A total of 2578 ballots were delivered to the Ballot Clerks by the Town Clerk. The Wardens declared the polls open at 8:00 A.M., and announced that the polls would close at 8:00 o'clock P.M. The ballot boxes registered zero (0) at the opening of the polls. The keys to the ballot boxes were placed in the custody of the police officers on duty. The election continued without incident until 8:00 o'clock P.M., at which time the Wardens declared the polls closed. At the closing of the polls the following was reported:

Precinct I: A total of 520 votes were cast of which 12 were absentee votes.

Precinct II: A total of 689 votes were cast of which 32 were absentee votes.

Precinct III: A total of 751 votes were cast of which 20 were absentee votes.

The total vote cast for the precincts was 1960 of which 64 were absentee votes. The ballots were then removed from the ballot boxes, audibly counted and delivered to the tellers for canvassing. They having been duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties continued as follows:

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Unanimously Voted to dispense with the reading of the Warrant and Article 1 relating to the election of Town Officers, etc., having been disposed of at a prior meeting.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Unanimously Voted to accept the motion by Finance Committee Chairman, Daniel Ryan, to hold all money articles until the continuation of Town Meeting to be determined at a subsequent date.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year, beginning July 1, 1990, in accordance with the provision of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17. The Computer Operating Committee requested by Francis J. Kane to be continued. It was Unanimously Voted.

The Town Government Study Committee chairman, Nicholas Femia, requested that this committee continues. It was Unanimously Voted.

The New South Carver Fire Station Building Committee Chairman, David J. Boucher reported the following:

The New South Carver Fire Station Building Committee reluctantly reports that efforts to construct a new fire station in South Carver have been delayed due to fiscal restraints. The building of a new fire station in South Carver remains a priority of the Carver Fire Department and the Building Committee. The Building Committee recommends that town meeting allow this committee to continue to pursue its goal and to report back at the next annual town meeting. It was Unanimously Voted.

Marguerite E. Mills, Co-Chairman of the Carver Bicentennial Committee requested that the report of this committee be held until annual town meeting Article 51 is presented and a full report will be given at that time. It was Unanimously Voted.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M., by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans, there being a quorum (75) present a total of 220 registered voters were counted. The appointed tellers were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties by the Moderator. The tellers were as follows: Sonja Gerkin, Linda Harrington, William Viator, Jr. and Elizabeth Martin.

Article 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to Approve the proposed Amendment No. VI to the Plymouth-Carver-Regional School District Agreement, as initiated by vote of the Plymouth-Carver-Regional District School Committee adopted on July 11, 1989. The proposed Amendment provides that one of the two present appointed members of the Regional District School Committee from Plymouth would become an elected member so that each town would then appoint one member to the Committee annually, Plymouth would elect four members (instead of three) and Carver would continue to elect one member, all elected members to serve for three-year terms. (Plymouth-Carver Regional School District) Recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Unanimously Voted for the town to transfer the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars from the Stabilization Fund to a Library Maintenance Account for the purpose of making repairs on the library. The Finance Committee recommended this Article.

(To see if the Town of Carver will vote to prohibit the acceptance of low-level radioactive waste, BRC or otherwise, at any facility within this jurisdiction that is not specifically licensed for that purpose by both the NRC and the State of Massachusetts.)

Article 22. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was SO VOTED for the Town under the provisions of Chapter 514, Section 3 of the Acts of 1957 not to withdraw from the Plymouth County Mosquito Control District. The Finance Committee did not recommend this article.

Article 23. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Paula M. Babbin, it was Unanimously Voted to adopt the following by-law as Article XXIII of the Town of Carver By-Laws as follows:

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CARVER HANDICAPPED COMMITTEE

ARTICLE 1 - TITLE AND PURPOSE

1. The name of the Committee is the Carver Handicapped Committee.
2. The purpose of the Committee is to coordinate or carry out programs in coordination with programs of the State Office of Handicapped Affairs in order to bring about full and equal participation in all aspects of life in the Town of Carver for all people with disabilities.
3. The purpose of these by-laws is to establish principles and procedures for the governance of this Committee.

ARTICLE II - POWERS AND DUTIES

1. Research local problems of people with disabilities.
2. Coordinate the activities of other local groups organized to meet the needs of people with disabilities.
3. Review and make recommendations about policies, procedures, services and activities of departments and agencies of the Town of Carver as they affect people with disabilities.
4. Work in cooperation with the Departments and Agencies of the Town of Carver to bring about maximum participation of people with disabilities.
5. Initiate, monitor and promote legislation at the Town, State and Federal level which advances the equal status of people with disabilities and ensure that appropriate regulations are adopted and enforced pursuant to such legislation.
6. Encourage public awareness of disability issues.
7. Provide information, referral, guidance and advice to individuals, businesses, organizations and public agencies in all matters pertaining to disability.
8. Recruit and recommend prospective Committee members to the Selectmen.
9. File an annual report which shall be printed in the Town Annual Report.
10. Take such action as the Committee considers appropriate to ensure the equal status of persons with disabilities, or any other activity deemed appropriate.

ARTICLE III- MEMBERSHIP

1. The Committee shall consist of (5) five members appointed annually by the Selectmen. At least one member shall be either an elected or appointed official of the Town.
2. Resignations shall be made by notifying the Town Clerk in writing.
3. Selectmen shall fill any vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term in the same manner as an original appointment.
4. The Chairperson or Vice Chairperson of the Committee shall receive the approval of the Committee prior to making statements or joining activities on behalf of the Committee.
5. All members shall have full voting rights.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

1. The officers shall include a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer.
2. Officers shall be elected annually by a majority vote of the Committee.
3. Duties:
 - a. The Chairperson shall:
 1. Develop the agenda in coordination with the other Committee members.

2. Preside over all meetings.
 3. Appoint sub-committees as needed.
 4. Authorize expenditures as needed.
- b. The Vice Chairperson shall perform all the functions of the Chairperson in his/her absence.
- c. The Secretary shall:
1. Keep records of all meeting attendance, minutes and correspondence.
 2. Post notice of all meetings forty-eight (48) hours before each meeting at the Town Clerk's office.
- d. The Treasurer shall:
1. Keep records of all financial matters.
 2. Develop a budget in co-ordination with the committee.
 3. Prepare a financial statement for inclusion in the Town Annual Report.

ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

1. Regular meetings shall be held at least six (6) times a year, "at the call of the chair or a quorum of the committee."
2. A quorum shall consist of three (3) members.
3. Meeting minutes will be amended and approved at the next meeting.
4. Special meeting can be called by the Chairperson or by any three (3) members.
5. Decisions will be made by a quorum of those members present, unless where otherwise noted in these by-laws.
6. Meetings shall adhere to Roberts' Rule of Order "and shall make such other votes as are necessary to the conduct of its business."

This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 24. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend Article XIV of the General By-Laws it was SO PASSED to add the following:

Section 6. The Town Clerk shall have the right to issue a written demand by mail to the owner or keeper of a dog which is not licensed pursuant to the rules and regulations relative to the control of dogs in Plymouth County of the Plymouth County Commissioners or other applicable law. The demand shall notify the owner or keeper of the dog that the dog was not licensed in accordance with requirements of law and that the dog must be licensed to comply with applicable law.

Section 7. A demand pursuant to Section 1 shall not be mailed earlier than sixty (60) days after commencement of the applicable license period.

Section 8. The owner or keeper of a dog who has not licensed the dog in accordance with applicable law and to whom a demand is mailed pursuant to Section 6 shall pay to the Town Clerk the sum of \$10.00 as a demand fee. The owner or keeper of the dog shall pay the demand fee to the Town Clerk at the time the Town Clerk issues a license for the dog or within thirty (30) days after a demand is mailed pursuant to Section 6, whichever is earlier. The demand fee shall be in addition to the license fees, penalties and forfeitures otherwise provided by law.

"The Town Clerk shall pay all demand fees received into the Town Treasury, and said fees shall not be thereafter paid to the County of Plymouth." This article is by the Dog Officer.

Article 25. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Johanna Leighton was defeated. It was Unanimously Voted to take "NO ACTION" on this article. Not recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 16. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Erwin K. Washburn, Chairman of the Carver School Committee, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to Rescind authority to issue \$145,000.00 principle amount of the unissued balance of the bonds or notes authorized under Article 21 at the Special Town Meeting held on May 23, 1988, as amended under Article 3 at the Special Town Meeting held on January 23, 1989, for remodeling, reconstructing, or making extraordinary repairs to public school buildings, including asbestos removal at the Governor John Carver School and extraordinary repairs to the Town Hall heating system and that the authorized amount of bonds or notes be reduced accordingly. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to amend its Zoning Map and Bylaws with respect to industrial uses, and to take the following action, or take any other action relative thereto:

1. Amend Section 4.3 by deleting the same and inserting in place thereof the following:

Section 4.3 USE REGULATIONS: INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT

4.3.1 Permitted uses: Industrial Zone X

a. Manufacturing and industrial uses of a clean operational nature (except as itemized in 4.3.3 and 4.3.5), provided they occupy less than 20,000 square feet floor area.

4.3.2 Permitted uses: Industrial Zone

a. Manufacturing and industrial uses of a light-intensity, clean operational nature (except as itemized in 4.3.4 and 4.3.5), provided they occupy less than 20,000 square feet floor area.

b. Any use permitted in a Business-Commercial District except Residential uses.

4.3.3 Prohibited uses: Industrial Zone X

a. Any use which is so detrimental, injurious, noxious, or offensive as to constitute a public nuisance, or which tends to reduce property values in the same or adjoining districts.

b. Any use which emits detrimental, injurious, noxious, or offensive odors, dust pollution, or smoke; or poses danger, such as manufacturing of acids, gases, fertilizers, glue, gypsum or explosives, petroleum refining, and reduction of animal matter.

c. Any other use dangerous to persons within or outside the district by reason of emission of odor, fumes, gases, particulate matter, smoke, noise, vibration, glare, radiation, electrical interference, threat of fire or explosion, or any other reason;

d. Solid waste disposal facilities, including without limitation landfills and junk and salvage yards, that require a site assignment from the Board of Health under M.G.L., Ch. 111, s.150A and regulations adopted by the D.E.P., 310 CMR 19.00;

e. Storage of hazardous wastes in quantities as defined by the Massachusetts Hazardous Waste Management Regulations by a "large quantity generator" including without limitation chemical wastes, radioactive wastes (including radioactive waste that has been reclassified as being below regulatory concern), and waste oil;

f. Disposal of hazardous wastes;

g. Disposal of snow that contains de-icing chemicals or snow that has been brought in from outside town;

h. Residential uses;

i. Any other uses prohibited by the Water Resource Protection bylaw.

4.3.4 Prohibited uses: Industrial Zone

a. Uses prohibited in Zone X;

b. Bituminous concrete and concrete batching plants.

4.3.5 Special Permit uses: All industrial zones

The following uses shall only be allowed when the S.P.G.A. determines that the use is compatible with other uses of a less intense nature or with adjacent zones, and that the operation will not have an adverse impact on the groundwater or air quality. The S.P.G.A. may prescribe safeguards, restrictions, and environmental design requirements concerning the site plan or operations as appear necessary. The S.P.G.A. shall adopt rules and regulations for the issuance of Special Permits, including filing and site plan review fees.

- a. Uses which occupy 20,000 square feet floor area or more.
- b. Heavy manufacturing, processing, fabrication or power generating industries, except as prohibited under prohibited uses, provided all open yards or lots containing storage, processing, manufacturing, or other operations which border other districts, or which are visible from major highways, overpasses, or thoroughfares passing through or adjacent to the district, shall be visibly screened by substantial walls, fences or vegetation screening at least eight feet high;
- c. Utility plants and substations;
- d. Trucking and freight terminals or depots;
- e. Underground storage of petroleum and other refined petroleum products, including without limitation gasoline, waste oil, and diesel fuel, except within buildings which it will heat or where it currently exists.
- f. Storage of road salt or other de-icing chemicals in quantities greater than for normal on-site use.
- g. Manufacture, use, storage, or disposal of toxic or hazardous materials as part of a principal activity, but excluding domestic activities and pesticide applications for normal agricultural use.
- h. Motor vehicle service stations, repair garages, car washes, truck or bus terminals, heliports (excluding helistops), airports, electronic manufacturing, metal plating, commercial chemical and bacteriological laboratories, and dry cleaning establishments using toxic or hazardous materials on site.
- i. Bituminous concrete and concrete batching plants (Zone X only): alterations or expansions of greater than 1999 square feet.

4.3.6 Definitions:

Hazardous waste—Materials as defined and regulated by 310 CMR 30.00 et seq. (Massachusetts Hazardous Waste Management Regulations).

Solid waste—Unwanted or discarded solid waste material with insufficient liquid content to be free flowing, including with out limitation rubbish, garbage, sludge, junk, refuse and ash. The term does not include vegetative compost, tree stumps, and brush under 200 cubic yards.

Special Permit Granting Authority (SPGA)—The members of the Carver Planning Board.

Toxic or hazardous materials—Any substance or mixture of such physical, chemical or infectious characteristics as to pose a significant, actual or potential hazard to water supplies and to human health, if such materials were discharged to land or waters of this town. Toxic or hazardous materials include, without limitation, petroleum products, heavy metals, radioactive materials, virulent infectious wastes, pesticides, herbicides, solvents, thinners and other materials which are listed as U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Priority Pollutants.

2. Create a new district known as Industrial Zone X, and amend the zoning map to show the same. Said district to consist of all land described as follows:

The northerly part of lots 5B and 5C as shown on Sheet 21 of the Town of Carver Board of Assessors plans. Bounded westerly by Lot 4, 505. feet; northerly by Lot 1, 340. feet; easterly by Lot 5, 453. feet; and southerly by the Business-Commercial District Zone Line, 510. feet.

The area to be rezoned hereunder also being shown on a plan on file with the Town Clerk entitled "Plan of Land off Plymouth Street, Carver, Massachusetts, to be rezoned to Industrial District A," dated February 27, 1990.

3. Amend Section 3.0 to add reference to Industrial Zone X as a district.

Parking and loading areas shall be set back from street lines a distance of 20 feet, and from side and rear lot lines a distance of 10 feet, except within an industrial park, where no side parking set-backs are required.

ARTICLE 32:

To see if the Town will vote to add the following sections to the Zoning Bylaws, or take any other action relative thereto:

15.0 Site Plan Approval

15.1 Purpose

The purpose of this bylaw is to protect the public interest by providing for a detailed review of site plans to insure that the impacts of certain developments allowed as of right or by Special Permit are in accordance with the purposes of the Carver Zoning By-law; that such developments adequately provide in their design and layout for the transportation, water supply, drainage, sewerage, open space, recreation and amenity needs of the occupants; that such developments minimize any adverse off-site impacts to public facilities and services; that such developments are in harmony with the existing neighborhood character and protect against adverse impacts to adjoining landowners.

15.2 Projects Requiring Site Plan Approval

A. Construction, exterior alteration or exterior expansion of a commercial, industrial, or multi-family structure.

B. Construction or expansion of a parking lot for a commercial, industrial, or multi-family structure.

C. Grading, clearing, or other land development activity except for the following: work in an Agricultural-Residential District, landscaping on a lot with an existing dwelling, clearing necessary for percolation and other site tests, work incidental to agricultural activity, or work in conjunction with a valid building permit, approved subdivision plan, or earth removal permit.

No project enumerated in Section 14.2 shall be carried out, and no building permit for such project shall be issued, unless the project has received either Major or Minor Site Plan approval (as determined by the following table) from the appropriate reviewing board.

Construction—square feet floor space

0-1999 Minor

2000 and up Major

Parking Spaces

0-19 Minor

20 and up Major

Land Development (see 14.2.C)

All activity Minor

At the request of the applicant, the reviewing board may waive any or all requirements of site plan review for exterior enlargements of less than 25% of the existing floor area, and for exterior building or site alterations where the board determines that the standards set forth in this bylaw are not relevant to the alterations.

15.3 Site Plan Reviewing Board

The Planning Board shall be the reviewing board for all site plan applications, except where the use also requires a special permit by another board, as designated in the

Zoning Bylaw Section 8.5. In those cases the special permit granting authority shall be the site plan reviewing board.

When the Planning Board is the reviewing board, no action shall be taken without a quorum of three members (except to continue the hearing to a time and date certain in the event of a quorum not being present) and no decision shall be made without the vote of a majority of the members present.

15.4 Application for Site Plan Approval

15.4.1 Applicants are encouraged to meet informally with the reviewing board prior to making a formal submission of plans to discuss site plan requirements and consider possible waivers. The board may provide a set of guidelines to assist applicants in meeting site plan, architectural, and landscaping objectives.

15.4.2 Each application for Site Plan Approval shall be submitted to the reviewing board at a regularly scheduled meeting by the current owner of record or his agent, accompanied by ten (10) copies of the site plan. After the reviewing board has certified receipt of the application, the applicant shall convey a copy to the Town Clerk for filing.

15.4.3 The reviewing board shall obtain, with each submission, a deposit sufficient to cover any reasonable expenses connected with a public hearing and review of plans, including the costs of any engineering or planning consultant services necessary for review purposes. Any unused balance will be returned to the applicant after the completion of the project and submission of as-built plans; or after the then owner or his agent gives written notice that he no longer intends to pursue the projects, and wishes the site plan approval to be rescinded.

15.5 Required Site Plan Contents

15.5.1 All site plans shall be prepared by a professional land surveyor, professional engineer, registered architect, or landscape architect as appropriate, unless this requirement is waived by the reviewing board because of unusually simple circumstances. All site plans shall be on standard 18" x 24" or 24" x 36" sheets and shall be prepared at a sufficient scale (1" = 40' preferred) to show;

A. the location and boundaries of the lot, adjacent streets or ways, and the location and owners' names of all adjacent properties;

B. existing and proposed topography including contours at two (2) foot intervals, the location of wetlands, streams, waterbodies, drainage swales, areas subject to flooding, and unique natural land features;

C. existing and proposed structures, including dimensions and elevations;

D. the location of parking and loading areas, driveways, walkways, access and egress points;

E. the location and description of proposed exterior lighting;

F. the location and description of all proposed septic systems, water supply, storm drainage systems, utilities, refuse and other waste disposal methods, and snow disposal methods;

G. the nature, location and size of all significant existing plant materials, including tree, shrub, or brush masses, grassed areas, and all individual trees over ten inches in caliper.

H. proposed landscape features including the location and a description of screening, fencing, and planting;

I. the location, dimensions, height, and characteristics of proposed signs;

J. the location and a description of proposed open space or recreation areas;

K. the estimated daily and peak hour vehicle trips to be generated by the site. Plan shall show traffic flow patterns for vehicles and pedestrians showing adequate access to and from the site and adequate circulation within the site;

L. a plan and narrative describing the soil erosion and sedimentation control measures that will be utilized within the site.

M. upon completion of the project, a set of as-built plans shall be provided.

15.5.2 The reviewing board may waive any information requirements it judges to be unnecessary to the review of a particular plan.

15.5.3 Failure of the applicant to submit all required materials may be grounds for denial of the application.

15.6 Procedures for Site Plan Review

15.6.1 The reviewing board shall, within seven days, transmit one copy each to the Building Inspector, Board of Health, Selectmen, Conservation Commission, D.P.W., Fire Department, and Planning Board or the Board of Appeals (whichever is not the reviewing board), who shall review the application and submit their written recommendations and comments to the reviewing board. Failure of Boards to make comments within 21 days of the referral of the application shall be deemed lack of opposition.

15.6.2 Major and Minor Review where use also requires a special permit: The procedure and timetable for such a review shall conform to the requirements for a Special Permit application, and the Site Plan Review process shall be concurrent with the Special Permit process.

15.6.3 Minor Review where no special permit is required: Upon receipt of the application, after determining that the application is complete, the reviewing board shall set a date for review of the plan at a regularly scheduled, public meeting. The applicant shall notify abutters of the scheduled review by certified mail and present return receipt to the board, along with a list of abutters certified by the Assessors Office. The reviewing board shall take final action within forty (40) days from the date it receives the application, after due consideration of the comments from the other boards.

15.6.4 Major Review where no special permit is required: Upon receipt of the application, the reviewing board shall determine that the application is complete. A public hearing to address the application shall be held within forty-five (45) days of the receipt of the application. The board shall then have 45 days following the public hearing in which to act. Notification of the public hearing shall be advertised for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper generally circulated in town, beginning at least 14 days before such hearing. The applicant shall send hearing notices to abutters by certified mail and present return receipts to the board at the hearing, along with a list of abutters certified by the Assessors Office.

15.6.5 Failure of the board to take final action within the allotted time shall be deemed approval of the application, unless an extension has been agreed upon by the reviewing board and the applicant.

15.7 In reviewing and evaluating the site plan, the reviewing board shall consider the following criteria and make recommendations to achieve the following objectives:

A. the site plan complies with the zoning regulations of the district in which the site is located;

B. the site plan minimizes traffic and safety impacts of the proposed development on adjacent highways or roads, and maximizes the convenience and safety of vehicular and pedestrian movement within the site;

C. the proposed development, to the extent feasible: a) is integrated into the existing landscape; b) minimizes adverse environmental impacts on such features as wetlands, floodplains, and aquifer recharge areas; c) minimizes obstruction of scenic views from publicly accessible locations; d) preserves unique natural or historical features; e) minimizes tree, vegetation, and soil removal and grade changes; f) maximizes open space retention; and g) screens objectionable features from neighboring properties and roadways;

D. the architectural design of the proposed development is in harmony with the prevailing character of the neighborhood and the Town of Carver;

E. the proposed development will have adequate water supply and waste disposal system and will not place excessive demands on Town services and infrastructure;

F. the site plan shall show adequate measure to prevent pollution of surface or groundwater from stormwater runoff, to minimize erosion and sedimentation, and to prevent increased runoff and potential for flooding.

15.8 Performance Standards

In order to receive site plan approval, all projects or uses must demonstrate compliance with the performance standards herein.

15.8.1 Access and Traffic Impacts

Applicants must demonstrate that the project will minimize traffic and safety impacts.

A. The number of curb cuts on state and local roads shall be minimized. To the extent feasible, access to businesses shall be provided via one of the following: 1) access via a common driveway serving adjacent lots or premises 2) a loop road shared by adjacent lots or premises. Driveways may be required to provide access to adjacent properties.

B. Curb cuts shall be limited to the minimum width for safe entering and exiting, and in no case shall exceed the Mass. D.P.W. standard.

C. All driveways shall be designed to afford motorists exiting to roadways with safe sight distances.

D. The proposed development shall assure safe pedestrian and vehicular circulation within its site.

E. In each case where a new building or new use will generate more than 100 additional trips (total of inbound and outbound) during the adjacent roadways' peak hours or the development's peak hours a traffic impact statement may be required. The traffic impact statement shall contain:

1. A detailed assessment of the traffic safety impacts of the proposed project or use on the highway or roads through which peak hour site traffic composes at least 5% of the existing capacity on an intersection approach, or roadway segments on which accident potential or residential traffic character is expected to be impacted.

2. A plan to minimize traffic and safety impacts through physical design and layout concepts or other appropriate means.

3. An interior traffic and pedestrian circulation plan designed to minimize conflicts and safety problems.

F. Sidewalks may be required where appropriate to provide safe and secure access to adjacent properties and between individual businesses within a development.

15.8.2 Lighting

A. Lighting shall be adequate but not so bright as to disturb neighboring uses. Parking lot luminaires should have a cutoff of 90 degrees, a maximum height of twenty feet, and a maximum permitted illumination of .5 footcandles.

15.8.3 Parking

A. Projected projects or uses must comply with Parking and Off-street Loading requirements in Section 6.3 of the Zoning Bylaw.

B. To the extent feasible, parking and loading areas shall be located to the side or rear of the structure.

C. Parking areas shall be designed to reduce their visual impact from public ways and adjacent land by the use of vegetative buffers, berms, natural contours, structural screening such as a fence, or a combination of the above.

15.8.4 Landscaping

A. A landscaped buffer strip at least 24 feet wide, continuous except for approved driveways, shall be established adjacent to any public road. The buffer strip shall be planted with grass, medium height shrubs, and shade trees (minimum 2 inches caliper, planted at least every 50 feet along the road frontage), or other landscaping acceptable to the board. At all street or driveway intersections, trees or shrubs shall be set back a sufficient distance so that they do not present a traffic visibility hazard.

B. Removal of large trees (over 5" diameter) along roadways shall be minimized. Preservation of existing vegetation where appropriate is encouraged.

C. Large parking areas shall be subdivided with landscaped islands. At least one tree (minimum 2" caliper) per 35 parking spaces shall be provided.

D. Exposed storage areas, machinery, service areas, truck loading areas, utility buildings and structures and other unsightly uses shall be screened from view from neighboring properties and streets using dense, hardy evergreen plantings, berms, or a wall or tight fence complemented by evergreen plantings.

E. All landscaped areas shall be properly maintained. Shrubs or trees which die shall be replaced within one growing season.

15.8.5 Appearance/Architectural Design

A. The proposed development shall visually enhance its environment; consideration shall be given to appropriate scale, massing, height, roofline and building materials to ensure that the architecture shall be in harmony with the surrounding natural environment, neighborhood and town.

15.8.6 Storm Water Runoff

A. All storm water runoff from impervious surfaces shall be recharged on-site unless in conducting site plan review it is determined that either recharge is infeasible because of site conditions or is undesirable because of uncontrollable risks to water quality from such recharge. Such recharge shall be by surface infiltration through vegetated surfaces unless otherwise approved by the reviewing board during site plan review.

B. If dry wells or leaching basins are approved for use, they shall be preceded by oil, grease and sediment traps except for specific exemptions allowed by state statutes. Drainage from loading areas for toxic or hazardous materials shall be separately collected for safe disposal.

C. Detention/retention basins shall be designed for the 100 year storm. Pipes shall be sized for the 25 year storm.

D. Surface water in impervious areas shall be collected at intervals to avoid puddling and excessive sheet runoff.

15.8.7 Erosion Control

A. The Universal Soil Loss Equation shall be used to estimate the present annual soil loss from the site while under construction and after construction is completed.

B. Erosion and sedimentation control measures described in the plan shall be adequate to retain all sediment within the site and away from wetlands, watercourse, and waterbodies, both during and after construction.

C. Site development shall not begin unless the soil erosion and sediment control measures and facilities described in the plan and scheduled for installation prior to site development have been installed and are functional.

D. Where land is to be developed for building, the board may require that stripping of vegetation and topsoil not be done until all necessary permits are in hand. The board may also require that clearing for large projects be done in phases, in order to limit the amount of time that bare earth remains exposed.

15.8.8 Water Quality

A. All outdoor storage facilities for fuel, hazardous materials or wastes, and potentially harmful raw materials shall be located within an impervious, diked containment area adequate to hold the total volume of liquid kept within the storage area, or shall employ other protective measures acceptable to the board.

15.8.9 Noise

A. Excessive noise at unreasonable hours shall be muffled so as not to be objectionable due to volume, frequency, shrillness, or intermittence.

B. No person shall engage in or cause very loud construction activities on a site abutting residential use between the hours of 9 P.M. of one day and 7 A.M. of the following day.

15.8.10 Utilities

A. Electrical, telephone, cable TV, and other such utilities shall be underground where physically and environmentally feasible.

15.9 Modification to the Site Plan

Before approval of a site plan, the reviewing board may request the applicant to make modifications in the proposed design of the project to ensure that the above criteria and performance standards are met.

15.10 Final Action on Site Plan Permit

The reviewing board's final action on applications for Site Plan Approval shall consist of either:

A. A determination that the proposed project is in compliance with the criteria and performance standards set forth in this bylaw;

B. A written denial of the application identifying the specific aspects of the site plan that are missing or that are not in compliance with the criteria and performance standards set forth in this bylaw;

C. Approval subject to any reasonable conditions and modifications as the reviewing board may deem necessary to ensure compliance with the criteria and performance standards set forth in this bylaw. Existence of conditions shall be noted on the plan and a copy of said conditions shall be filed at the Registry of Deeds.

Where no other sureties are being held, the board may require a surety in the form of a bond, irrevocable letter of credit or other means for those works which, if left incomplete, present a public hazard or nuisance.

The reviewing board shall send its decision in writing to the building inspector, applicant, and Town Clerk within 14 days of its final decision.

15.11 Administration

A. A site plan permit issued under this section shall lapse within one (1) year if a substantial use thereof has not commenced. The permittee may apply annually for an extension of the permit which the board shall freely grant, unless the board elects to modify or rescind the permit to adjust to regulatory changes or to site conditions not anticipated in the original review. If the board wishes to modify or rescind the permit, it shall do so at a public meeting, notice of which has been sent to the permittee 14 days in advance.

B. The reviewing board may periodically amend or add rules and regulations, including the establishment of reasonable fees, relating to the procedures and administration of this bylaw.

C. Any party aggrieved by a site plan review decision made by the Planning Board may appeal to the Zoning Board of Appeals under section 7.2.1 of the Zoning Bylaw.

D. Site plan approval by the reviewing board does not eliminate the requirement for review by other boards such as the Board of Health, the Conservation Commission, or the Historic District Commission.

15.12 Severability

The provisions of this bylaw are severable; if any provision or the application of the provision to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, this shall not effect the remaining provisions.

This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 33. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Stephen DiRado, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to make the following amendments in the Zoning By-Laws.

4.0 Add the words, "Applicants for a building permit should refer to Section 15 to determine if Site Plan Approval requirements apply."

5.2 and 5.3 BUSINESS-COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL MINIMUM FRONT YARD BUILDING SETBACK: Add words, "Where parking areas are located to the side or rear of the structure, minimum front yard setback shall be 40 feet."

6.3.4 PARKING AND LOADING SETBACK FROM STREET: change setback of 20 feet to 24 feet.

6.3.6 MINIMUM OFF-STREET PARKING REGULATIONS, GENERAL BUSINESS, COMMERCIAL, PERSONAL SERVICES CATERING TO THE RETAIL TRADE: Add words, "the site plan review board has the authority, at their discretion, to reduce the number of required parking spaces to one space per 250 square feet of floor area if the area which would have been paved is instead used for landscaping.

This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 34. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Stephen Pratt, it was Unanimously Voted to amend 24.3.2 second sentence as follows: "In no case shall more than two of the appointed members represent the same trade, profession, occupation or business interest."

This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to amend the Town By-Laws by adopting the following Earth Removal By-Law as follows:

Date of Town Meeting action: 6/6/90 Final vote: unanimous

ARTICLE 34:

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town By-Laws by adopting the following Earth Removal By-Law, or take any other action relative thereto:

SECTION 24.0 EARTH REMOVAL

24.1 PURPOSE

To ensure that permanent changes in the surface contours of land resulting from the removal and realignment of earth materials will leave the land in a safe and convenient condition for appropriate reuse without requiring excessive and unreasonable maintenance or creating danger of damage to public and private property, as well as to provide that earth removal activities shall be conducted in a safe manner and with minimal detrimental effect upon the district in which the activities are located.

24.2 DEFINITIONS

A. earth: all forms of soil, including but not limited to clay, gravel, hard pan, loam, peat, rock, or sand.

B. lot/land: a single parcel of land lying in a single body and separated from the owner's or other party's contiguous land by property lines described in a recorded plan or deed.

C. removal: stripping, excavating, mining, or blasting earth and rearranging it on the same lot or carrying it away from that lot.

D. property line: a line separating one lot from another.

E. owner: the owner of the land from which earth is sought to be removed, including individual owners, realty trusts, companies and corporations, or other legal entities.

F. abutters and other parties in interest: abutters, owners of land directly opposite on any public or private street or way, and abutters to the abutters within three hundred feet of the property line of the site as they appear on the most recent applicable tax list.

G. restoration: after an earth removal activity, returning the land contours to safe and usable condition and planting appropriate groundcover, or taking other measures acceptable to the E.R.C.

24.3 EARTH REMOVAL COMMITTEE

24.3.1 There is hereby established a seven member Earth Removal Committee (E.R.C.) consisting of three Selectmen and four additional members to be appointed by the Selectmen. When the E.R.C. is established, one member shall be appointed for a term of one year, one member for a term of two years, and two members for the terms of three years, and their successors shall be appointed for terms of three years.

24.3.2 The membership of the E.R.C. shall be made up as follows:

Three Selectmen

One member from two nominees submitted by the Board of Health.

Two members from three nominees submitted by the Carver Growers Committee of the Cape Cod Cranberry Growers Association.

One member who is an earth removal contractor or construction industry person.

In the absence of nominees from one or more of these interest groups, the Selectmen shall choose members without designation. In no case shall more than two of the appointed members represent the same trade, profession, occupation, or business interest. All members shall serve without compensation.

24.3.3 No committee action shall be taken without a quorum of five members (except to continue a hearing in the absence of a quorum), and no decision shall be made without the vote of a majority of the members present.

24.4 EARTH REMOVAL PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

24.4.1 Except as provided otherwise in this By-law, no earth shall be removed from any lot in the Town of Carver without the issuance of a permit from the E.R.C.

24.4.2 Before a permit for earth removal can be issued or denied, an application shall be submitted on such forms or in such manner as the E.R.C. may specify in its rules and regulations. The regulations adopted shall include, but are not limited to: the method of application, filing fees, required exhibits, site plans, site plan review fees, monitoring fees, bond requirements, and the means of compliance, inspection and administration. This bylaw shall be effective notwithstanding the absence or invalidity of rules adopted by the E.R.C.

24.5 SITE PLAN

24.5.1 A site plan shall be submitted in the quantities and in the form required by the rules and regulations of the E.R.C. Such plan shall be submitted by the E.R.C. to the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Board of Health, Board of Selectmen, Police Department, D.P.W., and other officers and official boards of the town for re-

view and comment, as the E.R.C. may direct. A plan shall also be filed with the Town Clerk.

24.5.2 The site plan shall be prepared by a registered professional engineer or registered professional land surveyor, as the board directs.

24.5.3 The plan shall include, but not be limited to, pertinent information on the following: lot boundaries, names of abutting owners and other parties in interest, streets contiguous to the site, vegetation, existing and proposed roadways, existing and proposed buildings, location of sources of water, sewage disposal, parking, loading areas, easements and rights-of-way, walls, fences, ditches, streams, ponds, and known permanent monuments, and other cross-sections, profiles, and contour maps needed to describe the proposal. The site plan shall show existing intermediate and final ground levels with those of adjacent properties and shall indicate natural surface water flows and drainage ditches if any. The site plan shall also show groundwater elevations before and after removal. The E.R.C. may require drainage computations based on D.E.P. drainage program TR-55 and a sediment control plan for during and after the operation with phasing as required. These computations shall indicate 10 and 100 year storm effects.

24.5.4 In certain instances outlined in this By-Law, the applicant shall be allowed to submit an abbreviated application instead of the full application and site-plan described above. The E.R.C. shall specify the exact form of the abbreviated application in its rule and regulations. The abbreviated application shall include, but is not limited to: the name of the owner, the location of construction, the volume of earth to be removed, the rate and time frame of removal, the removal contractor, and the time frame of restoration. The application shall be designed in such a way that the applicant can file without assistance from an engineer or other professional. Within 60 days of the filing, the E.R.C. may notify the applicant that the circumstances of the project warrant a full permit application.

24.6 PUBLIC HEARING

24.6.1 The E.R.C. shall, within 65 days after the filing of a full or abbreviated application, hold a public hearing on said application. No permit shall be issued or denied until the public hearing has been held. Notification of the public hearing shall be advertised for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper generally circulated in town beginning at least 14 days before such hearing, and by written notice to the Board of Health, Board of Selectmen, Conservation Commission, Planning Board, Police, and Department of Public Works. The application shall notify all abutters and other parties in interest of the hearing by certified mail and present receipts to the E.R.C. Advertising and related expenses shall be borne by the applicant, in addition to filing fees.

24.7 EARTH REMOVAL PERMIT CONDITIONS

24.7.1 The E.R.C. shall determine that the proposal generally conforms to the principles of good engineering, sound planning, correct land use, and provides for the proper and reasonable reuse of available topsoil if appropriate. The E.R.C. may set hours of operation, specify special truck routes, require bonds for restoration, road repair or other purposes, require monitoring fees, and impose safety-related condition. The board shall establish provisions for monitoring the permitted earth removal activity on a regular basis and may enter the premises at any time to inspect for compliance with the conditions set forth in the permit. The board shall also determine that the applicant has the means to implement the proposal if the permit is granted, and to restore the site to an appropriate condition including grading, loaming, seeding, or other alternative landscaping as may be required as a condition to the permit.

24.7.2 Applications for permits may be granted, denied, or granted in part and denied in part. The E.R.C. shall notify the applicant of its decision within 21 days after

the last session of the public hearing closes, provided that any continuation of the hearing beyond the date and time noticed in the advertised hearing notice shall be announced at the hearing for a date, time, and place certain. The condition of the permit, including the expiration date, shall be clearly set forth on the permit.

24.7.3 Failure of the E.R.C. to notify the applicant shall be deemed denial of the application on the 21st day following the close of the hearing.

24.7.4 No permit shall be issued for a period in excess of 12 months. Once issued, the permit may be extended annually without a public hearing, provided the work is carried out under the plans, specifications, and conditions previously approved after public hearing, and does not entail earth removal of a larger quantity or from a larger land area than allowed in the original permit.

24.8 CONDITIONAL EXEMPTIONS

An earth removal permit shall not be required for the following activities, provided the operation does not constitute a nuisance or danger to the public, and conform to accepted engineering and/or agricultural practice:

A. earth removal involving less than 100 cubic yards in one calendar year;

B. removal performed under the provision of a duly approved subdivision plan where the volume of earth removed does not exceed 5000 cubic yards times the number of acres within the limits of construction;

C. removal necessary for the reconstruction of existing streets and the installation of utilities;

D. removal necessary for construction under the provision of a valid building permit, where the volume of earth removed does not exceed 5000 cubic yards times the number of acres within the limits of construction;

E. removal performed in connection with town projects;

F. removal necessary for normal cranberry-related activities or other agricultural uses. This agricultural-related work is defined as earth removal necessary to maintain or improve the owner's contiguous or non-contiguous land for agricultural purposes, and does not include the removal of earth for sale, trade, or other considerations except as provided in 24.8 G, H and I;

G. removal necessary for the construction of new cranberry bog within the following limits;

i. where the average volume of earth removed per acre of new bog does not exceed 10,000 cubic yards; and

ii. where the total volume of earth removed from land in Carver under the same ownership does not exceed 100,000 cu. yards per year; and

iii. where restoration is performed after ten acres are excavated or 100,000 cubic yards removed (whichever comes first). This restoration shall be performed before further exempt excavation is undertaken on any land in Carver under the same ownership.

(Abbreviated filings for non-exempt cranberry bog construction: where average volume of earth removed per acre of new bog is greater than 10,000 cubic yards and less than 20,000 cubic yards, and the total volume removed from any land in Carver under the same ownership does not exceed 200,000 cubic yards in a year, on abbreviated application to the E.R.C. shall be required in lieu of a full application.)

H. removal by the owner of an agricultural operation for sale or trade to other parties for exclusive use in agricultural maintenance or improvement, provided the total volume sold or traded for such purposes by that owner does not exceed 75,000 cubic yards in a calendar year.

I. removal necessary for the construction of an agricultural water impoundment, provided the project conforms to USDA Soil Conservation Service Standards "Pond 378."

J. rearrangement of earth within property lines.

24.9 GENERAL PROVISIONS

24.9.1 If the E.R.C. believes that there is a violation of approved plans, specifications and conditions, or believes that the actual conditions or operations on the premises constitute a nuisance or public danger, the E.R.C. shall order the operation to immediately cease and desist specific activities or the entire operation, pending a review at a posted public meeting after at least 48 hours notice thereof to the operator, which meeting shall be held not less than 7 days following the initial E.R.C. order. If, after review, the E.R.C. is satisfied that the alleged violation, nuisance, or public danger was corrected or unfounded, it shall revoke or revise its order as appropriate. If after such review the E.R.C. finds that the permit conditions may be inadequate to protect the public interest and to carry out the purpose of this bylaw, or that a conditionally exempt earth removal activity may require the imposition of conditions to protect the public interest, it shall schedule a public hearing upon the same notice and hearing requirements as for an original permit. After seven days certified mail notice to the operator, the E.R.C. may revise, revoke, or continue the permit or permit conditions after such hearing, or may revise, revoke, or continue the permit or permit conditions after such hearing, or may impose permit conditions on a previously exempt operation.

24.9.2 All existing earth removal operations shall comply with this bylaw within six months of the effective date hereof, and no further earth shall be removed after that date without a permit hereunder. The E.R.C. shall hear and decide all applications from existing earth removal operations before the expiration of six months following the effective date of this bylaw, if a complete application therefore is received by the E.R.C. within 60 days following said effective date.

24.9.3 The penalty for violating any provisions of this By-Law shall be the maximum amount allowed by M.G.L. for the first and every offense. Each day of operation in violation of the By-Law is to be considered an offense.

24.9.4 If any earth shall be removed without obtaining an earth removal permit or otherwise in violation of this section, the E.R.C. may order the restoration of the property involved in accordance with the provisions of this section. Such an order of restoration will not constitute a waiver of any other fines or penalties for such violations. Anyone aggrieved by such order may within seven days of the receipt thereof may request a hearing before the E.R.C. to be held within 30 days. At such hearing the Board may modify, rescind, or uphold its order. The Board's order, if not appealed within seven days of receipt, or as modified, rescinded or upheld after hearing shall be deemed final action by the E.R.C.

Article 35. This article was withdrawn by Ann Miller, Planning Board. It was Unanimously Voted.

Article 36. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to set the term of appointment for police matrons for one (1) year under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 147, Section 19.

Article 37. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Rita Brusseau, Chairman of the Pond Study By-Law Committee, it was requested that this article be WITHDRAWN. It was Unanimously Voted.

Article 55. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously voted for the Town to accept the provisions of Chapter 40, Section 57, for the purpose of revo-

cation, denial or suspension of local licenses or permits for failure to pay municipal taxes or charges. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the meeting was adjourned to Thursday, June 21, 1990 at 7:30 p.m.

The Adjourned Session of the Annual Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of Carver was held at the Carver High School Auditorium, Thursday, June 21, 1990 at 7:30 P.M., pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated April 24, 1990. The meeting was called to order at 7:40 P.M. by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans, there being a quorum present (75) a total of 144 registered voters. The appointed tellers were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties by the Moderator. The tellers were as follows: Sonja Gerken, Helen Copello, Paul VonBurg.

After the Pledge of Allegiance the meeting proceeded to act on the Warrant as follows:

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Alan I. Dunham, Treasurer/Collector, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars to meet interest charges on temporary loans. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Article 4. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Daniel Ryan, Chairman of the Finance Committee, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Thousand (\$70,000.00) Dollars to the 1991 Fiscal Reserve Account.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Frank R. Mazzilli, Selectman, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy-five (\$175.00) Dollars to be expended by the Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service and appoint Jean Gibbs as Director in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 128, Sections 41 and 42. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Daniel Ryan, Chairman of the Finance Committee, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand, Seven Hundred fifty (\$13,750.00) Dollars for the purpose of conducting an audit of the Town for Fiscal Year 1990. The article was Unanimously Voted by the Finance Committee.

Article 9. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to transfer the sum of Sixty Thousand (\$60,000.00) Dollars from the Ambulance Fund Account to the Ambulance Operating Account, said sum to be under the control of the Board of Selectmen.

Article 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Daniel Ryan, Chairman of the Finance Committee, it was Unanimously Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand, Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars for the purpose of meeting the charges against the Cemetery Fund in the Town Treasury. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Article 11. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to be used to pay for all private work and materials in Town cemeteries, such as opening the graves, building foundation, etc. The Finance Committee recommended the article.

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Erwin K. Washburn, Chairman of the Carver School Committee, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thirty-five Thousand (\$135,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of operating buses to provide transportation of Carver students to and from the Regional Schools, said sum to be offset by estimated receipts from Plymouth-Carver Regional School District. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 18. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Stephen DiRado, Chairman of the Planning Board, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to accept the report of the Planning Board or to lay out or accept as laid out, the following private ways as public ways:

Ward Street—a 40-foot wide, 1250 foot long right of way at the end of Ward Street, the right of way being shown on a plan entitled "Plan of Right of Way, Carver, Massachusetts or granted by Daniel F. and Janice L. O'Connor to Mobile Village Realty Trust, Scale 1"-80' dated August 28, 1981, drawn by Lawrence E. Hughes, Registered Land Surveyor, Kingston, Massachusetts" and recorded in the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds.

Boulton Street—a 40 foot wide, 774 foot long right of way,

Weston Street—a 40 foot wide, 3940 foot long right of way,

Frank Street—a 40 foot wide, 570 foot long right of way,

Bow Street—a 40 foot wide, 5612 foot long right of way,

and Wade Street—a 40 foot wide, 1687 foot long right of way, all being shown on a plan entitled "As-built plan, Vaughan Estates, South Meadow Rd., Carver, Massachusetts, January 9, 1990, Scale 1"-200', Robert C. Bailey, Registered Land Surveyor, Pembroke, MA, owner and subdivider Williams Brothers, Inc. of Marshfield, 1A Fuller Street, Carver MA", the definitive plan of which is recorded in the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds in book 18, page 781.

Craig Street—a 40 foot wide, 1300 foot long right of way being shown on a plan entitled "As-built plan, Section IV, Cranberry Estates, Purchase and Fosdick Streets, Carver, MA, March 28, 1988, Scale 1"-40', Robert C. Bailey, Registered Land Surveyor, Kingston, Massachusetts", the definitive plan of which is recorded in the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds, book 3594, page 783.

This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 19. Upon motion duly made and seconded and discussion by Francis Kane, Selectman, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Thousand, Three Hundred Twenty (\$35,320.00) Dollars to reimburse the Treasury of the County of Plymouth for one-third of the award payable from said Treasury of said County of Plymouth for damages caused by the taking of land on Pine Street under the provisions of Plymouth County Commissioners Decree, No. 1496, dated April 21, 1987. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Article 20. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Alan I. Dunham, Treasurer/Tax Collector, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand, Four Hundred (\$2,400.00) Dollars to pay the cost of issuance of bonds and notes, including temporary loans, pursuant to disclosure requirements as promulgated by the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, 17 Code of Federal Regulations Part 240 and 241, Rule 15C 2-12. The Finance Committee Unanimously Voted this article.

Article 38. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by John H. Mickevich, Chairman of the Board of Public Works, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to lease under the provisions of Chapter 40, Section 4 of the Massachusetts General laws, a sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars for a period of five (5) years for replacement of a Backhoe for the Department of Public Works subject to annual appropriation of principal and interest. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Article 39. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Daniel Ryan, Chairman of the Finance Committee, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to borrow under the provisions of Chapter 44, Section 7, Clause 9 of the Massachusetts General Laws the sum of One Hundred Forty Thousand (\$140,000.00) Dollars for the purchase of a Brush Breaker for the Fire Department. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 40. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to transfer the sum of Four Thousand, Four Hundred Eighty-nine Dollars and eighteen cents (\$4,489.18) from the Fiscal year 1988 County Dog Fund Account and the sum of Two Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-nine Dollars and nine cents (\$2,229.09) from the Fiscal Year 1989 County Dog Fund Account, to an animal control account, such sums to be expended for animal control with the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 41. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Alan I. Dunham, Treasurer/Tax Collector, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to transfer the sum of Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars and sixty-six cents (\$7,850.66) from the Home Health Aide Account to the Home Health Aide Salary Account to fund the Home Health Aide position for Fiscal Year 1991. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Article 42. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend this article by Daniel Ryan, Chairman of the Finance Committee, it was Unanimously Voted to take "NO ACTION" until Special Town Meeting in the Fall, 1990. The Finance Committee recommended this article.

Article 43. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Daniel Ryan, Chairman of the Finance Committee, it was Unanimously Voted to take "NO ACTION" until Special Town Meeting in the Fall, 1990. The Finance Committee recommended this article. The Wage and Personnel Board also recommended this article.

Article 44. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Alan I. Dunham, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to fix the salaries of Elected Town Officers in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 108, as amended as follows:

The election proceeded without interruption until 8:00 P.M., at which time the Wardens declared the polls closed. At the closing of the polls the following was reported:

Precinct I ballot box registered a total of 649 ballots cast. Of the 649 ballots cast, 398 were Democratic ballots of which 9 were absentee. There were 242 Republican ballots cast of which 5 were absentee. This tallied with the check-in and check-out lists of the ballot clerks.

Precinct II A total of 749 ballots were cast. Of the 749 ballots cast, 430 were Democratic ballots, of which 8 were absentees. There were 319 Republican ballots cast of which 5 were absentees. This tallied with the lists of the check-in and check-out lists of the ballot clerks.

The meeting was called to order at 7:55 P.M., by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans, there being a quorum (75) present. The appointed tellers were duly sworn to the faithful performance of their duties by the Moderator. The tellers were as follows: Carolyn Brennan, Helen Copello and Joan White. After the Pledge of Allegiance the meeting proceeded to act on the articles in the warrant as follows:

Article 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded and by motion to amend the word "Article" to number 25 (twenty-five) of the Town of Carver By-Laws by Town Clerk Bernadette L. Hemingway, it was Unanimously Voted "to decrease the speed limit for motor boats on all bodies of water within the Town of Carver from 45 MPH to 35 MPH." This article was recommended by the Pond Study Committee, Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee. This article must be sent to the Division of Waterways.

Article 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded and after discussion it was Unanimously Voted to table this article until the next Annual Town Meeting. (motorboats and jet skis).

Article 3. Upon motion duly made and seconded and upon motion made by Alan I. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was SO PASSED for the Town to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell an obsolete Heckler & Koch P7 9mm Police Pistol and to apply the proceeds to the 1991 Police Operating Account. This article was recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

Article 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was requested by Acting Police Chief, Diane Skoog to table this article. It was Unanimously voted.

Article 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded with motion to amend by Alan I. Dunham, Treasurer/Tax Collector, it was Unanimously Voted that the Town amends its vote on the following articles as voted under articles 42, 43, 46, and 47 as voted at the Annual Town Meeting, Adjourned Session on June 21, 1990, and the following line items on the Summary Sheet as voted under Article 45 of the same meeting date and to revoke such articles and line items as amended:

Line Items 36, 91, 92, 96, 100, 108, 109.

Article 45.

Line Item 36 Police Salaries Account originally voted \$474,057.34 reduce \$28,696.00 to an amended amount of \$445,316.34

Line Item 91 Schools and Vocational Education Account, originally voted \$3,430,413.00 reduce \$86,060.00 to an amended amount of \$3,344,353.00.

Line Item 92 Plymouth-Carver Regional Assessment Account, originally voted \$3,496,184.00 reduce \$76,180.00 to an amended amount of \$3,420,004.00.

Line Item 96 Gasoline Account originally voted \$72,500.00 increase by \$20,000.00 to an amended of \$92,500.00.

Line Item 100 Municipal Employees Insurance Account, originally voted \$643,866.76, reduce by \$437.78 and transfer from overlay surplus \$96,775.82 to an amended amount of \$546,653.16.

Article 42. "No action" was Unanimously Voted on this article, with directions to reconsider at the next Special Town Meeting. There is no further recommendation for cost-of-living increases for non-union employees at this time.

Article 43. "No action" was Unanimously Voted on this article originally with directions to reconsider at the next Special Town Meeting. The sum of \$5,250.00 is requested for the purpose of funding longevity for non-union employees.

Article 46. Executive Secretary Salary account originally voted \$18,900.00 reduce \$12,721.00 to an amended amount of \$6,179.00.

Article 47. Executive Salary Operating Expense Account, originally voted \$500.00 reduce \$375.00 to an amended amount of \$125.00. This Article was recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

Article 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Eighty Thousand Eight Hundred Forty-one (\$80,841.00) Dollars which may be used for State Aid Construction or Improvement under Chapter 15 of the Acts of 1988 to meet the States' share of the cost of work, reimbursement received therefrom to be returned to the Treasury. This article was recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

Article 9. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town to enter into an agreement with the Town of Middleborough acting by and through its Board of Selectmen to provide for the sale of water by Middleborough to Carver to serve no more than forty-one (41) customers in Carver on terms and conditions approved by the Middleborough Board of Selectmen or in the alternative to approve an agreement between the Town of Middleborough and the Town of Carver acting by and through their respective Boards of Selectmen to provide for the sale of water by Middleborough to Carver to serve no more than forty-one (41) customers in Carver. This article was recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

Article 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to accept MGL Chapter 40 Section 42 A-F inclusive by which the Town shall be empowered to collect and establish liens for delinquent water charges. This article was recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

Article 11. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to authorize and direct the Board of Selectmen to petition the legislative to create a "Revolving Trust Fund" for the Council on Aging as follows:

AN ACT ESTABLISHING A SPECIAL ACCOUNT IN THE TOWN OF CARVER

Section 1 Notwithstanding the provisions of Section fifty-three (53) of chapter forty-four (44) of the General Laws, or any other provisions of law to the contrary, the Town of Carver is hereby authorized to establish a special account to be known as the "Council on Aging Trust Fund" into which account shall be deposited all receipts, revenues, and funds received from any source by the Council on Aging and the Council on Aging Department of said Town. Donations from private sources also may be received and placed into said account, as well as monies from other sources authorized by law.

Section 2 Said account shall be maintained by the town treasurer of said town. Said treasurer may invest the monies in said account in the manner authorized by sections fifty-five and fifty-five A of said chapter forty-four. The interest occurring on said account shall be audited by an independent certified public accountant and said audit report shall be submitted to the director of the bureau of accounts.

Section 3 The town treasurer shall assure that sufficient money is available at all times to meet current liabilities. The Council on Aging and the Council on Aging Department in said town shall annually furnish said treasurer a schedule of anticipated expenditures on a monthly basis.

Section 4 The funds and interest of said account shall be expended only for capital expenditures and budget appropriations for the Council on Aging and the Council on Aging Department in said town and only by a majority vote at a town meeting. Any monies so appropriated and not expended shall revert to said account. This article was recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 12. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Erwin K. Washburn it was So Passed for the town to establish a Capital Outlay Committee to be comprised of seven (7) members appointed as follows:

- One (1) member appointed annually by the Selectmen (may be from its own membership);
- One (1) member appointed annually by the School Committee (may be from its own membership);

One (1) member appointed annually by the Department of Public Works Commissioners (may be from its own membership);
And Three (3) members appointed by the Moderator (said members shall be appointed for three year terms). Initially, said members shall be appointed for one, two and three year terms. These members should not have any affiliation with any other town committee, board, nor commission. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 13. Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was Unanimously Voted for the town to adopt the following guidelines requesting capital expenditures:

1. All committees and departments shall submit to the Capital Outlay Committee any article that requests a capital outlay of Five thousand dollars or more.

2. The Outlay Committee shall review all requests and make its recommendation. Said recommendation shall include method of financing.

3. Should the Outlay Committee fail to act, the committee, or department, may submit the article without its recommendation.

This article was recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

Article 14. Upon motion duly made and seconded, this article was DEFEATED (ch. 30 B of the MGL - The Procurement Act).

Article 15. Upon motion duly made and seconded, and motion to amend to accept the text as written with words "or take from available funds or borrow", deleted by motion by Alan I. Dunham, Treasurer/Collector. It was Unanimously Voted for the town to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Thirty-eight Dollars and eighty-five cents (\$8,038.85) for the purpose of paying the first of five yearly payments for a municipal lease/purchase of a Backhoe for the Department of Public Works. This article was recommended by the Finance Committee and the Board of Selectmen.

Upon motion duly made and seconded the meeting was adjourned at 10:15 p.m.

QUESTION 5

LAW PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives before May 2, 1990?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would regulate the distribution to cities and towns of the Local Aid Fund, which consists of at least 40% of the revenue generated by the state

income, sales, and corporate taxes, as well as the balance of the State Lottery Fund.

Subject to appropriation by the legislature, the State Treasurer would distribute the Local Aid Fund to cities and towns on a quarterly basis, and each city or town would receive at least the same amount of local aid it received in the previous fiscal year unless the total Local Aid Fund decreases.

In fiscal year 1992, if there has been any increase over the fiscal year 1989 fund, half of the increase would be distributed in accordance with the distribution formula used for fiscal year 1989, and half would be distributed to each city and town in proportion to its population.

In each year after 1992, if the fund increases, the excess would be distributed through a formula devised by the state Secretary of Administration and Finance, with the advice and consent of the Local Government Advisory Committee. If the fund decreases after 1992, each town or city will have the amount it receives decreased by the same percentage.

This proposed law also requires that the Treasurer publish an annual report about the Local Aid Fund, that the state Auditor publish an annual audit of the Account, and that the Secretary of Administration and Finance issue to each city and town an estimate of funds it will receive from the Local Aid Fund.

Each city or town would be allowed to bring a lawsuit to force distribution of the account and would be entitled to a late payment fee if distribution is not timely.

Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 1990.

The project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is now composed of 23 Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the Town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. The project is a regional response to a regional problem and provides a way of organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees, and mosquito control professionals into a single agency with a broad geographical area of responsibility.

1990 was a year of extensive mosquito activity, due to significant rainfall during Autumn and Spring. Efforts aimed at the immature larval mosquitoes were pushed to the limit. Upon emergence of the Spring brood of adult mosquitoes, ultra low-volume spraying began. Residential complaints were received at our office in record numbers, and all available manpower was utilized to combat requests from homeowners concerning the abundance of mosquitoes in their particular areas. All sprayers and trucks performed well and almost no time was lost to breakdown.

In April of 1990, the Massachusetts Department of Public Health issued an advisory on Eastern Encephalitis to local Boards of Health and Mosquito Control Districts. An additional advisory was issued to all campgrounds in Southeastern Massachusetts in early summer. The first isolation of Eastern Encephalitis virus in *Culiseta melanura*, a bird-biting species, was detected in Halifax the week of June 22nd, and the Health officials were concerned about a spillover of virus into other mosquitoes known to bite humans. The highest risk for transmission of virus to humans usually occurs during August and September. Information based on the Department of Public Health mosquito trapping data precipitated an aerial spray program for all Plymouth and Bristol Counties, plus a portion of Norfolk County, during the mornings and evenings of August 27-29th. A dramatic reduction in adult mosquito populations occurred after the spray program, but three human EE cases had been contracted prior to the aerial spray. All historical case data suggests a return of the EE virus, which runs in a two- or three-year cycle, in 1991.

The figures specific to the Town of Carver are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect town lines, the information given below does provide a tally of the activities which have had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of Carver residents.

Insecticide Application. 13,952 acres were treated using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in May and the last in October.

Aerial Application. Larviciding woodland swamps by airplane before the leaves come out on the trees continues to be very effective. In Carver this year, we aerially larvicided 720 acres.

Our greatest effort has been targeted at mosquitoes in the larval stage, which can be found in woodland pools, swamps, marshes, and other standing water areas. Inspectors continually gather data on these sites and treat with highly specific larvicides when immature mosquitoes are present. Last year a total of 148 inspections were made to 68 catalogued breeding sites.

Finally, we have been tracking complaint response time, that is the time between notice of a mosquito problem and response by one of our inspectors. The complaint-response time in the Town of Carver was less than two days, with more than

475 complaints answered.

Mosquito Survey. A systematic sampling of the mosquitoes in Carver indicates that Culex pipiens was the most abundant species. Other important species collected included Coquillettidia perturbans and Culiseta melanura.

We encourage citizens or municipal officials to call our office for information about mosquitoes, mosquito-borne diseases, control practices, or any other matters of concern.

Office of Emergency Preparedness/ Civil Defense

The Emergency Preparedness/Civil Defense Department has completed a second year with an Emergency Operation Center located at the rear of the Police Department.

With the past year being a bicentennial year for the Town of Carver we were very busy helping with the different activities of the town. June 16, 1990 saw the biggest activity of the bicentennial year with a parade, concert and fire works display. The cooperation of all departments made the day a success for everyone young and old. The Civil Defense office was able to secure extra help from other towns to help these departments with being able to assist with the parade and later with the fireworks display. The help was at no cost to the town and a letter of thanks was sent.

The Old Home Day activities on July 28th was also a very busy day with a road race, concert and the annual clambake. Most of the personnel of the June 16th bicentennial activities came back on this day to help us again.

Since the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) exercise of 1989 we have been adding to the draft procedures and continue training as required by federal regulations. We will be having another graded exercise in August of 1991.

We continue to look for volunteers for the different positions that are still available in the Emergency Operations Center (EOC).

The Carver Emergency Preparedness/Civil Defense Department wishes to extend a thank you to the residents of Carver, MCDA-Area II staff and all volunteers for their cooperation and support of this past year.

Carver has been a computerized library for one year. The success of the operation can be measured in increased circulation, increase in books borrowed from SEAL consortium libraries, and the number of patrons registered.

Children's programs this year included four weekly story times for pre-schoolers, a program from Boston Public Library called Undercover Investigator for summertime reading in which over 200 Carver children participated.

Jan Brett, nationally known author of children's books, gave her last public library illustrated presentation in March to capacity attendance. An autograph session was held after the presentation. Two puppet shows, Fisherman and His Wife and Alexander and the Wind-Up Mouse were presented by the actor who played the King in King Richards Faire. Jane Riley, local persona, entertained children with a clown program. Jon Nemes did a Fire safety program and Mr. Lawrence Cole again lectured on the cranberry bogs. Most of the programs were followed by treats given by the Friends of the Library.

Friends of the Library have increased memberships to 84 families and individuals. Members of Friends are able to use free passes to the Science Museum, Fine Arts Museum and Heritage Plantation. Friends maintain a book sale table in the library. Old Home Day activities also included book sales. These funds are used to buy passes and to same for a public use computer.

Carver Edaville passes were used 113 times by families. Since there were three passes admitting a possible six people, approximately 678 Carver residents made use of this service.

Massachusetts Equalization and Library Incentive Grants purchased book browsers for the children's room and one half-cost of SEAL operating costs. Other

purchases have been the vertical file which, with the help of volunteers, is now a standard service of the library.

Among them are: Friends of the Carver Pound, Site Planning Comm., Tiger Cubs, Public Health Nurses, Plymouth County babysitting course, Carver Arts Lottery Council, Webelos, Pond Study Comm., Recycle Comm., Carver Youth Soccer, Shurtleff Park Comm., Literacy tutoring (4), Special Needs tutoring, Carver Soccer Field Comm., Poetry Workshop, Girl Scouts, Garden Club, CPR classes, and Men's Softball Comm.

Mr. Charles Hamilton donated a 1972 Town Report. This gift completes the collection of town reports on file at the library. Other donations this year: Mr. and Mrs. Katz for several books in memory of Herbert Thwing, Eileen Casey, and Alicia K. Babbin; John and Sandie Mazzuca with periodic donations; Juanita Silva donated over 600 new books, a welcome addition to the collections; Joyce Mazelewski for a three year subscription to Children's Highlights; Mr. Henry Shaw for Town Reports; and South Meadow Village, Garden Club and BiCentennial Comm. for donations to the Building fund.

Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension

Year Ending June 30, 1990

Cooperative extension is located on High Street, Hanson (on the grounds of the County Hospital). Cooperative Extension is a partnership of the United States Department of Agriculture, the land-grant college-the University of Massachusetts, Amherst-and county government. It is a nationwide informal educational program. County Agents are specialists in programs targeted to Agriculture and Natural resources; and Communities, Families and Youth (4-H). Staff consists of a director, two regional agricultural specialists, a community resource development specialist, two home economists, two 4-H agents and a split position, 4-H/home horticulture. Cooperative Extension administers a federally funded nutrition education program, The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (E.F.N.E.P.), located in Brockton.

County Cooperative Extension works on key issues related to Youth Development (4-H), Water, Nutrition Education, Agriculture and Family Life Programs. Throughout Plymouth County, this agency provides teacher trainings, teen programs (4-H) and projects, volunteer opportunities, and numerous educational programs for all ages.

New this year is a cable TV show "Cooperative Extension News and Notes". In the 4-H program last year, 8,923 youth were enrolled. Over 23,000 educational publications requested were processed. Last year, 489 outreach programs were offered.

For the past three years, Plymouth County Cooperative Extension attempted unsuccessfully to transfer the primary funding source from county dollars to State funds under the "University of Massachusetts". Currently, the budget is provided by the Plymouth County Commissioners with approval by the County Financial Advisory Board (one selectman per town represented). Twelve counties in Massachusetts, during the past 6 years, have transferred to State funds. Currently Plymouth and Barnstable remain county-funded.

Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District

The Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District continued to serve the Town of Carver in 1990. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally run regional agency serving southeastern Massachusetts dealing with issues being faced by each city and town in the region. The year 1990 was a difficult one for SRPEDD and for all of southeastern Massachusetts. The economy went into decline and all levels of government had to cut back, reducing the services they could provide. At SRPEDD we found more demand than ever for the regional approach to individual city and town problems. And we found more support for certain state government functions to be decentralized to the regional level.

In the past year, representatives of Carver serving on the SRPEDD Commission were Francis Kane representing the Board of Selectmen, and Nelia Anderson for the Planning Board. The Town's representative on the Joint Transportation Planning Group was William Pierce and Francis Kane as Alternate.

Some of the district's more significant accomplishments in 1990 were:

- o Completion of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which set regional priorities on federal and state grants for transportation and economic development projects.
- o Staffing of the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In 1990, SEED approved loans to 7 small businesses in the amount of \$1.3 million. These loans are projected to create 130 jobs and will result in the investment of over \$5 million from private sources.
- o SRPEDD continued to provide the planning services for the two regional transit authorities, GATRA and SRTA.
- o SRPEDD reviewed the environmental impact of larger development projects in the region to insure that potential harmful impacts will be addressed. This year, we reviewed 43 such projects, commenting on the impact on traffic, water supply, sewage disposal, wetlands, and other development-related issues.
- o Nine applications for federal and state funds were reviewed to insure consistency with other plans and efficient use of public funds.
- o SRPEDD conducted a district-wide traffic counting program and maintained a computer file of all available traffic count data for the period 1980 through 1990 throughout the region.
- o SRPEDD conducted workshops for local boards on Title V regulations (Health) and revolving accounts for review fees (Planning and others).
- o SRPEDD provided assistance to Carver to better manage their annual road improvements programs. Using a computer, road data provided by the towns is analyzed, assigned improvement repairs, and organized in a priority order for roads to be repaired.
- o SRPEDD worked throughout 1990 to expedite completion of the Old Colony Line, which will provide MBTA service into the region with a terminus in Lakeville. A 1992 completion date is projected.
- o A regional industrial land plan was begun in 1990. The plan will determine if more land for industrial development is needed to meet future growth.
- o SRPEDD organized the Southeastern Massachusetts Transportation Management Association representing the business and development community

along with the public sector. The SMTMA has been established to plan for anticipated traffic growth while maintaining the area's economic vitality. The SMTMA's plan was completed in 1990. SRPEDD also established the Route 44 Task Force for citizen input on future road development.

- o SRPEDD has worked with Boards of Health, Wastewater Treatment Plant operators and septage haulers to assess the needs for appropriate septage management strategies for the Buzzards Bay area.

We look forward to serving you in 1991.

Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging

As your representatives to the Old Colony Planning Council, Area Agency on Aging Advisory Committee, we are pleased to present this report of the Area Agency's activities for 1990.

In 1990, the Old Colony Planning Council completed its tenth year as the Area Agency on Aging. The Area Agency is responsible for administering Title III funds under the Older Americans Act for twenty-three communities in southeastern Massachusetts. This federal funding has enabled the Area Agency to respond to the growing needs of elders, particularly those over the age of 85. In partnership with councils on aging and other community agencies, Title III monies have been creatively combined with other funding to develop a range of in-home and community services.

Services funded by the Area Agency during fiscal year 1990 included:

- o Senior center and outreach programs
- o Home health aide services
- o In-home mental health services
- o Senior center services for deaf and physically handicapped elders
- o Transportation services
- o Legal services
- o Emergency services
- o Congregate and home delivered meals
- o Nursing home ombudsman services

These services have become an integral part of the elder service network.

The Council gratefully acknowledges the generous support and cooperation of the Area Agency on Aging member communities, specifically the participation and involvement of the members of the Area Agency on Aging Advisory Committee chaired by Ms. Barbara Farnsworth of Marshfield. The Council also recognizes the work of local boards and commissions and the many government agencies, public and private institutions and individuals who have assisted the Council.

Department of Public Works

The Honorable Board of Selectmen:

During the past year the major accomplishments of the Board of Public Works were as follows:

New pavement done with grade leveling course:

High St. from Rt. 58 to Gate St.—3,890' - 698 tons of mix were used.

Purchase St.—Sections of this street were done from Rt. 58 to the Middleboro Town Line - 509 tons were used to level this section of road.

Fosdick Road—300' of drainage was done. The road was also leveled with grader from Purchase St. to Beaver Dam Road - 405 tons of mix were used on this road.

In Crystal Lake, 3,000' of stone chip seal was done. Also, all private ways were graded at various times and conditioned with crushed gravel.

Snappit Street had 2,000' of reconstruction done at its north end. Also, 2,000 of 1-1/2 binder and 400 tons of mix.

Line painting was done on High St., Rochester Rd., Fosdick Rd., Wareham St., Holmes St., West St., Main St., crosswalks, stop bars and edge lines were done for the Bicentennial Parade area. 25 stop bars were also put on throughout the town. Cranberry Road and Federal Furnace were also repainted. 195,018' all totaled.

Chapter projects done this year:

Center Street was the only Chapter project this year due to State cutbacks. 7,700' of Center St. was resurfaced - 1,155 tons of Type I mix - Line painting was also done - Center and edge lines and directional lines at Storey's Corner. This has helped a great deal in this area. Shoulder work was also done on this road.

Drainage retention areas were cleaned again this year. They seem to work well if taken care of carefully. Drainage was done on Fosdick Rd., McFarlin Rd. and at the Maintenance Building. We also did the septic system at the Maintenance Building. Catch basins are being cleaned throughout the year. We finally have our catch basin truck in good form.

Mowing was not done this year due to cutbacks. Hopefully we can mow at least our main roads this year.

Our Public Safety account has fared better this year. Vandalism and theft have not been too bad. Hopefully, we can get all safety and street signs back on track.

Snow removal so far this year has been light. 240 tons of salt and 600 tons of sand have been used thus far. We still have two more months of winter, but we are in good shape so far. Last year at this time, we had depleted the budget. We are hopeful the winter will continue on the mild side.

M.C.I. workers again have done an outstanding job under the care of Bob Carey. They have done a great deal of work taking care of cemeteries, cutting grass, trimming trees, fixing buildings at various town facilities, and constantly picking up roadside trash. They are also building new E.M.T. facilities and doing a tremendous job. "To the M.C.I and Bob Carey - Thanks."

A number of dead trees have also been taken down this year. This is one budget we would like to expand. Then, hopefully, we will be able to do more tree work.

There have been 334 burials this year and 22 foundations have been put in.

There has also been a new section of cemetery (8,000 sq.ft.) started in Union Cemetery which will be grass seeded and loamed this spring.

We do have a number of projects lined up for '91.' How much we accomplish will depend on the budget and State funding.

We are aware that the town is in financial difficulty. We are also aware of the taxpayers needs. We would like to try to keep our roads, our parks, cemeteries and recreational areas in the best possible condition. Again, our budget will determine how much we are able to do.

We would also like to thank all of the employees of the DPW and all other departments for their help in a most successful year. Bill Halunen deserves a great deal of credit for keeping things going so smoothly. We also would like to thank Alan Dunham, Jeanne Roby, Pat Clark, and Kelly Stuart for their capable assistance.

Public Prosecutor Department

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen:

During the past year, the Office of Public Prosecutor has been involved in the processing and/or prosecution of approximately 625 criminal cases which is comprised of approximately 1,726 complaints.

As a direct result of your Police Department's action, the Court records reflect that from July 1, 1990 through December 31, 1990, a total of \$11,063.00 was collected in fines and returned to the general treasury of the Town. Furthermore, the first six (6) months of the year show a return of \$12,464.00 to the general treasury of the Town, according to Court records. Thus, an amount in excess of Twenty Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars was returned to the Town.

The current backlog of court cases stands at four to five months, in spite of the fact that over eighty to eight-five percent of the cases are disposed of through plea bargaining. The Court still has a double session scheduled for one day a week; however, this additional help has not been sufficient to bring our case load up to a current standard.

The Public Prosecutor continues to be present in Court on a daily basis to handle and assist all Town Departments in any action taken by them to effectuate enforcement of regulations, by-laws or delinquent taxes and to give seminars to your police officers.

Carver Ambulance Service

The Town of Carver Ambulance is operated through the joint efforts of the Carver Police Department and the town's "Call" Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs). Operation of the service is funded by money received for services rendered, primarily from insurance payments, and therefore does not require the expenditure of "tax dollars".

In 1990, two Semi-Automatic Defibrillators (one for each ambulance) were purchased and ambulance personnel underwent the training and testing necessary to be authorized to perform semi-automatic defibrillation in the field. By incorporating this Advanced Life Support skill into our Basic Life Support system, we have greatly enhanced our treatment capabilities.

We would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, in particular Frank Mazzilli who also serves as Ambulance Director, and all town departments for their support and cooperation. A special thanks to the Dispatchers for their efficient handling of calls and to the members of the Carver Police Department who assist us in rendering care to the sick and injured and to the Carver Fire Department for their professionalism in assisting us at several major incidents throughout the year.

Finally, we salute the "Call" Emergency Medical Technicians for their professionalism and selfless dedication to duty. The Town is indeed fortunate to have people who give so much of themselves to help others.

Report of the Town Government Study Committee

We of the Government Study committee have been researching the government structure of towns comparable to the Town of Carver, both in size and population.

We have found that in the past ten years many towns have updated their form of government.

We have contacted some of these towns to find what changes had been made and the result of such changes.

Based on this knowledge, we are studying the possibility of restructuring the form of government for the Town of Carver.

There are numerous changes being considered by our committee.

To present these changes to you at one time would be confusing. We are therefore planning to recommend a few changes at a time. This would give you a better chance to study and debate these changes.

This year we are recommending two comprehensive changes in our town government structure.

The first change would be an increase in the Board of Selectmen from three to five members.

Each of Carver's three precincts would elect their own representative to the Board while the remaining seats would be at large.

While the precincts representative would have the same duties, powers, and obligations as the at large members, we feel that they will provide a more personalized and responsive form of representative for their own precinct.

Having a larger board will also spread the workload by allowing more subcommittee work and introduce more opinions and viewpoints into policy deliberations.

The second recommendation is the adoption of a recall provision.

This would allow voters to remove any elected official from office.

Our purpose is to ensure that the voters have a method of public expression of dissatisfaction with an elected official's performance during his/her term of office, supporting the democratic principal that the ability to govern rests on the consent of the governed.

We have drafted this language carefully to allow the removal of an elected from office without promoting vengeful or frivolous use.

In the past ten years, 67 towns in Massachusetts have adopted the recall provision.

Procedure for implementation of these articles is as follows:

1. approval at town meeting
2. approval of State legislature
3. approval by voters at ballot

Report of the Board of Selectmen

Your "part-time" Selectmen have again found themselves spending more time, than they ought to, doing town business.

The practice of Tuesday evening and Thursday morning meetings have continued. The entire board is involved with Finance Committee meetings, Earth Removal Committee, Bicentennial Committee, Police and dispatcher grievances, Civil Defense matters, various committees as the Council on Aging and numerous legal matters involving potential large sums of money with the professional help of the new Town Counsel, Joseph P. Hannon. Add to this, individual membership on various committees, districts, delegations, etc., your board has been most active.

Among the more positive aspects of the work load has been the successful celebration of our Bicentennial, the hosting of the third and fifth grade students from the Governor John Carver School in their efforts to learn more about town government and the anticipated completion of water service to the homes on Plymouth Street and Lakenham Drive. On this last matter, the Board appreciates the efforts of the Town of Middleboro and Ravenbrook Farms in this urgent need to supply water to those affected by water contamination.

Positive steps have been taken on the earth removal problem and the siting of a new industrial zone, with strict limitation in South Carver.

The retirement of Chief Orr and the appointment of Acting Chief Skoog will be followed soon by the appointment of a permanent Police Chief.

Appointments to the Earth Removal, Capital Outlay, and Recycling Committees will do much to make Carver a better organized town. The Government Study Committee has submitted two referendums that will be the beginning of a Charter for the Town.

The evidence of business failures is but the visual ramifications of something the board and the Finance Committee have been wrestling with for the past three years; namely financial restraints. We have been either very lucky, or have exercised "creative financing" in being able to manage the town without depletion of services with the exception of the loss of the Executive Secretary and one police position. The School Committee has also had to be creative in their financing. Now, with the threatened loss of some state aid and the depletion of various funds and emergency aid, the day of reckoning may have come. You can be sure that your Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee will do everything in its power to provide the most services within the budget limitations. If misery loves company, then the Town of Carver is not alone in its financial troubles. It is a statewide, if not national, problem.

By the time this is read, the Middle East War has been successfully completed. The names of Carver men and women serving our country in the Middle East are listed elsewhere in this Town Report. Until their return, the Board will continue to offer a Moment of Silence on their behalf at all of our meetings.

We wish to thank the various Boards, Committees, Commissions, Town Hall Staff and other elected officials for their help in managing the complicated matters before us. Thanks to our staff of Jeanne Roby, Pat Clark, and Kelly Stuart for their hard work and understanding of the various problems that beset us.

Superintendent of Schools

This past year has been dominated on the local and state level by fiscal issues. In this, my third year as Superintendent of the local school district, I am confident that we are providing the best educational programs possible, considering the limitations we face financially.

Carver has been identified, through the latest federal census, as the largest growth community in the Commonwealth, reflecting a 51.5% increase in population over the last decade. During the last three years alone, we have increased our student enrollment by one hundred and five students. Unfortunately, over this same three year period, we have decreased the school budget each year; \$35,000 last year and \$86,000 this fiscal year. We have decreased our administrative staff by 43% in the last year and still have not replaced 32 of the 34 positions lost in fiscal year 1990.

Faced with such seemingly overwhelming challenges, we have effectively combined staff dedication and parent dedication to keep a positive, educational climate. Without the teamwork and personal sacrifice of our principal(s), teachers, and support staff, we could not have accomplished what we have to date. What have we accomplished? We have survived; an extremely important accomplishment considering the fiscal climate. We have used some very creative and innovative methods to temporarily solve our fiscal dilemma. We have restructured programs, moved staff, downsized programs, even when we should have been expanding, simply to make it through another year. It is extremely important that all community members recognize that we are not providing the kind of programs that we did three years ago and our ability to meet the individual needs of our children has decreased each year. On the first day of school this year, I met with staff and told them that our focus, or theme for the year, would be to "challenge every child". Clearly, we will not be able to "challenge every child", given the further reductions in budget we experienced as late as October 15th of this school year. Our staff has provided the very best they can, under the circumstances, and I am very proud of their efforts. I am also very proud to have served with the school committee you have elected during these difficult times. Mrs. Ellen Napier should be very proud of the six years of dedicated service she provided to the children of Carver. She always had the best interest of your children at heart in every and all decisions she made. Although Ellen will be missed, Mrs. Teresa Katuska brings with her a strong interest in our educational system, both as a parent and as a former finance committee member.

Although the challenges are significant, we have not allowed the problems of today to dictate the solutions for tomorrow. We have remained positive about our primary goal, the education of your children. Our future lies in our children. What we do today will determine our tomorrow. If we are to approach the new millennium confident that our children can face their challenges, we must help them prepare for their future with the best educational opportunities we can provide.

Council on Aging

The Carver Council on Aging is a town department established to serve and assist the senior population of our community, 59 years of age and older. The COA Offices, Drop-In-Center and Nutrition Center are housed in the Marcus Atwood House, located at Lakeview and Tremont Streets in South Carver. This multi-purpose center is open Monday through Friday from 9:AM until 4:PM, except for legal holidays.

Professional staff members (paid and volunteer) implement the programs and services established and authorized by the COA Board of Directors. Federal, state and local funds support a variety of services and programs focused on the needs of our senior citizens. Grants (public and private) also contribute to the financial support of this department.

Professional Services

Certified social workers are available for screening interviews, counseling and referral assistance. Counseling is also available for Social Security & SSI assistance, legal assistance provided by Attorney Lawrence L. Hale from 9:AM until 11:AM (second Thursday of each month) and the Southeastern Legal Assistance Corp., other social service needs: fuel assistance, tax preparation assistance, provided by T.C.E. Program (Tax Counseling for the Elderly), insurance assistance through S.H.I.N.E. (Serving Health Information Needs of Seniors) and health assistance in conjunction with the Carver Public Health Nurses. Free hearing tests are offered quarterly, free blood pressure tests are offered monthly along with annual flu shots and cholesterol tests that are provided at a modest fee. An Outreach Program has been added to our service.

Guest speakers are scheduled as appropriate to keep seniors informed of governmental regulations and/or changes, insurance, health related issues and other topics of interest to seniors. The Carver Senior Organization and AARP Chapter also hold their monthly meetings at the Marcus Atwood House. They too schedule guest speakers and have planned activities of interest to senior citizens.

Senior identification cards are issued by the COA and an updated list of businesses that offer senior citizen discounts has been completed and is available to seniors.

Government surplus food distribution is also administered quarterly by the COA to eligible persons (Jan., Apr., July & Oct.). Food Pantry added for emergency needs.

Daily Telephone Reassurance program available for seniors living alone or in isolated areas of town. Vial of Life kits are available to anyone and can be obtained at the COA office. A Loan Closet is provided by the COA & Public Health Nurses for persons needing walkers, crutches, wheelchairs, bed pans, etc. Magazines, books and puzzles available for loan as well. A Coupon Exchange file is maintained and offered to seniors wishing to extend their purchasing power. Breads and pastries from Purity Supreme and Angelos distributed at the Atwood House (Mon., Wed., Fri., 9:AM - 1:PM).

Transportation

Curb-to-curb transportation is available to the elderly and disabled persons living in our community. Operated by the COA, a GATRA (Greater Attleboro Taunton Regional Authority) mini-lift-bus, and lift-van are in service Monday through Friday for scheduled trips to shopping malls, super markets, medical appointments, social & recreational activities and for special events. A one dollar round-trip fare is accepted.

Nutrition

Congregate meals are served Monday through Friday at our Nutrition Center, providing hot and nutritious meals with social interaction among senior citizens. Meals-

on-Wheels are delivered to the frail and homebound seniors who qualify. A donation of one dollar fifty is accepted.

Drop-In Center/Social & Recreational

Our Drop-In Center is open daily, Monday through Friday from 9:AM until 4:PM for those wishing to read, play cards, bingo, shoot pool, watch TV or just engage in conversation with friends. Our facility is well heated in winter and air conditioned in summer. A VCR has been installed so that films can be enjoyed or used by guest speakers when they join us. Horseshoe & tennis courts are located on Atwood property.

The COA has reserved lanes at Alley Kat Lanes in Kingston and provides transportation for our bowlers on Monday afternoons. Transportation to North Easton Fitness Center is provided on Tues. & Thurs. afternoons for participants in the Aqua Arthritic Swimming & Exercise Program.

Special day-trips to Old Sturbridge Village to view the fall foliage; Narragansett Bay for a days cruise, LaSalette Shrine to view the Christmas lights, the Middleborough Historical Museum, etc. were so popular that more trips are being planned for the coming year: theater trips, musicals, ice shows, sporting events, flower show, etc.

Friend's of the COA, Inc. sponsor various fundraising dinner/dances and will be planning more for the coming year. Our Annual Chicken BBQ and St. Patrick's Day Corned Beef & Cabbage Dinner were very successful this past year.

Newsletter

To keep our senior population informed of activities, programs and matters of particular interest to them, we now distribute a monthly newsletter. Increased postage cost and related expenses prevent us from mailing the newsletter, but they are available for pick-up at the Town Hall, Carver Public Library, Atwood House and in the stores and businesses that advertise in our publication. Newsletters are also distributed on our GATRA buses and with the help and assistance from the mobile home parks, distributed along with their own newsletters.

Sustaining Membership

Friends of COA have launched a Sustaining Membership drive with a goal of 2,000 members. Annual membership fee: \$5 for individuals and \$10 for businesses & organizations. Sixty per cent for "building fund" with forty percent for "operating expenses."

Report of the Finance Committee

The Town of Carver has been no different from other towns in the state when it comes to financial problems. The past three years have been very difficult to budget for and hence, for the most part, the town's budgets have been level funded. The reason for these financial problems have been caused by a variety of things including: increased fixed costs and decreasing amounts of State aid. Since 1988, State aid to the Town of Carver has gone from \$3,234,037 to a FY91 amount of \$2,560,379. This is a decrease of almost 21%!!! Workmens Compensation Insurance saw a substantial increase of 34% in FY91. In FY91 some of the money lost from the decreasing State-aid and increased costs was made up from the excess monies that were in the Assessors Overlay account. These funds became available to us thanks to a law passed in FY90. New growth and the increases allowed by Proposition 2 1/2 were two other areas where money was available to make up the shortfall. The Assessors Overlay and New Growth are not always available and more than likely won't be available in Fiscal Year 1992. The bottom line is that this years budget process for 1992 will again be difficult to fund. It's doubtful that State aid will increase this year even with the overwhelming vote for Question 5 which guarantees 40% of state revenues going to the cities and towns.

This years Annual Town Meeting will probably again adjourn before all the definitive budget figures are known. A Special Town Meeting will most probably have to be scheduled after these budget figures are known in order to adjust the budget based on finalization of funds.

Some issues that the Fincom has been working on and/or discussing that may be of some interest to you are:

1. The independent audit report for FY90 recommended that the Town set up a Lock-box system. All tax bills would go directly to the bank and would begin collecting interest immediately. The interest will mean more money available to the town at the end of the year and less money we'll have to borrow and pay interest on. The Lock-box system is not cost-free but the Fincom recommends that the Treasurer/Tax collector look into obtaining these services for the town.
2. Due to the ever-increasing costs of health and insurance it is recommended that the town investigate ways to which money could be saved. For example, the employees contribution to their health plan could be increased; or the policy which allows part-time employees including part-time elected officials to receive full medical benefits the town should be reviewed.
3. As in every city and town, salaries of employees take up the bulk of the budget. The increases given the past few years have not been extravagant in most cases but have been more than the town could afford. It is recommended that the Board of Selectmen and School Committee get together and discuss how much money is available in a particular year for salary increases as they are the official negotiators for the town with the Unions. It should be noted all contracts (except the Schools) are subject to approval by Town Meeting within 30 days of contract settlement. If a Town meeting is not called within that 30 day period the contract is automatically ratified. It is also recommended that contracts expire around the time of Annual Town Meeting so that the citizens of the town have a chance to vote on them. This has not always happened in the past.

In the case of some departments the increases are not always the whole story. In some cases, in addition to the negotiated increases the employees may also receive an

additional "step increase". These "step increases" are given depending on courses and/or additional degrees obtained. The total raise received can be substantial.

These lean economic times call for moderation in these salary areas. The Selectmen, School Committee and Department Heads should all be involved in a discussion that would stabilize the haphazard way in which raises are decided now. Consistency can only add credibility to the town if they are handled in this manner.

The Town really needs an influx of new ideas in order to get us through these economic times. With this in mind all citizens are encouraged to participate in the system by becoming a member of the many committees that need staffing including the Finance Committee. A citizen cannot get the whole picture of what's going on in the Town by going to Town Meeting once a year. The system is more complex than that. If taxes are your concern and you'd like to participate in the system we recommend that you contact the Board of Selectmen who can let you know what positions are available.

Report of the Earth Removal Committee

The Earth Removal By-Law Committee was formed in order to designate new procedures and requirements in the Town of Carver for the granting of permits that would be reflective of the best interests of the community. The Committee met for over a year to formulate the Earth Removal By-Law. It might be pointed out that three members of the Committee were from the cranberry industry and their input into agricultural practices as related to cranberry bogs was most beneficial.

The Earth Removal By-Law was passed at Town Meeting on June 6, 1990, and the effective date, as signed by the Attorney General, was August 1990.

The "Grandfathering" of any existing earth removal operations and new cranberry bog construction expired on February 1990.

The Earth Removal By-Law was to ensure that permanent changes in the surface contours of land resulting from the removal and realignment of earth materials will leave the land in a safe and convenient condition for appropriate reuse without requiring excessive and unreasonable maintenance or creating danger of damage to public and private property, as well as to provide that earth removal activities shall be conducted in a safe manner and with minimal detrimental effect upon the district in which the activities are located.

In general, this By-Law provides the following exemptions for applying for a Earth Removal Permit, providing that the operation does not constitute a nuisance or danger to the public, and conforms to accepted engineering, and/or agricultural practices.

An earth removal permit shall not be required for the following activities:

- A. earth removal involving less than 100 cubic yards in one calendar year;
- B. removal performed under the provision of a duly approved subdivision plan where the volume of earth removed does not exceed 5,000 cubic yards times the number of acres within the limits of construction;
- C. removal necessary for the reconstruction of existing streets and the installation of utilities;
- D. removal necessary for construction under the provision of a valid building permit, where the volume of earth removed does not exceed 5,000 cubic yards times the number of acres within the limits of construction;
- E. removal performed in connection with town projects;

F. removal necessary for normal cranberry-related activities or other agricultural uses. This agricultural-related work is defined as earth removal necessary to maintain or improve the owner's contiguous or non-contiguous land for agricultural purposes, and does not include the removal of earth for sale, trade, or other considerations except as provided in 24.8 G, H and I;

G. removal necessary for the construction of new cranberry bogs within the following limits:

- i. where the average volume of earth removed per acre of new bog does not exceed 10,000 cubic yards; and
- ii. where the total volume of earth removed from land in Carver under the same ownership does not exceed 100,000 cubic yards per year; and
- iii. where restoration is performed after ten acres are excavated or 100,000 cubic yards removed (whichever comes first). This restoration shall be performed before further exempt excavation is undertaken on any land in Carver under the same ownership.

(Abbreviated filings for non-exempt cranberry bog construction: where average volume of earth removed per acre of new bog is greater than 10,000 cubic yards and less than 20,000 cubic yards, and the total volume removed from any land in Carver under the same ownership does not exceed 200,000 cubic yards in a year, an abbreviated application to the E.R.C. shall be required in lieu of a full application.)

H. removal by the owner of an agricultural operation for sale or trade to other parties for exclusive use in agricultural maintenance or improvement, provided the total volume sold or traded for such purposes by that owner does not exceed 75,000 cubic yards in a calendar year.

I. removal necessary for the construction of an agricultural water impoundment, provided the project conforms to USDA Soil Conservation Service Standards "Pond 378."

J. rearrangement of earth within property lines.

In order to place these limits in perspective, the following is offered as an example
CUBIC YARDS REMOVED PER ACRE = AVERAGE DEPTH CUT PER ACRE

5,000	1 1/2 feet
10,000	3 feet
20,000	6 feet

New cranberry bog construction was limited to ten acres total. Those ten acres must be completed prior to the issuance of further permits.

A By-Law is only as good as its enforcement. To that end, we are taking this opportunity to notify the citizens of the existence of the By-Law and further to invite any citizen, who feels that a possible violation exists, to notify the Committee, in care of the Selectmen's Office.

Complaints will be checked for the existence of a permit and then the inspection by member(s) of the Committee. If the Committee believes there is a violation of this By-Law, then a cease and desist order will be issued and a public hearing held.

Violations of this By-Law will result in penalties to the maximum extent of Massachusetts General Laws.

Please note that agricultural exemptions under Section 9.0 through 9.4 of the Zoning By-Laws are superceded by the Earth Removal By-Law, copies of which are available in the Selectmen's Office.

We trust that the cooperation of all will result in making the Town of Carer a better place to live without intrusion into the industries affected.

Municipal Finance Terminology

The following terms are frequently used in the Annual Town Report and at Town Meetings. In order to provide everyone with a better understanding of the meaning, the following definitions are provided.

SURPLUS REVENUE: (often referred to as : "Excess and Deficiency")

This fund represents the amount by which the Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserve. This is a bookkeeping term.

AVAILABLE FUND: (often referred to as "Free Cash")

Available funds is the amount certified annually by the State Bureau of Accounts by deducting from surplus revenue all uncollected taxes for prior years. This fund may be used by a vote of the Town Meeting.

OVERLAY:

The Overlay is the amount raised by the Assessors in excess of the appropriations and other charges for the purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements granted and avoiding fractions.

OVERLAY RESERVE:

This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific Overlay account for a given year, and may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes or voted into the reserve fund.

RESERVE FUND:

This fund is established by the voters at an annual town meeting only and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) both.

STABILIZATION FUND:

This is a fund created to provide a reserve for capitol expenditure. Appropriations from the Stabilization Fund may be made at an Annual Town Meeting by a two-thirds vote for any purpose the Town is authorized to borrow money for under Section 7 or 8 of Chapter 44 or for such other purpose as is approved by the Emergency Finance Board.

CHERRY SHEET:

Named for the cherry colored paper on which the Massachusetts Commission of Corporations and Taxation traditionally printed it, the cherry sheet carries the figures which must be used by the Assessors in determining the amount to be raised by taxation.

It lists the amounts of county tax and state assessments, as well as the estimated tax distributions from the General Fund, reimbursements, agency funds, and the Sales and Use Taxes.

Plymouth, ss. To either of the constables of the Town of Carver.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are directed to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs to meet at the Carver High School, in said Carver, on Saturday, the thirteenth day of April, 1991 at 8:00 o'clock A.M., then and there to act on the following Article, namely:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers to be voted for all on one ballot, namely: One Moderator for a term of one (1) year; One Selectman, One Assessor, One Member of School Board, One Member of Regional District School Committee, Two Members of Library Trustees, One Member of Public Works, One Member of Board of Health, each for a term of three (3) years, One Member of Planning Board, One Member of Carver Housing Authority, each for a term of five (5) years; One Member of School Board (to fill vacancy) for a term of one (1) year and to vote by ballot "Yes" or "No" on the following questions:

QUESTION NO. 1

This question is non-binding

"Do you support a septage treatment plant being built in the Town of Carver?"

QUESTION NO. 2

"Shall the Town of Carver be allowed to exempt from the provisions of Proposition Two-and-One-Half, so-called, the amounts required to pay for the bond issued in order to finance the repairing and replacing of the heating systems in the Carver public school buildings and the Carver town hall and the removing of asbestos in said buildings?"

The polls will be open until 8:00 o'clock P.M.

And you are further directed to notify said Inhabitants of said Town that as soon as the votes have been counted the meeting will adjourn to May 20, 1991, at 7:30 o'clock P.M., and at that time will reconvene at said Carver High School, then and there to act on the following Articles, namely:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year, beginning July 1, 1991, in accordance with the provision of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Hundred, Fifty Thousand (\$550,000.00) Dollars for remodeling, reconstruction, or making extraordinary repairs so as to repair the roofs of the Governor John Carver Schools, including cost incidentals and related thereto, and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise, or to take any other action relative thereto, said expenditure to be under the direction of the Carver School Committee.

Article 28. Selectmen recommend no action until Town Meeting.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing and equipping one (1) Handicap Van for the School Department. Said appropriation to be expended by the School Committee.

Article 29. Not recommended by Selectmen.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 41, Section 81U, which permits the expenditure of funds collected for the completion of a subdivision from the default of a performance bond, letter of credit, or other form of security, in an amount not to exceed \$100,000, by the Planning Board, without specific appropriation, provided that the expenditure is approved by the Selectmen or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 30. Recommended by Selectmen.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the amount of Eleven Thousand Four Hundred Nineteen Dollars and fifty cents (\$11,419.50) or the amount of Twelve Thousand Ninety-eight Dollars and five cents (\$12,098.05) if two step raises are approved, from the Home Health Aide Account to the Home Health Aide Salary Account to fund the Home Health Aide position for Fiscal Year 1992.

SPECIAL ACT BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Section 1. Composition, Term of Office—There shall be a Board of Selectmen composed of five members, elected for terms of three years each, one representative from each precinct and remainder at-large, so arranged that the terms of office be as nearly an equal number of members as is possible expire each year. Candidate precinct selectman must be a registered voter from that precinct.

Each of the three Board of Selectmen members elected in the 1993 annual Town Election will be elected by a separate precinct within the town as their representative on the Board and will assume all of the powers and duties of the current board. The two current remaining seats on the Board will remain at large.

Section 2. Powers and Duties—The executive powers of the Town shall be vested in the Board of Selectmen. The Board shall have all of the powers and duties given to selectmen under the constitution and laws of the Commonwealth and such additional powers and duties as may be authorized by bylaw or by other Town Meeting vote. The Board shall cause the laws and order for the government of the Town to be enforced and shall cause a record of its official acts to be maintained. The Board shall be the chief policy making Board of the Town and shall act by the issuance of policy statements and guidelines to be followed and implemented by all Town agencies serving under the Board. The Board shall exercise a general supervision over all matters affecting the interests or welfare of the Town.

The Board of Selectmen shall be the licensing authority of the Town and shall have power to issue licenses, to make all necessary rules and regulations regarding the issuance of such licenses and to attach such conditions and restrictions thereto as it deems to be in the public interest, and to enforce the laws relating to all businesses for which it issues licenses.

The Board of Selectmen shall be responsible for the preparation of all Town Meeting Warrants.

The Board of Selectmen shall review the annual proposed budgets submitted by department heads and make recommendations with respect thereto as they deem advisable to the Finance Committee.

The Board of Selectmen is responsible for negotiating with employee organizations under their control.

Section 3. Appointment Powers—The Board of Selectmen shall appoint town officers, boards, committees and commissions as provided by bylaw or other vote of the Town and such other regional authorities, districts or committees in accordance with any applicable laws or inter-local agreement.

Section 4. Implementation—The initial implementation will be as follows:

New positions, following initial terms, will be three years as are current board positions, with the same duties and powers.

Three new members to be elected in the 1993 Annual Town Election. In order to establish the proper cycle of terms of office three candidates will be elected in 1993 Town Election:

- a. One seat will be for a three year term, as is the seat scheduled for election in 1993, to the candidate with highest vote.
- b. One seat will be for a two year term which receives next highest vote.
- c. One seat will be for a one year term which receives next highest vote.
- d. The regular terms of office of the other two current Board of Selectmen members will remain at-large.

Any new precinct formed in the future in the Town of Carver will be entitled to a new representative seat on the Board of Selectmen with the same term, duties and powers as current board members, elected in the first Annual Town Election following such formation.

Section 5. This Act shall be submitted for acceptance to the voters of the Town of Carver at the Annual Town Election in 1992. If the majority of the votes is in the affirmative the provisions of the Act shall become effective immediately.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR RECALL ELECTIONS IN THE TOWN OF CARVER

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1. Application—Any person who holds an elected town office, with more than six months remaining of the term of office, may be recalled from the office, by the voters, in the manner provided in this section.

SECTION 2. Recall Petitions—200 or more registered voters (in the Town) may file with the Town Clerk an affidavit containing the name of the officer whose recall is sought and a statement of the grounds upon which the petition is based. The Town Clerk shall deliver to the said voters petition blanks demanding said recall, printed forms of which he/she shall keep available. The blanks may be completed by writing or typewriting; they shall be addressed to the Board of Selectmen; they shall contain the names and addresses of the persons who filed the affidavit and the grounds for recall as stated in the affidavit; they shall demand the election of a successor to the office, and they shall be dated and signed by the Town Clerk in a record book maintained for that purpose. The recall petitions shall be returned and filed in the office of the Town Clerk within twenty days following the date the petitions were issued, signed by at least fifteen per cent of the total registered voters of the Town in each precinct, who shall add to their signatures their address and precinct number.

The Town Clerk shall, within twenty-four hours following such filing, submit said petitions to the registrars of voters who shall within five working days certify thereon the number of signatures which are names of voters.

SECTION 3. Recall Election—if the petition shall be certified by the registrars of voters to be sufficient, the Town Clerk shall forthwith submit the same to the Board of Select-

men. Upon its receipt of the certified petition, the Board of Selectmen shall forthwith give written notice of said petition and certificate to the person whose recall is sought. If said officer does not resign his office within five days following delivery of the said notice, the Board of Selectmen shall order an election to be held not less than thirty-five nor more than sixty days after the date of the registrars' certificate of the sufficiency of the petition. If, however, another town election is to occur within sixty days after the date of the said certificate, the Board of Selectmen shall hold the recall election on the date of said other town election. If a vacancy occurs in the office after a recall election has been ordered, the election shall nevertheless proceed as provided in this section, but only the ballots for candidates need be counted.

SECTION 4. Nomination of Candidates—An officer whose recall is sought may not be a candidate to succeed himself at the recall election. The nomination of candidates, the publication of the warrant for the recall election, and the conduct of the same shall all be in accordance with the provisions of other laws relating to elections, unless otherwise provided in this section.

SECTION 5. Propositions on Ballot—Ballots used at a recall election shall state the following propositions in the order indicated:

For the recall of (name of officer) / /
Against the recall of (name of officer) / /

Adjacent to each proposition, there shall be a place to vote for either of the said propositions. After the propositions shall appear the word "candidates" and the names of candidates arranged alphabetically, by surname. If a majority of the votes cast upon the question of recall is in the affirmative, the candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. If a majority of the votes on the question is in the negative, the ballots for candidates need not be counted, except as provided in (Section 3) above.

SECTION 6. Officeholder—The incumbent shall continue to perform the duties of his/her office until the recall election. If he/she is not recalled in the election he/she shall continue in office for the remainder of his/her unexpired term, subject to recall as before, except as provided in this section.

If the officer is recalled in the election, he/she shall be deemed removed upon the qualification of his/her successor who shall hold office during the unexpired term. If the successor fails to qualify within five days after receiving notification of his/her election, the incumbent shall thereupon be deemed removed and the office vacant.

SECTION 7. Repeat of Recall Petition—No recall petition shall be filed against an officer within six months after he/she takes office, or in the case of an officer subjected to a recall election and not recalled thereby, until at least nine months after the election at which his/her recall was submitted to the voters.

SECTION 8. Appointments—No person who has been recalled from an office, or who has resigned from office while recall proceedings were pending against him/her, shall be appointed to any town office within 2 years after such recall or resignation.

SECTION 9. This Act shall be submitted for acceptance to the voters of the Town of Carver at the Annual Town Election in 1992. If the majority of the votes is in the affirmative the provisions of this Act shall become effective immediately.

**AMENDMENT NO. 6 TO THE AGREEMENT
ESTABLISHING THE OLD COLONY REGIONAL VOCATIONAL TECHNICAL
HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT**

The Agreement among the Towns of Acushnet, Carver, Mattapoisett and Rochester, Massachusetts entitled "Agreement Between the Towns of Acushnet, Carver, Mattapoisett and Rochester With Respect to the Establishment of a Regional Vocational High School District" as heretofore amended (the "Agreement") is hereby further amended as follows:

1. The second sentence of the preamble to the Agreement is amended to read as follows:

This Agreement is entered into pursuant to Chapter 71 of the General Laws of Massachusetts, as amended, by and among the Towns of Acushnet, Carver, Lakeville, Mattapoisett and Rochester, hereinafter sometimes referred to as member towns.

2. Section VI of the Agreement is amended by adding at the end a new sentence to read as follows:

Notwithstanding the preceding sentence of this section, during the first fiscal year in which the admission pursuant to Section VIII of a new member town is effective, such town shall be responsible for providing school transportation for pupils enrolled in the regional school district and for paying the costs of such transportation.

3. Section XII of said Agreement be amended to read as follows:

SECTION XII—QUOTA OF PUPILS FROM EACH MEMBER TOWN

The Committee shall enroll in the district school those pupils from the various member towns who, in its judgment, are best suited to profit from the instructional program offered; provided, however, that each member town shall have available to it a guaranteed minimum number of enrollees in the day school in any one year as follows: Acushnet, 200; Carver, 150; Lakeville, 60; Mattapoisett, 110; and Rochester, 85; if such pupils are available and willing to attend. Each member town, through its representatives to the district committee, shall certify to the district committee, the names of those pupils who are counted under the provisions of the guaranteed minimum by May 1. On or before May 15 of any year preceding the opening of the school year, the following September, the district committee shall determine the number of vacancies remaining unclaimed under the guaranteed minimum, which vacancies shall be known as the surplus enrollment. Each town's quota of the surplus enrollment shall be determined each year by multiplying the number representing the surplus enrollment by a fraction, the number of which shall be the number of pupils residing in each member town who are attending all the grades from kindergarten through grade twelve in any public, private or parochial schools wherever located on the previous October 1 and the denominator of which shall be the number of pupils from all the member towns who are attending all the grades from kindergarten through grade twelve in any public, private or parochial schools wherever located on the same date.

4. The agreement is further amended by adding at the end a new Section XIV to read as follows:

SECTION XIV—ADMISSION OF LAKEVILLE

A. Effective Date of Admission

Upon a vote of the Town of Lakeville to accept the provisions of the Agreement, as amended, said Town shall be admitted as a member town of the District within 30 days following acceptance by the original member towns of Amendment No. 6 to this Agreement and upon approval by the Department of Education of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts of said Amendment No. 6 to this Agreement and the admission of the Town of Lakeville as a Member Town of the Old Colony Regional Vocational Technical High School District.

B. Initial Members of the Committee

Within 30 days following the acceptance by the original member towns of Amendment No. 6 to this Agreement and upon the approval by the Department of Education of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts of Amendment No. 6 of this Agreement and the admission of the Town of Lakeville as a Member Town of the Old Colony Regional vocational Technical High School District, the

Moderator, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, and Chairman of the School Committee of the Town of Lakeville, acting jointly, shall appoint three (3) members to serve on the Committee, one (1) for a term of one year, and one (1) for a term of two (2) years, and one (1) for a term on three (3) years. Thereafter in every year in which the term of office of a member expires, Lakeville shall appoint one member to serve on the Committee in accordance with the provisions of Section I of the Agreement.

C Apportionment of Operating and Capital Costs

Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, capital costs and operating costs shall be apportioned to the Town of Lakeville in accordance with subsections IV(D) and IV(E), respectively, of the Agreement. In the first fiscal year in which the admission of Lakeville is effective, it shall pay as its share of the capital costs and operating costs for such fiscal year, an amount equal to that which the town would pay if its pupils enrolled in the regional school district were tuition pupils. After the first fiscal year in which the admission of Lakeville is effective, the town's share of capital and operating costs shall be determined in accordance with Section IV and, in addition thereto, commencing on the second fiscal year in which such town is a member and continuing through the eleventh such fiscal year, as partial reimbursement to the original member towns of Acushnet, Carver, Mattapoisett and Rochester for their payment of capital costs on account of the original regional school district building, such town shall pay an annual surcharge of \$31,914.00. The Committee shall determine the amount necessary to meet the annual operating and maintenance budget and shall allocate such amount among the member towns without taking such surcharge into account. After making such allocation, the Committee shall apply the amount of the surcharge to reduce the shares of capital and operating costs of the original member towns which are not then required to pay such surcharge, in the proportion as capital costs are allocable among such towns pursuant to Section IV. For purposes of Section IX, if Lakeville shall withdraw from the District prior to the eleventh year of its membership, such surcharge shall be deemed to be part of the Town's share of the indebtedness of the District outstanding at the time of its withdrawal.

5. To see what amount the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the Treasury to the Police/Fire Dispatch Account under the provisions of Chapter 240 section 7 of the Acts of 1989 to fund negotiated pay raises with the Carver Dispatches' Union for FY '91 or act in relation thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to amend that agreement among the towns of Carver, Marion and Wareham with respect to the formation of a Regional Refuse District as follows:

1. By striking therefrom Section III in its entirety and inserting in its place the following:

"SECTION III—APPORTIONMENT AND PAYMENT OF COSTS

(A) Classification of Costs

For the purpose of apportioning assessments levied by the District against member towns, costs shall be divided into three categories: Capital costs, operating costs, and local service costs.

(B) Capital Costs

Capital costs shall include all expenses in the nature of capital outlay, such as the cost of acquiring land, the cost of construction, reconstructing or adding to buildings, the cost of constructing roads, the cost of consulting services, the cost of any equipment necessary for the operation of a Refuse Disposal Facility and any other related costs incidental to the preparation of such a facility. Capital costs shall also include payment of principal of the interest on bonds and notes or other obligations issued by the District to finance capital costs. Capital costs shall not include any local service costs as defined in Section III (D).

(C) Operating Costs

Operating costs shall include all costs not included in capital costs as defined in Section III (B), but including interest on temporary notes issued by the District in anticipation of revenue. Operating costs shall not include any local service costs as defined in Section III (D).

(D) Local Service Costs

Local service costs shall include (i) all expenses in the nature of capital outlay, such as the cost of acquiring land, the cost of construction, reconstructing or adding to buildings, the cost of constructing roads, the cost of consulting services, the cost of any equipment necessary for the operation of a refuse disposal facility, including a transfer facility, and any other related costs incidental to the preparation of such a facility including payment of principal and interest on bonds, notes or other obligation issued by the District to finance such costs, and (ii) all other costs including interest on temporary notes issued by the District in anticipation of revenue; which expenses or costs are incurred by the District in order to provide to a member town a service or services customarily provided locally or a service or services subscribed to at local option, as contemplated by G.L. c. 59 S20A.

(E) Apportionment of Capital Costs

Capital costs shall be apportioned among the member towns and charged annually on the basis of the most recent available final equalized valuations as established by the State Tax Commission pursuant to General Law, Chapter 58, Section 10 (C) as amended. Each member town shall pay their share of the capital costs in the proportion that their equalized valuation bears to the aggregate of the equalized valuations of all member towns.

(F) Apportionment of Operating Costs

Operating costs following the establishment of the Regional Refuse District and for every fiscal year thereafter shall be apportioned to each member town in the proportion that the estimated weight of refuse to be received by the facility from such town, during such year, bears to the aggregate estimated weight of refuse to be received by the facility from all the member towns in such year.

Within five months of the end of each fiscal year, a determination shall be made as to the actual operating costs of the facility for such year and the actual weight of refuse received from each member town by the facility during such year.

Such determination shall be used when preparing the budget for the second succeeding fiscal year to provide adjustments to each member town's share of such budget. Such adjustments shall be made by charging or crediting each member town with the differ-

ence between the amount of operating costs apportioned to it for the second preceding fiscal year upon the basis of the estimated operating cost and the estimated weight of refuse for such year and the amount of operating cost which would have been apportioned to it if the actual operating costs and the actual weight of refuse for such year had been used when the budget had been prepared for such year.

In order to make the above adjustments, the facility shall contain a motor truck scale for weighing all vehicles delivering refuse to the facility. Accurate records shall be kept showing the weight of refuse delivered by each member town.

(G) Apportionment of Local Service Costs

Local service costs shall be apportioned to the town to which such local service is provided or at whose local option such service was subscribed. The assessment of anticipated local service costs, if any, to each town shall be certified to each town prior to December 31st of each year preceding the fiscal year to which said anticipated costs relate, in the manner provided in Section IV (C) of this agreement. No later than November 30th next following the end of each fiscal year a determination shall be made of the actual local service costs, if any, attributable to each town for such fiscal year. That determination shall be certified in writing by the District treasurer to the treasurer of each town no later than December 31st next following the end of such fiscal year. In the event the actual payment by a town for local service costs in such fiscal year exceeded the actual local service costs attributable to that town for such fiscal year, a credit in the amount of the overpayment shall be made against the next annual assessment made by the District to that town. In the event the actual payment by a town for local service costs in such fiscal year was less than the actual local service costs attributable to that town for such fiscal year a charge in the amount of that underpayment shall be added to the next annual assessment made by the District to that town.

(H) Times of Payment of Apportioned Costs

Each member town shall pay to the District in each fiscal year its proportionate share, certified as provided by subsection IV (C) of the capital and operating costs. Except as otherwise provided in subsection IV (A) or in subsection IX, the annual share of each member town shall be paid in such amounts and at such times that at least the following percentages of such annual share shall be paid on or before the dates indicated, respectively:

July 10	25%
October 10	50%
January 10	75%
April 10	100%

and,

2. By striking therefrom Section V in its entirety and inserting in its place the following:
"SECTION V—TRANSPORTATION

Each member town shall be responsible for the transportation of its refuse to the refuse disposal facility, except that such transportation may be provided by the District and assessed as a local service cost."

and,

3. By striking Section VIII (D) in its entirety and inserting in its place the following:

(D) Apportionment of Costs After Withdrawal

The withdrawing town's annual share of any future installment of principal and interest on obligations outstanding on the effective date of its withdrawal shall be computed in the same manner as in Section III (E) until the impending obligations are satisfied. Due dates of payments shall be in the same manner as specified in Section III (H).

Any future installment, or portion thereof, of any principal and interest on obligations

outstanding on the effective date of its withdrawal, which obligations were incurred by the District as a local service cost attributable to such withdrawing town, shall continue to be assessed to such town until the impending obligations are satisfied. Due dates of payments shall be in the same manner as specified in Section III (H).

Charges which would otherwise have been made to a withdrawing town pursuant to a determination under Section III (F) or (G) shall be assessed to such town notwithstanding the effective date of its withdrawal to be paid by it in the next commencing fiscal as provided in Section III (H). Credits which would otherwise have been made to a withdrawing town pursuant to a determination under Section III (F) or (G) shall be made to such town notwithstanding the effective date of its withdrawal to be credited against any assessment made to such town under this Section VIII (D). In the event the amount of such credit exceeds the amount of assessment the difference will be paid to such town by the District in four equal payments, during the next commencing fiscal year, each successive payment to be made no later than the following dates:

1st Payment	August 10
2nd Payment	November 10
3rd Payment	February 10
4th Payment	May 10

or take any other action relative thereto.

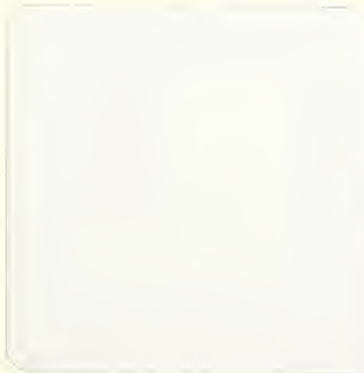
