A total of 3088 ballots were delivered to the Ballot Clerks by the Town Clerk. The Wardens declared the polls open at 8:00 o'clock A.M., and announced that the polls would be closed at 8:00 o'clock P.M. The ballot boxes registered zero (0) at the opening of the polls. The keys to the ballot boxes were placed in the custody of the police officers on duty. The election continued without incident until 8:00 o'clock P.M., at which time the Warden declared the polls closed. At the closing of the polls the following was reported:

Precinct I A total of 580 votes were cast of which 21 were absentee.

Precinct II A total of 767 votes were cast of which 30 were absentee.

Precinct III A total of 796 votes were cast of which 29 were absentee.

2 to further regulate the consumption of alcoholic beverages on certain licensed premises as follows:

Town By-Law XIX Public Ways and Places

Section 2 Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages on Certain Licensed Premises

No person shall consume alcoholic beverages on the premises of a commercial licensee who or which is licensed by the Selectmen or the Board of Health under General Laws Chapter 140 unless said licensee has a license for the sale of such beverages for consumption on the premises, or the selectmen have granted an occasional and temporary permit for the consumption by invitee on such premises of certain alcoholic beverages that have been purchased off the premises by the invitee. Whoever shall without permission as aforesaid consume alcoholic beverages on the premises of said licensee shall be fined \$50.00 for the first offense and \$100.00 for each subsequent offense. Each container of alcoholic beverage shall be deemed a separate offense.

No licensee under General Laws Chapter 140, who has no license to do so shall encourage, permit, or facilitate the consumption of alcoholic beverages on his, her or its premises. Whoever encourages, permits or facilitates the consumption of alcoholic beverages on his, her or its premises without a temporary and occasional permit to do so shall be fined \$1,000.00 for each offense, each day of offense being a separate offense (delete from Attorney General October 27, 1993 see article as posted) and to the extent permitted by law, the licensing authority may with due notice suspend, revoke or revise the applicable license.

The Selectmen may upon application of a licensee grant a temporary and occasional license for the consumption of certain alcoholic beverages on the premises of said licensee, provided that same shall not be sold on the premises and the selectmen find that adequate measures are assured to protect the public safety on and off the premises.

Nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the consumption of alcoholic beverages on any premises licensed under General Laws Chapter 140 by an individual who has acquired such beverage elsewhere within habitable space owned or rented by the consumer thereof and his invitee and within a lodging house, recreational camp, overnight camp or cabin, motel and mobile home park licensed under General Laws Chapter 140, provided the licensee permits such consumption. The term "alcoholic beverage" is as defined in General Laws Chapter 138.

Two Moratorium Districts are hereby created which are defined as the geographical area of the two Historic Districts in the town voted pursuant to G.L.,C. 40C at town meeting held on April 14, 1980 in Article 7 (Lakenham Historic District) at a town meeting held on April 12, 1982 in Article 6 (Savery Historic District). The said Moratorium Districts are defined and shown on a plan entitled "Lakenham

Historic District" dated April 1980, and a plan entitled "Savery Historic District" and dated February 5, 1981, both of which are on file with the Town Clerk.

2. Add to section 4 at the end the following:

Moratorium Districts

Within the Moratorium Districts defined in section 3.3, no new building shall be constructed for any use except single family residential for a period of eighteen months from the date of the town meeting vote hereon. During such time the Planning Board and Historic District Commission shall prepare articles and other recommendations to the town meeting by which to protect and enhance through its zoning by-law the historic assets of the town.

3. The foregoing amendments as set forth herein above shall be in effect only for the herein above stated.

(by Historic District Commission)

ARTICLE 37. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Daniel T. Ryan, member of the Master Plan Committee, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to amend Article 30 of the Continued Special Town Meeting of October 2, 1991 forming a Master Plan Committee as follows:

Master Plan Committee to be comprised of seven (7) members appointed as follows:

Four (4) members appointed annually by the Moderator.

One (1) member appointed annually by the Selectmen.

(May be from its own membership)

One (1) member appointed annually by the Planning Board

(May be from its own membership)

One (1) member appointed annually by the Zoning Board of Appeals.

(May be from its own membership).

Finance Committee recommended unanimously.

Selectmen recommended unanimously.

ARTICLE 38. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by John Temple to WITHDRAW this article. It was Unanimously Voted.

ARTICLE 43. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Fire Chief, Dana Harriman to postpone this article until the next Annual Town Meeting. It was Unanimously Voted.

ARTICLE 60. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Paul McDonald, member of the Carver Town Government Study Committee, to accept this by-law and motion to amend this by-law to Town By-Law #30 (XXX).

A Standing Vote 50 yes, 20 no, it was SO PASSED.

Town By-Law XXX:

A. Purpose: To establish and define the position of Town Administrator.

B. Summary: The Town Administrator reporting directly to the Board of Selectmen, shall be the Administrative Officer for the Town of Carver and shall act as agent for the Board of Selectmen in overseeing the day-to-day operation of the Town's General Government.

C. Job Description:

Section 1: (a) Appointment:

a.1 – The Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Town Administrator from a list prepared by a screening committee.

a.2 - The Board of Selectmen shall appoint the Town Administrator to serve for an indefinite term and shall fix the compensation for such person, annually, within the amount appropriated by the town.

a.3 – The Town Administrator shall be appointed on the basis of educational, executive, and administrative qualifications and experience.

(b) Qualifications:

b.1 – The educational qualifications shall consist of a master's degree, preferably in public or business administration, granted by an accredited degree-granting college or university. The professional experience shall include at least three (3) years of prior full-time compensated executive service in public or business administration; or

b.2 – Five (5) years or more of such professional experience and a bachelor's degree in an appropriate discipline shall qualify any applicant.

b.3 - A proven ability to relate to a variety of constituencies, included but not limited to town elected and appointed officials, committees and boards and the general public.

b.4 – Demonstrated ability and experience with computers, in particular, data bases, spreadsheets and word processing.

(c) Conditions:

c.1 - A Town Administrator need not be a resident of the town or of the Commonwealth at the time of appointment, nor at any time during the period of such service.

c.2 – The Town Administrator shall not have served in an elective office in the town government for at least twelve months prior to appointment.

c.3 – The Town may from time to time establish, by by-law, such additional qualifications as seem necessary and appropriate.

c.4 – The Town Administrator shall devote full time to the office and shall not hold any other public office, elected or appointive, nor engage in any business or occupation during such service, unless such action is approved in advance by the Board of Selectmen.

c.5 – The Board of Selectmen shall provide for an annual review of the job performance of the Town Administrator which shall, at least in summary form, be a public record.

Section 2. Powers and Duties – The Town Administrator shall be the chief administrative officer of the town, directly responsible to the Board of Selectmen for the administration of all town affairs for which the offices of Town Administrator is given responsibility by or under this by-law. The powers and duties of the Town Administrator as in regard to the police department and the fire department shall be in accordance with MGL Chapter 41, Section 97A and MGL Chapter 48, Section 42 - both having been accepted by the Town of Carver. The powers and duties of the Town Administrator shall include, but are not intended to be limited to the following:

(a) Appointment Duties:

a.1 – To appoint officers, members of boards and commissions as provided by by-law. Copies of the notices of all such proposed appointments shall be posted on the town bulletin board when submitted to the Board of Selectmen. Such appointments shall become effective on the fifteenth (15th) day following the day on which such notice of the appointment is filed with the Board of Selectmen, unless the Board of Selectmen shall, within that period by a majority of all of its members, vote to reject such appointment, or has sooner voted to affirm it.

a.2 – The Town Administrator shall also appoint, on the basis of merit and fairness alone, and, except as may otherwise be provided by general law or collective bargaining agreements.

(a) all town employees, including secretarial and clerical personnel; part time or full time, in consultation with the elected or appointed town officials to whom said employees report;

(b) all employees of appointed town multi-member bodies;

(c) one or more inspectors; and

(d) all other full-time, part time or seasonal employees, except those of the police and call fire department and the school committee.

All such appointments shall be subject to disapproval by a majority vote of all of the selectmen taken within fifteen (15) days.

(B) Financial Management Duties:

b.1 - To assure that full and complete records of the financial and administrative activities of the town are kept and to render as often as may be required by the Board of Selectmen, but not less than once a year, a full report of all town administrative operations during the period reported on, which report shall be made available to the public.

b.2 - To prepare and present, an annual operating budget for the town and present a capital improvement plan, prepared by the Capital Outlay Committee for the five (5) fiscal years next ensuing.

b.3 - To be the chief procurement officer for the town, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 30B of the Massachusetts General Laws, and to appoint such assistant procurement officers as provided in Chapter 30B of the M.G.L.

b.4 – Inspect and submit warrants for payment to the Board of Selectmen.

(C) Personnel Management Duties:

c.1 - To be entrusted with the administration of the town personnel system, including, but not limited to personnel policies and procedures, rules, and regulations, including provisions for an annual employee performance review, personnel by-law and collective bargaining agreements entered into by the town.

The Town Administrator shall also prepare and keep current a plan establishing the personnel staffing requirements for each town agency, except the school department.

c.2 – To negotiate, on behalf of the Board of Selectmen, all contracts and collective bargaining agreements involving any subject within the jurisdiction of the office of the Town Administrator, including contracts with town employees, except employees of the school department, involving wages, hours and other terms and conditions of employment. All such contracts and agreements shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen.

(D) Administrative Duties:

d.1 - To supervise, direct and be responsible for the efficient administration of all functions and activities for which the office of Town Administrator is given authority, responsibility or control by this by-law.

d.2 – To attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Selectmen, unless unavoidable for reasonable cause, and shall have a voice, but not vote, in all of its proceedings.

d.3 - To keep the Board of Selectmen fully advised as to the needs of the town and recommend to the Board of Selectmen and to other elected town officers and agencies for adoption such measures requiring action by them or by the town meeting as the Town Administrator may deem necessary or expedient.

d.4 – The Town Administrator shall be responsible for the maintenance and repair, rental and use, of all town buildings and facilities placed under the Town Administrator's control by this by-law, by vote of the town or otherwise.

d.5 – To assure that a full and complete inventory of all property of the town, both real and personal, is kept, including all property under the control of the school committee.

d.6 - To see that the provisions of the general laws, town by-laws and other votes of the town meeting and votes of the Board of Selectmen which require enforcement by the Town Administrator are faithfully executed.

d.7 – Keep records of his activities and render a full report to the Board of Selectmen when required.

d.8 – To coordinate the activities of all town agencies serving under the office of the Town Administrator and the office of the Board of Selectmen with those under the control of other officers and multiple member bodies elected directly by the voters. For this purpose the Town Administrator shall have authority to require the persons so elected, or their representatives to meet with Town Administrator, at reasonable times, for the purpose of effecting coordination and cooperation among all agencies of the town. The Town Administrator shall have the right to attend and speak at any regular meeting of any multiple member body.

d.9 - To seek and review by initiative or upon request of any town officer, those state, federal, regional and all other grants which may be of benefit to the Town of

Carver. The Town Administrator shall be the authority responsible for the reviewing and completing all applications for such grants, except as otherwise authorized by statutes. Once drafted, all grant applications shall be submitted to the Board of Selectmen for their approval and signature.

d.10 – To be responsible for any and all dispositions of non-criminal citations issued in the Town of Carver. The Town Administrator will be responsible for assigning one or more assistant clerks as required.

d.11 – To be responsible for the publication, maintenance and review of the town by-laws and of any duly authorized revisions, amendments, additions, or other changes pertaining thereto. Subsequent to enactment by the town meeting, copies of the revised by-laws shall be forwarded to the Attorney General of the Commonwealth for approval, and they shall be otherwise published, all as required by general laws. Copies of the revised by-laws shall be made available for distribution to the public.

d.12 – To attend all sessions of all town meetings and answer questions raised by voters which relate to warrant articles and to matters over which the Town Administrator exercises any supervision.

d.13 – To inquire at anytime, into the conduct and operation of office or performance of duties of any officer or employee, department, board commission or other town agency.

d.14 - Receive and address citizen complaints and needs.

d.15 – To perform any other duties as are required to be performed by the Town Administrator by by-laws, administrative code, votes of the Town meeting or votes of the Board of Selectmen, or otherwise.

(D) – Effect: To the extent that the provisions of this By-Law modify or repeal existing By-Laws of the Town of Carver, this By-Law shall govern.

(Carver Town Government Study Committee)

Upon motion duly made and seconded by Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Thomas Russell, it was Unanimously Voted to adjourn this annual town meeting to June 14th at 7:30 P.M.

ARTICLE 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Fire Chief Dana Harriman, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to appropriate, by available funds in the treasury, the sum of Nineteen Thousand Four Hundred Two (\$19,402.00) Dollars to purchase and equip a 4 wheel drive replacement cruiser for the Fire Department.

ARTICLE 2. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell the 1984 Ford Fire Department Cruiser and to apply the proceeds to the Fire Department Purchase of Small Equipment Account.

Chapter 44, Section 64. Said expenditure to be under the direction of the Selectmen.

M.P.G. Newspapers \$119.00 (Conservation Commission) Selectmen recommended. Finance Committee recommended.

ARTICLE 6. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion by Board of Selectmen, Chairman, Thomas Russell, it was SO PASSED 75 yes, 28 no for the Town to borrow a sum not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$350,000.00) Dollars to pay the judgments against it entered and to be approved by a judge of the Plymouth Superior Court in the Complaint entitled Zigouras, et als v. Carver, et als, CA Number 90-0315 B, and said borrowing in accordance with Chapter 44, Section 7 (11), M.G.L.

ARTICLE 7. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Daniel Brassil, Finance Committee Chairman, it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to reallocate Fiscal Year 1993 budget line items, voted in Article 68 of the Annual Town Meeting of 1992. The reallocation will not result in an increase or decrease of the total budget as follows:

ARTICLE 8. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Michael C. Harris, D.P.W. Commissioner, it was Unanimously Voted that this article supersede and replace the existing General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 6N, by-law and to number the by-law the same as that being replaced as follows:

Town By-Law XXIX – REPAIR OF PRIVATE WAYS

Pursuant to General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 6N, the Town shall make repairs to private ways in the Town of Carver only if all of the following requirements are first met:

(a) The repair to the road surface shall consist only of grading and leveling and patching with bituminous concrete, recovered asphalt paving, or processed gravel.

(b) The repair may include drainage improvements.

(c) No repair or drainage improvement shall be made until the Board of Public Works Commissioners has first voted as to declare the particular repair a public necessity, provided however, that no betterment or cash deposit shall be assessed or required for a repair so declared and there shall be no requirement of petition from abutters to the particular private way to be repaired.

(d) No repair shall be made of any land except with express written permission from the owner thereof, unless such owner is not determinable on the records of the Assessors, and the Town shall not be liable for damage caused by such repair.

(e) No private way shall be repaired unless said way has been in existence and open to the public continuing since July 1, 1983, and no private way which the Town Meeting has expressly refused to accept shall be eligible for repair hereunder.

(f) The town shall have no duty to repair a private way and such repairs shall be subject to the appropriation of funds therefor by Town Meeting.

Selectmen recommended unanimously.

ARTICLE 9. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to accept the provisions of General Laws Chapter 40, Section 57 and insert in its by-laws the following provision:

TOWN BY-LAW XXXI - DENIAL, REVOCATION OR SUSPENSION OF CERTAIN LICENSES

Section 1. Every Town of Carver licensing authority (including without limitation every town board, officer and department) shall deny an application for, or revoke or suspend any local license or permit including renewals and transfer for any person, corporation or business enterprise who has neglected or refused to pay any local taxes, fees, assessments, betterments or any other municipal charges. Such denial, revocation, or suspension shall be subject to the following limitations:

(a) The name of the person, corporation or business enterprise affected shall appear on a list furnished to the licensing authority as required in section 2 of this bylaw.

(b) A hearing after due notice is afforded the affected person, corporation, or business enterprise as is required in section 3 of the bylaw.

(c) The affected person, corporation or business enterprise has been given notice of the opportunity to enter into an agreement as provided in section 4 of the bylaw.

Section 2. The tax collector and all other town officials responsible for records of all town taxes, assessments, betterments and other town charges shall annually furnish to each department, board, commission or division, hereinafter referred to as the licensing authority, that issues licenses or permits including renewals and transfers, a list of any person, corporation, or business enterprise, hereinafter referred to as the party, that has neglected or refused to pay any local taxes, fees, assessments, betterments or other town charges for not less than a twelve month period, and that such party has not filed in good faith a pending application for an abatement of such tax or a pending petition before the appellate tax board.

Section 3. The licensing authority shall deny, revoke or suspend any license or permit, including renewals and transfers of any party whose name appears on said list furnished to the licensing authority from the tax collector; provided, however, that

written notice is given to the party and the tax collector, as required by applicable provisions of law, and the party is given a hearing, to be held not earlier than fourteen days after said notice. Said list shall be prima facie evidence for denial, revocation or suspension of said license or permit to any party. The tax collector shall have the right to intervene in any hearing conducted with respect to such license denial, revocation or suspension. Any findings made by the licensing authority with respect to such license denial, revocation or suspension shall be made only for the purposes of such proceeding and shall not be relevant to or introduced in any other proceeding at law, except for any appeal from such license denial, revocation or suspension.

Section 4. Any party shall be given an opportunity to enter into a payment agreement, thereby allowing the licensing authority to issue a certificate indicating said limitations to the license or permit and the validity of said license shall be conditioned upon the satisfactory compliance with said agreement. Failure to comply with said agreement shall be grounds for the suspension or revocation of said license or permit; provided, however, that the holder be given notice and a hearing as required by applicable provisions of law.

Section 5. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the board of selectmen may waive such denial, suspension or revocation if it finds there is no direct or indirect business interest by the property owner, its officers or stockholders, if any, or members of his immediate family, as defined in section one of chapter two hundred and sixty-eight A in the business or activity conducted in or on said property.

Section 6. This bylaw shall not apply to the following licenses and permits: open burning; section thirteen of chapter forty-eight; bicycle permits, section eleven A of chapter eighty-five; sales of articles for charitable purposes, section thirty-three of chapter one hundred and one; children work permits, section sixty-nine of chapter one hundred and forty-nine; clubs, associations dispensing food or beverage licenses; section twenty-one E of chapter one hundred and forty; dog licenses, section one hundred and thirty-seven of chapter one hundred and forty; fishing, hunting, trapping licenses, section twelve of chapter one hundred and thirty-one; marriage licenses, section twenty-eight of chapter two hundred and seven and theatrical events, public exhibition permits, section one hundred and eighty-one of chapter one hundred and forty.

Section 7. Any license or permit denied, suspended or revoked under this shall not be reissued or renewed until the license authority receives a certificate issued by the tax collector that the party is in good standing with respect to any and all town taxes, fees, assessments, betterments or other municipal charges, payable to the town, as the date of issuance of said certificate.

Selectmen recommended unanimously.

ARTICLE 10. Upon motion duly made and seconded and motion to amend by Daniel Brassil, Chairman of the Finance Committee it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to transfer from available funds in the treasury a sum of \$10,000.00 (Ten Thousand) Dollars to the Police Salaries Account to pay the negotiated police union contract for fiscal year 1993. Upon motion duly made and seconded by Nancy A. Seamans, Moderator, it was Unanimously Voted to adjourn.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING MONDAY, OCTOBER 25,1993

The Special Town Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Carver was held on October 25, 1993, at 7:30 o'clock P.M., pursuant to a Warrant of the Board of Selectmen dated October 5, 1993. The meeting was called to order at 7:45 P.M., by the Moderator, Nancy A. Seamans, with the Pledge of Allegiance. There being a quorum present (75) with a total of registered voters being 316. ARTICLE 1. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was Unanimously Voted for the Town to transfer Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars from the Ambulance Fund Account to the Ambulance Operating Account, said amount to be used in accordance with the Board of Selectmen vote of August 10, 1993, to fund an increase effective December 1, 1993 in semi-annual payments to call E.M.T.'s to the same amount as previously agreed to for Police E.M.T.'s Six Hundred Fifty (\$650.00) Dollars and to provide funds for the inoculation of E.M.T.'s in need of Hepatitis Binnoculation. Said sum to be under the control of the Board of Selectmen.

Selectmen voted unanimously.

Finance Committee voted 4 Yes, 2 No - 1 abstain.

Report of the Board of Assessors

For Fiscal Year 1994 the Board of Assessors clerical help has once again undergone changes. Laurie Harris departed our office in July to join the Hanover Assessors Office. She was a great asset to our office and she will be missed. Joanne Reposa has taken over Mrs. Harris' position and is proving to be a competent clerk. Becky Williams passed Course 201: Fundamental of Real Property Appraisal. The Town of Carver has successfully completed a re-evaluation of the Town and was certified by the Department of Revenue in September. This could not have been accomplished without the professional expertise of Patriot Properties, Inc.

Excise bills were received in our office from the Registry of Motor Vehicles for 1993 with 543 abatements granted. The Board of Assessors also granted 162 exemptions and 84 property tax abatements. The total amount of fees received in the Assessors office and returned to the Town's general fund was, \$782.00.

Report of the Council on Aging

The Carver Council on Aging is a town department established to serve and assist the senior population of our community, 59 years of age and older. The COA Offices, Drop-In Center and Nutrition Center are housed in the Marcus Atwood House, located at Lakeview and Tremont Streets in South Carver. This multi-purpose center is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., except for legal holidays.

Professional staff members (paid and volunteer) implement the programs and services established and authorized by the COA Board of Directors. Federal, state and local funds support a variety of services and programs focused on the needs of our senior citizens. Grants (public and private) also contribute to the financial support of this department.

Professional Services

Certified social workers are available for screening interviews, counseling and referral assistance. Counseling is also available for Social Security and SSI assistance, legal assistance provided by Attorney Lawrence L. Hale from 9:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. (second Thursday of each month) and the Southeastern Legal Assistance Corp. Other social service needs: fuel assistance, tax preparation assistance, provided by T.C.E. Program (Tax Counseling for the Elderly), insurance assistance through S.H.I.N.E. (Serving Health Information Needs of Elders) and health assistance in conjunction with the Carver Public Health Nurses. Free hearing tests are offered quarterly, free blood pressure tests are offered monthly along with annual flu shots and cholesterol tests that are provided at a modest fee. An Outreach Program becomes the "point of entry" to the COA and senior network for many seniors and members of their family. Geriatric Mental Health Social Workers are available through Catholic Charities and OCPC.

Daily Telephone Reassurance program available for seniors living alone or in isolated areas of town. Vial of Life kits are available to anyone and can be obtained at the COA office. A Loan Closet is provided by the COA and Public Health Nurses for persons needing walkers, crutches, wheelchairs, bed pans, etc. Magazines, books and puzzles available for loan as well. A Coupon Exchange file is maintained and offered to seniors wishing to extend their purchasing power. Breads and pastries from Carver's Shaw Market distributed at the Atwood House (Mon. thru Fri., 9:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.). The most recent service added to the COA is a Notary Public, available to seniors at no charge.

Guest speakers are scheduled as appropriate to keep seniors informed of governmental regulations and/or changes, insurance, health related issues and other topics of interest to seniors. The Carver Senior Citizens and AARP Chapter also hold their monthly meetings at the Marcus Atwood House. They too schedule guest speakers and have planned activities of interest to senior citizens.

Senior identification cards are issued by the COA and an updated list of businesses that offer senior citizen discounts is available to seniors.

Government surplus food distribution is administered quarterly by the COA to eligible persons (Jan., Apr., July and Oct.). Food pantry is open daily and made possible by on-going donations from Carver residents, organizations and businesses.

Transportation

Curb-to-curb transportation is available to the elderly and disabled persons living in our community. Operated by the COA, a GATRA (Greater Attleboro Taunton Regional Authority) mini-lift-bus & 2 lift vans are in service Monday through Friday for scheduled trips to shopping malls, super markets, medical appointments, social and recreational activities and for special events. A donation of one dollar fifty is accepted.

Adult Day Care Center

Although the Carver COA does not operate an adult day care center, we do provide transportation to Carver seniors enrolled in the Middleboro COA Adult Day Care Center on Monday through Friday.

Nutrition

Congregate meals are served Monday through Friday at our Nutrition Center, providing hot and nutritious meals with social interaction among senior citizens. Meals-on-Wheels are delivered to the frail and homebound seniors who qualify. A donation of two dollars is accepted.

Drop-In Center/Social and Recreational

Our Drop-In Center is open daily, Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. for those wishing to read, play cards, bingo, shoot pool, watch TV or just engage in conversation with friends. Our facility is well heated in winter and air conditioned in summer. A VCR has been installed so that films can be enjoyed or used by guest speakers when they join us. Horseshoe and tennis courts are located on Atwood property.

The COA has reserved lanes at Alley Kat Lanes in Kingston and provides transportation for our bowlers on Friday afternoons. Transportation to the YMCA in Middleboro is provided on Tuesday and Thursday mornings for participants in the Aqua Arthritic Swimming and Exercise Program.

Special day-trips are planned for the coming year: theater trips, musicals, ice shows, sporting events, flower show, etc.

Friends of the COA, Inc. sponsor various fundraising dinner/dances and will be planning more for the coming year. Our Annual Chicken BBQ and St. Patrick's Day Corned Beef and Cabbage Dinner remain popular. A traditional Turkey Dinner with all the trimmings has become an annual event for elders living in Carver and surrounding communities Thanksgiving Day.

Sustaining Membership

Friends of COA have launched a Sustaining Membership drive with a goal of 2,000 members. Annual membership fee: \$5 for individuals and \$10 for businesses and organizations. Sixty percent for "building fund" with forty percent for "operating expenses."

Newsletter

To keep our senior population informed of activities, programs and matters of particular interest to them, we now distribute a monthly newsletter. Increased postage cost and related expenses prevent us from mailing the newsletter, but they are available for pick-up at the Town Hall, Carver Public Library, Atwood House and in the stores and businesses that advertise in our publication. Newsletters are also distributed on our GATRA buses and with the help and assistance from the mobile home parks, distributed along with their own newsletters.

Interesting Statistical Information

- Carver's senior population is the fastest growing in the Commonwealth, with a 216% increase between 1980 and 1990 (US Census)
- There were 7,361 passenger trips last year, including 391 trips for Handicapped Elders and 307 Handicapped Non-Elders.
- Congregate Meals served at the Nutrition Center totaled 5,941 and Meals on Wheels were delivered to homebound elders totaling 5,110 meals.
- Volunteers (105 persons) donated a total of 7,533 hours valued in dollars at \$65,842.00
- Total Senior Service Budget amounted to \$253,950.58 of which, only \$51,720.42 was appropriated by Town Meeting. The balance came from grants, donations and fund raising.

Report of the Housing Authority

The Carver Housing Authority now meets on the third Wednesday of each month to process the business of managing two programs of State subsidized housing. There are twenty units for elderly and eight units for families. The Authority also oversees the leasing of eight units for those with mental illness to the Department of Mental Health.

The Executive Director for the Authority is Donna Fernandes. Additional staff persons are Melanie Sherwood, secretary and Peter Nelson, maintenance foreman. All are part-time positions.

In 1993 our chairperson was Richard Hoadley who was reappointed as the state representative on the Board. Other commissioners were Juanita Ashley, James Lynch, Robert Merritt and Ann Solomon.

The major effort for 1993 was the completion of the group home on Fuller Street. The Home is designed to provide housing and supervision for those persons with mental illness. It is under the auspices of the Department of Mental Health. The eight clients began their residency in early November.

The project caused considerable anxiety and distress within the neighborhood because of the uncertainty of its program. Communities where such homes already exist consistently report a positive and healthy situation. The Authority felt that it was appropriate for the Town of Carver to cooperate with the State in providing care for those requiring such an advocate. This effort would also enhance the town's ability to acquire future assistance in providing housing for the many who need such assistance.

Report of the Public Health Nurse Committee

This past year has been an exceptionally busy one for the staff of the Carver Public Health Nurses. As a comprehensive, certified home health agency, the Carver Public Health Nurses provide a variety of high quality skilled services to the residents of Carver. The services provided include Skilled Nursing, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Speech Therapy, Medical Social Work, and Home Health Aide. The agency also provides many health promotion screenings and immunization programs.

As the health care climate continues to change at a very rapid rate in this country, the demands on our staff continue to increase. These demands include not only caring for much sicker patients, but increased paperwork requirements and financial issues of our patients and their families. The current economic climate and the increased stress that is placed on our patients and families is evident. The staff of the Carver Public Health Nurses do their best to meet the variety of needs evidenced by our patients.

The statistics for the past year have demonstrated a marked increase. For comparison the following totals are submitted.

These visits have been provided with the same basic staff. The agency has come to the point where none of the staffing patterns are adequate. The physical space is also no longer adequate. The Professional Advisory Committee along with the Board of Health will be addressing these issues in the months to come.

In an attempt to keep their skills current, the staff have attended a variety of inservice educational programs. Included were: *When AIDS Hits Home, Emergency Psychiatric Response Networks, Bloodborne Pathogens, Oncology in Home Care Update, Diabetes and the Elderly, Alzheimers Disease: Diagnosis and Medications.* The staff are always willing to update their skills and improve their clinical practice.

This past year the agency has initiated a Widow & Widowers Support Group under the able direction of Lorraine Martin & Miriam Beaver. The group has met every other Wednesday at the United Parish of Carver in center Carver. A variety of volunteer speakers have presented programs to the group and there has been much time for socialization and support. The directors welcome any new members. A special thank you is extended to the United Parish, Council on Aging transportation service, and our wonderful volunteers for making the first year of the program so successful.

The "Friends of the Carver Nurses" continue to provide significant support financially as well as through volunteers. "Friends" solicit and accept donations for the nursing agency, assist at clinics, help with clerical duties, visit shut-ins, and drive patients to medical appointments. This worthy organization is an invaluable asset to the Carver Public Health Nurses as well as the community.

Our sincere thanks are sent to the Carver Police Dispatchers who answer our phone when the office is closed. These dedicated professionals do an excellent job of dealing with our patients and referral sources. The entire staff appreciates their efforts.

On behalf of the staff: Public Health Nurses, Pat Benson, Kathy Murray, & Dolores Peru; Physical Therapist, Claire Mather; Occupational Therapist, Pat Hicks; Speech Language Pathologist, Ellen Matanfel and Gene Pizzolatto; Medical Social Worker, Elise Beaulieu; Home Health Aides, Bobbie Fugoli and Lorraine Martin; and Office Manager, Laurel Butler, it continues to be our pleasure to meet the home health care needs of the residents of Carver.

Report of the Public Prosecutor Department

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen TOWN OF CARVER

During the past year, the Office of Public Prosecutor has been involved in the processing and/or prosecution of approximately 401 criminal cases which is comprised of approximately 1,098 complaints. We take pride in being of service to the Town for more than twenty-five (25) years.

As a direct result of your Police Department's action, the Court records reflect that from July 1, 1993 through December 31, 1993, a total of \$4,176.00 was collected in fines and returned to the general treasury of the town. Furthermore, the first six (6) months of the year show a return of \$6,169.00 to the general treasury, according to Court records. Thus, an amount in excess of Ten Thousand Three Hundred Dollars was returned to the Town.

The current backlog of court cases remains at three to four months, in spite of the fact that over eighty to eighty-five percent of the cases are disposed of through plea bargaining.

Finally, a long needed court reform measure is being implemented. On January 2, 1994, the trial de novo system in Massachusetts finally comes to an end which will save the cities and towns thousand of dollars in witness fees and unnecessary duplication of trials. After arrest for a crime, the defendant now has only one option. He or she will select a trial by judge or jury and will be bound by the result thereof and be able to proceed to an appeal only upon a question of law. This change in procedure will give us additional strength in our plea bargaining position as well as accelerate disposition of cases.

The Public Prosecutor continues to be present in court on a daily basis to handle and assist all Town Departments in any action taken by them to effectuate enforcement of regulations, by-laws or delinquent taxes and to give seminars to your police officers.

When requested, we will continue to serve as a liaison with the Plymouth County District Attorney's Office and your Police Department.

Report of the Emergency Management Agency

The Emergency Management Agency completed another year with the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) having to be utilized once again.

The first big storm of 1993, known as the Blizzard of 1993, came into Massachusetts to wreak havoc on March 13, 1993. Warnings of the possibility of the storm being a Blizzard had started a few days before giving us time to prepare. Not knowing just how hard we would be hit, the personnel in all departments joined together to make preparations for opening the Emergency Operations Center (EOC).

The Center was opened from 10:00 a.m. to midnight of the 13th. We were very fortunate that our Town was not hit as badly as some of the surrounding communities. Needless to say, the costs of any storm depletes Town accounts and for a major storm, such as the blizzard, accounts are depleted faster. The Federal Government, once again, were giving out emergency money, only this time they would pay for just snow removal. The chart used for this reimbursement, with only a 75% return, helped to replace a small portion of money back into the Town account.

Old Home Day festivities in July were once again enjoyed by present and past residents from different areas of the country. We again were very thankful for the help of the Massachusetts Auxiliary Police Association volunteers.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) conducted an evaluated exercise on December 7, 1993 with all of the towns located in the Emergency Preparedness Zone (EPZ), along with two of the Reception centers. Once again we received high marks which would not have been possible without the cooperation of all personnel and volunteers involved.

The Emergency Management Agency wishes to extend a thank you to the personnel, residents of Carver, MEMA-Area II staff and all volunteers for the cooperation and support of this past year.

Report of the Department of Public Works

During the past year the following major accomplishments have been done by the Department of Public Works:

The following streets have been stone chip sealed: Gate Street – 3,000' – 6,666 square yards Fosdick Road – 6,800' – 15,111 square yards Beaver Dam Road – 4,100' – 9,111 square yards Church Street – 2,000' – 4,444 square yards Wareham Street – 15,000' – 33,333 square yards

The following streets have been leveled with bituminous concrete: Wareham Street - 9,600' - 1,215 tons Meadow Street - 4,650' - 605 tons Crystal Lake (Cedar Drive) - 1,000' - 180 tons

The following street has been crack sealed: Route#58 - 46,500' - 8.8 miles - 5,554 gal.

Drainage was done in the following areas: Crystal Lake (Cedar Drive) – 4 basins and 500' of drainage Plymouth Street – 2 basins and 100' of drainage Bisbee Drive – 4 catch basins, realigned Storys Corner – 3 basins and 200' of drainage

Private ways were maintained this year with gravel and grader work, also some small amounts of paving. Hopefully, we will get an increase on our Private ways budget. This is one line item that needs to be increased, and will be requested again at Town meeting this year.

Power sweeping was done in various parts of Town. This is another line item that just has to be increased, especially after the brutal winter that we are having. It is essential that all this sand is removed from the roads, so that our drainage systems stay in good working order. Retention areas were also cleaned of silt build up.

Line painting was done on the following streets: High Street; Pond Street; Tremont Street; Plymouth Street; Wenham Street; Center Street; Silva Street; Fosdick Road; Purchase Street; Mayflower Road; Rochester Road; West Street; Route 58 and South Meadow Road.

Intersections repainted, stop bars, arrows and islands were: West Street and Holmes Street; Route 58 and 44; Center Street and Wenham Road (Story's Corner); Holmes Street and Meadow Street.

Snow removal this winter has been so severe. Since Christmas we have been hit week after week with snow storms, ice and very cold weather with no let up in sight.

We have used over 650 tons of salt and some 2,500 tons of sand. With spring three (3) weeks away, this is how our Snow Operating Budgets looks like to date: March 1, 1994, Snow Operating \$97,125.20 and Snow Overtime \$31,190.14. Let's hope it is all over.

Chapter work that has been done this year: Forest Street has been resurfaced with $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches of bituminous concrete, for a length of 6,500' and a width of 22' some, 2,047 tons. Driveway aprons, shoulder work and line painting.

Tremont Street from Mayflower Road proceeding north 8,000', width of 26' and 1" of top shoulder work. Line painting and driveway aprons, 1,800 tons.

This year we have two (2) project requests in for the resurfacing of Route 58 from the Wareham line to the Plympton line, also Route 44 from Route 58 intersections to the Plymouth line. If the State approves these projects, it will be to the town's benefit some, \$1,034,660.00 worth of road work. Chapter projects will be put together as soon as the money is made available from the State. Roads this year that we are looking for Chapter money are, High Street from Route 58 to Brooke Street and Plymouth Street from Gate Street to the Plymouth line.

MCI has given the town a great deal of assistance. They as always help with our cemetery work, tree work, and repairing of different town buildings. The DPW is sure that all the other departments cannot thank them enough. To MCI thanks again.

Cemeteries were limed and fertilized this year. A new section was built in Union Cemetery last year. As always cemeteries are groomed as often as possible and we will try to keep this up. There has been 23 lots sold, 21 burials, 4 cremations and 16 foundations put in.

The DPW also has a new full time secretary that has been needed for years. Our Road Management System is starting to come together with Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development. We would like to thank Paul Mission, Senior Transportation Planner for his help from SRPEDD.

Trying to keep up with all of our roads, parks, cemeteries, recreational areas, snow removal, ice control and just the taxpayer's needs, is not always easy within the budget constraints that we have. We will try our utmost, however, to continue providing the best possible conditions for our town.

We would like to thank all the employees of the DPW for a job well done and all that extra effort that was put in to such a severe winter is rewarding to be part of the team! All the other departments in town have been a great help and a big thank you goes out to them. Superintendent William Halunen has been exceptional as always in leading the department in its day to day operation. Thank you one and all! We had a couple of retirements this year, Theron Bumpus and Paul Halunen. They gave us alot of good years and we do thank them and miss them.

The Commission meets on the first Tuesday of every month, holding its meetings in the Carver Public Library beginning at 7:30 p.m. The Commission conducts hearings under M.G.L. Chapter 40C and the Town of Carver Historic District Bylaw for compliance to architectural significance within the town's two districts: the Lakenham Historic District and the Savery Historic District. To ensure compliance of all construction within the two districts, the Commission is working with the Building Inspector. Any property owner in either district should consult with the Commission before applying for a building permit.

This year the Commission was the sponsor of the Holiday House Tour, the proceeds of which will be applied to the Save Savery Avenue Fund. Report of the Commissioners of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District

The Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District continued to serve the Town of Carver during 1993. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally run regional agency serving southeastern Massachusetts.

During the past year, the Town of Carver was represented on the SRPEDD Commission by Francis Kane, Philip Harlow and Ann M. Miller. The Joint Transportation Planning Group had no representation.

Some of SRPEDD's more significant accomplishments in 1993 were:

- Completion and certification of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which set regional priorities and made cities and towns eligible for federal and state grants for transportation and economic development projects.
- Staffing of the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In 1993 SEED approved loans to 15 small businesses in the amount of \$2.7 million. These loans are projected to create 160 new jobs.
- Completion and approval of the Regional Transportation Plan, which addressed all modes of transportation for the next twenty years and included a region-wide travel demand computer model.
- SRPEDD reviewed the environmental impact of larger development projects in the region to insure that potential harmful impacts will be addressed. This year, we reviewed 47 such projects, commenting on the impact on traffic, water supply, sewage disposal, wetlands, and other development-related issues. 11 applications for federal and state funds were reviewed to insure consistency with other plans and efficient use of public funds.
- SRPEDD conducts a district-wide traffic counting program and maintains a computer file of all available traffic count data for the period 1980 to the present throughout the region.
- SRPEDD worked with both GATRA and SRTA on issues such as route evaluations, marketing, service to elderly and handicapped persons and overall data compilation and analysis.
- SRPEDD continues to provide computerized accident filing for 13 towns and has provided pavement management assistance to 16 towns.
- SRPEDD organized a regional economic development coordinating effort in Bristol and Plymouth Counties called the Massasoit Compact. A regional strategy for development was published in 1993.
- SRPEDD provided assistance to businesses on toxic materials use reduction. Staff worked with the Southeast Industrial Advisory Committee to hold meetings and workshops for businesses located throughout southeastern Massachusetts.
- Assistance was provided to the Boston Edison Co. with the planning and operation of the fourth annual Earth Lab Environmental Conference. The

conference was held at Bridgewater State College for science teachers throughout the region.

- A comprehensive update of the SRPEDD Fact Book was prepared to reflect current information on the cities and towns in the district. Among the changes are statistics from the 1990 U.S. Census, current employment trends, and information on major employers, financial institutions, and recreational facilities.
- At the request of the Seekonk Board of Water Commissioners, SRPEDD conducted a survey of the water rates and conservation practices employed by the public water suppliers in southeastern Massachusetts. A copy of the survey was sent to each water supplier in the region.
- SRPEDD conducted a survey of fees charged by the planning boards in southeastern Massachusetts. A copy of the results from the survey was sent to each planning board in the SRPEDD district.
- The SRPEDD staff assembled the zoning bylaws, subdivision regulations, board of health regulations, local planning studies and other local reports for each city and town in the SRPEDD district into a city and town library located at the SRPEDD office.
- The SRPEDD staff organized four public information meetings to review the proposed changes to Title 5 of the State Environmental Code. Title 5 regulates on-site sewage disposal systems.
- Working with a Strategic Planning Grant from the Executive Office of Communities and Development, the SRPEDD staff prepared an economic development study for the thirteen smallest towns in the SRPEDD district (Acushnet, Berkley, Carver, Dighton, Freetown, Lakeville, Marion, Mattapoisett, Plainville, Raynham, Rehoboth, Rochester, Westport). The study was designed to identify economic development strategies that could be employed by small towns that have limited resources.

We look forward to serving you in 1994.

Report of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 1993.

The Project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is now composed of 24 Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the Town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. The Project is a regional response to a regional problem and provides a way of organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees, and mosquito control professionals into a single agency with a broad geographical area of responsibility.

The 1993 season began with an above normal water table which produced large numbers of spring brood mosquitoes throughout the County. Efforts were directed at larval mosquitoes starting with the spring brood. Ground and aerial larviciding was accomplished using B.T.I., an environmentally selective bacterial agent. Upon emergence of the spring brood of adult mosquitoes, ultra-low-volume adulticiding began. The Project responded to increased numbers of service requests until a drying trend occurred during mid-summer. All sprayers and trucks performed well with little time lost to breakdowns.

The threat of the mosquito transmitted disease Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) was low in 1993. No horse or human cases occurred, but virus was recovered from bird-feeding mosquitoes. The recurring problem of EEE in Southeastern Massachusetts continues to ensure cooperation between this Project and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health.

The figures specific to the Town of Carver are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect town lines the information given below does provide a tally of the activities which have had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of Carver residents.

Insecticide Application. 8,752 acres were treated using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in May and the last in September.

Our greatest effort has been targeted at mosquitoes in the larval stage, which can be found in woodland pools, swamps, marshes, and other standing water areas. Inspectors continually gather data on these sites and treat with highly specific larvicides when immature mosquitoes are present. Last year a total of 82 inspections were made to 68 catalogued breeding sites.

Finally, we have been tracking complaint response time, that is the time between notice of a mosquito problem and response by one of our inspectors. The complaint response time for the Town of Carver was less than two days with more than 648 complaints answered.

Mosquito Survey. A systematic sampling of the mosquitoes in Carver indicates that <u>Culex territans</u> was the most abundant species. Other important species collected included <u>Coquillettidia perturbans</u> and <u>Culex pipiens</u>.

We encourage citizens or municipal officials to call our office for information about mosquitoes, mosquito-borne diseases, control practices, or any other matters of concern.

Report of the Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging

As your representatives to the Old Colony Planning Council, Area Agency on Aging Advisory Committee, we are pleased to present this report of the Area Agency's Activities for 1993.

The Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging is responsible for administering Title III funds under the Older Americans Act. This federal funding enables the Area Agency to address the growing needs of elders in twenty-three communities in southeastern Massachusetts. Working closely with local councils on aging and other community agencies, Title III funds are combined with other resources to develop and support a broad range of in-home and community-based elder services.

During FY 1993, an estimated 12,000 elders received assistance through more than twenty local and regional social support services and twenty-five Title III supported nutrition sites. The following services were funded in FY 1993 by the Area Agency.

- · Senior center and outreach programs
- Home health and respite services
- In-home mental health services
- · Services for deaf, blind and physically disabled elders
- Transportation services
- Legal services
- · Emergency services
- · Congregate and home delivered meals
- Services to families and caregivers
- Nursing home ombudsman services
- · Elder abuse prevention and education services

Also during Fiscal Year 1993, the Area Agency participated in a statewide elder needs assessment effort coordinated by the Executive Office of Elder Affairs. With the assistance of the twenty-three councils on aging in the region, over 400 elders were selected to participate in a needs survey.

The Area Agency on Aging acknowledges with gratitude the generous support and cooperation of the communities in the planning and service area, especially the local citizens who serve on the Advisory Committee chaired by Dolores Kent of Easton. The Advisory Committee, consisting of representatives from each of the communities served. assists the Area Agency in assessing elder service needs, establishing funding priorities and selecting subgrantees to provide the various Title III services.

The Council further notes with appreciation the work of local boards and commissions, public and private agencies, various institutions and individuals who have cooperated with or otherwise assisted the Council.

Report of the Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Program Highlights - July 1, 1992-June 30, 1993

County Extension programs are carried on through Plymouth County in cooperation with the University of Massachusetts and the United States Department of Agriculture. The Cooperative Extension System is supported by County, Federal and State funds, and operates under Federal and State laws and agreements. Education programs focus on water quality, horticulture, agriculture, 4-H youth development, nutrition and food, natural resources, leadership development and family life issues facing the County. Volunteer advisory groups work with staff on developing specific programs. Local citizens, appointed by the County Commissioners, serve as County Extension Trustees, directing the overall program. The Extension staff serve as a direct link with the University of Massachusetts. New research findings are translated into practical applications and shared with people and communities through workshops, conferences, field demonstrations, technical assistance, newspaper articles, radio and television. Publications such as regular newsletters and booklets, factsheets, and home study courses, bring information directly to those who need it.

In Plymouth County, the Cooperative Extension outreach office is located on High St., Hanson. In Southeastern Massachusetts regional programs are conducted in cooperation with the Barnstable County Cooperative Extension Program. Satellite offices of UMASS Cooperative Extension are located in Bristol and Norfolk Counties. UMASS Cooperative Extension also operates the Cranberry Experiment Research Station, located in Wareham. The Cooperative Extension office (Hanson) is open 8:30-4:30 PM Mon-Fri. Currently the county field staff consists of a County Director, two 4-H Youth Development Specialists, a Nutrition/Family Life Educator, and a Landscape/Nursery Specialist. A federally funded Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program, which has been active in Plymouth County since 1969, is run under the auspices of Cooperative Extension. Currently, one supervisor, and three outreach educators work in this program conducting a UMASS nutrition education program contact the county office at Box 658, Hanson, MA 02341. (617) 293-3541 or 447-5946.

PROGRAM OUTREACH - During the last 12 months county Cooperative Extension agents conducted 510 educational outreach programs.

• **CABLE TV** – Eighty-five cable TV shows "Extension News & Notes" have been produced by Plymouth County Cooperative Extension. All but 3 Plymouth County towns use this half-hour Cooperative Extension Cable TV program in their weekly community access channel, reaching over 100,000 households. Extension's free video lending library lists over 100 popular titles for home viewing for residents.

• **RADIO** – Every Sunday morning at 8:10 AM on WBET (Brockton), Cooperative Extension staff present a 15 minute broadcast on upcoming programs and timely educational topics.

• **NEWSLETTERS** – Cooperative Extension publishes fifteen newsletters in the area on Natural resources and Agriculture for residents and commercial growers. A master list of these is available from the County Extension Office.

• **FACTSHEETS** – Cooperative Extension has numerous fact sheets available to the public. Multiple copies of the order form "100 Most Popular Tip Sheets" are distributed routinely to libraries, town halls and local cooperating agencies. Current research in the areas of landscape, horticulture, nutrition and youth and family development are included.

• SERVICES – The County Cooperative Extension office has information and instruction forms to have your soil tested. UMASS Cooperative Extension Soil Analysis lab tests for soil pH and complete soil analysis. Pressure gauge tests for home canners are conducted at the County Extension office.

• EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS – A wide variety of teacher training workshops, lectures and on-site field demonstrations are conducted. 200 key county agencies receive a monthly mailing listing local Cooperative Extension activities.

• **AFFILIATIONS** – 4-H Farley Outdoor Education Center is a non-profit regional ACA accredited camp run by a Board of Directors representing 4-H in SE Massachusetts. Information on this facility can be obtained from the Plymouth County Cooperative Extension office.

- Established (EDIC) Town Meeting vote May 18, 1993 Economic and Industrial Development Corporation, Chapter 121C.
- Successful Economic Development training for members with SRPEDD.
- Strongly supported the activation of participating representatives to the (SRPEDD) Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District from the Town of Carver.
- Establishment of local concensus building process called the Carver Cracker Barrel.
- Coordinating the community action statements submitted to the state office of Communities and Development (EOCD) on August 1, 1993.
- Support and coordinated the efforts to form the 15 member Local Partnership program for the Town of Carver under the guidelines of (EOCD).
- Continues to support the continuation of a Railroad Park in the Town of Carver.
- Supported the establishment of the 25,000 loan program for local businesses through (SBA) Small Business Administration and (SEED) Southeastern Economic Development Corporation.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

In September 1993, Carver Teachers met for the first time ever as a <u>unified pre-</u> school through grade twelve school district! Deregionalization went into effect on 7/1/93 and the effects have been realized with significant additions of teachers, programs and administrators to the entire school system.

Patrick Meagher, our first Business Manager, brings his expertise in fiscal matters and is working with Selectmen to review the town's insurance programs to maximize coverage and reduce costs. Christopher Wiles joined our school district as Director of Media/Technology. He is sharing his expertise in computer technology with the townwide computer committee and computer system with state-of-the-art technology at a significant cost savings. Penny Scott, our new Director of Pupil Personnel Services will continue our school district's policy on inclusionary practices by expanding this philosophy into our secondary school setting.

This past year has been a very exciting year for Carver Public Schools. Our accomplishments have been multiple. In addition to facing the significant challenges of deregionalization, we encountered the demands of a sweeping Education Reform Act enacted by the state legislature only months before this school year began. We met our challenges with vigor and have dynamic plans for the future.

A <u>Strategic Planning Committee</u> of 30 individuals, with an interest in the future of our schools, has been meeting for over a year. Mission and Belief Statements have been formulated to assist us in producing a blueprint for a five-year improvement plan. Within our schools each building has formed a <u>School Council</u> to advise principals and school committee of school improvement needs. Each council is comprised of a principal, teachers, support staff, parents and community members. We have undertaken a complete shift in school governance with the introduction of <u>Quality</u> <u>Management</u>. Throughout the past year, teachers, school committee members, parents and administrators have received considerable training in quality management. Our goal is to become a quality system that fosters shared decision making and is dedicated to the process of continuous improvement.

We are very proud of our school district's accomplishments over the past year. Our <u>achievement test results</u> remain consistent with teacher performance standards for students reflecting <u>above grade level</u> in all grades tested. 82% of our high school graduates this year chose to further their education at either a two or four year college, or nursing school. Our high school guidance department will be completing a comprehensive 5-year follow-up of graduates next May.

There are many activities connected to community life that continue annually including <u>safety programs provided by police and fire departments</u>, field trips to town hall to observe town government in action, <u>programs conducted by the animal control officer</u>, our <u>Thanksgiving Day food drive</u> and <u>visits to the elderly at the Atwood House at Christmas time</u>. We have a rich tradition of including our community and its leaders in the education process for our students.

We have accomplished much over the short period of one year. The primary school has been completely restored after a year-long process of complex insurance claims and allegations of air quality issues. We have moved beyond those problems and have enacted a planning process to fully restore books lost to water damage in our Instructional Media Center. The primary school multi-age program has had a highly successful first year and plans are underway to continue and expand that program to grades 3 through 5. For the first time in our district's history, we are offering an <u>after-school program</u> for students in all schools. We have also started an <u>adult education program</u> that far exceeded our expectations, and planning is underway to significantly increase course offerings next year. Our school district is fortunate to have a rich tradition in parental interest and contributions to our students. <u>School volunteers</u> throughout our school provide the ultimate sacrifice for their children, *their time*.

The <u>athletic program</u> at Carver High School continues to provide excitement and stimulate school pride for our students. Coach Chuck Green and the Lady Crusaders won their second consecutive *State Softball Championship*. The wrestling team coached by Kevin Farrell and David Vining won their first *State Championship* along with several other awards. Coach Farrell was voted "*Division II Coach of the Year*". Athletics in Carver provide a sense of pride to students along with valuable lessons in team work, fair play and the individual responsibility to do the best you can whether you win or not.

As we look toward next year, there is excitement and district-wide planning to ensure that our joint accomplishments will continue. A district-wide curriculum advisory committee has been formed to assist in the continuing process of curriculum revision. The Carver School Committee has recently voted to actively seek a school addition to help relieve over-crowding in our elementary schools and to meet the demands of an increasing school enrollment. The Carver School Committee, school staff, parents of our students and interested community residents have all worked together to maximize opportunities for students of Carver Public Schools. A primary goal for the coming year is to make each year a better year for our students than the year before. With continued community support, we will reach this goal, year after year.

Municipal Finance Terminology

The following terms are frequently used in the Annual Town Report and at Town Meetings. In order to provide everyone with a better understanding of the meaning, the following definitions are provided.

SURPLUS REVENUE: (often referred to as: "Excess and Deficiency")

This fund represents the amount by which the Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserve. This is a bookkeeping term.

AVAILABLE FUND: (often referred to as: "Free Cash")

Available funds is the amount certified annually by the State Bureau of Accounts by deducting from surplus revenue all uncollected taxes for prior years. This fund may be used by a vote of the Town Meeting.

OVERLAY:

The Overlay is the amount raised by the Assessors in excess of the appropriations and other charges for the purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements granted and avoiding fractions.

OVERLAY RESERVE:

This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific Overlay account for a given year, and may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes or voted into the reserve fund.

RESERVE FUND:

This fund is established by the voters at an annual town meeting only and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) both.

STABILIZATION FUND:

This is a fund created to provide a reserve for capital expenditure. Appropriations from the Stabilization Fund may be made at an Annual Town Meeting by a two-thirds vote for any purpose the Town is authorized to borrow money for under Section 7 or 8 of Chapter 44 or for such other purpose as is approved by the Emergency Finance Board.

CHERRY SHEET:

Named for the cherry colored paper on which the Massachusetts Commission of Corporations and Taxation traditionally printed it, the cherry sheet carries the figures which must be used by the Assessors in determining the amount to be raised by taxation.

It lists the amounts of county tax and state assessments, as well as the estimated tax distributions from the General Fund, reimbursements, agency funds, and the Sales and Use Taxes.

Article 44. To see if the Town of Carver will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds, the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to support South Shore Women's Center's continued services to Carver residents who are victims of domestic violence.

Article 45. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate, or transfer from available funds, the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to support the Plymouth Area Coalition for the Homeless, Inc. in their service to Carver homeless families.

(by Plymouth Area Coalition for The Homeless, Inc.)

Article 46. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Police/Fire Dispatch Account to fund negotiated pay raises with the Carver Dispatcher's Union for FY'95 or act in relation thereto.

Article 47. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to the D.P.W. Salary Account to fund negotiated pay raises with the Carver D.P.W. Union for FY'95 or act in relation thereto.

Article 48. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Police Salary Account to fund negotiated raises with the Carver Police Union for FY'95 or act in relation thereto.

Article 49. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of providing a cost-of-living increase for non-union employees covered by the Wage and Personnel Plan or act in relation thereto.

Article 50. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to fund negotiated pay raises with the Carver Clerical Union for FY'95 or act in relation thereto.

Article 51. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of Forty-Eight Thousand (\$48,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of hiring a full time Executive Secretary, said expenditure to be under the direction of the Board of Selectmen or act in relation thereto.

Article 52. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of Six Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-Seven (\$6,677.00) Dollars to establish a part-time, 20 hour week clerical position for the Department of the Town Clerk, or take any other action relative thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to re-authorize the establishment of a Transportation Revolving Account for the Council on Aging in accordance with General Laws Chapter 44, Section 53 E $\frac{1}{2}$; which authorization, in addition to items provided by said statute, shall provide: (1) for transportation needs, vehicles, repairs, maintenance, fuel, lubricants, insurance (but not including insurance of any of the Greater Attleboro Taunton Regional Authority ["GATRA"] vehicles used by the Council on Aging), and salaries and expenses for part-time employees used relative thereto, (2) that departmental receipts, consisting of reimbursement by GATRA of transportation expenditures, shall be credited to the revolving fund; (3) that the Council on Aging Director shall be authorized to expend from such fund; and (4) that the total amount which may be expended from such fund during fiscal year nineteen hundred ninety-five shall be \$50,000.00, in accordance with the contract between the Town through its Council on Aging and GATRA; or take any other action relative thereto. 
