SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

MONDAY, JANUARY 23, 1989

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Carver High School Auditorium, Monday, January 23, 1989, pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen, dated December 27, 1988.

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 P.M. with 230 registered voters, by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans. The appointed tellers were as follows: John Peritizian, Sylvia Best, Judith Kivi, Roberta Perry and Cheryl Caron.

After the Pledge of Allegiance, the meeting proceeded to act on the articles in the Warrant as follows:

Article 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and motion to amend by Joan M. White, Chairman of the Wage and Personnel Board, it was unanimously voted for the town to establish a Longevity Plan for all permanent full-time non-union employees, to be included in the Personnel Plan as follows:

YEARS EMPLOYED	ANNUAL LONGEVITY PLAN
1-4	\$ 0.0
5-9	250.00
10-14	500.00
15-19	750.00
Over 20	1,000.00

Employees will be paid on the first pay period following anniversary date of continuous employment service with the Town of Carver. All employees must be members of the Plymouth County Retirement Association to be eligible. Date of employment will be determined by the Town of Carver or Plymouth County Retirement records, if discrepancies occur. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Alan Dunham, and discussion by Arthur P. DeCoursey to amend this article to have all money articles be held until April Special Town Meeting, within April Town Meeting. This motion was defeated. Alan Dunham continued on with his motion to amend this article, which was unanimously voted as follows: "That the Town vote to transfer the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Town Employees Salaries Account, as voted under Article 16, Special Town Meeting of September 22, 1986, to a Longevity Plan Account, retroactive to July 1, 1988. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Erwin K. Washburn, with a Standing Vote of 193 yea, 8 nea, and a 2/3rd vote required, it was so passed that the vote passed under Article 21 at the Special Town Meeting held on May 23, 1988 is hereby amended so that said vote shall provide that a portion of the proceeds of the bonds or notes authorized thereby for remodeling, reconstruction, or making extraordinary repairs to the Carver Public School Buildings may be expended for the purpose of removing asbestos from the Governor John Carver School and for replacing the boiler and making other extraordinary repairs to the Town Hall heating system. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously voted for the town to transfer the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars from the Ambulance Fund Account to the Ambulance Operating Account for the purpose of purchasing a Cardiac Defibrillator and Hepatitis Serum for the EMT and personnel working with the Ambulance. Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Alan Dunham, Town Treasurer/Collector, it was so passed for the Town to transfer the sum of Eighteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$18,500.00) Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Town Employees Salaries Account, as voted under Article 16, Special Town Meeting of September 22, 1986, to a Workmens' Compensation Insurance Account.

Article 6. This article was withdrawn by Police Chief, Thomas S. Orr. This was a "No Action" by the Finance Committee.

Article 7. This article was not a legal article and withdrawn by Police Chief, Thomas S. Orr. This was a "Unanimous not to recommend vote" by the Finance Committee.

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded and upon discussion by Alan I. Dunham, Treasurer/Collector, with a 9/10th vote needed, with 243 registered voters present.

1st count 182 yea - 23 nea 2nd count 202 yea - 30 nea

This article to pay the unpaid bills of 1988 was NOT PASSED. This article was unanimously recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 9. Upon motion duly made and seconded, with discussion and reading of a letter by Claire DeLoid, and with motion to amend this article by Selectman Frank Kane, it was unanimously voted for the Town to transfer the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Town Employees Salaries Account as voted under Article 16, Special Town Meeting of September 22, 1986, to a Special Investigator of Chapter 21E, D.E.Q.E. Notice Account, under the direction of the Board of Selectmen and Board of Health. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded and discussion on the floor by Steve DiRado of the Planning Board, and with a 2/3rd vote required, 202 yea - 17 nea, it was so Passed for the Town to amend the Zoning Map of the Town of Carver to change from Residential Agricultural District - to Business - Commercial District, the following described parcel of land abutting Montello Street containing 4.3 acres of land and bounded and described as follows: NORTHERLY by Carver-Plympton town line approximately 95 feet:

SOUTHWESTERLY

by Carver-Plympton town line, approximately 95 feet; by land now or formerly of Robert W. Shurtleff, Jr. and Jenny L. Shurtleff approximately 380 feet; and

NORTHEASTERLY

by that portion of Lots 3 and 3-1 on Sheet 24 of the Town of Carver Assessors' Maps now within a Business-Commercial District on the Zoning Map of the Town of Carver, approximately 905 feet.

The foregoing change in the Zoning Map of the Town of Carver being intended to include within a Business-Commercial District all of Lot 3 and Lot 3-1 shown on

Sheet 24 of the Town of Carver Assessors Map. (This article was recommended by the Finance Committee).

Article 11. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Francis J. Kane, Selectman, it was unanimously voted to label this article the April, 1989 Annual Town Meeting. This article was "unanimous no action" by the Finance Committee.

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Albert R. DeLoid, Chairman, Board of Health, it was unanimously voted for the Town to transfer the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars from the Board of Health Salaries Account to the Board of Health Operating Account. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 13. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Albert R. DeLoid, Chairman, Board of Health, it was unanimously voted for the town to transfer the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred (\$4,500.00) Dollars from the Health Officer Account to the Board of Health Operating Account. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 14. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Albert R. DeLoid, Chairman of the Board of Health, and with much discussion on the floor from many cranberry growers. The amendment and the motion were withdrawn by Albert DeLoid. This article was unanimously not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 15. Upon motion duly made and seconded this article "To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Health to study the feasibility of town-wide trash collection", was unanimously OPPOSED. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

There being no further business to come before the meeting and upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to adjourn.

Meeting adjourned at 10:25 P.M.

After the Pledge of Allegiance, the meeting proceeded to act on the articles in the Warrant as follows:

Upon motion duly made and seconded, Selectman Francis J. Kane requested that a Temporary Town Clerk be appointed in the absence of the Town Clerk for this annual and Special Town Meeting. There motion was unanimously passed and Town Counsel, Harold Kowal, was so appointed.

Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Selectman Francis J. Kane, it was unanimously voted that no articles be considered at the Annual Town Meeting that exceed an expenditure of One (1) Dollar until after the Special Election to be held June 10, 1989.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted for the Town to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1989, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period or less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17. The Finance Committee recommends this article.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted for the Town to authorize the Treasurer to enter into a compensating balance or agreements for the Fiscal Year 1990 pursuant to Chapter 44, Section 53F of the General Laws. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee. Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted for the Town to hear the report of any standing committee and to abolish any special committee not submitting a report unless otherwise voted and to establish any new committees. The following committees reported:

MONDAY, APRIL 24, 1989

A Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Carver High School on Monday, April 24, 1989 at 8:00 P.M., pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated March 8, 1989.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M., by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans, there being a quorum present. The appointed tellers were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties by the Moderator. The tellers were as follows:

Joan White Carolyn Brennan Sylvia Best Robert Bentley Bernard Gid Helen Copello

Article 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Selectman Francis J. Kane, to delete all language following "public water system" and further to reduce the amount to \$5,000.00. it was unanimously voted to DEFEAT this article.

(To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Sixteen Thousand (\$16,000.00) Dollars for legal and engineering services to prepare enabling legislation to obtain State authority to establish a public water system. [And to fund said purpose, the Treasurer be and hereby is directed to transfer a sum of money to cover initial project costs as required and to borrow from time to time, any or all of the project costs (reduced as supplemental by any State or other grant) under and pursuant to Chapter 44, Section 8, Subdivision 5 and other authority thereto enabling without limitation Chapter 456 of the Acts of 1908 and all acts in amendment thereof: that the Board of Selectmen authorized as appropriate, may contract for engineering and legal services for said project.]

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred (\$1,200.00) Dollars to the Workmens' Compensation Insurance Account. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and motion to amend by Erwin K. Washburn "that the sum of \$250,000.00 is hereby appropriated for constructing, originally equipping and furnishing a maintenance building for the repair of Town vehicles and equipment, including costs incidental and related thereto, and that to raise such appropriation, the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen is authorized to borrow this amount under and pursuant to Chapter 44, Section 7 (3) of the General Laws, as amended, or any other enabling authority and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor, I further move that no money shall be borrowed until the town votes to exclude said amount from Prop. 2 1/2 so called." With a 2/3rd voted needed, standing vote, 116 yea - 112 nea, this article was NOT PASSED.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Gary Weston to take this article out of order it was SO PASSED. With discussion by Frank R. Mazzilli, Selectman, it was SO PASSED that this article be withdrawn for further study until next Special Town Meeting. (Earth Removal By-Law Section 90.)

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Robert Bentley, Member of the Aquifer Protection By-Law Study Committee, and recommendation by Stephen DiRado of the Planning Board, it was unanimously voted to accept to amend the Town of Carver Zoning By-Laws by adding the following section:

Section 14.0 The Water Resource Protection District

14.1 Purpose

The Water Resource Protection Districts are intended to protect the public health, safety, and welfare by preventing contamination of, and preserving the quantity of ground and surface water which provides existing or potential water supply for the Towns residents, cranberry growers, institutions and businesses. 14.2 Definitions

 For the purpose of this section, the following terms shall be defined as follows: <u>Agricultural use</u> - land in agricultural use means land primarily used in the raising of animals, fruits, vegetables, berries, nuts, or other food for human consumption, feed for animals, tobacco, flowers, sod, trees, nursery or greenhouse products, and ornamental plants and shrubs, or in raising forest products under a planned program; or when primarily and directly used in a related manner which is incidental thereto and represents a customary and necessary use in raising such products and preparing them for market. <u>Hazardous waste</u> - materials as defined and regulated by 310 CMR 30.00 et seq. (Massachusetts Hazardous Waste Management Regulations). <u>Impervious Surface</u> - material covering the ground, including but not limited to macadam, concrete, pavement, and buildings that does not allow surface water to penetrate into the soil (cranberry bogs are not considered impervious surfaces).

<u>Maximum groundwater elevation</u> - the height of the groundwater table when it is at its maximum level or elevation. This level is usually reached during the months of December through April and allowances should be made therefore at other times of the year.

<u>Solid waste</u> - unwanted or discarded solid material with insufficient liquid content to be free flowing, including limitation rubbish, garbage, junk refuse and ash. The term does not include negative impost, tree stumps and brush under 200 cubic yards.

<u>Special Permit Granting Authority (SPGA)</u> - the members of the Carver Planning Board.

Toxic or hazardous materials - any substance or mixture of such physical, chemical or infectious characteristics as to pose a significant, actual or potential hazard to water supplies and to human health, if such materials were discharged to land or waters of this Town. Toxic or hazardous materials include, without limitation, petroleum products, heavy metals, radioactive materials, virulent infectious wastes, pesticides, herbicides, solvents, thinners and other materials which are listed as U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Priority Pollutants.

14.3 Applicability

1. Water Resource Protection Districts shall be considered as overlying other zoning districts.

2. The applicability of this section to existing uses or structures and to projects legally begun at the time of adoption, shall be governed by the Town of Carver By-Laws.

3. The provisions of Part 14.4.2 (except 14.4.2.d) shall not apply to land in agricultural use or land being constructed for agricultural use as defined above.

14.4 Use Regulations

1. The following uses are prohibited:

a. Solid waste disposal facilities, including without limitation landfills and junk and salvage yards, that require a site assignment from the Board of Health under M.G.L., Ch. 111, s.150A (the Landfill Site Assignment Law) and regulations adopted by the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering, 310 CMR 19.00;

b. Storage of hazardous wastes in quantities as defined by the Massachusetts Hazardous Waste Management Regulations by a "large quantity generator" including without limitation chemical wastes, radioactive wastes and waste oil;

c. Disposal of hazardous wastes.

d. Disposal of snow that contains de-icing chemicals and that has been brought in from outside the District;

2. If, in the judgement of the Special Permit Granting Authority, the Design Operation Standards in Part 14.6 are adequately satisfied, the following uses may be allowed upon issuance of a Special Permit and subject to such conditions as the SPGA may impose. Failure to comply with the terms and conditions of a Special Permit shall be grounds for revocation of said permit.

a. Major construction projects requiring review of the Carver Planning Board, and which are subject to site plan review;

b. Any uses where more than 10,000 square feet of any lot would be rendered impervious (not to include roadways).

c. Underground storage of petroleum and other refined petroleum products, including without limitation gasoline, waste oil, and diesel fuel, except within buildings which it will heat or where it currently exist., The SPGA shall be notified prior to the replacement of any tanks. Replacement tanks shall be double walled (or current state of the art) tanks and shall be of the same gallonage or less. Large tanks shall require a permit under this By-Law.

d. Storage of road salt or other de-icing chemicals in quantities greater than for normal household use;

e. Manufacture, use, storage, or disposal of toxic or hazardous materials as part of a[principal activity, but excluding domestic activities and pesticide applications for normal agricultural use.

f. Motor vehicle service stations, repair garages, car washes, truck or bus terminals, heliports (excluding helistops), airports, electronic

manufacturing, metal plating, commercial chemical and bacteriological laboratories, and dry cleaning establishments using toxic or hazardous materials on site; 14.5 Site Plan Approval

Any application for a special permit shall be made, reviewed and acted upon in accordance with the following procedures:

1. Each application for a special permit shall be filed in writing with the SPGA and shall contain a complete description of the proposed use, together with any supporting information and plans which the SPGA may require. Submissions should include appropriate engineering data to provide a basis for reviewing the impact of the proposed activity on the Aquifer Protection Districts.

2. The SPGA shall refer copies of the application to the Board of Health, Conservation Commission, and the Department of Public Works, which shall review, either jointly or separately, the application and shall submit their recommendations to the SPGA. Failure to make recommendations within 35 days of the referral of the application shall be deemed lack of opposition.

3. The SPGA shall hold a public hearing on the application, in conformity with the provisions of M.G.L. Ch. 40A within 65 days after the filing of the application with the SPGA. A written notice of this public hearing will be made by the applicant to all abettors, and proof of notification will be furnished to the SPGA. In addition, this notice will be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the Town not less than 14 days prior to the hearing.

4. After notice and public hearing, and after due consideration of the reports and recommendations of the local boards/departments, the SPGA may grant such a special permit provided that it finds the proposed use:

a. is in accordance with the provisions of Section 14.6;

b. is in harmony with the purpose and intent of the Bylaw and will promote the purposes of the Groundwater Protection Districts;

c. is appropriate to the natural topography, soils and other characteristics of the site to be developed;

d. will not, during construction or thereafter, have an adverse environmental impact on the aquifer or recharge area (i.e. quality or quantity of groundwater); and

e. will not adversely affect an existing or potential water resource.

14.6 Design and Operation Standards

1. <u>Safeguards</u>-Provision shall be made to adequately protect against toxic or hazardous materials discharge or loss through corrosion, accidental damage, spillage or vandalism through such measures as provision for spill control in the vicinity of chemical or fuel delivery points, secure storage areas for toxic and hazardous materials, and indoor storage provisions for corrodible or dissolvable materials.

2. <u>Disposal-No</u> disposal of hazardous wastes within Water Resource Protection Districts shall occur. All provisions of M.G.L., Ch. 111, s. 150A (the Landfill Site Assignment Law) and M.G.L., Ch. 21C (the Massachusetts Hazardous Waste Management Act) shall be adequately satisfied.

3. <u>Fill</u>-Fill material used in a Water Resource Protection District shall contain no solid waste, toxic or hazardous material, or hazardous wastes. Adequate documentation shall be provided to ensure proper condition of the fill. The SPGA may require soil testing by a certified laboratory at the applicant's expense.

4. <u>Spill containment</u>-For industrial and commercial uses, an emergency response plan to prevent contamination of soil or water in the event of accidental spills or the release of toxic or hazardous materials shall be submitted to the SPGA, if deemed necessary, for approval prior to granting of a Special Permit. Recommendations of the Fire Department on said plan shall be sought.

5. <u>Monitoring</u>-Periodic monitoring shall be required when the site locations and land use activities indicate a significant risk of contamination to the water resource as determined by the SPGA based upon recommendations of the Department of Public Works, Board of Health, Conservation Commission and/or the SPGA. Such monitoring may include analyses of water or soil for appropriate substances and installation of groundwater monitoring wells constructed and located as specified by the Department of Public Works, Board of Health, the Conservation Commission and the SPGA. All monitoring wells must meet and exceed the proposed or current DEQE design standards for monitoring well installation. All costs will be borne by the owner of the premises.

6. <u>On-site recharge</u>-All storm water runoff from impervious surfaces shall be recharged on-site unless in conducting site plan review it is determined that either recharge is infeasible because of site conditions or is undesirable because of uncontrollable risks to water quality from such recharge. Such recharge shall be by surface infiltration through vegetated surfaces unless otherwise approved by the SPGA during site plan review. If dry wells or leaching basins are approved for use, they shall be preceded by oil, grease and sediment traps except for specific exemptions allowed by State statutes. Drainage from loading areas for toxic or hazardous materials shall be separately collected for safe disposal.

14.7 Enforceability

Failure to comply with the provisions of the Carver Aquifer Protection bylaw may constitute grounds for legal action.

Whoever violates any provision of the Bylaw shall be punished by a fine of not more than three hundred dollars (\$300.00). Each day or portion thereof of continuing violation shall constitute a separate offense.

14.8 District Delineations

The Water Supply Protection Districts are as follows:

All areas shown on the proposed sole source aquifer maps as developed by the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Quality Engineering. Said areas encompass all of the Town of Carver with the exception of the northwestern section of the Town bounded by approximately Fuller Street and Main Street.

14.9 Provisions

The provisions of this By-Law are severable; and if any provision or the application of such provision to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, this shall not affect the remaining provisions or take any other action thereto (Aquifer Protection By-Law Study Committee). This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and discussion by Fire Chief Dana Harriman and David Boucher, of the South Carver Fire Station Study Committee, and motion that the sum of \$650,000.00 is hereby appropriated for constructing, originally equipping and furnishing a new South Carver Fire Station including costs incidental and related thereto and that to raise this appropriation, the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen is authorized to borrow this amount under and pursuant to Chapter 44, Section 7(3) of the General Laws, as amended, or any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor. I further move that no money shall be

borrowed until the town votes to exclude said amount form Prop. 2 1/2 so called. With a standing 2/3rd vote, required, this article was DEFEATED. yea 91 nea 101

Article 9. Upon motion duly made and seconded and discussion by Robert Malonson it was unanimously voted to continue the General By-Laws as is and that a Study Committee consisting of (5) five members be appointed by the Selectmen to study amendments of this Article XIII Town By-Laws.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend, it was SO PASSED for the Town to purchase Department Equipment from the proceeds of bonds or notes as part of the authorization to borrow for this purpose voted under Article 1 of the Special Town Meeting of April 28, 1986, Adjourned Session of May 5, 1986, as follows:

This article was SO PASSED yea 86, nea 48. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was SO PASSED for the Town to transfer from available funds in the Treasury, the sum of Five Thousand Nine Hundred Sixty-two Dollars and Eighty-one Cents (\$5,962.81) to the Department Equipment State House Notes-Issue of 8/15/88 Account. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was SO VOTED to reconvene on Wednesday, April 26, 1989 at 7:30 P.M. Meeting adjourned at 10:30 P.M.

The adjourned session of the Annual Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held at the Carver High School on Wednesday, April 26, 1989 at 7:30 P.M., pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated March 7, 1989.

The meeting was called to order at 7:35 P.M., by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans, there being a quorum present. The appointed tellers were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties by the Moderator. The tellers were as follows: Carolyn Brennan, Joan White, Helen Copello, and Sylvia Best.

After the Pledge of Allegiance, the meeting proceeded to act on the Articles in the Warrant as follows:

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was SO VOTED to take NO ACTION on articles 26-27-28 and 29.

(Article 26-Carver Housing Authority, a parcel of town owned land, or any portion thereof, identified by Assessors Map #52, Plot #3, consisting of approximately 9.4 acres, for the development of low and moderate income family housing and/or special needs housing.)

Article 27. Carver Housing Authority, a parcel of town owned land, identified by Assessors Map #74 Plot #16, consisting of approximately 0.77 acre, for the development of Special Needs Housing.

Article 28. Carver Housing Authority, a parcel of town owned land identified by the Assessors Map #51, Plot #3-7, consisting of approximately 1.38 acres, for the development of low and moderate income family housing and /or special needs' housing.

Article 29. Carver Housing Authority, a parcel or parcels of town owned or tax title land of sufficient size for the development of six (6) duplexes (12 units) of low and moderate income family housing and/or a special needs' residence for eight (8) residents and staff.

Article 30. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted to postpone action on this article until June town Meeting. (Re-Zoning Tremont St. Ind. District.)

Article 31. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and motion to amend by Selectman Frank R. Mazzilli, it was unanimously voted to withdraw this article.

Article 32. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously voted for the Town to amend its General By-Laws as follows:

Article 1-Section 1-insert the words "or May" after the word April.

Article 36. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was SO VOTED to take out of order, it was so voted, yea 114-nea 26 and that the town to raise and appropriate the sum of One (\$1.00) Dollar to create the Board of Health Technical Review Account and accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44 Section 53E relative to this account.

Article 35. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was SO PASSED, yea 82-nea 21, with a 2/3rd vote required that the town adopt the following By-Law as Article 23 of the Town of Carver By-Laws:

The Board of Health is charged with collecting users fees to reimburse the town for costs, including monitoring costs, associated with the landfilling of waste and other material within the Town of Carver. Such waste may be collected within or outside the Town of Carver. The fees will be set on a tonnage basis and collected in conjunction with the enforcement of regulations promulgated under Mass. General Laws, Chapter 111, Section 31A and 31B.

Article 40. Upon motion duly made and seconded, this article was UNANIMOUSLY DEFEATED.

Article 41. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously voted for the Town to accept the changes of the Town Clerks' fees as authorized by the Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 262, Section 34, Clauses 1-79, to become effective by motion to amend by Town Treasurer, Alan I. ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Adjourned Session JUNE 14, 1989 - WEDNESDAY

The Adjourned Session of the Annual Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver, was held at the Carver High School, Wednesday, June 14, 1989 at 7:30 o'clock P.M., pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen, dated March 7, 1989. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans, there being a quorum present. The appointed tellers were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties by the Moderator. The tellers were as follows: Linda Harrington, Diane Skoog, Joan Simmons, and Elizabeth LeBel.

After the Pledge of Allegiance, the meeting proceeded to act on the articles in the Warrant as follows:

Before starting with the articles, the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans, requested the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Daniel Ryan, to explain the Recap Preparation Sheet for the town which consists of net levy, raise and appropriate and estimate receipts. It was also stated at this time that Police Chief, Thomas S. Orr, will not need to make any cuts in his department.

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by the Town Treasurer/Collector, Alan I. Dunham, it was SO PASSED, for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Thousand (\$70,000.00) Dollars to meet interest charges on temporary loans. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee, 5 yes 2 abstained.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Alan I. Dunham, Treasurer/Collector, it was SO PASSED, for the Town to transfer the sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars from Free Cash and to raise and appropriate the

sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars to the 1990 Fiscal Year Reserve Account. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

This article was recommended unanimously by the Finance Committee.

Article 17. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Finance Committee Chairman Daniel Ryan, it was unanimously voted for the town to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars for the Towns participation in the Plymouth County Rape Crisis Center. This article was unanimously recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 18. Upon motion duly made and seconded, this article was WITHDRAWN by Erwin K. Washburn, Chairman Carver School Committee. It was unanimously voted.

Article 19. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Erwin K. Washburn, it was SO PASSED for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Forty-one Thousand Six Hundred Ninety-seven (\$141,697.00) Dollars for the purpose of operating buses to provide transportation of Carver students to and from the Regional Schools; said sum to be offset by estimated receipts from Plymouth-Carver Regional School District.

Article 23. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously voted for the Town to authorize the Board of Sclectmen to appoint the five (5) members of the Shurtleff Park Advisory Committee as Trustees for Shurtleff Park, and to further allow the Trustees to accept donations or appropriations which may be used for the Park in any respect by the said Trustees by a majority voted. The Finance Committee recommended "no action" on this article.

Article 24. Upon motion duly made and seconded and after discussion by Marguerite E. Mills of the Bicentennial Committee and by motion to amend by Finance Committee Chairman, Daniel T. Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Alan I. Dunham, Treasurer/Collector, it was SO PASSED that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Eighty five and 25/100 Dollars (\$1,685.25) to the Treasurer-Clerical Account and the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Eight-five and 25/100 Dollars (\$1,685.25) to the Town Accountant Clerical Account in order that the combined position be increased from part-time (20 hours) to full time (35 hours) effective the week following this Special Town Meeting.

The Finance Committee did recommend this article but the Wage and Personnel Board did not.

Article 5. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to accept by Alan I. Dunham, Treasurer/Collector; this article was DEFEATED. (Request of funds for adjustment of Wage and Personnel Board category on Personnel). Not recommended by Finance Committee or wage and Personnel Board.

Article 6. This article was withdrawn by Selectman Francis J. Kane at the beginning of this meeting.

There being no further business to come before the meeting and upon motion duly made and seconded it was unanimously voted to adjourn this meeting.

Board of Assessors

Fiscal 1990 saw the conversion of the Assessor's billing and valuation data to an in-house computer system. This will allow us to maintain more accurate records and increase the efficiency of our office.

The Assessor's Office was directly involved in securing \$209,000 in emergency funding, to be used to help offset the deficit created by the State's financial crisis.

In September 1989, Patriot Properties, Inc., commenced work on a full revaluation of all property in Carver. This project will include inspection of a majority of all properties and the establishment of new valuation for Fiscal 1991.

In keeping with the office policy on education, Assessor Earl Healey, successfully completed Assessor's Course 101, and was certified by the Department of Revenue to classify property.

Assessor Charles Hamilton and Assistant-Assessor Judith Yelle, attended a computer science course, and clerical staff members' Brid Jackimowicz and Becky Williams completed Assessor's Course 200. "Principles of Assessing Procedures"

We have remained active in the Plymouth County Assessors' Association during the year, with Assistant-Assessor Judith Yelle, elected to the office of Vice President and Assessor Charles Hamilton appointed as a sub-committee for the Chapter 61A Study Committee.

In more routine matters, the office staff processed 495 property transfers; 59 plans for land splits and sub-divisions; 300 building permits and 955 excise tax abatements. There were also 278 applications for abatements and 169 applications for tax exemptions were logged, reviewed and either granted or denied by the Board of Assessors.

Office of Emergency Preparedness/ Civil Defense

The Emergency Preparedness/Civil Defense Department has completed their first year in the new Emergency Operations Center (EOC), located in the Police Department

This past year has seen the department working with the Fire Department and Department of Environmental Quality Engineering (DEQE) to help put a plan together that would evacuate a section in the northern part of the Town due to the investigation of the North Carver Landfill. Letters were sent to the households involved and with their cooperation we were able to have the information regarding people who may have needed a means of transportation or any handicap that would need special attention if we did have to evacuate. With the cooperation of the School Superintendent, School Personnel, Transportation Officer and Board of Health we felt we had the best possible plan. Fortunately, we did not have to use this plan.

We have also completed a successful exercise on September 20th and a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) drill on October 12th and 13th. The drill is a requirement of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and conducted according to the guidelines of NUREG-0654. We are presently waiting for a full report regarding the drill. The disasters of the earthquake and hurricane Hugo had taken all the manpower available of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and therefore reports will not be available until some time the end of February or beginning of March. The initial review of the exercise was held on Sunday, October 15th at the Taunton Regency and Carvers evaluation was excellent. This mark of excellence is to be credited by the individual departments of the Town involved with the drill plus many loyal volunteers who came forward when they were needed.

We continue to look for volunteers for different positions that are still available in the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in case of an accident either at Pilgrim or any natural disaster. Since our Town Report last year we have had several people come forward and fill positions and we will be having further training as the year progresses.

The Carver Emergency Preparedness/Civil Defense Department wishes to extend a thank you to the residents of Carver, MCDA-Area II staff and all volunteers for their cooperation and support of this past year.

Council on Aging

The Carver Council on Aging is a town department established to serve and assist the senior population of our community, 59 years of age and older. The COA Offices, Drop-In-Center and Nutrition Center are housed in the Marcus Atwood House, located at Lakeview and Tremont Streets in South Carver. This multi-purpose center is open Monday through Friday from 9:AM until 4:PM, except for legal holidays.

Professional staff members (paid and volunteer) implement the programs and services established and authorized by the COA Board of Directors. Federal, state and local funds support a variety of services and programs focused on the needs of our senior citizens. Grants (public and private) also contribute to the financial support of this department.

Professional Services

Certified social workers are available for screening interviews, counseling and referral assistance. Counseling is also available for Social Security & SSI assistance, legal assistance provided by Southeastern Legal Assistance Corp., other social service needs, fuel assistance, tax preparation assistance, insurance assistance through S.H.I.N.E. (Serving Health Information Needs of Seniors) and health assistance in conjunction with the Carver Public Health Nurses. Free hearing tests are offered quarterly, free blood pressure tests are offered monthly along with annual flu shots and cholesterol tests that are provided at a modest fee. An Outreach Program has been added to our service.

Guest speakers are scheduled as appropriate to keep seniors informed of governmental regulations and/or changes, insurance, health related issues and other topics of interest to seniors. The Carver Senior Organization also hold their monthly meetings at the Marcus Atwood House. They too schedule guest speakers and have planned activities of interest to senior citizens.

Senior identification cards are issued by the COA and an updated list of businesses that offer senior citizen discounts has been completed and is available to seniors.

Government surplus food distribution is also administered quarterly by the COA to eligible persons.

Daily Telephone Reassurance program available for seniors living alone or in isolated areas of town. Vial of Life kits are available to anyone and can be obtained at the COA office. A Loan Closet is provided by the COA & Public Health Nurses for persons needing walkers, crutches, wheelchairs, bed pans, etc. Magazines, books and puzzles available for loan as well. A Coupon Exchange file is maintained and offered to seniors wishing to extend their purchasing power. Breads and pastries from Purity Supreme and Angelos distributed weekly at the Atwood House.

Transportation

Curb-to-curb transportation is available to the elderly and disabled persons living in our community. Operated by the COA, a GATRA (Greater Attleboro Taunton Regional Authority) mini-lift-bus, and lift-van are in service Monday through Friday for scheduled trips to shopping malls, super markets, medical appointments, social & recreational activities and for special events. A one dollar round-trip fare is accepted.

Nutrition

Congregate meals are served Monday through Friday at our Nutrition Center, providing hot and nutritious meals with social interaction among senior citizens. Meals-on-Wheels are delivered to the frail and homebound seniors who qualify. A donation of one dollar twenty-five is accepted.

Drop-In Center/Social & Recreational

Our Drop-In Center is open daily, Monday through Friday from 9:AM until 4:PM for those wishing to read, play cards, bingo, shoot pool, watch TV or just engage in conversation with friends. Our facility is well heated in winter and air conditioned in summer. A VCR installed so that films can be enjoyed or used by guest speakers when they join us. Horseshoe & tennis courts located on Atwood property.

The COA has reserved lanes at Alley Kat Lanes in Kingston and provides transportation for our bowlers on Monday afternoons. Transportation to North Easton Fitness Center is provided on Tues. & Thurs. afternoons for participants in the Aqua Arthritic Swimming & Exercise Program.

Special day-trips to Old Sturbridge Village to view the fall foliage; Narragansett Bay for a days cruise, LaSalette Shrine to view the Christmas lights, the Middleborough Historical Museum, etc. were so popular that more trips are being planned for the coming year: theater trips, musicals, ice shows, sporting events, flower show, etc.

Friend's of the COA, Inc. sponsor various fundraising dinner/dances and will be planning more for the coming year. Our Annual Chicken BBQ and St. Patrick's Day Corned Beef & Cabbage Dinner were very successful this past year as was our Summer Frolic, Halloween Party and Valentine's Day Buffet/Dance.

Newsletter

To keep our senior population informed of activities, programs and matters of particular interest to them, we now distribute a monthly newsletter. Increased postage cost and related expenses prevent us from mailing the newsletter, but they are available for pick-up at the Town Hall, Carver Public Library, Atwood House and in the stores and businesses that advertise in our publication. Newsletters are also distributed on our GATRA buses and with the help and assistance from the mobile home parks, distributed along with their own newsletters.

Sustaining Membership

Friends of COA have launched a Sustaining Membership drive with a goal of 2,000 members. Annual membership fee: \$5 for individuals and \$10 for businesses & organizations. Sixty per cent for "building fund" with forty percent for "operating expenses."

The staff are always willing to update their skills and improve their clinical practice.

During 1989 we were able to add some new & exciting services at no costs to the town.

- -Geriatric Social Worker, Susan Gates, was able to make home visits to our patients through a grant at Jewish Family & Children's Services.
- -Diabetic Screenings in conjunction with Thayer Pharmacy.
- -Home nutritional consultation through Old Colony Elder Services.
- -Relationship with Curry College to provide field placement for R.N. students.
- -Quality Assurance Audits done collaboratively with the staff of CURA VNA of Plymouth & Pembroke Public Health Nurses
- -Seminar on Medigap insurance policies (to supplement Medicare) presented at South Meadow Village

With the side range of experience and expertise of our staff, we are able to meet most requests from the community. If you or your group would like a speaker on a specific medical topic, please call the nurses office and we will do our best to fill that request. Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging

As your representatives to the Old Colony Planning Council, Area Agency on Aging Advisory Committee, we are pleased to present this report of the Area Agency's activities for 1989.

The Old Colony Planning Council, acting as the Area Agency on Aging, is responsible for administering Title III funds under the Older Americans Act in the twenty-three communities in the service area. The Area Agency funds and coordinates a wide range of community, in-home and nutrition services through local Councils on Aging and other elder service agencies. In addition, the Area Agency periodically conducts surveys to identify the needs of elders and to develop services to address these needs.

During this year, the Area Agency conducted a comprehensive needs assessment survey of elders in the entire service area. Four subgroups of the elderly population were surveyed: congregate and home delivered meal recipients, elders who participate at senior centers, and homebound elders who do not receive home delivered meals. A total of 1419 elders were surveyed. The results of the survey were compiled for each community and for the entire region. In addition, a small survey of nursing and rest home residents was also conducted this year.

In 1989, several communities received funding assistance under Title III-B of the older Americans Act. In the area of senior center programs and development, the following communities were assisted, Avon for senior center renovations; Brockton for the Dorn-Davies Senior Center; East Bridgewater for architectural designs; Hanover for minor energy conservation improvements; Plymouth for senior center programs; and, Whitman for senior center equipment.

Other communities which received assistance included Carver for an outreach program; Easton for arthritis assistance programs; Hanover for a chore and home repair program; and Plympton for a Rent-A-Kid Program.

Several regional programs which provide services in all or part of the service area also received funding. Included among these regional programs are two programs administered by the Area Agency on Aging-The Volunteer Transportation Program and the Nursing Home Ombudsman Program. Old Colony Elderly Services administered the Emergency Assistance Program for elders with extraordinary needs and the Minibus Program which assisted elders in eight communities with group transportation.

Other regional programs funded this year include the legal assistance for elders, home health aide, and home-based geriatric mental health programs. Also, several programs which assist elders with special needs, including those who are deaf, blind and physically disabled, were funded.

Nutrition services in the form of congregate and home delivered meals continued to be funded through Title III-C monies in many communities in the service area. During 1989, significant expansion occurred in the nutrition program. New congregated sites were established in Hanover, Rockland and at the North Field Congregate Housing development in Plymouth. Also, for the first time, kosher meals were made available at the South Area Jewish Community Center in Stoughton one day per week. These nutrition programs play an integral role in attending to both the social and nutritional needs of elders.

The Council gratefully acknowledges the generous support and cooperation of the Area Agency on Aging member communities, specifically the participation and involvement of the members of the Area Agency on Aging Advisory Committee and officers, Ms. Barbara Farnsworth, Chair., Marshfield, and Ms. Virginia Murray, Vice Chair., Plymouth. The Council also recognizes the work of local boards and commissions and the many government agencies, public and private institutions and individuals who have assisted the Council.

Carver residents are making use of every aspect of the library. The services provided are many and varied. Children come for the story hour program four times per week. Janet Banks and volunteer Barbara Carlson have worked up programs as a team. Children have also entered the Reading Raisin program, the Bedtime story hours in the summer, the Cranberry counting contest in the fall and the Hats off to Young Readers that was ongoing through the year. Mothers of children in the story hours read, met, and used library facilities while their children were in the story room.

There are Hats OFF to the wonderful volunteers who manned many posts throughout the library as the days for using the computer came closer. Louise Denehy and Catherine Salvesen devoted many hours to circulating books and book preparation so that staff could keep to the appointed task. New volunteers Chris DeMaggio, Margie Smith and Jan Konetchy put their good typing skills to use to enter all the material on the computer. Cindy Borden and Sue Hoge kept books on the shelves with Bob Weeks pitching in every so often. Others who helped were Ruth Donovan, Eileen Holzman, Karen Wegert and Bobby Seeley.

The Quilters held their annual show at the Library in May. They donated \$200.00 to the Friends of the Library. Friends of the Library is a very viable group this year. During Old Home Day, the Friends sold new and used books while a clown attracted and entertained young children. The Octoberfest held in the fall raised more money for the public use computer needed for patrons. The Friends also purchased tickets to the Fine Arts Museum and the Science Museum for use by patrons who are members of the Friends. These passes are free and must be reserved in advance. Since their inception at the library, they have been used 20 times.

Carver used the Edaville passes a total of 204 times, representing the many families who visited the attraction. The passes are hotly sought after when the lights go up in the fall. The winter list is signed up right after the first of November when the list is available.

Mr. Laurance Cole gave a talk to Carver residents about the cranberry bogs. The talk was accompanied by marvelous slides. The library hopes to have return engagements from Mr. Cole.

Groups using the library over the year: Friends of the Carver Pound, Captain P.A.L., Pond Study, Scouts, Site Planning, Public Health Nurses, Arts Lottery, Hazardous Waste, Literacy tutors, and Shurtleff Park Committee.

Mr. Charles Sears donated the fine Feynman <u>Lectures of Physics</u>, HRT Enterprises donated \$50.00, and Mrs. Virginia Keith Shaw donated the <u>Atlas of Plymouth County</u>, published by Geo Walker.

Interlibrary loan materials have come to the Carver patrons from all over the country. In an effort to fill requests, books have been received from all the participating libraries in the SEAL network plus colleges within the state such as Wellesley, MIT, Northeastern and Cape Cod Comm. Coll. States from which we received books were Pennsylvania, Utah, California, Texas, Conn., New York and New Jersey. Clearly, residents are using the services of the library.

Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension

Cooperative Extension is located on High Street, Hanson (on the grounds of the County Hospital). Cooperative Extension is a partnership of the United States Department of Agriculture, the land-grant college, the University of Massachusetts, Amherst and county government. It is a nationwide informal educational program.

County Agents are specialists in programs targeted to Agriculture and Natural Resources; and Communities, Families and Youth (4-H).

Staff consists of a director, two regional agricultural specialists, a community resource development specialist, two home economists, two 4-H agents and a split position, 4-H/home horticulture. In addition, Cooperative Extension administers a federally funded nutrition education program. The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (E.F.N.E.P.), located in Brockton. This is staffed by a nutrition specialist and three program assistants who deliver educational programs to families with limited resources.

Cooperative Extension agents serve the public through planning and conducting educational conferences, workshops, phone call consultations, field visits and timely newsletters.

Plymouth County home economists this year worked with 849 welfare recipients using a newly developed curricula by Cooperative Extension specialists called "Life Skills".

In our 4-H program last year 9,358 youth were enrolled, either in the club programs, or exposed to 4-H through short-term projects. 356 volunteers assisted in conducting the county 4-H program.

3,432 residents received educational newsletter, Garden Clippings, a monthly horticulture fact-filled publication. Specialized letters for commercial agricultural enterprises are available (Small Fruit, Vegetables, Tree Fruits, Small Farms and Livestock) and received by 2,020 residents.

During this past year over 10,000 educational publication orders were processed by the county office staff. Soil pH tests were done for 307 county residents. In Plymouth County over 504 educational outreach programs were conducted last year.

Your County Cooperative Extension office can be of service to you by calling (617)293-3541 or 447-5946, Monday through Friday, 8:30 am-4:30 pm.

County Cooperative Extension works on key issues related to Youth Development, Water, Nutrition Education, Agriculture and Family Life Programs. Throughout Plymouth County this agency provides teacher trainings, teen programs and projects, volunteer opportunities, and numerous educational programs for all ages.

New this year County Cooperative Extension began a video lending library. Brochures on this were distributed to all Town Halls and Libraries.

Due to budget constraints County Cooperative Extension recently implemented a user fee schedule for programs, soil tests and selected newletters.

For the past two years Plymouth County Cooperative Extension attempted unsuccessfully to transfer the primary funding source from county dollars to state funds under the "University of Massachusetts". Currently the budget is provided by the Plymouth County Commissioners with approval by the County Financial Advisory Board (one selectman per town represented). Eleven counties in Massachusetts, during the past 6 years, have transferred to state funds. Currently Plymouth, Bristol and Barnstable remain county-funded. The Plymouth County Cooperative Extension budget is supplemented by \$200,000 of state and federal dollars; primarily to fund the Nutrition Education program, to fund educational mailings (\$25,000), and 1/10 appropriation toward county agent salaries.

Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 1989.

The Project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is now composed of 23 Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the Town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. The Project is a regional response to a regional problem and provides a way of organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees, and mosquito control professionals into a single agency with a broad geographical area of responsibility.

1989 was a year when overall mosquito production was higher than normal. The timing and amounts of rainfall were nearly optimal for the most bothersome mosquito species. Every single month from April through September had above normal rainfall. Trap collections of flood-water mosquitoes were far greater than ever before, significantly exceeding 1988 which had been the record year. In our operating area efforts aimed at immature larval mosquitoes were successful, but could not keep up with spreading populations. More and more reliance had to be placed on ultra low volume spraying to reduce adult mosquito populations to tolerable levels. All sprayers and trucks operated well and almost no time was lost to breakdowns. Employees pitched in and when needed, overtime work was carried out.

The threat of the mosquito transmitted disease Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) was low in 1989. There was some concern that this season's outbreak of EEE in the mid-atlantic states might spread northward. Some stepped-up spraying was carried out. No horse or human cases occurred. Virus was recovered from bird feeding mosquitoes. The recurring problem of EEE in southeastern Massachusetts continues to ensure cooperation between this Project and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health.

The figures specific to the Town of Carver are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect town lines the information given below does provide a tally of the activities which have had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of Carver residents.

Insecticide Application. 9,600 acres were treated using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in May and the last in September.

Aerial Application. Larviciding woodland swamps by airplane before the leaves come out on the trees continues to be very effective. In Carver this year we aerially larvicided 560 acres.

Finally, we have been tracking complaint response time, that is the time between notice of a mosquito problem and response by one of our inspectors. The complaint response time in the Town of Carver was less than two days.

Mosquito Species. <u>Culiseta melanura</u> was the dominant mosquito collected in the Carver trap. Other important mosquitoes collected included <u>Coquillettidia perturbans</u> and <u>Aedes vexans</u>.

We encourage citizens or municipal officials to call our office for information about mosquitoes, mosquito-borne diseases, control practices, or any other matters of concern.

Department of Public Works

The Honorable Board of Selectmen:

During the past year the accomplishments of your Board of Public Works were as follows:

New pavement done with grader leveling course. Plymouth St. 5,000', 22' wide; Meadow St. 2,000', 20' wide; Silva St. 3,000', 20' wide; Tremont St. 1,000', 26' wide. 1,600 tons.

Chapter projects done this year. Tremont St. 6,000' of binder was laid and 4,000' of top was laid at 26' width. 4,777.00 tons of binder and top was laid on Tremont Street. 4,000' of top to be laid this year. West St. was also a project this year. 6,375', 22' wide binder and top was placed. 2,329 tons binder and top was laid on West Street. Shoulder work, loam, grass seeding and line painting job was completed in the fall. Also, 6,000' of shoulder work, loaming and line painting was done on Tremont Street.

500' of drainage line was laid on West St. Drainage retention areas were cleaned this year in all of the housing projects. Sand sealing was done on the following streets: Wareham Street 4,800', 20' width. Stone chip sealing was done on Lakeview St. 3,300', 24' width; stone chip sealing was done on Holmes St. 1,400', 20' width; slurry seal Seipet Street 1,000', 19' width.

Line painting was done on the following streets: Meadow St. 23,232'; Wareham St. 14,520'; Lakeview St. 3,300'; 6,000 of Tremont St.,; Holmes St. 5,755'; West St. 6,000'; Forest St. 5,900'; Popes Point 6,680'; Plymouth St. 5,000'; Silva St. 7,000'; Purchase St. 6,800'; Federal Rd. 16,210'. All stop bars off Main St. and Purchase St. were repainted and all School Zones were repainted-106,397' L.F. total.

Street sweeping was done on the following streets: Rt. 58 from Plympton town line to the Wareham town line; S. Meadow Road and all housing developments that budget would allow.

There have been 18 burials this year. There have been 13 foundations put in thus far this year.

The new section of Central Cemetery was seeded and fertilized this spring. All cemeteries were also limed and fertilized this year.

Mowing was done this year on Rt. 58, Rt. 44, Silva Street, Purchase Street and S. Meadow Road. We would like to do more mowing if and when the budget will allow.

Our Public Safety account is seriously affected by the theft and vandalism of street and road marking signs. In the future, legal action will be taken against any individuals who are apprehended in any act of theft or vandalism.

Snow removal so far this year has been heavy. We have had serious ice on the roads in the mornings. We also have had numerous storms. Starting Thanksgiving Day, winter hit us. It has been very cold and we have had to do a lot of sanding. Hopefully, the rest of the winter will warm up. We have already used close to 900 tons of salt and 6,500 tons of sand.

The Youth Program, headed by Rocky Gomes, has done a lot of painting and maintenance of recreation areas. A thanks to them.

M.C.I. workers have also done a good job taking care of the cemeteries, cutting grass, trimming trees, fixing buildings, doing carpentry work at various town facilities. They pick up a lot of roadside trash. A thanks to Bob Carey and his M.C.I workers.

We have a lot of projects lined up for '90'. How much we accomplish will depend on the budget and State funding. We are aware that the town is in financial difficulty. We are also aware of the tax payers needs. We would like to try to keep our roads, our parks, cemeteries and recreational areas in the best possible condition. Again, our budget will determine how much we are able to do.

We would also like to thank all of the employees of the DPW and all other departments for their help in a most successful year. Bill Halunen deserves a great deal of credit for keeping things going so smoothly. We also would like to thank Alan Dunham, Jeanne Roby and Pat Clark for their capable assistance. Thank you again.

Public Prosecutor Department

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

During the past year, the Office of Public Prosecutor has been involved in processing and prosecution of approximately 538 criminal cases composed of approximately 1,268 complaints.

As a direct result of your Police Department's action, the Court records reveal that from July 1, 1989 through December 31, 1989, a total of \$14,346.00 was collected in fines and returned to the general treasury of the Town. Furthermore, for the first six months of the year, the sum of \$14,985.00 was returned to the Town's treasury. Thus, for the entire year, an amount in excess of Twenty Nine Thousand Three Hundred Dollars was returned to the Town.

Currently, the case backlog stands at three to four months, in spite of the fact that over ninety percent of the cases are disposed of by plea bargaining. The Court has been able to schedule double sessions one day per week but this additional help has not been sufficient to bring our case load up to a current standard.

The Public Prosecutor continues to be present daily in the Court to handle and assist all Town departments in any action taken by them to effectuate enforcement of regulations, by-laws or delinquent taxes, and to give seminars to your police officers.

Superintendent of Schools

If one word could capture the events of the past year within our schools, I believe that word would be "change". Change is not always a negative factor; however, forced change through dramatic fiscal reductions can significantly impact a school system, negatively. What I can report to the community with great pride is the way your staff within your schools has responded to the challenge to continue the educational process in a positive manner. That does not mean that all is well nor does it mean that we are capable today of providing the same services to your children that we did last year at this time. What it signifies to me is the tremendous dedication our staff has for your children. When I walk through the buildings I always come away with an excitement about the educational experiences that the elementary students of Carver are receiving. There is still a sense of joy in learning in our buildings even though we have lost so much in such a short period of time. How long staff can continue to generate that joy under the threat of more losses to our educational program is difficult to estimate.

This year we have made progress in identification common educational goals. The Carver School Committee's philosophy has been linked to administrative goals to insure a common understanding of our educational mission. The school districts primary goal, identified in the Carver Public Schools Policy Manual is, "...to accept responsibility for the development of each child into an adult who can stand confidently, participate fully, learn continually, and contribute meaningfully to society." Our new principal, Mr. Richard Pazasis, and his new assistant principal, Mrs. Susan Martin, have effectively added a new dimension of high expectations for students and staff. They have also demonstrated a personal commitment to provide as positive an atmosphere as possible within the schools. Our ability to succeed as a school district next year will greatly depend upon the commitment of the community to provide the resources necessary to meet the unique challenges facing public education in this, a new decade.

Annual Report of the Principal

Although the previous 1988-1989 school year witnessed some growth in student enrollment by twenty-seven students, the eighty plus professional staff kept class sizes reasonable and allowed students to experience a wide variety of educational programs. In addition, an adequate number of support personnel made it possible for teachers to focus most of their energy on student instruction, and less on clerical/supervisory tasks. The school year ended, however, with a sharp reduction in anticipated financial support and some anguish over what the 1989-1990 school year would being to education in Carver. Approximately \$454,793 was cut from sixteen support positions; not the best ending for what was documented in the previous Annual Report as a successful school year.

The 1989-1990 school year was highlighted by a new elementary school administration, taking on the somewhat unknown challenges which the reduction in teachers and support personnel would bring, and the returning elementary staff, digging in and putting forth an outstanding effort for the students of Carver.

Some of the specific challenges encountered were: (1) Working with very large class sizes; (2) Providing a physical education program without specialists; (3) Utilizing the library and audio-visual equipment without the services of a librarian; (4)Providing computer and gifted instruction without staff; (5) Providing clerical and teaching assistant support without teacher aides; and (6) Maintaining the buildings and grounds with less custodial assistance.

As of the writing of this report, I can state that despite the obstacles put before us, we have been successful. Student progress in basic skills and achievement test results have steadily improved. Teachers, based on report card marks, have reported 96% of the student population to be performing at the average or above average standard. The physical education program has received positive feedback from many students, parents, and teachers. Students and teachers have had some use of the library and audio-visual equipment. More teachers are learning how to utilize computers for classroom instruction. Clerical and teaching aide assistance has been provided, to the best of the public's ability, by parents and citizens. And the custodial staff has worked hard to keep up with the maintenance of the building and grounds. Finally, and not the last on our list, support, through fundraising and assistance in every way possible. They have never said no to any request for help.

In closing, I would like to express my sincere thanks to my teachers and support staff, the school committee, central office administration and staff, the parents and students, and my assistant principal for making the current school year successful despite the unusual challenges put before us during the current school year.

Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District

The Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District continued to serve the Town of Carver in 1989. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally run regional agency serving southeastern Massachusetts dealing with issues being faced by each city and town in the region. In the past year, the representative of Carver serving on the SRPEDD Commission was John Mickevich representing the Board of Selectmen. The Planning Board was not represented.

Some of the district's more significant accomplishments in 1989 were:

- Completion of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which set regional priorities on federal and state grants for transportation and economic development projects.
- Completion of a regional groundwater (aquifer) project, including a map of the region's aquifers and a protection plan for these important resources.
- Staffing of the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED)
 Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In
 1989, SEED approved loans to 21 small businesses in the amount of \$3.57
 million. These loans are projected to create 295 jobs and will result in the
 investment of over \$12 million from private sources.
- SRPEDD continued to provide the planning services for the two regional transit authorities, GATRA and SRTA.
- SRPEDD reviewed the environmental impact of larger development projects in the region to insure that potential harmful impacts will be addressed. This year, we reviewed sixty-one such projects, commenting on the impact on traffic, water supply, sewage disposal, wetlands, and other development-related issues.
- Seventy-six applications for federal and state funds were reviewed to insure consistency with other plans and efficient use of public funds.
- SRPEDD conducts a district-wide traffic counting program and maintains a computer file of all available traffic count data for the period 1980 through 1989 throughout the region.
- SRPEDD maintains a computer based Accident Filing System for eleven communities in the region. The service provides for rapid and accurate retrieval of detailed traffic accident information and is useful in identifying high hazard locations.
- The Buzzards Bay Project was a major focus for SRPEDD in 1989. The District worked with the EPA and the newly formed Buzzards Bay Advisory Committee, consisting of local officials, in the effort to clean up and preserve the water quality of this important resource.
- A study and zoning bylaw for accessory apartments was prepared and distributed.

Municipal Finance Terminology

The following terms are frequently used in the Annual Town Report and at Town Meetings. In order to provide everyone with a better understanding of the meaning, the following definitions are provided.

SURPLUS REVENUE: (often referred to as :"Excess and Deficiency")

This fund represents the amount by which the Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserve. This is a bookkeeping term.

AVAILABLE FUND: (often referred to as "Free Cash")

Available funds is the amount certified annually by the State Bureau of Accounts by deducting from surplus revenue all uncollected taxes for prior years. This fund may be used by a vote of the Town Meeting.

OVERLAY:

The Overlay is the amount raised by the Assessors in excess of the appropriations and other charges for the purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements granted and avoiding fractions.

OVERLAY RESERVE:

This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific Overlay account for a given year, and may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes or voted into the reserve fund.

RESERVE FUND:

This fund is established by the voters at an annual town meeting only and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) both.

STABILIZATION FUND:

This is a fund created to provide a reserve for capitol expenditure. Appropriations from the Stabilization Fund may be made at an Annual Town Meeting by a two-thirds vote for any purpose the Town is authorized to borrow money for under Section 7 or 8 of Chapter 44 or for such other purpose as is approved by the Emergency Finance Board.

CHERRY SHEET:

Named for the cherry colored paper on which the Massachusetts Commission of Corporations and Taxation traditionally printed it, the cherry sheet carries the figures which must be used by the Assessors in determining the amount to be raised by taxation.

It lists the amounts of county tax and state assessments, as well as the estimated tax distributions from the General Fund, reimbursements, agency funds, and the Sales and Use Taxes.

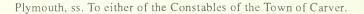

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers to be voted for all on one ballot, namely: One Moderator for a term of one (1) year; One Selectman, One Assessor, Two Members of School Board, Two Members of Library Trustees, One Member of Public Works, One Member of Board of Health, each for a term of three (3) years, One Member Planning Board, One Member of Carver Housing Authority, each for a term of five (5) years; and to vote by ballot "Yes" or "No" on the following questions:

QUESTION NO.1

This question is non-binding

"Do you oppose further cuts or withholding of Local Aid to the Town of Carver?"

QUESTION NO. 2

This question is non-binding

"Should the state share 40% of its revenue from growth taxes (income, state and corporate income) with towns and cities on a continuing and consistent basis to help support basic local services such as public safety, public health and education?"

QUESTION NO. 3

"Shall the Town of Carver be allowed to exempt from the provisions of Proposition Two-and-One-Half, so-called, the amounts required to pay for the bond issued in order to finance the repairing and replacing of the heating systems in the Carver public school buildings and the Carver town hall and the removing of asbestos in said buildings?"

QUESTION NO. 4

"Under the provisions of Chapter 41 Section 21 of the Massachusetts General Laws shall the town vote to have its Selectmen act as Water and Sewer Commissioners?"

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CARVER HANDICAPPED COMMITTEE

ARTICLE I - TITLE AND PURPOSE

1. The name of this Committee is the CARVER HANDICAPPED COMMITTEE.

2. The purpose of the Committee is to co-ordinate or carry out programs in coordination with programs of the State Office of Handicapped Affairs in order to bring about full and equal participation in all aspects of life in the Town of Carver for all people with disabilities.

3. The purpose of these by-laws is to establish principles and procedures for the governance of this Committee.

ARTICLE II POWERS AND DUTIES

1. Research local problems of people with disabilities.

2. Co-ordinate the activities of other local groups organized to meet the needs of people with disabilities.

3. Review and make recommendations about policies, procedures, services and activities of departments and agencies of the Town of Carver as they affect people with disabilities.

4. Work in co-operation with the Departments and Agencies of the Town of Carver to bring about maximum participation of people with disabilities.

5. Initiate, monitor and promote legislation at the Town, State and Federal level which advances the equal status of people with disabilities and ensure that appropriate regulations are adopted and enforced pursuant to such legislation.

6. Encourage public awareness of disability issues.

7. Provide information, referral, guidance and advice to individuals, business, organizations and public agencies in all matters pertaining to disability.

8. Recruit and recommend prospective Committee members to the Selectmen and Executive Secretary.

9. File an annual report which shall be printed in the Town Annual Report.

10. Take such action as the Committee considers appropriate to ensure the equal status of persons with disabilities, or any other activity deemed appropriate.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

1. The Committee shall consist of (5) five members appointed by the Selectmen and Executive Secretary. At least one member shall be either an elected or appointed official of the Town.

2. Resignations shall be made by notifying the Town Clerk in writing.

3. Selectmen and Executive Secretary shall fill any vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term in the same manner as an original appointment.

4. The Chairperson or Vice Chairperson of the Committee shall receive the approval of the Committee prior to making statements or joining activities on behalf of the Committee.

5. All members shall have full voting rights.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

1. The officers shall include a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer.

2. Officers shall be elected annually by a majority vote of the Committee.

3. DUTIES:

- a. The Chairperson shall:
 - 1. Develop the agenda in co-ordination with the other Committee members.
 - 2. Preside over all meetings.

- 3. Appoint sub-committees as needed.
- 4. Authorize expenditures as needed.
- b. The <u>Vice Chairperson shall</u> perform all the functions of the Chairperson in his/her absence.
- c. <u>The Secretary shall:</u>
 - 1. Keep records of all meeting attendance, minutes and correspondence.
 - 2. Post notice of all meetings forty-eight (48) hours before each meeting at the Town Clerk's Office.

d. The Treasurer shall:

- 1. Keep records of all financial matters.
- 2. Develop a budget in co-ordination with the Committee.
- 3. Prepare a financial statement for inclusion in the Town Annual Report.

ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

- 1. Regular meetings shall be held at least six (6) times a year.
- 2. A quorum shall consist of three (3) members.
- 3. Meeting minutes will be amended and approved at the next meeting.
- 4. Special meetings can be called by the Chairperson or by any three (3) members.
- 5. Decisions will be made by a quorum of those members present, unless where otherwise noted in these by-laws.
- 6. Notice of meetings will be the third Wednesday of the month.
- 7. Meetings shall adhere to Robert's Rules of Order.

Article 23.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article XIV of the General By-Laws as follows by adding the following:

"Section 6. The Town Clerk shall have the right to issue a written demand by mail to the owner or keeper of a dog which is not licensed pursuant to the rules and regulations relative to the control of dogs in Plymouth County of the Plymouth County Commissioners or other applicable law. The demand shall notify the owner or keeper of the dog that the dog was not licensed in accordance with requirements of law and that the dog must be licensed to comply with applicable law.

Section 7. A demand pursuant to Section 1 shall not be mailed earlier than sixty days after commencement of the applicable license period.

Section 8. The owner or keeper of a dog who has not licensed the dog in accordance with applicable law and to whom a demand is mailed pursuant to Section 6 shall pay to the Town Clerk the sum of \$10.00 as a demand fee. The owner or keeper of the dog shall pay the demand fee to the Town Clerk at the time the Town Clerk issues a license for the dog or within thirty days

after a demand is mailed pursuant to Section 6, whichever is earlier. The demand fee shall be in addition to the license fees, fines, penalties and forfeitures otherwise provided by law. The Town Clerk shall pay all demand fees received into the Town treasury, and said fees shall not be thereafter paid to the County of Plymouth."

(by Dog Officer)

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Carver By-Laws by adopting the following bylaw:

Article No. XXIV:

AMUSEMENT DEVICES

The Board of Selectmen, as Licensing Authority, may, in its discretion, grant licenses to keep and operate automatic amusement devices in accordance with the provisions of <u>Massachusetts General Laws</u>, <u>Chapter 140</u>, <u>Section 177A</u>. No such licensee shall be allowed to have more than two (2) such amusement devices on any one business premises, except the Licensing Authority may issue one such license for every ten thousand (10,000) of town population that would allow more than two (2) such devices.

Article 25.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to amend its Zoning Map and Bylaws with respect to industrial uses, and to take the following action, or take any other action relative thereto:

1. Amend Section 4.3 by deleting the same and inserting in place thereof the following:

Section 4.3 USE REGULATIONS: INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT

- 4.3.1 Permitted uses: Industrial Zone Xa. Manufacturing and industrial uses of a clean operational nature, provided they occupy less than 90,000 square feet floor area.
- 4.3.2 Permitted uses: Industrial Zone
 a. Manufacturing and industrial uses of a light-intensity, clean operational nature, provided they occupy less than 20,000 square feet floor area.
 b. Any use permitted in a Business-Commercial District except Residential uses.
- 4.3.3 Prohibited uses: Industrial Zone X

a. Any use which is so detrimental, injurious, noxious, or offensive as to constitute a public nuisance, or which tends to reduce property values in the same or adjoining districts.

b. Any use which emits detrimental, injurious, noxious, or offensive odors, dust pollution, or smoke; or poses danger, such as manufacturing of acids gases, fertilizers, glue, gypsum or explosives, petroleum refining, and reduction of animal matter.

c. Any other use dangerous to persons within or outside the district by reason of emission or odor, fumes, gases, particulate matter, smoke, noise,

reclassified as being below regulatory concern), electrical interference, threat of fire or explosion, or any other reason;

d. Solid waste disposal facilities, including without limitation landfills and junk and salvage yards, that require a site assignment from the Board of Health under M.G.L., Ch.111, S. 150A and regulations adopted by the D.E.P., 310 CMR 19.00;

e. Storage of hazardous wastes in quantities as defined by the Massachusetts Hazardous Waste Management Regulations by a "large quantity generator" including without limitation chemical wastes, radioactive wastes and waste oil;

f. Disposal of hazardous waste;

g. Disposal of snow that contains de-icing chemicals or snow that has been brought in from outside town;

h. Residential uses;

i. Any other uses prohibited by the Water Resource Protection bylaw.

- 4.3.4 Prohibited uses: Industrial Zone
 - a. Uses prohibited in Zone x, and
 - b. Bituminous concrete and concrete patching plants.

4.3.5 Special Permit uses: All industrial zones

The following uses shall only be allowed when the S.P.G.A. determines that the use is compatible with other uses of a less intense nature or with adjacent zones, and that the operation will not have an adverse impact on the groundwater or air quality. The S.P.G.A. may prescribe safeguards, restrictions, and environmental design requirements concerning the site plan or operations as appear necessary. The S.P.G.A. shall adopt rules and regulations for the issuance of special Permits, including filing and site plan review fees.

a. Uses which occupy 20,000 square feet floor area or more.

b. Heavy manufacturing, processing, fabrication or power generating industries, except as prohibited under prohibited uses, provided all open yards or lots containing storage, processing, manufacturing, or other operations which border other districts, or which are visible from major highways, overpasses, or thoroughfares passing through or adjacent to the district, shall be visibly screened by substantial walls, fences or vegetation screening at least eight feet high;

c. Utility plants and substations;

d. Trucking and freight terminals or depots;

e. Underground storage of petroleum and other refined petroleum products, including without limitation gasoline, waste oil, and diesel fuel, except within buildings which it will heat or where it currently exists.

f. Storage of road salt or other de-icing chemicals in quantities greater than for normal household use.

g. Manufacture, use, storage, or disposal of toxic or hazardous materials as part of a principal activity, but excluding domestic activities and pesticide applications for normal agricultural use.

h. Motor vehicle service stations, repair garages, car washes, truck or bus terminals, heliports (excluding helistops), airports, electronic manufacturing, metal plating, commercial chemical and bacteriological laboratories, and dry cleaning establishments using toxic or hazardous materials on site.

4.3.6 Definitions:

<u>Hazardous</u> waste--Materials as defined and regulated by 310 CMR 30.00 et seq. (Massachusetts Hazardous Waste Management Regulations).

<u>Solid</u> waste--Unwanted or discarded solid waste material with insufficient liquid content to be free flowing, including without limitation rubbish, gar age sludge, junk, refuse and ash. The term does not include vegetative compost, tree stumps, and brush under 200 cubic yards.

<u>Special Permit Granting Authority</u> (SPGA)--The members of the Carver Planning Board.

Toxic or hazardous materials -- Any substance or mixture of such physical, chemical or infectious characteristics as to pose a significant, actual or potential hazard to water supplies and to human health, if such materials were discharged to land or waters of this town. Toxic or hazardous materials include, without limitation, petroleum products, heavy metals, radioactive materials. virulent infectious wastes, pesticides, herbicides, solvents, thinners and other materials which are listed as U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Priority Pollutants.

2. Create a new district known as Industrial Zone X, and amend the zoning map to show the same. Said district to consist of all land described as follows:

The northerly part of lots 5B and 5C as shown on Sheet 21 of the Town of Carver Board of Assessors plans. Bounded westerly by Lot 3, 505. +/- feet; northerly by lot 1, 340 +/- feet; easterly by Lot 5, 453 +/- feet; and southerly by the Business-Commercial district Zone Line, 510. +/- feet.

The area to be rezoned hereunder also being shown on a plan on file with the Town Clerk entitled "Plan of Land off Plymouth Street, Carver, Massachusetts, to be Rezoned to Industrial District A", dated February 27, 1990.

3. Amend Section 3.0 to add reference to Industrial Zone X as a district.

Section 6.3.4 SET-BACK REQUIREMENTS

Parking and loading areas shall be set back from street lines a distance of 20 feet, and from side and rear lot lines a distance of 10 feet, except within an industrial park, where no side parking set-backs are required.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws by replacing the second paragraph of section 6.3.8 (Buffer Strips) with the following section, or take any other action relative thereto:

Section 6.3.8 BUFFER STRIPS

In the Industrial District adjacent to a dwelling existing or proposed at the effective date of this zoning, there shall be provided a special setback area not less than 100 feet wide. Such setback area shall be landscaped and planted with grass, shrubs, native trees or other plants to provide a visual screen. The setback area may contain walks, sewerage, and wells, but no part of any building, structure, or paved space intended or used as a parking area shall be located within such setback area.

(Petitioned for by the Industrial District Bylaw Committee)

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to amend its Zoning Map to place the following described area located on and off the easterly side of Tremont Street, presently partially in the Business-Commercial district and partially in the Residential-Agricultural district, in the Industrial District:

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to add the following sections to the Zoning Bylaws, or take any other action relative thereto:

14.0 Site Plan Approval

14,1 Purpose

The purpose of this bylaw is to protect the public interest by providing for a detailed review of site plans to insure that the impacts of certain developments allowed as of right or by Special Permit are in accordance with the purpose of the Carver Zoning bylaw; that such developments adequately provide in their design and layout for the transportation, water supply, drainage, sewerage, open space, recreation and amenity needs of the occupants; that such developments minimize any adverse off-site impacts to public facilities and services; that such developments are in harmony with the existing neighborhood character and protect against adverse impacts to adjoining landowners.

14.2 Projects Requiring Site Plan Approval

A. Construction, exterior alteration or exterior expansion of a commercial,

industrial, or multi-family structure.

B. Construction or expansion of a parking lot for a commercial, industrial, or multi-family structure.

C. Grading, clearing, or other land development activity except for the following: work in an Agricultural-Residential District, landscaping on a lot with an existing dwelling, clearing necessary for percolation and other site tests, work incidental to agricultural activity, or work in conjunction with a valid building permit, approved subdivision plan, or earth removal permit.

No project enumerated in Section 14.2 shall be carried out, and no building permit for such project shall be issued, unless the project has received either Major or Minor Site Plan approval (as determined by the following table) from the appropriate reviewing board.

> Parking Spaces 0-19.....Minor 20 and up.....Major

> Land Development (see 14.2.C) All activity......Minor

At the request of the applicant, the reviewing board may waive any or all requirements of site plan review for exterior enlargements of less than 25% of the existing floor area, and for exterior building or site alterations where the board determines that the standards set forth in this bylaw are not relevant to the alterations.

14.3 Site Plan Reviewing Board

The Planning Board shall be the reviewing board for all site plan applications, except where the use also requires a special permit by another board, as designated in the Zoning Bylaw Section 8.5. In those cases the special permit granting authority shall be the site plan reviewing board.

When the Planning Board is the reviewing board, no action shall be taken without a quorum of three members (except to continue the hearing to a time and date certain in the event of a quorum not being present) and no decision shall be made without the vote of a majority of the members present.

14.4 Application for Site Plan Approval

14.4.1 Applicants are encouraged to meet informally with the reviewing board prior to making a formal submission of plans to discuss site plan requirements and consider possible waivers. The board may provide a set of guidelines to assist applicants in meeting site plan, architectural, and landscaping objectives.

14.4.2 Each application for Site Plan Approval shall be submitted to the reviewing board at a regularly scheduled meeting by the current owner of record or his agent, accompanied by ten (10) copies of the site plan. After the reviewing board has certified receipt of the application, the applicant

shall convey a copy to the Town Clerk for filing.

14.4.3 The reviewing board shall obtain with each submission a deposit sufficient to cover any reasonable expenses connected with a public hearing and review of plans, including the costs of any engineering or planning consultant services necessary for review purposes. Any unused balance will be returned to the applicant after the completion of the project and submission of as-built plans; or after the then owner or his agent gives written notice that he no longer intends to pursue the project, and wishes the site plan approval to be rescinded.

14.5 Required Site Plan Contents

14.5.1 All site plans shall be prepared by a professional land surveyor, professional engineer, registered architect, or landscape architect as appropriate, unless this requirement is waived by the reviewing board because of unusually simple circumstances. All site plans shall be on standard 18" x 24" or 24" x 36" sheets and shall be prepared at a sufficient scale (1" = 40) preferred) to show;

- A. the location and boundaries of the lot, adjacent streets or ways, and the location and owners' names of all adjacent properties;
- B. existing and proposed topography including contours at two (2) foot intervals, the locations of wetlands, streams, waterbodies, drainage swales, areas subject to flooding, and unique natural land features;
- C. existing and proposed structures, including dimensions and elevations;
- D. the location of parking and loading areas, driveways, walkways, access and egress points;
- E. the locations and description of proposed exterior lighting;
- F. the location and description of all proposed septic systems, water supply, storm drainage systems, utilities, refuse and other waste disposal methods and snow disposal methods;
- G. the nature location and size of all significant existing plant materials, including tree, shrub, or brush masses, grassed areas, and all individual trees over ten inches in caliber.
- H. proposed landscape features including the locations and a description of screening, fencing, and planting;
- I. the locations, dimensions, height, and characteristics of proposed signs;
- J. the locations and a description of proposed open space or recreation areas;
- K. the estimated daily and peak hour vehicle trips to be generated by the site. Plan shall show traffic flow patterns for vehicles and pedestrians showing adequate access to and from the site and adequate circulation within the site;
- L. a plan and narrative describing the soil erosion and sedimentation control measures that will be utilized within the site.
- M. upon completion of the project, a set of as-built plans shall be provided.

14.5.2 The reviewing board may waive any information requirements it judges to be unnecessary to the review of a particular plan.

14.5.3 Failure of the applicant to submit all required materials may be grounds for denial of the application.

14.6 <u>Procedures for Site Plan Review</u>

14.6.1 The reviewing board shall, within seven days, transmit one copy each to the Building Inspector, Board of Health, Selectmen, Conservation Commission, D.P.W., Fire Department, and Planning Board or the Board of Appeals (whichever is not the reviewing board), who shall review the applicants and submit their written recommendations and comments to the reviewing board. Failure of Boards to make comments within 21 days of the referral of the application shall be deemed lack of opposition.

14.6.2 Major and Minor Review where use also requires a special permit:

The procedure and timetable for such a review shall conform to the requirements for a Special Permit application, and the Site Plan Review process shall be concurrent with the Special permit process.

14.6.3 Minor Review where no special permit is required.

Upon receipt of the application, after determining that the application is complete, the reviewing board shall set a date for review of the plan at a regularly scheduled, public meeting. The applicant shall notify abutters of the scheduled review by certified mail and present return receipts to the board, along with a list of abutters certified by the Assessors Office. The reviewing board shall take final action within (40) forty days from the date it receives the application, after due consideration of the comments from the other boards.

14.6.4 Major Review where no special permit is required:

Upon receipt of the application, the reviewing board shall determine that the application is complete. A public hearing to address the application shall be held within forty-five (45) days of the receipt of the application. The board shall then have 45 days following the public hearing in which to act. Notification of the public hearing shall be advertised for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper generally circulated in town, beginning at least 14 days before such hearing. The applicant shall send hearing notices to abutters by certified mail and present return receipts to the board at the hearing along with a list of abutters certified by the Assessors Office.

- 14.6.5 Failure of the board to take final action within the allotted time shall be deemed approval of the application, unless an extension has been agreed upon by the reviewing board and the applicant.
- 14.7 In reviewing and evaluating the site plan, the reviewing board shall consider the following criteria and make recommendations to achieve the following objectives:
 - A. the site plan complies with the zoning regulations of the district in which the site is located;
 - B. the site plan minimizes traffic and safety impacts of the proposed development on adjacent highways or roads, and maximizes the convenience and safety of vehicular and pedestrian movement within the site;
 - C. the proposed development, to the extent feasible: a) is integrated into the existing landscape; b) minimizes adverse environmental impacts on such features as wetlands, flood-plains, and aquifer recharge areas; c) minimizes obstruction of scenic views from publicly accessible locations; d) preserves unique natural or

historical features; e) minimizes tree, vegetation, and soil removal and grade changes; f) maximizes open space retention; and g) screens objectionable features from neighboring properties and roadways;

- D. the architectural design of the proposed development is in harmony with the prevailing character of the neighborhood and the town of Carver;
- E. the proposed development will have adequate water supply and waste disposal systems and will not place excessive demands on Town services and infrastructure;
- F. the site plan shall show adequate measures to prevent pollution of surface or groundwater from storm water runoff, to minimize erosion and sedimentation, and to present increased runoff and potential for flooding.

14.8 Performance Standards

F.

In order to receive site plan approval, all projects or uses must demonstrate compliance with the performance standards herein.

14.8.1 Access and Traffic Impacts

Applicants must demonstrate that the project will minimize traffic and safety impacts.

- A. The number of curb cuts on state and local roads shall be minimized. To the extent feasible, access to businesses shall be provided via one of the following 1) access via a common driveway serving adjacent lots or premises 2) access via an existing side street 3) access via a loop road shared by adjacent lots or premises. Driveways may be required to provide access to adjacent properties.
- B. Curb cuts shall be limited to the minimum width for safe entering and exiting, and in no case shall exceed the Mass. D.P.W. standard.
- C. All driveways shall be designed to afford motorists exiting to roadways with safe sight distances.
- D. The proposed development shall assure safe pedestrian and vehicular circulation within its site.
- E. In each case where a new building or new use will generate more than 100 additional trips (total of inbound and outbound)during the adjacent roadways' peak hours or the development's peak hours a traffic impact statement may be required. The traffic impact statement shall contain:
 - 1. A detailed assessment of the traffic safety impacts of the proposed project or use on the carrying capacity of any adjacent highway or roads through which peak hour site traffic composes at least 5% of the existing capacity on an intersection approach, or roadway segments on which accident potential or residential traffic character is expected to be impacted.
 - 2. A plan to minimize traffic and safety impacts through physical design and layout concepts or other appropriate means,
 - 3. An interior traffic and pedestrian circulation plan designed to minimize conflicts and safety problems.
 - Sidewalks may be required where appropriate to provide safe and secure access to adjacent properties and between individual

businesses within a development.

14.8.2 Lighting

A. Lighting shall be adequate but not so bright as to disturb neighboring uses. Parking lot luminaries should have a cutoff of 90 degrees, a maximum height of twenty feet, and a maximum permitted illumination of .5 footcandles.

14.8.3 Parking

- A. Projected projects or uses must comply with Parking and Off-street Loading requirements in Section 6.3 of the Zoning Bylaw.
- B. To the extent feasible, parking and loading areas shall be located to the side or rear of the structure.
- C. Parking areas shall be designed to reduce their visual impact from public ways and adjacent land by the use of vegetative buffers, berms, natural contours, structural screening such as a fence or a combination of the above.

14.8.4 Landscaping

- A. A landscaped buffer strip at least 24 feet wide, continuous except for approved driveways, shall be established adjacent to any public road. The buffer strip shall be planted with grass, medium height shrubs, and shade trees (minimum 2 inch caliber, planted at least every 50 feet along the road frontage), or other landscaping acceptable to the board. At all street or driveway intersections, trees or shrubs shall be set back a sufficient distance so that they do not present a traffic visibility hazard.
- B. Removal of large trees (over 5" diameter) along roadways shall be minimized. Preservation of existing vegetation where appropriate is encouraged.
- C. Large parking areas shall be subdivided with landscaped islands. At least one three (minimum 2" caliber) per 35 parking spaces shall be provided.
- D. Exposed storage areas, machinery, service areas, truck loading areas, utility buildings and structures and other unsightly uses shall be screened from view from neighboring properties and streets using dense, hardy evergreen plantings, berms, or a wall or tight fence complemented by evergreen plantings.
- E. All landscaped areas shall be properly maintained. Shrubs or trees which die shall be replaced within one growing season.

14.8.5 Appearance/Architectural Design

A. The proposed development shall visually enhance its environment; consideration shall be given to appropriate scale, massing, height, roofline and building materials to ensure that the architecture shall be in harmony with the surrounding natural environment, neighborhood and town.

14.8.6 Storm Water Runoff

- A. All storm water runoff from impervious surfaces shall be recharged on-site unless in conducting site plan review it is determined that either recharge is infeasible because of site conditions or is undesirable because of uncontrollable risks to water quality from such recharge. Such recharge shall be by surface infiltration through vegetated surfaces unless otherwise approved by the reviewing board during site plan review.
- B. If dry wells or leaching basins are approved for use, they shall be preceded by oil, grease and sediment traps except for specific exemptions allowed by state statutes. Drainage from loading areas for toxic or hazardous materials shall be separately collected for safe disposal.
- C. Detention/retention basins shall be designed for the 100 year storm. Pipes shall be sized for the 25 year storm.
- D. Surface water in impervious areas shall be collected at intervals to avoid puddling and excessive sheet runoff.
- 14.8.7 Erosion control
 - A. The Universal Soil Loss Equation shall be used to estimate the present annual soil loss from the site while under construction and after construction is completed.
 - B. Erosion and sedimentation control measures described in the plan shall be adequate to retain all sediment within the site and away from wetlands, watercourse, and waterbodies, both during and after construction.
 - C. Site development shall not begin unless the soil erosion and sediment control measures and facilities described in the plan and scheduled for installation prior to site development have been installed and are functional.
 - D. Where land is to be developed for building, the board may require that stripping of vegetation and topsoil not be done until all necessary permits are in hand. The board may also require that clearing for large projects be done in phases, in order to limit the amount of time that bare earth remains exposed.

14.8.8 Water Quality

A. All outdoor storage facilities for fuel, hazardous materials or wastes, and potentially harmful raw materials shall be located within an impervious, diked containment area adequate to hold the total volume of liquid kept within the storage area, or shall employ other protective measures acceptable to the board.

14.8.9 Noise

- A. Excessive noise at unreasonable hours shall be muffled so as not to be objectionable due to volume, frequency, shrillness, or intermittence.
- B. No person shall engage in or cause very loud construction activities on a site abutting residential use between the hours of 9 P.M. of one day and

14.8.10 Utilities

A. Electrical, telephone, cable TV, and other such utilities shall be underground where physically and environmentally feasible.

14.9 Modification to the Site Plan

Before approval of a site plan, the reviewing board may request the applicant to make modifications in the proposed design of the project to ensure that the above criteria and performance standards are met.

14.10 Final Action on Site Plan Permit

The reviewing board's final action on applications for Site Plan Approval shall consist of either:

A. A determination that the proposed project is in compliance with the criteria and performance standards set forth in this bylaw;

B. A written denial of the application identifying the specific aspects of the site plan that are missing or that are not in compliance with the criteria and performance standards set forth in this bylaw;

C. Approval subject to any reasonable conditions and modifications as the reviewing board may deem necessary to ensure compliance with the criteria and performance standards set forth in this bylaw. Existence of conditions shall be noted on the plan and a copy of said conditions shall be filed at the Registry of Deeds.

Where no other sureties are being held, the board may require a surety in the form of a bond, irrevocable letter of credit or other means for those works which, if left incomplete, present a public hazard or nuisance.

The reviewing board shall send its decision in writing to the building inspector, applicant, and Town Clerk within 14 days of its final decision.

14.11 Administration

A. A site plan permit issued under this section shall lapse within one (1) year if a substantial use thereof has not commenced. The permittee may apply annually for an extension of the permit which the board shall freely grant, unless the board elects to modify or rescind the permit to adjust to regulatory changes or to site conditions not anticipated in the original review. If the board wishes to modify or rescind the permit, it shall do so at a public meeting, notice of which has been sent to the permittee 14 days in advance.

B. The reviewing board may periodically amend or add rules and regulations, including the establishment of reasonable fees, relating to the procedures and administration of this bylaw.

C. Any party aggrieved by a site plan review decision made by the Planning Board may appeal to the Zoning Board of Appeals under section 7.2.1 of the Zoning Bylaw.

D. Site plan approval by the reviewing board does not eliminate the requirement for review by other boards such as the Board of Health, the Conservation Commission, or the Historic District Commission.

14.12 Severability

The provisions of this bylaw are severable; if any provision or the application of the provision to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, this shall not affect the remaining provisions.
