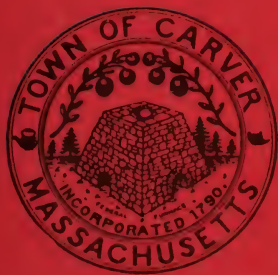

April 9, 1983

The Annual Town Election for the election of Town Officers was held at the Governor John Carver School on Saturday, April 9, 1983, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated March 2, 1983. The Warden declared the polls open at 8:00 A.M., and announced that the polls would close at 8:00 P.M. At the closing of the polls the Ballot Box registered a total of 1725 ballots cast, of which 48 were Absentee Ballots, and 1677 were cast by voters in person.

Special Town Meeting

April 11, 1983

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, April 11, 1983, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated March 2, 1983, and duly posted on March 10, 1983, as required by law.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M., by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott, there being a quorum present. The meeting then proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. Article duly moved and seconded. Thereupon, Mr. Clark A. Griffith moved that the words "snow plow" be deleted from the original motion; the motion to amend was duly VOTED. Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Eleven Thousand (\$11,000.00) Dollars and to trade a 1976 $\frac{3}{4}$ ton Chevrolet pick-up for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new one (1) ton pick-up with dump body for the Department of Public Works.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of line painting of town roads.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and after considerable discussion of the matter, it was VOTED to transfer the sum of Eleven Thousand Three Hundred Ninety-four Dollars and ninety-six cents (\$11,394.96) from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account to "lease-purchase," and to trade the 1973 John Deere loader on a lease/purchase agreement on a fully equipped new rubber tired "Front-End Loader" with 2-cubic yard bucket for the Department of Public Works.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing one photo-copier for the Town Clerk's Office, and one photo-copier for the Police Dept.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer the sum of Five Thousand One Hundred Forty Dollars (\$5,140.00) from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing a coin-operated Savina 870 + 1 copier for public use in the library.

Article 6. Motion duly made and seconded to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Four Thousand Seventy-seven (\$4,077.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a new radio base station for the Fire Department. Voice vote being had, it was SO VOTED.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing small equipment for the Fire Department.

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a radio console for the Fire-Police Dispatch Center.

Article 9. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer the sum of Eighteen Thousand (\$18,000.00) Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing or leasing and equipping two police cruisers (as needed). Said account to be under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded, voice vote being questioned, and standing vote being had, with 190 voting in the affirmative and 102 opposed, it was VOTED to transfer the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Fifty (\$1,650.00) Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing two (2) Radar Units for the Police Department.

Article 11. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Seventy-one Dollars and Fifteen cents (\$10,571.15) for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a 15 passenger mini-bus.

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars for the reproduction of Assessors property cards (field cards), said amount to be expended under the direction of the Board of Assessors.

Article 13. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Fifteen Thousand Four Hundred Fifteen (\$15,415.00) Dollars to the Schools and Vocational Education account for the purpose of meeting the salaries increase for the non-union employees.

Article 14. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Fifty-eight Thousand (\$58,000.00) Dollars to the Schools and Vocational Education Account for the purpose of meeting the salaries increase for teachers.

Article 15. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Forty-one Thousand Six Hundred Twenty-three (\$41,623.00) Dollars to the Schools and Vocational Education Account for the purpose of meeting the Special Needs tuition.

Article 16. Upon motion duly made (by Mr. Erwin K. Washburn) and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Eighteen Thousand Five Hundred Five (\$18,505.00) Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for the purpose of purchasing one new school bus for the School Department, said amount to be expended under the direction of the School Committee.

Article 17. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Twenty Thousand Three Hundred (\$20,300.00) Dollars to the Municipal Employees Insurance Account.

There being no other business to come before the meeting and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn at 9:35 P.M.

Annual Town Meeting

April 11, 1983

The Annual Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, April 11, 1983, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M., by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott, there being a quorum present.

The meeting then proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, as follows: (Article 1 having been disposed of at a prior meeting)

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money

from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1983, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from free cash in the treasury the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars to meet interest charges on temporary loans.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from free cash in the treasury the sum of Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars to the 1984 fiscal year Reserve Account.

Article 5. Upon motion duly moved and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to hear the report of any standing committees and to abolish any special committee not submitting a report unless otherwise voted, and to establish any new committee. Thereupon the following committee reports were heard:

1. Mr. Robert Wiltshire reported for the Carver Youth Needs Committee (Written report on file). It was unanimously VOTED to accept the report, and to continue the Committee.
2. Mr. Charles Erwin, of the School Committee, presented an oral report from the School Needs Study Committee. It was VOTED to accept the report, and to continue the Committee.
3. Mr. Erwin K. Washburn reported for the Local School Building Committee; it was unanimously VOTED to accept the report, and to continue the Committee.
4. Mr. Clark Griffith reported for the Town Barn Building Committee. It was VOTED to accept the report and continue Committee.
5. Mr. Frank R. Mazzilli made motion, duly seconded, "To appoint a five member committee to be called the Trustees for the Marcus Atwood House and Property, Two members to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, Two members to be appointed by the Council on Aging, One member to be appointed by the Moderator. Each appointment was for a one year term. The motion was VOTED unanimously.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars from available funds in the treasury to be expended by the Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service and choose a Director in accordance with the provisions of General Laws of Massachusetts, Chapter 128, Sections 41 and 42.

Thereupon, Jean O. Gibbs was duly nominated Director, and was unanimously elected.

Article 7. Article was duly moved and seconded. Motion duly made and seconded to amend original motion so that the amount of the Dog Fund not be deducted from Library Operating Expense Account, amendment VOTED unanimously. It was then unanimously VOTED that the County Dog Fund, in the amount of \$441.32 be applied to the Library Account.

At this time it was VOTED to recess for the Special Town Meeting scheduled to commence at 8:00 P.M. At the conclusion of the Special Town Meeting the Annual Town Meeting reconvened at 9:45 P.M., and proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to honor the memory of the late John F. Orzechowski by designating the North Carver

Fire Station as the "Johnny O" Fire Station.

Article 9. To see what action the Town will take with regard to fixing the salaries of Elected Town Officers in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended. Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to fix the salaries as follows:

Town Treasurer & Tax Collector	\$12,240.00 per annum
Town Clerk	4,320.39 per annum
Moderator, \$50.00 for the Annual Town Meeting and \$20.00 for each Special Town Meeting.	
Chairman, Board of Selectmen	\$1,800.00 per annum
Two Members, Board of Selectmen	\$1,550.00 per annum(ea.)
All other paid elected officers	\$3.00 per hour.

Article 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to postpone action on Article 10 until May 23, 1983.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from Revenue Sharing Fund sums of money as may be necessary to defray certain town charges from July 1, 1983 to June 30, 1984.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer from Revenue Sharing Funds the following sums of money:

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to transfer the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars from the Ambulance Fund Account to the Ambulance Operating Account, said sum to be under the control of the Board of Selectmen.

Article 13. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Five Hundred Eighty-four dollars and Thirty-three Cents (\$9,584.33) to pay the following unpaid bills of 1982:

Leyden Insurance Agency (Municipal Insurance Account)	\$ 8,133.00
Cooperative Production Collaborative (Schools & Vocational Education)	\$ 1,451.33

Article 14. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars from available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of meeting the charges against the Cemetery Fund in the Town Treasury.

Article 15. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to be used to pay for all private work and materials in Town cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 16. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Eleven Thousand Three Hundred Ninety-one (\$11,391.00) Dollars which may be used for State Aid Construction or Improvements under Chapter 191 (FY 1982) in conjunction with available State Funds of Thirty-four Thousand One Hundred Seventy-two (\$34,172.00) Dollars and, in addition, to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Thirty-four Thousand One hundred Seventy-two (\$34,172.00) Dollars to meet the State's share of cost of work reimbursement received therefrom to be returned to the Treasury.

Article 17. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to amend the Town of Carver By-Laws as follows:

Article VIII Section 1

Amend Article VII Section 1 by striking out the first sentence and inserting in place thereof "There shall be a Finance Committee of eleven (11) members."

Article 18. Mr. Timothy McGillicuddy, Chairman of the Planning Board, gave the report of the Planning Board Hearing, as required by law, said report being on file in the Town Clerk's Office, the Article being first duly moved and seconded. Thereupon, after considerable discussion, standing vote being had, with 97 voting in the affirmative and 29 opposed, it was VOTED to amend the zoning by-law by adopting the following section: "*Section 6.4.3. Signs by Special Permit by the Board of Appeals*": add the following paragraph:

d. Display of a sign, lighted or unlighted, not exceeding twelve square feet in area on each side and not over eight feet in height, advertising products or services not located on or not pertaining to the use of the premises on which the sign is located.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 10 of the Town's General By-Laws, or take any other action thereto, by deleting all wording after "for a period of more than," and adding "30 days."

A junk vehicle shall be defined as any unregistered vehicle in excess of one, unless said vehicle is solely for agricultural or lumbering use, or vehicle used for recreation or camping purposes, such as campers, trailers and ski-mobiles. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to postpone action on Article 19 until the upcoming adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting.

Article 20. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to amend Section 6.4.2 of the Zoning By-Laws by adding: "e. Political signs, no sooner than 30 days prior to an election and to be removed no later than 7 days after an election."

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to add the following to its General By-Laws or to take any other action thereto:

"Any candidate wishing to place political signs within Carver's Town Boundaries shall pay a refundable deposit of \$25.00 to the Building Inspector prior to the placement of such signs. The deposit shall be returned upon the candidate removing his/her signs in compliance with the time period specified in Section 6.4.2 part e. of the Carver Zoning By-Laws." Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to postpone action on Article 21 until May 23, 1983.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 84, Section 11 of the Massachusetts General Laws to have "No Parking" allowed on the following streets.

Annual Town Meeting

Adjourned Session—May 23, 1983

The Adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting was called to order at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, May 23, 1983, at 7:30 P.M., by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott. There not being a quorum present at that time, the Moderator declared a recess until such time as a quorum appeared. At 7:40 P.M., the Moderator declared that a quorum was present, and the meeting was then called to order. The meeting proceeded to act on the remaining Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 10. To raise and appropriate sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges from July 1, 1983 to June 30, 1984.

Thereupon, Alan I. Dunham, Town Accountant, moved that due to the fact that the Town had not yet received the "Cherry Sheet" for FY 1984 that action on Article 10 to be postponed until Monday, June 13, 1983, at 7:30 P.M. The motion was duly seconded and it was unanimously SO VOTED.

Article 19. Upon motion by Selectman Daniel Daly, duly seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to amend Article 10 of the Town's General By-Laws so as to read as follows:

“No person shall permit a junk vehicle, or any major part thereof, to stand in the open on premises within the town which are not licensed under Chapter 140, Section 57 for a period of more than 30 days.

For the purposes of enforcing this By-Law, a junk vehicle shall be defined as:

A. any vehicle, or major part thereof, which is inoperable or unfit for vehicular use.

B. or any unregistered vehicle in excess of one.

Section “B” of the definition of junk vehicle shall not be used to prohibit the storage of recreational vehicles such as campers, trailers, ski mobiles, nor shall it be applied to any other operable vehicle that's legal use does not require registration:

Enforcement of this By-Law shall be by the Selectmen or their appointed representative.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to add the following to its General By-Laws or take any other action thereto:

“Any candidate wishing to place political signs within Carver's Town Boundaries, shall pay a refundable deposit of \$25.00 to the Building Inspector prior to the placement of such signs.

The deposit shall be returned upon the candidate removing his/her signs in compliance with the time period specified in Section 6.4.2 part e of the Carver Zoning By-Laws.” The Article was duly moved and seconded.

Thereupon, amendments being duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to add the following to the General By-Laws of the Town of Carver:

Any candidate wishing to place a political sign within Carver's Town Boundaries shall pay a refundable \$25.00 deposit to the Building Inspector prior to the placement of such signs.

No signs shall be placed sooner than 30 days prior to an election and shall be removed no later than 7 days after an election, except where a primary election and general election fall within 60 days of one another. In such a case the 30 days prior to an election shall apply to the primary election and the 7 days after an election shall apply to the general election.

The deposit shall be returned to the candidate upon his/her removing their signs in compliance with the provisions of this By-Law. Enforcement shall be by the Building Inspector.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 85, Section 11 of the Massachusetts General laws to have “No Parking” allowed on the following streets:

Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to take no ac-

tion on Article 23. Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn to Monday, June 13, 1983, at 7:30 P.M. The meeting was adjourned, at 7:53 P.M.

Special Town Meeting

May 23, 1983

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, May 23, 1983, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated May 3, 1983. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M., by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott, there being a quorum present. The meeting then proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to accept the provisions of Chapter 40, Section 22D, of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts (towing away of vehicles illegally parked or standing on public ways).

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 85, Section 11, of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts (fast driving-arrest without warrant) or take any other action relative thereto.

Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to take no action on Article 2.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to authorize the Board of Selectmen to seek Federal and State Grants on behalf of the Town as they become available.

Article 4. Article was duly moved and seconded. After some discussion, Selectman Daniel B. Daly moved that the words "including the purchasing of equipment and salaries of employees" be deleted from the original motion. Motion was duly seconded and it was SO VOTED.

Thereupon, on motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to accept, in accordance with the Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 53 D Legislation as follows:

"An act authorizing the Town of Carver to establish in the Town Treasury a Revolving Fund to be used by the Recreation Committee for the purpose of raising and appropriating funds up to the limits allowed under Chapter 44, Section 53D.

The Revolving Fund shall be kept separate from any other monies or funds of the Town, and shall be used solely for the maintenance and support of recreation, playground and park facilities and services of the Town. Expenditures of money from the Revolving Fund may be made by the Town Treasurer without further appropriation. The Town Accountant shall submit, annually, a report of the Revolving Fund to the Selectmen, the Recreation Committee and the Finance Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 5. It was duly moved and seconded to amend the Zoning By-Law by eliminating the first paragraph of Section 6.3.8 and by adding the following in its place:

6.3.8 Buffer Strips

In Business-Commercial Districts a buffer strip of at least fifty feet must be provided, other than along a street, where these districts abut

Residential-Agricultural or Wetlands Districts. Similarly when a business development is adjacent to an existing residential property in a Business-Commercial District or Residential-Agricultural District the business must provide a buffer strip of at least fifty feet along the bounds of the residential property. Such buffer strips shall be landscaped and planted with grass, shrubs, trees or other plants which will in time provide a visual screen of at least 7 feet high. The buffer strip may contain fences, ornamental and acoustic walls, and walks, but no part of any building or structure, such as a paved area, roadway or driveway may be located within a buffer strip. The buffer strip may not be used for display, storage of materials or parking.

The Planning Board then presented their written Report of the required public hearing which was held on Thursday, May 19, 1983, said report being on file in the Town Clerk's office.

Considerable discussion followed, and upon a motion duly made and seconded to "cut off debate," standing vote being had, with 104 voting in the affirmative and 5 opposed, it was SO VOTED. Thereupon, voice vote being had on the original motion, the Moderator declared the motion DEFEATED.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a 15 passenger mini-bus for the Carver Nutrition Center and to trade in the 1974 mini-bus.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Twenty-eight Thousand One Hundred Fifty-six (\$28,156.00) Dollars to the Schools and Vocational Education Account for the purpose of meeting the salaries increase for teachers.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to adjourn. Meeting adjourned at 8:45 P.M.

Special Town Meeting

June 1, 1983

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Wednesday, June 1, 1983, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated May 17, 1983. The meeting was called to order at 7:45 P.M. by the Moderator, there being a quorum present. The meeting then proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Erwin K. Washburn, Chairman of the School Board, moved that the meeting take up Article 2, "out of order." The motion was duly seconded, and it was unanimously SO VOTED.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to hear the report of the School Needs Study Committee. Thereupon, Charles Erwin, Chairman of the School Needs Study Committee presented an oral report for the Committee, explaining the need for a new school building, etc., and invited questions from the voters regarding any matters contained in the Warrant concerning schools; there being no further questions, the meeting proceeded to act on Article 1 as set forth in the Warrant.

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept an amendment to the Agreement pursuant to which the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District was established, as initiated and proposed by vote of the Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee adopted on May 10, 1983 and entitled "Amendment No V to the Agreement Establishing the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District providing for the Dissolution of said District" the text which is on file in the Town Clerk's office.

Thereupon, standing vote being had, with 372 voting in the affirmative and 15 opposed, upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly seconded, it was VOTED "to accept Article 1 as prescribed by Statute."

Article 3. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly seconded, standing vote being had, with 332 voting in the affirmative and 14 opposed, it was VOTED: That the sum of \$11,000,000. is hereby appropriated for the purpose of constructing, originally equipping and furnishing a new secondary school for pupils in grades 7 through 12 to be located on all or a portion of the so-called Pond Street site described in the vote adopted under Article 11 at the Special Town Meeting held on May 19, 1975, such project being the municipal purpose for which such property shall be acquired, that to raise the foregoing appropriation, the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen is hereby authorized to borrow the sum of \$11,000,000 under and pursuant to Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948 as amended and supplemented, or any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded, voice vote being had, it was VOTED: That the Town Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to set aside and maintain in a separate account in the general fund all sums received as income from the investment of the proceeds of bonds or notes issued pursuant to the vote adopted under the preceding article in this warrant for possible use to pay principal and interest on such bonds or notes, for constructing a vehicle maintenance building or for constructing improvements to Pond Street, such sums to be reserved for appropriation by the Town at a future annual or special town meeting.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Secondary School Building Committee to consist of the School Committee and four members appointed by the Moderator. Article was duly moved and seconded. Thereupon, motion to amend being duly moved and seconded, and amendment being Voted, it was Voted to establish a secondary school building committee to consist of the School Committee and two members appointed by the Board of Selectmen and one member appointed by the Moderator and one member appointed by the Finance Committee.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to transfer the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) dollars from available funds in the treasury to the secondary School Building Committee.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, standing vote being had, with 412 voting in the affirmative and 6 opposed, it was VOTED: That the sum of \$650,000. is hereby appropriated for the purpose of constructing, originally equipping and furnishing an addition to and the remodeling of the Governor John Carver Elementary School and that to raise the foregoing appropriation, the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen is hereby authorized to borrow the sum of \$650,000. under and pursuant to Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948 as amended and supplemented, or any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor.

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED: That the Town Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to set aside and maintain in a separate account in the general fund all sums received as income from the investment of the proceeds of the bond or notes issued pursuant to the vote under the preceding article in this

warrant for possible use to pay additional project costs or to pay principal and interest on such bonds or notes, such sums to be reserved for appropriation by the Town at a future annual or special town meeting.

Article 9. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED: "That authorization be given to the Local School Building Committee for the use of the balance in the School Building Construction Account for the purpose of preparing architectural and engineering plans and other preliminary expenses for the construction of an addition to the Governor John Carver School and to any extent of any remaining balance for the construction of such addition. Said balance being \$30,508.83.

Article 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to accept Chapter 597 of the Acts of 1982 amended General Laws, Chapter 60A, Section 1, which will provide an exemption from the Motor Vehicle Excise for any motor vehicle owned by a former prisoner of war, which term is defined as any regularly appointed, enrolled, enlisted, or inducted member of the United States military forces who was captured, separated and incarcerated by an enemy of the United States during an armed conflict.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to strike out Article VIII, Section 2 of the Town of Carver By-Laws and insert in place thereof the following new section.

"Section 2.

The Council on Aging shall consist of nine (9) members. The Board of Selectmen shall annually appoint three (3) members for a three-year term, except that initially the present members of the seven (7) member Board shall continue to serve their respective terms and the Board of Selectmen shall appoint one (1) new member for a term of one year, one (1) new member for a term of two years, and thereafter shall annually appoint three (3) members for a term of three years in order to maintain a Council of nine members. The members of the Council shall serve without pay."

Article 11 was duly moved and seconded, and after some discussion, voice vote being had, the motion was DEFEATED.

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty-seven Dollars and seventy cents (\$757.70) from the State Aid to Free Public Libraries Account to the Library Operational Account for the purpose of making major repairs to the Library lighting system.

Article 13. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars from the Ambulance Fund Account to the Ambulance Operating Account, said sum to be under the control of the Board of Selectmen.

Article 14. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars to the Street Lighting Account.

Article 15. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the amount of One Thousand Nine Hundred (\$1,900.00) Dollars to the Elections, Registrations, and Street Listing Account.

Article 16. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars to the Veterans' Benefits Account.

Article 17. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars to the Health-Physical Therapy Account.

Article 18. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to

transfer from the Police Salary Account to the Police Operating Account-Service the sum of (\$1,500.00), One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars.

Article 19. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from Police Salary Account to the Police Overtime Account the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars.

Article 20. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Police Salary Account to the Police Operating Expenses-Equipment and Supplies Account the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars.

Article 21. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Police Salary Account to the Police Court Account the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

Special Town Meeting

November 14, 1983

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, November 14, 1983.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by the Moderator, Robert O. Mott. There not being a quorum present at that time, the Moderator called a recess for a few minutes to await the appearance of a quorum. At 7:35 P.M. the Moderator declared a quorum present. After the Pledge of Allegiance, the meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant, as follows:

Article 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Board of Assessors to enter into a contract for revaluation for Fiscal 1985, maintenance for Fiscal 1986 and 1987, and recertification for Fiscal 1988, of the Town of Carver, for the sum of \$110,000.00, and to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of Thirty-Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Twelve Dollars and fifty cents (\$37,812.50) to cover the cost of the first year of said program.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to

transfer the unexpended balance of Three Thousand Four Hundred Seventy-two Dollars and twenty-nine cents (\$3,472.29) remaining in the Revenue Sharing Account known as "Purchase of Forest Fire Cab and Chassis Account" (used for building and equipping a Forest Fire Truck) to the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account," Small Equipment for Fire Department."

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Five Hundred Seventy-eight (\$578.00) Dollars from the State Aid to Libraries Account to the Library-Operating Expense Account for the purpose of replacing a fire door.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars from the State Aid to Libraries Account to the Library—Operating Expense Account for the purpose of capital improvements.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of \$8,528.79 from Police Off Duty Work Detail Account to a new reserved for appropriation account to be called "Police Off Duty Work Detail Service Charge Account" and to transfer from this account the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars to the Police Operating Expense Account.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred (\$2,800.00) Dollars from the Police Salaries Account to the Police Overtime Account to help defray the cost of covering Full-time Officers on leave etc.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to amend the vote taken at the Annual Town Meeting, adjourned session June 20, 1983, under Article 10, Summary Sheet A, line 25, Regional Vocational Assessment, \$252,362.00, and to instead raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety-seven Thousand, Eighty-three Dollars and Fourteen cents (\$197,083.14) for the same Regional Vocational Assessment.

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Forty-two Thousand Eight Hundred Sixteen Dollars and Fifty-eight cents (\$242,816.58), in addition to the amounts originally voted under Article 10 of the 1983 Annual Town Meeting, as follows:

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Personnel Administration Plan for all non-union employees of the Town of Carver, with the exception of elected officials and those employees under the jurisdiction of the School Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.

The Article was duly moved and seconded. The full text of the Plan, as moved and seconded, consists of several pages and is in the Town Clerk's files, and is incorporated herein by reference.

Thereupon, after considerable discussion, the following Amendments to the Plan were duly moved and seconded, and SO VOTED:

1. Addition to Section I. VOTED: "Members of the Call Fire Department and seasonal employees shall be exempt from this Plan."

2. Section IV-C, second paragraph: VOTED: "In addition, when an employee works a Saturday or Sunday that is not a regularly scheduled work day, the compensation shall be time and one-half."

3. Section IV-C, paragraph #2.

VOTED: Amend to read "all compensatory time must be taken in accordance with State Law."

4. Section V, Part B, sentence #1. VOTED to substitute the word "during" for "after" in Section V Part B, sentence #1."

Section V-C VOTED: to add "Head Librarian 35 hours weekly."

Section V-E-1. VOTED: "Full time employees shall be evaluated on a quarterly basis for their first year of employment, thereafter on an annual basis. Part-time employees shall be evaluated on an annual basis."

Section VI-D

VOTED: "Employees shall be allowed to use four (4) sick days per year for family illness."

At this time, upon motion duly made and seconded, standing vote being had, with 51 voting in the affirmative with 22 opposed, it was VOTED to "cut off debate."

Thereupon, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to adopt the proposed Personnel Administration Plan, as amended.

Motion duly made and seconded that the Personnel Administration Plan be made effective as of July 1, 1984. Standing vote being had, 42 voting in the affirmative and 45 opposed, the motion was defeated.

Motion duly made and seconded that the Plan be effective as of January 1, 1984. Voice vote being had, it was SO VOTED.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Fifty-four Thousand, Nine Hundred and Thirty-six Dollars and ninety-four cents (\$154,936.94) to provide adjustments in salaries and wages, in addition to the amounts originally voted under Article 10 of the 1983 Annual Town Meeting, said salary and adjustments to be retroactive to July 1, 1983, etc.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, and after considerable discussion, it was unanimously VOTED to take no action on Article 10.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept an amendment to the Agreement pursuant to which the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District was established, as initiated and proposed by vote of the Plymouth-Carver Regional District School Committee adopted on August 30, 1983 and entitled "Amendment No. V to the Agreement Establishing the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District providing for the Dissolution of said District."

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to take no action on Article 11.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District Committee to draw up an amendment to the Regional agreement setting forth terms of withdrawal for the Town of Carver.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to take no action on Article 12.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, and upon motion duly

made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to adjourn.

Office of Emergency Preparedness

The Basic Emergency Operations Plan and the Emergency Response Plan for Pilgrim I were revised to provide for the current needs of the Town of Carver.

A close working relationship has been maintained with the Massachusetts Civil Defense Agency, Area II. They have assisted the Carver office with advice, training, and much needed materials, such as booklets, maps, signs, training aids, etc.

The alerting sirens for the 10 mile EPZ for the emergency response plan for Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station have been checked and maintained.

The required Federal Emergency Management Agency Test for the Pilgrim I ERP was held on June 29, 1983, and very successfully passed by the Town of Carver.

The Carver OEP held a Radiological Training Session and both members of Civil Defense and the Carver Fire Department were trained by MCDA in Radiological Emergency procedures.

The Town's Radiological Response Monitoring Kits (2) were replaced with new instruments and 12 new and additional kits were obtained from MCDA for Civil Defense and the Fire Department.

Eleven MCDA, Area II meetings were attended, twelve local meetings were held. Two State-level training sessions were attended by the director.

Two new members joined the Civil Defense staff this year.

Additional radio communications equipment was purchased for Civil Defense through Boston Edison in fulfillment of the Carver Emergency Response Plan for Pilgrim I.

A tour of the Pilgrim I plant for Town officials was held on September 9, 1983, through arrangement with Boston Edison.

The members of the Auxiliary Police/Civil Defense staff attended the MCJTC Police Officers Training Course held at the Plymouth County Sheriff's Department.

The Civil Defense car was wired with lights and siren, and new decals applied by a member of the CD staff.

Hurricane and winter storm warning fliers were distributed in the Town buildings.

The Civil Defense staff participated in the emergency medical services drill held this Fall in Carver.

The Auxiliary Police staff continued their church traffic duty on Sundays and Town patrols on Friday nights.

Civil Defense is a function not only of your local government but the Federal and State governments as well. All three units of government work together to insure the safety of citizens and to mitigate the damage caused to communities by natural and national disasters.

The Carver Office of Emergency Preparedness would like to thank all the volunteers who have participated and continue to participate in Civil Defense. The staff would also like thank the residents of Carver for their efforts and cooperation.

Director's Report

Many services are provided to people in the Town of Carver, who are 59 years of age or older or handicapped, by the Carver Council on Aging. A list of these services, I.D. cards for discounts, a list of local and surrounding area stores who give discounts to elderly citizens, and names placed on the mailing list may be obtained at the Marcus Atwood Multi-purpose Center in South Carver, open daily Monday through Friday from 9:00 A.M.—4:30 P.M. for information and referral.

During the past year the Service Director for the Carver Council on Aging has coordinated all mini-bus reservations, mall trips, shopping trips, restaurant lunches, medicals, mini-bus drivers, newsletters, business calls and information and referrals calls. The Director also assisted many people, of all ages, in making out Fuel Assistance applications and distributed cheese and butter to all who qualified.

The Director attended numerous meetings, such as: meetings pertaining to ways to help the elderly with Medicare and Medicaid problems, Social Security and Supplementary Security Income (SSI) benefits, Fuel Assistance, and other energy related problems, etc. Many other meetings were attended, mainly: Carver Housing Authority, Senior Aide, CIRCA, Area Association of Plymouth County Directors, Old Colony Planning Council and Old Colony Elderly Services. Various Staff Meetings were also attended by the Director.

The Drop-in Center at the Marcus Atwood Multi-purpose Center is open daily from 12 Noon—4:30 P.M. Many activities are enjoyed at the Center and all seniors and handicapped are invited to attend.

Newsletters are mailed out bi-monthly keeping the elderly informed on legislation for the elderly, legal information, new developments in Social Security, tax information, and a two month calendar of activities and services. Over the past year our mailing has increased from 4,534 to 5,511.

There are two Senior Aides, whose salaries are paid by the Department of Labor, that work at the Carver Council on Aging. Each Aide works twenty hours per week assisting at the Drop-in Center, visiting the sick in hospitals and nursing homes and the homebound, and calling on new residents to acquaint them with the services and ac-

tivities of the Council. They also handle business affairs in the absence of the Director.

For the past year, the "Meals on Wheels" program has been in effect. These meals are provided by the Old Colony Elderly Services through a caterer and are delivered to the eligible clients in Carver by volunteers at the Marcus Atwood Center.

As of October, 1983, hot meals have been served twice a week—Tuesday and Thursday—at the Nutrition Center adjacent to the Multi-purpose Center. The cost of these meals is \$1.00 and all residents of Carver who are 59 or over, or handicapped, are welcome to participate.

The Carver Council on Aging continues to thank the Honorable Board of Selectmen, the Town Boards, and the Townspeople for their continuing outstanding support of their programs.

During the past year, this office has continued to serve the needs of your police department in the preparation, trial and disposition of criminal charges before the Wareham District Court. The County Cooperative Extension Service is located on High Street, Hanson, and can be reached by calling 293-3541, 447-5946 or 746-0053.

STAFF:

The staff is comprised of a director, two regional agricultural specialists, a community development specialist, two home economists, three 4-H agents, one part-time 4-H and Home Horticultural agent and four clerical staff.

In addition to our county staff, a nutritional educational program for limited-income families in Plymouth County, EFNEP, is staffed by one nutritionist and nine nutrition assistants; it is located at 32 Belmont Street, Brockton. This program is funded by Federal Nutrition Funds, through the University of Massachusetts, our Land-Grant College.

In Carver, there were 300 4-H'ers enrolled last year. In addition, the 4-H fair is held in Carver each year, giving high visibility to the total extension program in that area. Each department, 4-H, agriculture, home economics, community resource development and the expanded food and nutrition education program (EFNEP) maintain mailing lists for free monthly newsletters. This past year we introduced a new one "Garden Clippings" especially designed for the backyard gardener. Many Carver residents receive these, free on request.

Throughout the year, Extension professionals answer numerous phone inquiries in any of the above subject areas; other services we provide include free testing of soil pH and pressure gauge accuracy for home canners.

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 1983.

The Project is a special district, created by the State Legislature in 1957, that is now composed of 20 Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the Town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. Approximately 350,000 people are served at an annual per capita cost of \$1.05.

1983 was a difficult year for mosquito control operators in southeastern Massachusetts. A warm winter and heavy rains resulted in heavy mosquito breeding, especially of the species responsible for transmitting Eastern Equine Encephalitis. During August, crews were operating nearly 24 hours per day, 7 days per week, to lower the potential for transmission of this deadly and unpredictable disease. The Project expects to receive approximately \$20,000 from the Governor's Emergency Fund to help offset the costs incurred during the outbreak. It is quite likely however, that more Encephalitis activity will occur in 1984.

In order to prioritize a massive number of possible mosquito control activities and thereby make efficient use of a very limited budget, a system has been developed to monitor adult and larval mosquito populations across our 603 square miles. Voluminous amounts of data are being collected from 1500 to 2000 breeding areas thus far located, catalogued, and visited periodically during the warm season. With the aid of a newly acquired computer system, we can utilize the data to more readily isolate areas where various control methods will result in the greatest relief from mosquitoes with minimum hazard or environmental impact.

During 1983, the Project's accomplishments were greater than any other previous year despite per capita expenditures that have not been increased in nearly eight years. Previous annual reports have listed various data representing the magnitude of accomplishments in various activity categories on a sum-total basis. This year for the first time, again with the aid of a computer, the figures specific to the town of Carver are given below. Though mosquitoes ignore political boundaries, these figures may provide a better picture of the cost effectiveness of our program.

1. Insecticide Application. In the Town of Carver, 19,142 acres were treated by truck mounted sprayers for the control of adult mosquitoes. Many visits over the course of 15 weeks were required to accomplish this. As we have completely converted to the use of silent electric sprayers used at night, many residents expressed dismay believing that we were no longer spraying at all.

Our greatest increase in effort has occurred in the control of mosquito larvae in pools, swamps, marshes and other standing water areas that have been located and catalogued. Inspectors periodically collecting data at these sites will treat with relatively non-toxic larvacides (usually mineral oil) if substantial numbers of larvae are found. In Carver, a sum-total of 447 visits were made to 55 potential breeding sites. Some of these were at the request of Carver homeowners with standing water on their properties. In addition, 240 acres of marshes or swamps that were too large to treat by a man on foot were treated by our aircraft. We intend to increase our use of the aircraft, however this will normally be limited to remote breeding sites. Residential areas may be sprayed only

during the course of a public health emergency.

Finally, a total of 600 treatments were made to storm sewer catch basins to prevent breeding.

2. Water Management. During 1983, crews removed blockages, brush and obstructions from 4,290 linear feet of ditches and streams to prevent overflows or stagnation that can result in mosquito breeding. This type of work is steadily increasing, though reclamation by machine has been temporarily decreased.

We encourage citizens or municipal officials to call our office for information about mosquitoes, mosquito-borne diseases, sources of breeding, or other matters of concern. Controlling mosquitoes and the diseases they carry is a difficult and ongoing job that benefits from the input of those affected.

Public Health Nurse Committee

ANNUAL REPORT & AGENCY EVALUATION 1983 (FY 82-83)

The year 1983 was an exceptionally exciting and chaotic one for the Carver Public Health Nurses. We saw marked increases for nursing services, as well as home therapies and home health aides. As hospitals continue to be under pressure to discharge patients earlier and as patients' needs become more complicated and technical, the need for quality home health care to the residents of Carver is even more crucial. The full range of home health services: skilled nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, medical social work and home health aide are available through our town agency.

Our staff work extremely hard to provide high quality home health care 7 days per week, 365 days per year. The staff consists of Sharon Lamond, R.N.; Mary Boudreault, R.N.; Karen Barnes, R.N.; Beverly Chinetti, Secretary; and Eleanor Maini, Senior Aide from Old Colony Elderly Services with a field placement at our agency. As our caseload continues to grow we will need to hire a third part-time nurse and increase our allotted clerical time. Hopefully, this will be achieved in 1984.

Our Professional Advisory Committee continues to give us support and encouragement. New members this year are Betsy Mullins, Speech Therapist and Christine Colangelo, Occupational Therapist.

The Policy Review and Evaluation Committee has met during the year to review all existing agency policies and revise those that need change. A new immunization policy was written to provide catch-up immunizations to students at the Gov. John Carver Elementary School who needed further immunizations to comply with State Dept. of Public Health Regulations.

Dr. Phyllis Hollenbeck, our Medical Advisor, reviewed Standing Orders and Medical Policies; Death in the Home Policy; Acceptance, Denial and Termination Policies; and the Standards of Care. All policies were approved.

The Budget Committee met many times during the year due to the marked increase in patient load. The Committee worked very hard and their help has been greatly appreciated. The continued support and understanding of the Finance Committee and Selectmen has helped us through this difficult and demanding year.

A small group from the Professional Advisory Committee has been working hard to make the "Friends of the Carver Public Health Nurses" a reality. The efforts of George Harriman, Kathy Murray and Charlotte Keating have brought us to a point of impending incorporation of this group. The "Friends" would be a volunteer, non-profit organization that would support the activities of the nursing agency. The group would assist at all clinics, help with publicity, develop a volunteer driver pool, develop a list of friendly visitors and do fund raising. Any interested Carver residents are welcome to become a part of our "Friends" group.

Various agency staff members were involved in a number of health promotion programs during the year. These included "Healthworks" Fair at Memorial Hall in Plymouth; Bowel and Colon-rectal Cancer screening in conjunction with the American Cancer Society; Pesticide and Health Monitoring Program for area cranberry growers.

Through the efforts of PAC member George Harriman, we have been able to add the services of Mrs. Eleanor Maini to our agency. Mrs. Maini is a Senior Aide with Old Colony Elderly Services with her field placement here at the CPHNC. Mrs. Maini works 20 hours per week doing friendly visits, errands for patients, and helping with our overall office functioning. Her salary is paid through a OCES grant.

The two hospice programs serving Carver have been operational for over a year now and have provided a multitude of services to our terminally ill patients. Both the Cranberry Area Hospice, based in Plymouth, and the Wareham Area Hospice contract with the CPHNC to provide the home health care component to their patients.

With increasing growth of our community and the complexity of our health care system, the years ahead will certainly prove to be as exciting and challenging as 1983 has been for the CPHNC. Our entire staff will continue to be available and accessible to all Carver residents to meet their home health care needs.

The 1983 school year in the Carver Schools showed a decrease in the rate of student growth. While 1983 started with 1158 students in grades Kindergarten through grade six, the year ended with 1161 students. This change represents a modest .2% enrollment increase. Nevertheless, 1983 also brought with it double sessions of grades 7 and 8. Regional school space problems necessitated keeping Carver grades 7 and 8 students in Town and on double sessions until a new pod addition to the Governor John Carver School is completed. The School Building Assistance Bureau and the State Department of Education approved a school construction grant of \$970,687 for the much needed eight-room pod addition. Until the project is completed, however, the 157 grade 8 students and 187 grade 7 students will remain on double sessions. The project is scheduled for completion in August, 1984.

Mr. Andrew Eames, longtime custodian for the school department retired after 17 years of loyal service to the Town.

Two additional teachers were approved for a job-sharing assignment. There are currently 4 teachers serving two classrooms on a job-sharing schedule. The School Committee appointed Dennis Green and Peg Lamprey to the Town's Recreation Committee. Pam Santino was elected to the School Committee seat vacated by Terry Katz. Erwin K. Washburn was elected to the position of School Committee Chairman for the 30th year. He has served on the School Committee for 32 consecutive years. The School Committee voted to adopt new curriculums in the areas of Language, Science and Music. New textbooks have been purchased to support the Language and Science programs. The staff is currently generating a new Math curriculum and the committee has already approved the funds to purchase new Math textbooks to support the program. The School Building Committee secured an out-of-court settlement for a new resurfaced gymnasium floor. The Committee also initiated compliance with all State and Federal regulations regarding asbestos abatement in the schools.

The Lionesses sponsored a voluntary fingerprinting program for the children at the school as well as a Drug Information Program through the Chemical People. The P.T.O. continued to support the children and staff at the school through a wide variety of fund raising activities. The Fireman's Auxiliary sponsored another fine Fire Prevention Program at the school.

Carver continued to take advantage of grant opportunities. A Chapter I Grant of \$49,249 was awarded to the school to provide remediation in the areas of math and reading for approximately 100 students in grades 1 through 6. A Chapter 2, E.C.I.A.

Block Grant Award of \$9,233 was secured to develop a new Math curriculum and to hire a part-time guidance counselor. Three Special Needs grants were awarded to help defray the extraordinary costs of the Special Needs Programs, Chapter 766, in the school. Two (2) grants, P.L. 94-142 (\$27,300) and P.L. 89-313 (\$9,750) again provided several special needs staff positions at substantial financial savings to the Town. An Incentive Grant of \$8,800 paid for one (1) outside special needs tuition placement. One hundred and seventy-three (173) special needs students were serviced within the Carver School setting, while thirty (30) outside day and residential placements were provided as required by law.

Minimum Competency tests were provided for students in grades 3 and 6. Listening skills were mandated this year to be added to the basic skills of writing, math, and reading. A complete score of 91% reflects the percentage of grade 3 students who passed the minimum competency skills, while 87% of the grade 6 students achieved the minimum competency standards.

Santa Claus again visited the school via helicopter; he also managed to visit the Kindergarten children at the Benjamin Ellis School. This year, Bill Donaldson, recently retired police officer and substitute school bus driver, assisted Santa's annual visit to the school. For the fourth consecutive year, the fourth grade children attended Nature's Classroom in Swanzey, New Hampshire. In addition, grade 6 journeyed to Thompson's Island in Boston Harbor for a week-long Nature's Classroom experience. The P.T.O., CAP's and many other generous community groups helped to financially support the Nature's Classroom trips for the children.

Community input characterized school programs during 1983. Paula Witham headed up the Chapter I Parent Advisory Council. Kathy Skrabut and Joy Cappola, jointly provided leadership to the P.T.O. by sharing the presidency. Helen Walsh again served as the Volunteer coordinator. Lynn Souza volunteered to initiate plans to develop a Carver Citizens Advisory Committee. Use of the school facilities and the school busses continue to be made available to local community groups. Virtually every week night and Saturday the buildings are being utilized by organizations in the Town.

1984 will be a year of challenges. Financial constraints imposed by the restrictions of Proposition 2½ will compel the entire school community to exercise resourcefulness, creativity, and renewed vigor to maintain and support a strong academic program for every Carver student.

Department of Public Works

The past year has seen the following work accomplished by the Department of Public Works.

Paving and pavement maintenance were provided on the following Town roads: Forest St., Fuller St., Green St., High St., McFarlin Rd., White Pine Lane, Pond St., Old Center St., Wareham St. and Cranberry Rd.

Drainage improvements were provided on Meadow St., Ward St., Rochester Rd., Main St. and Crystal Lake Drive.

The Department has put to good use the newly purchased front end loader and 1-ton dump truck, both of which were approved at the last Annual Town Meeting.

Roads in the subdivisions were swept of winter sands and all drainage catch basins were cleaned.

The men from MCI, Plymouth, continue to provide the Town of Carver a very valuable service working in the cemeteries and alongside the roads of Carver clearing brush and debris.

A word of thanks should go to Richardo Gomes and his crew of school children who worked so diligently for the D.P.W. this past summer. Projects completed include mowing in the cemeteries, painting the Center Fire Station and the continued clean-up of Town beaches.

There were 22 burials attended to.

All parks and cemeteries were maintained in the usual manner.

Over 750 acres were aerial sprayed for the gypsy moth using *Bacillus Thuringiensis* (B.T.) All indications point to a substantial kill of the moth with only a few "Hot Spots" remaining to be attended to this year. It should be noted that 50% of the \$10,000 appropriated for the control of the gypsy moth was reimbursed back to the Town from the State.

South Meadow Road has finally been reconstructed. Appreciation has to go to the Contractor, T. L. Edwards, Inc., Avon, Mass.; the Mass. Department of Public Works engineers; and, last but not least, all the abutting home owners for their trust and understanding during construction. South Meadow Road is a road we can all be proud of.

Route 58 reconstruction, which is a much larger project, is approximately 25% complete with a completion date of November 1984 still anticipated. While the General Contractor, Forte Brothers, of Berkely, R.I., did encounter some problems during the pulverization of the existing road, it is felt that in the Spring work will move along more expeditiously. This Department only asks for a little understanding and patience during construction and looks forward to another completed road project we can all be proud of.

The first year of the Town's line painting program has produced the painting of over 40 miles of single and double lines on Carver roads. The program has been very successful and has ultimately made the roads in Carver safer. This Department asks the support of the Carver townspeople during the second of a three year program to paint center lines on all Carver's roads.

Most recently has been the resignation of Clark A. Griffith from the Board of Public Works for personal reasons. Clark's tenure on the Board goes back to 1972, the beginning of the Department of Public Works in Carver. Clark's knowledge of Public Works and the Town Government will be sorely missed, and is only deserving of a big Thank You for a job well done.

Thomas W. Russell has been chosen to fill Clark's unexpired term (1984) and

brings to the Board of Public Works a varied background in public service from Chairman of the Finance Committee to Selectman. It is felt that Tom will add a new dimension to the Board of Public Works.

This Department would like to express its gratitude to the other Town Departments and especially the D.P.W. employees for a job well done over the past year.

Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District

During 1983 the Town of Carver continued its membership for the fourteenth year in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is a planning and economic development agency formed under state law to serve twenty-eight communities in southeastern Massachusetts by providing a cooperative approach to regional issues.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or designee and a planning board representative from each participating municipality and six low-income and minority representatives. Carver's Commission representatives from the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board, respectively, are David G. Knight, a member of the Executive Committee, the Economic Development Committee and SEED Corporation, and Timothy McGillicuddy, Jr., a member of the Executive Committee.

In addition to regional planning and economic development, SRPEDD assists member cities and towns. Through the free municipal assistance program, each community receives time for local projects and assistance in preparing applications for Federal and State funds.

The agency's purpose is to plan for regional land use, economic development, housing, transit, transportation, solid waste, energy resources and conservation, and air and water quality. Local participation in these regional plans enables communities to be eligible for Federal and State dollars.

Services to Carver this past year included:

- Assisting the Route 44 Task Force: and
- Providing technical assistance to the Planning Board.

Regional plans and other activities conducted this year benefiting all communities included:

- Approval of over \$230 million in regional grant applications to Federal and State agencies and of over \$32 million in Industrial Revenue Bonds which will create approximately 1,200 new jobs in the region.

- Environmental assessment reviews of State and Federally funded projects, and reviews of all local zoning amendments. The reviews are advisory and are oriented toward making proposals more cost-effective and feasible.
- The annual update of the *Overall Economic Development Program* (OEDP) which makes member communities eligible for U.S. Economic Development Administration funding and a 10 percent bonus for public facility projects.
- The annual update of the *Transportation Improvements Program* (TIP) which lists major projects in each community for Federal and State funding. A project must be included on the TIP in order to be eligible for these funds.
- A Housing Conversion and Rehabilitation Program funded with bonus money provided to SRPEDD by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The program provided grants to establish 16 new housing units in existing structures throughout the region.
- Marketing Southeastern Massachusetts—SRPEDD was actively involved in the Golden Connection effort in Connecticut to attract high technology industries to the region and prepared the five publications used to market the region.
- SEED, South Eastern Economic Development Corporation, established and staffed by SRPEDD provides low-interest, long-term financing to small businesses in southeastern Massachusetts through the U.S. Small Business Administration's "503" Program. In 1983, SEED assisted four businesses which resulted in total investments of over \$1.5 million and created 66 jobs.

SRPEDD represents the collective will of its member communities. As the responsibilities and problems of municipalities become increasingly complex, the District can provide technical assistance to local boards, encourage cooperation among communities, and provide a comprehensive approach to issues that cross local boundaries.

Finance Committee Report

As budgets for FY-85 are reviewed, we are seeing the staggering impact of Carver's unrestrained residential growth. This is most noticeable in our school budget requests as our Town's enrollment percentage in both regions begins the dramatic rise which will continue for the foreseeable future.

As we approach Annual Town Meeting and the funding of FY-85 budgets, the Finance Committee must take an unusual approach due to this year's unique circumstances.

Unlike past years, the Cherry Sheet figures will be available well before Town Meeting. This should allow Carver to avoid the summer Special Town Meeting and last minute rush to set the tax rate that we have experienced recently.

However, the voters will decide on Election Day, via the override questions, the town's appropriation limit for FY 85. Because of this variable, the Finance Committee is now preparing separate sets of recommendations to fit each possible set of circumstances. The appropriate recommendation will then be made at Town Meeting. Therefore there will be no Finance Committee Recommendation column in the Town Report Budget Summary Sheets, nor on the individual articles in the Warrant.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs to meet at the Governor John Carver School House, in said Carver on Saturday, the fourteenth day of April, 1984, at 8:00 o'clock A.M., then and there to act on the following Article, namely:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers to be voted for all on one ballot, namely: One Moderator for a term of one (1) year; One Selectman, One Assessor, One Member of School Board, One Member Board of Public Works, Two Library Trustees, One Member Board of Health, each for a term of three (3) years; One Member Planning Board for a term of five (5) years; One Member of Carver Housing Authority for a term of five (5) years; One Member Carver Housing Authority (to fill vacancy) for a term of two (2) years; One Member Regional District School Committee (to fill vacancy) for a term of one (1) year; One Member Board of Health (to fill vacancy) for a term of one (1) year; and to vote by ballot "Yes" or "No" on the following questions:

QUESTION NO. 1

"Shall the Town of Carver be allowed to exempt the total amounts required to pay for bonded indebtedness incurred prior to the passage of proposition two and one-half, so-called, from the town's limit?"

QUESTION NO. 2

"Shall the Town of Carver be allowed to exempt from the provisions of proposition two and one-half, so-called, the amounts required to pay for the bond issued in order to purchase and install portable or relocatable classrooms to be located initially at the Plymouth-Carver High School?"

The polls will be open until 8:00 o'clock, P.M.

And you are further directed to notify said Inhabitants of said Town that as soon as the votes have been counted the meeting will adjourn to Monday, April 23, 1984, at 7:30 o'clock, P.M., and at that time will reconvene at said Governor John Carver School House, then and there to act on the following Articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1984, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from free cash in the treasury the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000) Dollars to meet interest charges on temporary loans.

Article 4. To see what amount the Town will vote to transfer from free cash in the treasury and what amount the Town will vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account to the 1985 fiscal year Reserve Account.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to hear the report of any standing committees and to abolish any special committee not submitting a report unless otherwise voted, and to establish any new committee.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars from available funds in the Treasury to be expended by the Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service and choose a Director in accordance with the provisions of General Laws of Massachusetts, Chapter 128, Sections 41 and 42.

Article 7. To see what disposition the Town will make of the County Dog Fund.

Article 8. To see what action the Town will take with regard to fixing the salaries of Elected Town Officers in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108 as amended, namely:

Article 9. To raise and appropriate sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges from July 1, 1984 to June 30, 1985.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from Revenue Sharing Fund sums of money as may be necessary to defray certain town charges from July 1, 1984 to June 30, 1985.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to amend part VI, section D “Sick Leave,” of the Wage and Personnel Administration Plan by eliminating all use of the words “60 days” in said section and replacing such wording with the words “120 days.”

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the treasury the sum of Thirty-Thousand fifty-four (\$30,054.00) Dollars to reimburse the Treasury of the County of Plymouth for awards payable from the Treasury of said County for damages caused by the taking of land on Plymouth Street—Section II, under the provision of Plymouth County Commissioner’s Decree No. 1499, dated February 21, 1984.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Ten Thousand One Hundred Fifty (\$10,150.00) Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing large diameter hose for the Fire Department or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars from available funds in the Treasury for the purpose of meeting the charges against the Cemetery Fund in the Town Treasury.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to be used to pay for all private work and materials in Town cemeteries such as opening graves, building foundations, etc.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account a sum of money and to trade a 1970 5500 GMC Dump Truck for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new dump truck with 6-yard dump body for the Department of Public Works.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund account the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of line painting of Town roads or take any other action relative thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Eleven Thousand Two Hundred and thirty-three (\$11,233.00) Dollars which may be used for State Aid Construction or Improvements under Chapter 289 (FY83) in conjunction with available State Funds of Thirty Three Thousand Six Hundred ninety-seven (\$33,697.00) Dollars and, in addition, to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Thirty Three Thousand Six Hundred ninety-seven (\$33,697.00) Dollars to meet the State's share of cost of work, reimbursement received therefrom to be returned to the Treasury.

To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Ten Thousand Eight Hundred forty-nine (\$10,849.00) dollars which will be used for State Aid Construction or Improvements under Chapter 637 (FY84) in conjunction with available State Funds of Thirty-two Thousand Five Hundred forty-seven (\$32,547.00) Dollars or take any other action relative thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Ten Thousand Eight Hundred forty-nine (\$10,849.00) Dollars which will be used for State Aid Construction or Improvements under Chapter 637 (FY85) in conjunction with available State Funds of Thirty-two Thousand Five Hundred forty-seven (\$32,547.00) Dollars or take any other action relative thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of conducting a State Census and local redistricting as per Massachusetts Constitution. A reimbursement of twenty-five cents per resident will be returned to the Town of Carver.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Carver Fire Department to use a portion of Lot 12 of Sheet 16 of the Assessors' Plans on Green Street, better known as the "Poor House Lot" in North Carver for the purpose of constructing a new Fire Station, said area to be decided by the Selectmen or take any other action relative thereto.

Municipal Finance Terminology

The following terms are frequently used in the Annual Town Report and at Town Meetings. In order to provide everyone with a better understanding of the meaning, the following definitions are provided.

SURPLUS REVENUE: (often referred to as “Excess and Deficiency”)

This fund represents the amount by which the Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserve. This is a bookkeeping item.

AVAILABLE FUND: (often referred to as “Free Cash”)

Available Funds is the amount certified annually by the State Bureau of Accounts by deducting from surplus revenue all uncollected taxes for prior years. This fund may be used by a vote of the Town Meeting.

OVERLAY:

The Overlay is the amount raised by the Assessors in excess of appropriations and other charges for the purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements granted and avoiding fractions.

OVERLAY RESERVE:

This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific Overlay account for a given year, and may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes or voted into the Reserve Fund.

RESERVE FUND:

This fund is established by the voters at an annual town meeting only and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) both.

STABILIZATION FUND:

This is a fund created to provide a reserve for capital expenditure. Appropriations from the Stabilization Fund may be made at an Annual Town Meeting by a two-thirds vote for any purpose the town is authorized to borrow money for under Section 7 or 8 of Chapter 44 or for such other purpose as is approved by the Emergency Finance Board.

CHERRY SHEET:

Named for the cherry colored paper on which the Massachusetts Commission of Corporations and Taxation traditionally has printed it, the cherry sheet carries the figures which must be used by the Assessors in determining the amount to be raised by taxation.

It lists the amounts of county tax and state assessments, as well as the estimated tax distributions from the General Fund, reimbursements, agency funds, and the Sales and Use Taxes.
