Annual Town Election

Saturday, April 13, 1985

The Annual Town Election for the election of Town Officer's was held at the Governor John Carver New Cafeteria on Saturday, April 13, 1985, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated Thursday, March 21, 1985 and posted as required by law. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 o'clock A.M. by the Warden, Eugene P. Souza. The following named Election Officers were present at the opening of the polls, and having been duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties by the Town Clerk; thereafter assigned to their respective duties as follows:

A total of 43 Electronic Voting Machines and booths plus 5,000 cards were delivered to the Ballot Clerks by the Town Clerk and Police Officers. The Warden declared the polls open at 8:00 o'clock A.M. and announced that the polls would close at 8:00 o'clock P.M. The Ballot Box registered zero (0) at the opening of the polls. The keys to the Ballot Box were given to the Warden, Eugene P. Souza. The election continued without incident until 8:00 o'clock P.M. at which time the Warden declared the polls closed. At the close of the polls the Ballot Box registered a total of 1,428 cast, of which 44 were Absentee Ballots and 1,384 were cast by voters in person. This totaled and tallied with the Check-In Voting Lists and Check-Out Voting Lists by the respective inspectors. The ballot cards were visibly removed from the Ballot Box and so counted by the computer and election officers who were sworn in to perform their duties.

Annual Town Meeting

Monday, April 22, 1985

The Annual Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School, on Monday, April 22, 1985, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated March 21, 1985. The meeting was called to order at 7:38 o'clock P.M., by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans, there being a quorum present. The Invocation was given by Rev. Robert H. Merritt, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. The Moderator appointed Joan M. White, Robert Bentley, Maureen Knott and Robert Wiltshire to serve as Tellers to count the votes and they were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties. This was to be the 194th Annual Town Meeting.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to dispense with the reading of the Warrant. Article 1, relating to the election of Town Officers, etc.; having been disposed of at a prior meeting, the meeting then proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1985 in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

At this time, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED that all money Articles will be postponed.

Article 3 and 4. No action at this time.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to hear the report of any standing committees and to abolish any special committee not submitting a report unless otherwise voted, and to establish any new committee.

Thereupon, the following Committee reports were presented:

1. Mr. Charles Erwin reported that the School Needs Study Committee wishes to be continued. Report accepted and it was VOTED to continue Committee.

2. William R. Holmes reported on the Town Barn Study Committee. Report accepted and it was VOTED to continue Committee.

3. It was requested by Timothy McGillicuddy that the report of the Residential Growth Study Committee be postponed until the Special Town Meeting of June 3, 1985. It was SO VOTED.

4. Michael Lodico presented a report for the Carver Youth Needs Committee. He asked to have the committee continued and also requested more members. Report accepted and it was VOTED to continue Committee.

At this time, upon motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED to adjourn until the Special Town Meeting scheduled for 8:00 o'clock P.M., was disposed of. It was SO VOTED.

Special Town Meeting

Monday, April 22, 1985

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Governor John Carver School on Monday, April 22, 1985 at 8:00 o'clock P.M., the meeting called to order by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans.

There being a quorum present, the meeting then proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded, Standing Vote being had, with 51 voting in the affirmative and 76 opposed, this Article for the purchase of Voting Machines and Ballot Boxes was DEFEATED.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was SO VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of \$15,000.00 (Fifteen Thousand Dollars) for the purpose of purchasing office equipment for the Town Hall.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five Thousand Dollars) for the purpose of conducting an audit for the Town.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and after some discussion, the Finance Committee recommended \$10,150.00 (Ten Thousand One Hundred Fifty Dollars) for the purpose of purchasing a Dump Body and Catch Basin Cleaner for Department of Public Works. It was SO VOTED.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of \$3,600.00 (Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars) from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing a Recorder for the Police and Fire Dispatch Center.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of \$3,000.00 (Three Thousand Dollars) from the Police "Off Duty" Work Detail Service Charge Account to the Police "Off Duty" Work Detail Account, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 53C.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and upon recommendation from the Finance Committee, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of \$8,000.00 (Eight Thousand Dollars) from the Ambulance Fund Account to the Ambulance Operating Account. Said sum to be under the control of the Board of Selectmen.

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of \$30,000.00 (Thirty Thousand Dollars) from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund account for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a Rescue Truck for the Fire Department.

Article 9. Upon motion by Police Chief Thomas S. Orr, and duly seconded, standing vote being had, 78 opposed and 36 in the affirmative, motion to transfer from Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account the sum of \$28,000.00 (Twenty-eight Thousand Dollars) to purchase and equip two (2) police cruisers was DEFEATED. Upon motion duly made and seconded, original request of one (1) police cruiser for \$14,000.00 (Fourteen Thousand Dollars) was unanimously VOTED.

Article 10. It was requested by the Department of Public Works, that no action on this Article (½ ton Pick-up Truck) at this time. SO VOTED.

Article 11. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to transfer the sum of \$2,000.00 (Two Thousand Dollars) from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of printing Zoning Books.

Article 12. Upon motion duly made by Erwin Washburn and duly seconded, it was VOTED to transfer \$25,000.00 (Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars) from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund Account for the purpose of purchasing one (1) new school bus for the School Department. Said amount to be expended under the direction of the School Committee.

Meeting adjourned at 9:00 o'clock P.M.

Annual Town Meeting

Monday, April 22, 1985

CONTINUATION:—

Article 14. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee of seven (7) people to arrange for the Bicentennial.

Article 20. Part I

Upon motion made by Erwin Washburn and duly seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to approve the execution of a release by the Board of Selectmen and John E. Atwood et als in consideration of the return of \$5,000.00 (Five Thousand Dollars) paid to John Atwood by the Town under the terms of a certain purchase and sale agreement dated November 7, 1975 between John E. Atwood et als as seller and the Town of Carver as purchaser, mutually releasing each other from the terms of said agreement, thereby declaring said agreement null and void and of no effect.

Part II

Upon motion duly made by Erwin Washburn and duly seconded, it was SO VOTED that no action be taken to rescind action on Article 11, of the Special Town Meeting, Adjourned Session, held on May 19, 1975 wherein the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five Thousand Dollars) was transferred from available funds in the treasury and the issuance of bonds not to exceed the sum of \$150,000.00 (One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars) was authorized to acquire parcels of land covered by the purchase and sale agreement.

Article 21. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and motion to amend this article by removing the word "purchase," it was unanimously VOTED to read:

To approve the acquisition by eminent domain proceedings, donation or otherwise by the Selectmen on behalf of the Town of all or a portion of the following described land to secure a possibly viable public water supply for the Town, and further to approve any necessary reasonable conditions agreed to by the Board of Selectmen to complete the acquisition of said described land:

Property described as follows:

Parcel 1 and Parcel 2 as shown in a deed from David G. Piper, Sr. to David G. Piper, Sr. Trustee of Investment Realty Trust dated July 22, 1981 and recorded in the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds, Book 5183, Page 489.

Article 22. Motion duly made and seconded, after discussion by Erwin Washburn (Article by petition by Robert Weker) the Article was SO VOTED

Article reads as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to expand the School Committee from a three member board to a five member board in accordance with Chapter 41, Section 1 of the General Laws of Massachusetts, terms to be as follows:

1. New position will be for three year terms as are the current board positions.
2. Two new members be elected in the Annual 1986 Town Election, and in order to establish the three year cycle of two members, two members, and one member being elected respectively in each of the three years.
 - a. That the person with the highest vote for the School Board in the 1986 election be awarded for the full three year term, the current board seat scheduled for election in 1986.
 - b. That the person with the second highest School Board vote be awarded for the full three year term, the first of the two new additional seats, and
 - c. That the person with the third highest School Board vote be awarded the second of the two new additional seats for a one year partial term after which time, this second new seat would be elected every three years.
3. That the regular terms of office of the other two current School Board members not to be altered.

Article 23. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and after some discussion by Matthew Mendes, and with a Standing $\frac{2}{3}$ Vote being had, 69 in the affirmative and 9 opposed to deleting entire section, it was SO VOTED to amend Section 10.51 of the Town's Zoning By-Laws by deleting the entire section and replacing it with the following:

“No mobile home park shall be less than 100 acres and no single acre shall contain more than five mobile home lots.”

Article 24. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and after some discussion, it was SO VOTED to amend the Town of Carver By-Laws as follows:

Strike out Article 1, Section 1 and amend to read:

“*Article 1, Section 1*—The Annual Town Meeting shall be held for the transaction of municipal business in the month of April or May on a weekday to be set by the Board of Selectmen, and the Election of Officers on the second Saturday in April at 8:00 o'clock A.M. The polls shall be open until 8:00 o'clock P.M.”

- B. A person shall be guilty of disorderly conduct if, with intent to cause public inconvenience, annoyance, or recklessly creating a risk, they:
 1. engage in fighting, violent, or threatening behavior or,
 2. obstruct vehicular or pedestrian traffic or,
 3. use indecent, profane, or insulting language in a public place or near a dwelling, or
 4. make any indecent figures, or writes any words, or make any marks that shall deface any wall, post, fence, building, roadway or public property.

Any person violating this By-Law shall be fined not more than \$50.00 (Fifty Dollars) for each offense.

Article 35. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED for the Town of Carver to join the Greater Attleboro-Taunton Regional Transit Authority (GATRA) pursuant to Section 3 of Chapter 161B of the Massachusetts

General Laws, as amended.

Said grant to be deposited in a separate account.

Article 3. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED for the Town to accept for the Plymouth-Carver Regional District Schools an equal educational opportunity grant for fiscal year 1986 under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 70A, Section 5 as inserted by Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985. Said grant shall be expended by the School Committee for direct service expenditures.

Article 4. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED for the Town to accept for the Plymouth-Carver Regional District Schools, a professional development grant payable on February 15, 1986, August 15, 1986, February 17, 1987 and August 15, 1987 for the purpose of increasing teacher compensation under the provisions of Section 13 of Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept for the Plymouth-Carver Regional District Schools, the provisions of Section 40 of Chapter 71 as amended by Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985 and to increase all teacher salaries to at least \$18,000.00 per person.

Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED that no action be taken on this article.

Article 6. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED for the Town to accept for the Old Colony Regional Vocational Technical High School District School, an equal educational opportunity grant for fiscal year 1986 under the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 70A, Section 5 as inserted by Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985. Said grant shall be expended by the School Committee for direct service expenditures.

Article 7. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED for the Town to accept for the Olde Colony Regional Vocational Technical High School District School a professional development grant, payable on February 15, 1986, August 15, 1986, February 15, 1987 and August 15, 1987 for the purpose of increasing teacher compensation under the provisions of Section 13 of Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985.

Article 8. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED for the Town to approve the acquisition by the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District of all or a portion of the following described land as a site for the new regional school to be constructed in Carver to accommodate grades seven thru twelve.

Property described as follows: As shown on Assessors Sheet 105, Lot number 3, Book 3224, Page 704, owned by Ernest Gonsalves, said property bound on all sides by land owned by the Plymouth-Carver Regional School District.

Article 9. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED for the Town to authorize the Carver School Committee to investigate the feasibility of acquiring the Baca property for future school needs, said property is adjacent to the Pond Street site and is shown on Sheet Number 102 of the Assessor's Plan.

Article 10. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED to amend the article for the Town to establish an account for the purpose of investigating the acquisition of the Baca property by rescinding action taken under Article 12 of the May 19, 1975 Adjourned Session Town Meeting and transfer the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars appropriated under this Article. Said account to be expended by the Carver School Committee.

Article 11. Upon motion by Erwin K. Washburn, duly made and seconded, it was unanimously VOTED for the Town to rescind action taken under Article 11 of the Special Town Meeting Adjourned Session held May 19, 1975 wherein the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars was transferred from available funds in the treasury and issuance of bonds not to exceed the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Thousand (\$150,000.00) Dollars was authorized to acquire certain parcels of land on Pond Street.

Report of the Selectmen

During this past year, the Board of Selectmen, like many other Boards in Town, has been kept quite busy with many important issues, some of which will be ongoing during the months and in some cases years ahead.

To try to explain each of those issues in this report would be much too lengthy, so we are going to highlight those issues at this time:

Received Grant from the State for a Town Planner.

Got the street renumbering project started. Town is about 75% completed.

Submitted and received approval for new Precinct Plan for elections in 1988.

Perambulated the Town's bounds as required by law with the Towns of Plymouth, Middleboro, Kingston, Wareham and Plympton.

Voted to appoint Mobile Home Study Committee whose recommendations will be presented this year.

Worked with the State and Fire Department on securing new Fire Tower for Miles Standish State Forest.

Working with the DPW on the redesign of four dangerous intersections.

Appointed and are working with the new IDC Board to bring businesses to Carver.

Recommended to Plymouth County Commissioners they check on possible Group Rates for towns for Liability Insurance.

Recommended and received approval to create 7-member Bi-Centennial Committee (members still needed).

Met with GATRA to procure new vans for elderly use.

Have begun process of looking into Public Water System for town and have met with engineers and bankers for that purpose.

Have also met with Plymouth Selectmen regarding possible Regional Water District with Plymouth.

Carver was very fortunate to have Ocean Spray build their new Receiving Plant in Carver last year which means we are beginning to get some industrial and commercial business to settle here.

The Selectmen convinced the Governor to change his mind about declaring a State of Emergency and to request the President to declare a National Emergency for damages caused by Hurricane Gloria which means an 82½ per cent reimbursement to all cities and towns in Massachusetts. Carver will be receiving \$100,000.00.

Selectmen requested selling the North Carver Fire Station for \$10,000.00 and turned over a parcel of land to the Fire Department so the Volunteer Firemen could build a new station. At the present time it has not cost the town any money. The 40' x 72' building is just about closed in, thanks to the members of the Fire Department.

The Ambulance Service is another great service to the town. It is operated by the Police Department and Civilian EMTs under the direction of Co-ordinator Stanley McAuliffe. No town money has been used to date for purchasing the two ambulances as well as paying for all supplies, upkeep, maintenance and salaries for police and civilian EMTs.

These are only some of the issues which we have dealt with over this past year and are presently involved with union negotiations with 3 town unions as well as the weekly functions of Committee Appointments, License Hearings and many other administrative duties.

As a Board we would be remiss at this time if we did not take this opportunity to thank all of the town employees as well as the volunteers who assisted during Hurricane Gloria this past fall. The dedication that was shown by all was a tribute to our town and, as a result of their efforts, serious tragedy was averted.

In closing, we, as a Board, encourage all residents to take an active role in their town, whether it's serving on a Board or Committee or at the very least plan to attend Town meeting. Many important decisions must be made in the coming months which will have long term effects on our future and it's vital that you, as a resident, take an active role in those decisions.

The Board in the coming year will continue to work for the best interest of Carver and is available any Tuesday evening at our weekly meetings or contact our office during the day, if you have any questions or need some assistance or information regarding your Town.

In April 1985 two new members were elected to the Board of Assessors. The entire board attended a basic state-mandated educational course in Assessment Administration offered by the Department of Revenue. Assessors staff and board members continue to pursue professional designations throughout the year, by attending courses and meetings offered by the Department of Revenue and the Massachusetts Association of Assessing Officers.

The board finalized contract negotiations and payments in lieu of taxes were secured for the first time from both the Carver Housing Authority, and Housing for Independent Living. This resulted in \$22,966.00 in additional Revenue to the town for FY 85.

The Board is also currently in negotiation with the Town of Plymouth to resolve the question of payments in lieu of taxes on the Plymouth Airport land located in the Town of Carver. The Plymouth Selectmen are reviewing the valuation figures submitted to them, by this board, and an amicable settlement should be reached sometime this year.

The Board of Assessors has vigorously pursued the location, and identification of all Personal Property and new businesses in town, and will be enforcing the rules, regulations, and penalties regarding the filing forms of list. These measures have also resulted in new revenue for the town.

The Carver Assessors continue to take a very active part this year in seeking the establishment of new guidelines for the valuation of cranberry bog under farmland protection, (chapter 61A). Following a state-funded study by the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, Department of Agriculture, a decision on this issue was reached by the Farmland Valuation Advisory Commission, of the Department of Revenue on October 8, 1985. As a result of that meeting, the new guidelines for FY 86 set a range of values from \$7,800 to \$11,700 per acre. A substantial increase over FY 85 guidelines of \$1,100 to \$1,700 per acre.

Director's Report

There are many services provided for the elderly (59 years of age or older) or handicapped, in the Town of Carver, by the Council on Aging. A list of these services, I.D. cards for discounts, names placed on mailing lists and a list of surrounding area stores who have discounts for the elderly may be obtained at the Marcus Atwood Multi-purpose Center in South Carver, which is open daily Monday through Friday from 9:00 A.M.—4:00 P.M. for information and referral.

All mini-bus reservations, mall trips, shopping trips, luncheons at the Atwood House Nutrition Center, medicals, mini-bus drivers, newsletters, home delivered meals, business calls, information and referrals calls have been co-ordinated by the Service Director for the Council on Aging throughout the past year. The Director also assisted many people, of all ages, in making out fuel assistance applications and delivered free commodity food to all who qualified.

The Director and the Chairperson of the Council on Aging Board of Directors attended numerous meetings throughout the year. These meetings pertain to the needs of the elderly such as: Medicare and Medicaid changes and updates, Social Security and Supplementary Security Income (SSI) benefits, Fuel Assistance and other energy related problems. Some of the other meetings include: Senior Aide, CIRCA, Old Colony Planning Council, Old Colony Elderly Services and various staff meetings.

The Drop-in at the Marcus Atwood Multi-purpose Center is open daily from 12 Noon—4:00 P.M., where many activities are enjoyed and all Seniors and Handicapped are invited to attend.

Newsletters are mailed out bi-monthly, keeping the elderly informed on any new legislation, changes in Medicare and Medicaid, Tax information, and a two month calendar of activities and services. Over the past year the mailing increased from 6,068 to 6,597.

There are three Senior Aides, whose salaries are paid by the Department of Labor, that work at the Carver Council on Aging. Each Aide works twenty hours per week.

One of the Aides works in the Nutrition Center and also makes visits to the sick in hospitals, nursing homes and the homebound. Another Aide works in the office and primarily takes people to medical appointments. The third Aide is the acting Maintenance man and delivers "Meals on Wheels" (Home delivered meals to shut-ins) on occasion. He also drives the mini-bus whenever needed.

Luncheons are served daily in the Nutrition Center. The donation is \$1.00. People 59 years of age or older or handicapped are welcome. There is no set income requirement. The luncheons have increased from 7,276 to 11,125 over the past year.

Since the Nutrition Center has been operating, the "Meals on Wheels" program keeps growing rapidly, as all meals are cooked on the premises.

The Carver Council on Aging continues to thank the Honorable Board of Selectmen, the Town Boards and the Townspeople for their continuing outstanding support of their programs.

The Civil Defense office responded to the hurricane Gloria disaster and provided communications with the State Civil Defense Agency and provided water tanks to supply water for town citizens without working wells.

Civil Defense is a function of Federal, State and local governments established to insure the safety of citizens and to mitigate the damage caused to communities by natural and national disasters.

The Carver Office of Emergency Preparedness and Civil Defense extends a thank you to all the volunteers and to the residents of Carver for their efforts and cooperation this past year.

A very special thank you to Kathy Murray, Joan Garretson, Beverly Sundberg and Mary MacDonald for all of their hard work.

New staff members include Roxanne Houston, Accounts Manager and Leona Williamson, Senior Aide. We welcome both of these capable women to our staff.

Laurie Kelly has been volunteering to help with clerical work 2 or 3 mornings each week. Her assistance has been greatly appreciated.

It continues to be my pleasure to work with such a dedicated and hardworking staff.

Carver Public Library

The library is the best bargain in town. A few dollars support can be parlayed into many benefits for every person in town, young and old. With the use of interlibrary loan cooperation, at no extra cost, many more materials can be found for the people of Carver. Most of the public libraries in the United States are found in communities of 25,000 or fewer people. Therefore, regional participation with other libraries is becoming more and more important. We are presently involved in the planning of the New Bedford Regional Computer network called "SMARTS." It will take a few years and much time and work, but will increase speed and materials available to the citizens of Carver.

We have added audiovisuals to the library's circulation this year. We now have videocassettes, music cassette tapes, framed art prints, and a gift Polaroid camera from the Polaroid Corporation. Thanks to the Friends of Carver Public Library we now have a micro computer that is now in the development of use stage.

Programs and contests for public education and information are part of every library year. This year programs and contests for children included "name the birds," walk-in summer storytime, as well as our regular winter storytimes for 3-5 year-old children. We had board games and trivial pursuit contests, "name the trees" contest with a live tree as the prize from "A Growing Concern" of Carver. The school sent over art work displays from the different school classes. Summer saw reading programs on hobbies and a Book Treasure Reading program with treasures of gifts from the Candy Jar and Erickson's Ice Cream. In the fall, we had the annual window painting contest and a "Fright room" for Halloween night. The cranberry count contest and Santa Claus coming to read to the children rounded the year off.

Adults had programs from quilt displays from the Plymouth Co. Cranberry Quilters, to Antiques know-how and demonstrations of self-defense and karate. We even have a Santa Clause suit for public circulation for adults at Christmas time.

During the year we added a new rug to the Atwood room and climate control system for the library with State grant money. Displays like the quilts and the handmade dolls by Ina Eubertis will be safer in a warmer and drier library. The books will last a great deal longer also.

The Atwood meeting room was used by many organizations this year: the Acid Rain Committee, ABC's, TOPS, Scouts, Quilters, Arts Lottery Council, and many individuals doing tutoring and studying.

We would like to thank all who volunteered their time at the library this year. We could never thank them enough for their generosity in giving books and time. Special thanks to Paula Babbin for children's books, Mr. Norman Birch for a magazine subscription gift, Betsy Ryan for giving a class on cartooning, the Friends of Carver Health Nurses for a set of medical books, CAPS, South Meadow Village Assoc., Cranberry Village Assoc. for large print books and the Firefighters Auxiliary for the book gift. A special thanks to the Mott family for the Learning Disabilities Materials shelf.

Thanks to the town support this year, the library has again been able to increase our hours open for your convenience in using one of the best bargains in town.

The main office is located on High Street, Hanson on the grounds of the Plymouth County Hospital and can be reached by telephoning 293-3541 or 447-5946. (In the telephone book under Plymouth County)

A federally-funded Nutrition Education Program, designed to assist young families with limited resources, is located in Brockton at 32 Belmont Street. Under the guidance of Andrea Gulezian, 9 nutrition assistants (6 FTE's) worked with 320 homemakers. In addition they offered a week-long nutrition summer camp for youth and over 60 food demonstrations to improve family diets. As a cooperating agency they received $\frac{3}{4}$ of their referrals from WIC, Project Good Health and Food Stamp offices. In schools (with nutrition education programs that reach 5,000 youth) 357 volunteers worked with the nutrition program.

Cooperative Extension Agents are specialists in the area of 4-H, Home Economics, Community and Natural Resource Development and Agriculture. Agents service all towns in Plymouth County through lectures, phone call assistance, field visits and county-wide programs.

In our 4-H program last year 15,178 youth were enrolled. Of that number 959 were enrolled in traditional club programs and 14,219 were exposed to 4-H short term projects, school enrichment or individual study programs. 786 volunteers assisted in conducting the county 4-H program.

Newsletters....free for the asking

The Home Economics department recently made available to residents a newsletter "Creative Living" which covers areas of Consumer Economics, Human Development, Nutrition and Clothing & Textiles.

"Garden Clippings," the extension newsletter for the backyard gardener has a circulation of 3,400, doubling in size since last year.

Agriculture and Resource Development agents service clients by reporting needed agriculture events as they happen, essential to produce growers and communities. A computer links our office to U/MA research.

Cooperative Extension works through a variety of ways to reach Plymouth County residents. 20,000 publication listings were distributed to all libraries and town halls this past year. Radio PSA and newsreleases are sent out weekly to ensure program coverage. Presently there are 10,800 names on our mailing lists who receive monthly newsletters in wide areas of interest.

**Plymouth County
Mosquito Control Project**

Board of Selectmen, Town of Carver:

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 1985.

The Project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is now composed of twenty-two (22) Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the Town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. The Project is a mechanism for organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees and mosquito control professionals to carry out the single function of mosquito control over a broad geographic area. The Project now provides environmentally sound mosquito control to an area of approximately 650 square miles.

Calendar year 1985 was one of expansion. On July 1 the Town of Halifax joined the program. The Project finally was able to acquire additional badly needed equipment, including three pickup trucks, a flatbed truck, and excavator for use on the Salt Marsh, two sprayers and a complete complement of survey equipment. A laboratory to sort, identify and count field-caught mosquitoes was completed. The information gathered from trap collections and field surveys is important to the integrated pest management approach used by the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project.

In summary, 1985 began with a dryer than normal spring and early summer. Prior to mid-August, complaints of nuisance mosquitoes were often scattered and could be attributed to a single local breeding site. This made source reduction simple and effective. In late summer, increased frequency of rainfall led to a more broad scale problem requiring increased spraying for adult mosquitoes. Concern about transmission of eastern equine encephalitis to both horses and humans also surfaced at the end of the summer. However, no cases occurred in Massachusetts although virus-positive mosquitoes were collected.

The figures specific to the Town of Carver are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect political boundaries, the information below does provide a tally of those activities which had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of town residents.

1. *Insecticide Application.* 8,143 acres were treated using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in May and the last in September.

1. *Aerial Application.* Larviciding woodland swamps by airplane before the leaves come out on the trees can be very effective. In Carver this year we aerially larvicided 880 acres.

2. *Water Management.* During 1985, crews removed blockages, brush and other obstructions from 900 linear feet of ditches and streams to prevent overflows or stagnation that can result in mosquito breeding. This work together with machine reclamation is most often carried out in the fall and winter.

We encourage citizens or municipal officials to call our office for information about mosquitoes, mosquito-borne diseases, control practices, or any other matters of concern.

During the past year the accomplishments of your Board of Public Works are as follows:

The following streets were overlaid (Type I Mix) Fosdick Road, Popes Point, France Street, Mayflower Road, West Street and Beaver Dam Road. Total square feet 32,044.

Replaced culverts on the following streets: Hammond Street, West Street and Meadow Street. Also, one mile of Route 44 (Center Street) was overlaid 1½" of Type I Mix.

More drainage was done at Crystal Lake Drive and Wenham Shores had to have replacement of some pipes. Street sweeping was done on Route 58 and intersections. Also, South Meadow Road, Church Street, Lakeview Street, part of Tremont Street, Center Street, Storey Corner and Route 44.

Maintenance of Private Ways was also done: Bates Pond, Pine City, Bunny's Road and Hammond Street, all done with grader and loader with a good gravel base. Brush cutting was done on the sides of the following roads: Plymouth Street, West Street, Cross Street, Holmes Street, Wareham Street, Rochester Road, Meadow Street, High Street, Spring Street, Pleasant Street, Brook Street, Center Street and Cranberry Road.

There were 28 burials attended to. Parks and Cemeteries were maintained in the usual manner by the inmates of MCI contributing greatly to them. We are very fortunate to have this ongoing program every year. The service and production that Carver gets from this group is invaluable.

Line Painting was done on parts of Route 44, Meadow Street, Tremont Street, Rochester Road, Cranberry Road and Federal Road.

The final overlayment of Ward Street has been completed.

The Salt Shed on Rochester Road is almost completed, some more wiring is still to be installed.

Hurricane "Gloria" was a blow to Carver with excessive tree damage to the town which took many weeks of clean-up. We are very happy to report that the \$60,000.00 plus that was spent by the D.P.W. is reimbursable through the State and Federal Governments. We would like to thank all who participated in the clean-up efforts.

Indications are that there may be a return of some Gypsy Moth problem this year. We are keeping a close watch on this matter.

A big "Thank You" to Richardo Gomes and his crew for another year of a job well done.

Most recently, has been the resignation of William R. Holmes and Thomas W. Russell from the Board of Public Works. Bill's tenure on the Board goes back to 1972, the beginning of the Department of Public Works in Carver. Bill and Tom's knowledge of Public Works and the Town Government will be sorely missed, and is only deserving of a big "Thank You" for a job well-done.

Also, we tender the resignation of Ron Freitas for personal reasons. The Board of Public Works is fortunate to have Dave Piper, Jr. and Paul Williams as appointees. It is nice to have positions filled so quickly with very knowledgeable people.

The Board of Public Works and Superintendent Brian Thayer would like to express their appreciation to the D.P.W. employees for their faithfulness when called out at all hours of the day and night, also to the Board of Selectmen, Pat Clark, Jeanne Roby and Alan Dunham.

Carver Public Schools

The 1985 school year opened with 1,211 students enrolled in grades kindergarten through six which reflected an increase of 62 students over 1984. Kindergarten classes are now housed at the Gov. John Carver building and the Benjamin Ellis building is being used for school committee meetings and storage.

Mr. Erwin Washburn was re-elected to a three-year term and serves as the committee chairman with committee members Mrs. Pamela Santino (third year of three-year term) and Mr. Charles Erwin (second year of three-year term). Mr. Washburn is serving his thirty-fourth year as a committee member and thirty-second year as chairman.

Space needs continue to be a concern and this year grade eight students returned to regional buildings in Plymouth. Seventh grade students remained in Carver with an enrollment of 164. Marylou Hobson was appointed Administrative Assistant for grade seven and Mr. DiStefano, Superintendent of Carver Schools, was appointed to the position of Assistant Superintendent for Carver Facilities and Personnel by the Regional School Committee. Mr. Krieger resigned as Principal in April. Mr. Fred Morris was appointed Acting Principal to the end of June and was subsequently appointed Principal for 1985-86. Mr. William Lander served as acting Assistant Principal until his appointment as Assistant Principal. Mr. William DiStefano is serving his second year as Superintendent of Carver Schools. Secretary to the Superintendent is Donna Mountain and Betty LeBel is the Bookkeeper. New secretarial and clerical staff include Patricia Downey, Stephanie Copp, and Ann Marie Nocera. Dr. Christopher Kendall became the new Special Education Director following the resignation of Mr. Kopitsky.

Through the purchase of a new bus with revenue sharing funds, school bus transportation this year is provided totally with Town of Carver busses resulting in a significant savings.

The building committee selected Korslund, LeNormand and Quann to design the new \$14,000.00 secondary school facility. The Pond Street site has been cleared and design drawings are nearly complete for this 1,000 pupil facility.

The new social studies curriculum is fully implemented and a new reading program was approved. The transitional kindergarten program was reinstated this year. Grant funds continued to help support curriculum projects, provided funds for Chapter I programs in reading and mathematics, and helped with the costs of special education programs in Carver schools and for outside placement of students in special programs. There was wide student participation in music and drama activities throughout the year. Educational field trips were enjoyed at all grade levels. Grade four and six students for the sixth year attended the week-long Nature's Classroom program. A very successful grade five Science Fair was held under the direction of Mr. C. Moakley and the grade five staff. Carver was the recipient of a substance and alcohol abuse grant and a Drug Fair drew nearly four hundred parents, citizens, and students. This was a major event in the school system's attempt to educate students and parents about the dangers of substance and alcohol abuse. Significant support for this program was given by the Carver Lions.

New staff members this year include: Mary Barclay and Janet O'Connor, Grade 6; Debra Lynch and Holly Paradis, Grade 1; Patricia Verre, Transitional Kindergarten; Christine Anderson, L/D teacher and Peg Maeder, School Psychologist.

This past year was both exciting and challenging and not without a few "bumpy" spots along the way. The 1985-86 school year commenced with increased funding, additional staff positions, new administrators and teachers, a positive feeling between the teachers' association and the school committee as a result of a two-year contract, and envisions of Carver's own secondary school.

There are many challenges ahead because of Carver's increasing population. These challenges can be managed with citizen support and adequate funding.

Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District

During 1985 the Town of Carver continued its membership for the sixteenth year in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is a planning and economic development agency formed under state law to serve twenty-eight communities in southeastern Massachusetts by providing a cooperative approach to regional issues.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or designee and a planning board representative from each participating municipality and six low-income and minority representatives. Carver's representatives for the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board, respectively, were: Arthur P. DeCoursey and Warren Greene.

In addition to regional planning and economic development, SRPEDD assists member cities and towns. Through the free municipal assistance program, each community receives time for local projects and assistance in preparing applications for federal and state funds.

The agency's purpose is to plan for regional land use, economic development, housing, transit, transportation, solid waste, energy resources and conservation, and air and water quality. Local participation in these regional plans enables communities to be eligible for federal and state dollars.

Services to Carver this past year included:

- Review of residential policies in master plan
- Route 44 Task Force organization

Additionally, SRPEDD, working with scientists, public officials and concerned citizens from throughout the area, is helping to manage and implement an EPA sponsored study of Buzzards Bay. This multi-year project is geared toward protecting and improving the quality of this irreplaceable resource. Carver is one of the communities that will benefit from this study.

Regional plans and other activities conducted this year benefiting all communities included:

- Approval of over \$152 million in industrial revenue projects in the region, creating approximately 1,300 jobs.
- Environmental assessment reviews of state and federally funded projects, and reviews of all local zoning amendments. The reviews are advisory and are oriented toward making proposals more cost-effective and feasible.

- The annual update of the *Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP)* which makes member communities eligible for U.S. Economic Development Administration funding and a 10 percent bonus for public facility projects.
- The annual update of the *Transportation Improvements Program (TIP)* which lists major projects in each community for federal and state funding. A project must be included in the TIP in order to be eligible for these funds.
- Conducting a community education effort on the safe handling of industrial hazardous wastes under a contract with Southeastern Massachusetts University.
- SEED, South Eastern Economic Development Corporation, established and staffed by SRPEDD, provides low-interest, long-term financing to small businesses in southeastern Massachusetts through the U.S. Small Business Administration's "503 Program" and the \$1 million revolving loan fund established in 1984. In 1985 SEED assisted businesses in total investments of over \$8 million and the creation of over 450 new jobs.

SRPEDD represents the collective will of its member communities. As the responsibilities and problems of municipalities become increasingly complex, the District can provide technical assistance to local boards, encourage cooperation among communities, and provide a comprehensive approach to issues that cross local boundaries.

Municipal Finance Terminology

The following terms are frequently used in the Annual Town Report and at Town Meetings. In order to provide everyone with a better understanding of the meaning, the following definitions are provided.

SURPLUS REVENUE: (often referred to as "Excess and Deficiency")

This fund represents the amount by which the Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserve. This is a bookkeeping item.

AVAILABLE FUND: (often referred to as "Free Cash")

Available Funds is the amount certified annually by the State Bureau of Accounts by deducting from surplus revenue all uncollected taxes for prior years. This fund may be used by a vote of the Town Meeting.

OVERLAY:

The Overlay is the amount raised by the Assessors in excess of appropriations and other charges for the purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements granted and avoiding fractions.

OVERLAY RESERVE:

This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific Overlay account for a given year, and may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes or voted into the Reserve Fund.

RESERVE FUND:

This fund is established by the voters at an annual town meeting only and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) both.

STABILIZATION FUND:

This is a fund created to provide a reserve for capital expenditure. Appropriations from the Stabilization Fund may be made at an Annual Town Meeting by a two-thirds vote for any purpose the town is authorized to borrow money for under Section 7 or 8 of Chapter 44 or for such other purpose as is approved by the Emergency Finance Board.

CHERRY SHEET:

Named for the cherry colored paper on which the Massachusetts Commission of Corporations and Taxation traditionally has printed it, the cherry sheet carries the figures which must be used by the Assessors in determining the amount to be raised by taxation.

It lists the amounts of county tax and state assessments, as well as the estimated tax distributions from the General Fund, reimbursements, agency funds, and the Sales and Use Taxes.

Report of the Finance Committee

As we approach another Town Meeting, we again urge all registered voters to please attend.

We, of the Finance Committee, make a study of all department budgets and then we make our recommendations. We base our recommendations on what is best for the Town of Carver.

The requests made by Department Heads always far exceed the amount of money the Town can spend. It is, therefore, the duty of your Finance Committee to make an in-depth study of all departments and then make our recommendations accordingly. We would also like to remind you that when you are limited to the amount of money you can spend, you must realize that an increase to one department must mean a decrease to someone else. We, of the Finance Committee, try to see that you get the most for your tax dollars. We cannot do this alone. All we can do is make recommendations. We need your presence to back us up.

If the number of parking spaces in any such area is more than fifteen but not more than twenty-five, one parking space; more than twenty-five but not more than forty, five percent of such spaces but not less than two; more than forty but not more than one hundred, four percent of such spaces but not less than three; more than one hundred but not more than two hundred, three percent of such spaces but not less than four; more than two hundred but not more than five hundred, two percent of such spaces but not less than six; more than five hundred but not more than one thousand, one and one-half percent of such spaces but not less than ten; more than one thousand but not more than two thousand, one percent of such spaces but not less than fifteen; more than two thousand but less than five thousand, three-fourths of one percent of such spaces but not less than twenty; and more than five thousand, one-half of one percent of such spaces but not less than thirty.

B. Parking spaces designated as reserved under the provisions of paragraph (a) shall be identified by the use of above grade signs with white lettering against a blue background and shall bear the words "Handicapped Parking: Special Place Required. Unauthorized Vehicles May be Removed at Owner's Expense"; shall be near as possible to a building entrance or walkway; shall be adjacent to curb ramps or other unobstructed methods permitting sidewalk access to a handicapped person; and shall be twelve feet wide or two eight-foot wide areas with four feet of cross hatch between them.

C. No vehicle shall be left parked or standing in any area designated for use by disabled veterans or handicapped persons as authorized by Section 19A, or in

such manner as to obstruct a curb ramp designed for use by handicapped persons as a means of egress to a street or public way.

The penalty for violation of this by-law shall be as follows:

For the first offense, fifteen dollars; for the second offense, twenty-five dollars; for each subsequent offense, the vehicle may be removed according to the provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 266, Section 120D, or to do or act in any manner relative thereto.

This permit shall be subject to the same conditions listed in section A of this By-Law, and its issuance shall be contingent upon the existence of a permit for the erection, rebuilding or remodeling of a permanent building on the same lot.
- C. On written application by the owner of record of any lot in a Commercial or Industrial District, the Building Inspector may issue a permit for the use on said lot of a unit as a temporary office for a business or other purposes upon such terms as the Building Inspector may require. No unit under this paragraph (c) shall be used for residential purposes.”
