For the purpose of apportioning assessments levied by the District against member towns, costs shall be divided into three categories: Capital costs, operating costs and local service costs.

(B) Capital Costs

Capital costs shall include all expenses in the nature of capital outlay, such as the costs of acquiring land, the cost of construction, reconstructing or adding to building, the cost of constructing roads, the cost of consulting services, the cost of any equipment necessary for the operation of a refuse disposal facility and any other related costs incidental to the preparation of such a facility. Capital costs shall also include payment of principal of the interest on bonds and notes or other obligations issued by the District to finance capital costs. Capital costs shall not include any local service costs, as defined in Section III (E).

(C) Operating Costs

Operating costs shall include all costs not included in capital costs as defined in Section III (B), but including interest on temporary notes issued by the District in anticipation of revenue. Operating costs shall not include any local service costs as defined in Section III (E).

(D) Local Service Costs

Local service costs shall include (i) all expenses in the nature of capital outlay, such as the costs of acquiring land, the cost of construction, reconstructing, or adding to buildings, the cost of constructing roads, the cost of consulting services, the cost of any equipment necessary for the operation of a refuse disposal facility, including a transfer facility, and any other related costs incidental to the preparation of such a facility; including payment of principal and interest on bonds, notes or other obligation issued by the District to finance such costs; and (ii) all other costs including interest on temporary notes issued by the District in anticipation of revenue; which expenses or costs are incurred by the District in order to provide to a member town a service or services customarily provided locally or a service or services subscribed to at local option, as contemplated by General Law, Chapter 59, Section 20A.

(E) Apportionment of Capital Costs

Capital costs shall be apportioned among the member towns and charged annually on the basis of the most recent available final equalized valuations, as established by the State Tax Commission pursuant to General Law, Chapter 58, Section 10 (C), as amended. Each member town shall pay their share of the capital costs in the proportion that their equalized valuation bears to the aggregate of the equalized valuations of all member towns.

(F) Apportionment of Operating Costs

Operating costs following the establishment of the Regional Refuse District and for every fiscal year thereafter shall be apportioned to each member town in the proportion that the estimated weight of refuse to be received by the facility from such town, during such year, bears to the aggregate estimated weight of refuse to be received by the facility from all member towns in such year.

Within five months of the end of each fiscal year, a determination shall be made as to the actual operating costs of the facility for such year and the actual weight of refuse received from each member town by the facility during such year.

Such determination shall be used when preparing the budget for the second succeeding fiscal year to provide adjustments to each member town a share of such budget. Such adjustments shall be made by charging or crediting each member town with the difference between the amount of operating costs apportioned to it for the second preceding fiscal year upon the basis of the estimated operating costs, an estimated weight of refuse for such year and the amount of operating costs which would have been apportioned to it if the actual operating costs and the actual weight of refuse for such year had been used when the budget had been prepared for such year.

In order to make the above adjustments, the facility shall contain a motor truck scale for weighing all vehicles delivering refuse to the facility. Accurate records shall be kept showing the weight of refuse delivered by each member town.

(G) Apportionment of Local Service Costs

Local service costs shall be apportioned to the town to whom such local service was provided or at whose local option such service was subscribed. The assessment of anticipated local service costs, if any, to each town shall be certified to each town prior to December 31st of each year preceding the fiscal year to which said budget related as provided in Section IV (C), within five months of the end of each fiscal year a determination shall be made of the actual local service costs, if any, attributable to each town for such fiscal year. That determination shall be certified in writing by the District treasurer to the treasurer of each town within six months of the end of such fiscal year. In the event actual payment for local service costs assessed against a town in such prior fiscal year exceeded the actual local service costs attributable to such town, a credit in equal installments totaling the amount of such overpayment shall be made to such town against the assessments remaining to be paid by the town in the then-current fiscal year. In the event actual payment for local service costs assessed against a town in such prior fiscal year was less than the actual local service costs attributable to such town, a charge, in equal installments totaling the amount of such underpayment, shall be added to the assessments remaining to be paid by that town in the then-current fiscal year.

(H) Times of Payments of Apportioned Costs

Each member town shall pay to the District in each fiscal year its proportionate share, certified as provided by subsection IV (C) of the capital and operating costs. Except as otherwise provided in subsection IV (A) or in subsection IX, the annual share of each member town shall be paid in amounts and at such times that at least the following percentages of such annual share shall be paid on or before the dates indicated, respectively:

July 10	35%
October 10	50%
January 10	75%
April 10	100%

and,

“Section V (TRANSPORTATION)

Each member town shall be responsible for the transportation of its refuse to the refuse disposal facility, except that such transportation may be provided by the District and assessed as a local service costs”

3. By striking Section VIII (D) in its entirety and inserting in its place the following:

“(D) Apportionment of Costs after Withdrawal

The withdrawing town’s annual share of any future installment of principal and interest on obligations outstanding on the effective date of its withdrawal shall be computed in the same manner as in Section III (E) until the impending obligations are satisfied. Due dates of payment shall be in the same manner as specified in Section III (H).

Any future installment, or portion thereof, of any principal and interest on obligations outstanding on the effective date of its withdrawal, which obligations were incurred by the District as a local service cost attributable to such withdrawing town, shall continue to be assessed to such town until the impending obligations are satisfied. Due dates of payment shall be in the same manner as specified in Section III (H).

Charges which would otherwise have been made to a withdrawing town pursuant to a determination under Section III (F) or (G) shall be assessed to such town notwithstanding the effective date of its withdrawal and shall be paid in equal installments totaling the amount of such charge on the dates provided in Section III (H) for the then-current fiscal year. Credits which would otherwise have been made to a withdrawing town pursuant to a determination under Section III (F) or (G) shall be made to such town notwithstanding the effective date of its withdrawal and shall be paid in equal installments totaling the amount of such credit no later than thirty days following the dates for payment provided in Section III (G) for the then-current fiscal year.”

- 1.B This section shall not apply to the moving of earth materials under the provisions of a duly approved subdivision plan, to work necessary for the construction of streets and the installation of utilities, to such work in connection with the excavation and grading of land incidental to construction of a duly permitted structure, nor to work performed in normal cranberry related maintenance or improvement of contiguous or non-contiguous land for agricultural purposes, and does not include the removal of earth for sale, trade, or other considerations.

Special Permit Requirement:

- 2.A Applications for special permits for earth removal shall be on such forms or in such manner as the (SPGA) may specify in its rules and regulations and shall be submitted together with all required exhibits and site plans.
- 2.B The special permit granting authority (SPGA) shall determine that the proposal generally conforms to the principles of good engineering, sound planning and correct land use, and that the applicant has means to implement the proposal if a special permit is granted or to restore the site to an appropriate condition including grading, loaming, seeding or other alternative landscaping as may be required as a condition to the special permit, a bond in an amount as the (SPGA) may deem appropriate shall be held by the Town of Carver until all work has been completed and conditions of the special permit have been met, and inspected by the (SPGA's) authorized agent and a report filed on same.

Site Plan:

- 3.A A site plan shall be submitted in the quantities and in the form required by the rules and regulations of the special permit granting authority. Such plans may be submitted by the SPGA to the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Board of Health, Board of Selectmen, Fire Department, Police Department, or other officers and official boards of the Town for review and comment.
- 3.B The site plan shall include, but not limited to pertinent information on the following: lot boundaries, names of abutting owners, streets contiguous to the site, veg-

etation, existing and proposed roadways, existing and proposed buildings, location of sources of water, sewage disposal, parking areas, loading areas, fences, easements and right-of-ways, walls, ditches, streams, ponds, and known permanent monuments, and other cross sections, profiles, and contour maps needed to describe the proposal.

- 3.C Such plan(s) shall be prepared by a registered professional engineer. The site plan shall show existing intermediate and final ground levels with those of adjacent properties and shall indicate natural surface water flows and drainage ditches if any.
- 3.D At all times during excavation of a duly approved earth removal project, the permit holder shall be liable to the Town of Carver for any and all road repairs leading to or adjacent to the project site, and shall maintain a paveway to the project site. See item 2.B bond issue.

Report of the Board of Selectmen

In the years ahead, Carver residents will look back on fiscal year 1995 and recognize what remarkable accomplishments were achieved. Town Meeting authorized the renovation and expansion of Town Hall, the acquisition of 14.5 acres known as the Roby Property on which the new Public Library will be built, and a new South Carver Fire Station was constructed. All of this was done within the restraints of Proposition 21/2!

Route 58 was repaved from Plympton to Wareham with sidewalks added in the center of town.

Satisfactory contracts were negotiated and signed with the Police, DPW, Dispatchers and Town Hall Clerical unions which included a five percent salary increase for all employees.

Significant progress is underway for contract renewal with Adelphia Cable Communications that will provide increased service and options that will be beneficial to the town and subscribers. The Computer Study Committee continues to work toward an upgraded system that will utilize new technology and meet the town's needs. Implementation of the new E911 system is nearing completion.

The Water Study Committee obtained a grant to explore options and future needs facing our town, while preliminary agreements have been reached with the Town of Middleboro for expanded water line hook-ups and the potential for a possible town-wide system in the future.

McDonald's restaurant opened in North Carver and plans to build a multi-million dollar cranberry plant in South Carver were announced by the Decas Brothers. Progress continues for the re-opening of Edaville Railroad, while King Richard's Faire and the Cranberry Festival grow in popularity. Clearly, Carver is moving in the right direction.

Resolutions to the number of conflicts pending for many years were cleared from the town's agenda in 1995. These included resolution to litigation concerning Lakenham Drive, Savery Avenue and the town's dispute with SEMASS. A site for a new Transfer Station has been found, while our Recycling Center continues to serve Carver residents until it is opened.

The past year has been active politically as well. Board Chairman, Frank R. Mazzilli, was re-elected to his 13th term and sustained both a "recount" and attempted "recall" movement - initially targeting the entire five member Board. In addition to the Annual Town Election, a Special Town Election was held to fill the vacancy caused by Selectman Thomas W. Russell's resignation to avoid a "conflict of interest", as well as a Special State Primary and State Election to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of State Representative Charles Decas. When Carver voters were not going to the polls, many were busy circulating petitions for various causes.

The divisiveness of these events cannot overshadow the success, accomplishments and cooperation that prevailed throughout the year. Much of this success can be attributed to the positive working relationship of the Capital Outlay Committee, Finance Committee and Board of Selectmen.

Finally, we thank those who serve on Boards, Commissions, Authorities and all town employees for their contribution and cooperation. Members of the Board are particularly grateful to Jeanne M. Roby, Pat Clark and Jean Bouchard of the Selectmen's office for their dedication and commitment.

The Board of Assessors has been preparing for a Revaluation for FY97. They have been working closely with Patriot Properties Inc., and the Department of Revenue to insure that all values will be at full and fair value.

Becky Vaughan has completed the necessary courses to earn her M.A.A. in March of 1995.

Excise bills were received in our office from the Registry of Motor Vehicles for 1995 with 578 abatements granted. The Board of Assessors granted 156 exemptions and 53 property abatements. The total amount of fees received in the Assessors office and returned to the towns general fund was \$658.00

Report of the Council on Aging

The Carver Council on Aging is a town department established to serve and assist the senior population of our community, 59 years of age and older. The COA Offices, Drop-In Center and Nutrition Center are housed in the Marcus Atwood House, located at Lakeview and Tremont Streets in South Carver. This multi-purpose center is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., except for legal holidays.

Professional staff members (paid and volunteer) implement the programs and services established and authorized by the COA Board of Directors. Federal, state and local funds support a variety of services and programs focused on the needs of our senior citizens. Grants (public and private) also contribute to the financial support of this department.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

Certified social workers are available for screening interviews, counseling and referral assistance. Counseling is also available for Social Security and SSI assistance, legal assistance provided by Attorney Lawrence L. Hale from 9:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. (second Thursday of each month) and the Southeastern Legal Assistance Corp. Other social service needs: fuel assistance, tax preparation assistance, provided by T.C.E. Program (Tax Counseling for the Elderly), insurance assistance through S.H.I.N.E. (Serving Health Information Needs for Elders) and health assistance in conjunction with the Carver Public Health Nurses. Free blood pressure tests are offered monthly, free hearing tests are offered quarterly along with annual flu shots and cholesterol tests that are provided at a modest fee. An Outreach Program becomes the "point of entry" to the COA and senior network for many seniors and members of their family. Geriatric Mental Health Social Workers are available through Catholic Charities and OCPC.

Daily Telephone Reassurance program available for seniors living alone or in isolated areas of town. Vial of Life kits are available to anyone and can be obtained at the COA office. A Loan Closet is provided by the COA and Public Health Nurses for persons needing walkers, crutches, wheelchairs, bed pans, etc. Magazines, books and puzzles available for loan as well. A Coupon Exchange file is maintained and offered to seniors wishing to extend their purchasing power. Breads and pastries from Carver's Shaw Market distributed at the Atwood House (Mon. thru Fri. 9:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.). The most recent service added to the COA is a Notary Public, available to seniors at no charge. Copies of documents, policies, forms & prescriptions made free of charge to seniors at COA office.

Guest speakers are scheduled as appropriate to keep seniors informed of governmental regulations and/or changes, insurance, health related issues and other topics of interest to seniors. The Carver Senior Citizens and AARP Chapter also hold their monthly meetings at the Marcus Atwood House. They too schedule guest speakers and have planned activities of interest to senior citizens.

Senior identification cards are issued by the COA and an updated list of businesses that offer senior citizen discounts is available to seniors.

Government surplus food distribution has been discontinued due to cutbacks in the federal program. Food pantry is open daily and made possible by on-going donations from Carver residents, organizations and businesses.

TRANSPORTATION

Curb-to-curb transportation is available to the elderly and disabled persons living in our community. Operated by the COA, a GATRA (Greater Attleboro Taunton Regional Authority) mini-bus & 2 lift-vans are in service Monday through Friday for scheduled trips to shopping malls, super markets, medical appointments, social and recreational activities and for special events. A donation of one dollar fifty is accepted.

ADULT DAY CARE CENTER

Although the Carver COA does not operate an adult day care center, we do provide transportation to Carver seniors enrolled in the Middleboro COA Adult Day Care Center Monday through Friday.

NUTRITION

Congregate meals are served Monday through Friday at our Nutrition Center, providing hot and nutritious meals with social interaction among senior citizens. Meals-on-Wheels are delivered to the frail and homebound seniors who qualify. A donation of two dollars is accepted.

DROP-IN CENTER/SOCIAL AND RECREATIONAL

Our Drop-In- Center is open daily, Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. for those wishing to read, play cards, bingo, shoot pool, watch TV or just engage in conversation with friends. Our facility is well heated in winter and air conditioned in summer. A VCR has been installed so that films can be enjoyed or used by guest speakers when they join us. Horseshoe and tennis courts are located on Atwood property. Knitting Grannies meet Thursday afternoons, making AIDS Baby Quilts, scarfs, mittens & caps for Head Start enrollees and lap blankets for homebound elders. Movie of the Month offered the last Tuesday of each month in the Drop-In Center following lunch. Walking Club meets at the Carver High School track Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings from 9:00 a.m. until 9:30 p.m.

The COA has reserved lanes at Alley Kat Lanes in Kingston and provides transportation for our bowlers on Friday afternoons. Transportation to the YMCA in Middleboro is provided on Tuesday and Thursday mornings for participants in the Aqua Arthritic Swimming and Exercise Program.

Special day-trips are planned for the coming year: theater trips, musicals, ice shows, sporting events, flower show, etc.

Friends of the COA, Inc. sponsor various fundraising dinners/dances and will be planning more for the coming year. Our Annual Chicken BBQ and St. Patrick's Day Corned Beef and Cabbage Dinner remain popular. A traditional Turkey Dinner with all the trimmings has become an annual event for elders living in Carver and surrounding communities Thanksgiving Day. Monthly Pancake Breakfast offered the 3rd Saturday of each month between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m.

SUSTAINING MEMBERSHIP

Friends of COA have launched a Sustaining Membership drive with a goal of 2,000 members. Annual membership fee: \$5 for individuals and \$10 for businesses and organizations. Sixty percent for "building fund" with forty percent for "operating expenses."

NEWSLETTER

To keep our senior population informed of activities, programs and matters of particular interest to them, we now distribute a monthly newsletter. Increased postage cost and related expenses prevent us from mailing the newsletter, but they are available for pick-up at the Town Hall, Carver Public Library, Atwood House and in the stores and businesses that advertise in our publication. Newsletters are also distributed on our GATRA buses and with the help and assistance from the mobile home parks, distributed along with their own newsletter.

Report of the Board of Health

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The following is the annual report of the Board of Health for 1995:

A total of \$146,177.15 was received from January 1, 1995 to December 31, 1995. This money was generated from CMW Regional Landfill tipping fees, inspection and permit fees. The new Title 5 has resulted in a large increase in percolation and soil evaluation tests.

The year 1995 brought changes to all local Boards of Health. The revisions of the State Sanitary Code (Title 5) by the Department of Environmental Protection in March has resulted in a much greater work load for the Board of Health. Where we once witnessed percolation tests, we must now do the percolation test and the new soil evaluation along with the engineering firm. Our Health Agent, Robert C. Tinkham, Jr., was forced to, and passed numerous courses in the last year making him proficient in administering and application of the new Title 5. Courses such as: Soil Evaluator, System Inspector and VSS Water Handler. His knowledge and experience will help the residents of Carver better understand the new code.

The Carver Board of Health has also applied for and will be receiving a \$100,000.00 grant from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts sometime around May 1996. This will result in Carver residents, of qualifying income, being eligible for low interest loans that will be paid back in a period of ten years for repairs and upgrades to their current septic systems.

The Board of Health this year, at the request of the Finance Committee, completely modified their fee schedule. The result of this new fee schedule should represent an increase of roughly \$10,000.00 in revenue generated by the Board of Health. Also, the Carver Board of Health has completely revised its Supplemental Rules for Subsurface Sewage Disposal Systems in order to coincide with the State's new Title 5.

The Board of Health and staff will continue serving the people of Carver to the best of their ability. With the numerous problems that occur in the Town, it is necessary to have the support of Town Officials and citizens of the community.

The Carver Public Health Nurse Committee is a comprehensive, certified home health agency providing the full range of home health services to the residents of Carver. The services provided include skilled nursing, physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, medical social work, and home health aide. The agency also provides many health promotion screenings, immunization programs, and communicable disease follow-up. The staff are an excellent resource for town residents regarding community resources available.

As the health care climate continues to change at such a rapid rate in this country, the demands on our staff continue to increase. The direct care staff are coping not only with sicker patients, with complex health care needs, but also with increased paperwork demands and requirements from reimbursement sources. The administrative staff is meeting and networking with area health care agencies to investigate the varied types of collaborations and affiliations developing. The goal of all staff is the same, to provide the highest quality, most cost effective home health care to the residents of Carver.

Our library continues to provide highly valued service to the Town residents. As is indicated, circulation is increasing in all areas. A genealogy computer was installed for family research. A CD ROM set from The Church of Latter Day Saints archives was purchased and used by approximately eight-five (85) patrons in the library during 1995. Carver is one of the few libraries in Southeastern Massachusetts to offer this service.

These groups and persons used the Atwood Room in 1995: Republican Town Committee, Cub Scouts, Pond Study Committee, Ben-Ellis Group, TOPS, Arts Lottery, Carver Youth Basketball, Historical Commission, Library Building Committee, Library Trustees. These programs were offered by the library: Finance Services with Waddell Reed, Babysitting Training for Teens, Together We Can run by Peg Merritt, Literary Tutor Programs.

The children's department provided a summer reading program and also continues to provide two weekly story times during the winter months. Summer reading featured plays produced by the children in the reading program. The following programs were also provided by the children's department: Santa visits, All about Owls, Ice Cream Party, How the Grinch Stole Christmas. Tours were given to first and fourth grade students from the Gov. John Carver Elementary School as well as to the Boy Scouts.

The library celebrated its 100th anniversary with a Centennial Tea held at the library on March 26th. Senator Marc Pacheco attended and presented a Certificate of Recognition to the library from the Massachusetts Senate.

Our anniversary was also celebrated with a used book sale at Old Home Day and a production of a one woman show depicting the life of Amelia Earhart held at Carver High School.

Plans for the new library are progressing on schedule. On July 13, 1995, the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners announced that the Carver Public Library had been awarded a construction grant in the amount of One Million Three Hundred Thirty-Eight Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-Two Dollars (\$1,338,662) and at a Special Town Meeting held on October 23, 1995, it was voted (Yes 299 - No 16) for the Town to appropriate the sum of Two Million One Hundred Ninety Thousand Two Hundred Fifty-Six Dollars (\$2,190,256) for a new Carver Public Library. ARC of Cambridge was selected as the architect for this project.

These families and individuals donated books and gifts to the library: Cole, Daniels, Franey, Gleason, King, McElaney, Morrill, Perry, St. Louis.

The Trustees and staff are grateful for the support of the townspeople in our exciting endeavor - the building of a new Carver Public Library.

The Trustees meet the first Thursday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in the Atwood Room of the library.

Report of the Public Prosecutor Department

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen

TOWN OF CARVER

During the past year, the Office of Public Prosecutor was involved in the processing and/or prosecution of approximately 444 criminal cases which comprised of approximately 1,073 complaints.

As a direct result of your Police Department's action, the Court records reflect that from July 1, 1995 through December 31, 1995, a total of \$3,645.00 was collected in fines and returned to the general treasury of the Town. Furthermore, the first six (6) months of the year show a return on \$1,779.00 to the general treasury. Thus, an amount in excess of Five Thousand Four Hundred Dollars was returned to the Town.

In addition to the dollars returned from the Court to the Town, the Registry of Motor Vehicles is also sending reimbursements directly to the Town for fines collected by their agency for civil motor vehicles infractions.

The current backlog of court cases remains at three to four months, in spite of the fact that over eighty to eighty-five percent of the cases are disposed of through plea bargaining.

The court reform measure which went into effect on January 2, 1994 has been fully implemented and the two trial system has been eliminated. The Court has become more efficient and I have further reduced expenses by only having police officers present to testify when absolutely needed.

The Public Prosecutor continues to be present in Court on a daily basis to handle and assist all Town Departments in any action taken by them to effectuate enforcement of regulations, by-law delinquent taxes and to give seminars to your police officers. We continue to serve as a liaison with the Plymouth County District Attorney's Office and your Police Department, in addition to giving legal assistance to the Board of Selectmen and other town departments upon request.

The following streets have been leveled with Bituminous Concrete:

We will every year try and do some paving and drainage in all Private Ways. As always we will grade and try to control the dust in all of our Private Ways.

Infra Red was used on South Meadow Road to bring drainage grates back to grade.

Chapter work done this year is as follows:

High Street	-	8,000; - 2,800 Tons - cost \$105,000.00
Plymouth Street	-	11,000; - 3,800 Tons - cost \$140,000.00

Also the Department of Public Works has started the realignment and reconstruction of Pond Street. Two new concrete box culverts are included in this project. If all goes according to plan this project should be completed early summer "1996" at a cost of \$250,000.00.

This year Route #58 was resurfaced. The Town applied for this grant two years ago. The DPW has also applied and done all the detail work required by the state for two other projects. This is the schedule for these project as follows:

Route #58 was done this year at the cost of \$900,000.00.

Route #44 Intersection Redesign at the three locations has been awarded and will begin this Spring at the cost of \$800,000.00.

The last project that has been requested is the Resurfacing of Route #44 from Route #58 to the Plymouth Carver town line, omitting of course, the Route #44 Intersections.

Route #44 Resurfacing cost \$500,000.00.

Intersections repainted, stop bars, arrows and islands. This has a good effect on traffic control. Crosswalks, Stop Bars and Directional Arrows were done in various parts of town. The Board of Public Works would like to see this line item increased.

Snow removal this year has been brutal. As of January 20, 1996 we have received 41" of snow. This puts a tremendous strain on equipment and the budget. At this time we are about \$95,000.00 over budget for Snow Operating and \$15,000.00 in Snow Overtime. Our salt at this time is 800 Tons, our sand is about 3,000 yards. With 60 days to go with winter we could break all records.

M.C.I. in the past has given the Town a great deal of assistance. This year however, they have had problems at the camp and our regular 3 or 4 days has been dropped to about one day a week. Hopefully we can get back on track with M.C.I.

Cemeteries were limed and fertilized this year. Some trees were planted in Union, Central and Lakenham. A new section was build in Central and will be seeded this spring. We will still need additional space in Lakenham. We will survey what we have in Lakenham and see if we can add some lots. There were 20 burials this year, 19 lots sold, 10 foundations put in and 5 cremations.

We will be updating our road management system this year. Mr. Paul Mission from Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development has been a great help in allowing us to be aware of grants for transportation improvements that become available to our community.

Our secretary Dawn Ferreira is the representative for our community and keeps us right up to date with what is going on in all of Plymouth County and other Counties as well.

Hopefully this year will get our Power Sweeper. This is a vital piece of equipment. Tons of sand put on roads each year has to be picked up. This is vital to our drainage system. We have received our new catch basin cleaner. This year, this will be a plus to our drainage system.

Drainage was done in the following areas' two catch basins on Fosdick Road 100' north of Beaver Dam Road, also 500' feet of drainage including two catch basins on Wenham Road in troubled area near the Plymouth line. Drainage pipe installed across the road on High Street in two areas.

This past year the Board of Selectmen and the DPW have set up a recycling center at Rochester Road Salt Shed facility. This is working out well but we would like to see a transfer station recycling center soon.

Trying to keep up with all of our road work, parks, cemeteries, recreational areas, snow removal and ice control is not always easy within our budget constraints that we have. We will however, continue to provide the best possible conditions for our taxpayers.

Report of the Housing Authority

The Carver Housing Authority continues its work in managing three programs of state subsidized housing. The twenty units of elderly and the eight units of family housing were constructed in 1982 and are located on Meadowbrook Way. In addition the Authority is responsible for eight units of housing on Fuller Street in North Carver. This facility, known as the 689 program, was created in 1993 in conjunction with the Department of Mental Health.

The Executive Director of these programs is Donna Fernandes. Donna has done an outstanding job in managing a very strict budget and enabled the Authority to increase the funds in reserve. These funds are going to be in considerable demand in the not too distant future because of increased maintenance projects.

Our maintenance foreman is Peter Nelson. The demand on Peter's time and energy were extended to the limit with the extreme weather conditions this past year. The Authority operates under the counsel of the office of EOCD which required us to relinquish the position of Administrative Assistant. We were then able to acquire the services of Frances Cloonan to help part-time as office secretary. This was made possible through the efforts of the Council on Aging.

Eunice Murphy was elected as a commissioner in April. The Authority reorganized for the year at that time, choosing Richard Hoadley as chairperson, Robert Merrit as vice-chairperson, Roberta Fountain as treasurer, and Dorothy Anglely as assistant treasurer.

A major effort in 1995 was overhauling the well system. The Authority is also responsible for the water supplying the units managed by South Shore Housing and this seems always to be a delicate issue. It has commanded considerable attention over the years. This past year saw the advent of a new Town library. Its construction sometime within the next year will provide an exciting and available resource for the residents of Meadowbrook. Negotiations are presently continuing around the impact and the control of anticipated traffic within the area. Another benefit to the Authority resulting from the library and Town Hall projects will be the availability of municipal water system for the complex. The anticipation of having this in place will bring with it enormous relief as the water situation has not only brought aggravation to the residents, but it has also been costly.

The Authority is already expecting to work more aggressively on both maintenance and preventative maintenance projects as soon as possible. The buildings at Meadowbrook are now fourteen years old and showing their wear. This will require competent planning as well as creative financing.

We take pride in our housing community. We are blessed with conscientious and caring people. It continues to be a joy to be their advocates.

Report of the Historic District Commission

The Historic District Commission makes the following report for 1995:

The Town of Carver has, within its boundaries, two historic districts: Lakenham Historic District in North Carver, and the Savery Historic District in South Carver. These two districts were set aside by Town Meeting to preserve the character and historic significance in our Town.

The Historic District Commission is responsible to uphold MGL Ch. 40C and the Town of Carver Historic District Bylaw, by conducting hearings relative to architectural significance within the Town's two historic districts. The Commission meets the first Tuesday of every month, and holds its meetings in the Carver High School cafeteria, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The Commission has been involved this year with the preservation of Savery Avenue, the oldest divided highway in the United States. Property is being purchased on Savery Avenue to create a park which will be open to the public, with nature trails and picnic areas. Ann Miller, a resident of the Savery Historic District, has completed work on a grant application, as part of the Town's open space program, to ensure that this will be possible. We anticipate that all of the legalities will be completed during 1996, and look forward to having this property available for all our residents to enjoy.

This year the Commission placed signs at the northern and southern entrances (on Main Street and South Main Street) to the Savery Historic District, welcoming people to the district. The Commission plans to place signs in the Lakenham Historic District in 1996, as soon as work to Plymouth Street (Route 44) is completed.

We welcome anyone interested in preserving our historic districts to join us at our meetings, or become a member of our Commission.

Report of the Commissioners of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District

The Town of Carver continued its participation in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District during 1995. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally governed regional agency serving twenty-seven cities and towns in southeastern Massachusetts. We are funded by federal and state grants and local assessments. For 1995, the Town of Carver paid \$1,588.50 for our services, based upon an assessment of 15 cents per capita.

During the past year, the Town of Carver was represented on the SRPEDD Commission by Philip Harlow and Ann Miller. The Joint Transportation Planning Group representative was Dawn Parent.

Some of SRPEDD's more significant accomplishments during 1995 were:

- Completion and certification of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) which set regional priorities for federal transportation funds. The TIP sets priorities for \$134 million in federal and state dollars for regional transportation projects over the next 3 years.
- SRPEDD completed the first year of its program to develop and promote the aquaculture industry in southeastern Massachusetts. With the traditional fishing industry in crisis, coastal and inland aquaculture have tremendous potential in the region. The program consists of education and technical assistance to businesses and communities.
- SRPEDD reviews and proposes mitigation measures for the impacts of development projects in the region. In 1995, the proposal to bring commuter rail to Fall River and New Bedford was the most controversial project reviewed. SRPEDD is continuing to seek a regional consensus on alternative routes and proposed impact mitigation for this project. Other large development projects reviewed by SRPEDD were the proposed Wampanoag Casino in New Bedford (SRPEDD supports revenue sharing based on impact) and the proposed New Bedford Airport expansion (SRPEDD supports its expansion).
- The region's Overall Economic Development Program was completed for the U.S. Economic Development Administration and resulted in the awarding of \$1.65 million to expand the successful Myles Standish Industrial Park by more than 200 acres.
- A program to develop strategies and plans to relieve traffic congestion at the region's worst intersections was launched in 1995.

- SRPEDD conducts a district-wide traffic counting program and maintains a computer file of all available traffic count data throughout the region. SRPEDD undertook counts at 84 locations this year.
- SRPEDD also compiled computerized accident records for 8 communities. We used this data to publish the region's 25 most dangerous intersections and road segments. This information helps with the redesign of the dangerous areas.
- SRPEDD worked with the two regional transit authorities, GATRA and SRTA, on issues such as route evaluations, marketing, service to elderly and handicapped persons and overall data compilation and analysis.
- SRPEDD continued its affiliation with the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In 1995 SEED made loans to 132 small businesses in the amount of \$13 million. These loans are projected to help create 750 new jobs.
- SRPEDD continued to operate the Southeastern Massachusetts Data Center, providing information to businesses, cities and towns, and individuals.

In addition, municipal assistance was provided to Carver in the following areas:

- Provided Technical Assistance to the Local Economic Partnership and on the Update of the Open Space Plan
- Analyzed Warrants for Traffic Signals at S. Meadow Road and West Street

SRPEDD conducted traffic counts at the following locations:

- Main Street
- Route 58
- South Meadow Road
- Tremont Street

SRPEDD was created to serve the cities and towns of southeastern Massachusetts. We are governed by elected and appointed officials from all the cities and towns. We look forward to serving you in the future.

Report of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 1995.

The Project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is now composed of 25 Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the Town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. The Project is a regional response to a regional problem and provides a way of organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees, and mosquito control professionals into a single agency with a broad geographical area of responsibility.

Again in 1995, the season began with an above normal water table which produced large numbers of spring brood mosquitoes throughout the County. Efforts were directed at larval mosquitoes starting with the spring brood. Ground and aerial larviciding was accomplished using B.T.I., an environmentally selective bacterial agent. Upon emergence of the spring brood of adult mosquitoes, ultra-low-volume adulticiding began. The Project responded to service requests until a drying trend occurred during mid-summer. All sprayers and trucks performed well with little time lost to breakdowns.

The threat of mosquito-transmitted disease Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) was low in 1995. This season marked the second consecutive year since 1981 that EEE virus was not isolated during the mosquito surveillance period. A certificate of recognition was presented on September 21, 1995, to the Massachusetts Mosquito Control Association for continued cooperation and coordination with the Department of Public Health in providing surveillance of Eastern Equine Encephalitis.

The figures specific to the Town of Carver are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect town lines the information given below does provide a tally of the activities which have had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of Carver residents.

Insecticide Application. 5,292 acres were treated using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in May and the last in September.

Aerial Application. Larviciding woodland swamps by airplane before the leaves come out on the trees continues to be very effective. In Carver this year we aerially larvicided 540 acres.

Our greatest effort has been targeted at mosquitoes in the larval stage, which can be found in woodland pools, swamps, marshes and other standing water areas. Inspectors continually gather data on these sites and treat with highly specific larvicides when immature mosquitoes are present. Last year a total of 117 inspections were made to 69 catalogued breeding sites.

Finally, we have been tracking complaint response time, that is the time between notice of a mosquito problem and response by one of our inspectors. The complaint response time in the Town of Carver was less than two days with more than 273 complaints answered.

Mosquito Survey. A systematic sampling for the mosquitoes in Carver indicates that *Culiseta melanura* was the most abundant species. Other important species collected included *Culex pipiens* and *Culex salinarius*.

We encourage citizens or municipal officials to call our office for information about mosquitoes, mosquito-borne diseases, control practices, or any other matters of concern.

Report of the Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the residents of the town of Carver: The Delegate to the Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging is pleased to present this report of the Area Agency on Aging activities for 1995.

NARRATIVE STATEMENT:

The Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging is responsible for the planning, coordination and funding of elderly services under Title III of the Older American Act in the 23 community region served by the program. The Area Agency, in conjunction with input from the 23 community Advisory Committee, has focused its efforts on developing a comprehensive network of services and programs which are responsive to the full spectrum of elder service needs. In collaboration with local councils on aging and elder service provider agencies, the Area Agency provided grant funding for the following services and programs in Fiscal Year 1995:

- Senior Center and Outreach Programs
- Home Health and Respite Services
- In-Home Mental Health Services
- Services for Elders with Disabilities
- Transportation Services
- Legal Services
- Emergency Services
- Congregate and Home-Delivered Meals
- Nutritional Education and Counseling
- Services to Families and Caregivers
- Nursing Home Ombudsman Services

In addition to providing the services listed above, the Area Agency also used funding under Title III-F of the Older Americans Act for the provision of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Programs and Services, for:

- Community Health Education Presentations
- Demonstration fitness and exercise programs at local Councils on Aging
- Nutrition Education and Health Eating/Weight Loss Programs to almost 500 elders.

The Area Agency also used funding awarded from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health for the provision of Prostate Cancer Awareness and Education presentations throughout the region. The Area Agency worked closely with councils on aging and other human service provider agencies to conduct these presentations at various locations. A total of 14 educational presentations were conducted, serving more than 320 elders.

STATISTICAL INFORMATION:

The services and programs above were available to elders throughout the region. In 1995, over 380,000 units of service were provided to more than 12,000 elders. These included: serving 836 elders with over 2,000 trips under the Volunteer Transportation Program; approximately 2,300 units of in-home mental health services to 430 elders; 1,600 units of in-home personal care services; 3,500 units of legal assistance services; and 250,000 congregate and home delivered meals.

The Area Agency on Aging Advisory Committee Delegates and Alternates play a key role in the development and support of elder service programs in the area. The Advisory Committee, consisting of representatives from each of the 23 communities served, assists the Area Agency in assessing elder service needs, establishing funding priorities and selecting subgrantees to provide Title III services. The support and cooperation of the local communities and Advisory Committee is acknowledged with gratitude by the Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging.

Plymouth County Cooperative Extension

County Extension programs are carried on through Plymouth County in cooperation with UMASS-Amherst and the United States Department of Agriculture. The Cooperative Extension System is supported by County, Federal and State funds, and operates under Federal and State laws and agreements. Education programs focus on water quality, horticulture, agriculture, 4-H youth and family development, and nutrition education. Volunteer advisory groups work with staff on developing specific programs. Local citizens, appointed by the County Commissioners, serve as County Extension trustees, directing the overall program. Extension staff serve as a direct link with the University of Massachusetts. New research findings are translated into practical applications and shared with people and communities through workshops, conferences, field demonstrations, technical assistance, newspaper articles, radio and television. Publications such as regular newsletters and booklets, fact sheets, and home study courses, bring information directly to those who need it.

In Plymouth County, the Cooperative Extension outreach office is located on High St. Hanson. In Southeastern Massachusetts regional programs are conducted in cooperation with the Barnstable County Extension Program. Satellite offices of UMASS Cooperative Extension are located in Bristol and Norfolk Counties. UMASS Cooperative Extension also operates the Cranberry Experiment Research Station, located in Wareham. The Cooperative Extension office (Hanson) is open 8:30 - 4:30 p.m. Mon - Fri. Currently, the county field staff consists of a County Director, two 4-H Youth Development Specialists, a Nutrition/Family Development Specialist, and a Landscape/Nursery Specialist. A federally funded Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program, which has been active in Plymouth County since 1969, is run under the auspices of Cooperative Extension. Currently, one supervisor, and two outreach educators work in this program conducting a UMASS nutrition education certificate course. A three-year Water Quality Grant was received this past year for work in the Taunton River Watershed Connections Project. PROGRAM OUTREACH

- **CABLE TV** - One hundred and thirty (130) cable TV shows "Extension News & Notes" have been produced by Plymouth County Cooperative Extension. All but 3 Plymouth County towns use this half-hour Cooperative Extension cable TV program in their weekly community access channel, reaching over 100,000 households.
- **RADIO** - Every Sunday morning at 8:10 a.m. on WBET (Brockton), Cooperative Extension staff present a 15 minute broadcast on upcoming programs and timely educational topics.

- **NEWSLETTERS** - Cooperative Extension publishes fifteen newsletters in the area on Natural resources/Agriculture/Nutrition for residents and commercial growers. A master list of these is available from the County Extension Office.
- **FACT SHEETS** - Cooperative Extension has numerous fact sheets available to the public. Multiple copies of the order form "150 Most Popular Tip Sheets" are distributed routinely to libraries, town halls, and local cooperating agencies.
- **SERVICES** - The County Cooperative Extension office has information and instruction forms to have your soil tested. UMASS Cooperative Extension Soil Analysis Lab tests for soil pH and complete soil analysis. Pressure gauge tests for home canners are conducted at the County Extension Office.
- **EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS** - A wide variety of teacher training workshops, lectures and on-site field demonstrations are conducted. 250 key county agencies receive a monthly mailing listing local Cooperative Extensions activities.
- **AFFILIATIONS** - 4-H Farley Outdoor Education Center is a non-profit regional ACA accredited overnight camp run by a Board of Directors representing 4-H in SE Massachusetts. Information on this facility can be obtained from the Plymouth County Cooperative Extension office.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

The past year has brought about many changes and accomplishments within our district. We welcomed Debra Haskell, Assistant Principal at the Gov. John Carver Primary/Elementary and Benjamin Ellis Pre-school center. Ms. Haskell previously was a member of the Middleboro Public Schools faculty where she served as a Reading Specialist. Over the past several months, Ms. Haskell has contributed greatly within her multiple role as Assistant Principal for all three schools. We also appointed eight new teachers to the high school staff and four new teachers on the primary/elementary level. Not all positions were new, several were the result of resignations and retirements. Ms. Ruth Lynch left Carver High School after seven years to become Assistant Principal for Duxbury High School. Although Ms. Lynch will be missed, we congratulate her on her new position. Mr. Richard Ward retired after thirty years of service to Carver students. Mr. Ward was a positive role model and one of the founders of our successful athletic program. We all wish Dick and his family a healthy and enjoyable retirement, and we hope to continue to see Dick at school events.

Immersed in the third year of education reform, our schools have been a hotbed of activity. The District-Wide Curriculum Committee completed a handbook which provides a blueprint for curriculum revision and development; this document also identifies a five-year plan for curriculum revision. The school administration developed a professional development handbook which clearly identifies the opportunities for professional staff to assist them in the development of their skills as teachers. The Carver School Committee held an educational forum to discuss the impact of the State Department of Education mandates around the topic of time and learning. As a result, administration developed a staggered schedule for each school building to allow for the implementation of suggestions that came from the forum. I can report at this time our current schedules fully meet the education reform mandates regarding time and learning. As we looked more closely at the use of days in our school calendar, the last day of school for staff was changed from a full day of varied activities to a full day of professional development. This year, on February 26 we will have a full day of workshops for certified staff presented by our own teachers and administrators.

The Carver School Committee identified the following three goals for 1995-1996:

- #1: All members of the Carver Public School Community can expect to be treated with a high level of respect and dignity by all other members of the community while attending any school activity in order to create a positive learning and social environment. All members of the school community will work to convey to all students, appropriate levels of behavior that will help to increase their potential for success in their future academic, business, professional and social activities.
- #2: Carver students shall continually improve in basic academic skills in the areas of science, mathematics, language arts, social studies and world languages.

#3: Carver Public Schools' administration, staff, students and community residents will communicate in an open, honest and respectful manner.

The school administration has been working all year to develop measures and indicators to assess our progress in the above-stated goals. In the spring the school district will mail a "report card" of our progress to all parents.

Achievement scores of elementary students remain at an average of fourteen points above the national percentile ranking for a total test battery result. Students are tested in grades two through six in areas of reading, language and mathematics. The elementary schools, kindergarten through grade six, have adopted a new literacy program for reading and language arts and our expectation is that students will learn the essential skills and will become more proficient in higher order skills, such as critical thinking. At the secondary level, the "teaming" process has been completed in grade seven and we are planning to fully implement a team approach in grade eight next year. The senior high school grades have a completely revised course of studies and we have instituted several new courses. Study periods have been fully eliminated in grades seven and eight, and a structured study concept will be adopted fully in the senior high level next year. Many new initiatives, such as the elimination of bells, the introduction of a study skills master notebook and the introduction of six marking periods have been introduced with the hope of improving student learning outcomes.

The School Building Addition Committee for Carver High School has identified that the building addition project will begin this spring. We hope to have the project completed by next spring and fully occupied by September of 1997. The completion of the project will allow the school district to identify a separate middle school, grades six through eight, under the control of a separate principal. Our current staff have been meeting this year in preparation of the transition.

Our athletic program continues to provide students with learning opportunities and the development of skills in teamwork and cooperative interactions. The wrestling team and the girls' softball teams have proven that the third time never fails by winning state championships in their respective sports for the THIRD TIME. We are very proud of the coaches and students of both teams for incredible records of accomplishment. We identify students who participate in athletic programs as student/athletes, always cognizant of the "student" part of the title. Our athletic program is designed to promote learning experiences which contribute to the physical, mental, social and emotional growth of our students. I am also proud to report that our students continually are awarded "good sportsmanship" titles. These titles are a reflection of the philosophy of our athletic director and coaches.

The Carver School Committee, with the support of community residents, has provided our school district with the direction, resources and opportunity to meet the needs of our students. We have begun the process of comprehensively assessing how well we accomplish that task. Our theme this year was Assessment and Critical Thinking and all learning

opportunities for staff within our school district have been devoted to improving our understanding, as educators, of how we assess student progress, and whether our students have learned to think critically. Assessment of our progress is critical to assist us in making future decisions relative to personnel and programs. As we prepare to complete the third year of educational reform, we must be sure that our reform efforts have resulted in continuous improvement.

Report of the Industrial Development Commission

The mission of the Carver Industrial Development Commission is to promote the towns economic development by encouraging the creation and growth of local businesses engaged in appropriate commercial and industrial activity. This year the IDC organized Carver's first Local Partnership Committee with many of the IDC members participating. The local Partnership under Chairman Paul Kelly was able to secure a grant from E.O.C.D. in the amount of \$27,500.00 for the purpose of doing an economic study of the town of Carver. The IDC also met with the coordinators of McDonald's Corp. To help with information and logistics involved with opening a business in Carver. The IDC has worked with other perspective Businesses inquiring about Carver. The IDC made inquires of several business ventures, to try to attract them to Carver, those being the hotel and accommodation business and a possible bus line to come to Carver on a scheduled basis. The goal of the IDC for FY97 will be to finish an "informational brochure" about Carver and develop distribution channels for attracting businesses to Carver. Our ongoing goals will be to continue to look for and help prospective businesses locate in the town of Carver, and to pursue the avenues of some form of public transportation in the town and to also provide accommodations to visitors who wish to spend a short period of time in Carver.

Our budgetary needs for FY96 consist of monies to erect a second "welcome" sign in the south end of town on route 58 at a cost of \$100.00.

To pay for an overhead aerial photo of the town being used in a plan to beautify and revitalize the center of town at a cost of \$50.00.

The final budgetary request for FY96 will be to fund the collection of information and printing costs of the informational brochure at a cost of \$850.00.

We see a need to make a budget request for FY97 in the amount of \$1,000.00 to help in the final distribution phase of the information brochure and the development and creation of a, "Business Info Pack" which will help future businesses find their way through the many processes needed to open up in Carver, ie: zoning bylaws etc. We would also have enough money to finance any reprint of the "information brochure" if needed.

The IDC will seek to foster a climate that is favorable to business growth and beneficial to Carver residents. The Commission will work diligently to preserve and improve the quality of life in Carver while cooperating fully with other local, county, state and federal agencies in matters of mutual interest.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to close the following inactive accounts, or take any other action relative thereto.

(by Town Accountant)

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to reallocate Fiscal Year 1996 budget line items, voted in Article 3 of the Special Town Meeting of October, 1995, or take any other action relative thereto. The reallocation will not result in an increase or decrease of the total budget.

Article 4. Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept new provision M.G.L. Full payment should be in the Tax Collector's hands no later than November 1st, or 30 calendar days after the tax bill is mailed, whichever is later, or take any other action relative thereto.

Adult Bookstore/Adult Motion Picture Theater
Board of Appeals

In the Industrial and Industrial X Districts subject to the following conditions.

- A. Adult Bookstores and Adult Motion Picture Theaters may not be located within one thousand (1,000) feet of each other, and
 - 1. Within five Hundred (500) feet from the nearest lot lines of a Residential District.
 - 2. Within five Hundred (500) feet from the nearest lot lines of any establishment licensed under the provisions of Section 12 of Chapter 138 of the Massachusetts General Laws.
 - 3. Within one Thousand (1,000) feet from the nearest lot lines of a school, church, day care center, public beaches, or playgrounds.
- B. Adult Bookstores and Adult Motion Picture Theaters and all advertising signs shall not be located within fifty (50) feet of a public or private way and must be set back a minimum of fifty (50) feet from all lot lines.
- C. The application for Special Permit must include the following information.
 - 1. Name and address of the legal owner of the bookstore or theater.
 - 2. Name and address of all persons having a lawful equity or security interest in the bookstore or theater.
 - 3. Name and address of the manager.
 - 4. The number of employees.
 - 5. Proposed security precautions.
 - 6. A plan of physical layout of the premises.

- D. A Special Permit for an Adult Bookstore or Adult Motion Picture Theater shall lapse within one (1) year, including the time required to pursue or await the determination of an appeal filed pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40A, Section 17, from the grant thereof, if a substantial use thereof has not sooner commenced except for good cause or, in the case of permit for construction, if construction has not begun by such date except for good cause.

ADULT LIVE ENTERTAINMENT ESTABLISHMENT — An enclosed building used for presenting live entertainment featuring nude or semi-nude dancing, suggestive dancing, or live entertainment distinguished by an emphasis on matters depicting, describing, or relating to sexual conduct, or sexual excitement as defined in Section 31 of Chapter Two Hundred Seventy-Two of the Massachusetts General Laws.

2. By adding the following to Section 8 - Uses by Special Permit

Adult Live Entertainment Establishment
Board of Appeals

In the Industrial and Industrial X Districts subject to the following conditions.

- A. Adult live entertainment establishments may not be located within one thousand (1,000) feet of each other, and
1. Within one Thousand (1,000) feet from the nearest lot lines of a Residential District.

A Special Permit for an adult live entertainment establishment shall lapse within one (1) year, including the time required to pursue or await the determination of an appeal filed pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40A, Section 17, from the grant thereof, if a substantial use thereof has not sooner commenced

except for good cause or, in the case of permit for construction, if construction has not begun by such date except for good cause.

D. Adult Live Entertainment Establishment and all advertising signs shall not be located within fifty (50) feet of a public or private way and must be set back a minimum of fifty (50) feet from all lot lines.

(by Zoning Board of Appeals)

Article 19. 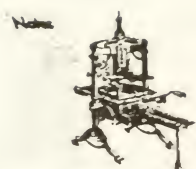
