to exercise resourcefulness and vision in keeping up with the challenge of 1982.

# TOWN WARRANT AND REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

Plymouth, ss. To either of the Constables of the Town of Carver.

### GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs to meet at the Governor John Carver School House, in said Carver on Saturday, the tenth day of April, 1982, at 8:00 o'clock A.M., then and there to act on the following Article, namely:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers to be voted for all on one ballot, namely: One Moderator for a term of one (1) year; One Selectman, One Assessor, One Member of School Board, One Member of Regional District School Committee, One Member Board of Public Works, Two Library Trustees, One Member Board of Health, each for a term of three (3) years; One Member of Planning Board, One Member of Carver Housing Authority, each for a term of five (5) years; One Member of School Board (to fill vacancy) for a term of two (2) years; One Library Trustee (to fill vacancy) for a term of one (1) year; One Member of Carver Housing Authority (to fill vacancy) for a term of two (2) years; One Member of Board of Health (to fill vacancy) for a term of one (1) year; and to vote by ballot "Yes" or "No" on the following questions:

# **QUESTION NO. 1**

"Shall the acceptance by the Town of Carver of an act passed by the General Court in the year nineteen hundred and seventy-one, entitled "An Act authorizing the Town of Carver to establish a Department of Public Works exercising the powers of certain other departments and town officials" be revoked?"

# **QUESTION NO. 2**

"Shall the Town vote that no more than two coin-operated amusement devices per establishment be permitted in the Town of Carver in accordance with General Laws Chapter 140, Section 177 A?"

The polls will be open until 8:00 o'clock, P.M.

And you are further directed to notify said Inhabitants of said Town that as soon as the votes have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Monday, April 12, 1982, at 7:30 o'clock, P.M., and at that time will reconvene at said Governor John Carver School House, then and there to act on the following Articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1982, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 2. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from free cash in the treasury the sum of eight thousand (\$8,000.00) dollars to meet interest charges on temporary loans.
  - Article 3. Recommended by the Finance Committee.
- Article 4. To see what amount the Town will vote to transfer from free cash in the treasury and what amount the Town will, vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account to the 1983 fiscal year Reserve Account.
  - Article 4. Finance Committee recommends the sum of \$40,000.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the following By-Law establishing an Historic District (Lakenham), and an Historic District Commission, under the provisions of Chapter 40C of the General Laws of Massachusetts, as most recently amended by Chapter 168, Acts of 1975 which was voted as Article 7 by the Town at the Annual Town Meeting held April 14, 1980 and act anything thereon or thereto. (by request)
  - Article 5. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to amend the General By-Laws of the Town by adding a new section as follows or to take any other action with respect thereto.

# SAVERY HISTORIC DISTRICT BY-LAW

This By-Law shall be known and may be cited as the Savery Historic District's By-Law under the authority of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40C, as amended.

The purpose of this By-Law is to promote the educational, cultural, economic and general welfare of the public through the preservation and protection of the distinctive characteristics of buildings and places significant in the history of the Town of Carver or their architecture, and through the maintenance and improvement of settings for such buildings and places and the encouragement of design compatible therewith.

There is hereby established an Historic District to be known as the Savery Historic District under the provisions of the Historic District Act, General Laws, Chapter 40C bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point about 100 m south of the intersection of Main Street, (Main Street is also known as S. Main, Rochester Road, Plymouth Street and Route 58) and Meadow Street, the district heads in a southerly direction along Main Street until it reaches the intersection of Shaw Road and Main Street where the district terminates. The district encompasses the buildings and some portion of the land on both sides of the route just described.

The boundaries are hereby established as shown on the map entitled "Savery Historic District" dated February, 1981 which accompanies and is hereby declared to be a part of the By-Law.

# Administration of the Savery Historic District


No building or structure within the Historic District shall be constructed, demolished, moved or altered in any way that affects exterior architectural features and no building shall be moved into an Historic District unless the Carver Historic District Commission shall first have issued a certificate of appropriateness, a certificate of hard-

ship or a certificate of non-applicability with respect to such construction, alteration or movement. The building inspector shall not issue a permit within an Historic District unless one of the certificates noted above has first been issued by the District Commission.

The authority of the Commission shall be limited to exterior architectural features which are subject to view from Main Street (Route 58), Savery Avenue and the Union Cemetery.

(by Carver Historic District Commission)

Article 6. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.



Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Fifteen (\$715.00) Dollars to the Historical Commission for the purpose of producing a descriptive booklet of historical sites in the Town of Carver or take any action relative thereto. (by Historical Commission)

# Article 7. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the waste management agreement dated February 1, 1982, between the Carver, Marion, Wareham Regional Refuse Disposal District and SEMASS Partnership.

# Article 8. Finance Committee recommends no action until Town Meeting.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law by adopting the following section, or take any other action relative thereto:

# 13.0 Airport District

# 13.1 Purpose

The purpose of the Airport District is to encourage the most appropriate use and development of land within the Town of Carver in the vicinity of the Plymouth Municipal Airport, by providing for uses compatible with and of benefit to the Airport and to land areas in proximity to the airport; and to prevent the encroachment of noise sensitive and otherwise incompatible uses into present or future areas of potential aircraft noise disturbance.

# 13.2 District Delineation

The Airport District shall be defined as the area shown on the map described as follows:

"Zoning Map of the Town of Carver Airport District, adopted \_\_\_\_\_."
Such district shall be comprised of the land shown on the Assessors' Maps of the Town of Carver on Sheet No. 113 Lots 1, C, 5A, 6D, 7, 8, A
Sheet No. 114 Lots 2B, 1, 2C, A

Sheet No. 114 Lots 2B, 1, 2C, A Sheet No. 115 Lots 13A, 13B, A

# 13.3 Permitted Uses

- 1. Aviation-related uses and structures on property of the Plymouth Municipal Airport.
- 2. Agricultural uses excluding grain crops which are attractive to birds.

### 13.4 Uses by Special Permit

The Board of Appeals as special permit granting authority (SPGA) may authorize special permits for uses which tolerate a high level of sound exposure, including but not limited to:

- 1. Limited commercial uses of a type related to aviation or to other aviation or airport-oriented uses;
- 2. Light manufacturing, processing, and assembly in enclosed buildings;
- 3. Trucking and freight terminals or depots;
- 4. Wholesaling, warehousing and distribution facilities;
- 5. Office buildings, laboratories, research facilities, and other campus-

type office structures or groups of structures on adequately buffered sites; and

6. Uses of a character similar to any of the above which are not of a higher nuisance level.

### 13.5 Prohibited Uses

Residential uses are prohibited in the Airport District.

Obstructions to air navigation are prohibited.

No structure shall be erected or altered nor any tree permitted to grow which would create a hazard to air navigation. In determining whether such a hazard exists, the Inspector of Buildings or the Board of Zoning Appeals, as the case may be, may have reference, but not exclusively, to criteria used by the Plymouth Airport Commission and/or the Massachusetts Aeronautic Commission.

No use shall be permitted which creates electrical interference with radio aids or communications.

# 13.6 Conditions to Special Permits

# 13.6.1 General Requirements

As appropriate, uses under special permit shall conform to the applicable general regulations of this by-law and the specific requirements of Section 8.0.

# 13.6.2 Specific Requirements for the Airport District

- a. Permits for high structures may require the applicant, at its own expense, to install, operate and maintain such markers and lights as may be necessary to indicate to pilots the presence of any airport hazard.
- b. Adequate sound insulation shall be required of all buildings regularly occupied.
- c. The SPGA shall determine that the use will cause no hazard to air navigation, visibility or flight safety, or attract excessive numbers of birds.

### 13.6.3 Site Plan

The SPGA may require a site plan to be submitted in the quantities and in the form as set forth in the rules and regulations of the SPGA and as appropriate, shall supply the same information required for a site plan in Section 9.4 of this by-law.

### 13.7 Height Limitations

In order to prevent the erection of structures which, due to height, would create hazardous obstacles to air navigation in the vicinity of the Plymouth Municipal Airport, the applicable requirements of Chapter 90 of the General Laws of Massachusetts, and the standards of the Federal Aviation Regulations, shall be met. No structure shall be erected which exceeds the height limitations of the above regulations unless appropriate authority shall have been issued by the Plymouth Airport Commission and by the Massachusetts Aeronautics Commission or the Federal Aviation Agency.

# 13.8 Special Review by Other Agencies

The SPGA shall submit applications for special permits to the Plymouth Airport Commission for review and comment, and no special permit shall

be issued unless the SPGA has considered the report of the said commission or thirty-five days have elapsed since receipt of the application by the commission without report or recommendations.

# 13.9 Disclosure of Proximity to Airport

As a condition to the grant of a special permit, the SPGA shall require the applicant to notice and acknowledge that the use authorized may be exposed to airport related noise resulting directly or indirectly from the operations of the airport, now and in the future, including but not limited to ground and in-flight operations of aircraft at, over, or in the vicinity of the airport, and that such notice and acknowledgement shall extend to all lessees, heirs, administrators and assigns.

(by Planning Board)

Article 9. Finance Committee recommends no action until Town Meeting.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 3.1 of the zoning by-law by adding the following type of district, or take any other action relative thereto:

Section 12.0 Planned Tourist-Commercial District (PTC)

# 12.1 Purpose

The purpose of the Planned Tourist-Commercial (PTC) District is to encourage the most appropriate use and development of land in a designated area within the Town of Carver by providing for certain activities having a unique relationship and demonstrated value to the Town consistent to a district conceptual plan, to promote economic benefits for the residents of the Town, to preserve existing cranberry growing activities, and to protect existing tourist oriented land uses from the adverse effect of developments of conflicting natures.

## 12.2 District Delineation

The PTC district is defined as that land generally south and east of Meadow Street, west of Main Street and north of Indian Street as shown on a map entitled:

"Planned Tourist-Commercial District"
Town of Carver Zoning Map
date:

Said map is adopted as part of the zoning map of the Town of Carver.

### 12.3 Wetlands

Wetlands within the PTC district are shown on an overlay map entitled "Wetlands, Planned Tourist-Commercial" District, Town of Carver, dated \_\_\_\_\_\_, which map shall be part of the zoning by-law. Uses authorized in the underlying district as of right or by special permit shall be subject to the conditions determined by the Planning Board as the special permit granting authority to be necessary for compliance with Section 11.4 of this by-law.

# 12.4 District Conceptual Plan

The Planning Board (SPGA) shall adopt a conceptual plan for the development of the district area. Such plan, which may be reviewed and amended

from time to time as the Planning Board may deem advisable, shall show the locations of existing and proposed facilities including structures, public and private ways, railroad rights-of-way, water courses, canals, dams, dikes, cranberry bogs, sites for camping, playing fields, places of assembly, service areas, parking lots, motels, and accessory activities.

# 12.5 Permitted Uses in the PTC District:

- Cranberry growing and related activities including structures, canals, dams, dikes, ditches, roadways and reservoirs.
- Agriculture, horticulture and floriculture on parcels not less than five acres.

# 12.6 Site Plan

A site plan shall be required for all uses authorized by permit or by special permit in the PTC district.

For the purpose of this by-law, a site plan shall include the plot plan or site plan required from an applicant for a building permit, or such plan as is required by the rules and regulations adopted by the special permit granting authority (SPGA). As appropriate, such plans shall comply with the general requirements of Section 9.4 of this by-law and as applicable shall show the boundaries of the district, of the lots in question, names of abutting owners, natural and man-made features, including any wetlands and the boundaries of a wetlands district, means of access, including boat launching sites, authorized fishing and hunting areas, roadways, parking areas, buffer strips, landscaped areas and such other requirements as the SPGA shall adopt in its rules and regulations.

# 12.7 Uses by Special Permit

The special permit granting authority for uses authorized by special permit in the PTC district shall be the Planning Board.

No special permit shall be issued under this section except for a tract of land in single or consolidated ownership of not less than three acres.

No special permit may be issued except in compliance with the provisions of section eight (8) of this by-law, and without the following express findings by the SPGA:

- 1. The proposed activities are appropriate and consistent with the conceptual plan for the PTC district.
- 2. The site is appropriate for the uses and structures proposed.
- 3. Proposed water and sewerage facilities will be suitable to service the site without a detrimental effect upon any other area of the Town.
- 4. The use will not be detrimental to the established or future character of the neighborhood and the Town, and subject to appropriate conditions and safeguards if deemed necessary.
- 5. There are sufficient safeguards to prevent nuisance or serious hazard to vehicles and pedestrians.
- 6. Adequate and appropriate facilities will be provided to insure proper operation of the uses, structures or conditions to the special permit.

# **Special Permit Uses**

Camping Areas—Subject to approved site plan showing access roads, individual and group sites, sanitary facilities, the special permit shall state the

permitted capacity, and shall be subject to annual permits from state and local authorities as required by the General Laws.

**Demonstration tracts**—Cranberry culture, forestry, wildlife, exhibition sawmill and similar activities: May be on parcels of less than five acres.

Motels—Subject to approved site plan, limitations as to size, and to the requirements of the General Laws.

Museums, historical, cultural and scientific, and including commercial and industrial exhibits—Subject to approved site plan.

Places of assembly, including theatres, cinemas, convention or function halls—Subject to limitation on capacity and approved site plans.

Retail stores, service-related establishments, branch bank, gift shops, restaurants.

Recreational-Tourist Railroad and accessory uses, including secondary activities such as retail establishments selling convenience goods, and restaurants and cafeterias of limited capacities—As appropriate, subject to an approved site plan.

**Sports Facilities**, golf, tennis, riding, boating, fishing, field sports, swimming, skating, bicycling—Subject to limitations on capacity, sanitary facilities and approved site plans.

# 12.8 Signs

No signs within the PTC district shall be authorized except as conditions to special permitted activities, conforming, as appropriate, to the provisions of Section 6.4 of this by-law.

### 12.9 Prohibited Uses

Multi-family permanent dwellings, mobile homes, commercial shopping centers and industrial uses are prohibited in the PTC district.

## WASTE MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT

with

## CARVER-MARION-WAREHAM REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT

SEMASS is a privately funded waste to energy project proposed to be built in the Town of Rochester and in operation in 1984.

The Carver-Marion-Wareham Regional Refuse Disposal District has signed a contract with SEMASS to allow use of the District's landfill located on Federal Road in the Town of Carver.

Each of the Towns in the District is being asked to ratify the agreement at Town meeting, and the following information is provided so that the benefits to the District and its member Towns can be evaluated:

## WHAT THE DISTRICT GETS

- 1. A place to dispose of all residential and commercial solid waste from the Towns of Carver, Marion and Wareham for 27 years, without charge.
- 2. Payment of the entire cost of operating the District's landfill, which is currently about \$164,000 per year.
- 3. \$110,000 towards the purchase of a new bulldozer for its landfill (already deposited in escrow at the District's bank by SEMASS).
- 4. Payment of the District's outstanding bonds (up to \$325,000).
- 5. \$1 per ton for all materials SEMASS deposits in the District's landfill.
- 6. A small transfer station, at the landfill where residents can dump their wastes for transport to SEMASS, at no cost to the District.
- 7. Payment for cost of all capital improvements such as monitoring wells, liners and leachate control systems required for the landfilling of SEMASS wastes.

## WHAT SEMASS GETS

- 1. The right to deposit up to 400 tons per day of ash in the District's landfill (with the average expected to be about 283 tons per day).
- 2. The right to deposit unburned shredded refuse in the District's landfill (not more than 35,000 tons in the first year and not more than 20,000 tons in any subsequent year).
- 3. The right to deposit solid waste which cannot be shredded in the District's landfill (not more than 10,000 tons in the first year and not more than 5,000 tons in any subsequent year).

NOTE: SEMASS must pay the District \$1 per ton for all of the above deposits.

Under the agreement between the District and SEMASS, the District will retain control of the landfill and will continue to operate it. SEMASS has agreed to assume the cost of road maintenance on Tihonet Road, which will be the route of trucks from SEMASS to the landfill, through the Towns of Wareham and Carver.

SEMASS has committed in their Environmental Impact Report to upgrade the current landfill by immediately installing monitoring wells to determine any existing or potential future ground water contamination. They have also committed to pay for lin-

ing those portions of the landfill to be used for SEMASS wastes. In addition, a leachate collection and storage system will be installed, and a leachate treatment system will be provided based on the quantity and quality of leachate collected. No toxic or hazardous wastes as defined under the Federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976 will be accepted at SEMASS or deposited at the District landfill.

In summary, SEMASS will receive a good landfill to serve the waste to energy facility, and the District will save and earn in fees a total of more than \$10 million over the next 20 years and have an environmentally improved landfill.



## SEMASS

## **Municipal Finance Terminology**

The following terms are frequently used in the Annual Town Report and at Town Meetings. In order to provide everyone with a better understanding of the meaning, the following definitions are provided.

## SURPLUS REVENUE: (often referred to as "Excess and Deficiency")

This fund represents the amount by which the Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserve. This is a bookkeeping item.

## AVAILABLE FUND: (often referred to as "Free Cash")

Available Funds is the amount certified annually by the State Bureau of Accounts by deducting from surplus revenue all uncollected taxes for prior years. This fund may be used by a vote of the Town Meeting.

## OVERLAY:

The Overlay is the amount raised by the Assessors in excess of appropriations and other charges for the purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements granted and avoiding fractions.

## **OVERLAY RESERVE:**

This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific Overlay account for a given year, and may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes or voted into the Reserve Fund.

## RESERVE FUND:

This fund is established by the voters at an annual town meeting only and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) both.

## STABILIZATION FUND:

This is a fund created to provide a reserve for capital expenditure. Appropriations from the Stabilization Fund may be made at an Annual Town Meeting by a two-thirds vote for any purpose the town is authorized to borrow money for under Section 7 or 8 of Chapter 44 or for such other purpose as is approved by the Emergency Finance Board.

## **CHERRY SHEET:**

Named for the cherry colored paper on which the Massachusetts Commission of Corporations and Taxation traditionally has printed it, the cherry sheet carries the figures which must be used by the Assessors in determining the amount to be raised by taxation.

It lists the amounts of county tax and state assessments, as well as the estimated tax distributions from the General Fund, reimbursements, agency funds, and the Sales and Use Taxes.


